State to decide fate of playground equipment

Replacement of the recently-removed playground equipment from Saltwater State Park is teetering on which budget version the state legislature will adopt.

While that legislature sits in stalemate in Olympia, complaints are being received by the State Parks and Recreation Commission and by Saltwater State Park operators that there no longer are slides, swings or teeter totters on which the youngsters visiting the park may play. Dan Beckwith, owner

of the park's concession stand, said he alone receives an average four to five complaints a day since the last of the equipment was removed in April.

The equipment was removed from the park throughout the past year, with the remaining two swings being put into storage last month. Don Malley, park manager, said he was forced to remove the equipment when he no longer could maintain it. The equipment was second hand when the park received it, he explained, and the pieces were getting too old to ensure safety.

Some of those who have complained about the removals are maintaining that there are still some good years left in the equipment, but Malley disagrees.

HE SAID THAT although an injury lawsuit pending against the state and incurred on playground equipment at Saltwater State Park was not the catalyst for removing the equipment, it is an indication of what can happen on faulty equipment. In that instance, a young girl was injured last year when a swing broke, a casualty that resulted in a \$1,500 lawsuit against the state.

So the equipment sits in storage at the park. Only the stagecoach is still visible, tipped on its side in the manager's yard, and it appears there will be no new equipment unless funded by the state.

Responding to complaints about the missing equipment, Rep. Eric Rohrbach, R-33rd District, this session asked the state for \$20,000 to install new log-type climbing toys. The House has since included the funds in its budget, the Senate pulled those funds out and neither budget has passed.

"Right now there's no chance if the Senate doesn't negotiate the budget," Rohrbach said Monday. "If we're (House members) forced to take the Senate budget, the equipment won't be funded."

BUT WAS THE funding necessary if, as some maintain, the old equipment was still good? "I questioned the need for the removal of the last swingset," Rohrbach said, "but by then that was all that was left. The question really then became how we could get more equipment."

Malley stresses the equipment is not repairable. "We're just going to have to wait to see if we get the money from the state," he said.

Jury acquits Palzer

A 48-year old local businessman has been found not guilty of the second-degree rape of a Midway woman, 18.

A King county Superior Court jury of six men and six women deliberated fewer than six hours Friday evening before deciding that Chris Palzer should be acquitted of the rape and unlawful imprisonment charges. Palzer had been accused of the May 7 rape of the woman in his motor home while it was parked at the Sea Tac Mall.

In testimony during the week-long trial before Judge James Dore, Palzer had maintained his innocence. He said the woman was in the motor home of her own accord but they had no sexual contact. According to Palzer, nude pictures taken of the woman were taken at her request.

The woman contended in her statements before the jury that Palzer offered to get her a job at the Steak Factory restaurant, in which he owns stock. After taking

her to the restaurant, she claimed, Palzer returned the motor home to the Sea Tac Mall where they parked and shared drinks and cocaine.

Later he raped her and forced her to pose for embarrassing pictures, the teenager said.

Palzer's defense attorney, Phil Mahoney, was successful in convincing the court panel that there was insufficient evidence to convict his client. Lab tests, he noted, did not even prove that a rape had occurred.

City committee winds up petition form distribution

Distribution of petitions calling for the conversion of unincorporated Federal Way into an incorporated city has been completed, City Committee Information Chairman Ross Davis said Monday.

Davis said that some 1,600 petitions, each of which contains spaces for 19 signatures, have been mailed or handed out to individuals, civic organizations, churches and local businesses.

"Now that we've distributed the petitions we'll start counting signatures," Davis said, "and we'll start releasing a count of the signatures next week."

He said that he didn't know how many persons have signed the petition sheets already, but added

that the total is well over 1,000.

"We haven't had a chance to really start counting," he said, "but we have about 30 persons out doorbelling and we mailed out copies to all the members of the (Federal Way) Chamber of Commerce today."

CITYHOOD advocates hope to obtain about 3,000 signatures within the next two weeks, so that the process of holding public hearings on the proposal can be started as soon as possible.

The group needs about 2,500 signatures--that figure represents ten percent of the local voters who participated in the last general election--to initiate the hearings.

Unfortunately the city committee has not been able to determine the exact number of

signatures necessary because King County records-keeping methods don't permit an exact count.

The difficulty, Davis explained last week, results from the fact that the proposed city limits cut through some election precincts, making a precise count impossible.

So the group has elected to aim for an initial total that is higher than the estimator, so that the number of signatures is sure to be adequate.

The hearings will be held by the King County Boundary Review Board, an official agency that has the power to reshape the proposed city limits but cannot otherwise change the incorporation measure.

CALLING FOR creation of a city of 59,300 persons, the proposal would establish a manager-council form of government and would name the new municipality Federal Way.

The boundaries of the area under consideration are Puget Sound on the west and the Pierce County line on the South. The northern boundary runs along South 255th Street to the Kent city limits. The eastern boundary follows the limits of Kent, Auburn and other valley cities.

Residents will be invited to testify at the review board hearings on whether or not they want to be included in the proposed city.

Thus far the only opposition has come from a handful of residents at Redondo Beach, who say they fear higher taxes and who have accused incorporation advocates of reasoning from an inadequate data base.

City committee spokespersons have said that they tacitly welcome Redondo's potential withdrawal, answering that if Redondo became part of the proposed city, it would receive an unfairly large share of benefits.

The reason for this, incorporation advocates say, is that Redondo needs substantial improvements, that residents are currently unwilling or unable to finance, to its road and water systems.

Carving rip-off stirs neighbors to action

When Carl Boe left for work last week, he automatically glanced toward the Puget Sound Hills sign he'd recently carved at the entrance to the housing development at 4th Ave. S. and Dash Point Road.

It was gone. Evidently taken by vandals, the seven by two foot Alaskan cedar sign had been unbolted from the brick wall and removed.

"We're just sick about it," said his daughter, Karen, a 20-year-old who works for South Tacoma Motors. "We've been getting calls from neighbors and even people we don't know who are wondering what happened to it."

Boe, who put 50 hours of labor into the sign, carved it as a memorial to Scott Kingrey, a cadet on leave from the Coast Guard Academy in New London, Conn. Scott was visiting Boe's home as his son's guest when he was killed in an automobile accident at that same corner last July.

In an effort to get the sign back, a handful of neighbors are doorbelling the community to solicit funds. Spearheaded by Vicki Humphrey, a resident for the past three years, they've so far gathered \$400 and have yet to contact everyone. "We expect to get somewhere between \$400 and \$600," she said.

Surprised at the results, Vicki said people have been eager to contribute toward a reward. "Everybody I talked to said that they thought he'd taken it home to oil it. When they found it was taken, they were really upset about it." People contributed between \$5 and \$25 each with an average of \$10 per family.

Suspecting that the vandalism could have been by youngsters living near by, several neighbors searched the woods that borders the community's east side.

Pat McDonald, a Federal Way resident for nine years said she searched the gully as a likely dumping spot but found nothing. "I just hope they haven't cut it up or mutilated it in anyway," she said.

Though the police were called immediately, they said there wasn't enough evidence to warrant an investigation.

Searching for possible clues, Karen said she'd seen a car parked nearby the day before. As a precaution, she'd taken their driver's license number. "It's a long shot, but they could have been scouting out the sign."

Hoping to find some news that will lead to recovery of the sign, they are going to post the reward in local businesses and offices plus put an announce-

ment in the junior high and high schools. "I just hope somebody calls," said Vicki.

Ironically, Boe and his wife recently left for son Mark's graduation from the academy. They do not intend to tell him about the missing sign, said Karen.

"He's going to be so disappointed. He's seen pictures and that's all," she said. Mark and his fiancée will be visiting his parents in two weeks.

Ready with the reward that will be given to anyone with information leading to the direct recovery of the sign, Vicki said, "If someone feels bad and wants to return it, they can just leave it on the ground where we can find it."

Fountain Isle condo given OK

After several delays, the King County Council has approved a planned townhouse complex in the Meredith Hill area but has left the density of the site at the discretion of the developer.

The existing zoning would permit the development of Fountain Isle Lake at between one and two units per acre on the 17.47 acre site. The Federal Way Community Plan revision committee has recommended the area for between three and nine units per acre zoning. No date has been set by the county council to consider those revision suggestions to the area growth guideline.

The developers, Qualico Homes of Federal Way, can now make

the choice of developing at a lower density now or waiting until the council completes work on the revision suggestions and coming close to the originally proposed density of 12 units.

Ed Heavey, attorney for the applicants, said Monday the developer will wait for the outcome of the revision.

Residents of the area near the site at 51st Avenue South between South 301st and South 304th Streets opposed the condominium proposal because it would further change the low density character of the neighborhood and create specific problems with drainage, traffic, police protection and school overcrowding.

Storing gas? Be careful

So you're going to beat the gas shortage by filling several cans with gas and storing them in your trunk, garage, basement or the guest room?

Don't do it. You could be first, violating the law, and more important, placing yourself and others in extreme danger.

The vapor from one gallon of gasoline is estimated to have the explosive force of 40 pounds of TNT. Gasoline is continually giving off explosive vapors that could be

ignited by sparks or flame from heaters, electrical appliances or cigarettes.

If you have gas stored in the trunk of your car, you may be driving a bomb. The trunk affords little air circulation and gets hotter than the driving compartment. Escaping vapors can explode without warning when touched off by the electrical system.

If you happen to get rear-ended with a trunk load of full gas cans, say goodbye.

Actually, the law prohibits transportation of more than 10

gallons in approved metal containers by private vehicles. (The King County Fire Marshal's Office can issue a permit for transporting more than 10 gallons.)

An approved metal gasoline container is:

- a one-gallon metal can with screw-type lid and clearly marked as to contents.

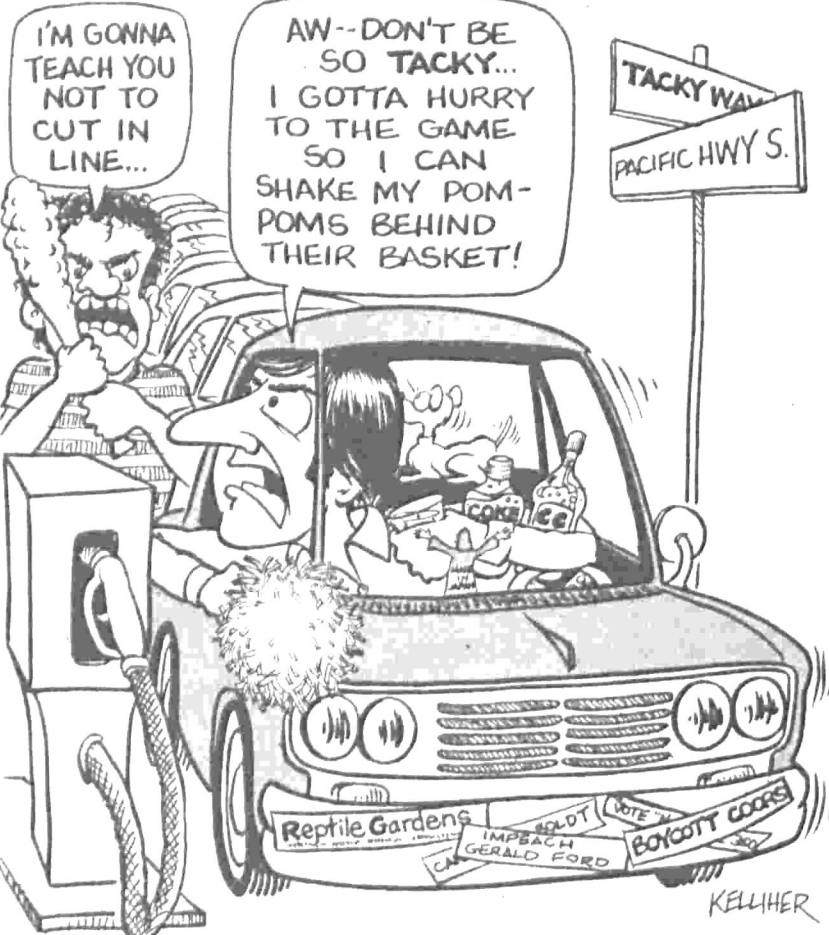
- a five-gallon (maximum) safety can, clearly marked as to contents, having a spring-closing lid and spout cover and designed so it will safely release internal

pressure when subjected to fire.

- a five-gallon "Jerry" can.

The law forbids storage of more than one gallon of gas in houses and attached structures. Up to five gallons can be legally stored in detached garages, storage sheds, etc. Cans storing more than five gallons must be kept outside of any building or structure.

If you feel storing gas is the best way to fight the gas crunch, do it safely and legally. The consequences could be far more serious than having a car with an empty tank.



Commissioner brings new hope to WD56

When chairman of Water District 56 Board of Commissioners Fred Thompson last week nominated Scott Thomasson to fill the seat recently vacated by Marion Gable, we wondered whether it was just another attempt to cause confusion in the district. Thompson?

Thomasson? A closer look at the new commissioner, however, reveals that even at age 24 Thomasson is no freshman in

the water business and in fact may bring to the district hope for upgrading the system that has inadequately served its customers for several years.

Thomasson, who designs water system as a professional, ran for a position on district 56's three-man board two years ago. He lost to Commissioner Richard McColley but, convinced that he had some expertise to offer the district, he planned to

run for the board again this fall. Thomasson is a firm believer that district 56's system is insufficient to afford fire protection and, just as he advocated two years ago, wants to see the antiquated system upgraded.

