RUNAWAYS

'I'm helpless, real helpless,' mother laments

The names that follow are fictitious to protect the privacy of the individuals involved.

Anxiety was etched in the face of Laura Gilbert. She sat, hands clenched in her lap.

Her voice never broke but tears occasionally rimmed her eyes.

"I need a place to go," she said. "I'm helpless. Real helpless."

She's the mother of four sons, three of whom either attend college or hold steady jobs. But something's wrong with 14-year-old Tony and "helpless" was Laura's only description of her feelings as she sat in her comfortable Federal Way Rambler home.

The day before, Tony had left the house and not returned that night, just as he had done twice before in the last five months. The first time he was missing only overnight, the second time stretched into three weeks, and now the third time... "who knows?" she asked.

Tony is what is commonly recorded with the police as a "runaway." He began the wandering habit last winter, apparently realizing that his mother and father have no control when he refuses to come home at night.

FOR LAURA, that reality has become a nightmare riddled with anguish that, in addition to a myriad of troubles, threatens to break up her marriage. And she sees no way out.

"There isn't much I can do," she explained. "I can't tie him to a chair just to make sure he's here. And once you get him home, how long's he going to stay this time?"

Still, she spends hours looking for him, visiting his junior high, talking to his friends. "But even if his friends knew, they wouldn't tell me," she said softly.

Tony first ran away in January because his mother removed the stereo from his room. "There were some loose parts and we were concerned about his safety," Laura said. Angered, Tony left the house and didn't return. He was found at a friend's house the next day.

"After that he seemed to be OK for a long time," Laura recalls. Then in the end of March he was gone again. Laura had asked him to pick up some windfalls on the lawn, sending him out twice to complete the job. The third time she sent him out, he kept walking. Three weeks later he was discovered in Auburn and returned home.

"I TOLD HIM when he came back that time that he could run

away if he wants to," Laura said. "There's nothing much as a parent I can do."

Tony was home for nearly a week when he and some friends were picked up by King County Police for breaking into a neighbor's garage. "I got a call about 11 a.m. and a friend on the police force asked if I'd talked to Tony. I said no, he's in school. Then I found out he wasn't," Laura said, her fist tightening. "I was so angry I couldn't believe it. I gave him a lecture and said he's going to have to start making the right decisions for himself." Then he was gone again.

Laura has handfuls of theories—but no answers—and receives very little assistance from the usual authority figures. The police have dozens of runaways with which to deal in South King County alone, spawning a more passive attitude toward finding them. "If they find Tony, the police will call me or bring him here. But they won't look for him," she said, adding that she can understand such a policy considering the runaway volume.

Neither is there any assistance at school, she said. "There's no law to protect you. No place to put him. Nothing anybody can do."

SO SHE STRUGGLES through

the day, trying to find her son and an answer to a perplexing situation. "I kind of expect him to call one of these days and I really don't know what to say to him." Laura shook her head. "I don't really want to welcome him home. It's put a strain on my marriage and on my family life. I'm at a loss today."

"It could ruin my marriage," she continued. "At times I don't want to believe the things Tony does. I try to defend him, my husband doesn't agree and it causes some big arguments. I can't blame my husband."

AT TIMES, HOWEVER, she blames herself, feeling guilty for perhaps spoiling the youngest or failing to be his companion. "Actually he's immature and it might be my fault. He's always had problems in school and it's been a real trouble getting him through. Right now he's failing every class."

And sometimes she blames outside influences. "Maybe it's our fault, the way we're raising the children these days. We try to teach them the right values but then we send them to school and other kids are that way. If Tony got mixed up with another group of kids, he'd be better off."

The irony of the situation is that Laura has a background of work-



ing with troubled kids. She has worked both with special education programs on the elementary level and with Federal Way's Continuation High. "But it's not like working with your own. I always hoped my kids wouldn't turn out that way," she said. "At least three of them didn't."

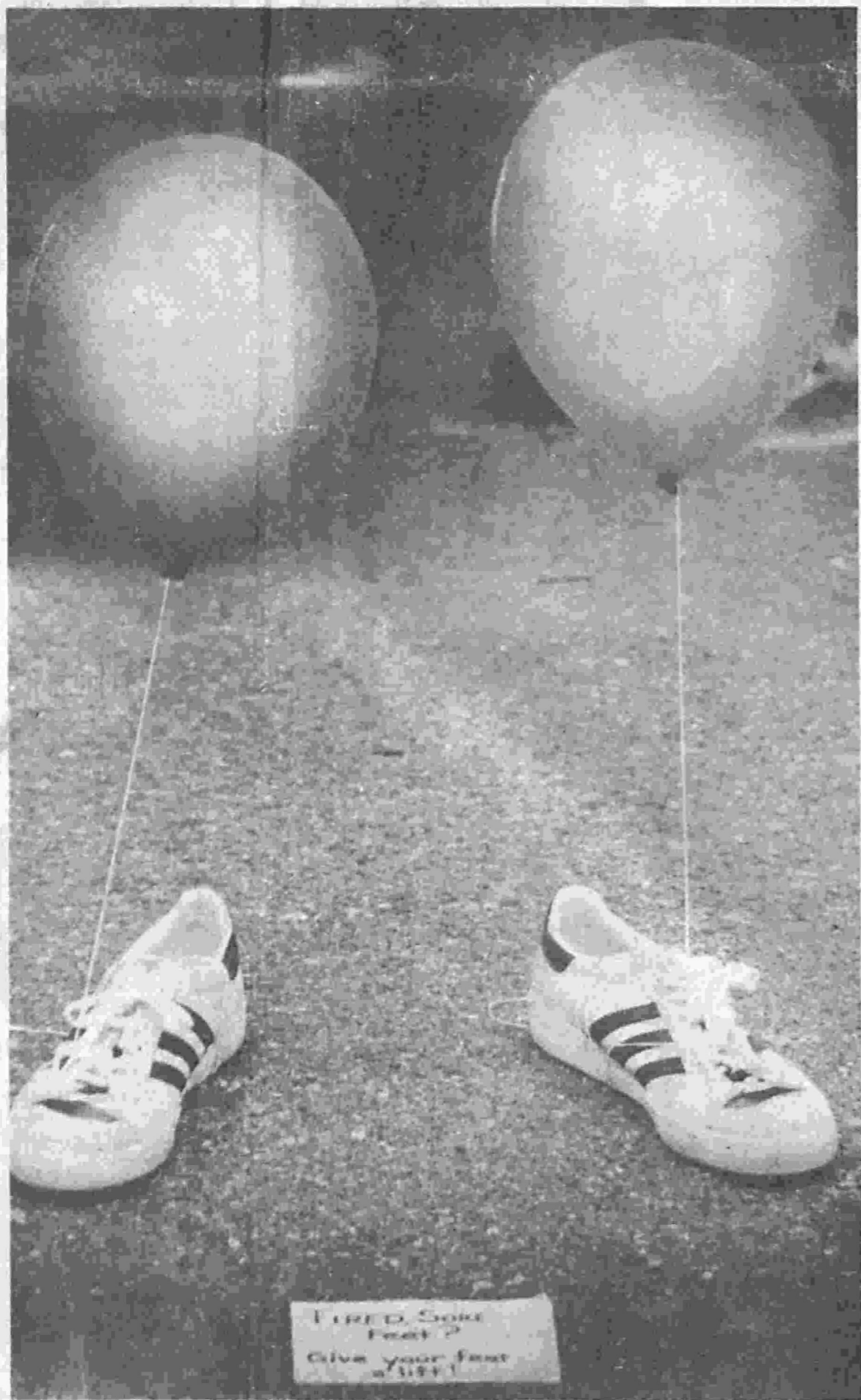

Appropriations bill may determine festival fate

With \$5 million for the project included in both the House and Senate versions of the 1979-81 budget, only one more major legislative hurdle remains before Federal Way's proposed Pacific Northwest Festival in the Forest becomes half a reality.

The other half, actually more like three-fourths in terms of basic dollar amounts, will depend on the often unpredictable will of Congress.

Jim Badgely, of the Pacific Northwest Festival in the Forest Ad Hoc Committee, said that there's no doubt that the budgetary measure will achieve House and Senate approval. But for the expenditure to be authorized, he said, both branches of the Legislature will have to also approve an appropriations bill.

The situation is therefore similar to the one that confronted festival supporters in 1977, when the Legislature budgeted the funds but failed by one vote to approve the issuance of the necessary bonds.

Nevertheless, Badgely, whose committee includes a number of local businesspersons and residents who support the proposal, said that he believes the appropriations bill will receive the necessary votes, probably sometime later this week.

"IT LOOKS as if we have enough votes in the Senate," he

said, "and the appropriations bill has already been passed by the House. But if the Senate amends the bill — and that's what it will probably do — the bill will have to go back to the House for further approval."

"The next biggie," said Badgely, "is getting federal funds."

Plans for the performing arts center — it would be built on a 30 acre tract of land donated by the Weyerhaeuser Company — call for an additional \$15 million to come from federal sources.

"We talked with Norm Dicks and Henry Jackson (U. S. Rep. Dicks, D-6th District, and U. S. Sen. Jackson) a couple of weeks ago," Badgely said. "The one thing Dicks said is that as soon as the legislation goes through the Legislature, then he can start doing something back in Washington D. C."

