

Betts quits sewer board, criticizes new manager

Byron Betts, chairman of the Lakehaven Sewer District Board of Commissioners, last week announced his intention to resign from the board and, in an unrelated matter, concurrently chastised the district manager for causing a "turmoil" within the district.

Betts said he intends to resign from the board July 5 apparently as a result of allegations that he retained his seat illegally.

"I don't want to cause embarrassment to the commissioners," Betts said at the Thursday night meeting of the board. "And I'm not about to have a running battle with...anyone."

The question of his legality surfaced earlier this year when it was discovered that Betts had moved out of his Redondo home into a north Tacoma home. Since that new residence is outside the sewer district boundaries, state law requires that Betts, a member of the board for eight years, resign his position on the board.

However, earlier allegations by the NEWS that Betts is an illegal commissioner were denied by Betts, who maintained that he

lives at his business, Enchanted Village, which is inside the sewer district boundaries.

WHILE NOT ACKNOWLEDGING that he does not live with in the district, Betts, in the absence of Commissioner John Sawyer, announced he will resign so as not to create problems within the district due to the question of his legality.

Following his resignation announcement, Betts was critical of both Sawyer, who apparently left town for a month without informing the other commissioners, and of district manager Russ David.

"The only thing that really bothers me now...is the new managers' opinion of how he handles interoffice procedures," Betts said, turning to David. "I've heard too many office blow ups."

"You know, we've had this problem before and that's why we looked for a new manager. I'm not so sure we're that far from it again, and that bothers me."

Betts recommended that Leonard Tripp, currently a Water District 124 commissioner, be appointed to fill his seat until his term expires in November. "I realize I have no power over who

is appointed to my position," he said, "but I would like to see someone who thinks along the same line and has the same interests (as I do)."

TRIPP, BETTS SAID, "has the community at heart," appears to work well with Sawyer, who also is a water district commissioner, and would serve well as the second commissioner to hold positions on both water and sewer boards, an advantage should the utilities opt to merge.

Commissioner Bob Green, obviously surprised by the resignation, said Betts will be missed on the board, adding "I hate to see him go, although I can understand his reasons he wouldn't run (for office) again."

Green agreed that Tripp would be an asset to the board. "If Leonard is willing to accept—and assuming it's satisfactory with John Sawyer — I would agree to his appointment," he said.

Tripp, who has been approached about assuming the position, has indicated some interest in the job but has not agreed to accept it.

Betts' replacement will not be named until Sawyer returns in July.

Suburban routes get Metro boost

Better bus service may be on the way to suburban King County. Metro Council has directed the staff to find a way to fund an additional 100,000 hours of suburban bus time in 1980. The increase is expected to cost about \$2 million. The 19-8 vote was split along Seattle-King County political lines with all the negative votes coming from the Seattle con-

tingent of the 37-member Metro Council.

Neil Peterson, Executive Director of the transportation and sewage company, said the move would "run us into a bind" eventually and could mean that money for much needed buses will not be there by 1981.

The move for more bus hours was led by County Council members Bill Reams, Gary

Grant, Tracy Owen and Paul Barden whose districts are suburban.

Reams called the request "modest" and said the suburbs should "be getting close to half-a-million hours (of new service) to bring it up to parity" with Seattle.

Mayor Charles Royer and other city officials contended, however, that 81 percent of Metro's riders live in the city and bus service should be strongest there. "While it's true that the suburbs need better service, it does no good to have people standing on street corners in Seattle being passed by buses" Royer said.

Councilman Paul Barden countered "There is a lot of difference between waiting for a second or third bus and not having a bus at all."

Proponents of the increase claim it would "not curtail service for anybody" on city routes.

Metro which has seen ridership skyrocket during the current gas shortage, is finding it difficult to meet the demands, according to staff. Chuck Collins, Transit Director, said "the demand for needs outstrips the supply. That is the simple fact." He said, however, the staff would make an effort to devise a "financially and operationally feasible plan" to meet the council's mandate.