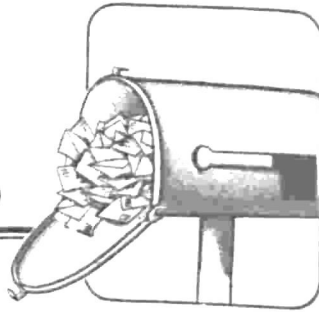
Aware that there is some opposition from customers who do not want to pay for an improved system in the district, Thomasson said last week that there is no straight path toward attaining his

goal. First, he said, The people must be made aware that a piece of pipe in the ground won't last forever and sometimes has to be replaced. Once accomplished, the upgrade will be much easier, Thomasson said.

We agree. We also believe it will take an enthusiastic, learned and experienced person to make the district aware of its problem. Thomasson is just that person.

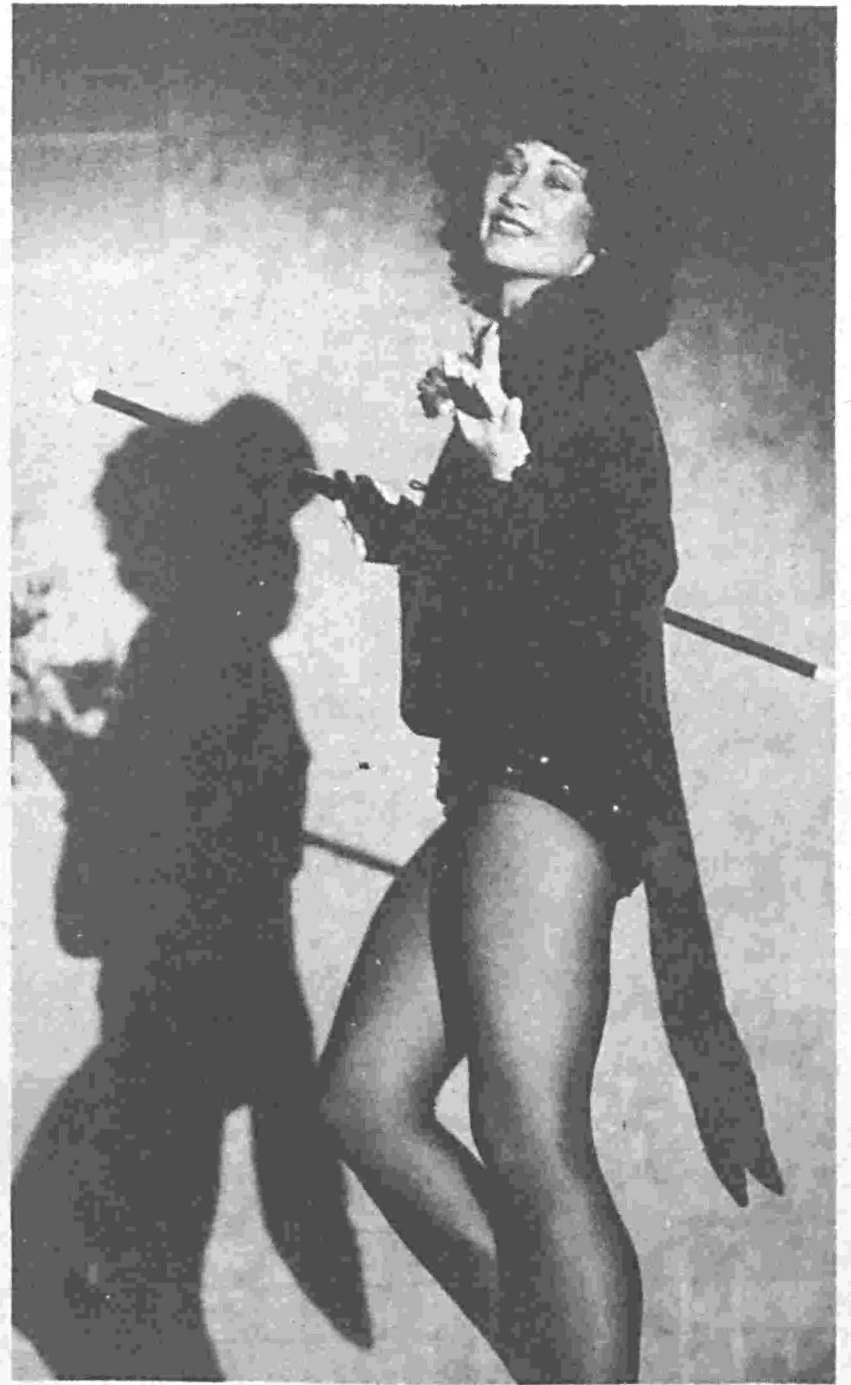

The second-runner up award and a \$300 scholarship was presented to Debye Minkler. The Chamber of Commerce crowd, who had sponsored her, went

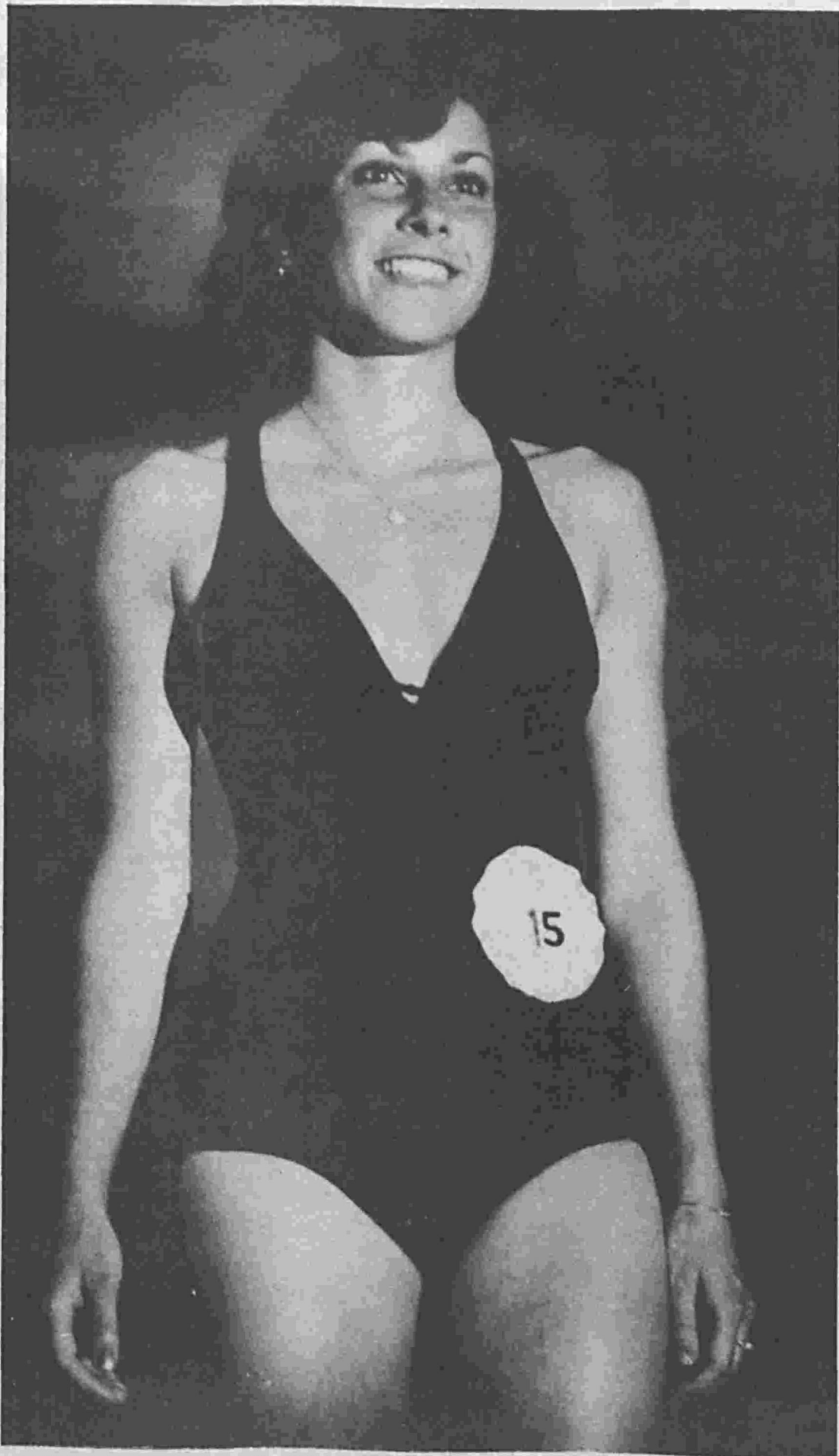
wild.

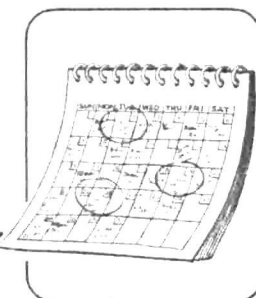

\$50 Million asked for Ag bond issue

A \$50 million bond issue to finance the preservation of farm lands in King County has been recommended for the Sept. 18 ballot by the Farmlands Study Committee appointed by the county executive after a similar bond issue failed in the general election last November.

The money would be used, if the county council votes to put the measure on the ballot and it is successful, to acquire the development rights of between 12,000 and 15,000 acres of farm land in the county during a six year period.

The annual cost to the taxpayers over the thirty year life of the bonds would be about \$9 on a home assessed at \$50,000.

Among the first priority lands is a parcel east of Star Lake in the Lake Fenwick area. It is about one mile wide and slightly more than two miles long. Most of the rest of the recommended properties lie in the Green, Snoqualmie and Sammamish River valleys and the Enumclaw Plateau.

The purchase program, if approved by the voters, would be on a voluntary basis, the committee stressed. The development rights to the land would be bought by the county and, though the land owner could sell the property, the land could never be used for anything but agriculture in the future without an approving vote of the people of King County.

Members of the committee told the council Monday the effort is needed because farmland is rapidly disappearing in the county. In the Green River Valley alone, more than 20,000 acres of agriculture land has disappeared in the past 25 years.

One of the reasons the land is being sold to developers, according to a committee report, is that farming is not profitable and "no rational person will risk his money to purchase a business which will operate at a loss."

The purchase of development rights would be the difference between profit and loss for dairy farmers, the report concluded.

Crime report:

Police bust eight on various charges

King County Police arrested eight persons, seven of them teenagers and all but two from Federal Way, on a variety of charges between Thursday and Sunday, 3rd Precinct records showed Monday.

None of the suspects were jailed, but all of them were cited into the Federal Way District of King County Justice Court.

Two arrests resulted from a teenage drinking spree. Officer John W. Blake, off duty at the time, was shopping at an all-night market on South 312th Street when he spotted a boy stealing a half case of beer from the cooler.

The thief fled into nearby woods, and Blake jumped into his own automobile in an attempt to head the boy off on the other side of the area. There he spotted the suspect as he climbed into a waiting car.

Blake followed the two, and when they stopped nearby he identified himself as a police officer and held both of them. The boys, one 18 and the other 17, were cited on charges of illegal consumption and possession of alcohol, and the theft suspect was also charged with shoplifting. The incident occurred Sunday at about 7 p.m.

TWO OTHER teens were cited on vandalism charges following an accident in the parking lot of a South 320th Street shopping center, where a shopping cart being towed by a speeding automobile was released to crash into the side of a parked car.

While one boy drove, the other reached out the window, grabbed the cart and held onto it until the automobile built up speed.

The suspects, one 17 and the other 18, are said to have repeated the stunt several times before the parked car was struck. The damage to the car, which is owned by a 24-year-old Federal Way woman, amounted to about \$200.

Several witnesses noted the license number of the suspects' vehicle, and the two were apprehended, charged and released shortly afterwards.

A 29-YEAR-OLD woman was cited on a charge of reckless endangerment after 3-year-old child was found playing with a loaded .22-caliber automatic pistol near a 21st Avenue South residence on Friday.

Police reports indicate the child got the small handgun from the woman's pocket book.

An 18-year-old was charged with creating a disturbance on Sunday afternoon after several persons in the vicinity of South 312th Street and Fifth Avenue South reported excessively loud rock and roll music coming from a parked car.

The investigating officer found that the youth had set up two speakers outside his vehicle.

Two girls, both 16, were cited on shoplifting charges after an incident involving two blouses taken from a SeaTac Mall department store. The girls, both of them Sequim residents, were tur-

ned over to the mother of one of them.

Money amounting to \$140 was stolen from the cash box at the Federal Way Boys' and Girls' Club Saturday during a botan twirling contest. The money was

being used to make change to persons who were paying entry fees.

The theft occurred while a girl who was in charge of the cashbox had been momentarily called away. Police said that while there were a number of young

persons in the area, all of them claimed to have seen nothing.

VANDALS SMASHED tow windows at Lake Dolloff Elementary School on South 308th Street Sunday, doing some \$40 in damage.

A few thefts and burglaries

were reported during the period, but the loss in each of the incidents was less than \$500.

Grass Roots Gardening

by Ginna Koontz



Of all the flowering evergreen shrubs grown in this area the magic charisma of the rhododendron reigns. Rhododendrons can be planted anytime in spring, even when in full flower. August through September is an ideal time to plant or transplant them also.

Avoid planting rhodies in windswept areas, too close to a cement foundation or under trees which create dense shade or have shallow aggressive root systems that could deprive the rhodies of adequate nourishment and water.

If drainage and soil aeration are poor, consider planting in raised beds retained by logs, bricks, large stones or planks.

The top of the root ball should never be lower than the soil surface. Mix at least 50 percent peat moss with soil when planting. Rhodies also prefer a humusy soil. My lazy gardener's formula; soil from planting hole, equal amounts of commercial bagged manure, peat moss and sand. Mix well before using to plant or replant rhodies.