"Of course there's a no more spending' feeling in Washington, so we don't know just exactly what's going to happen there," he said.

BADGELY URGED supporters

of the center to write to Dicks, Jackson and U. S. Sen. Warren Magnuson, asking the three representatives to push for the necessary federal funding. Dicks, he said, has already received several hundred letters from Federal Way residents and others who support construction of the center.

When completed, the festival would house Seattle Opera's annual production of Wagner's works, but it would also be used by a variety of other theatrical and musical groups.

In addition, Tacoma city officials say it could become the site of the northern terminal of the proposed Tacoma rapid transit system, thereby linking Metro Transit to a high speed rail transport network in Pierce County.

Tacoma's rapid transit plans are on the drawing board, with funds for their construction slated to come from a 1989 World's Fair and a series of national expositions in Tacoma during the next decade.

A lot of junk comes across my desk every day en route to its final resting place in the waste basket.

Usually it gets no more than a disinterested glance before being cast in the general direction of the ultimate "out" basket.

But once in a while something comes in that skids to a stop and makes me sit up and take notice. So it was with a press release from the Washington State Research Council proclaiming next Sunday, May 6, 1979 as Tax Freedom Day.

In case you've never heard of Tax Freedom Day I'm going to tell you all about it whether you like it or not and I'm positive you won't.

Tax Freedom Day (TFD) is that point in the year when the typical taxpayer will have amassed enough money to pay all his federal, state and local taxes for the entire year.

Looking at it another way, when you went to work Jan. 2, you were doing time for the tax person. Now, 88 working days later you're all paid up.

Taxes include Federal income, Social Security, property, sales, gasoline, motor vehicle excise, tobacco, booze, real estate excise, and taxes paid by business and passed on to the consumer.

It's like being in the military, or in jail on a work release program. You get furloughed or sprung on May 6, but you know you gotta go back next year.

As I digested this assemblage of wonderful and wonderful data I noticed an absence of productivity in the newsroom. There was a lot of giggling, chattering and such, but no typewriter tap tap taps.

I peeked into the newsroom and saw a couple of reporters chattering about the weekend past, another had his feet on the desk and was reading the newspaper, and yet another was intensely involved in a Spiderman comicbook. Even the newsroom workhorse seemed lethargic and was punching a tape at half speed.

"All right, you guys (we don't discriminate in the newsroom, they're all guys to us) there are gonna be some

changes around here starting May 7," I said.

Nobody paid much attention, but the guy with his feet on the desk slowly removed them, and the guy with the comic book put it down. The workhorse began to type a little faster and the two in the corner looked at me as they continued their inane conversation.

"I suppose none of you know the significance of May 7," I yelled. "May Day?" one said.

"Mother's Day?" another suggested.

"Your birthday?" a third asked.

"Wrong," I said. "It's the first working day after Tax Freedom Day."

"What's that? Another one of those right wing Republican tax-revolt-and-balance-the-budget protests?" our political writer asked.

I explained the concept of TFD and why it was Feb. 9 back in '29 and April 15 in '59.

I don't much care what you do as long as you're supporting Jimmy and Dixy and Norm and Mike and all those high paid bureaucrats, but come next Monday you're working for Robinson newspapers and we're going to start putting out a newspaper around here," I declared, thumping a desk for emphasis.

"I saw the same news release," she said, "and the way I've got it figured, I've been working for Robinson all year and come Aug. 28 I have to work for the tax man for the rest of the year—that's when I start vacation."

Distrust justified

Why do many Highline area residents distrust the Port of Seattle?

The Port answered that question loud and clear last week when it approved the lease agreement with Weyerhaeuser for the company's 2.3 acre aviation center west of Sea-Tac Airport.

It was not so much that the Port Commissioners approved the lease, but the way in which they did it.

The Port did not adequately inform the public that the Weyerhaeuser lease item would be on the agenda of the Tuesday, April 24 meeting, so many residents who would have protested the lease were not in attendance.

The Port did not provide Robinson Newspapers with an agenda containing the Weyerhaeuser item until Monday, the day before the meeting. Since we publish on Sundays and Wednesdays, there was no way for us to publicize the meeting before it took place.

As a result, the residents who are opposed to the Weyerhaeuser development

and rely on this paper for information were not informed of the agenda item.

They charge the Port with deliberately hiding the item from the public so there would be little or no opposition at the meeting.

We feel it was probably just an oversight on the part of some Port staffers. Nevertheless, the situation could have been rectified by tabling action on the lease agreement until the next Port meeting so the item could get adequate publicity.

Jack Block, a Port Commissioner from Normandy Park, attempted to table the matter for just that reason but was not successful.

Could it be that other Port Commissioners share the view expressed at the meeting by our loyal public servant, Commissioner Henry Kotkins?

"There is nothing that moral protesters could change," exclaimed Kotkins.

Wham, bang! Lease approved.

Loud, clear! Distrust justified.

Dogs causing problems

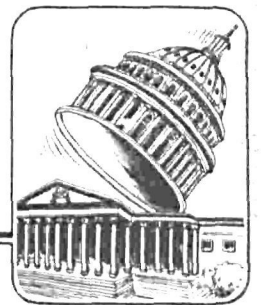
Editor: There are several dogs in my neighborhood that run loose. They tear up yards and get into garbage cans. This is beginning to be a big problem.

Under the Capitol Dome

Virtually every taxpayer in the state will get a break on July 1, but the Legislature is entitled to nothing more than passive credit. It won't result because of anything the lawmakers have done, but rather from what they haven't done.

On that date, a "temporary" increase in the retail sales tax and business and occupation taxes will expire.

It Doesn't Happen Often When originally enacted in the special session of 1976, it was scheduled to expire in July, 1977, but the seasoned observers only snickered.

"Temporary" increases had been enacted many times before, only to be extended before the scheduled expiration date. And eventually they were made permanent.

And sure enough, the "temporary" tax of 1976 has been extended from time to time ever since, right up to this year when, for a change, it isn't needed.

It Adds Up Total savings over the coming two-year period are expected to amount to an estimated \$115.35 million.

The rollback of the state sales and use tax from 4.6 to 4.5 percent means a reduction of \$59.3 million, and expiration of the surcharge on B and O taxes, a cutback of more than \$56 million.

Broken down on a yearly basis, sales and use tax savings are projected at \$27.8 million for fiscal 1979-80, and \$31.5 million for 1980-81, for B and O taxes, \$26.2 million and 29.8 million.

Who Will Ever Notice?

Savings for the second year of the biennium were projected at a higher level than the first year on the assumption that the state's economy will continue its ascension. But if this assumption proves correct, and it is accompanied by the same spiraling trend of inflation, it could completely negate the effects of any tax reduction.

As far as the sales tax is concerned, few, if any, will ever notice.

Every Little Bit Helps

Legislation authorizing irrigation districts to develop hydroelectric generating facilities has the potential of adding 500,000 KW to the Pacific Northwest power grid.

To help them finance such projects, the measure also extends from 10 to 40 years the bond retirement period for such districts.

It authorizes them to sell electricity to private power distributors as well as publicly-owned utilities.

Additionally, the irrigation districts are authorized to construct and maintain water conduits to carry water for domestic use of residents of a city or town.

Sharpen Those Axes

Meanwhile, in the face of the oil crunch and most of the state's coal still in the ground, efforts are underway to revive interest in wood as a heating fuel.

There is legislation requiring all building permit applications for single family residence construction to include provisions for use of this resource. Not only a masonry chimney will be required 90 days after the effective date of the act, but also a prescribed outside combustion air inlet. The effective date, however, is far removed—January 1, 1981.

Radiation Gets Attention

Radiation was a concern of the Legislature long before the Three Mile Island incident. Legislation granting the Department of Social and Health Services investigative and regulatory authority over hazards associated with use of ionizing and nonionizing radiation was introduced well in advance of the accident in Pennsylvania.

The authority, however, is specifically limited to laser, microwaves and ultra violet lights, with radio, television and microwave transmissions specifically exempted.

Additionally, regulation of radiation in workplaces is retained in the Department of Labor and Industries.

Back To Basics

One of the most difficult jobs the legislators had was reaching agreement on basic education—

which subjects for which the state would be responsible for full funding. Numerous attempts were made to include virtually all of the subjects now taught in some schools, what conservatives consider "frills."

The final product, however, had the list fairly well pared down, though such items as education for the handicapped, remedial and bilingual education were included as expected.

Too Active to Quit

After more than 30 years of public service, 16 of them in elective offices, former State Treasurer Jack Taylor has had enough of retirement.

Following a few months rest, he has joined Consolidated Land Agency, Inc., as associate broker and investment counselor. It is a full service real estate firm in Olympia.

Taylor, who started his public service as a King County Commissioner, serving two terms, then served eight years as State Land Commissioner.

Later he served in executive capacity with the Public Utilities and Transportation Commission, and for the last 14 years, as assistant treasurer under State Treasurer Robert S. O'Brien.

Ask what you can buy for a dime these days and the answer will be, "Pretty damn little."