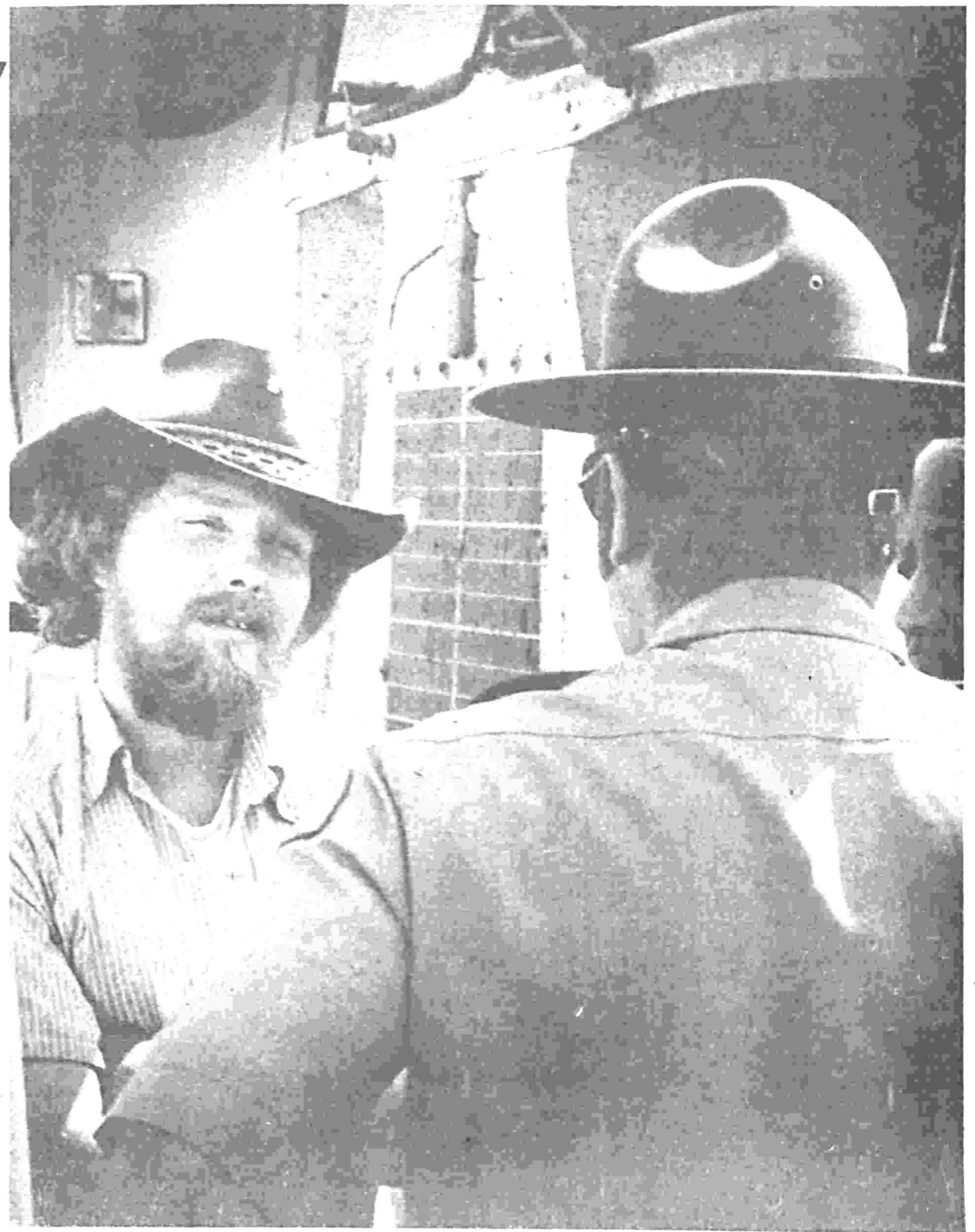
The only suburban member of the council to speak against additional service was Kent Mayor Isabel Hogan. She drew the wrath of Renton Mayor Charles Delaurenti and other suburban council members when she said "I'd be embarrassed if we had more buses running in Kent that are as empty as what we have now."

Reams called the comment "absolute nonsense" and said suburban drivers are "passing up stops because the buses are full." Reams also called for better routes to connect suburban centers. Riders cannot reach Auburn from Federal Way or Redmond from Woodinville, Reams said. He said a multi-level service concept was approved by the council years ago but "we're not anywhere near that yet."

