## To mother...with 20 years of love

Dick Dilley came into the office recently, a poem tucked in his back pocket. A 20-year-old youth with permanented curly hair and sensitive searching eyes, he said he'd written a poem for his mom for Mother's Day.

He wanted it to be a surprise. Dick was born in Auburn, one of eight children to Helen and Donald Dilley of 2032 S. 333rd St. One of three sets of twins, Dick said he was number five and "just barely missed being number six. There were five boys and three girls plus a nephew who moved in for two years.

Wanting a chance to express his appreciation for his mother's care and concern, Dick said "the older you get, the harder it is to say 'look mom, you're great.' When you're little, it's easy."

Remembering his teens when the family occasionally traveled to stay with his father, a Boeing engineer, he was reminded of the security he felt snug in his parent's love and support.

"Being there is enough," said Dick who now works for Boeing and coaches youth sports at the Boys' Club and for South Lake Soccer. "Sometimes you want to confide in your mom and you can't because you always want her to think you're the best."

And still my thoughts return to you;  
To you whose love I'll never forget  
I give my own with no regret.*

Since the early days of their marriage, the Dilleys faithfully observed the family tradition of getting together for a good, old-fashioned songfest, acting parts from plays or playing games. Though all but the youngest 12-

year-old set of twins have left home, they still regroup once a month.

"Ever since we were kids, we always took care of each other and were responsible for one another. It makes us stronger and able to set goals and carry them out as we grew older."

"We always knew what the rules were and that they weren't to be bent or broken. It gave our lives a sense of stability and direction," he said.

When I felt lost, you made me belong.  
When alone, it's easy to feel uncared.  
When I was depressed, the family was there.*

When I began to think of all she does for me, it just got to me. Mothers always hear from teens that they're not needed anymore. But, it's not true. Just

knowing that mom's in the next room can make all the difference."

And example by trusting in Him above.*

*So now, though it is years past due

### Children molested

## 19 yr. old jailed for rape

A 19-year-old Federal Way man is being held in King County Jail in lieu of \$10,000 bail following incidents in which two children, both boys, were brutally raped,

detectives said Friday.

One of the children is seven and the other is nine, the detectives said. Both were raped in Federal Way, one on May 2 and the other

Tuesday.

In one of the incidents the victim was forced into the woods at knifepoint. In the other the victim was grabbed and dragged into a forested area.

Detectives Bob Lamoria and Dave Reichart said they picked up the suspect on Thursday in Seattle. They said the suspect was identified through evidence left at the scene of one of the crimes.

The man offered no resistance, they said, and was not armed at the time.

Charges will probably be filed in the case next week, the detectives said. They anticipate that the suspect will be charged with two counts of first degree statutory rape and one count of second degree assault.

The statutory rape law applies in this case, they explained, because of the victims' ages and the difference between the ages of the victims and that of the suspect.

### Redondo

## Marina to be replaced with ramp boat launch?

South King County soon may be hosting a ramp boat launch on the shores of Redondo if the marina committee's recommendation carries clout.

Following five months of investigation, the citizen advisory committee last week voted to recommend to the King County Council the most feasible option for restoration of the boating facility: demolition of the existing dry storage marina building and installation of a two-lane boat ramp.

The other option considered as feasible was removal of the existing building and retention of the surrounding docks with a monorail system for launching boats. However, the group opted for the two-lane ramp launch which, among other advantages, allows early-morning boaters to use the facility without assistance.

The recommended facility, if built, will include parking accommodations, a pier to the south of the ramp for fishing, restrooms and a concession stand.

SOME MEMBERS of the committee expressed concerns Thursday that if the development was not well-controlled it may attract undesirable patrons. Mel

Ferron, committee member and president of the Redondo Community Club, questioned whether the committee had assimilated enough information to make a final recommendation.

Speaking for the community club, Ferron said that the club declined to take a position on the facility because it was not confident in the thoroughness of the study. "It does vitally affect our community and we want to protect our environment against impact from undesirables," he said.

Ferron stressed that the community viewed control of the parking lot as essential and objected to installation of a suspended tire breakwater for aesthetic reasons.

Although the committee's recommendations did not specifically address these factors, they did indicate that most committee members favor conditions that would allow use of the launching ramp 24 hours per day but use of the parking lot only from an hour before dawn to an hour after dusk.

ALTHOUGH THE 11 members who voted on the recommendation wavered on how much patrons should be charged for use of the facility, most supported future expansion of the fishing pier and installation of some type of breakwater.

The recommendation now goes to the County Council for approval. Meanwhile, more detailed plans of the recommended facility are being blueprinted so that the county can apply for a state Inter-Agency Committee (IAC) grant June 1 to fund the project which has been tagged with a ballpark figure of \$1,078,842, excluding a breakwater.

If the project goes—and the county is confident it will—the facility may no longer be known as the "Redondo Marina." Although there was no strong rallying by committee members, the name "Stone's Landing" has gained some support as a tribute to the first homesteader in Redondo in the late 1800's.

## Under the Capitol Dome

Only urban residents will feel the effects of the mandatory features of the auto emission inspection act in the immediate future.

But the goal of the legislation is statewide periodic inspections on a voluntary basis.

The mandatory provisions will go into effect in areas where emission containments exceed limits prescribed by the Department of Ecology.

There Could Be More Currently, intended prime targets are the Seattle, Tacoma and Vancouver areas, and possibly Spokane.

But the act calls for periodic monitoring. This eventually could bring numerous other areas into the fold.

Sponsors of the program, however, hope public cooperation through voluntary submission to inspections will negate this latter possibility.

Something Old, Something New Mandatory inspections aren't new in this state. There has been a compulsory motor vehicle safety inspection law on the books since 1937.

But it hasn't been enforced since 1947, when the Legislature ceased funding the program.

There are numerous other differences in the two acts.

Insurance Against Ripoff Besides being statewide, the safety inspection was conducted by the state, under supervision of the State Patrol.