Take a dime to the swap meet and your horizons widen. Take any amount of money to the meet, or none at all, and you will usually find there just what you are looking for.

The meet, which puts to daytime use the grounds of the Midway Drive-In Theatre, is the place to find the unusual, the much-used, the ill-gotten and ill-used and, now and then, a decent bargain.

"Accordion for thirty dollars. Must go!" blared the loudspeaker as people strolled, generally with no purpose in mind, between the colorful rows. Hurry is definitely not a part of the swap meet atmosphere.

Becky Wilson of Federal Way and friend Ginger Kelpszas wandered among the displays, carrying their young children. Ryan Wilson, 2, and Becky Kelpszas, 10 months, were sound asleep in their mothers' arms.

"I like it," Wilson said. "It's fun,

and you get some good deals."

Vendors, who pay 50 cents for the right to display their wares, are low key entrepreneurs who respect the amiable aura of the place. No hard sell here.

"We don't carry much in the dime line," L.A. Funk of Tacoma said. "I have slingshots for 25 cents, though."

Funk, a four-year veteran of swap meets, was able to uncover a manual of German war equipment, printed in German, that he would "let go" for a dime.

His display featured hunting equipment, survival gear and a large array of unusual books. His pride and joy, however, was a railroad drill from the 1870s. The price, negotiable, was \$100.

"There's always a buyer for it," Funk said of his crazy-quilt selection. "It's well worth the space."

Elsewhere in the meet were dime items ranging from an old microphone head (I'm sure it'll work if you got the right attachment), "Ring-a-Ding" key rings, imprinted with timeless slogans

like "U TURN ME ON," and National Geographics dating back to 1973.

A heap of old and new, classic and forgettable 45 records were going for 10 cents each. Two titles near the top of the pile were "Let's Do It" by the Checkmates, Ltd. and "Lily" by Shelby Flint.

Nearby could be found a battered ukulele. Price? 10 cents. No strings attached.

It was heartening to discover that balloons are still a bargain. A thin dime will buy five small balloons or two large ones.

For just five dimes, balloons inflated with helium could be had. Doug Coulbert of Seattle was the seller.

"I like balloons. Don't you like balloons?" he said, grinning like a kid. "I'm having a blast with 'em."

Coulbert, a Metro bus driver during the week, said the balloon business had not been bad.

"I'm just about breaking even." At the swap meet, that's about all you need for a good day.

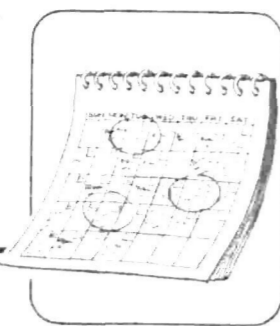

Crisis program helps pay costly heat bills

It doesn't take long to get rid of \$14,500 at the Crisis Intervention Program at the South King County Multi-Service Center. Serving 130 low-income clients since the first of January, the program has provided help to those who have found themselves temporarily unable to pay their heating expenses during the winter coldspell. Paying out an average of \$113 per client, it can aid a family once in a 12-month period.

The federally funded program, set up several years ago, was designed to help families with increased energy costs get help in life or health threatening situations.

Clients who qualify under low-income guidelines can be assisted with emergency firewood or fuel deliveries, emergency house repairs plus help in reinstating a utility that has been shut off. "We deal directly

with the utility company," said Frederick Allingham, emergency services coordinator. "We make our checks payable to them." He added that the client is expected to pay anything they can.

A card file is kept on each client. It is audited at the end of the program by the Community Services Administration.

Able to pay a maximum of \$250 per family, the service often mediates to ob-

tain extensions on shut-off notices, said Allingham. He mentioned one case where a woman came in with a \$360 bill, probably four months of utility charges. "Most of them don't come in until they are really desperate and then it's hard to handle it," he said. "They try to get it together and can't."

The service paid an initial \$160 and set up installments for the remainder.

Most clients, he said, found themselves strapped financially when utilities costs soared during a long cold spell in January and February. "Bills were \$20-\$50 higher than usual and it really made it tough," said Allingham.

blem, they are referred to other agencies such as the Salvation Army, the Federal Way Community Council or the Auburn Community Council.

Asked how the word of available funding got around, Allingham said they mailed out letters to various service agencies, put up posters and kept an ear out for complaints through the food bank, located next to the office.

"Word of mouth was probably what helped the most," he said.

Open through May 31, for a maximum \$250 per person, Allingham said he doesn't think he'll have any problem getting rid of the remaining \$1,000. "We get calls all the time."

The poverty program is the continuation of the Economics Office of Opportunity program of 1964 started by Pres. Lyndon Johnson.

TJ: controlled smoking

Nearly half of Thomas Jefferson High School's 1,100 enrollment want the school board to authorize a controlled smoking area at the school, governed by a five person board elected by the student body.

Russ Hancock, a Jefferson student and member of the school Senate, presented the school board with a proposal for a "Smoking Tolerance Policy." He said that the student smoking population at the school had presented the request to the student body government with a petition signed by 500 students.

The proposal calls for a mandatory one hour smoking hazard session, parent approval forms verified by the smoking board, supervision and monthly reports by the board, and provisions for suspending the privileges.

Hancock said he was personally opposed to smoking and that it should not be condoned by the administration, but the proposal was being brought to the board

because of the number of signatures on the petition. He estimated that 40 to 45 percent of the student body smokes, but said most refrain from the habit at school. However he said that the present non-smoking policy results in vandalism in restrooms.

THE BOARD took the issue under advisement and asked for an administrative response by the end of the month.

In other action the board passed a resolution renewing the contracts of all certificated personnel for the next school year. The action means that there will be no reduction in force (RIF) and that all teachers can expect to have a job next year.

Board member Larry Van Sickle said the action "symbolizes the re-birth of the educational program in Federal Way."

The district plans to hire additional teachers next year with increased funds from the state. In recent years the staff has been reduced because of levy failures.

Displaced homemaker project starts May 1

A Displaced Homemaker Project for eligible applicants will start May 8 and continue through Aug. 2 at Highline College. To qualify for the project, a person must be widowed, divorced or have a disabled spouse; need to work for pay in the near future; have a limited income; have limited paid work experience, and have spent substantial time as a homemaker.

From May 8 through June 28, sessions devoted to building self-confidence, clarifying values, learning decision-making and goal-setting skills, assessing vocational interests and examining the job market and

training opportunities will be held from 10 a.m. to noon on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Sessions from 1 to 3 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays will cover individual basic skills evaluation, basic skill development, math, reading, writing and study skills.

From 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Wednesdays, with a one-hour lunch break, those enrolled will take fieldtrips to community colleges, vocational-technical schools and businesses; take part in special workshops on financial planning, self-care and personal relationships and be given individual counseling time.

July 10, 11 and 12, the group will work together to discuss and practice job readiness skills prior to a two-week on-the-job experience, which will take place July 16 through 27. During this time participants will be placed for eight hours a day, 40 hours a week, in work settings observing and experiencing work activities. This is not paid employment.

The remainder of the project will be devoted to sharing work experience and receive assistance and support for the "next step."

Staff members for the projects are Jan Reha, project coordinator and instructor who is co-director of state-wide disadvantaged project and former vocational consultant for the

Bellevue project; Betty Colasurdo, Women's Programs Coordinator at Highline College, and the developmental studies staff.

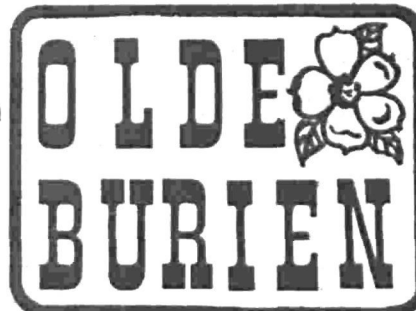

Karen St. Charles aims for higher archery success

Maybe William Tell's ability to shoot an apple off his son's head is the most famous exploit of archery marksmanship, but Karen St. Charles of Federal Way can wing an arrow more accurately than Tell's apple-splitter.

Karen estimated that she could consistently hit a 50-cent piece from 33 yards. She began competing in archery tournaments last December. Two months later, she won the Women's Open Division of the Northwest Indoor Championships at Shoreline Community College.

The 25-year-old bow-and-arrow sharp-shooter is now readying for the Washington State Target Tournament, which will be held May 19 and 20 at the Puyallup Fairgrounds parking lot.

Although she has quickly progressed into archery prominence, Karen has limited her goals concerning the sport:

"I don't want to turn pro. Archery has been fun for me, and I'd just like to keep it that way. I get to travel around the state for competitions and have met a lot of neat people involved in archery.

"I'd love to be one of the top target shooters in the state; maybe enter the Las Vegas Big and place well. It's a pretty big competition and attracts shooters from all over the western United States."

wheels. As the archer pulls back on the shooting portion of the string, the wheels rotate to transfer the bow's tension-weight backward. The shooter does not use a finger-tip release. Instead, a tee-shaped mechanical release is used.

"It eliminates arrow-flight fishtail," explained Karen's husband Jay, who is an archery equipment expert. "The string has a tendency to hop around the fingers during the release. This causes the arrow to wobble before its spinning motion straightens its flight. The wobbling motion hinders accuracy a little."