The 1980 Metro budget calls for a transfer of \$7 million from the Flyer Stop program that serves suburban routes to help pay for cost overruns on the in-city trolley renovation and expansion. Reams said "it can't all just be give, give, give. Somewhere we need some equity."

The 100,000 hour increase would be in addition to 148,000 new hours already in the Metro budget for the suburban county and 98,000 new hours for city routes. The operating budget for the coming year is about \$76.7 million. Farebox revenues comprise only about \$19.4 million. The budget also reflects a \$6.3 million carry over from this year's budget, some of which has been suggested as the source for funding the requested suburban route improvements.

Following the requested staff work, another vote on the increased service will be needed.

Council to look at local Metro service

The Federal Way Community Council is discussing plans to conduct a study of the services that Metro Transit is providing locally, hoping to find ways to document members' claims that it is inadequate.

Harry Keinath, who is also one of two co-chairmen of the Federal Way City Committee, and Todd Johnstone, a councilman who belongs to Metro's Citizens' Transit Advisory Committee, are looking at ways the study might be conducted.

Keinath said that the idea for the inquiry came from an effort made by Bellevue, in which levels of service provided by Metro and various alternatives were scrutinized.

"It is interesting that some population forecasts say that Federal Way could surpass Bellevue in ten years, and yet in

the new study that Metro just completed, Federal Way isn't mentioned at all," Keinath said.

He said the problem is the result of Seattle's domination of the King County Council.

"Our council right now is playing right into Seattle's hands," Keinath said. "The city of Seattle contributes only 45 percent of Metro's revenues, but it gets 56.4 percent of the bus service."

He said that if Federal Way votes to incorporate, the study could be underwritten by a federal grant. "But as things are today," he said, "we're hoping to get some University of Washington graduate students to do it for us."

The decision to undertake the inquiry was made at Thursday night's community council meeting.

Truck protest appears to have fizzled locally

The independent truckers whose protest against rising fuel prices started Thursday at Federal Way said at the time that their activities were the beginning of what could become a nation-wide shutdown.

But far fewer truckers than were anticipated took part in a convoy that slowed rush hour traffic on Interstate 5, and a Washington State Patrol spokesman said Friday it appeared that no further protests would be forthcoming.

So for the time being at least, the truckers' movement appears to have fizzled out.

The protest was informally organized by Matt Berry and James Gallagher, two independent truckers who operate out of Arlington. They said it started with discussions via citizens' band radio channels and finally turned into a call for a road-blocking convoy that would go from the Evergreen Truck Stop on South 348th Street to Everett.

But state troopers and King County Police arrived at the truck stop well before the scheduled departure of the con-

voys, and told Gallagher, Berry and other truckers that a demonstration that blocked the freeway would not be permitted.

SO THE TWO organizers agreed to keep the protest vehicles in a single lane, travel at or near the 55-miles-per-hour speed limit and drive at least 100 yards apart. Though the agreement was later broken by some of the exuberant drivers, no citations were issued.

At one point, some of the rigs backed up northbound rush hour traffic for nearly two miles.

The truckers were protesting the 55-mile-per-hour speed limit, government regulations and the oil companies, all of which, they say, are putting them out of business.

"We used to be able to go from coast to coast for \$300," said William Mixon, a driver from Halleyville, Ala. "But now it costs us \$800. Everything has gone up but our rates. So we're going to shut it down just like we did in '73."

Almost unanimously, the drivers had harsh words for President Jimmy Carter and Gov. Dixy Lee Ray, neither of whom, they said, have any understanding of the trucking industry.

"HE OUGHT TO come out here

and ride with us sometime," said one of the drivers of the President. "Then he'd know what we're up against."

But the drivers were by no means unanimous in their willingness to participate in the protest. During the period in which the demonstration was getting started, the CB waves crackled with arguments between those who favored blocking the freeway with a convoy and those who said the demonstration would only anger the public.

Many motorists, watching the convoy pull out of the truck stop, blew their horns in support. Some of the truckers greeted the motorists with the old upraised-fist salute once used by 1960s radicals, and some of the motorists gleefully returned the gesture.