The state will contract with numerous private firms to conduct the inspections at a nominal fee calculated to pay the costs. To insure against "ripoffs," terms of the contracts will prohibit firms which conduct the inspections from making the necessary repairs or adjustments.

"Do It or Else"

And this law will be enforced. Under terms of the National Clean Air Act, states which fail to comply may be subject to federal sanctions.

This could cost them as much as 10 percent of their share of federal gasoline tax money.

Nuclear Aid Delay

It will be some time in 1981 at the earliest before the first generator can be on line under the act authorizing irrigation districts to develop hydroelectric facilities.

And Tacoma and Seattle City Light, which have agreed to develop the projects and buy the output, will be the chief beneficiaries.

While any surplus will go into the Northwest power grid, the

two city-owned utilities are counting on the facilities to delay from two to three years their need to buy additional electricity from nuclear plants.

More Than Measles

Widespread outbreaks of rubella (hard measles) which reached epidemic proportions in several areas, prompted enactment of the compulsory immunization act signed into law by Gov. Dixy Lee Ray last week.

But the legislation goes far beyond that. It calls for compulsory immunization against any disease which the State Board of Health determines is communicable, and numerous other diseases are specified in the law.

Only school children exempted are those whose parents have religious, health or philosophical objections.

Hitting the Ceiling

Under the variable gasoline tax law enacted two years ago, the state tax is going to 12 cents a gallon.

The tax is geared to the price of gasoline, but 12 cents is the ceiling. Under the existing law, it

can't go higher.

But those who buy their motor vehicle fuel in Seattle could pay another two cents tax under a law giving that city the option of levying an additional tax up to two cents to help finance a high level West Seattle bridge.

Just Keeping Tab

A bill passed by both houses and sent to the Governor last week enacts into law a procedure which has been a frequent practice in the Legislature.

Off and on for years, one or both houses have had in their rules a requirement that any bill involving expenditures carry a fiscal note estimating its cost.

Adoption of such a rule, however, has been at the whim of each house, which has full authority to regulate its own conduct.

The purpose, of course, was to let legislators know what the cost of a bill would be before they voted on it.

Enacting it into law will make this practice mandatory, and presumably, also make the information equally available to the public.

is very realistic. Although expensive, the state should set up similar equipment at strategic locations, and then require drivers to be tested before a drivers license is renewed.

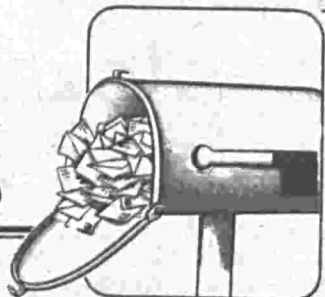
Furthermore, using computers, the results of a drivers test can be tabulated, and the driver issued a license in one of three categories. First, a blue license for driving with no restrictions (that is, of course, within existing laws). Second, a red license which allows driving on all roads except freeways, (how many incompetent drivers use freeways?). Third, a yellow license which limits driving to roads other than freeways and to driving between the hours of 10 a.m. and 3 p.m., not on holidays, and not more than 50 miles from home. This takes care of another class of incompetent drivers.

Additional road controls is not the answer. Control the driver.

## The Gay Blade

How bringeth you up a child in the ways of righteousness?

You teacheth him the values of his parents and his society, natch. And you turneth him over to experts who tinkereth with his little Psyche.

The theme of the Oscar-winning *Scared Straight* is the latest noble experiment in bending the twig. The film takes us into New Jersey's Rahway Prison, where hardened criminals are used to frighten children away from a life of crime.

The much-acclaimed documentary has kiddy-tinkers across the country drooling to start similar programs in their communities. The film makes it clear that the youngsters are scared spitless when they learn the values of American society from caged criminals.

They learn, for instance, that the sentence issued by the judge on a television cop show is the least of the offender's worries in real life. The law-abiding society of which their parents want them to become members in good standing sentences its miscreants to homosexual rape, stabbings, beating and other punishments not mentioned in the courtroom.

Its valuable lesson, which, coupled with teaching of the Christian doctrine of love for his

fellow man, should help a youngster get his head on straight, to coin a phrase.

A similar documentary, now being filmed by Whitecollar Productions of Lompoc, California, attempts to do for misdirected juvenile vocation seekers what *Scared Straight* does for incipient criminals.

Titled *Scared Crooked*, the film records the success of a program at a federal prison honor farm in California in which softened prisoners are used to frighten children into a life of white collar crime.

The youngsters learn, for instance, that once-unsuccessful lawyers, bureaucrats and officeholders have had their lives turned around on the honor farm, emerging as successful writers, lecturers, and ninth-flight golfers.

It's a valuable lesson, which coupled with teaching of the American doctrine of separate but equal, should help a youngster get his head on straight, to recoin a phrase.

## The Modern Mom

Motherhood is now an elected option, posing the problem of a decision. If such a freedom of choice had existed 30 years ago, if women had not automatically responded to society's expectations, what would I have done? Would I have preferred a well organized business life or would I have chosen to fill my days with little people and their big problems?

I can only guess, but in looking back I'm glad I embraced the role of motherhood, even though throughout the years there were many times when it seemed like an endless sentence, from which relief would never come. I longed for a time of my own, free from the harassing presence of others. Now, at long last, I have it, and my initial surge of elation at being released from parent duty is being offset by a sense of depletion, which varies with each individual child.

Their cumulative moving out was a gradual process, so I experienced no abrupt trauma as the house emptied itself of children. But as each one ventured forth and closed the front door, the tenor of the house began to change.

With the first departure went the strains of daily practice on the piano. For a time I dusted the keyboard, then finally pulled the cover over the keys and patted the polished wood. Since the first child was a girl, the bathroom across the hall from her room emptied itself of curlers, bath powder, cologne and a singing voice that carried through the splashing of the shower.

With her, too, went the making of jam from the wild mountain blackberries she liked to pick, and the sound of a voice calling, "Hey, Mom, what did I do wrong?" when the meringue on her lemon chiffon pie collapsed. And at night, during her last year at home, when adult stirrings within her were making her restless for the world beyond her window, the soft strumming of a guitar could be heard as she lulled herself to sleep. With her went a special gentleness, quiet strength, laughter and a love of music.