Karen's bow includes a two-power scope sight, mounted on the stock, and a small peep sight, fixed to the draw string. She aims in on the target by aligning it in both sights. A stabilizing rod mounted in the center of the bow's stock increases the bow's steadiness.

The total cost of bow, plus accessories, is \$340. The accompanying arrows sell for \$60 a dozen.

But Karen explained that anyone, who is interested in taking up target archery, could be completely outfitted for about \$125.

"PEOPLE SHOULD make sure that their equipment is properly fitted to them," she pointed out.

"Also, the arrows and the bow have to match to work together right. Anyone getting started in archery should get advice from a specialist before buying anything."

Karen and Jay are definitely authorities on archery. They work at Northwest Archery, located at 19807 1st Ave. S. Jay's parents, Glenn and Margaret St. Charles, opened the shop 30 years ago. Now, it's considered the Northwest's top bow-and-arrow specialty outlet.

Karen, along with her family, first became interested in archery target shooting 10 years ago. She learned the basics of the sport at The Indoor Lanes in Burien. When the establishment closed down, Karen gave up archery.

TWO YEARS AGO, she walked into Northwest Archery and met Jay. Their mutual interest in the sport initiated a conversation. A year later, they were married. Now, archery is the focus of their leisure and occupational pursuits.

However, Jay noted that beginners in target archery should not plan on progressing at the rate Karen did:

"She's naturally good at archery. She has a rare knack for it."

"Look to the essence of a thing..."
Marcus Aurelius
There is no record of whether this ancient Roman emperor ever fished, but this brief quote with its timeless wisdom helps one understand why fishing with ultra light gear is so treasured by those who have discovered it. For fishing with ultra light gear gets closer to the essence of fishing than any other method. It magnifies those peak moments of this great sport.

when your rod comes to life and the message flashes up your line to your hands that you have a fish on is one of these great moments. Another is that equal-ly small fraction of time when you know you've won, when you get the fish in the net or on the bank. The essence of the first moment is the unknown. You never are sure in that first instant the size of your fish, or in some waters, the kind it is. It's a moment of great expectation. The essence of the second is pride, a feel-

ing of success, that you have accomplished something on a very personal basis. There's no in between with either experience. You either have a fish on or you don't. You've either won the battle or it's not decided yet. These are positive, no-question-about-it turning points and therein lies their power to make men, women and children come back again and again to fish. The time in between these two split seconds can be filled with excitement, tension, pleasure and work.

They make a perfect contrast to the first and last moments. The essence of this time in between is uncertainty. You never really know until the last moment whether you're going to win or lose. If you've never tried ultra light fishing, one of the best places to get a feel for it is on our lakes this April, when the trout are on the bite. You have the whole lake in which to play a fish, with no really tough problems such as fast water, rocks or brush.

Fish poaching uncovered

ing about charges against nine persons in the Olympia area. Kramer singled out agents Jerry Thomas, Dick Smith and Jeff Boone as key investigators.

Charges resulting from the investigation included one count each of trafficking in game fish against eight persons, in-

cluding employees of six Olympia-area restaurants, and two counts against a commercial buyer.

Enforcement Chief Kramer emphasized that this case is only the tip of an iceberg as far as poaching is concerned, and that the level of enforcement isn't adequate to combat the problem.

FLIP Plan offers mortgage creativity

A new type of mortgage in the state of Washington is the FLIP, or Flexible Loan Insurance Program, now being offered by Hamill Mortgage, Inc. of Tacoma. The program has been tried out elsewhere in the country with great success and is now available here. A close look will show that it is different from the conventional mortgage because it allows a qualified buyer to extend his down payment to cover a more expensive home.

What's the trick? "A substantial part of the down payment," George Hamill explains, "goes into a pledged savings account. The principal and interest of that account help to pay off the mortgage's first five years, in a graduated payment plan, so that the payment rises as the borrower's income rises. By the start of the sixth year, when the borrower's income should be sufficient to cover both principal and interest on the mortgage."

A specific example may explain what is involved here. Robert Hamilton, vice-president and general manager of United Homes, has made the FLIP mortgages available on their new homes in Federal Way's West Campus. Their three-bedroom, split-level with two baths finished and a third roughed in, pantry and breakfast nook in the kitchen, large deck, formal dining room

and master suite, sells for \$72,250. Traditional mortgage wisdom would ask for an income large enough for the payment-to-income ratio to be 25 percent. A large down payment, of course, would mean that a smaller monthly income would be sufficient.

FLIP allows most of that down payment to go into an earmarked savings account. The principal and interest from the account are used to help pay the mortgage during the first five years, when presumably income is rising. By the start of the sixth year, when the savings account is depleted, the income has risen sufficiently so that the payment-to-income ratio is only 25 percent. For the rest of the term of the mortgage, the monthly payment remains constant.

A closer look at that particular house shows that a buyer with an income of \$27,000 could use a FLIP mortgage to good advantage. With a down payment of \$10,800, the earmarked savings account would be \$6,230.88. Then the monthly payment in the first year of principal and interest would be only \$441.53. (It must be remembered that mortgage insurance, taxes, and fire and extended coverage insurance are required; since the payments on those items are so variable, they have not been included here.) In the second year, the monthly

payment rises to \$474.23, but income has presumably risen also. For the third year, the figure is \$508.82 each month.

In the fourth year of the FLIP program, the monthly mortgage payment would be \$545.43. Fifth year, \$584.16. And, finally, in the sixth and all succeeding years, \$625.15.

Hamill points out that this is not everybody's mortgage. "Ability to earn goes up at approximately six percent per year. This is a patented program on a computer which figures out the curve and shows what an individual will be able to pay at the start of the sixth year. The largest group of those who qualify for this program also qualify for conventional mortgages but are terrified of the large monthly payment. Many of them choose standard financing after all, but FLIP offers them an option. The smaller group of those who qualify for this program are slightly short for a conventional mortgage for the home they need. For them, the FLIP program is ideal, because it allows them to use a savings account's income to help pay their mortgage each month."

Mortgage defaults are usually in the first two and a half years, Hamilton and Hamill are agreed. FLIP provides for the lowest mortgage payment during those periods of prom-

ably lowest income at the start of the mortgage. "If present trends continue," Hamill says, "this will be a valuable device to place people in homes."

Doug Fields of South King Realty, sales agent for United Homes, points out that the public is better educated now about real estate. "Many people recognize that the best investment they could have made five years ago is a home," he says. "FLIP increases your buying power or lowers your monthly payment and is ideal for the young or move-up family. It allows you to tap in now to the higher income you can expect in the future."

There are specific requirements on the program. The homes purchased under the FLIP program must be in Pierce, King, Thurston, Kitsap or Mason counties only. Large-scale investors are not eligible: only single family homes, owner occupied, qualify. The homes must be either finished or nearly completed, as the mortgage money cannot be spoken for out into the future more than a couple of months. Old or new homes are eligible, but only United Homes is participating to any substantial degree among the builders. Down payments as low as ten percent can qualify, but the benefits of course are greater with a greater down payment.

United Homes is one of the Northwest's largest home builders, with work in progress from Oakbrook to Federal Way. 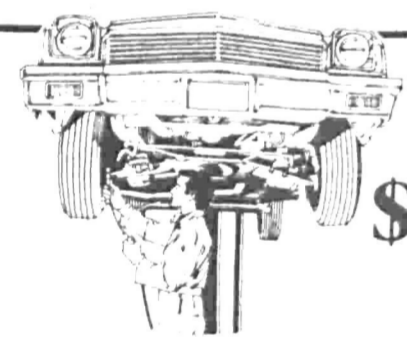