The truckers' original plans were changed when Lt. D. R. Cook and Sgt. W. W. McDowell of the state patrol convinced Berry and Gallagher to parley. The negotiations took place in a closed patrol car parked in front of a row of the big rigs.

When the four men climbed out of the patrol car at about 4 p.m., Gallagher and Berry said they wanted to hold a press conference in the offices of the truck stop.

"THEY TOLD us they'd stop us before we ever got started," Gallagher said of the troopers. "They said we'd be able to go only if we did it at reasonable speed and reasonable intervals."

He said the protest would succeed in making its point "only if the news media gets our story out to the right people."

Cook, who was also at the impromptu press conference, said that he and his officers are sympathetic with the truckers' plight.

"But we have to think about the safety of everybody on the road," he said.

Later, just before the convoy left, Gallagher said that "we were hoping for more than 100 trucks, but now we don't know how many will go."

A total of about two dozen of the big 18-wheel rigs took part, with many of the drivers accompanied by their wives or sweethearts.

I think they should execute all rapists and murderers.

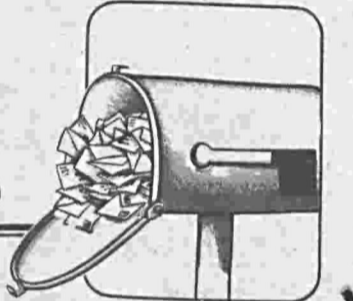

Last week I visited the most controversial classroom south of Seattle to see for myself what could be causing this great commotion.

The children in the third grade room at Beverly Park Elementary barely glanced at me as I entered the room. They didn't seem surprised to see a reporter.

There she was, Mindy the hamster, sleeping in the corner of a cage in a corner of the room. She was curled about the size of a golf ball.

Mindy, how could a dumb little hamster like you cause trouble like this? And there were the plants, four of them in little pots lining the window sill.

What a mess. This is one of those stories that never needed to be told. There are more important things going on.

But the story was told through the eyes of a fanatic mother of two children with serious allergies. Mrs. Norma Stroud's view of what happened was presented to the public via the Seattle Times. For some reason, the other side of the story was left out.

To say the least, Mrs. Stroud's story made two Beverly Park teachers, the principal, and Highline School District administrators in general seem like a collection of insensitive fools.

And they are angry about it. The story is simple enough, but completely different versions of what happened create confusion. This is the story I got by of talking with Mrs. Stroud, her children,

the two teachers involved and the principal.

In mid-May, Mrs. Stroud moved to White Center from Seattle and looked for a "clean" school for her children to attend. She found Mount View Elementary had too many trees and foliage on the grounds.

White Center Heights Elementary was overcrowded, so she chose Beverly Park because of the lack of trees on the grounds. Beverly Park principal Ron Lynch accepted the two children with the understanding, he said, that they were only concerned about trees and plants outside.

Mrs. Stroud and her son Steve accompanied daughter Debbie to the third grade classroom of Sandy Klein. The three inspected the room and when Mrs. Stroud discovered little Mindy in the corner, she said the creature must be removed.

Mrs. Klein said she took Mindy out, but told Mrs. Stroud it would only be for the remainder of the day, until she could talk the situation over with her teaching partner, Ann Watson, and Lynch.

Mrs. Stroud conferred with Lynch and told him the hamster would have to go. Lynch recalled her also complaining about the plants in the room, and said she suggested that the trees outside be chopped down. Lynch said Mrs. Stroud presented no medical records of her children's illnesses.

According to Mrs. Klein, the mother returned to the school and disrupted class twice later in the

day to see if the hamster was still out. It was.

During one visit, said Mrs. Klein, Mrs. Stroud thought she spotted Mindy in an aquarium, but it was only a hermit crab (no name).

Following school that day, the two teachers took the matter to a faculty-administration meeting where it was decided to put Mindy back in the room and not disturb the class curriculum.

When Debbie came to class the next morning, Mrs. Watson sat her in the front of the room and the hamster in the back. The two teachers said they watched Debbie all day and frequently asked her if she felt any sign of allergic reactions. There were none.

A conflicting report comes from Mrs. Stroud. She said Mrs. Watson literally forced Debbie to stay in the room with the hamster, with the words, "sit down and make the best of it." Mrs. Watson denies saying that.