The second child left three

years later, taking with him the basketballs that had crammed the closets, sweat suits and Adidas, gym shorts and tank socks. These were the things he packed but the things he could not pack were the things I missed.

With him went the excitement of Friday night basketball games, the high exhilaration that followed a win and the grim silence that followed a loss; his enthusiasm with his participation, his anger and frustration with his failures. Emotions, clearly defined and unmistakable, bounced off the walls when he entered a room. He gave daily family living an intensity and a vibrancy that all could share. With him went the warm glow I had reflected from his involvement with living.

The youngest child lingered at home a little longer than the other two. Perhaps because he was the last one I unconsciously enmeshed him in bonds which he struggled to unravel. When he finally freed himself of my expectations he discarded the framework of my world and set about constructing one of his own.

With him went the challenges to my stereotyped thinking, grown cobwebby over the years. His curiosity for the "why" of existence, his defiance by believing only in himself - all these he took away with him. Because confrontations no longer existed I found it a challenge to keep my mind from turning inward once again.

Now the rooms of the house have grown silent, the corners cluttered with memories, and I find myself wishing for noise and confusion, basketballs bouncing, phones ringing, showers splashing, someone singing. I remind myself that was another time and another age.

From the vantage point of 30 years I look back and say, "How great to have been a mother," to have lived with and through each child, felt their pangs from the moment of birth, loved them, spanked them and wiped their tears, and been able to hold back my own as I waved goodbye to each one.

# California cops nab teen fugitives from Fed Way

San Luis Obispo police have arrested a 17-year-old Federal Way boy and his 18-year-old companion, both of whom are wanted in King County in connection with a

variety of local crimes, 3rd Precinct detectives said Friday. The two, who were driving a car stolen several weeks ago from an East Hill residence in

Kent, were caught by officers of the California city Thursday. The suspects were burglarizing a garage at the time, local detectives said.

A third boy, 17, escaped during the incident, detectives said. The other two are also from Federal Way.

County police said the trio is suspected of several automobile thefts, larcenies, burglaries and other crimes. The 18-year-old is being sought for investigation of forgery also, they said.

MEANWHILE, county police arrested two more Federal Way boys, one nine and the other 13, in connection with a \$250 burglary at a 22nd Avenue Southwest residence Thursday.

The burglary occurred between 3 and 4 p.m., and the arrests were made some three hours later.

Police said the 13-year-old bragged to other children in the neighborhood that he had stolen a stereo and rings from the residence.

The stereo was recovered. The

13-year-old was booked at King County Youth Center, and the nine-year-old, who had no previous record, was turned over to his parents.

IN OTHER thefts and burglaries, jewelry and change worth a total of \$2,000 were stolen from a South 310th Street residence on Wednesday sometime between noon and 5 p.m.

Just after dawn on the same day, citizens' band radio equipment, fishing tackle and other items were stolen from a vehicle parked at a 37th Avenue Southwest address. The vehicle was entered via a wing window, which was pried open.

Cash estimated at \$858 was stolen under mysterious circumstances from the cash register of a Pacific Highway South automotive supply firm. The incident occurred sometime

Tuesday night.

A SQUABBLE between a Federal Way man and his former female roommate left the man, 35, facing the possibility of arson charges.

Police said the man and the woman had recently separated. The woman reportedly left many of her belongings at the man's house.

But on Thursday the man threatened to burn the belongings, and when the woman checked with neighbors, she was told the material was already alight in the man's driveway.

Police and firemen were quickly summoned, and the blaze, which had been producing eight-foot flames, was extinguished.

The man, who had been drinking beer with a neighbor, was booked for investigation of arson. Loss in the incident was estimated at \$1,000.

## Man jailed after two local children raped

The second-degree rape trial of a local businessman is underway in King County Superior Court.

In opening statements Thursday, Senior Deputy Prosecutor Ron Clark told a jury of six men and six women in Judge James Dore's court he will prove that Chris Palzer, 48, raped and unlawfully imprisoned an 18-year old woman March 7.

The alleged crime is said to have occurred in Palzer's motor home, the Foxy Lady Motel, while it was parked in the lot at Sea-Tac Mall. Clark said the state will show that the victim went to the Mall on March 7 to apply for work. There she met Palzer who offered to help her get a job at the Steak Factory restaurant.

Following a trip to the

restaurant, Palzer lured the woman back to his motor home, offered her drugs and alcohol and "made advances" to her, Clark asserted.

When the victim protested that she wanted to leave, Palzer is accused of removing her clothes, forcing her onto a bed, forcing her to perform various sex acts and taking pictures of her nude and while wearing clothing items chosen by Palzer.

The woman managed to escape the motor home, Clark told the jury, and ran through the parking lot of the Mall clad only in jeans.

A teenage couple, leaving the Mall after a shopping trip, offered to help her after she told them she was being chased by a man in a motor home.

home as it left the Mall and got the license number.

In testimony Thursday, the teenagers both said the victim was crying and "really scared" when she reached their car.

Clark told the jury the victim has had "nightmares, difficulty in sleeping and has changed the way she speaks" since the incident. Her sister testified Friday that she was "very withdrawn, shaky and didn't seem to make too much sense when she talked" after March 7.

Phil Mahoney, one of two attorneys representing Palzer, said in his opening statement his client did not rape the woman that she was "friendly and sexually interested in Mr. Palzer. They attempted to have sex but he could not."

In pre-trial discussions with Judge Dore, Clark indicated a large box of evidence on the counsel table that was taken from Palzer's motor home. Clark called it the "most bizarre grouping of tools of seduction that you can possibly imagine." The prosecution contends that among the various items of "erotic paraphernalia" seized from the motor home were the photographs of the victim.

Although Palzer is not charged with any drug violations, several prospective jurors were excused or asked to be excused because of strong feelings about drugs and alcohol which they said might make it impossible to give the defendant a fair trial.