Dig hole slightly larger than plant root ball. In container-grown plants are root bound gently cut roots loose before planting. Remove burlap or other tying materials from balled roots.

Pack soil lightly into hole around, under and over roots and water well. Newly planted rhodies must be kept uniformly moist during the first two years but do not over water! We have had great success spreading gypsum over the soil under plants and very lightly scratching in. This, over a period of several years, turns sticky clay soil into workable, friable soil allowing water and plant food to move into the soil and improves drainage. The gypsum does not change the pH (acidity or alkalinity) of the soil.

A light application of acid-type fertilizer can be sprinkled on soil if desired, then mulch with bark, two to three inches deep. Never cultivate under shallow rooted rhodies. Hand pull weeds and use Casaron herbicide according to label directions to control weeds.

Every rhodie expert has a sure-fire fertilizer time-table schedule, each different! Remember, rhododendrons are not heavy feeders. One teaspoon fertilizer for each two foot of plant width is adequate. We apply rhodie fertilizer in early March and water well. This allows time for fertilizer to be taken up and utilized when needed most; immediately after blooming when putting out new foliage and setting buds for the next year's blooms.

Chlorosis is signaled by yellowing between leaf veins. This is usually caused by the loss of soil acidity. Iron sulphate applied one pound to one hundred square feet will change acidity from pH 6.5 to pH 5.5 that rhodies demand.

Some rhodie growers are expounding using lime on rhodies in this area. Never attempt to alter pH or any other soil factor without first having a soil test run.

True, most soils in this area may be a bit too acid, even for rhodies, but how do you know if the soils are not analyzed? I repeat, do not use lime on rhodies without a soil test!

Rhodies seldom require pruning. If needed to control rangy varieties, during or immediately after blooming is the best time. Cut back to a whorl of leaves. If pruning is delayed until fall the plant will not suffer but next year's bloom buds will be lost.

Strawberry root

I'd like to suggest my favorites, some older varieties, some new, but all or any of these regal aristocrats would delight each Mother who reigns on Mother's Day.

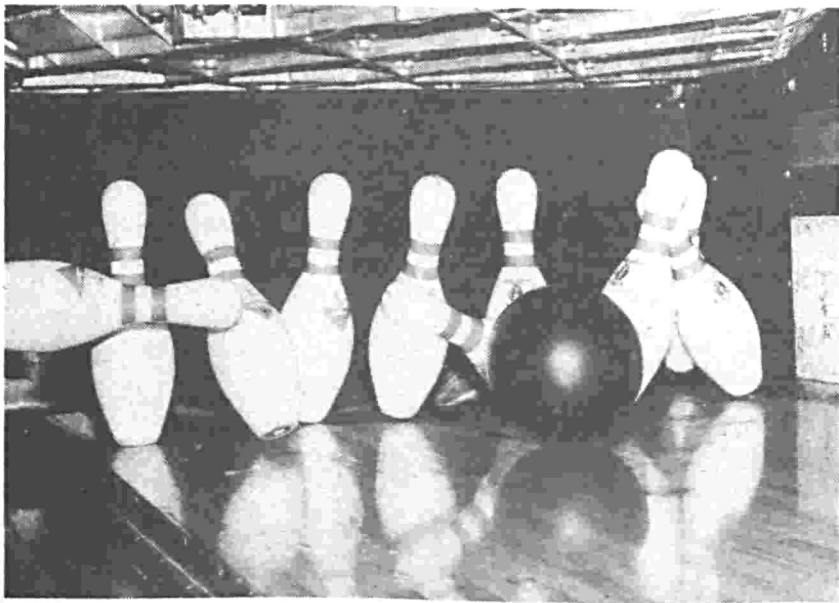

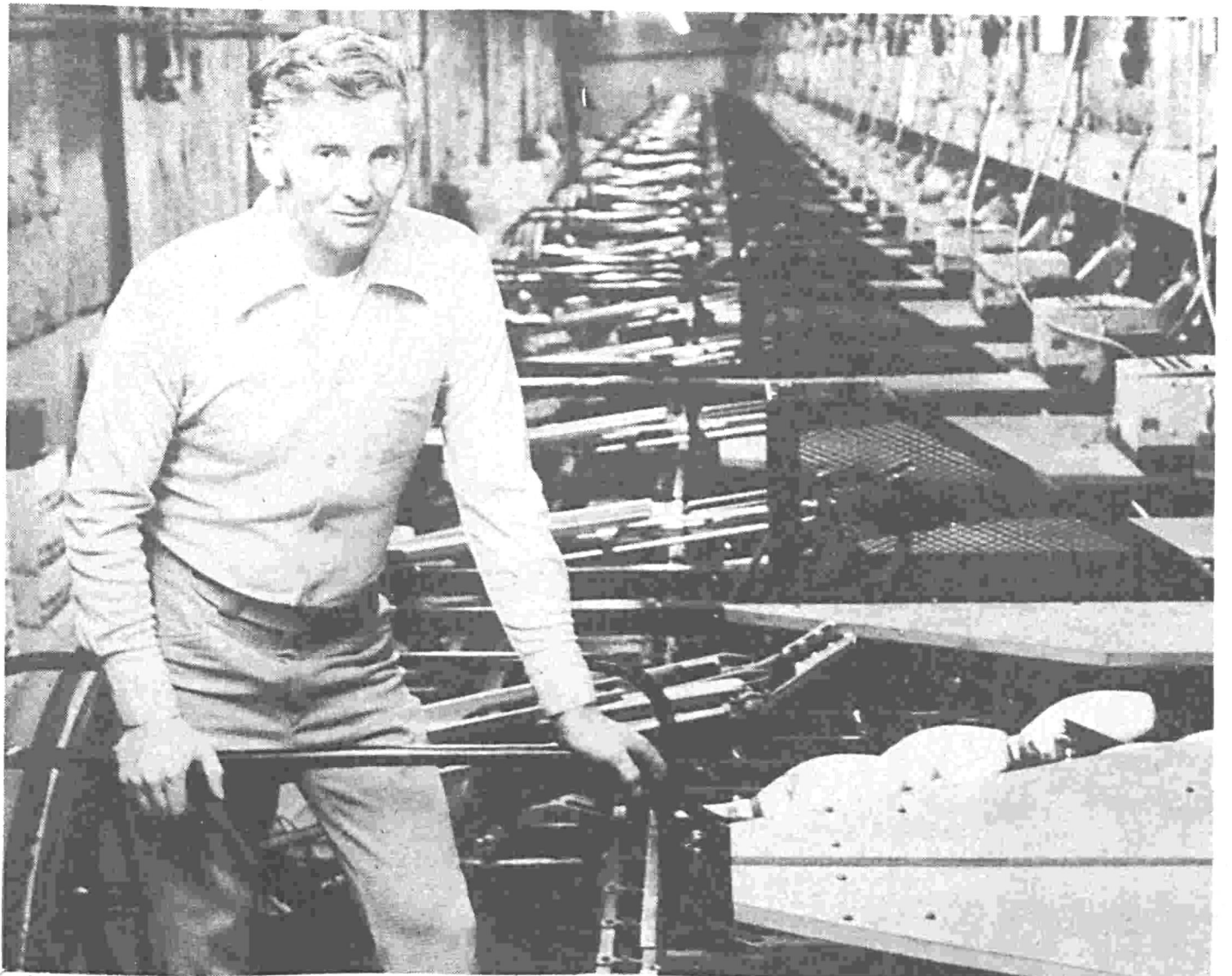

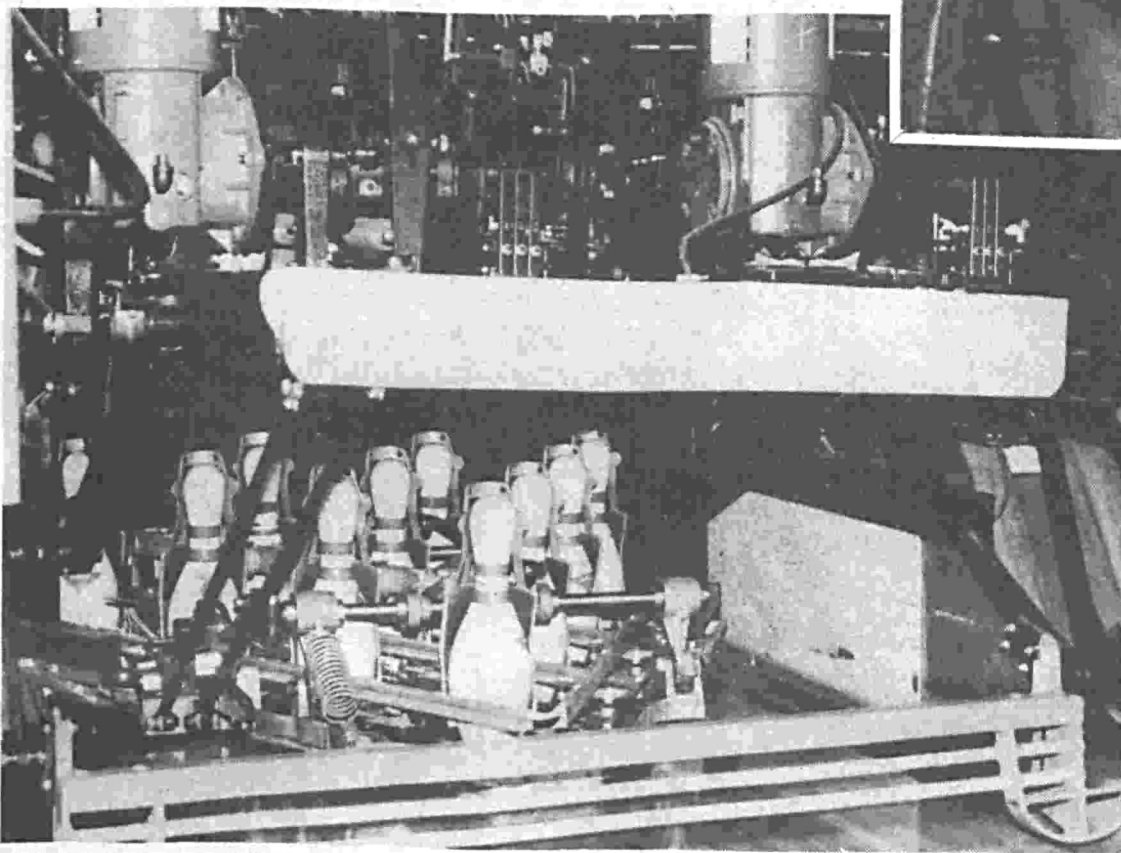

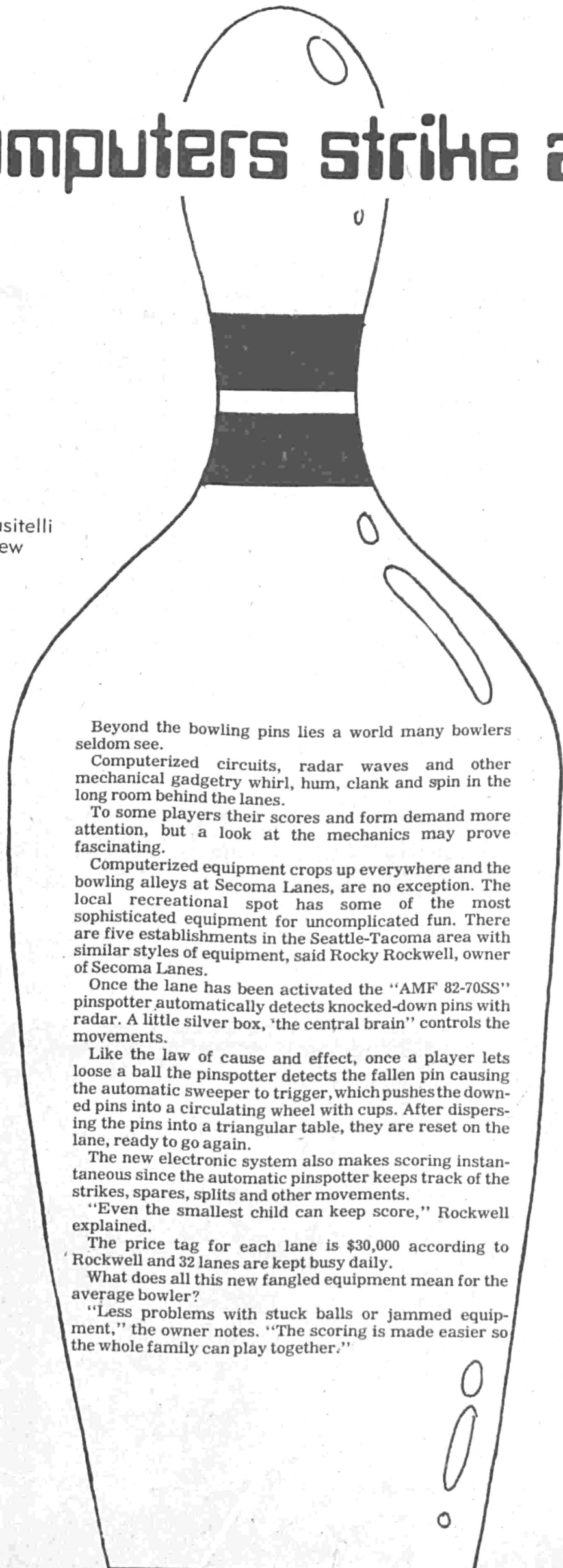
GEARS, LEVERS AND SPRINGS powered by electronic circuits reset fallen pins like magic.

Computers strike again



Beyond the bowling pins lies a world many bowlers seldom see.

Computerized circuits, radar waves and other mechanical gadgetry whirl, hum, clank and spin in the long room behind the lanes.