Mrs. Stroud came to the classroom at the end of the day and discovered the hamster had returned. According to the teacher, Mrs. Stroud became angry and belligerent and threatened her with a lawsuit.

Mrs. Stroud then went to the principal and they discussed the problem at length. Lynch said he offered various alternatives for the remaining three weeks of school such as home tutoring, finding a larger school with more classes (Beverly Park has only one third grade class), or moving Debbie to a nearby fourth grade classroom where she would do her third grade work with help from various teachers.

Lynch said Mrs. Stroud accepted both the home tutoring and fourth grade classroom options but suddenly she got up in the middle of the conversation and walked out.

Mrs. Stroud has a different version. She said Lynch did not offer the fourth grade option, in fact he

virtually kicked her kids out of school with the words that three other schools didn't want the children, and neither did Beverly Park.

Lynch vehemently denies saying that.

That night, according to Mrs. Stroud, Debbie's face swelled up and she had trouble eating and sleeping. The two children have not returned to school since, and are now being tutored at home twice a week by a district teacher.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Stroud received a rather firm letter from Lynch stating his decision not to alter the classroom environment for Debbie's allergies. The letter also asked for a doctor's verification of the children's various illnesses, and that Mrs. Stroud provide an emergency telephone number (she has no phone).

Lynch said he wrote the letter in response to Mrs. Stroud's threat of a lawsuit.

So there's the story the best I can tell it. But one question remains that must be answered.

Why in the world couldn't the hamster and plants be removed from the classroom to accommodate Debbie's allergies?

Say the teachers, the plants and animals are truly class projects. Kids sign up and take turns being petkeepers or gardeners and this has been going on all year.

And there's a story behind furry little Mindy. At the beginning of the school year there were two different pet hamsters but both died. The youngsters bought Mindy with money they won from saving Campbell Soup labels. Mindy belonged to the kids and when they learned their pet might have to leave the room, "they were most upset to say the least," according to Mrs. Klein.

Lynch said he had to consider the possibility of having 30 parents on his case if he ruled the hamster was out.

Since this article is a column,

and on the editorial page, I'll express my opinion.

After listening to all sides of the story, I have to agree with the school's handling of the situation. The school people tried to accommodate Mrs. Stroud's daughter without disrupting 27 other children.

They were indeed sensitive to the situation. They sent tutors, a school nurse, a student placement officer and a social worker to the Stroud home to work the problem out. They offered feasible alternatives — for the life of me I don't see anything terrible about three weeks of school-provided home tutoring.

They cooperated up to a point — the point where anyone with any common sense would stop.

But there's no reason why Mrs. Stroud's children can't be placed next fall in a classroom suitable to her. School district administrators should make sure of that.

What really angers me is an editorial entitled "Overreaction in Highline," which appeared June 5 in the Seattle Times.

It recounted Mrs. Stroud's side of the story and labeled the bureaucratic decisions as being

laced with obstinance and insensitivity. It implied a lack of common sense among school officials in dealing with the matter.

Nonsense. With little or nothing to go on, the big time newspaper took a shot at one of the finest school districts in the state.

Let's look at who's insensitive. During the past several months, the Highline School District has made critically important decisions on the future of this district. Schools are being closed right and left, and the whole system has been revamped to accommodate middle schools.

The Seattle Times has virtually ignored all of this, the real news in the Highline School District.

The conclusion to the editorial stated this: "But sometimes big systems like school districts, that are able to live with the big problems, seem allergic to the little ones, occasionally breaking out in a small rash."

I'd like to amend that: "But sometimes big newspapers like the Seattle Times, that are able to handle the little problems, seem allergic to the big ones, occasionally breaking out in a sensational rash."

Crime report:

Auburn man jailed after 90 mph chase

King County Police arrested a 20-year-old Auburn man Thursday night after a wild chase that started at the intersection of South 296th Place and 32nd Place South and ended east of Kent.

Police said the man, who was on a motorcycle, had been pulled over in a routine traffic stop, took off at a high rate of speed. A dozen patrol cars were involved in the chase before it was over.

