Festival in the forest

Built by 1983? It's up to the Feds now

The future of the proposed Pacific Northwest Festival in the Forest, a multi-million dollar performing arts center that would be built with state and federal funds in Federal Way, will be decided in Washington, D. C.

Approved by the Legislature during the last days of its session on the 1979-81 budget, a bill authorizing a bond issue to pay the state's share of the center's construction costs has been sent to Gov. Dixy Lee Ray. The governor is expected to sign the measure into law within the next week or so.

But, with the state's promise to spend \$5 million in their pockets, the center's supporters must now focus on the U. S. Congress, where members of the state's delegations to the Senate and the House have, with but two exceptions, pledged to do everything in their power to obtain an additional \$15 million.

State Rep. Frank Warnke, who has shepherded the festival through the byways of the Legislature for the last six years, believes the money will be obtained — despite the current "cut the budget" sentiment in the nation's capitol.

"IT'S POSSIBLE," said an

related Warnke on Monday, "that we could start construction next year. And if everything falls into place and clicks, we would be performing during the 1983-84 theatrical season."

Warnke, a Democrat from the 30th District, said the final version of the appropriations bill ties up the funds until the \$15 million is made available either from federal or private sources.

It also authorizes the creation of a 12-member commission to oversee construction of the facility.

Five of the commission members will be appointed by the governor. The state Senate and the House will appoint two

commissioners apiece, and Pierce County, King County and Tacoma will also each name a member.

"The commission will concentrate on fund raising and lobbying in Washington D.C.," Warnke said.

He said that if Federal Way votes to incorporate, the commission will probably be enlarged by the legislature so that the new city is represented also.

"OUR ESTIMATES suggest that the festival will bring as much as \$50 million into the state during its first year of operation," Warnke said. "That includes airline tickets, business for motel and hotel pro-

prietors and a number of other things."

Asked what the center would mean for a newly incorporated Federal Way, Warnke replied that the facility could bring "a tremendous bundle of money" into the municipal treasury.

But to realize the benefits, Warnke said, the new city would have to enact a business and occupation tax or an entertainment tax — "like other cities have."

The appropriations bill that gained the approval of both the House and the Senate allows the state to spend money that is already included in five separate versions of the biennial budget. Though the budget was still being thrashed out Monday, approval of the festival funding was secure, Warnke said.

To be built on a 30-acre tract of land at Panther Lake in West Campus, the center would house Seattle Opera's annual Wagner festival and a number of other musical and theatrical events as well. The land is being donated by the Weyerhaeuser Company, while the state and federal funds will pay for the structures that would be erected on the site.

Warnke said that the bill gives supporters two years to raise the remaining \$15 million.

Cityhood drive garners 1,000 petition signers

With the pro-cityhood petition campaign only about two weeks old, the Federal Way City Committee already has collected some 1,000 signatures, Information Chairman Ross Davis said Monday.

"I think we're doing very well," said Davis, explaining that neighborhood doorbell ringing efforts began only last Saturday.

"In another week we'll take a look and see how many we have by then," he said. "We want to get the petitions into the county as soon as possible, so the (King County) Boundary Review Board can start scheduling the public hearings."

Davis said that the committee will need about 3,000 signatures to get the public hearing process started.

"Frankly," he said, "Nobody's been able to figure out the exact number of signatures we need because the county doesn't have the information available in a form we can use."

State law requires that a number equal to 10 percent of the registered voters who participated in the last general election sign to initiate the incorporation process. After the petitions are signed, the boundary review board schedules a series of public hearings and either approves or disapproves the limits of the pro-

posed city.

THE DIFFICULTY the city committee encountered in determining the exact number of necessary signatures resulted from the fact that the proposed borders cut across the boundaries of a number of election precincts, Davis said.

"Our best estimate is between 2,300 and 2,500 signatures, so with 3,000 we're sure to be safe," he said.

But the 3,000, Davis added, is just a starter. "We intend to keep circulating petitions even after the review board process is started," he said.

This week, he said, copies of the petitions will be circulated to a number of local merchants, who will place them in their businesses for customers to sign. In addition, a number of local ministers have agreed to circulate the petitions amongst the members of their congregations.

But the petitions will not be circulated in most local shopping centers, said Davis, because the centers themselves have regulations forbidding political activity in parking lots and on walkways.

"IT'S REALLY easy to get signatures on the petitions," said Davis. "In our first doorbell ringing we collected between 300 and 400 in just two hours."

The committee is attempting to place the incorporation question before the voters by fall, probably on the general election ballot.

Climaxing a series of public meetings held here last fall, the incorporation petition calls for formation of a city of approximately 59,300 persons. The city could be governed by a manager and a council, with seven councilpersons elected at large.

It would retain the name Federal Way.

The proposed boundaries — these are subject to the review board's approval — are Puget Sound on the west, the Pierce County line on the south, and South 225th Street on the north, excluding Kent and the other cities on the eastern edge of the Federal Way School District.

An unincorporated area in the vicinity of Lake Fenwick is also excluded from the proposed area.

TO DATE, the incorporation effort has encountered organized

Millions slated for traffic relief

Recent state legislation has put Federal Way on the drawing board for multi-million dollar traffic improvements, but don't expect the snarls to clear up too soon.

Most of the projects slated to begin this year have been delayed from original target dates for a spectrum of reasons and, of the major projects, only one apparently will be completed before next spring.

That project is the Metro Park and Ride on South 320th Street just west of I-5. Construction of the 780-stall lot was stalled last winter when rains made the land too muddy to level, according to Jerry Zirkle, Department of Transportation district administrator. Work has since resumed on the project and

should be completed by next fall, making it the only state project to be completed within a year.

The project that appears will have the most effect on easing traffic tension in Federal Way is the construction of an interchange on I-5 at South 272nd Street. The \$2,817,000 project is about a season late in starting and construction will not begin until late summer when it originally was scheduled to be this spring. Zirkle said the project was delayed because the state is encountering difficulties in securing the land necessary to construct the interchange; completion is scheduled for late 1980.

A SECOND METRO Park and Ride lot and flyer stop also are included in the interchange plans and will be installed concurrently with the interchange. It is slated

for completion a few months prior to the interchange completion.

Traffic hazards along Pacific Highway South should improve by the early 1980's with several projects that include resurfacing and signal installations.

Resurfacing from South 356th to 312th streets is intended to eliminate the drainage problem that threatens motorists during heavy rains. The drainage system, specifically along the strip adjacent to SeaTac Mall, also will be revised to handle rain runoff from the heavily commercial strip. A deadline has not been set for that project, Zirkle said, because although construction was to begin this month the state is having difficulties coordinating the project with King County, who is partially funding the im-

provements. TRAFFIC SIGNAL installations are scheduled for the intersections of Pacific Highway South and South 336th and 272nd streets. Both projects are behind schedule and will take about a year to complete once installation begins. Zirkle, who pointed out that target dates set by the state are loose schedules, said those projects should begin next fall.

The intersection of South 312th Street and Dash Point Road (SR 509), which has drawn some safety concerns by residents throughout the past year, will not receive a signal until late 1980, according to schedule. That project also will include channelization and illumination of the intersection, the costs of which also will be shared by the County.

Festival project leaps a hurdle

The long-planned, long-talked-about, long-lobbied-for Festival in the Forest needs only the pen of Governor Dixy Lee Ray to become half a reality—in terms of finances, a 25 percent reality.

Gov. Ray has indicated she will sign the bill authorizing the sale of \$5 million in bonds to construct a \$20 million multi-theatre complex on the shores of Panther Lake in Federal Way to house major world renowned artists and performers from various disciplines. The meaning 75 percent of funds must come from federal or private sources.

It was and is an ambitious dream of a hand full of farsighted persons who worked six years to get the Festival to this stage.

Who, except perhaps Seattle Opera director Glenn Ross, would ever have thought of Federal Way as the future home of the world famous Seattle Opera summer production of Wagner's Ring of the Niebelung?

Who, except perhaps the Weyerhaeuser Company, has 30 acres of land on a lake to donate to such a project?

Who, except perhaps Representatives Frank Warnke and Bob Eberle could hound, nag, cajole and keep their colleagues in line on key votes? Warnke, a veteran Democratic legislator, has worked the bill hard in the House and the Senate, but he needed help from Eberle for

key Republican votes and the second term "freshman" delivered.

Warnke and Eberle didn't do it alone. Sandy Lorentsen, a devoted lobbyist worked hundreds of hours on the bill and was paid whatever the meager funds a special ad hoc committee in support of the project could muster.

Local activists Jim Badgley, Faye Clerget, Joe Rhea and others did their part, and a healthy check from Harry Newman, co-owner of SeaTac Mall, came at a critical time in the lobbying effort.

Only Senator Eleanor Lee, D-33rd, among South King County legislators voted against the project. A fact to be remembered at re-election time.

Now it's up to the Washington State delegation to muster the \$15 million in matching funds. According to Federal Way Chamber President L. Anthony Tebeau, only Cong. Mike Lowry, D-7th, and Joel Pritchard, R-1st, have, through their aides, expressed concern over the project. We are confident that those two simply lack adequate information about the project and will eventually be supportive.

The Washington delegation is among the most influential in the nation and will surely work hard on one of the best, most farsighted, and most exciting projects to come along in a long, long time.

Sign your name for presidential primary

We wholeheartedly support an initiative campaign under way to give Washington a presidential primary.

Initiative 370, which has received bi-partisan support, would set a Washington primary on the fourth Tuesday in May during presidential election years. If Initiative 370 is signed by at least 123,711 registered voters and passes in the General Election this November, Washington's first presidential primary will be May 27, 1980.

Other primaries that day would be in the states of Oregon, Idaho and Nevada, creating as powerful regional primary just one week before the California crucial showdown.

Here's how the Washington primary would work: Voters would request either a Democratic or Republican ballot (party registration would not be required). Candidates receiving more than 15 percent of their party's vote would qualify for delegates to their national convention.

Candidates would receive delegates proportional to the number of votes received. For example, if Jerry Brown received 50 percent of the Democratic vote and Jimmy Carter received 40 percent, the Democratic delegates would be distributed proportionally. Delegates would be pledged to that candidate for

the first two ballots at the national convention.

How would a presidential primary benefit residents of Washington?

—It would give Washington clout in the race for president. Washington would be a key state in the "Regional" primary with the greatest number of delegates. Candidates would need the momentum for the California primary.

—Washington would no longer be a token stopping point for presidential candidates. The big money campaigns would be here contributing an estimated \$45 million to the state economy.

—Inevitably, Washington residents would become more interested and involved in presidential races. They would have opportunities to see and listen to the candidates in person instead of always via the news media. People would have a chance to directly participate in their state's choice of candidates without going to precinct caucuses.

Initiative 370 petitions will need the minimum 123,711 signatures before July 6 to make the November ballot. The petitions will soon appear in area grocery stores and other businesses.

We hope you'll agree with us that it's time for a Washington presidential primary and sign your name.

It's like this every year.

"Jeannie," he said, "It's 9 o'clock. Maybe you should get ready for bed."

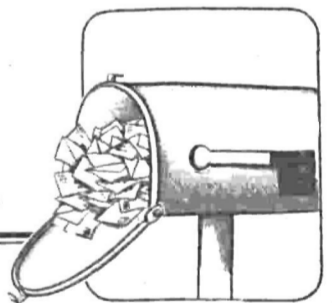
"Nine at night?" I asked.

Competency test scores:

Ninth graders weak in math, spelling

How competent are Federal Way ninth graders in basic skills?

Not too bad in vocabulary and reading, and not good in math and spelling, according to results of the first test in pre-graduation competency.