The trial is expected to last five days.

## Official pleads guilt

An officer of the Vashon Sportsmen's Club has pleaded guilty in King County Superior Court to conducting illegal dice games at the club between 1975 and 1978.

Lewis Roggenbuck, the club president, signed the admission of guilt Thursday before Judge Barbara Durham acknowledging that the club made more than \$10,000 profit from the games during that period.

Although the fine for the illegal activity could be up to \$100,000, Deputy King County Prosecutor Duane Evans said the county will only seek a fine of whatever the club's profits during that time were. He said it could be about

\$12,000.

In a plea bargain with the county, club members agreed to admit to the illegal activity in exchange for no criminal charges against any club member.

One of the club members is Terry O. Allman, former commander of the Burien Police Precinct. Allman has been suspended from duty without pay for nearly three months while the investigation of the gambling charges was conducted.

Allman, who was promoted to the rank of Major in October, was never confirmed in that post by the county council. Lawrence G. Walcott, head of the county department of public safety, withdrew that appointment in mid-January when the reports of the illegal activity were made public.

Allman has been demoted to the rank of captain and will be put in command of the north police precinct in Kenmore, according to Chief Hal Booth, head of staff services for the sheriff's department. Allman will also receive more than \$6,000 in back pay for the three-month suspension.

Allman was president of the club from 1977 to 1978. Evans said the evidence showed that Allman did not run the illegal games but was in charge of the authorized annual fishing derby sponsored by the club.

His selection was announced Wednesday by Prosecutor Norm Maleng to replace John Keegan who has moved to private practice.

## Gable resigns WD 56 seat

Marion Gable, a 23-year-veteran of the Water District 56 board of commissioners, resigned that position this month for "age and health reasons."

Gable, a well-known Redondo figure, has lived in the area since 1946 when he came here from North Dakota. He dealt in life insurance most of his life.

Declining to divulge his age, Gable said he is retired and does not have any plans for the future. "It depends

upon my health," he said.

Fred Thompson, chairman of the Water District 56 board, said he and Commissioner Richard McColey are considering candidates to fill Gable's position. Under state law, the remaining commissioners are responsible to fill the vacancy.

After 23 years, will Gable come to any more water district meetings? "If I feel like it, I will," he said.

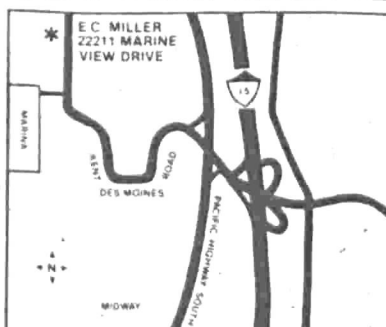

# Troubleshooting group sets up operations here

Long-time community activist Eric Carson and two others have put together a non-profit corporation that will work on a variety of projects aimed at improving the quality of life here it was announced Wednesday.

The corporation, called Community Development Research, was chartered by the state last month. It is already making plans to study questions related to land use, local poverty, juvenile crime, the local economy and the potential involvement of the community in the fine and performing art scenes.

Carson, whose academic background includes a doctorate and several other degrees, has worked as a county planner and more recently as Federal Way's community coordinator. But now, frustrated by the apparent sluggishness of existing institutions, he has come to believe that the non-profit corporation is the only way to go.

"I feel that government agencies are limited in how they can respond to the concerns of a community," Carson said.

IN ADDITION, government is always trying to tell us what we should want and what we should be doing," he said. But we don't need that; we know what we want, and we can do it ourselves at less cost."

Carson's partners in the corporation — it will be known by its initials, CDR — are John Drausser and Dorothy Patterson. Drausser is the chairman of the

Federal Way Home Rule Committee, the group which did much of the research work upon which the current incorporation drive is based, while Patterson is an architect and planner.

Funding for the corporation, Carson said, is expected to come from a variety of sources, among them the Ford, Rockefeller and Mott foundations.

"Our purpose is not to compete with government," he said. "We want to work in conjunction with public agencies. But our main goal is to serve the community by obtaining grants that local people can use to solve local problems."

TOWARD THAT end, Carson is hoping to enroll a number in-

dividuals and organizations as members of CDR.  
"Suggested annual member-

ship fees," he said, "will be \$25 for individuals and \$45 for organizations."

Membership will "buy the members the right to come up with specific projects, at which time CDR will go to bat and try to get the projects implemented," Carson said.

One of the projects upon which CDR is already at work is the creation of a drop-in center for the community's troubled youth. The Federal Way Youth Service Bureau is also involved in the effort, which is just now in the preliminary phase.

Another — this is one of Car-

son's specialties — is a process he terms "environmental mediation," in which the parties to a land use dispute are brought together in an attempt to resolve their differences before the issues come to a head in county governmental proceedings.

"The process helps everybody

concerned," he said, "it enables the community to protect its own interest, and at the same time it lets the developer get his plans approved much more quickly."

## Townhouses OK near Mirror Lake

A local developer will be allowed to build a reduced-scale townhouse complex near Mirror Lake, the King County Council land use appeals committee ruled this week.

Qualico Homes sought a rezone for 18.87 acres at 1st Avenue South between South 312 and 316th Streets to permit 214 units. That request was reduced to 171 units by the King County Zoning Examiner because the proposed revisions to the Federal Way Community Plan call for between two and nine units per acre in that area.

The decision, appealed by Qualico, was upheld Monday by the land use appeals committee subject to confirmation by the entire council next week.

Ed Heavey, attorney for Qualico, argued that the "Federal Way Committee Plan has been observed by its non-observance in this area." He said Qualico decided to purchase the land for maximum density development by the county although that was subsequently withdrawn.

There is a "substantial demand

for townhouses in Federal Way" Heavey said. He complained that a "large timber company owns a lot of land and has failed and refused to make that property available to other developers except in the southwest corner of its property and that is not suitable for development."