He apparently fled because he had no motorcycle endorsement on his driver's license. He was charged with reckless driving and reckless endangerment and was booked at the King County Jail.

During the chase, police said, the man's speed exceeded 90 miles-per-hour.

In other police news:

A 16-year-old Continuation High School student was collared on the school grounds Thursday and charged with stealing a coin machine from a vending truck earlier in the day.

The boy was taken to King County Youth Center after his mother refused to take custody of him. The coin dispenser was valued at about \$95 and contained about \$7 in change.

TWO STUDENTS at Thomas Jefferson High School were arrested Tuesday after they were spotted spray painting the walls of one of the school's buildings at about 2:30 p.m.

One of the boys, a 16-year-old, later admitted to several other acts of vandalism and to setting three arson fires at the school since March.

The other boy, a 17-year-old, admitted only to the incident for which he was collared. Both boys were released in the custody of their parents.

Two other teens were arrested Thursday and subsequently released in the custody of their parents after a King County Traffic Unit officer stopped their vehicle at the intersection of South 272nd Street and Pacific Highway.

The two, a boy of 17 who was

driving and a girl of 16 who was passed out in the back seat of the car, were pulled over after the officer observed the car weaving in and out of traffic.

Police charged the driver with racing, reckless driving and illegal possession and consumption of intoxicants. The girl, who woke up after the car was stopped, was charged with illegal possession and consumption also. Both are from Pierce County.

TWO THEFTS in which the loot exceeded \$500 were reported between Tuesday evening and Thursday night.

One of these, a residential burglary in which goods worth some \$1,500 were stolen, occurred Thursday night. The house, on 30th Avenue Southwest, was looted of firearms, jewelry and other items.

The other theft, a larceny, happened Wednesday at the Evergreen Truck Stop, where a parked tractor-trailer was looted of some \$1,535 in tarpaulins and other trucking equipment.

A total of 15 larcenies, three burglaries and four other acts of vandalism were reported during the period.

County police chief charged with assault

Assault charges were filed Friday in Seattle District Court against Chief Harold (Chal) W. Booth of the King County Department of Safety.

Booth is charged with the misdemeanor offense of simple assault stemming from an altercation May 23 in the King County parking garage. John Leggett told county police he was returning to the garage after a night class in the county administration building when he saw Booth, Officer Frank Porter and a female companion.

He said he rode the elevator with the trio and both Booth and the woman appeared to be extremely intoxicated. Leggett said he started to leave in his car but stopped and went over to Booth's car to see if he could help him.

Leggett said he was concerned about Booth's ability to drive. Booth became "incensed" according to court documents and struck Leggett on the arm and face after flashing his police badge at the man. Leggett went back to his car with Booth in pursuit. The chief allegedly kicked Leggett's car several times.

After Booth and the woman drove away, Porter drove up, told

the man who he was and asked him what he was doing in the garage. Leggett got the number of the car Porter was driving and reported it to county police.

Booth is a 23-year veteran of the county police force and is currently chief of the bureau of staff services which includes the civil and fiscal and property management sections of the department. His annual salary is \$39,780. He was an investigator for the State Liquor Control Board before joining the department in 1956.

Director of Public Safety Lawrence Waldt said Friday he would take the "absolutely, totally appropriate action; take it in a logical fashion and wait until the court makes a decision" before taking any action involving Booth. Waldt said "his work is in no way impacted by this incident."

Leggett, a volunteer fireman, passed a polygraph (lie detector) test before the charges were filed.

Trial is set before Seattle District Court Judge Betty Taylor Howard. A plea of guilty could be entered before June 18.

\$55 million bond sale seen for POS

The Port of Seattle commissioners will consider a \$55 million bond sale Tuesday, nearly half of which would be used for improvements at Sea-Tac Airport.

Port Executive Director Richard Ford said Friday the bonds would be part of a \$125 million package agreed to earlier this year by the commission for waterfront and airport improvements. About half of the total package will go for land acquisition near the airport, Ford said.

The \$24 million portion in the proposed package for Sea-Tac improvements has been agreed to by the airlines which use the airport, Ford said. The airlines refinance the bond payments, he said. The estimated landing fee

increase will be about \$.10 per 1,000 pounds or from the current fee of \$1.20 to about \$1.30 per landing. Sea-Tac already has one of the highest landing fees in the country.