To some players their scores and form demand more attention, but a look at the mechanics may prove fascinating.

Computerized equipment crops up everywhere and the bowling alleys at Secoma Lanes, are no exception. The local recreational spot has some of the most sophisticated equipment for uncomplicated fun. There are five establishments in the Seattle-Tacoma area with similar styles of equipment, said Rocky Rockwell, owner of Secoma Lanes.

Once the lane has been activated the "AMF 82-70SS" pinspotter automatically detects knocked-down pins with radar. A little silver box, "the central brain" controls the movements.

Like the law of cause and effect, once a player lets loose a ball the pinspotter detects the fallen pin causing the automatic sweeper to trigger, which pushes the downed pins into a circulating wheel with cups. After dispersing the pins into a triangular table, they are reset on the lane, ready to go again.

The new electronic system also makes scoring instantaneous since the automatic pinspotter keeps track of the strikes, spares, splits and other movements.

"Even the smallest child can keep score," Rockwell explained.

The price tag for each lane is \$30,000 according to Rockwell and 32 lanes are kept busy daily.

What does all this new fangled equipment mean for the average bowler?

"Less problems with stuck balls or jammed equipment," the owner notes. "The scoring is made easier so the whole family can play together."

TJ soccers enter semis

Two victories separate the Thomas Jefferson soccer team from a state AAA high school championship crown.

A physical 2-1 win over Peninsula Monday night at Federal Way Stadium sends the Raiders into competition at Memorial Stadium in Seattle tonight as one of the state's four best teams.

Jefferson will compete at 7 p.m. against Sammamish, winners of an overtime 1-0 game against Blanchet in Seattle.

North Puget Sound champion Kennedy used goals by Al Gagner and Tom Castagna to defeat W.W. Miller in the 7 p.m. game at Federal Way, 2-0, and will face O'Dea at 8:30 tonight in Seattle.

The Raiders scored their pair of goals in the first half and then hung on, surviving a brutal game to gain

entry into the AAA semi-finals.

"It was physical; Peninsula was throwing cross-body blocks and everything," Raider coach John Cameron said. "We suffered from it. Four of our guys have bruises; they're not bad, just some bumps that we shouldn't have gotten."

"It felt like I was playing football out there," Jefferson co-captain Tim Sedlacek, who was involved in a violent collision with Seahawk goalie Tom Allard in the first half, said. "They were big and tough like Federal Way; it was kickball, mostly."

Sedlacek and the Raiders countered Peninsula with a precision passing attack in the first half, forcing the Seahawks into numerous turnovers and penalties.

Peninsula fired the first shot-on-goal of the contest, but TJ rattled off 13 straight,

including two scores, before the opposition shot again.

The first Jefferson goal came on a corner kick at the 15:50 mark of the initial half. The kick caromed off of one TJ player and straight in front of forward John Knox, who fired in a 10-yard shot from the right of the goal.

Less than five minutes later it was the Raiders again, this time taking advantage of a free kick resulting from a dangerous play call against the Seahawks near the Peninsula goal.

Jefferson fullback Russ Dahl took the free shot and placed it in the air near the goal mouth, where a sea of heads combined to drop the ball to Raider Tom Beler on the right side. The TJ forward lifted a 15-foot shot into the upper left corner of the net, and Jefferson had all the

tallys they needed.

With a two-point cushion, the Raider attack seemed to fall apart in the second half. While TJ passing faltered, Peninsula scored once and nearly tied the game before the Jefferson squad picked up enough for the win.

At the 13 minute mark, Peninsula's Bobbie Burton dribbled through the Raider defense and rolled a 15-footer around goalie Keith Paulson's right side to bring the Seahawks within one goal.

That goal was almost scored with 25 minutes remaining when Jon Gilligan broke away from the TJ backmen and fired towards the right side of the goal. A diving Paulson saved the goal and possibly the game for the Raiders, who regained the passing technique to run down the game.

"They were playing a lot more high ball the second half," Cameron said of his team. "They didn't bring the ball down and control it; when we do that, we can go right around them, like we did the first half. There were balls headed two or three times out there."

"We kind of lost something the second half. After this we'll have more respect for the physical teams, and keep the ball away from them so they don't beat the hell out of us."

Cameron and Jefferson will rely on finesse rather than brute strength in Seattle.

"I think we're capable of beating anyone if we play well," the TJ coach said. "We're not as tall as some of the teams but we have some of the best skills of any team in the state."

Local high school soccer coaches select FW District All-Star squad

The Federal Way School District's three high schools—Jefferson, Federal Way and Decatur—comprised a domineering force in South Puget Sound League soccer. The three's combined record was 29-8-5 SPSL record.

The Federal Way News pooled nominations from the district's three soccer coaches—Jack McCulloch of Federal Way, John Cameron of Jefferson and Rick Dennison of Decatur—to form a Federal Way District All-Star

Team.

A tie in the voting resulted in the selection of 12 members to the team instead of the normal on-field limit of 11. Jefferson, which won the league title with a 13-1-0 record, placed seven players on the All-Star lineup. Federal Way, the league's second-place squad with a 11-1-2 tally, notched three picks; and Decatur, which placed in the SPSL's upper division with a 5-6-3 slate, had two players selected.

Seven of the All-Stars were

unanimous selections. They were goalie Keith Paulson (TJ); fullbacks Jeff Wysong (FW), Steve Rasmussen (TJ) and Don Carmel (Decatur); halfbacks Darin McKeown (FW) and Tim Sedlacek (TJ), and forward Ron Pierce (TJ).

The remaining members of the All-Star Team received two votes from the coaches. They were Rusty Dahl (TJ), Phil Hughes (Decatur), Ken Fuegman (TJ), Craig Nicholson (FW) and John Knox (TJ).

Seven seniors—Paulson, Wysong, Rasmussen, Carmel, Dahl, Sedlacek, Hughes and Pierce—made the team. Knox is the only junior selection. Nicholson, McKeown and Fuegman are sophomores.

Those who received one vote or mention, were Federal Way's Todd Zimberg, David Schoon, Terry Hildebrandt and John Konop; Decatur's Jerry Leishman and Rolph Grosch, and Jefferson's Tai Yamada and Scott Akre.

Boys' Club reorganization moves forward

Plans for a reorganization and expansion of services in South King County by the Boys' Clubs of Seattle and King County have moved ahead.

Wally Watson, executive director of the Boys' Clubs of Seattle and King County, Inc., outlined the purpose and program of the organization Thursday while speaking before the Burien Rotary Club.

Watson indicated that community interest and potential support has spurred the organization into undertaking a feasibility study now underway.

The King County Board of Directors, as well as local boards serving the SeaTac-Des Moines and Federal Way branches, will soon take up the issue of south-end expansion and consolidation of south-end clubs into one administrative district headed by an area director. The director will be charged with the responsibility for the two clubs now in operation and the proposed Burien branch.

"We are not even sure whether Burien indeed wants our services," Watson explained, "and that's the purpose of our feasibility study. With the amount of calls, letters and the petition requesting a club in the area I feel that the community probably does."

Southend staff members have been consulted concerning the possible shift in administration. Federal Way Boys' and Girls' Club Director Lynn Templeton and Des Moines Boys' Club Director, Doug Branham both take the attitude that thorough planning and a strong community interest is vital to expansion.

"Operating a new club is a huge undertaking," Templeton said. "Funding sources for seed money must be developed, adequate facilities secured and a commitment from community leaders to support the branch is vital. The county and local boards will have to take a long and careful look at expansion and make the

right decisions to insure adequate ground-work.

"After that, its up to the staff to demonstrate the value of the club to the community. I'm optimistic about success in a proposed Burien branch. I think that there is a good chance of success as an outstanding addition to the area."

Boys' Clubs in King County have developed rapidly during the past five years with new branches at Rainier Vista and Kirkland-Redmond. New buildings at Bellevue and Federal Way resulted from \$1.1 million raised in the capital campaign.

A capital fund of \$100,000 has been established in SeaTac Des Moines as well as planned renovation of the Mercer Island facility and the consolidation of the North End Clubs.

At present, 15,000 children are members of King County Clubs with several branches offering adult recreation and community activity programs as well.

Lancers gain dual winners for this week's finals

"Disaster struck the local corps of track and field competitors at the West Central District qualifying meet held last Friday and Saturday at Highline Stadium.

Even the seemingly invincible Kay Garnett was struck by bad luck, twice in fact. The Federal Way Eagle girls were the other recipients of a double blow, but fate smiled on them more than any of the other area squads by getting nine athletes total from both the boys and girls to AAA state to held next Friday and Saturday at Renton Stadium.

The Kennedy girls were led by Garnett's two expected firsts in the 100 (11.2) and 80 low hurdles (a meet record 10.2) with the rest of the team adding three more in fifth and sixth places.

But the big news was Garnett's false start in the 220 and the following defeat in the 880 relay.

The new rule in high schools states that an athlete is disqualified if they false start even once. For Garnett it was one of the most crucial ever.

"I guess I was overanxious,"

she said. "That's the first time I've ever false started. I tightened up in the relay because I was disappointed with the start in the 220."

That little slip at the end of the 880 relay cost Kennedy a trip to state and says Coach Paul Muckerheide, any shot at the state title.

But due credit must be given to Lori Nomiya who grabbed a strong second in the 100 ahead of Jefferson's Linda Lynch (11.6) to give the locals a clean sweep and then anchored the relays, both of whom made it to state, the 440 and 880.

Nomiya fell behind Garnett on the exchange but worked her way back to do the almost unheard, catch Garnett in a sprint, passing her on the inside and outleaning her by a hair.

Nomiya was shocked that she had caught Garnett. "I thought maybe I could catch her."

Garnett mentioned that she had noticed Nomiya's 11.4 in the 100.

The Eagle ran 50.0 and 1:45.2 in the short team events. But in the mile relay, the were disqualified

after coming very close to qualifying losing in the last 100 yards to Renton and Sammamish with a 3:59.3. They were accused of a bump that Eagle coach Bill Harris did not feel affected the race.

Also in dispute was the qualifying standard for that event of state if a team was not in the top two or an individual in the top six at West Central. The computed standard was 3:56.5, but the WIAA and a coach Jan Truant changed that to 3:56.0 arbitrarily. "They based it on last year's fastest two teams," fumed Harris.

Eagle Lisa Taylor was disqualified twice, once in the 440 for running on the lane line after finishing a qualifying fifth and then in the relay.

The Federal Way boys didn't have it so bad as they qualified someone in every distance event, led by Ron Asmus's fourth in the half mile at 1:56.5 and Dave Dzewaltowski who followed his brother's footsteps in the mile with a 4:26.1 in third just as Lori followed her sister Janice.

Dave Woodward had the best night of any of the Eagles, setting a school record in the high

hurdles with a 14.3 behind Keith Bell's meet record 14.1 for Hazen. Kennedy's Brian Bertsch was fourth in the same race with a 14.9 and moved up to third in the lows at 19.8.

The only other local qualifiers came from Mt. Rainier and Evergreens Dean Wilson broke the Ram school record he held last year by soaring 13-10 1/4 for third. Wilson had been passed on to district after suffering a sprained ankle. John Webster kept up the Ram tradition in the 220 becoming the third straight to go on to state.

Linda French was the girls leader, placing fifth in the shot at 40-9 1/2.

Brad Gylling pulled a surprising second in the discus with a 156-0.

The overall boys title went to Hazen with 68 points to Clover Park's 56 and Interlake's 31. Federal Way tied for seventh with 22 and JFK was 14th with 12.

Sammamish defended their girls' title with 62 and Renton followed at 52 and then Kentridge with 38. Kennedy tied for fourth, having 31 points and Federal Way was only five points and two places back.

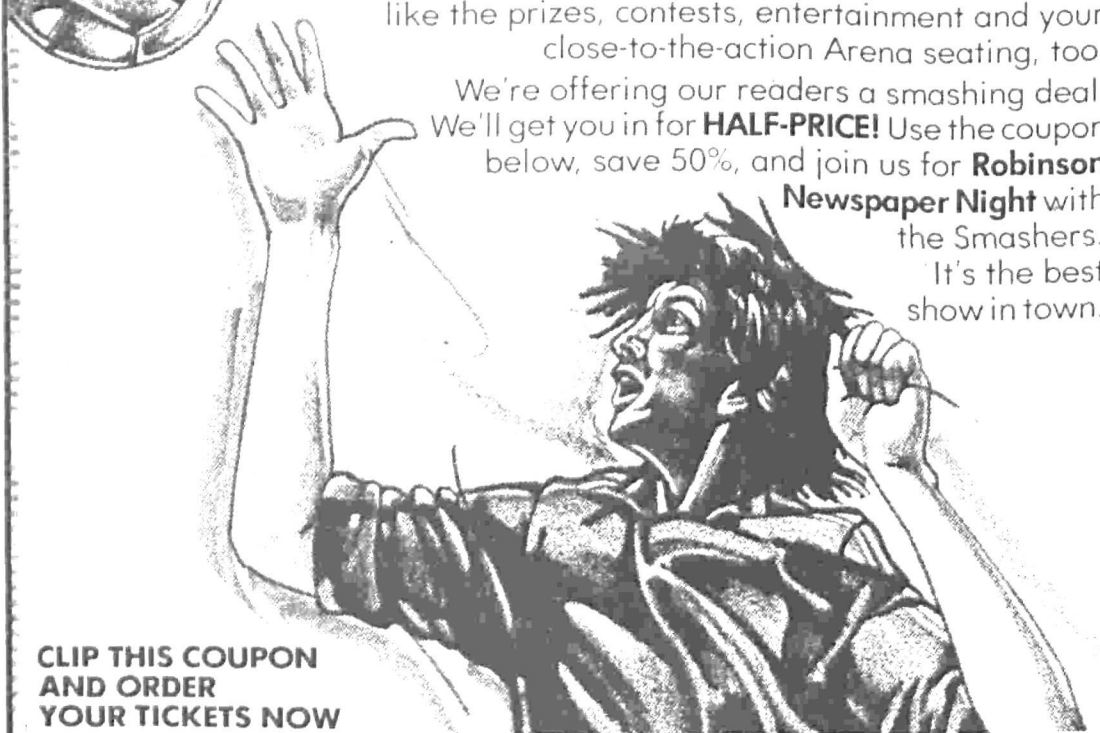

Eagle hitters advance by SK, 8-4

It may have been a round-about trip, but the Federal Way Eagles made their way into the regionals.