The "severe drainage" problems in the area of the proposed development "cannot be solved without the cooperation of the developer (Qualico) and we are willing to cooperate but in exchange, we want the density raised from 171 to 214 units per acre,"

Heavey said.

The requested 214 units would amount to 11.2 units per acre.

Deputy Zoning Examiner Robert Eveleigh also requested that the land use appeals board require the developer to cluster the housing away from the boundaries of the property to prevent a higher impact on the single family residences across the street.

The committee rejected the suggestion and ruled that the development can be scattered on the property.

# Oil man defends industry's side

Plagued by gas shortages and almost \$1 pump prices, motorists may reject an oilman's explanation of why Mexicans got U.S. gas for about 50 cents a gallon.  
"Only a drop in the bucket went to Mexico," Don Anderson of Atlantic Richfield told some 100 people during a panel discussion on Consumers and the Energy Market on Saturday. Atlantic Richfield sponsored the seminar in Renton.  
Only 48,000 barrels went to Mexico last year, the Los Angeles ARCO manager said in an interview. Oil suppliers made the same profit they make in America — 2.5 cents per gallon, he added. Low Mexican prices stem from a Mexican government subsidy and absence of U.S. gas taxes, Anderson said.  
Was the 48,000 barrels the margin between exports and imports across the American-Mexican border?  
"Yes," Anderson replied, repeating it was just a drop in the bucket compared to the 8 to 9 million barrels supplied daily in the U.S. market. He was unaware of any exports to Mexico this year, he said.  
America's crude-oil surplus, coupled with a shortage in refining capacity, is why oil was sent to Mexico, according to Anderson.  
HERE'S HIS explanation on the shortage of refinery capacity: Long ago, America was divided

into oil market districts, with one district occupying west of the Rocky Mountains, from Alaska southward. Physical obstacles, like mountains, keep each district generally self-contained in the drilling-refining-marketing cycle. In the West Coast district, three firms, including Atlantic Richfield and Sohio, obtain high-sulfur oil from Alaska. Sohio diverts 400,000 barrels daily by ship, to its Gulf of Mexico refineries. The reason Sohio doesn't sell oil on the West Coast, thus saving shipping, is marketing expense and lack of a refinery. Environmentalists block construction of new refineries anyway, he continued.  
Why doesn't Sohio and his company — with its West Coast refineries which handle high-sulfur oil — work out a deal?  
At first, Anderson pleaded undue expense for refinery expansion. Questioned again, he replied:  
"We can absorb 400,000 barrels over the next five to seven years, because our California production of high-sulfur oil is declining."  
Anderson blames the oil crisis on several factors, including motorists who "top off" their tanks. "If people just drove 50 miles less a week, it would probably be over in a week," he said. "We are petroleum junkies."  
Atlantic's sponsorship of the seminar was tax-deductible, acknowledged Anderson.

PANEL MEMBER Ken Leonard, executive director of the Washington State Council on Economic Education, finds that the oil crisis hits various sectors differently.  
"A teacher can get off at 2:30 or 3 p.m., run down and beat the lines," he said. "A teacher's cost of obtaining gas is definitely much less than it is for the production worker." That worker must wait until after 5, expend gas hunting for an open station, then endure lines — all escalating his cost of obtaining gas.  
Upon hearing a panel member from Puget Power paint a bleak forecast, Leonard retorted: "As a Puget Power ratepayer, I want to know if you're going to lock the door (against more people)? Are you going to cut me off at 10 at night? Or what are you going to do?"  
Puget Power public relation spokesman Don Noel responded, "The obvious contingency is to change legislation to shut the door." He also predicts voltage reductions, in which home appliances would run at less than normal speeds. He sees "rollover" blackouts ahead, where one block would go without power for four hours, then switch on, making another block go without for four hours.  
IN OBJECTING to changing environmental regulations, he cited delays with nuclear projects.  
The recourse Puget Power

must use is combustion turbine generators, burning natural gas or distillate oil, he said. (A Washington State Oil Heat Institute study indicates that Puget's turbines would consume 10 percent of the state's distillate demand.)  
Puget Power officials are contemplating several generators, including sites near the Olympia airport and by Fife.

Carol Doherty, legal counsel for the Port, said Friday the Krishnas are allowed by federal court order to solicit money from

passengers at the airport terminal. Doherty said she does not know the particulars of a suit filed this week by the Port of Portland against the cult.

The Portland lawsuit is aimed at halting money-raising activities at Portland International Airport by the cult. Port Director Lloyd Anderson is quoted as say-

ing the port is not trying to stop the Krishnas or any other political or religious organization from expressing political or religious beliefs.

Anderson accused the cult of asking for money "rather than discussing religious views."

U.S. District Court Judge Morrell Sharp ruled here two years

ago that the Port of Seattle had to permit the Krishnas to solicit in restricted areas of the terminal at Sea-Tac because the airport is considered a "First Amendment forum" according to Doherty.

She said the regulations on solicitation have been appealed by the religious cult and counter-

appealed by the Port which has agreed to have the case remanded to federal court.

Meanwhile, Doherty said, "we have nothing planned right now" to further curb the group. She said Sharp's order forces the Port to permit six of the cult to solicit in the terminal with solicitation licenses issued daily.

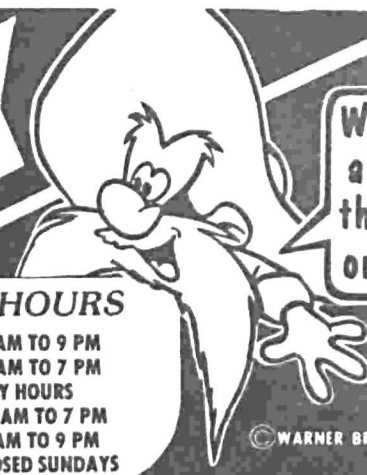

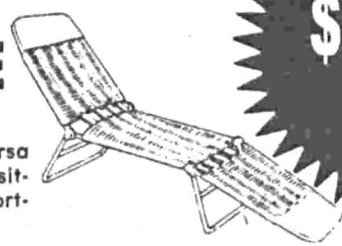

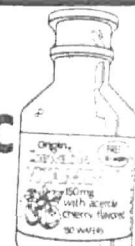

## Gas shortage is political, says rep.

It is becoming increasingly apparent the current fuel shortage is not a physical one, rather an allocation shortage, Eric Rohrbach, 33rd district republican, said.