Ford said it is somewhat of a departure for the Port to use bond money for land acquisition although it was done in the early days of airport development. In 1972, federal money for such acquisition, known as ADAP money, was made available to the Port. To date, about \$700,000 of surplus homes in the north and south clear zones have been purchased.

The proposed bond scheme is the "first of two major bond issues over the next two years," according to Ford.



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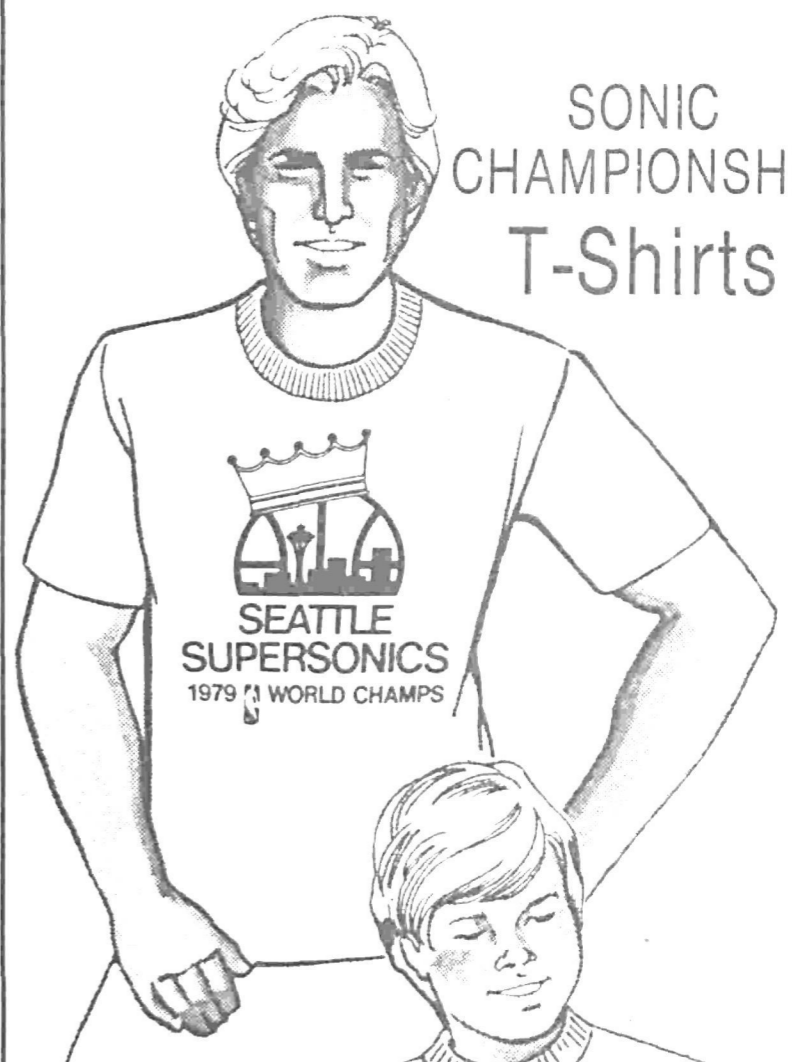
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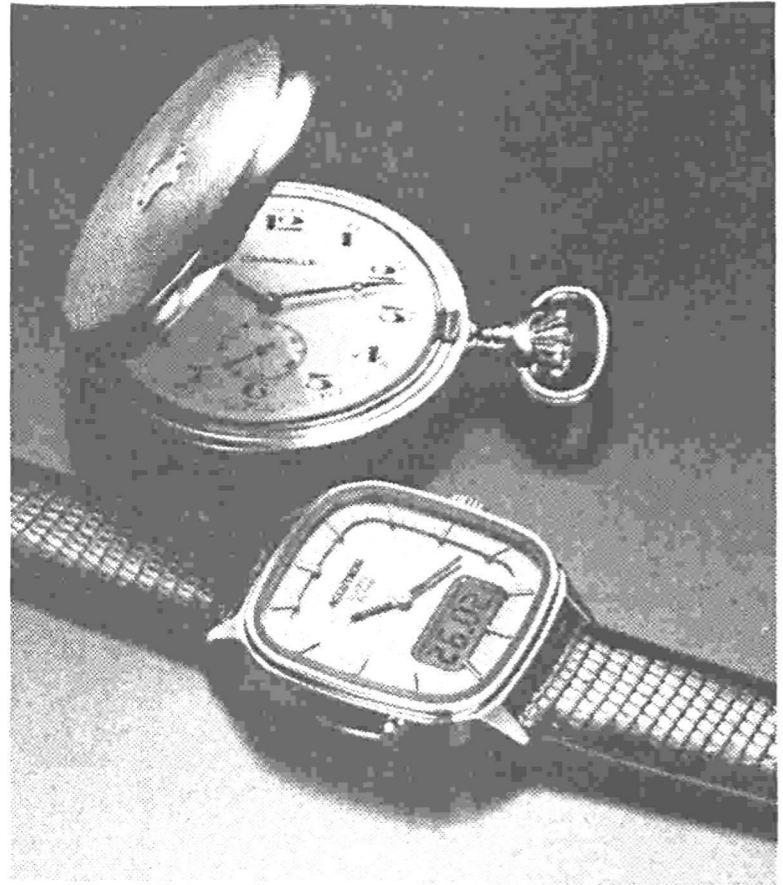
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Grass Roots Gardening