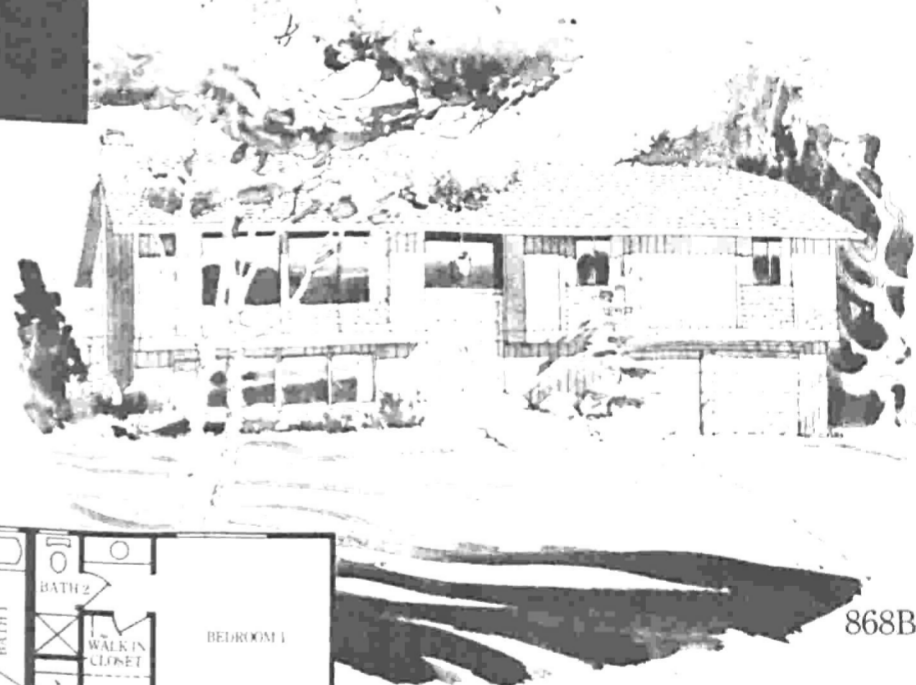

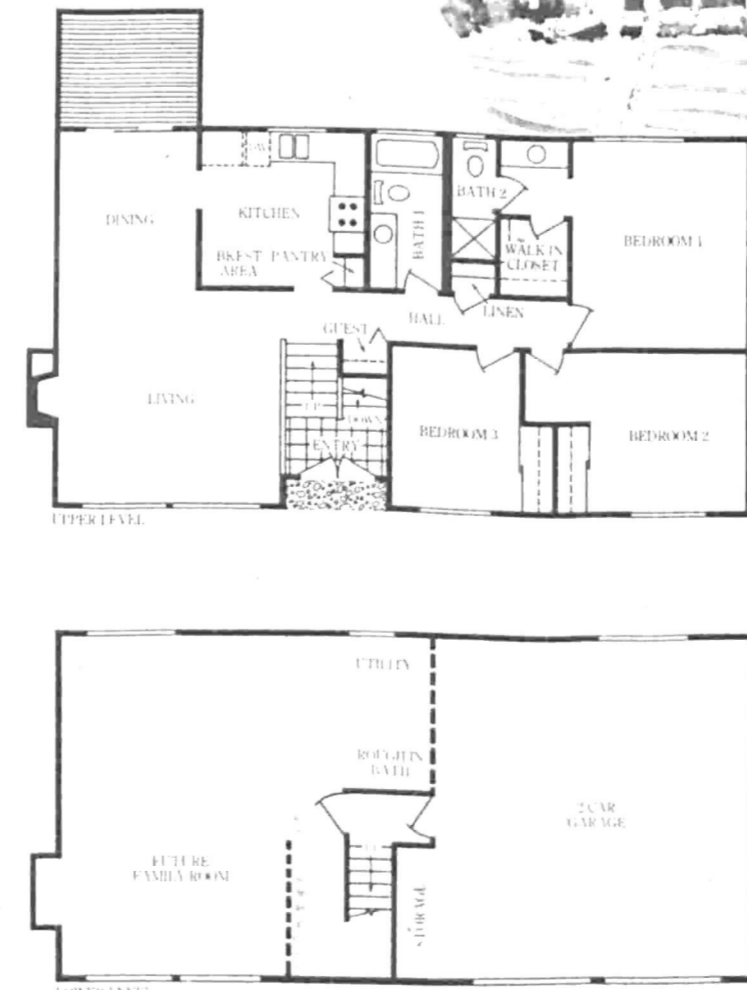

Density stymies townhouse approval

Action on a proposed 122-unit townhouse complex in the Meredith Hills area has been delayed for the second week in a row by the King County Council.

The council voted to put off a decision on Fountain Isle Lake townhouses because there is a conflict between the density in the county Comprehensive Plan for the area and the density allowed under the proposed revision to the Federal Way Community Plan.

The current zoning would permit one to two units per acre on the 17.4 acre plat but the revision committee has suggested medium density of from three to nine units per acre on the site.

Councilwoman Bernice Stern said the council appeals committee which heard an appeal two weeks ago of the proposed use, "felt we should not hold up the developer" while the revision to

the FWCP is pending before the council. She said the developer, Qualico Homes of Federal Way, was to be given the choice of developing now at the reduced density or waiting until the council takes action on the medium density proposal of the revision committee.

Councilman Paul Barden said he was concerned that such action by the council could "Prejudice our Position regarding density." He said storm water is a Problem and "I am concerned that we would put ourselves in a bad position by increasing the density. If we tacitly agree with nine units per acre, then we're going to be in less than an unbiased position."

In the appeals hearing April 16, Councilman Bill Reams won the unanimous support of the committee with his suggestion that the council "amend the community plan as it applies to this one pro-

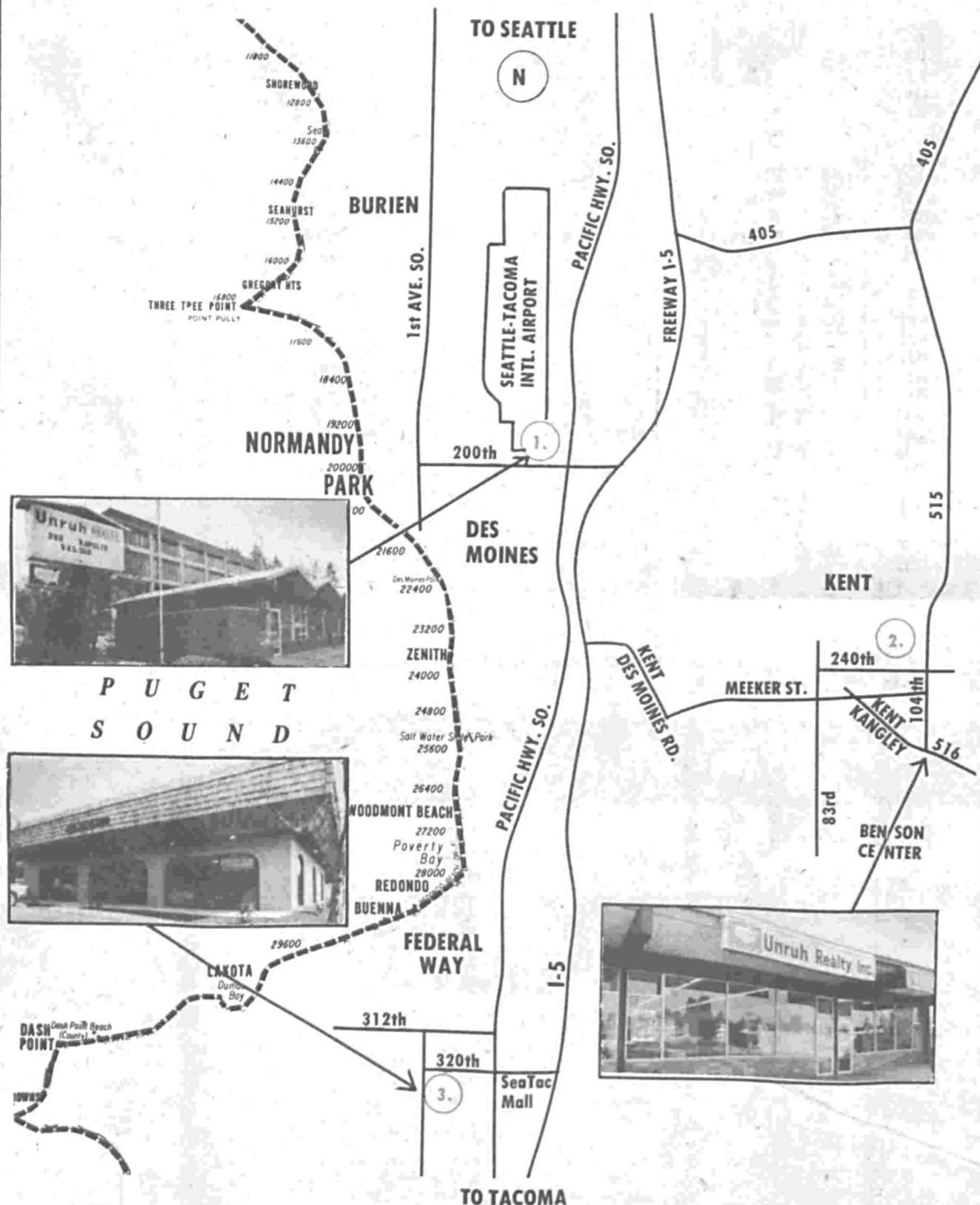

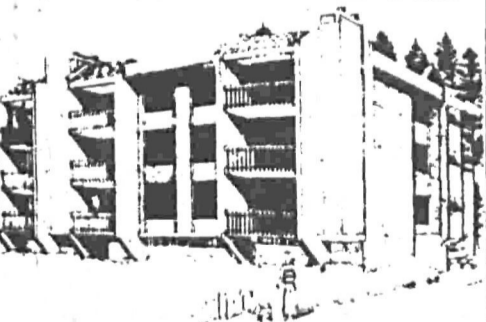

Homemade liqueurs designed for great results

To mixed or plain drink connoisseurs, liqueurs are often an essential item in the liquor cabinet. The taste is great, the cost is prohibitive. However, it is possible to duplicate these liqueurs at home for a fraction of the cost.

Homemade liqueur, a sweetened spirit flavored by vegetable substances, is often equal or superior to its store-purchased counterpart.

Liqueurs make an unique Christmas, birthday or any-occasion gift. Homemade liqueur makers should save every salad dressing to small liquor bottle they can find. Bottled and decorated with a personalized label, the liqueur packaging can demonstrate the treat to be expected inside.