The school board last year adopted a program calling for students to pass a competency test in basic skills prior to graduation. Under the program, students were to be tested first in the ninth grade to determine if remedial help was necessary. The first of those tests were conducted this year.

Of the 1,295 ninth graders in the district's five junior high schools, 67 percent passed the vocabulary section, 65 percent passed the reading portion, 65 percent passed language usage, 63 percent passed punctuation, 60 percent passed capital letters, and 53 percent passed spelling. Only 30 percent were able to pass the mathematics section.

THE MATH TEST consisted of 40 questions and a standard of 75 percent correct was required for passage. In the six language skills tests, a ninth grade equivalent score was required for passage.

Ron Johnson, administrative assistant for program support, said that the math test was developed locally and is evidently more difficult than some commercially prepared tests.

When asked by board member Nancy Ise if he was surprised by any of the results, Johnson said he thought the math scores would be higher and the reading and vocabulary scores lower.

The district is planning to add basic skills specialists to the staff next year to work with students in problem areas. As for the spelling scores, Johnson said that job has to go all the way back to the elementary grades.

Johnson said that some school counselors had been contacted by parents who were "appalled" at the scores and concerned about student advancement into the 10th grade. The district has no plans to hold back ninth graders, but they must pass the test prior to graduation.

The math test will be given each year to all students in grades nine through 12 to assure that each student retains the math skills and reviews them periodically, Johnson said.

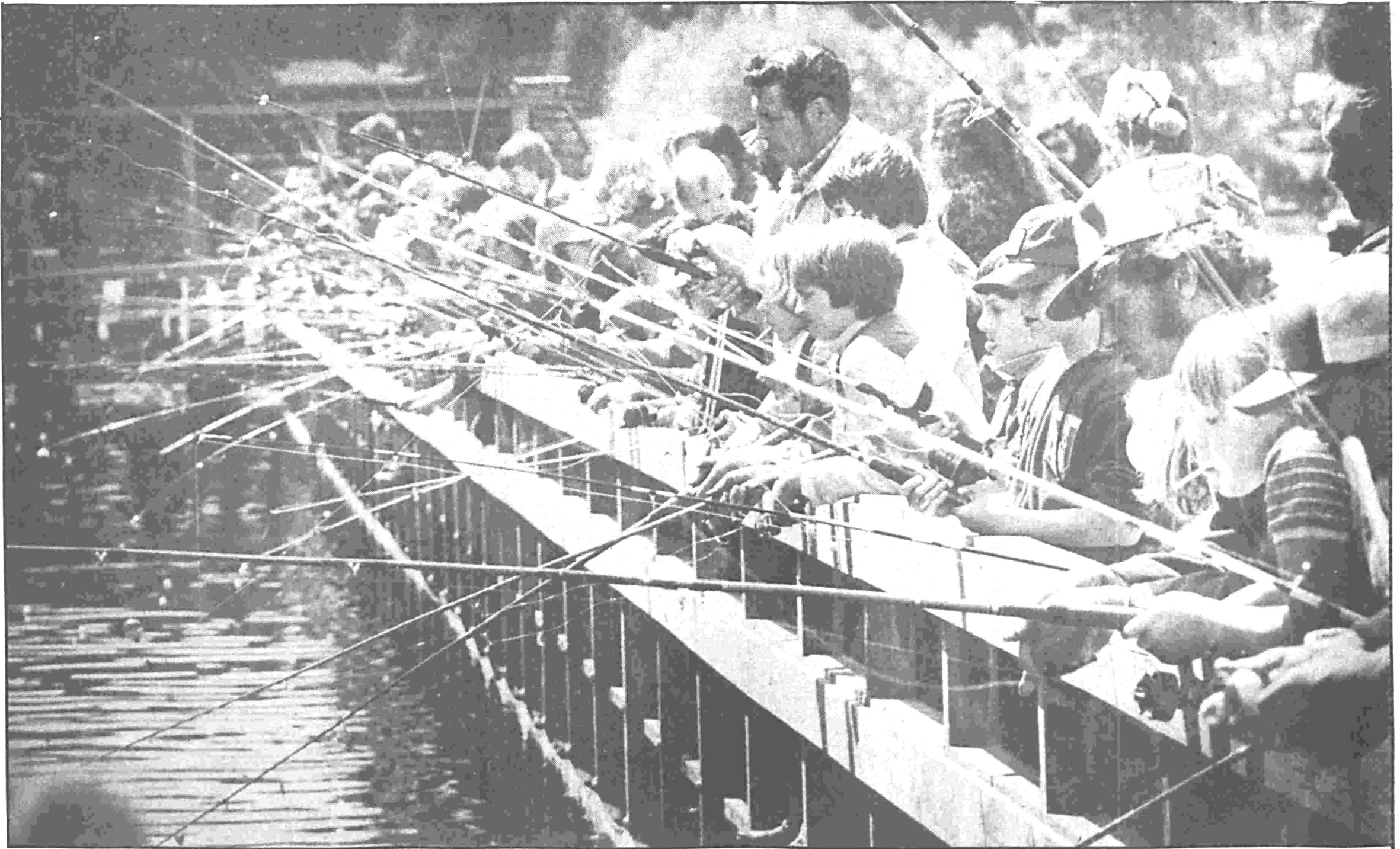

Woman tells jury of rape at Mall

Despite repeated pleas for him to stop, a local businessman continued his sexual assault on an 18-year old woman, she testified Monday before a King County Superior Court jury.

Through periodic sobs and tears, the petite redhead told of her encounter with Chris Palzer, 48, March 7. Palzer allegedly raped her in the bedroom of his motor home while it was parked at the Sea Tac Mall.

The woman testified she met Palzer in the Mall where she had gone to apply for a job. Palzer told her "you're looking at the right person if you need a job because I own a lot of places," she said. She left the Mall with him and drove to the Steak Fac-

tory where Palzer said he could get a job as a waitress.

Later, when they returned to the Mall, she told him she wanted to leave but Palzer reportedly encouraged her to have a drink and "snort" cocaine through a rolled dollar bill. "I was scared of him so I took it," she told the jury of six men and six women.

Palzer is accused of forcing her to the bedroom, undressing her and forcing her to submit to various sex acts. He then took pictures of her in the nude and dressed in certain garments he had selected for her.

The woman said she threatened to tell her boyfriend but Palzer retorted, "you're never gonna see your boyfriend again. You're gonna stay with me." She said his

forced acts made her feel "icky."

The woman also testified that Palzer "kept reaching into the cupboard. I thought he was getting a weapon."

When she finally managed to escape the motor home, the woman said she ran partially-clad through the parking lot, with Palzer in pursuit. Two Tacoma teenagers helped her then followed the motor home to get the license number.

During her time with Palzer, the Midway woman told the jury in Judge James Dore's court, "I was always afraid of him." Under direct examination from Senior Deputy Prosecutor Ron Clark, the woman said she had "definitely not" agreed to the acts performed with Palzer.

Since the incident, she said, she has "had the same nightmare every night."

The second-degree rape trial is expected to continue through Wednesday.

Council delays development regs

A decision on several King County ordinances that would regulate the manner in which certain areas of rural King County may be developed has been postponed for at least two weeks by the county council.

The council heard testimony Monday on the proposed laws which many property owners and developers find too restrictive.

Under two of the proposed ordinances, the minimum lot size per dwelling unit would be three or five acres. Two other ordinances would further restrict development by reserving 65 percent of the site as open space to ensure that land for future growth will be retained.

Landslide, seismic and wetland areas as well as several sensitive areas would be protected if the council adopts an ordinance relating to those areas. That ordinance came under fire from a representative of Burlington Northern Railroad who said the "sensitive area ordinance promises urban sprawl and is unreasonably over-restrictive."

Calene Coddington told the council all the ordinances "promise development pressure."

Doug Webb, a developer representative, said all five ordinances are "unfair" but the one requiring five acre lot sizes is

"probably the least unfair" since the owner would not have to dedicate 65 percent of his property to open space reserve.

Webb said the ordinances effectively put "65 percent of the land in a land bank for future growth but you don't get any money. You can't take a person's land rights without compensation," he said. Webb urged the council to amend the proposed ordinances to give the property owners three choices. He said they should either be allowed to develop the tracts as one-acre lots, or as five acre lots where it is appropriate with a plan ahead on where the house would go. The third option,

he said, should be to cluster the houses at one unit per acre on one-half of the property and leave the other half in a growth reserve.

Also urging the council to return the proposed laws to committee for further action was Larry Triplett of the Seattle-King County Board of Realtors. He said the council needs to "come up with a concrete, all-inclusive plan."

The growth management committee, chaired by Councilman Bill Reams, will consider the ordinances May 23 with further council action planned for May 29.

Crime report:

FW man, boys nailed in vandalism incidents

Vandals were unusually busy in Federal Way last week, King County Police records showed Monday, and not all of the suspects were juveniles.

In one of the incidents, police cited a middle-aged man on a charge of malicious destruction of property after a huge old maple tree was cut down at a Marine Hills Way residence Tuesday.

The tree, some two feet in diameter, was near the property

line between the suspect's house and a residence which is under construction. The victim is the owner of the new residence.

Police indicated that the suspect had asked the victim to cut down the tree.



Traveling in style with a mobile hotel

After a day on the ski slopes or collecting shells at Long Beach, the vacationers climb back into their traveling lodge and take off down the road.

The newest thing for indulgent tourism is the Snoozer, a mobile hotel where 16 guests can live aboard the two-story bus and watch the scenery go by as they breeze down the roadway to their next destination.

This hotel on wheels is one of 10 to be acquired by Travel Network, a national franchised travel agency (one office is located in West Campus).

The \$600,000 super-bus comes complete with nine cabin-rooms, eight double for passengers and one double for crewmembers. All the comforts of home are compactly included in the mahogany rooms: a radio, television, central tape-deck player and close circuit television. Each room has hot and cold running water with showers.

The articulated touring car rides on an air suspension chassis and measures 13.12-feet by 8.2-feet and stretches 59.4 feet. It is powered by a 10-cylinder, 400 horsepower Daimler Benz diesel engine which allows the bus to cruise at 60 mph with a maximum speed of 80 mph.

The touring bus is presently making promotional appearances throughout the coun-

try for eight months, after that time it will be available for charters, said Mary Christensen, manager of the West Campus Travel Network.

Total cost of the trip averages \$1,200 for 24 hours. "This includes continental breakfast and the cost of a driver and crewmembers," Ms. Christensen said.

The cost per person ranges from \$75 to \$100, depending on the tour and the utilization of the facilities.

Future charter trips include a trip to the Winter Olympics in Lake Placid, N.Y.