According to inventory reports dated April 26 from the State Energy Office, Rohrbach said the inventory of gasoline for the West Coast was up 9.8 percent, but refineries were producing at 83 percent capacity.

Refineries could provide more gasoline, but the federal government has encouraged a slowdown in production, the representative said. That encouragement, Rohrbach said, is coming from President Jimmy Carter as an attempt to force a mandatory con-

servation effort.

"The president should be honest with the country and let Americans know this 'shortage' is a deliberate national policy. Then all can openly debate whether this policy is correct," Rohrbach said.

The United States gasoline sales to Mexico have increased, Rohrbach said, and gasoline is selling for 48 cents a gallon in that country.

Prices at the pump in this state may soon be double that amount, Rohrbach said.

"This is another clear example of the failure of federal control of energy. Deregulation of domestic oil would encourage more gasoline production."

## Puget Power stock down

Puget Power has realized mixed first quarter earnings on increasing operating revenues for 1979, President John Ellis said last week.

Addressing shareholders at the company's annual meeting, he noted that "the single most important impact on the company for the past year came as a result of customer growth and the effect of that growth on system demands."

Net income for the first quarter was \$11,584,000 on operating revenues of \$75,382,000 compared with net income of \$11,418,000 and operating revenues of \$64,568,000 for the same quarter in the

prior year. Earnings per common share for the first quarter of 1979 were 48 cents, compared with 57 cents for the first three months of 1978.

Ellis said the earnings performance on much higher revenues reflected generally increasing costs and increased numbers of common shares outstanding.

He added that the company experienced substantially increased costs of fuel and purchased power as a result of seesawing temperatures and precipitation patterns experienced during the first quarter of the year. Ellis said those unusual patterns tested the company's ability to supply

power to an increasing number of customers—up to 7 percent from a year ago. He added that the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission approved higher electric rates for the company, effective March 20, but too late to effect first quarter earnings.

# Visiting therapist bikes and hikes

Sue Taylor is a physical therapist from Concord, Calif. She works for Contra Costa County Medical Services at George Miller Center East, helping severely, multiply handicapped people of all ages.

She came to this area in late March to take a special two-months course in Neurodevelopmental Treatment known as the Bobath Technique, sponsored by the Washington State Elks.

Three days a week she drives to classes in Riverton Heights, but the other two days she rides her bike from the Federal Way home of Helen Varo where she is staying, to the Washington Elks Therapy Office in West Campus.

On weekends she has bicycled on Bainbridge Island, Vashon, the San Juans, Shelton and the Olympic Peninsula. Add to that some cross-country skiing at Snoqualmie Pass, back packing and camping at Carbon River at Mt. Rainier,

and Ms. Taylor has probably seen more of the Pacific Northwest than many people who have lived here all their lives.

Bicycling is nothing new to Sue. In April, 1977 she married Craig Taylor, and the following day they left Roseburg, Ore., where she had been working and rode a tandem bike to Ohio, visiting relatives along the way. The trip took 60 days with 40 days of actual traveling during which they covered 2,526 miles.

They left their bicycle-built-for-two at the home of Craig's parents in Ohio and spent the rest of their honeymoon hiking, backpacking and traveling through Europe.

Ms. Taylor who holds a masters degree in physical therapy from the University of Southern California in addition to a bachelors degree from the University of California at Davis, was happy to be accepted to the present course in her special-

ty. "I applied for it two years ago, but it's been worth waiting for," she said. There are only 24 therapists taking the course, 12 of them therapists with the Elks Program. Sue received a scholarship which covered most of her \$600 tuition.

There are 100 students at the center at Concord where she

works, and they range in age from infants on up. The oldest one at present is 60, and all are severely, multiply handicapped.

"The goals are different for each child, each person," she said. "There is no one way to treat them."

The technique she is studying was developed by the Drs. Bobath in England for

working with children with cerebral palsy.

"Treatment is based on normal movement, on learning the components of normal movement," she said. "There is more being done for the severely handicapped than ever before, but lots more that can be done," she said. Money is one of the problems. Special equipment and train-

ed people both cost money.

Later this month Sue will pack her skis, bike and camping equipment in her car, rejoin her husband and return to work in Concord. Her two months here has been serious study but fun as well, and she has seen some of the best of the Pacific Northwest.

The Federal Way Eagles are on the verge of their fourth straight South Puget Sound League baseball title.

The Eagles outlasted the Puyallup Vikings in a two-hour 45-minute, 11 inning marathon Thursday to post a 6-3 victory. The win gives Federal Way a two-game cushion atop the SPSL standings with two playing dates left on the SPSL schedule.

So, the Eagles are assured at least a share of the SPSL crown. A Federal Way win or a Puyallup and Lakes loss in either Tuesday's or Thursday's games would give the Eagles the SPSL title and league's number-one entry into the regional tournament.

Federal Way hosts Washington Tuesday and travels to Curtis Thursday for its season finale. Both games begin at 3:30 p.m. weather permitting. Puyallup meets Sumner Tuesday and Washington Thursday.

The loss to Federal Way proved a serious setback to Puyallup's playoff hopes. The Vikings, who have lost three straight and have an 11-4 SPSL record, are tied with the Lakes Lancers for the second (and last) SPSL berth into the regionals. The Lancers are the most explosive and feared team in the league.

Puyallup came into Thursday's contest with the best defensive statistics in the SPSL. The Viks had allowed a league-low 3.2 runs-per-game.

But defensive lapses keyed Puyallup's downfall.

Federal Way broke loose for a four-run 11th inning that decided the outcome. The Eagles only had one hit in the stanza. Two Puyallup errors and two walks provided the ammunition for the rally.