It is legal to make homemade liqueurs — the alcohol used as an ingredient has already been taxed when purchased. Liqueurs do not increase in alcoholic content as they are created but reduce in content about 25 percent as other ingredients are added.

Liqueurs are traditionally served after filled to the brim of a small glass. Many connoisseurs recommend a larger glass to allow enjoyment of the spirit without spilling it.

Most liqueurs are chilled when drunk; by cooling or served over cracked or shaved ice. Chilled li-

queur does not suffer noticeable loss of character or aroma.

Some liqueurs are heavier than others and if carefully poured over each other in a glass, a layered drink will be created. For example, creme de menthe, creme de cacao and peach liqueur can be used together.

Liqueurs have moved from a solo act as a drink to being combined with other alcohols in mixed drinks. Some enhance coffee. They also can be used in cooking, baking, flavoring ice cream or making sauces.

The finished product should keep for several years with little deterioration. Liqueurs should be stored in an upright position.

Most liqueurs are made by macerating fruit or herbs in spirits and then adding sugar. The brilliant colors of most liqueurs are not natural but come from added food coloring.

There are a few tips for the homemade liqueur maker:

- Mix the liqueurs in a large, for example one-gallon, screw-top glass jar. These often are discarded by restaurants and managers often will give to an inquiring party.

- Satisfactory results come from using the least expensive liquor for the base ingredient. Only commercially prepared alcohol should be used as a base.

- Always record when the li-

queur was made, shaken and what ingredients were used. It won't be necessary to wonder if this is week two, or three, and to duplicate the information is readily available.

- Some spices may not be available on the grocer's shelf but can be obtained at speciality shops — such as the Specialty Spice Shop in Sea-Tac Mall or Pike Place Market.

- Glycerine, when needed, is available from a drugstore. It is used to give consistency to the finished liqueur.

- For one cup of sugar syrup, combine 1 cup sugar and ½ cup water, then boil together for several minutes. If substituting — HONEY FOR the syrup, use one cup honey for each cup of sugar syrup.

- If it is necessary to filter the final product, first pour through a wire strainer to remove large particles. The liqueur can next be poured through a wide weave cotton cloth — like cheesecloth — and successively poured through increasingly tighter woven cloth to remove additional sediment. Or, pour through filter paper used in a home drip coffeemaker.

- If the tips sound complicated and enough to discourage the effort, don't be alarmed. Start with an easy liqueur — such as creme de menth — and progress to the more difficult.

Recipes for tantalizing liqueurs

KAHLUA
7 c. sugar
8 c. water
4 oz. instant coffee
2 fifths vodka 1 vanilla bean

Combine sugar and water; boil 5 minutes. Remove from stove, add coffee. Bring to boil, again. Remove from heat and add vodka.

Split vanilla bean lengthwise and drop into one-gallon jug. Add liquid. Cover. Let stand three weeks.

CREME DE MENTHE
2 ¼ tps. peppermint extract
1 fifth vodka
1 ½ to 2 c. sugar syrup
1 tsp. glycerine

Combine ingredients in a large jar and shake well. Liqueur may be immediately used, but is smoother after two weeks.

CREME DE CACAO
6 tbsps. chocolate syrup 1 fifth vodka ½ c. sugar syrup

Mix ingredients in large jar and shake

well. The liqueur may be filtered to reduce cloudiness.

D R A M B U I E
SIMULATED
1 ½ tps. angelica root, chopped
1 fifth scotch whiskey
1 c. honey

Combine angelica and whiskey and let set overnight. Strain angelica out and add honey. The liqueur may be immediately used but if undisturbed for two months the cloudiness will settle out.

G A L L I A N O
SIMULATED
3 tps. angelica root, chopped
3-inch piece cinnamon stick
1 clove

¼ tsp. nutmeg
¼ tsp. mace
1 fifth vodka
1 c. sugar syrup

Combine all ingredients except sugar syrup in large jar. Shake well. Steep for one week, then filter. Add sugar syrup and liqueur is ready. Food coloring may be added.

GRAND MARNIER
— SIMULATED
1 fifth brandy
1 ½ tps. orange extract

1 c. honey
½ tsp. glycerine
1 pinch cinnamon
1 pinch powdered coriander

Mix all ingredients in large jar and shake well. Let stand one month and clarify by siphoning.

ORANGE LIQUEUR
5 naval oranges
2 c. vodka

1 ½ superfine granulated sugar
1 c. vodka

Pare very thinly the bright-colored rind from oranges. Use none of the white. Blot peel on paper toweling to remove excess oil. Put peel in a large jar and add 2 cups vodka. Close jar and store in a cool, dark place for two days or until vodka has absorbed the flavor and color of the peel.

Remove peel. Add sugar, shake until

sugar dissolves. Add one cup vodka and stir until liquid becomes clear. Close jar, store in cool place at least a week to age.

DAIQUIRI LIQUEUR
4 limes
2 c. light rum
1 ½ c. superfine granulated sugar
1 c. rum

Pare very thinly the bright-colored rind from limes, no white. Blot on paper toweling to remove excess oil. Put peel in a large jar. Add two cups rum, close jar. Store in a cool, dark place for two days or until rum has absorbed the flavor and color of the peel.

Remove peel. Add sugar, shake vigorously until sugar dissolves. Add one cup rum and stir until liquid becomes clear. Close jar and store in a cool, dark place at least a week to age.

PEACH LIQUEUR
9 small fresh peaches
1 fifth 80-proof vodka

1 c. sugar syrup. Peel peaches and cut into small pieces. Put peaches and vodka in large jar and let stand one week, shaking occasionally. Strain contents and press remaining liquid from peaches. Add sugar syrup, strain again.

PEAR LIQUEUR
6 fresh medium pears — about 2 lbs.
2 c. 80-proof vodka
1 c. sugar
½ c. 80-proof brandy

Core and coarsely chop pears to make 4 c. Place in one-gallon jar. Add vodka, sugar, brandy. Cover tightly, invert jar. Let stand 24 hours. Repeat turning process daily until sugar dissolves. Store in dark, cool place for five to six weeks. Strain into decanter.

BANANA LIQUEUR
1 medium-size ripe banana
1 fifth vodka
1 c. sugar syrup
¼ tsp. vanilla extract

Peel, mash banana and put into large jar. Add vodka, covering banana. Let set for one week. Pour contents through wire strainer to remove most of banana, add sugar syrup. Strain until all cloudiness is gone. Add vanilla, shake well.

CHERRY LIQUEUR
2 c. ripe Bing cherries
2 tbsps. powdered sugar
1 pt. brandy
¼ c. 100-proof vodka
1 pinch mace
¼ c. sugar syrup

Since the tinge of almond flavor in this liqueur comes from the pits, the cherries should be pierced several times each so interior parts of the cherry come in contact with the alcohol solution. Place cherries in jar, sprinkle powdered sugar over them, add brandy and vodka. Tightly close jar and store in warm place — about 80 degrees — for six

weeks. Pour off liquid and extract extra liquid from cherries. Add mace and sugar syrup, shake well. Filter remaining fruit particles.

ALMOND LIQUEUR
¼ tsp. almond extract
1 fifth vodka
1 c. sugar syrup

Combine ingredients, the liqueur is ready to be used.

YELLOW CHARTRUSE
— SIMULATED
1 ½ tps. angelica root, chopped
3 tps. melissa
3 tps. hyssop
3-inch piece cinnamon stick
¼ tsp. mace

Combine all ingredients except sugar syrup in large jar. Close tightly, shake and let steep one week. Filter several times. Add sugar syrup and liqueur may be used. Add yellow food coloring to obtain color.

Burritos spice up the Cinco de Mayo

Cinco de Mayo - the fifth of May - is a national holiday in Mexico commemorating a Mexican victory over invading French forces. In the U.S., Cinco de Mayo is celebrated as Mexican-American Day, and it's a fine time to enjoy one of Mexico's important contributions to U.S. culture - good food.

To make it a real fiesta, why not try these two party recipes, Jalapeno Burritos for a Crowd, which are spicy Mexican-style "sandwiches," and Chili con Queso, a cheese dip served with tortilla chips.

Jalapeno Burritos For A Crowd
 4 lbs cooked beef pot roast, shredded or diced
 ¼ cup cooking oil
 ¼ cup flour
 1 tsp chili powder
 1 jar (8 oz) Jalapeno strips in Escabeche, drained
 1 large onion, chopped
 ½ tsp oregano

2 cups beef stock
 36 large tortillas
 Cooking oil
 Sauté beef in ¼ cup oil in large skillet until meat is lightly browned. Sprinkle with flour; mix well. Stir in chili powder, jalapeno strips, onion, garlic, oregano and stock. Bring to boil; reduce heat and simmer until mixture thickens. Remove to serving dish and keep warm. Heat tortillas one at a time in lightly oiled skillet. Place 3 to 4 tablespoons of meat mixture on each tortilla. Fold over 2 sides and roll up. Eat like a sandwich accompanied by an assortment of Mexican-style sauces, which are available in supermarkets. 8 to 12 servings.

 One-third cup water
 1 tsp vanilla
 ½ tsp grated lemon rind
 ½ cup egg whites (about 4) ¼ tsp cream

 Sift flour, sugar, baking powder and salt into bowl. Make well in center; add corn oil, egg yolks, water, vanilla and lemon rind. Beat until smooth. 