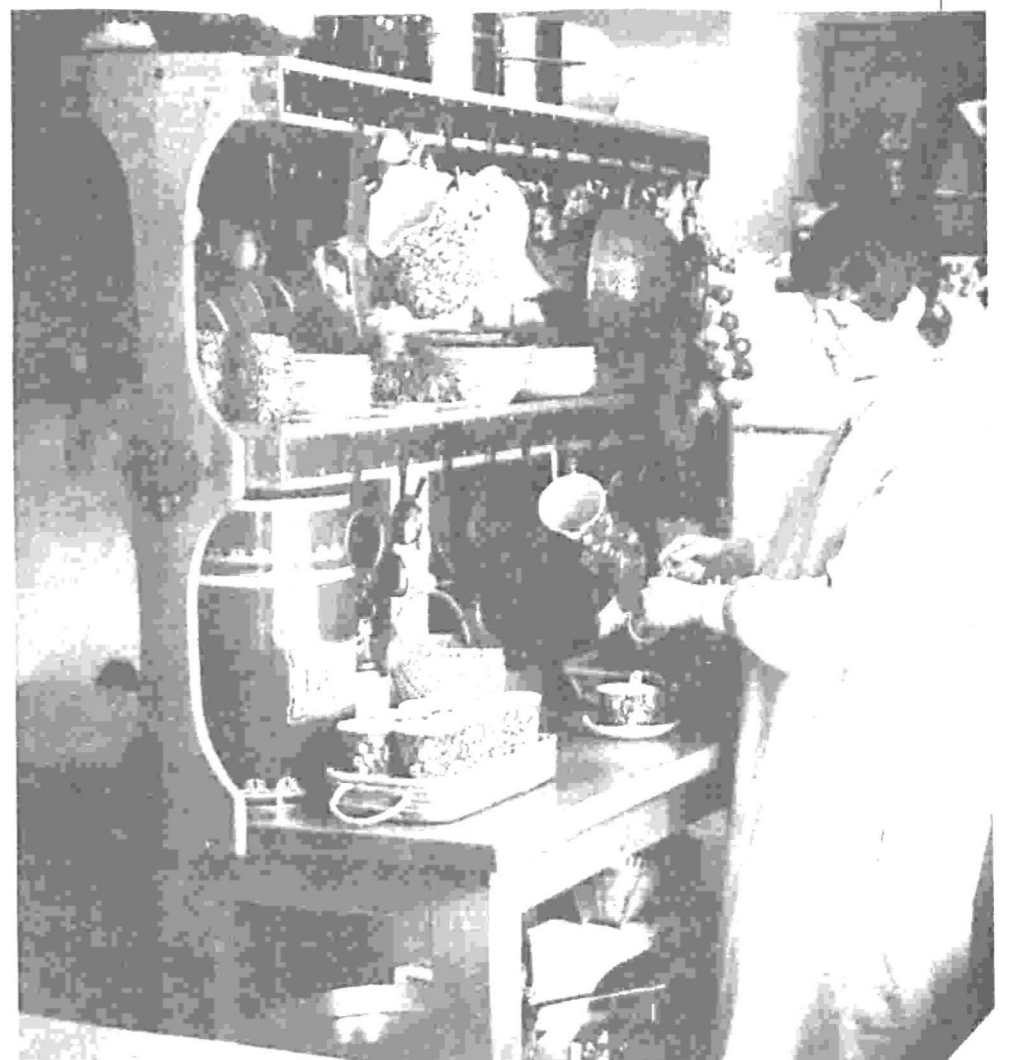

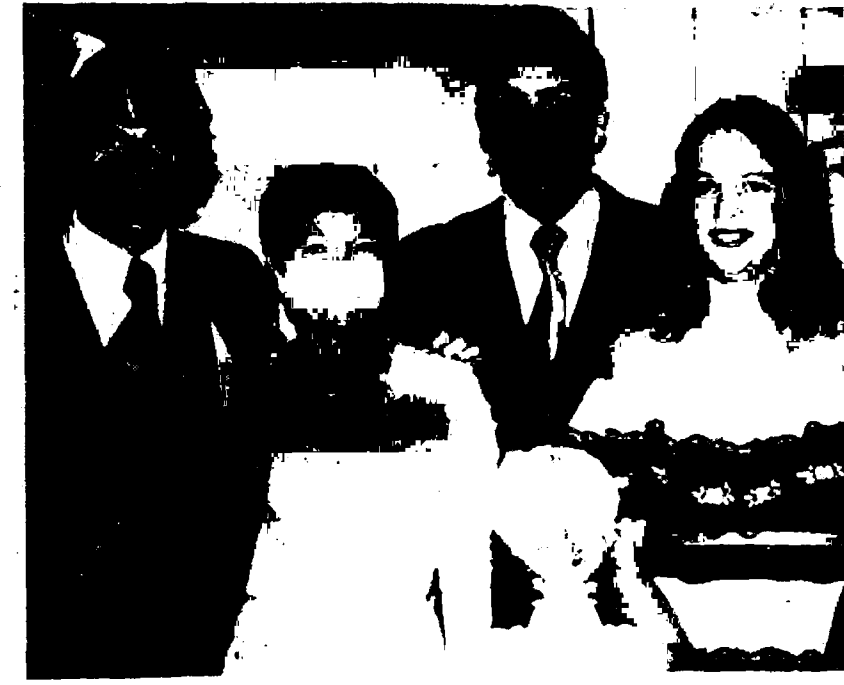

 opposition only from a few residents in the Redondo Beach area — and the city committee has responded to that by saying that an incorporated Federal Way would be better off without the waterfront community.

Redondo Beach residents, committee co-chairman Harry Keinath said recently, have consistently expressed a need for a high level of service and a concurrent reluctance or inability to pay for it.

Keinath said that Redondoites "exhibit a kind of egocentricity in their expectations."
 "For example," he said, "when

the city committee was meeting only a mile away at Sacajawea Junior High School, there were people in Redondo who claimed that the meetings were not convenient enough and were not adequately publicized."

There's no doubt, Keinath said two weeks ago, that Redondo's sewerage system, water supply system and roads need major improvements.

"Relative to the rest of Federal Way the need is disproportionately high — which means that if Redondo becomes part of the city, it will probably receive more money per capita than any other part of the community," Keinath said.

Metro feels the pinch

So you thought you'd beat the gas crunch by taking the bus? Well, Metro is feeling the pinch too, with only a five-to-seven-day stockpile of diesel fuel and a close escape from a 25 percent cutback on fuel.

"Our fuel supplier advised us we may be 25 percent short for May," said Mike Sharar, Metro manager of community relations. "We now believe that will be covered by Huff Petroleum Company, our supplier."

Whether Metro will have ample diesel fuel in June is uncertain, according to Sharar. "We'll probably have a week's notice (of cutbacks) from Huff," he added.

He admitted he is worried, but he assures that buses won't stop running.

Instead, Sharar said, riders can

expect less frequent service whenever fuel begins to dry up. "A bus would run every 20 minutes, instead of every 10," was one of his examples.

NEXT, "we would reduce the miles we travel — like, by sticking to arterials. We may ask people to walk farther to the bus stop," Sharar explained. Then, Metro will "take a hard look" at half-full bus runs, he added.

Already, he said, Metro has within a couple of months increased stored diesel reserves from three to a five-to-seven-day supply. Metro uses 21,000 gallons of diesel daily, according to Sharar.

Storage-tank capacity limits reserves.

Currently, Metro "is taking steps" to add storage capacity, according to Don Munro, manager of transit development.

"And we're taking steps to insure that we won't get gouged by diesel prices," he asserted.

Metro pays about 55-60 cents a gallon; the 1980 budget reflects a 107 percent increase, said Sharar, promising that fares won't be increased to offset spiraling fuel bills.

METRO is also guarding against a major crisis by forming plans for collector park-and-ride lots. Establishing more lots is a more efficient way to use fuel, Sharar said, since it curbs the drain from long routes. That doesn't mean Metro will take away existing bus stops, he added.

Metro will also encourage carpooling and flexible working hours to spread out peak loads. Sharar, admitting that's been tried before, conceded, "There's

nothing magic about it; but a crisis provides more stimulus."

HOPES ARE also hanging on a decision expected in a week from Washington, D.C.

David Kalber, Metro manager of governmental relations, said that the U.S. Economic Regulatory Administration (under the U.S. Department of Energy) will propose regulations reinstating mandatory allocations that will force suppliers to provide 100 percent of the needs for agricultural and transit users. Allocations will be based on earlier levels, he added.

Metro begins direct UW run

Metro will begin a non-transfer bus run from Federal Way and Highline to the University District, a plus for University of Washington students who formerly had to transfer buses downtown.

"Beginning May 28 on Route 174, you can sit there and shut your eyes all the way," recently announced Don Munro, Metro manager of transit development.

Route 174 will make Highway 99 pick-ups at South 348th Street, at South 240th Street (Highline Community College) and points in between on Highway 99 to downtown Seattle (via Third Avenue) and the University District. Drivers will change the bus number to "71" when reaching downtown; the change occurred from linking the 174 and 71 routes.

Burien group works to free jailed Christians

If Gary Short has learned one thing since he began working to free oppressed Christians in the Soviet Union, it's to believe the unbelievable.

Short, as pastor of a Burien church that serves as the base for an organization called Friends in the West, knows countless cases of Russians and citizens of other Communist-bloc countries who have been harassed and imprisoned for expressing their Christianity.

The stories are hard to believe, he said — "and I've seen some of these situations and talked to the people involved."

Friends in the West is what its name implies—a link to the free world for Christian dissidents.

Its founder and director, Ray Barnett of Surrey, B.C., moved the headquarters to Burien when he became familiar with Short and his Church of Blessed Hope.

From there, the alliance's network of participating churches in the United States has thrown its collective influence into negotiating for the release of Christian dissidents, working for the civil rights of those who remain in Communists societies, and heightening public awareness of the Christianity vs. Communism dilemma.

THE LATEST success for the organization was the exile of Georgi Vins, a writer and leader of the unregistered Baptist church in the Soviet Union.

Short and another Friends in the West representative met Vins early this month in New York City, where he arrived after East German lawyer Dr. Wolfgang Volgel, upon the urging of Barnett, included him in negotiations for the release of four other Soviet dissidents.

Short said Vins was held for five years in Siberian labor camps and prisons until "suddenly they took him for three days in an open cattle car through the bitter cold to a Moscow jail. He wasn't told the reason, and after being held in Moscow for one day, he was told his place of exile had been changed.

"All five of the dissidents were taken in a convoy of 10 cars to Moscow Airport," Short said. "It was only after they arrived at the airport that they were told by the

American Consul, that who was waiting there, that their 'place of exile' was to be the United States."

Vins, whose wife and family stayed behind and reportedly are being harassed by the KGB security force in their home town of Kiev, was apparently targeted by the Soviets for release "some time ago," Short said.

"They had begun the process of restoring his health by taking him off the bleak diet in the labor camp," Short related.

The Soviets' handling of Vins is consistent with a strategy to improve their western-world image, Short said. "They're concerned about changing their bad-guy reputation," he said.

THEIR SPIRIT of cooperation could lessen, however if an arms treaty between the USSR and the U.S. is reached, Short pondered.

"If the SALT agreement is signed very quickly, they (Soviets) might become tougher with their policy of releasing Christians," he said. "I'm sure one reason for Vins' release was their desire to have the treaty ratified."

Because they are paying more attention to their image, the Russians' treatment of imprisoned dissidents improves with more publicity on the subversion, Short said.

"Vins said his treatment depended on the amount of coverage and interest in him," Short said. "Guards would wave letters to him in his face but wouldn't let him read them. They meant it as a type of torture. But they began treating him better."

Friends in the West is laboring to familiarize the world with the plight of oppressed Christians, Short said.

"Many people, including fellow Christians in this country, are unaware of how serious the problem is," he said.

More attention has been given the releases of Jewish dissidents, he noted.

"Last year, 30,000 Jews were given exit visas from Russia," he said. "You could count on two hands the number of Christians released."

"The Jews have a tremendous organization and financial base from which to work. On the other

hand, we're relatively new," he added.

MOST CHRISTIAN organizations are "more interested in getting Bibles and religious broadcasts" into the Soviet mainstream, Short said. Friends in the West is "sort of pioneering the human rights aspect."

"Our philosophy," he said, "is to help those who want to stay in Russia to create an atmosphere of tolerance, and to do everything we can to help those who want

Headquarters site

Port, Boeing prefer sale

The Port of Seattle staff favors selling 30 acres west of Sea-Tac Airport to Boeing for a corporate headquarters, should the pending rezoning gain approval, according to Arthur Yoshioka, Port planning director.