After suffering three straight losses, anyone of which would have guaranteed a Region 3 Baseball Tournament berth, the Eagles returned to their typical brand of ball in taking an 8-4 win over the South Kitsap Wolves in a playoff to determine regional entry Monday at Roosevelt Field in Bremerton.

"We looked a little more like our old selves," a gleaming Federal Way skipper Bob Stewart said, referring to a resurgence of his team's ability to hit and score. "I'm glad to see them come back, they were really down after last week."

Federal Way meets Stadium High, the Tacoma City League champions, in Friday's regional opener at Heidleberg Field in Tacoma. The game will begin at 8:30 p.m.

The Eagles attack was highlighted by the hitting prowess of Butch Cratsenberg and Doug Tisdel. Cratsenberg poked three hits in four trips to the plate. He scored twice and knocked two teammates home. His triple in the

seventh inning was the biggest blast of the night. Two batters later, Butch trotted home from third on a Tisdelfly.

That was the second time that Tisdel brought Cratsenberg in. Crats also scampered home in the fifth inning when Tisdel sliced an off-field double down the left-field line. Cratsenberg produced the first run by lining a single to center to score Dave Green who led off the inning with a single and immediately stole second base.

Three of Federal Way's runs came on South Kitsap throwing errors. In the fourth inning, Randy Scholl took a one-out walk, advanced to second on a Bill Shaw single and sprinted home when a South Kitsap double-play attempt resulted in a wild throw past first base. Todd McGrady, whose grounder initiated that the foul up took second on the error. Mark Scholl followed by smacking a grounder to third baseman Scott Mealar who bobbled the ball and then skipped it past first. McGrady came round on that miscue.

Mark Hillis scored Federal Way's final run in the seventh by another misguided toss. He reached first on four balls, stole se-

cond, and dashed towards third on an in-field grounder. The peg from first to third base landed in the dirt and bounded to the third-base line fence. Hillis rounded the corner and scored.

Federal Way jumped to a 2-0 lead in its first two at bats. Jim Bendorf led off the top of the first inning with a walk. He went all the way to third base on a wild pitch against Roosevelt Field's deep backstop. Cratsenberg lined a single to left center to score Bendorf.

Tisdel opened the second inning with a base hit between first and second base. He took second as Randy Scholl walked and advanced to third when South Kitsap turned the double play on Bill Shaw's grounder to second.

Todd McGrady's high hopper to second took a fungo bounce over Wolve Randy Romo, allowing Tisdel to score the Eagles' second run.

South Kitsap generated its major offensive in the bottom of the second inning. The Wolves batted around their order and used two walks and four hits to take a 3-2 edge by the end of the stanza. However, Federal Way pitcher Jim Bendorf allowed South Kitsap just one runner per inning

from the third to fifth while Federal Way took a 6-3 lead.

Federal Way, a team noted for inconsistency in the field, suffered its only defensive lapse in the sixth

inning. The Wolves utilized two hits and three Federal Way errors to push across their final run.

Stewart was especially pleased with his team regain-

ing its elasticity, the ability to take a lead, lose it and then out-distance the opponent down the stretch.

"This was good for us," he said with a grin.

It also seemed to revive Stuart's confidence.

"I'm sure we can beat Stadium," he said without hesitation.

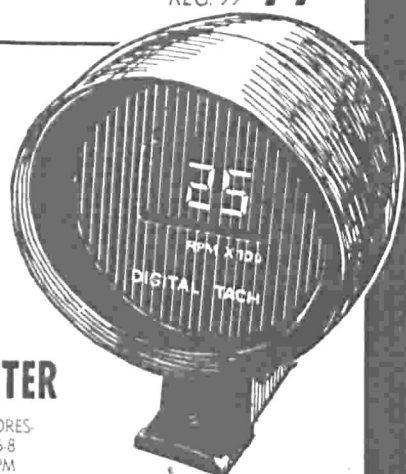

Anthony aids bowlers at SportsWorld clinic

Earl Anthony is one of the Professional Bowlers Association's brightest stars, but the won't wear out his welcome on the PBA tour.

Some professional athletes, including bowlers, continue to compete after their skills have faded. Anthony has decided he won't be one of those.

"You can hang on too long in any sport," Anthony said Monday during a stop in Federal Way. "There are guys on our tour now who should get out for their own good."

"But you fall in love with the game, and you can't imagine yourself doing anything else."

ANTHONY HASN'T decided what his next venture will be, but he's checking what's available.

"I really don't know what I'll do when I retire from bowling," he said. "I'll look around until I find something I like."

Anthony has given himself five more years to compete, but "I might quit earlier if I find something new to get into."

Already one of the greatest kegglers in the history of the game, Anthony has two major goals remaining. "I want to be the first to win over \$1 million on the tour and the first to win 40 tournaments," he said.

He's near both milestones now, with more than \$700,000 in career earnings and 31 victories.

His most recent tournament win—in the Long Island, N.Y., Open in March—was among the sweetest, since it came less than a year after he suffered a heart attack.

THE SEIZURE knocked him off the tour for only six weeks. Then he began a comeback that he hoped would end with a personal triumph.

"I had to prove to myself that I could still compete," he related. "I did that by finishing second in four tournaments, but I still felt I had to prove I could win again."

"When I finally broke through (at Long Island), it was a great

feeling. I felt like a rookie starting all over again."

His "re-start" has netted more than \$60,000 in prize money this season, putting him at the head of the tour's money-winning list.

Celebrity status goes with that position, and Anthony long ago overcame his shyness and became a personality befitting his role.

"I was very shy when I first went on the tour," said Anthony. At SportsWorld Lanes this week to conduct a clinic.

ANTHONY'S SCHEDULE of appearances sent him to New York, California, and Washington in the space of a few days recently. Such jet-setting wasn't on his mind during his early days on pro tour.

"My primary goal then was to make enough money to support my family," the 41-year-old Tacoma native said.

Ten years ago, Anthony was a clerk for a grocery supply company when he decided he couldn't ignore the lure of the PBA circuit any longer.

"Once you make a decision like that, it's a gamble," he said. "You have to be ready to stick it out. I gave up a pretty good job to go on tour."

"But," he said, "my company was beginning to lay off people, and I was 31. It was time to either give it a try or forget it."

He didn't "forget it."

And he won't forget to hang up his bowling shoes before he wears out his welcome.

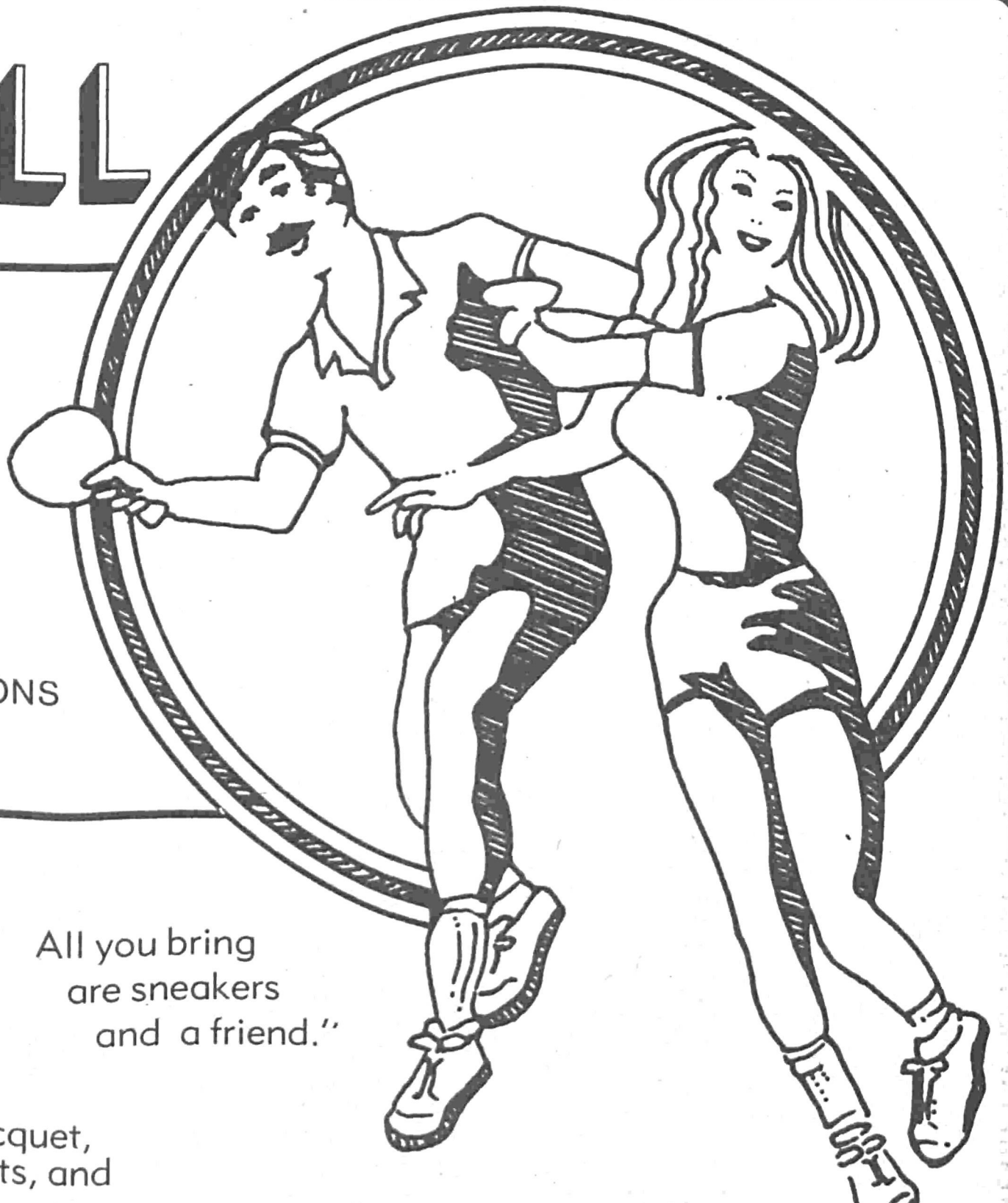

GRCC ties for state men's tennis title, women take 3rd

"Weird" but satisfying was how Green River Community College tennis coach Steve Sauers summarized his Gators' performance in last weekend's state tennis tournaments.

Green River tied for the men's tourney title with host Yakima Valley. Each team scored 167 points. But the Gator women, who had more seeds going to state than the men, ended up third in their state tourney, played in Spokane.

Speaking of the men's outcome, Sauers said, "If we played that tournament for the next 100 years, that (a tie) would never happen again. We were tied after the first day's rounds and entered the two doubles championship matches tied. We split those, so that was it."

Green River, the defending men's champs, won three event championships on the seven-event schedule.

Tom Kennedy, a Jefferson High graduate, took the number-four singles title by scoring four straight wo-set wins, including a 7-6, 6-2 victory over Columbia Basin's Jim Lorenzen in the finals.

Green River's Brian Stanley breezed to the number-one singles title with two-set wins. He downed Yakima's Kelly Evernden, 6-3, 6-2 in the championship round. Evernden had scored two previous wins over Stanley in regular-season action.

Stanley and Randy Wong, a West Seattle High alum, zoomed to the number-one doubles title without dropping a set. The GRCC duo topped Evernden and Ed Burke, 6-4, 6-2, in the finals.

Kennedy and Dave DeMulling, the Gators' number-two doubles squad, competed in the decisive match of the tourney. Unfortunately for the Green River cause, they suffered their first loss of the season in a hard-fought 7-6, 4-6, 6-3 decision to Yakima's Dave Whiteside and Russ Cooley. Kennedy and DeMulling, undefeated until that championship round, had lost only one previous set all season. They had a 4-0 lead in the first set but fell to a Yakima comeback.

Matt Finney gave Green River second place in number-two singles by scoring three straight two-set wins before falling to Yakima's Ken Sanford in a close title match. Sanford and Finney split 6-2 victories in the first two sets. The Yakima netter took the deciding third set, 7-6, by scoring an 8-6 win in the tie-breaker.

Dave DeMulling

gave Green River a strong performance while taking second in the number-five singles competition. He zipped through his first three matches without dropping a set but then had to face last year's state number-one champ, Ed Burke, in the championship round. DeMulling took his possibly out-of-place competitor to three sets but succumbed, 6-2, 4-6, 6-4.

Wong placed third in number-three singles. He swept his initial two matches but dropped a 7-5, 6-1 decision in the semis. He came back with a 6-0, 6-1 consolation win over Everett's Bob Medin for his placement.

Sauers pointed out that Green River lost a fewer sets than Yakima, but the

Gator mentor was pleased with the final totals.

"Yakima and Green River were the two best teams I've seen in my 10 years of coaching, and it would probably be safe to say that they are the two best teams in the history of community college tennis in this state.

"It almost seems fitting that we tied. Neither team deserved to lose."