Butch Cratsenberg started the march with a sharp grounder down the third-base line. Mory Bogrand

fielded the shot with a backhand stab, but his throw to first strayed wide of the mark. Mark Hillis followed with a walk. Crats was forced at third on Randy Scholl's attempted sacrifice bunt, but Doug Tisdell loaded the bases by taking four straight balls.

Then Puyallup blew a chance to get out of the inning unscathed. Todd McGrady smacked a grounder to shortstop Jerry Williams, who flipped the ball to second for the force to start a possible double-play. However, Mike Ogle bobbled the toss at second as Scholl slid safely into the bag. Hillis waltzed home from third during the action.

Barnt Turchin gave Federal Way a three-run lead by slicing a double down the right-field line. Scholl and Tisdell scored on the hit, and McGrady at the plate as Todd tried to score on Mark Turchin's grounder. Turchin took third on the throw to the plate and capped Federal Way's scoring by coming in on Dave Greening's single down the third-base line.

Federal Way's two runs during the regulation seven innings of play came via Puyallup mishaps in the field.

Greening opened the game by lining a single up the middle. Jim Bendorf advanced him to second with a base hit through the shortstop hole. Puyallup starting pitcher Tom Fobes attempted to catch Bendorf leaning off first, but his pickoff throw zoomed high of first base and rolled into short right field. Greening used his swift foot-speed to score from second on the miscue.

In the fourth, Hillis smacked a liner to deep center. Mark Haskey hesitated in retreating for the fly, and the ball whisked over his head. Hillis rounded second and came into third standing up. Ogle, taking

the relay throw from center, threw toward third base even though Hillis was comfortably coming into the bag standing up. Hillis watched Ogle's peg sail over his head and the 10-foot screen guarding the bleachers from the playing field. Hillis took a free trip home as the ball bounced around the street bordering the field.

Puyallup tied the score at 1-1 in the bottom of the second. Bogrand powered a triple that tipped off the glove of a stretching Turchin in left. He scored on Larry Jones' looping Larry to right.

Puyallup forced the game into extra innings by mustering a run in its last-chance seventh inning. Federal Way mistakes figured in the tying run.

Tom Fobes took first base on Dave Greening's throwing error from second. Later, Greening's glove caught the ball, allowing Bogrand to tag Fobes between first and second for the second out of the inning.

Larry Jones followed by banging a sinking liner to left. Turchin charged in an attempt at a shoe-string catch for the final out of the game. He was a step too late. The ball bounded past Turchin, allowing Bogrand to complete the base circuit. Jones went to second on the play, but Bendorf, who pitched the entire 11 innings for Federal Way, left him stranded by striking out Haskey for the third out.

Puyallup loaded the bases with no outs in the bottom of the 11th via two singles and a Bendorf fielding error. Federal Way allowed a run while completing a force at second for the first out. Bendorf posted his sixth strikeout of the game for the second out, and Mark

Scholl clutched a popout to shortstop to end the game.

Bendorf, who threw 135 pitches over the distance, allowed only one Puyallup base runner in the eighth, ninth and 10th innings.

During that time, the Eagles saw their threats mount and disappear without reward.

One of those near-miss opportunities sparked a bench-clearing argument between the Eagles and plate umpire Bob Maguinez. Pete Weymiller—who took first on a shortstop error, moved to second on Mark Scholl's sacrifice bunt and advanced to third on a Greening single to left—attempted to tag and score from third on Cratsenberg's medium-fly to left.

The ball and Weymiller seem to arrive home at the same time. Maguinez signaled Weymiller safe on his dust-flying slide. Jones, playing catcher, then showed Maguinez the ball clutched in his right hand. Maguinez raised his clenched right fist with the out sign.

Stewart and the Eagle players immediately stampeded the home plate area, but the ensuing verbiage didn't change the call. In the ninth, Hillis and Randy Scholl opened with walks. Tisdell moved them up with a sacrifice bunt. However, neither runner advanced any further as McGrady struck out and Turchin grounded to second.

Stewart, who showed the wear of living through the erratic play in the field and his team's numerous go-a-head opportunities continually vanish, wore a relieved grin after the decisive 11th inning and understated: "It was a real struggle." (For related story, see B-3)

## Federal Way, Jefferson to clash for SPSL soccer title

"Now comes the big one," Jefferson coach John Cameron stated after his soccer team posted its sixth straight win Thursday night in a 2-0 win over Decatur.

"I think both teams have had it in mind since the first time we met," Federal Way coach Bob McCulloch noted.

What both coaches were referring to is Tuesday night's showdown between Jefferson and Federal Way. The battle to decide the South Puget Sound League champion will begin at 8:30 p.m. at Federal Way Memorial Stadium. Federal Way is tabbed as the home team. Decatur and Puyallup will tangle in the 6:30 p.m. portion of the double header.

The Federal Way Eagles, 11-0-2, lead Jefferson, 11-1-0, by two points in the race for the title. A TJ Raider win Tuesday would temporarily tie

the Raiders with the Eagles pointwise. But, Jefferson has a season-finish match with league doormat Rogers Thursday. Federal Way's season ends with the Tuesday contest.

The FW Eagles won the first showdown between the two district rivals, 3-1, April 19. Federal Way gambled by concentrating manpower on the front line. The strategy could have left the Eagle defense vulnerable, but aggressive play by the Eagle back liners made the maneuver pay off.

However, McCulloch said he wouldn't use the same tactics Tuesday.

"They're wise to it now probably," McCulloch remarked. "We'll probably use our basic 4-3-3 lineup and try to play our regular style."

Cameron also will set his team differently in the second round. In the first contest, the Raiders

focused attention on Federal Way's standout sophomores Craig Nicholson and Darin McKeown. Neither scored, but the Raider focus on their play opened opportunities for other Eagles.

"We won't concern ourselves with them so much this time," Cameron said. "We're going to have to mark them better man-to-man when they get down close. We don't want to give them time to think about what they're doing."

"Federal Way has good fullbacks. They pressure your offense every time. We're going to have to do the same thing to them."