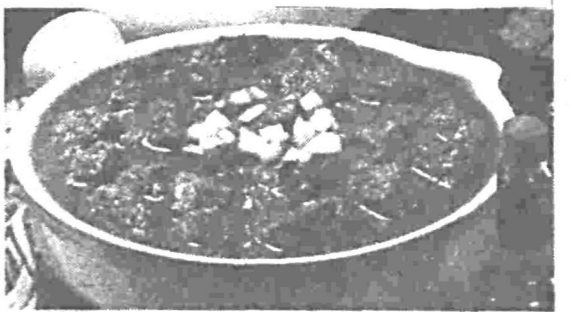

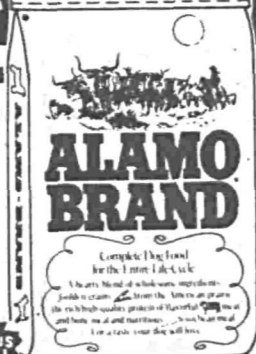

What's Cookin' in Ruth's Kitchen

So cobblers aren't quite as sweet and rich as pies, but by the time you top a serving with whipped cream or iced cream, they're not exactly the perfect weight watcher's fare.

A cobbler is usually baked at 375 degrees approximately 45 minutes to brown the crust, bake it through and cook the rhubarb tender.

A muffin batter made from scratch or from a mix makes a good cobbler topping.

It is not rolled but is spread on top of the sweetened rhubarb just before baking. You may want to mix a full sized recipe or batch of muffin batter, spread what you need on top of your cobbler and bake the rest in muffin pans to go with the rest of the meal.

OLD FASHIONED rhubarb pies were thickened with either flour or tapioca, and even with a quarter cup to a pie using three cups of rhubarb,

the filling was often runny, because rhubarb releases a lot of juice while baking. Then somebody discovered that if you stirred an egg or two into the filling the pie would not only cut better but have a nice, mild flavor. Here's a good proportion:

Rhubarb Pie
3 cups rhubarb, cut in 1 inch pieces
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 eggs
Beat eggs, and mix

with sugar, salt and flour. Pour over rhubarb and mix. Put in unbaked pie shell, and top with full crust or lattice crust. Put in 425 degree oven, and after 10 minutes turn heat down the 325 degrees for 30 to 40 more minutes of baking.

I never would have thought of using rhubarb in a jellied salad had I not seen a recipe in a cookbook that looked interesting. However, I wasn't satisfied with

the original proportions; so I made some alterations, tried it, liked it, and here is the recipe:

Rhubarb Salad
2 cups sliced rhubarb
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup water
1 package strawberry flavored gelatine
1/2 cup orange juice or pineapple juice
1 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Put rhubarb, water, sugar and salt in a saucepan. Bring to a

boil, and cook until rhubarb is tender but not mushy. Add strawberry gelatine to hot mixture, and stir until dissolved. Add orange or pineapple juice, and let stand in refrigerator until starting to thicken. Stir in celery and walnuts, and pour into a pan or molds until firm.

When they are good and plentiful you might want to add a few fresh strawberries for color and flavor.

With all the modern refrigeration and rapid transportation that give us good year round produce, fruits and vegetables in season are still a treat.

Asparagus is still followed by green peas, and rhubarb is the harbinger of spring that precedes local berries and fruits. Rhubarb is here now, and whether you pull it from your garden or buy it in the market, let's enjoy it before it's totally overshadowed by local strawberries.

Rhubarb is made into pies, cobblers, cakes, puddings and even jellied salads, but one of the simplest and best springtime treats is a dish of rhubarb sauce with your breakfast toast.

I've seen some complicated methods of making rhubarb sauce, but here's a simple one:

Easy Rhubarb Sauce
2 cups rhubarb, sliced thin
1/2 cup sugar

Wash and trim rhubarb stalks, and slice enough to make two cups. Put in a saucepan which has a fitted cover. Stir in sugar, and let stand a minute, and it will make its own syrup. No water is necessary. Cover the pan, and set on an element turned on high. Let it come to a rapid boil, but watch it, because it boils over easily. Turn heat to simmer, and in approximately five minutes it will be tender but not mushy.

This amount of sugar makes a tart sauce. If you prefer it sweeter use three quarters of a cup of sugar.

Some people add a dash of cinnamon, and some of us prefer our rhubarb sauce plain. A handful of raisins added to rhubarb and sugar before cooking makes a good variation, or if you want to add a sliced banana or a little crushed pineapple before serving, those are good variations too.

RHUBARB PIE recipes are many, ranging from full crust to lattice and from plain filling to thick custard, but cobblers are easier, and some people prefer them, because they're less rich, having only a crust on top and are usually made with less sugar than pies.

Cobblers are especially good served warm with cream, whipped cream, ice cream or with cream cheese blended with enough milk to make it soft and fluffy.

Cobbler may be topped with a plain biscuit crust made from a mix or it may be slightly sweetened and made richer with a small amount of butter or margarine cut in with a pastry blender.

Patted thin, a cup of biscuit mix will make enough crust to top a cobbler or deep-dish pie in a two quart casserole. Sweeten it with two tablespoons sugar and cut in two tablespoons of a quarter of a cube of either butter or margarine before adding enough milk to make a soft dough. Pat it or roll it out approximately three eighths of an inch thick, and wrap it

around a rolling pin to help you put it on top of rhubarb and sugar in a casserole. Slit the top of the crust with a sharp knife before baking.

COBBLER PRO-

PORTIONS are approximately a cup of sugar to four cups diced rhubarb, whereas for a pie you'll want a cup or more of sugar to three cups of diced rhubarb for the filling.

whole berries give the top a party finish. The rich flavor and full bodied texture of whipping cream make it a favorite dessert ingredient. It is also prized for its decorative qualities. A garnish of showy whipped cream adds instant appeal to any dessert. When whipped to a firm texture, it may be piped through a pastry bag

to create fancy borders, rosettes, ruffles of whatever. Or it may be served as a "chantilly" topping - lightly beaten to soft peaks. Once cream is whipped, it may be covered and refrigerated an hour or two before serving. Any slight separation of liquid from the cream may be put back in place easily

Garnish with additional strawberries. Makes 8 servings.

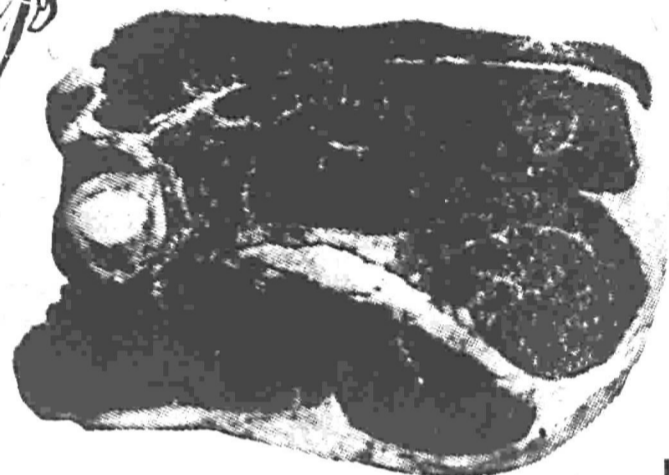
Strawberry Whipped Cream Filling:
 Combine 3 egg yolks, 1 cup powdered sugar and 2 tablespoons milk beating with wire whisk. Place over gently boiling water and cook, stirring constantly, 8 minutes or until mixture thickens. Remove from heat and stir in ½ teaspoon vanilla. Cover and refrigerate about ½ hour. Whip 1 cup cream until stiff peaks form. Fold into egg yolk mixture. Fold in 2 cups sliced strawberries. Makes 8 servings.

Optional: If desired, 2 tablespoons cream sherry may be substituted for the milk and vanilla.

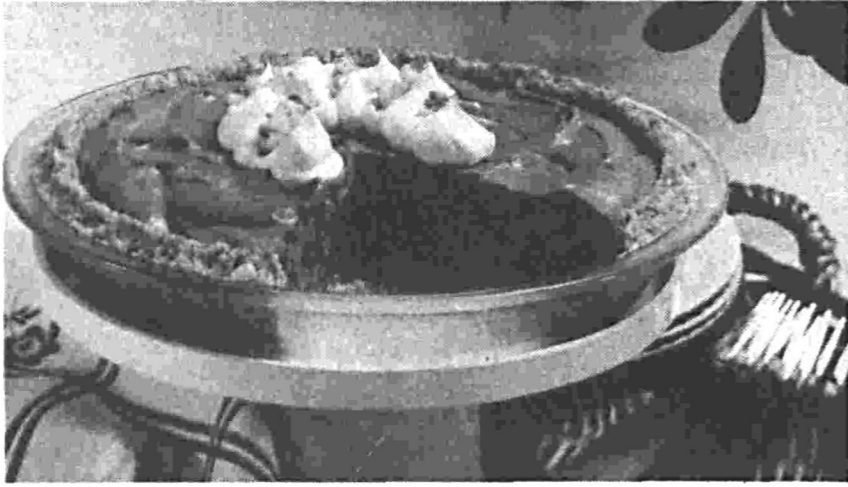

Creamy Chicken Omelet
 6 eggs, separated
 6 tbsps milk
 1/2 tsp salt
 1/4 tsp white pepper

 1 cup diced cooked chicken
 1 can (10 3/4 oz) chicken gravy
 2 tbsps chopped parsley

 Juice of 1 lemon
 1 egg yolk, beaten
 1/2 cup diced celery
 2 tbsps chopped parsley
 1/2 tsp salt
 1/4 tsp white pepper
 1/4 tsp thyme
 1 1/4 cups diced chicken

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Melt 6 tablespoons butter in skillet and saute bread crumbs until golden brown. Melt remaining butter in sauce pan; add flour and blend. Baked Halibut

1 cup sliced celery
1 med onion, sliced
1 med pepper, cut into ¼-inch strips
¼ cup vegetable oil

Cooking fowl with flair

Take it from Grandma. She knew poultry was one of the best buys around, and it still is.