"Agreements are still in draft form. Drafts have not been done on a lease, although there has been some talk about a lease. A lease has not been ruled out," Yoshioka said recently.

He estimated that a sale price would be near a \$2 million, although that old figure would need to be updated.

How the \$2 million, or whatever, could be spent — and what the sale vs. lease option could mean to the community — is not clear. Before looking at some of the options, this capsule case history will update status of the project.

IN MAY 1977, Boeing contacted the Port, which runs the airport, about the site. Subsequently, the Port applied for a rezoning from single family to manufacturing park, on behalf of Boeing.

The County Zoning Examiner opened the hearing and remanded the case to the county council for consideration of amending the Highline Communities Plan (HCP), which depicted the site as a combination of open space-park-recreation, and amending the Sea-Tac Communities Plan (STCP). When the council amended the HCP on July 24, 1978, it imposed a condition that caused the Port to re-apply for a change to RM 900 (high density multi-units) and for an unclassified-use permit to allow a helicopter pad. The last testimony at the re-opened hearings was taken on April 17; the examiner's recommendation is forthcoming at an unspecified time.

Five acres of the 30 are subject to a rezoning; precise location of the five acres has not been defined.

ALSO UNDEFINED is disposition of the sale or lease proceeds, should the rezoning be granted.

Underlining the answer is the procedure the Port would use, assuming the transaction occurs.

Yoshioka said a staff recommendation on the sale would be presented to the Port Commissioners, who would make the final judgment on a transaction.

Commissioners also have the option of using the proceeds to develop aircraft facilities, like resurface runways, or using proceeds in the home-acquisition program, according to Robert Brown, chief of the airport division of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA).

The FAA does not confine proceeds to the home-acquisition program, he explained.

Another option the commission could exercise is to reimburse the FAA for its share of the home-acquisition program.

"If the Port gets \$2 million, slightly over \$1 million would come to the FAA because it provided 52 percent participation in the program," Brown said. "However, the way they (Port) talked to me, it would be used to buy more land in the home acquisition program."

IN OCTOBER, \$3,123,905 will be available for the reportedly lean home-acquisition fund, he said.

"Not every penny will go for land acquisition; they may want to buy an apron, airport development item," Brown said, noting the port is considering a \$128 million capital-improvement program.

Yoshioka said the staff's recommendation is that proceeds go into the home-acquisition fund.

But he acknowledged that depositing proceeds in the fund would free up other funds intended for home acquisition. "There could be a chain effect," he admitted.

At the end of the chain, money could be used to decrease the \$80 million in revenue bonds the Port hopes to sell to help finance the \$120-million capital-improvement program, according to Yoshioka.

SO THE Port's decision on sell vs. lease rests on the needs for large-scale infusions of capital, he explained.

Another factor influencing a decision is that, by law, the Port cannot lease any longer than 50 years at a time, he noted.

"Everyone (all parties) is tending toward a sale," Yoshioka explained.

Don Davis, a official Boeing agreed. Boeing prefers to buy, although it would lease, if necessary, he said. The permanence afforded by a sale makes it desirable, he said, since "a corporate headquarters doesn't change with production changes. (By contrast), we can phase out a 707 and it affects the industrial facility."

While a sale price hasn't been established, Boeing was informed of the \$2 million tag and didn't withdraw its interest, according to Davis.

In the draft sale agreement, the Port stipulates that manufacturing is not allowed, but permits office use, Yoshioka said. A two-story height limitation is imposed on the headquarters building, he added. And, he continued, closing is subject to the granting of the reclassifications.

Also, a stipulation prevents Boeing from suing the Port regarding airport noise, according to Yoshioka.

Consummation of an agreement awaits county action on the

embassy.

The stalemated situation is being handled "individually," as each case must be, Short said. "We're assisted by diplomats in more intense negotiations. We also organize churches in letter-writing campaigns," he said.

rezoning matter, he said.

In regard to the remaining 25 acres, Yoshioka said Boeing would landscape it, in accordance with the STCP. "Presumably, the zoning won't be changed; but that depends to some extent on the zoning examiner," he explained.

IF SOLD, the property would revert back onto the property-tax rolls, he said. (Houses occupied the site before it was condemned by the Port in the 1960s for a buffer.)

Property taxes at the current level would be an estimated \$240,000 annually on a \$12-million property (a \$10-million building plus \$2 million in land value), according to the assessor's office. That's subject to many qualifications, including a lag on collection of taxes on new construction and level of assessed value.

If leased, excise taxes (formerly leasehold taxes) would be levied on the Port-owned land, generally based on 12 percent of

the lease payment level. The Port remits the 12 percent to the state, which distributes collections back to the county, with some given to the Port, via the county.

In addition, an estimated \$200,000 in personal-property taxes would accrue to the county on a \$10 million Boeing-owned building (unless a lease is written for some other arrangement), according to Ken Morse, appraisal section supervisor in the personal property division of the assessor's office.

Effectively, this means the Port land gets taxed by excise taxes; the Boeing building is subject to personal-property taxes.

Yoshioka estimates excise taxes would be 85 or 90 percent less than property taxes. Authorities agree they are less; they disagree on how much less. One rule of thumb used by officials is 2 percent of the value for property taxes; 1.2 percent of the "rent" for excise taxes.

Morris appointed principal

The Highline School Board has officially appointed Glen Morris as principal of Olympic Elementary School.

Currently a junior high, Olympic will be converted into an elementary school for next year to house students from North Hill and Manhattan elementaries, which will be closed.

Morris is presently the principal at North Hill.

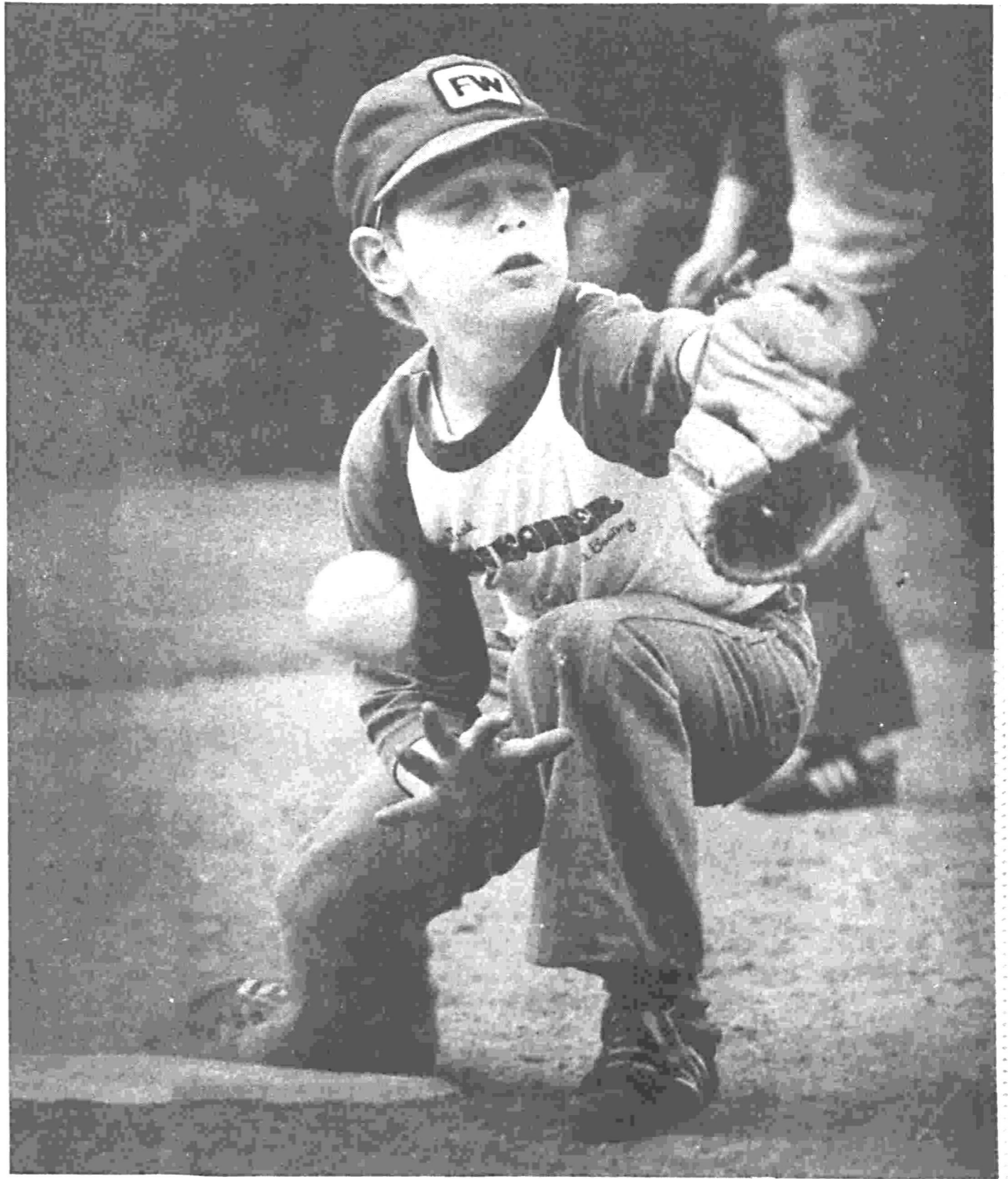

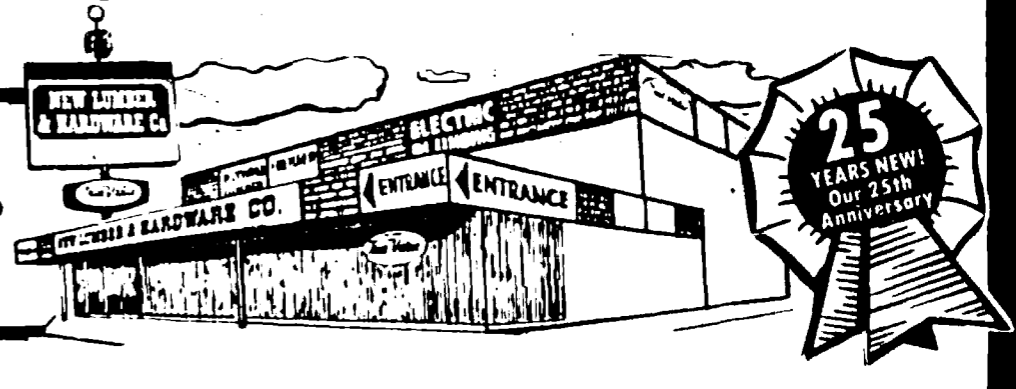

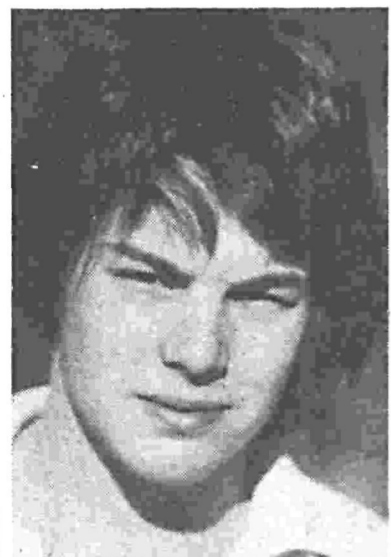

Boating Quiz: Which of the following are more important causes of boating collisions?

- Boater inexperience;
- Reckless or negligent operation;
- Lack of boating knowledge;
- Lack of knowledge of the water being cruised;
- Noise;
- Daytime glare;
- Fatigue;
- Shock-vibration;
- Alcohol.

Answer to Boating Quiz: If you picked the last five you were closer to the truth than if you picked the first four. In the past, boating safety people have blamed such things as inexperience of one kind or another, along with negligence, for boating collisions.