The Gator women, who came into the state tourney with seven seedings in nine events, had their troubles at state. They finished a lower-than-expected third place with 23 points. Columbia Basin took the title with 63, and Spokane Falls had 34.

Julie James, a Federal Way High grad, took the

number-two singles title and combined with Kelly Sharkey to beat the Spokane Falls' team in the number-one doubles championship match.

Anne Kennedy, a TJ graduate, finished third in number-three singles.

The women's tourney outcome puzzled Sauers as the Gators topped Spokane Falls, 6-3, when the two teams met earlier this season.

He noted that GRCC had a "great season" in both men's and women's tennis. Each of the squads had 17-3 dual-meet records and took Puget Sound Region titles.

"But now it's time to start beating the bushes for new players," he said. "We're going to have a hard time replacing

the players that are going to be leaving us on our men's side.

"It's getting increasingly harder for players to come straight out of high school and compete successfully in CC tennis."

The Gators lose sophomores Kennedy, Wong, DeMulling and Finney. However, Sauers looks for a bright future on the women's courts.

How's your HO3?

An update on homeowner's policies

There was a time when a homeowner's policy had no deductible or only a very small one. "We used to get claims for a pair of sneakers the kid lost at school," says Jack Stanford, an independent insurance agent.

Deductibles now are a standard \$100 or \$250, with the \$250 recommended. That means a deductible for each occurrence, not for the year or other term of the policy.

Isn't that terribly expensive? Well, yes and no. It helps keep the rates of coverage down in the first place (more about that later), and it means the company takes a little pity too. If a single loss is over \$1,000, there is no deductible on that occurrence. It does mean that Harry Homeowner needs to keep the amount of the deductible readily available in case of need.

"People don't turn in every little thing any more," Stanford says. "The company gets fewer nuisance claims, so they can keep their rates down. Considering the coverage, insurance rates have never been lower. There's another thing, too. If

a policy holder insists on turning in every little, just-over-deductible thing, the company can cancel the policy, quite legally. It's like car insurance that way. If you abuse it, you may lose it."

One nice thing about going from a \$100 to a \$250 deductible is that it knocks about 10 percent off the price of the insurance policy. That helps put that other \$150 (the difference between the two deductibles) in the bank in case it's needed.

Speaking of price, what can you expect to pay for insurance? Stanford took his own house, as an example, a three bedroom rambler in Federal Way, looked up a few things in the American Appraisal System survey, and concluded it would cost about \$50,000 to rebuild his house on his lot. The annual insurance rate is \$145.

In addition to insurance on his house itself, Stanford has insured the contents, and he recommends that other people do too. "It adds about \$40 to my bill each year," he says, "but it insures my furniture, even my clothing and TV. The replacement situation has changed

recently, too. Before, all you got was the actual value of what you had, and of course it was all used and therefore not "worth" much if you went to sell it. Now the "value" is considered to be what it would cost to buy new. The idea is just a couple of years old. Most of the companies are offering this now. A few are waiting to see what happens. If your company doesn't offer it, maybe you need a different company. I think it's a really good deal."

Another part of a homeowner's policy is the personal liability. This covers accidental damage you or your child may do, on or off your property, the mailman slipping on your walk, even the need for medical care for a guest. "Everything except automobiles," Stanford says.

Even traveling away from home, the personal part of your homeowner's policy travels with you. Your luggage is insured, so is the situation where you might do damage accidentally to someone else or their property.

"The guest medical is a good deal,"

Stanford says. "It means that when Uncle Hank cuts his hand with the carving knife when he's trying to slice the roast, you can have it taken care of right away. There is no deductible on the guest medical - it's simply covered, and so there's no need for a liability suit to recover damages from you to pay for poor Uncle Hank's stitches. It's simply covered."

Another thing a homeowner's policy should cover is housing elsewhere if your home is destroyed, while it is being rebuilt. "That can really ruin you," Stanford says, "because it can take months to build a home. This pays for a motel if that's the best thing to do, or even for renting another home in the area, until you can move back in."

So sit down with your agent and find out what your homeowner's policy covers. Make sure it's up to date and is kept that way. And know where you keep it; preferably out of the house! After all, if the house burns, the policy would too!

Highline spawned plan to consolidate paramedic service

by Pat Jenkins
Consolidation of South King County's paramedic service — what Highline Medic 1 administrators nearly introduced last year — appears ready to become a reality no later than early next year.

A consensus vote by the South King County Paramedic Provider Groups in the spring of 1978 initiated plans to bring under one "roof" the Highline, Valley, and Auburn-Federal Way service areas.

County officials and paramedics themselves are virtually unanimous in their endorsement of the consolidation concept.

But the community board that represents the Highline provider group nearly beat everyone to the punch "about a year ago," Ed Stuhlman noted.

That's when, said the director of the Highline Medic 1 program, the board did everything but enact a countywide consolidation.

"The plan stalemated over some legal complications, so they

decided to hold off on it for a while," Stuhlman said.

A YEAR LATER, the county's Emergency Medical Services Division is awaiting proposals from the fire departments and districts in the three provider groups on how to consolidate the paramedic service.

The proposal that is accepted is expected to improve the administration of the service and make better use of manpower when it is put into effect by the end of this year or early in 1980.

Judy Pierce, manager of the

EMS Division, said there is little opposition to the proposed consolidation.

"There might be a few who are opposed to doing it, but the majority of paramedics and other people involved is in favor," she said.

Stuhlman concurred, saying, "Everyone feels it's necessary. It's been a long time coming."

He added, however, that the plan to consolidate "sounds great to date. Nothing is really down on paper yet. We'll wait and see what the proposals say."

The deadline for submitting proposals is June 15. And in case no proposals are received from the fire districts and departments, Pierce said her division is also developing an outline "for directly running the program."

AS IT stands now, consolidation would create a lead agency to assume the administrative and financial responsibilities of the paramedic service.

"By doing this," Pierce said, "the service will improve and there will be more effective use of manpower."

Administration costs, which have spiraled upward in recent years, "will be greatly reduced, also," she said.

Service boundaries for the individual provider groups will remain the same, but mutual aid agreements will be established, calling for paramedic units to respond to aid calls that are outside their area.

While Pierce said some districts "have been opposed to doing that in the past," Stuhlman said overlapping service will be nothing new.

With the expansion of the service, she said, she eventually hopes to put out a weekly newsletter with listed space and rides.

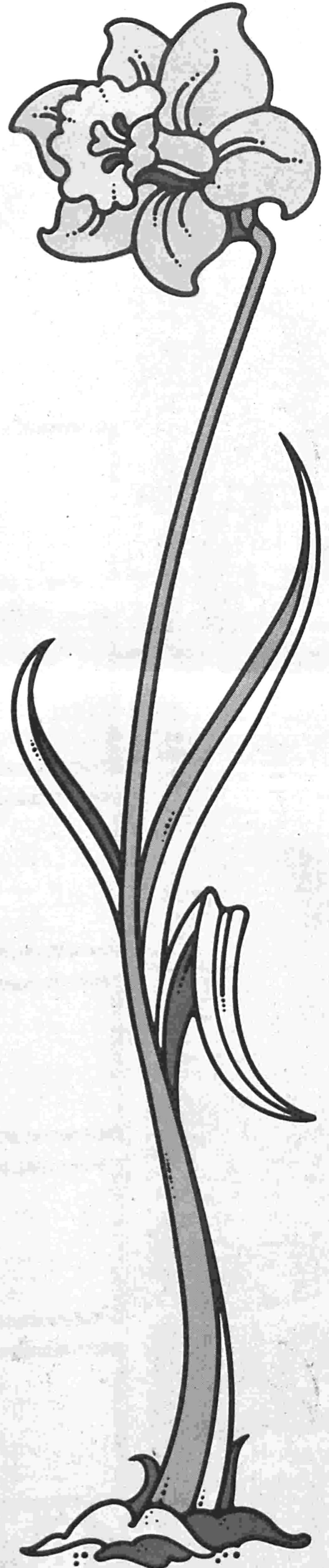

Discover a world of spices

During the ancient days, men fought and risked their lives bringing caravans of rich, pungent and aromatic spices to the rich man's dinner table. Today every food store stocks shelves of these food enhancers and all cooks have easy access to their own kitchen spice racks.

Generations before us relied on spices for survival, not only were they used for cooking, but in religious ceremonies, medicines and in courtship.

Spices have a loose definition and are often intermingled with herbs, said Dee Dovey, manager of the Specialty Spice Shop at SeaTac Mall.

But loosely defined, spices come from the tropics and are derived from dried fruits, barks, flower buds, pods, berries, flower stigmas and whole plants.

No one really knows when spices were first used in cooking, but a Chinese herbal dated 2700 B.C. was uncovered and mentioned the use of cinnamon. Visitors to the Isle of Rhodes in 2800 B.C. feasted on such Grecian specialties as gingerbread and nougats.

Centuries before Christ, the nomadic tribes of the Arabian desert had a spice cartel. They gained lavish profits from taxes on the spice caravans passing through their kingdoms.

Frequently spices are mentioned in the Old Testament Bible; in Genesis 43:11, the recipe reads, "a little honey, spices, myrrh, nuts and almonds."

New worlds were discovered during the pursuit for spices, Spain and Portugal were the leaders in transporting spices, until the 1600's when the English captured the monopoly away from the Dutch. Then they became the dominate merchants in the East India spice trade.

Pepper, the mate to salt, was one of the most valued spices. Alaric, King of the Goths, in 410 A.D. held Rome in ransom for the sum of 3,000 pounds of pepper.

The seasoning is a dried berry of a vine that once grew wild in the northern region of Sumatra; now it is also cultivated in Brazil, Thailand, Malaysia and Ceylon. Black pepper is the berries picked just before becoming fully ripe. White pepper is made by removing the outer coating and letting the berry ripen. Then it is ground into powder.

The cinnamon, found in today's store, is actually cassia, a close second to the sweet spice. The only difference between the two is the tree they come from.

The cinnamon or cassia bark is gathered after the May and November rains in the Far East. The spice can be used in cakes, breads, fruit dishes, puddings, pork, ham, and stews. The cin-

namon sticks add flavoring to hot spiced drinks.

Both mace and nutmeg come from the same tree, Ms. Dovey said. Mace is the sun-dried aril, while nutmeg comes from the pit that is dried for several weeks while still in the shell. Poultry, fish and desserts can be enhanced with the spice.

The world's most costly spice, saffron, comes from the Mediterranean area and India.

"It is made from the stigma of the crocus," Ms. Dovey said. "Saffron sells for \$800 to \$900 a pound."

She said the reason for the exorbitant cost stems from the special way the spice is obtained.

"The flowers must be picked when in bloom and the season is very short. Each blossom is hand picked."

To cut the costs but still have the same flavor, she recommends the spice achiote that grows in Puerto Rico. It is used for cakes, buns, rolls, cookies, chicken, seafood and rice dishes.

Many spices combined together add a complimentary flavor to foods. At the Specialty Spice Shop, a collection of spices make a Barbeque blend that can be added to tomato sauce, catsup, or fruit juices. To make meat marinades, combine the seasonings with orange or pineapple

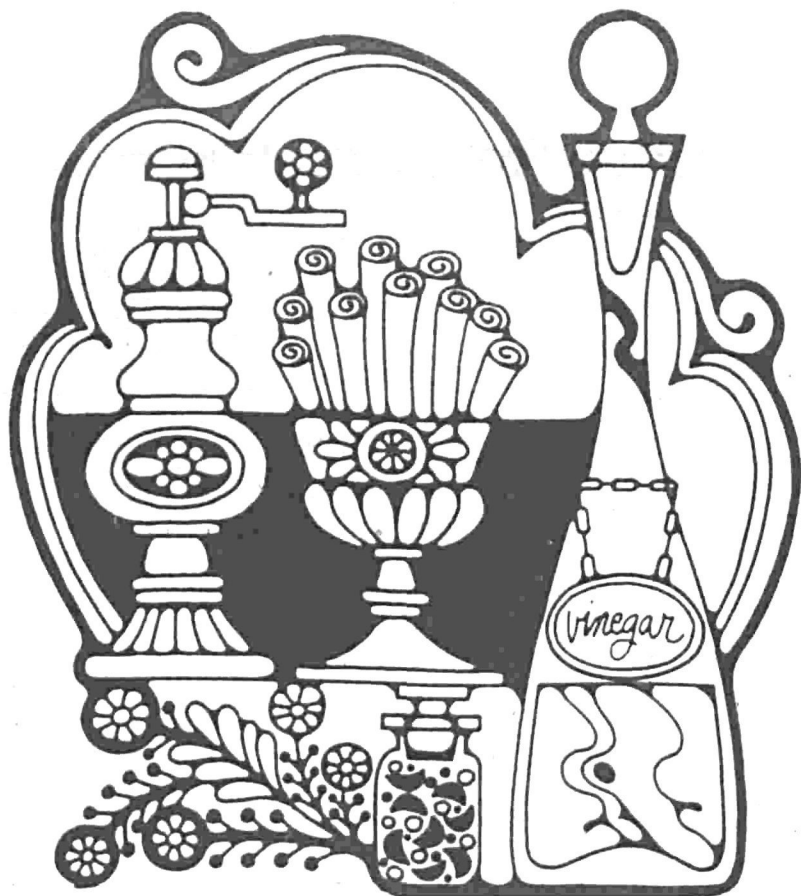
juice. This month many of the gourmet cooking magazines feature Indian cooking. Curry,

the main seasoning, is a combination of several spices: coriander, cinnamon, fennel, cumin, allspice and ginger.

For those summer salads, include a dash of oregano, parsley, chervil and marjoram in the oil and vinegar.