According to McCulloch, Cameron's probable strategy is the right one to use against the Eagles. "You really can't mark anyone in particular when you play us any more," he said. "We're a more balanced team than we were at the start of the season. We're

passing and moving the ball much better."

But Federal Way still burns opponents with its long-pass, fastbreak offense. Cameron called it "kickball."

"You can't take anything away from them for using it," he said of FW's offense. "It works well with the personnel they have, and they win with it."

Jefferson concentrates on moving the ball downfield with setup passes.

"They move the ball well on the ground," McCulloch said. "We can't give them time to do it. We should be able to stop them because our defense is geared to pressure."

The team that dominates the game with its style should be the winner Tuesday, both coaches predicted. Both also added that they would have no problems psyching up their teams for the shut-down.



# Gator baseball streak ends, but playoff chances remain

The Decatur Gator baseball team is nose-to-nose with Washington in the South Puget Sound League AA playoff race, with two games separating each team from the finish line.

Decatur was rapped by Rogers Thursday, 6-1, while the Patriots were downed by the hard-hitting Lakes Lancers, 7-3, to keep the two AA schools in a deadlock.

The regular season draws to a close for the Gators this week with two contests that could (and should) decide the playoff picture. Decatur travels to Bethel on Tuesday and hosts Clover Park on Thursday.

If records were made to be broken, so are winning and losing streaks. Rogers

did the breaking against the Gators.

"They broke our streak and their streak," Decatur coach Gary Holmboe said. "They were on a five game losing streak, and we were on a four game winning streak."

Rogers scored on Decatur and pitcher Ed Camden early, as second baseman Bob White singled a three-two pitch to left field, and scored two batters later on shortstop Joe DeRosier's line double to right center.

Cleanup batter Scott Stolzenberg followed with a double to left field to score DeRosier with the second Ram run. With two outs and Stolzenberg on third, number seven hitter Tom White lifted a short single to center

field for the inning's third tally.

While Rogers jumped to an early lead, the Gator bats had difficulty adjusting to the breaking pitches of Ram pitcher Jeff Metke. The only Decatur hit in the first two innings came on catcher Doug Springer's bloop single on the rightfield line.

"He did a good job; he was effective," Holmboe said of Metke. "To tell the truth, we don't see much of that breaking stuff."

During the second inning, Holmboe instructed his batters to "Get up and almost straddle the plate" in order to reach Metke's pitches. Even with the advice, Gator hitting and scoring was nil until the third

stanza.

With one out in the third, Decatur shortstop Pat Buckholz re-directed a Metke pitch to left center. The ball flew over the small creek that skirts the outfield, and Buckholz touched all bases for a Gator home run.

Decatur comeback hopes received a serious blow in the top of the fourth when Ram third baseman Kevin Neumiller walked, advanced to third on Tom White's ground-rule double into the center field woods, and scored in a rundown play.

Neumiller had been caught between third and home on an attempted squeeze play, but managed to reach home as Camden, covering the plate, dropped the throw from third. A Metke

single brought White in for the final run of the inning.

Rogers added an insurance run in the top of the seventh inning, and closed out Decatur with one of the strangest double plays on record. Gator Pat Regan grounded towards second; as the ball forced second sacker Todd Rock to his right, it bounced sharply and struck the heel of his glove.

The errant ball bounced directly to shortstop DeRosier, who was standing on second. DeRosier's play to first ended the game, and typified the misfortunes of the Decatur squad.

"They got all the breaks; they hit everything in the hole and we didn't hit anything in the hole," Holmboe said.

"Everything they hit was right square in the hole."

When the Ram hits weren't in the hole, Gator fielding was consistent; the infield turned two double plays, including one which centered on sophomore second baseman Larry Fisher. Decatur will

need sharp fielding and hitting to pull through the coming week.

Holmboe and Decatur will be keying on the Bethel contest this Tuesday, as Washington will be caught in a game with Federal Way, which needs one more victory to clinch the

SPSL AAA championship. Washington will also face another league frontrunner in Puyallup this Thursday; the Patriots, not the standings, are on

Holmboe's mind. "I don't care now where we finish in the league, as long as it's a h e a d o f Washington," Holmboe said.

## Salmon fishing expert conducts 2-day seminar

Charles R. White, author, researcher, and lecturer on the subject of salmon fishing, will conduct a salmon fishing seminar June 11 and 12 at the Seattle Center Playhouse. The "Salmon Seminar" will feature White's unique underwater films of salmon striking trolled lures, surface film of his research and fishing at Rivers Inlet, and a demonstration of downrigger fishing technique.

White began his underwater research four years ago, using a television camera attached to a downrigger. He now has the first close-up visual evidence of how salmon react to lures, how they approach and strike them, and why they sometimes get away. This spectacular footage was shown publicly for the

first time in the United States in April to more than 1,350 sports and commercial fishermen at a Salmon Seminar hosted by Tacoma Community College. Tickets for the event were completely sold out more than a week in advance, and fishing enthusiasts came from as far away as Alaska, Montana, and California.

White's interest in marine life began while he was working as a biologist and photographer for the Oregon Fish Commission. Later he originated and built the Undersea Gardens chain that now ex-

tends from Victoria, B.C. to California. In addition to his underwater research, he is currently the president of Saltaire Publishing, Ltd. in Sidney, B.C., where he continues to write and publish his popular series of books on fishing.

The seminar sessions at the Seattle Center Playhouse have been scheduled for 7 p.m. and 9:15 p.m. on June 11 and 12.

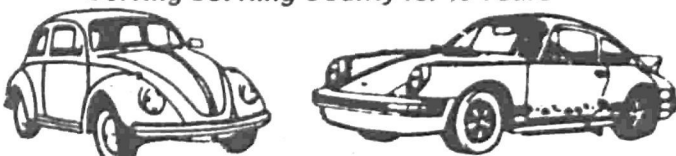
Also to be adopted during this meeting are the seasons and bag limits for forest grouse, early chukar and red-leg and