Recent in-depth studies, however, have shown that these other things, called "environmental stressors," are the real culprits.

Each of these five factors cuts down our alertness. It was shown in tests, for instance, that as fatigue increases, a boater tends to quit scanning the

waters ahead and to each side and starts staring at such things as boats or even floating debris.

Thus, a weary boater, skimming across the water at 25 knots at the end of a day, anxious to get back to the dock, would fail to react quickly enough when on a collision course.

In one series of tests, boaters faced a flashing light display which simulated boats moving across their vision. When one of the lights became stationary, which indicated a collision course, the operator pushed a button, which indicated the hazard was recognized.

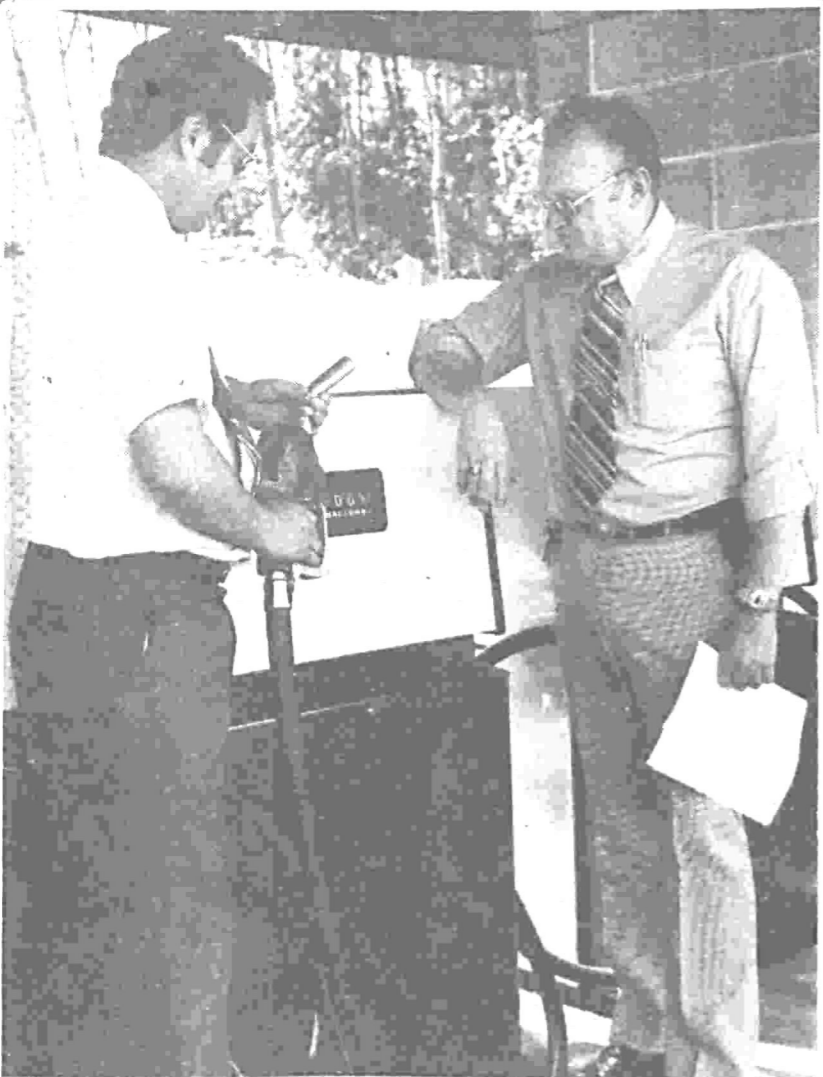

Gas headaches? Try filling fire vehicles

If the thought of waiting in gas lines for a few hours is plaguing, try standing in line for a week. That's just what the Federal Way Fire Department had to do last week as it struggled through government and oil company bureaucracies to secure some petroleum for its new station.

The scenario began last Tuesday when pumps were installed at the district's new headquarters. Anticipating no problems, Fire Marshall Dave Crossen called the district's supplier and asked for gas to fill the new tanks. "Sorry, no gas," he was told, learning that new gas supplies are distributed only with the government's OK.

Crossen then called the Department of Energy (DOE). "Call back later," a department employee said, and he did. "You'll have to fill out form 99. We'll send it to you in the mail," another employee said.

"What if I have a fire tonight?" Crossen asked.

"Find a service station," DOE advised.

MOST OF THE problem for the fire department was in supplying unleaded and premium petroleum for the officers' emergency cars, for the Medic One unit and for a few pumps that require other than diesel fuel. Although most of the fire trucks require diesel, which is in adequate supply, the situation remained threatening last week to the department because of recent additions of vehicles that require unleaded and premium gas.

"Without the help of some Federal Way service stations, we

could have been in serious trouble," Crossen said Monday. "Some of them even gave us gas after they were closed."

By Thursday, the department had received a promise of gas delivery on Monday. Meanwhile, the Medic Unit continued to guzzle gas at seven miles to the gallon and the small pumper that requires regular gas operated at four miles per gallon. Station Eight's gas supply ran dry and the situation looked ominous.

"We've run out of gas three times at Station Eight because the supplier won't come out and fill it," Crossen said. "Traditionally when the supply was low, they'd just come out and fill the tanks. Now they're not able to."

SO WHAT ARE the implications for the fire department? "Well, it's just not the public affected by this gas thing," Crossen said. "I guess it means we're going to have to watch our own gas supplies better. And unless we can get a guarantee of fuel supply, it could become a serious situation—and from what we hear from Olympia it's going to get worse."

While neighboring Auburn Fire Department has received no allocation cutbacks, Puyallup is operating with a 20 percent cut in gas supplies. Federal Way's delivery this week was calculated to at least equal last year's supply, but, Crossen pointed out, demand for services has increased 15 to 20 percent and the new Medic One unit and pumper are demanding more gas, and that may be gas that won't be plentiful throughout the coming months.

Responsiveness key to community needs

Seated in her new office where she's recently taken over the position of South King County Multi-Service Center's executive director, Maggie Ellis talked about her goals for the year.

Most of them center around developing "a good combination of professional, church and community effort." Mentioning successful programs such as meals on wheels and elderly home health care, she said "It's something that just can't be beat."

She talked about the value of a community-based service as opposed to a bureaucracy. "We can be more responsive because we have the flexibility and are responsive to community needs. We're close to the people."

Ms. Ellis, a robust woman with a quick smile and strawberry blonde curls took over the executive position that was recently vacated by Stephanie Eldringhoff.

She is responsible for 22 staffers, four VISTA employees, MSC services and nine center-housed agencies, all of which support programs for emergency, low-income and handicapped services.

With an background in teaching plus a master's from Washington State University in adult and continuing education, she said she is prepared to handle the needs of the center, many of which center on communicating.

"Communication is important. I realize that today that's almost a cliché but in this job you need to be understood by all kinds of people...clients, a variety of media, staff plus the public who insures funding," she said.

MS. ELLIS SAID SHE thinks proper planning is the key to a successful program. "We need a long range plan that will consider where we are, where we're going and where we will be in five

years," she said referring to discussion currently underway at board meetings.

A major area of concern is the necessity for MSC facilities that will be required after the 1979-80 school year.

A need that is currently popping up with increasing regularity is to provide emergency or counseling services for battered women. Though the program is yet in its infancy, she said women have heard "word of mouth" that they can get help at the center. Eight to 10 cases called in during April and two women called in last Friday.

Though they are now only able to provide minimal services such as offering counseling, food, or medical attention, she said, eventually they hope to provide a hot-line or emergency shelter.

"Right now we have to refer severe cases to the Seattle or Tacoma shelters and they are over-crowded. But, you just can't say no when someone comes in. We're better than no help at all. At least they have someone to talk to about it."

Right now, she said the center is going through a period of growth. As the community expands, needs diversify and change. She mentioned the recently established merger of their transportation service with the King County Metro as being part of a joint effort.

TO MAKE THEIR dream of greater community involvement come true they need to get more professionals involved in their services.

"We'd like to broaden our geographical base to draw people for the advisory committees and Board. We need a better representation from the community.

Unable to suppress her excitement about what that could mean, she said that community

supported programs are the key to local needs. All that's required is involvement and work.

Willing to do her share and then some, Ms. Elli said "If the good Lord would do me a favor, I'd like Him to extend the week or give

me more hours in a day or just a spurt of energy."

"There's so many things to do but the staff is enthusiastic," she said. "That extends the effectiveness of our program two-fold."

Normandy Park: back to the start

In a surprise announcement, Normandy Park city manager Doug Schmitz said Monday the three finalists for police chief have been dropped from consideration and the search for someone to fill the post will begin again.

None of the finalists, who came from an original list of 21 applicants, measured up to requirements as an administrator of a police department, Schmitz said.

"All of them had unquestioned abilities at law enforcement, but they didn't possess the administrative expertise we need," Schmitz said.

Schmitz added that they did not seem adaptable to the community.

As late as last Thursday, Schmitz expected to name this week his selection to take over the job vacated in January when William McSeveney retired.

And last Tuesday and Wednesday, Schmitz and Mayor Tom Dawson interviewed in California the finalist given the top rating by an oral review board.

But over the weekend, Schmitz reconsidered the qualifications of all three finalists and decided to "discard them and start over from scratch."

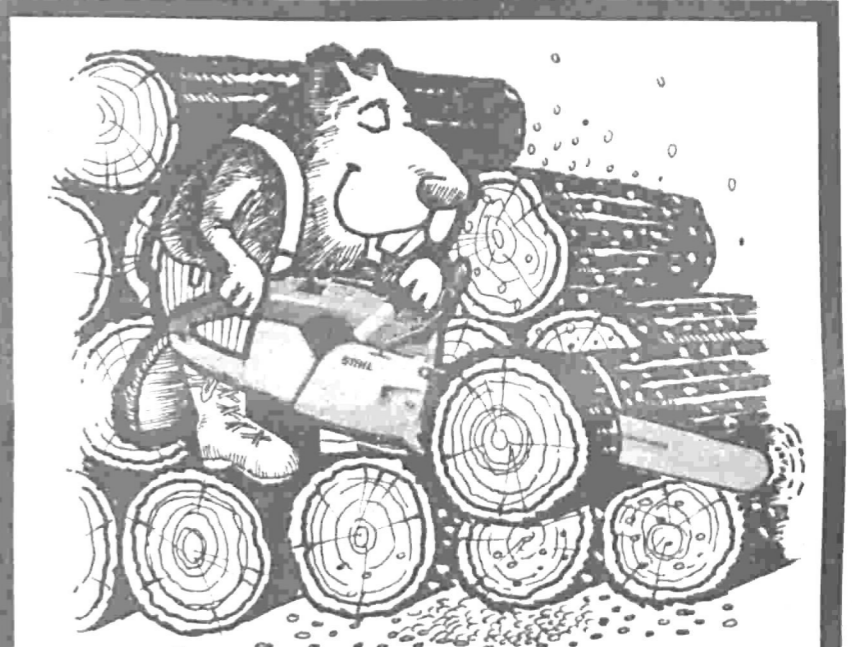
None of the other candidates remains under consideration, Schmitz said. The process of hiring a chief, which is expected to last as long as six months, will be similar to the earlier process of having applicants ranked by police chiefs and city managers of other cities, and then reviewed by the Normandy Park civil service commission and an oral board.

Garnett Arcand, a Bellevue Police Department captain who has been Normandy Park's interim chief since McSeveney's retirement, will remain in the job indefinitely. He has not applied for it fulltime.