Pumpkin Muffins
 1 1/2 cups flour
 1/2 cup sugar
 2 tps baking powder
 3/4 tsp cinnamon
 3/4 tsp salt
 1 egg, slightly beaten
 1 cup canned pumpkin
 One-third cup squeeze margarine
 1/4 cup milk
 1/2 cup raisins
 Combine dry ingredients. Add remaining ingredients; mix well. Line plastic muffin

tray or custard cups with paper liners. Spoon batter into six cups, fill each cup 1/2 full. Microcook 3 to 5 minutes, or until tops are set, turning once each minute. Remove muffins from tray or cups immediately. Cool on wire rack. Repeat with remaining batter. Makes approximately 1 dozen.

To Reheat:
 Microcook on paper towel until hot using the following times as guidelines. Serve immediately. 1 muffin, 10 to 15 seconds; 2 muffins, 20 to 25 seconds; 3 muffins, 25 to 30 seconds.

Tip: Some muffins may be done before others. If so, remove; continue microcooking remaining muffins a few seconds.

Savory Scrambled Eggs
 1 tbsps margarine
 6 eggs
 One-third cup milk
 1 cup (3 oz) cream cheese, cubed
 Salt and pepper

Microcook margarine in 1 1/2 quart casserole 30 seconds or until melted. Add eggs and milk; mix well. Add cream cheese. Cover; microcook 3 1/2 to 4 minutes or until eggs are almost set, stirring after 2 minutes. Stir; let stand, covered, 2 minutes before serving. Season to taste. 4 servings.

Variations: Add chopped parsley, chives, green onion slices or crisply cooked bacon, crumbled, to eggs with cream cheese.

Omitte cream cheese. Microcook eggs as directed until almost set. Add 1/2 cup shredded sharp

natural cheddar or Monterey Jack cheese. Continue as directed.

Herb Sauced Fish
 1/4 cup celery slices
 1/4 cup chopped onion
 3 tbsps margarine
 1 tbsps flour
 1/4 tsp salt
 1/2 tsp tarragon leaves, crushed
 Dash of pepper
 1 cup (4 ozs) natural Monterey Jack cheese
 1 lb fish fillets

Microcook vegetables and margarine in 2-quart casserole 4 to 5 minutes or until vegetables are tender, stirring after 2 minutes. Blend in flour and seasonings. Gradually add milk, stirring constantly. Cover; microcook 4 to 5 minutes or until sauce boils and thickens, stirring once each minute. Add cheese; stir until melted. Arrange fillets in 11 3/4 x 7 1/2 inch baking dish; top with cheese sauce.

Microcook 4 1/2 minutes, turning after 2 minutes. Let stand, covered, 2 to 3 minutes before serving, or until fish flakes easily with fork. 4 servings.

Variation: Add 1 tablespoon sherry to cheese sauce.

Ratanouille Pyrenees
 2 medium zucchini, sliced
 1 medium eggplant, peeled and cubed
 1 medium onion, sliced
 1 green pepper, cut into strips
 3/4 cup French dressing
 1 pt. cherry tomatoes, halved

Combine ingredients except tomatoes in 3-quart casserole; mix light-

ly. Cover; microcook 12 to 14 minutes or until vegetables are crisp-tender, stirring after 5 minutes. Add tomatoes. Cover; microcook 2 to 3 minutes or until hot. Serve hot or cold. 10 to 12 servings.

Creamy Mallow Cheesecake
 1/4 cup margarine
 1 cup vanilla wafer crumbs
 4 cups miniature marshmallows
 One-third cup milk
 2 8-oz. pkgs cream cheese
 2 tbsps lemon juice
 2 tps grated lemon rind
 1 tsp vanilla
 1 cup heavy cream, whipped

Microcook margarine in small bowl 45 second, or until melted. Blend in crumbs; reserve 1/4 cup for topping. Press remaining crumb mixture onto bottom of 9-inch springform pan.

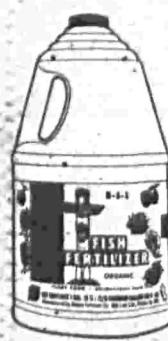

 Dash of pepper
 1 egg, slightly beaten
 1/4 lb Braunschweiger sausage, cut in 1/4-inch slices
 1/4 lb Swiss cheese, thinly sliced
 Paprika

In large skillet melt butter. Add potatoes, onion, salt and pep-

 4 slices beef eye of round (1/2 inch thick), about 1 1/4 lbs
 1 tsp powdered sage
 1/2 tsp basil
 1/4 lb Monterey Jack cheese
 1/4 cup butter
 Salt
 1/4 tsp pepper
 One-third cup dry white wine
 Sour cream noodles
 Pound beef with mallet until slices are flattened to about 6 inches in diameter. Sprinkle with sage and basil. Cut cheese into 4 sticks and place one on center of each beef serving. What's Cookin' in Ruth's Kitchen

Are you planning on leaving your husband for a week or a weekend, you'll want to come back to a spouse who is glad to have you home but hasn't suffered from malnutrition in the meantime.

Some men would relish a chance to mess around in the kitchen freely without somebody looking over his shoulder and asking, "Just what do you think you're cooking up?"

There are others who loathe eating out, who would never consider heating up a TV dinner, and though they know how to broil a steak, fry an egg or toss a salad, they'd rather not be bothered.

I have one of the latter, and although it's flattering to know how intensely loyal he is to my cooking, I've wanted to leave for a few days and visit my daughter.

I haven't gone, because I couldn't get on the flight I wanted. But I will, and by the time I do I hope to have a good collection of, not leftovers but "planned overs" in the refrigerator and freezer.

THESE PLASTIC CARTONS filled with his favorite foods should get him through until there are things cooking again in Ruth's kitchen.

This sort of preparation is really no big deal. If you're having stew or goulash, make a good sized batch. Eat some and freeze the rest. Do the same with your favorite tuna casserole, chicken and rice, or just fry a big platter of chicken, and freeze some of the pieces, wrapped separately in waxed paper and packed loosely in a plastic bag for freezing.

All that needs to be done is to unwrap the chicken, spread the pieces out in a baking pan, and heat them through in a moderate oven. Even an inexperienced cook can do that.

When I take a trip, which I don't do often, I usually leave part of a baked ham in the refrigerator, along with a good supply of fruit, salad materials, cheese and staples, both fresh and packaged; so those holding down the home fort shouldn't even have to go to the store.

YEAST BREADS are a favorite topic of mine, and I still bake a batch of dinner rolls, twists, once if not twice a week. But I had a request the other day for a sweet dough, which I assume would be one suitable for cinnamon rolls, caramel pecan rolls or a frosted, filled coffee ring. Once you become accustomed to working with yeast dough, you can make all these things, and easily.

One of the joys of making yeast breads is that you can vary the proportions without courting disaster like you might if you took a notion to add more sugar or shortening to a well balanced cake recipe. Anyway, here's a good dough for sweet rolls, a coffee ring or a braided loaf:

Sweet Yeast Dough
1 1/2 cups lukewarm water
1/2 cup sugar
1 envelope dry yeast
1/2 cup instant powdered milk
1 egg
1/4 cup oil
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
4 1/2 cups flour, or more
Put lukewarm

the dough from your mixing spoon and also from the sides of the bowl.

I find it easier to knead the dough smooth right in the bowl instead of removing it to a floured board. You can sit down comfortably with the bowl in your lap. Steady it with your left hand and knead with your right.

Knead the dough until it is smooth and can be shaped into a ball,

by chance, you find you've added too much flour in the first place, you can soften the dough by working in a few teaspoons of warm water.

Don't be afraid of over-kneading. When the dough is quite smooth, make it into a ball, stretching the surface, and put it back in the bowl, rough side down and smooth side up. Cover the bowl, and set it in a warm place to raise

until the dough is bubbly and more than double in bulk.

Punch out all the bubbles, knead the dough smooth, and again make a ball. Put it back in the bowl, rough side down and smooth side up. Cover the bowl, and set it in a warm place to raise

FOR CINNAMON ROLLS roll the dough out on a board or a vinyl table or counter top to a rectangle ap-

proximately 1/4 inch thick. I prefer not to flour the board. Well raised and kneaded dough usually doesn't stick, but if it does, a few drops of oil is the best way to keep it from sticking.

Spread the dough with soft butter or margarine, and sprinkle it all over with a mixture of sugar and cinnamon, either brown or white sugar with approximately one teaspoon cinnamon to a half cup sugar. Spread with raisins or cur-

rants, and roll the dough up like a jelly roll.

Use a very sharp knife, and cut the dough in approximately one inch slices. Place on end in a well oiled wide, shallow pan, keeping rolls one half to one inch apart. Place in a warm place to raise.

The best way to tell when rolls are ready to bake is to tap one lightly with your finger. If it springs back, let them raise some more. If the tap leaves an indentation,

the rolls are ready to bake.

Bake 20 to 25 minutes or until rolls are golden brown in a 375 degree oven. For a glaze, spread while hot with a thin uncooked icing. One tablespoon butter or margarine, one half teaspoon vanilla, one cup powdered sugar and enough milk that it will spread with a pastry brush is a good proportion.

A few suggestions: When raising dough I'd rather cover the bowl with a metal lid

than a wet cloth. If it sticks, it's easy to rub off. I usually put the bowl of dough in the oven to raise, but hesitate to recommend it, because the switch should be turned on for a minute and no more. Anything over 130 degrees will kill the yeast. I use a big old crockery bowl. Don't put a plastic bowl in the oven. But don't let these warnings scare you out. Learn to make bread and enjoy it. It's one of the greatest joys of cooking.

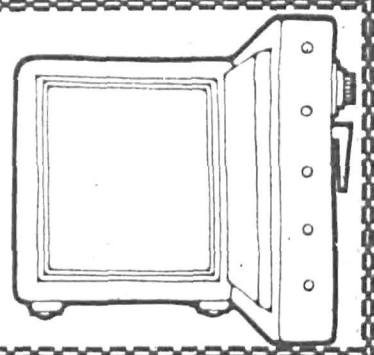

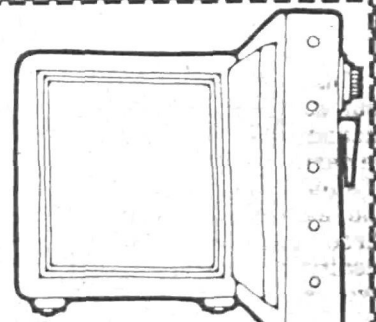

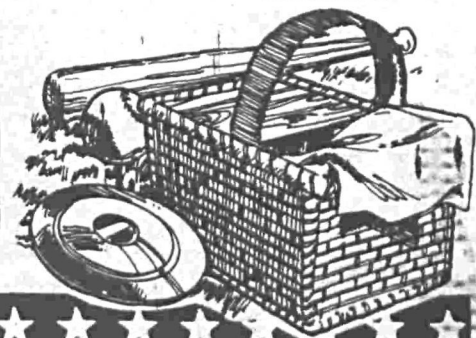

 1 medium tomato, cut in wedges
 2 tps lemon juice
 1/2 tsp oregano
 1/2 tsp salt
 1 1/2 cups packaged pre-cooked rice

1 can (7 oz) water-packed tuna, drained and flaked

Dissolve bouillon cubes in boiling water. Melt butter in large skillet. Add cucumber, celery, green pepper and onion and saute until vegetables are just tender. Blend flour and sugar, add corn syrup and honey; blend well. Mix together eggs, vanilla, salt and melted butter; stir into syrup mixture. Pour into unbaked pastry shell. Sprinkle with 1/4 cup

macadamia nuts. Bake in 350-degree oven 50 to 55 minutes or until knife inserted halfway between center and edge comes out clean. Cool. Top with whipped cream and the toasted nuts.

Dairy days call for milk

Take a break in a busy day with cookies and a cold dairy drink. It's a quick and delicious way to lift your spirits and energy level. Remember the restorative powers of milk and cookies after school?

The recipes featured here, however, are created to appeal to adult tastes as well as younger appetites. The drink, for instance, has just enough tang to make it interesting. It's a smooth concoction of plain yogurt, milk and sherbet. Whiz it in the blender and you'll see why it's called a Sunrise Special.

The cookies are dainty and pretty

enough to serve at tea time or for dessert. Golden Butterflies are made from a butter and sour cream pastry which is rolled up and refrigerated before slicing and baking. The Almond Cookies are crisp, buttery little mouthfuls. These are quick and easy to make, and bake in just 10 minutes. As always, real butter and high quality ingredients used in recipes developed by the Washington Dairy Products Commission home economists make home baked cookies well worth the effort.

Milk and other dairy products belong to one of the basic four food groups that make

up a balanced diet. Two 8-ounce glasses of milk per day is the recommended amount for most adults.

Almond Butter Cookies
1 cup sliced almonds
¾ cup butter, softened
Two-thirds cup sugar
1 egg
1 tsp vanilla
2 cups flour
One-eighth tsp salt

Spread almonds in thin layer on baking sheet. Bake in 375-degree oven 5 minutes or until golden. Cool. Beat together butter and sugar until fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. Stir in flour, almonds and salt just until combined. Shape dough into 1-inch balls. Place on

ungreased baking sheet. Bake in 375-degree oven 9 or 10 minutes or until bottoms are light golden brown. Transfer to rack to cool. Makes about 4 ½ dozen.

Yogurt Sunrise Special
Combine 1 cup orange sherbet, 1 (8-oz) carton plain yogurt and 1 cup milk in electric blender. Whirl until blended. Makes about 3 ½ cups.