An amazing variety of fare is possible with fowl. Every dish can be so different from every other that your family can enjoy chicken often.

Before trying out a new recipe, you should determine a bird's age. As a rule young chickens are tender and delicately flavored, as well as ideal for roasting, grilling or sauteing-cooking methods that quickly seal in taste and preserve succulence.

Older birds are tougher but have a more pronounced flavor that can work to a meal's advantage when you gently braise or poach them with vegetables and seasonings. The stock you get is good for innumerable preparations.

Once you have selected your fowl, you may want to try this tasty colonial recipe adapted from the original version in Mrs. Mary Randolph's "Virginia Housewife," first published in 1831. The recipe can now be found in its adapted version in the Time-Life series, "The Good Cook."

Williamsburg Chicken Pudding

4 to 5-pound fowl, cut up into serving pieces
1 onion
Celery tops
Parsley sprigs
1 tsp dried thyme
Salt and pepper
2 cups broth, reserved from poaching
Batter:
2 cups milk
3 eggs, well beaten
¼ cup flour
4 tblsp butter, melted
1 tsp salt

Put chicken pieces in a pot with water to cover, along with the onion, celery tops, parsley, thyme, salt and pepper. Simmer gently, uncovered, until the meat is just tender. Take the chicken pieces from the broth; remove the skin and place the pieces in a shallow baking dish. Pour over the strained broth. Make a batter with milk, eggs, flour, melted butter and salt. Pour this over the chicken and bake at 350 degrees for about 35 minutes, or until batter topping is set and an inserted knife comes out clean. Serve immediately with a gravy made of broth thickened by a butter and flour roux served separately.

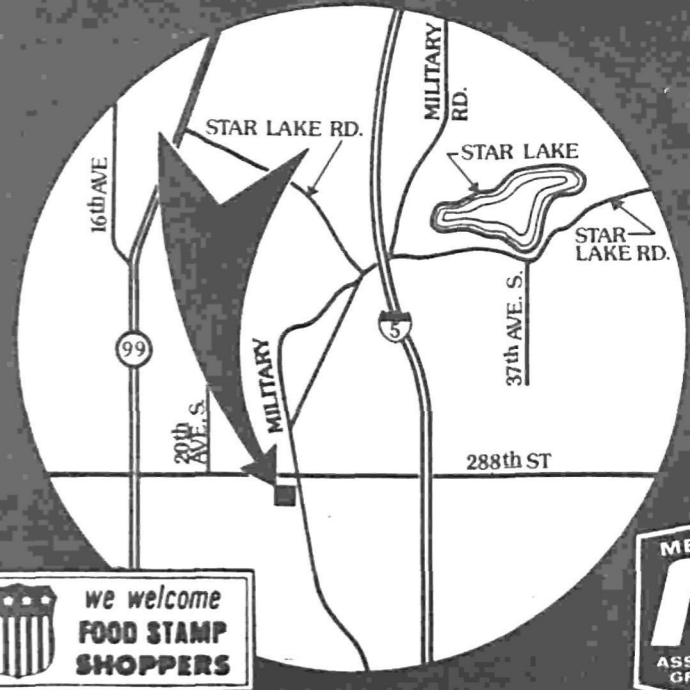

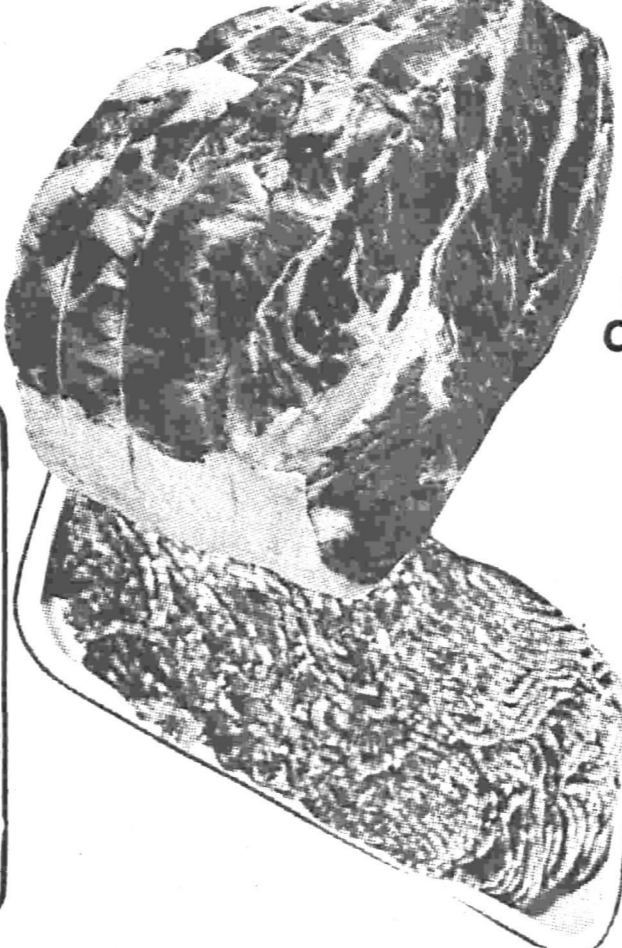

 3 eggs, beaten
 1/2 tsp salt
 1/4 cup flour
 1 1/4 cups milk
 1/4 cup light rum
 1 cup (4 oz) shredded Swiss cheese
 1 cup shredded American cheese
 2 pkgs (10 oz each) frozen spinach, cooked and drained
 1 can (4 oz) sliced mushrooms, drained

In bowl, combine milk, flour, eggs and salt; beat until smooth. Let stand at room temperature 30 minutes. For each crepe, pour about 3 to 4 tablespoons batter into hot, lightly buttered 7-inch skillet, turning to coat bottom. Cook until slightly golden. Remove and keep warm.

In saucepan, melt butter. Add 1/4 cup flour and cook, stirring, until bubbling and smooth. Remove from heat and gradually blend in milk and rum. Cook, stirring until thick and smooth. Add cheese; stir until melted. Combine 1 cup cheese sauce, spinach and mushrooms. Fill crepes; roll up. Place in shallow baking dish, about 11 1/4 x 7 1/2 inches. Top with remaining cheese sauce. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes, or until hot and bubbling. Makes 4 servings.

Partytime Strawberry Souffle
 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
 1/4 cup cold water
 1 pkg (8 oz) cream cheese, softened
 1 pkg (10 oz) frozen strawberries, thawed
 One-third cup light rum
 2 egg whites
 1 jar (7 oz) marshmallow creme
 1 cup heavy cream, whipped
 1 strawberry sliced

In saucepan, sprinkle gelatin over water to soften. Cook, stirring, until gelatin is dissolved. Gradually add to cream cheese. Stir in strawberries and rum. Chill until slightly thickened. Beat egg white to soft peaks. Gradually add marshmallow creme and continue beating to stiff peaks. Fold egg white mixture and cream cheese mixture into gelatin.

Wrap foil collar 3 inches high around 1-quart souffle dish. Secure with tape. Pour mixture into dish; chill until firm. Just before serving, remove collar. Decorate with ribbon of whipped cream and the fresh strawberry. Makes about 8 servings.

Cranberry Rum Punch
 1 can (20 oz) pineapple rings
 1/2 cup maraschino cherries
 1 quart cranberry juice cocktail
 1 quart apple juice
 Juice of 2 lemons
 1 quart light rum
 1 quart club soda

Drain pineapple; reserve liquid. Arrange pineapple rings and cherries in 1 1/2-quart ring mold. Add 1/2 inch water and freeze. Remove from freezer and add just enough water to cover fruits, freeze.

To serve: combine reserved pineapple liquid with cranberry juice, apple juice, lemon juice, rum and soda in punch bowl. Float ice ring in punch bowl. Makes about 20 6-ounce servings.

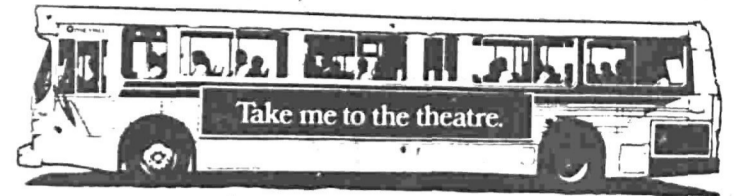