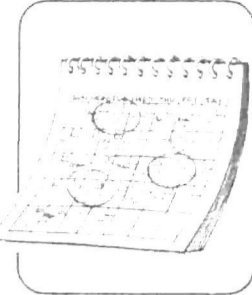

Westiders sue Port over Weyerhaeuser lease

by Carolyn Logan

A lawyer representing the Westside Hilltop Survival Committee announced Monday he will file a suit against the Port of Seattle regarding Port Commission approval of a lease for a Weyerhaeuser corporate-aviation hangar, west of Sea-Tac Airport.

Lawyer Roger Leeds said he will file "as soon as possible" against the Port, and will name Weyerhaeuser as a defendant.

"We have been mystified and taken by surprise by the way the lease (agenda item) popped up willy-nilly and was approved," Leeds said of Port Commission action on April 24.

The Port released the final Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) on the Westside General-Corporate Aviation Facility (a 14.2-acre site including 2.3 acres for Weyerhaeuser) on April 12. A

seven-day period for public comment elapsed, as required by law, before the Port approved the lease on April 24, according to Ed Parks, Port planner.

LEEDS said the suit will ask to have the Port's April 24 resolution declared invalid.

He called the April 12 EIS too limited in scope.

Questions that need to be addressed in an EIS include airport expansion plans of the Port and the interrelationship between the airport and State Route 509, now under construction, according to Leeds.

The document he envisions would include the Boeing Headquarters, proposed for west of Sea-Tac, and the adjacent Weyerhaeuser facility.

In addition, "There has never been an EIS on the overall (Sea-Tac) Airport Plan," he asserted, referring to the plan that was revised in 1977. Nor has there

been a federal impact statement, he said, noting that you can't ask for a federal EIS in a non-federal court.

When the committee files in King County Superior Court, there will be ample financial backing to wage legal action, according to a committee spokesperson.

In Leeds' objections, he also claimed the Port ignored the Sea-Tac Communities Plan in the Weyerhaeuser matter. Observing that the county opposed general-aviation expansion north of South 176th Street, Leeds asked, "Are there any rules for the Port (to follow)?"

THE "RULES ISSUE" also is an issue in the Westside Hilltop Survival Committee's suit against Boeing and King County, according to Leeds.

The committee asks King County Superior Court to nullify previous government-approved

land-use changes that have enabled the Boeing plan to proceed. Trial date has been set for Oct. 8.

In one early skirmish, parties are filing papers called interrogatories to collect more information.

On March 7, Boeing raised about 75 questions, including requests for names of all Westside Hilltop Survival Committee members and legal descriptions of all property owned by them.

The Boeing lawyer, Richard McCann, said he received Leeds' answers before last Friday's date to hear a Boeing motion to compel interrogatories. Receipt rendered the hearing moot, he added.

McCann anticipates more interrogatories from each side before the October court date.

Leeds said he will submit interrogatories, asking such questions as how much money in campaign contributions Boeing gives to

King County officials.

He said the Weyerhaeuser ac-

tion will not preclude the Boeing action.

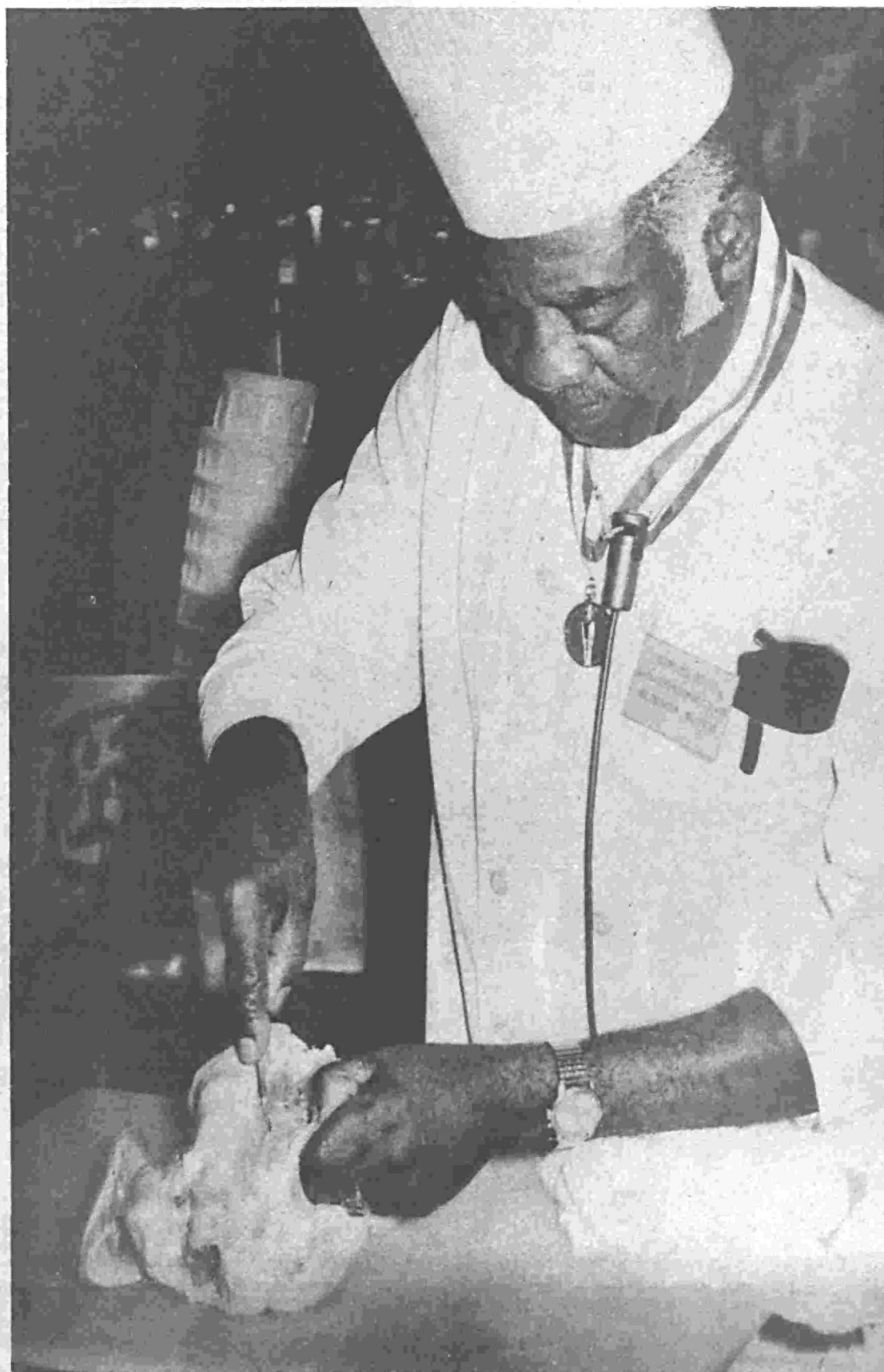

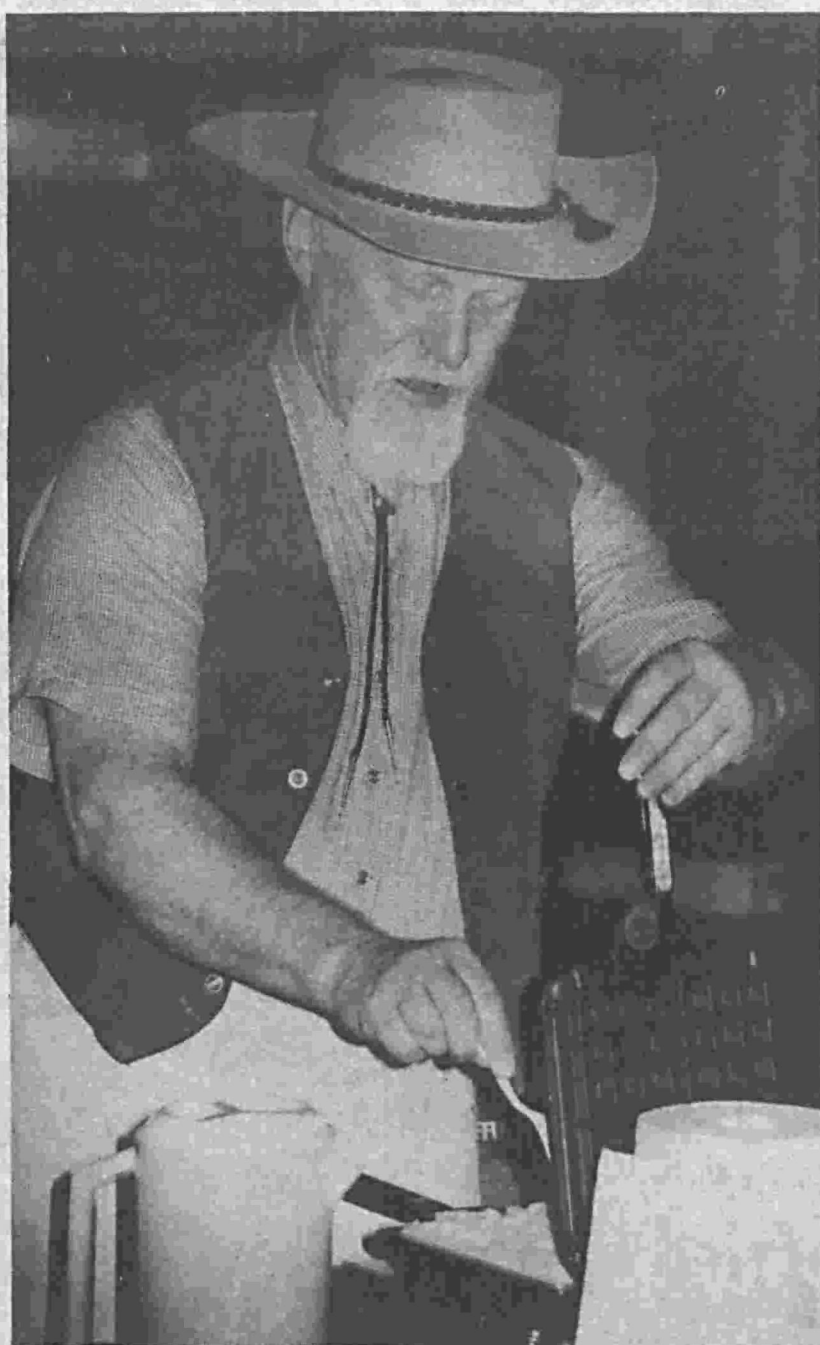

Dressed in a stiff white uniform and draped with gold medals, the chef, wearing the familiar tall hat, leans over his stove and prepares a succulent Chicken Cordon Bleu. Carefully he instructs his students on the special techniques needed for a perfect creation.

The students, however, aren't ordinary, they are shoppers at SeaTac Mall where a unique culinary arts show took place last weekend. The neophyte and advanced cook saw demonstrations and tasted samples created by professional experts.

Several of the chefs were students from the Seattle Central Community College Culinary Arts Program. Along with their director David Madayag, they created everything from vegetable roses to stuffed chicken

Hawaiian.

The recent winners of 73 gold medals and eight trophies in a Washington state culinary arts competition, the students displayed an intricate flamingo, Indian medallion and cartoon pictures made from various food materials.

Madayag observes more people are becoming interested in the food services and especially the culinary arts.

The creations on view were outgrowths of the program's six-quarter food program.

For another look at the state of the food's art, Kelly Gunderson of the Cafe Patisserie displayed desserts looking so delicious they just had to be sampled. The lavish bread-baskets, dainty petits fours required no persua-

sion, passers-by gladly stopped and tasted the wares.

Further proving decorations can look as good as they taste, the students from the Renton Vocational Technical Institute, designed colorful watermelon donkeys and cuddly panda bears for children's parties, said instructor Milo VanDecar.