Sour Cream Butterfly Pastries
1 cup chilled butter
1 ½ cups flour
½ cup dairy sour cream
1 tsp grated lemon peel

Granulated sugar
Cut butter into flour with pastry blender until consistency onto is moist and crumbly. Mix in sour cream and lemon peel. Turn dough onto wax paper and shape into 4-inch square. Wrap and chill in freezer ½ hour. Unwrap and cut dough in half. Work with one piece at a time, refrigerating remaining dough. Sprinkle about 2 tablespoons sugar on rolling surface. Coat all sides of pastry with sugar. Roll out to 12 x 5-inch rectangle, turning pastry over often and adding sugar as needed to coat rolling surface. Make a light lengthwise mark down center of dough. **DO NOT CUT**

THROUGH. Starting from short ends, roll dough toward center mark. Refrigerate. Repeat with remaining dough. Cut each pastry roll into 20 (½-inch) slices. Dip-½ cut side in sugar. Place sugared side up on ungreased baking sheet allowing 2-inches between each cookie. Bake in 350-degree oven 15 to 20 minutes

Low-cal dressings, low-cal salads

The best way to lose excess weight is to bring the daily caloric intake below the output, to eat a balanced diet and to secure adequate exercise. This permits sensible, healthy weight reduction and avoids the nervousness, headaches and short temper which usually go with extreme or crash diets.

With salad season coming on, here are a few low-calorie salads and dressings to help those who are watching their waistslines.

Jellied Tuna Salad
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
¼ cup cold water
½ tsp powdered mustard
½ tsp salt
½ tsp instant minced onion
2 tbsps sugar
1 tbsps fresh lemon juice
1 ½ cups buttermilk
Yellow food coloring, optional
½ cup diced celery
1 can (3 ¼ ozs) tuna, drained and broken into small pieces
Salad greens

Soften gelatin in cold water. Dissolve over hot water. Blend in seasonings and sugar. Add lemon juice, buttermilk and a few drops food coloring, if used. Chill until thickened, but not firm. Fold in celery and tuna. Pour

into 4 individual molds and chill until firm. Unmold on salad greens. If desired, serve with Cooked Salad Dressing (see below.) About 86 calories.

Patio Salad
1 cup melon balls or cubes
1 tomato, peeled and cut into wedges
1 ½ qts broken salad greens
¼ cup salad oil
1 ½ tbsps fresh lemon juice
½ tsp instant minced onion
½ tsp Worcestershire
¾ tsp salt
One-eighth tsp pepper
½ tsp sugar

Combine first 3 ingredients in salad bowl. Put remaining ingredients in small jar, cover and shake well. Add to first mixture in bowl and toss lightly. Makes 6 servings. (Salad: about 32 calories. Dressing: about 85 calories.)

Cottage Cheese and Cucumber Salad
2 tbsps white vinegar
2 tbsps sugar
½ tsp each poppy and celery seed
1 ½ cup creamed cottage cheese
Salad greens
20 slices unpeeled cucumber
Heat vinegar, sugar and seeds to boiling. Pile cheese onto greens and arrange cucumber sliced diagonally in the cheese. Pour dressing

over top and chill until ready to serve. Makes 4 servings. (About 112 calories per serving.)

Cooked Salad Dressing
½ tsp each powdered mustard and paprika
Dash of cayenne
2 tbsps vinegar
¼ cup nonfat milk
1 egg, beaten
¼ tsp non-caloric liquid sweetener
Mix all ingredients in top part of small double boiler. Put over hot water and cook, stirring, until thickened. Cool and chill. Makes ½ cup. (About 13 calories per tablespoon.)

Tomato Salad Dressing
1 pkg. old-fashioned French dressing mix
1 ½ cup tomato juice
¼ cup each malt vinegar and salad oil
Empty contents of package of mix into a screwtop, quart-size jar. Add remaining ingredients, cover and shake well. Chill. Makes 2 cups. (About 22 calories per tablespoon.)

Cucumber Sauce
Mix 1 container of plain yogurt with 1 grated small cucumber. Stir in 1 tablespoon chopped fresh dill and salt to taste. Chill. Stir again before serving. Makes 1 ½ cups. (About 8 calories per tablespoon.)

Lamb for variety in menu

In this country, lamb...often thought of as the harbinger of spring...is often a neglected meat, but it is a favorite in England and the Scandinavian countries, and is the chief meat in the Middle East.

Lamb has an adaptability to combine with herbs, saucers and other foods, probably because of its delicate flavor. As a change from high priced beef, lamb can be stretched in a number of ways and is a refreshing change in daily menus.

Braised Lamb In Sour Cream
2 lbs lamb neck
¼ cup all-purpose flour
2 tbsps salt
½ tsp pepper
Pinch each of ground thyme and tarragon
2 tbsps butter
½ tsp caraway seeds
2 bouillon cubes dissolved in 1 cup boiling water
1 onion, minced
Juice of ½ lemon
1 cup dairy sour cream
2 tbsps dry white wine

butter in heavy skillet. Add remaining ingredients, cover and cook over very low heat for 1 ½ hours. Makes 4 servings.

Armenian Lamb Stew
2 lbs lamb shoulder, cut up and trimmed of excess fat
2 tbsps cooking oil
1 cup sliced onions
2 lbs spinach, cut into large pieces
1 cup tomato juice or sauce
Salt and pepper
1 cup water
Cook meat in oil until brown on all sides. Add onions; cover and cook over medium heat for about 10 minutes. Onions should be tender but not brown. Add spinach, tomato juice, salt, pepper and water. Cover and simmer until tender. Depending on the lamb, this make take from 40 minutes to 1 hour. Makes 4 servings.

Lamb Pie with Herb Crust
2 lbs boneless lamb shoulder or neck
3 tbsps all-purpose flour
Salt and pepper
1 garlic clove, pureed
3 tbsps shortening
2 cups bouillon or water (½ may be red or white wine)
Herb bouquet (bay leaf, thyme, parsley)

18 small white onions, parboiled
18 very small new potatoes, scraped, OR 3 large potatoes, cut in good-sized pieces
2 cups peas
1 cup pitted ripe olives
Herb crust
1 egg yolk
2 tbsps milk or water
Roll meat in flour seasoned with salt and pepper. Saute along with garlic in the shortening, using a deep flame-proof baking dish. When brown, add remaining ingredients except last 3, and simmer until thickened, adding a little more bouillon if necessary to make enough gravy. Remove herb bouquet and correct seasoning. Cool Roll Herb Crust rather thick and cut into 1-inch strips. Arrange lattice-fashion on pie, trimming ends. Glaze top with egg yolk beaten slightly with milk. Bake in preheated 400-degree oven until browned. Makes 6 servings.

Herb Crust
Mix 1 package (3 ozs) cream cheese, ½ cup butter, 1 ¼ cups all-purpose flour, ½ teaspoon salt and 1 teaspoon each of chopped chives and dill. Chill before rolling.

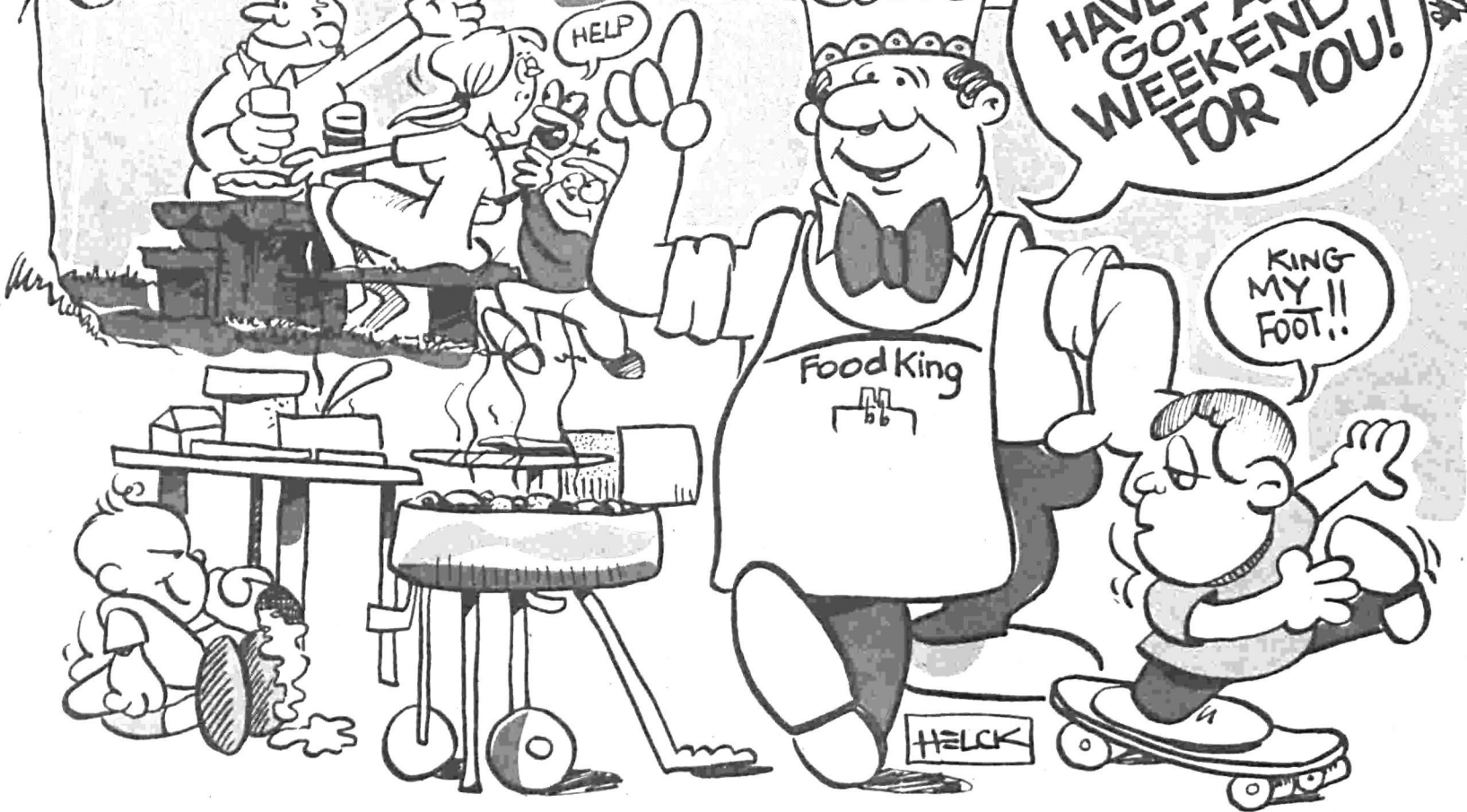
For the benefit of the readers who called, we are repeating the recipes for Beef Salad Provencale, Beef Burgundy with Fruit and Super Beef and Squash Casserole and hoping that the gremlins keep their distance this time.

Beef Salad Provencale
 3 cups cooked beef roast, cut in thin strips
 3 cups cooked rice
 1 1/2 cup sliced celery
 1 cup sliced green onions with tops
 1/2 cup each mayonnaise and sour cream
 1/2 tsp seasoned pepper
 1 tsp each prepared horseradish, prepared mustard and salt
 2 large tomatoes, cut into eighths
 Cucumber slices
 Combine roast beef, rice, celery and onions. Blend remaining ingredients except tomatoes and cucumbers. Stir into rice mixture. Chill. Arrange on salad greens, if desired, and garnish with tomato wedges and cucumber slices. Makes 6 servings.

Super Beef and Squash Casserole
 1 lb fresh yellow or zucchini squash, sliced
 1 cup each chopped onions and green peppers
 1 lb. lean ground beef
 3 cups cooked rice
 2 eggs, beaten
 1 can (10 3/4 ozs) condensed cream of chicken soup
 1/2 cup sour cream
 1 tsp salt
 1/4 tsp pepper
 1 cup grated Cheddar cheese
 Cook squash and onions in salted water about 5 minutes. Drain well. Cook green pepper and meat until meat is no longer pink. Stir in rice. Blend eggs, soup, sour cream and seasonings. Stir into meat mixture. Fold in squash mixture. Turn into greased shallow 2-quart casserole. Top with cheese. Sprinkle with paprika, if desired. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes or until hot and bubbly. Makes 6 servings.

Beef Burgundy With Fruit
 1 1/2 lbs boneless beef chuck, cut in 1-inch cubes
 2 tbsps vegetable oil
 1 cup chopped onions
 2 cloves garlic, minced
 1/2 cup Burgundy wine
 3 beef bouillon cubes
 1 tbsps Worcestershire sauce
 1 1/2 cups water
 1 1/2 cups each diagonally sliced carrots and celery
 2 tbsps cornstarch
 1 tsp salt
 1/4 tsp pepper
 1 can (17 oz) fruits for salads (drain; reserve 1 cup syrup)
 3 cups hot cooked rice
 In a Dutch oven brown meat on all sides in hot oil. Add onions, garlic, wine, bouillon cubes, Worcestershire and water. Cover; simmer 40 minutes or until meat is almost tender. Stir in vegetables. Replace cover and continue cooking 20 minutes longer. Blend cornstarch, salt and pepper with reserved syrup. Add to meat mixture. Cook stirring, until clear and thickened, about 2 minutes. Gently mix in fruit. Serve over beds of fluffy rice. Makes 6 servings.

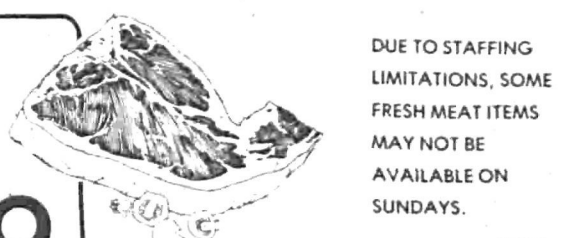