During the show his students created edible decorations out of apples, oranges and grapefruit.

No culinary job would be completed without handy kitchen tools, and at the Panhandler exhibit, every gadget from tomato slicer to an electric food processor was demonstrated.

"Many cooks are getting back to the little gadgets," noted Gene Penix, who with his wife Lynn, manage the cookware store.

"Our grandmothers used all

these small tools, but later generations decided not to use them. However, they are becoming popular again."

From the wild west and the far north, "Sourdough" Jack Mabee introduced his true old-fashioned art of sourdough cookery to shoppers during the cooking show.

Mabee has traveled throughout the west and Alaska collecting sourdough recipes and then compiling them into a cookbook. These are the hungry-man favorites that fed the gold-miner, trapper, cowboy, as well as grandmother.

Other displays featured Poverty Bay Wine Co. demonstrating cheese and wine cookery, Johnny's Seafood preparing fish and the Specialty Spice Shop brewing teas.

Sebastian Pizza

Pizza brightens dull day

When stay-at-home weather marks a spring day...out come the cards and game boards, the dictionaries and rule books. Out, too...especially on a somber Sunday afternoon...is the formal menu. The word for the day is a snackin' supper...one that comes easily to the gaming table, and needs little in the way of serving dishes or utensils.

Borrowing ingredients from a King of Sandwiches, "The Sebastian," here's a whole new turn to the pizza. Blend curry, chutney and mayon-

naise with freshly grated cabbage and spread on yeast pizza dough. Sprinkle ham and Cheddar cheese evenly around the pie...and bake the Sebastian Pizza in a preheated 425-degree oven for 25 minutes.

Even the dough is prepared in half the time required for a typical pizza. The flour mixture is beaten only one minute, kneaded until smooth, allowed to rest for 20 minutes and then patted into the pan.

Sebastian
Pizza
1 1/2 cups flour

1 pkg dry yeast
1 tsp salt
1/2 cup hot water
1 tbslp oil
One-third cup mayonnaise
One-third cup mango curry, chopped
3 tbslps flour
1 tbslp curry powder
1 1/2 to 2 cups ham, cut in julienne strips
2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese
2 cups shredded cabbage

Stir together 1/2 cup flour, yeast and salt. Add hot water and oil to flour mixture; beat until smooth, about 1

minute. Stir in more flour to make a moderately stiff dough. Turn out onto lightly floured surface and knead until smooth and satiny, about 3 to 5 minutes. Cover dough with bowl and let rest 20 minutes. Stretch dough to fit into greased 12-inch pizza pan. Combine mayonnaise, chutney, 3 tablespoons flour and curry powder; fold in cabbage. Spread cabbage mixture evenly over dough. Sprinkle ham over cabbage. Top with Cheddar cheese. Bake in preheated 425-degree oven 25 minutes. 6 servings.

Fresh coconut makes a flavor difference

Coconut is a favorite flavor of many Americans, and flaked and grated coconut are familiar products on grocers' shelves. In these forms, coconut is convenient and tasty. But how about venturing into the do-it-yourself realm of freshness and flavor?

The nut-brown husk of the coconut may look formidable, but breaking into it is fairly simple...if you know how. First, pierce the eyes with a screwdriver or ice pick, then drain out the liquid through these holes. Heat the coconut in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 15 to 30 minutes. Tap all over with a hammer, then break open. Pry out meat and pare off dark skin.

To grate white meat, use grater or whirl in blender. When measuring pack lightly into cup. To toast, spread in shallow pan. bake in 350-degree oven for about 15 minutes until

light brown, stirring frequently.

Coconut
Puddin' Pie
2 tbslps soft butter
1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar
3 eggs, separated
1/2 cup evaporated milk, undiluted
One-eighth tsp salt
2 cups freshly grated coconut
Ground nutmeg
9-inch pie shell, baked
Cream butter and sugar. Add egg yolks, one at a time, and beat until mixture is very light and lemon-colored. Add vanilla and milk. Beat egg white until foamy. Add salt and beat until stiff but not dry. Fold into creamed mixture. Fold in 1 1/2 cups of the coconut. Pour into baked pie shell and sprinkle with nutmeg. Top with remaining grated coconut. Bake at 350 degrees for about 35 minutes, or until the filling is just set. Serve warm or cold. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Coconut-Crusted
Apple Dessert
6 large tart apples,

peeled, cored and sliced
1 cup brown sugar
1 1/2 tpsps cinnamon
1/2 tsp mace
About 1/2 cup flour
1/4 cup fresh orange juice
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup flaked fresh coconut

Heap apples in greased 8-inch round baking dish 2 inches deep. Mix 1/2 cup brown sugar, spices and 2 tablespoons flour; sprinkle over apples. Pour orange juice over all. For the topping, blend 1/2 cup brown sugar, the butter and one-third cup flour with a fork until crumbly. Stir in coconut. Spread over apples. Cover with foil. Bake in preheated 425-degree oven 20 minutes. Remove foil; bake about 15 minutes longer. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Coconut
Cookies
3/4 cup butter (or use part margarine)
1 cup firmly packed

dark brown sugar
1 egg
1 tsp vanilla
2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1/2 tsp baking powder
1/4 tsp salt
1 cup toasted grated coconut

Cream butter; gradually add sugar and beat until light and fluffy. Add egg and vanilla; beat well. Sift together dry ingredients; combine with coconut. Combine the two mixtures and knead until ingredients hold together. Shape into a ball and set in the refrigerator until firm, about 20 minutes. Roll small amount of dough on a floured board to a thickness of one-eighth inch. Cut with cookie cutters or cut into 2-inch rounds and bake on ungreased cookie sheets in preheated 350-degree oven for 10 to 15 minutes, or until edges are brown and cookies are done inside. Loosen with spatula immediately; let cool in pans. Makes about 5 dozen.

Chocolate Oatmeal Cookies

A variation on an old-time family favorite, softened with applesauce.

Chocolate
Oatmeal
Cookies
1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour
1 tsp baking powder
1/4 tsp salt
1/2 cup whole-wheat flour
1/4 cup wheat germ or soy flour or other special flour
3/4 cup rolled oats
1/2 cup semisweet chocolate pieces
1 egg, unbeaten
1 tablespoon ap-

plesauce
3/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
1/2 tsp vanilla

In large bowl sift together all-purpose flour, baking powder and salt. Add and mix in wheat flour, wheat germ, rolled oats and chocolate pieces. In separate bowl mix egg, applesauce, brown sugar, cooking oil and vanilla. Add liquid ingredients to dry ingredients and mix well. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto greased baking sheets. Bake in

preheated 350-degree oven until browned, about 18 minutes. Makes 3 dozen.

Fudge Pudding

When baked, the chocolate sauce in this Fudge Batter Pudding is on the bottom and the cake portion is on the top. Whipped cream or heavy cream go well with this pudding if it is served cold, because the chocolate sauce becomes quite thick.

Fudge Batter Pudding
2 tblsps melted butter or margarine
1 cup sugar
1 tsp vanilla
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
8 tblsps cocoa
3/4 tsp salt
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup chopped nuts (optional)

One and two-thirds cups boiling water
Mix butter, 1/2 cup sugar and vanilla together. Fry in oven 25 minutes, then turn and fry 25 minutes longer, until chicken is tender. Remove from pan immediately. Makes 4 servings.

Cookies for the kiddies

There is no one much more happy than a child with a cookie "for each hand." unless its a grown-up with a couple of cookies to go with coffee or tea. And then you might add the youngster who finds fresh home-baked cookies in his lunch box, or the husband who finds them in his brown bag.

Coconut Orange Squares

 Two-thirds cup sifted all-purpose flour
 ½ tsp each baking powder and salt

Cream butter and sugar until light. Beat in egg, orange rind and milk. Add coconut and flour sifted with baking powder and salt. Mix very quickly and only enough to blend. Put in pan (8 x 8 x 2 inches) lined with wax paper then greased. Bake in 350-degree oven for about 25 minutes. Cut into 16 squares.

 ½ cup soft butter
 1 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar
 2 eggs
 2 cups sifted cake flour
 1 tsp baking powder
 ½ tsp salt
 1 tsp cinnamon
 ¼ tsp each cloves and nutmeg
 2 cups raisins, chopped

½ cup chopped nuts
 Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs, one at a time, beating until light after each addition. Add sifted dry ingredients, raisins and nuts; mix well. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto greased cookie sheets; bake in preheated 350-degree oven for about 10 minutes. Makes about 4 dozen.

Brown Sugar Nut Mounds
 1 cup soft butter or margarine
 1 ½ cups firmly packed light brown sugar
 1 egg
 4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
 ½ tsp each salt and baking soda
 2 tps cinnamon
 ½ cup dairy sour cream
 Pecan halves

Cream butter and sugar and add egg, beating until light. Add sifted dry ingredients and sour cream; mix well. Shape into balls the size of a small walnut. Put on ungreased cookie sheets and press a pecan into center of each. Bake in preheated 400-degree oven for 10 to 12 minutes. Makes about 7 dozen.

What's Cookin' in Ruth's Kitchen

I've always loved an anecdote which was told to me by my first boss, the late Bernice Redington who was Prudence Penny of the Seattle Post Intelligencer.

"She boarded the elevator to go home and was visiting with a woman who had just attended our afternoon cooking school.

"That souffle we made won't be any good if it stays here all weekend. I think I'll go back and get it," she said. "It sounds silly, but I guess it's just my Scotch instincts."

"Oh, and what part of Scotland do they come from?" the lady inquired in a thick Scottish accent.

My mother was Scotch-Irish, which I guess gives me one quarter Scottish ancestry, but my instincts are definitely Scotch, especially when it comes to grocery shopping. This is the result of a less than affluent childhood and the great depression which plagued my youth.

The policy of the Jurich household is to never skimp on groceries. If we cut corners, it's not on food, but I want to make dog-goned sure I'm getting my money's worth.

A WALK DOWN the meat counter of a supermarket is enough to plunge one into shock, especially if you're looking at beef prices, but there are still ways to feed your family well without going vegetarian.

Pork, turkey, chicken and game hens are relatively inexpensive, and if you intersperse occasional beans and other legumes with fish and a little beef, you can do pretty well.

There's no finer Sunday dinner main dish than a roast pork loin or shoulder roast with browned potatoes, and if you shop like I do you'll watch for specials and pick the leanest one in the case.

Roast it in an open, shallow pan at 300 degrees, using a meat thermometer, and you can't go wrong. Put halves of potato under or around the roast when you figure it's about half done.

Baked country spareribs will be crusty brown on the outside and juicy on the inside if spread out in a shallow pan and baked an hour and a half at 325 degrees. Salt and pepper are enough seasoning for most people, but if you want more, rub the meat lightly with a barbecue sauce or juice from sweet pickle relish before you put them in the oven.

SWEET AND SOUR spareribs are among the most popular of all pork dishes, and I was lucky enough to unearth a recipe from my inimitable filing system. It's one that I published several years ago after watching its preparation and sampling some in an Oriental cooking class one evening at Federal Way High School.

The class was conducted by Mrs. Phyllis Kriese and was understandably very popular. The food was great, and she had a charming manner of doing a demonstration.

I've changed the format slightly to suit our style, but basically, here's her recipe:

Spareribs
3 pounds spareribs or less
2 tablespoons oil
1 clove garlic
Dash of salt
Have the meat cutter cut the ribs across

in one to one and a half inch strips. Put ribs in boiling, salted water, and cook until tender, approximately 20 minutes. Rinse in cold water, and pat dry. Cut in pieces, and

save the broth.
Fry minced garlic on oil, and push aside. Brown ribs lightly in oil, but don't fry crisp. Sprinkle with salt. Make sauce, pour it over spareribs, and simmer slowly 15 to 20 minutes.

Sauce
Three-fourths cup brown sugar
One-third cup cider vinegar (you may use half pineapple juice)
Two-thirds cup water or broth
3 tablespoons corn-

starch
3 tablespoons shoyu sauce

Mix all ingredients, and cook over low heat, stirring until thickened.

FOR A COMPLETE MEAL Mrs. Kriese suggested adding any of the following: Cauliflower, green pepper, celery, dry onion, preferably Bermuda, chunks of pineapple and thinly sliced cucumber or white radish.

Parboil vegetables,

and add to spareribs just to warm through immediately before serving.

If you have leftover roast pork that hasn't been nibbled cold with horseradish mustard or heated with sauerkraut, you might want to heat chunks of it in sweet and sour sauce and serve with steamed rice.

Back to the matter of keeping the food budget in balance - I think one of the most important things is to

take a few minutes to study the ads and make a shopping list.

Most of us have a few stores within easy shopping radius and usually start with the one that offers the best specials on our favorite items.

There are some fine stores in the vicinity that I seldom shop simply because they're on the wrong side of the highway for me. But I still glance over their ads to make sure I'm not missing out on

anything and to get a comparison of prices with the ones I may patronize.

When shopping, stick to the list but not too rigidly. If you can afford it pick off the specials that you don't happen to notice before. Keep a note pad on the kitchen counter to jot down staples as you notice your supply is running low. That will save extra trips to the store.

I've been getting phone calls from women who wanted to

express an opinion what to do when Pop pops in with a friend to stay for dinner.

One woman asked, "What do you do if he pulls this after you have dinner all ready?"

Frankly I don't know. Probably the same thing as you'd do when a couple gets their dates mixed and shows up for dinner the evening before they were supposed to. You just smile and make the best of it.

Molded salad makes the meal

Gelatin salads have a reputation for complementing the simplest meal. The secret of successful salad making is combining ingredients with contrasts in color, texture, form and flavor. This Fruit and Nut Ring succeeds on all scores of pleasing combinations.

Select lemon, lime, orange or orange-pineapple flavor

gelatin as the base to gelatin a riot of ingredients: chopped pecans, diced apple and grapefruit sections and sliced ripe olives. Place a small bowl of mayonnaise in the center of the unmolded fruited gelatin ring. Serve with a platter of cold meat or with chicken salad.

Fruit and Nut Ring

1 pkg. (3 oz.) lemon, lime, orange or orange-pineapple flavor gelatin

1 tsp salt
1 cup boiling water
¼ cup cold water
2 tps lemon juice
1 grapefruit, sectioned, drained and diced
1 medium apple, peeled and diced

2 tbsps coarsely chopped pecans
3 to 4 tbsps ripe olive slices

Dissolve gelatin and slat in boiling water. Add cool water and lemon juice. Chill until thickened. Forld in grapefruit, apple, nuts, and olives. Spoon into 4-cup ring mold. Chill until firm, at least 4 hours. Unmold. Serve with mayonnaise, if desired. Makes 3 ¼ cups or 6 servings.

Savory dishes from cream of onion soup

There's nothing new about the onion. The fact is that onions have been flavoring foods for 4500 years, since the time of the Pharoahs. Pyramid inscriptions indicate that the staple foods of the workers were chiefly radishes, garlic and onions. Now in the 20th cen-

tury the onion has been creamed and made into a delightful condensed cream of onion soup. You'll find that the new soup is delicious when prepared with part milk and part water. But don't stop there. Try cream of onion soup as the gravy-maker in the Pork Loin

Platter. Just blend the soup with meat drippings, mustard, chopped apples and thyme. Cook Brussels Sprouts right along with the pork and gravy for a uniquely delicious combination.

For a super sauce, heat the soup with blue cheese, sour cream, Worcestershire and milk. Don't let the simplicity fool you. Danish Onion Sauce does wonders for sauteed mushrooms, hamburgers and broccoli.

And for those of you who like to "dress up" soup for a dinner party, try this next creation. Inspired by the cuisine of India, where shrimp and curry are a natural duo, Shrimp-Onion Bisque, combines the two with the rich flavor of the soup.

Pork Loin Platter

4-lb pork loin rib roast
Salt
Pepper
1 cans (10 ½ ozs each) condensed cream of onion soup
½ cup water
2 pkgs (about 10 ozs each) frozen Brussels Sprouts, partially thawed
1 cup chopped apples
1 tbsps Dijon mustard
½ tsp thyme leaves, crushed

In roasting pan, place meat fat-side up; season with salt and pepper. Roast at 325 degrees for 2 hours. Pour off all but 2 tablespoons drippings. In bowl, combine remaining ingredients; stir into drippings. Cover; roast 50 minutes more or until meat and vegetables are done (total roasting time 40 minutes per pound or 170 degrees on meat thermometer.) Remove meat and vegetables to serving platter; In top of range, in roasting pan, heat sauce, stirring to loosen browned bits (thin to desired consistency with additional water.) Serve with meat. Garnish with apple wedges if desired. Makes 6 servings.

Danish Onion Sauce

1 can (10 ½ ozs) condensed cream of onion soup
¼ cup milk
One-third cup sour cream
1 tbsps crumbled blue cheese
½ tsp worcestershire
In saucepan, combine ingredients. Heat; stir occasionally. Serve over hamburgers, sauteed mushrooms, broccoli or cauliflower. Makes about 2 cups.

Shrimp Onion Bisque

1 cup cleaned raw shrimp, cut up
¼ cup green pepper squares
1 med clove garlic, minced
½ tsp curry powder
2 tbsps butter or margarine
1 can (10 ½ ozs) condensed cream of onion soup
1 soup can milk
In saucepan, cook shrimp and green pepper with garlic and curry in butter until done. Blend in soup and milk. Heat; stir occasionally. Makes about 3 ½ cups.

And by heating the milk in the mug or soup bowl there's no messy pan to deal with. A stick of butter can be softened in just 15 seconds at high power and melted in a minute or so.

Pasta With

Crab Sauce
 1/4 cup butter
 6 tbsps flour
 2 cups milk
 3/4 tsp basil, crumbled
 1/2 tsp salt
 1 small garlic, minced
 One-third cup dry white wine
 1 can (6 1/2 ozs) crab meat, drained
 4 servings hot cooked spaghetti

Combine butter and flour in 1-quart glass measure. Cook, uncovered, with full power in microwave oven 1 minute. Stir in milk, oregano, basil, salt and garlic. Cook with full power 6 minutes, stirring twice with wire whip. Mix in wine. Gently mix in all but a few pieces of crab. Cook 30

seconds longer or until heated through. Spoon over pasta. Shred reserved crab and sprinkle over top. Sprinkle with minced parsley, if desired. Makes 4 servings (3 cups sauce.)

CONVENTIONAL METHOD: Melt butter. Stir in 5 tablespoons flour. Stir in milk and cook, stirring over medium high heat, until sauce thickens and comes to a boil. Stir in oregano, basil, salt, garlic, wine and all but a few red pieces of crab. Heat through. Spoon over pasta. Shred reserved crab and sprinkle over top. Sprinkle with minced parsley, if desired.

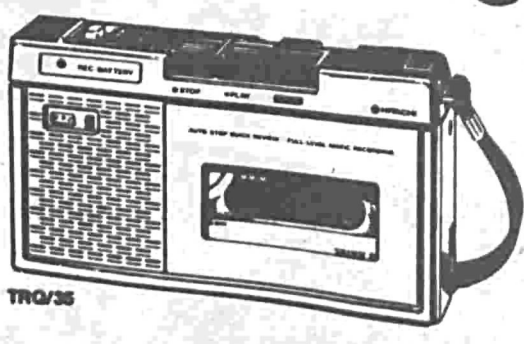

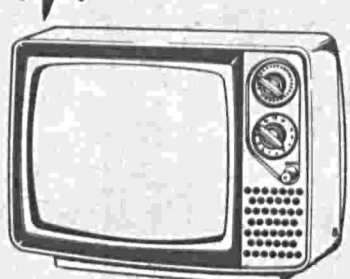

Meatballs Napoli

Rice beats beef budget blues

Choices at the meat counter these days are different than they used to be. It's no longer, "Which cut is most economical?" but "What can I do with expensive meat to stay within my budget?"

There's a package that's probably on your kitchen shelf right now that can help with this dilemma...and it contains rice. Surveys have shown that rice is already in the kitchens of more than 80 percent of the households. Don't just look at it every time you open the cabinet door...use it.

Rice only costs about three cents per half cup serving. Add it to the dishes containing your family's favorite cut of beef and you'll find that the meat will easily serve another person or two. That's one of the very special attributes of rice...stretching your budget.

Try these recipes and see.

Beef Salad Provencale
3 cups cooked beef roast, cut in thin strips
2 eggs, beaten
1 can (10 3/4 oz) condensed cream of chicken soup
1/2 cup sour cream
1 tsp salt
1/4 tsp pepper
1 cup grated cheese

Cook squash and onions in salted water about 5 minutes. Drain well. Cook green pepper and meat until meat is no longer pink. Stir in rice. Blend eggs, soup, sour cream and seasonings. Stir into meat mixture. Fold in squash mixture. Turn into a greased shallow 2-quart casserole. Top

1 1/2 lbs boneless beef chuck, cut into 1-inch cubes
2 tbsps vegetable oil
1 cup chopped onions
2 cloves garlic, minced
3 cups cooked rice
1 1/2 cups sliced celery
1 cup sliced green onions with tops
1/2 cup each mayonnaise and sour cream
1/2 tsp seasoned pepper
1 tsp each prepared horseradish, prepared mustard and salt
2 large tomatoes, cut into eighths
Cucumber slices

Combine roast beef, rice, celery and onions. Blend remaining ingredients except tomatoes and cucumbers. Stir into rice mixture. Chill. Arrange on salad greens, if desired, and garnish with tomato wedges and cucumber slices. Makes 6 servings.

Super Beef and Squash Casserole
1 lb fresh yellow or zucchini squash, sliced
1 cup each chopped onions and green peppers
1 lb lean ground beef
3 cups cooked rice
1/2 cup burgundy wine
3 beef bouillon cubes
1 tbsps worcestershire sauce
1 1/2 cups water
1 1/2 cups each diagonally sliced carrots and celery
2 tbsps cornstarch
1 tsp salt
1/4 tsp pepper
1 can (17 oz) fruits for salads
3 cups hot cooked rice

Drain fruits and reserve 1 cup syrup. In a Dutch oven, brown meat on all sides in hot oil. Add onions, garlic, wine, bouillon cubes, worcestershire sauce and water. Cover; simmer 40 minutes or until meat is almost tender. Stir in vegetables. Replace cover and continue cooking 20 minutes longer. Blend cornstarch, salt and pepper with reserved syrup. Add to meat mixture. Cook, stirring, until clear and thickened about 2 minutes. Gently mix in fruit. Serve over beds of fluffy rice. Makes 6 servings.

Meat Balls Napoli
1 lb lean ground beef
1 cup soft bread crumbs
One-third cup each finely chopped onion and celery
1 egg
1 tbsps garlic salt
1/4 tsp pepper
1 tsp Italian seasonings
1 tbsps worcestershire sauce
1 jar (15 1/2 oz) spaghetti sauce
1 tbsps cornstarch
1 cup beef broth
1 can (16 oz) cut green beans, drained
3 cups hot cooked rice
Parmesan cheese (optional)

Combine beef, bread crumbs, onion, celery, egg, seasonings and 3 tablespoons spaghetti sauce; mix thoroughly. Form into 12 meat balls. 1/4 cup each. Place in a greased shallow baking pan. 