The flower of Gemini, whose date is from May 22 to June 21, is the perennial poppy, papaver. Most spectacular of this plant tribe are P. orientale, Oriental Poppy. The coarse, hairy, fringed, divided leaves are fern green. The strong bold plants grow about four feet tall and form a dense row along a fence, border or mass plantings.

In May and June the three- to six-inch flowers appear. Many have single rows of petals, some double and all have glistening black centers. Each petal's texture resembles crinkly silk. Colors range from Oriental red, salmon, raspberry, lavender to white. Many named varieties are available but the names are not as important as acquiring a variety of colors. Most large mail order nursery concerns sell rooted poppy plants.

Shortly after blooming, plants die back. In early fall foliage grows again and lasts over winter quickly growing to maturity in warm spring weather. Set the plants about 18 inches apart. Cut spent blooms so they do not set seed. The seeds do not come true to color and generally revert back to red blooms.

Gypsophila (baby's breath) is often planted as a filler in

Oriental poppy beds to fill in when the poppies go dormant in late summer. Other companion plants to set out with Oriental poppies are bearded iris and violas.

Less well known but charming garden plants are P. burseri, the alpine poppy. Two-inch flowers of white, orange, yellow and salmon bloom in April and May. Foliage is refreshing blue-green with nearly hairless divided leaves. The foliage grows in basal rosette forms with five- to eight-inch tall flower stems arising from the rosette. Alpine poppies are excellent rockery plants but may be short lived. Seeds planted in fall or very early spring will bloom the first spring.

P. nudicaule, the Iceland poppy, blooms May to frost. The divided leaves

have coarse hairs and the one- to two-foot high slender stems are also hairy. Blooms are cup shaped to three inches wide and slightly fragrant. The hues range from white, cream, yellow, orange, salmon and rose to pink. To prolong bloom period, pick the flowers frequently.

All poppies require full sun, ordinary soil and good drainage. Do not over water poppies and most of all, never fertilize papavers.

Poppies are excellent cut flowers but there is a conditioning requirement to prevent each cut bloom from wilting. Immediately after cutting the blooms, light a candle and sear the cut end in the candle flame until the stem end is black and sealed. Another method is

to heat an open pan of water to boiling. Carefully bundle cut blooms in newspapers leaving cut stem ends exposed. The paper keeps the heat from marring the blooms. Hold cut stem ends in the boiling water for two minutes. After searing stems in candle flame or boiling water place ends in a pail of cool water in a cool dim area for at least four hours. Blooms will then last in arrangements for several days.

The shiny black center stamen pollen can stain so carefully spray the centers of each poppy with hair spray to seal the pollen so it doesn't sift onto linens, mats, fine woods, etc.

Whether gardeners are Gemini or not, all should cultivate Geminis' flower, the poppy, for gay spring and summer color spots.

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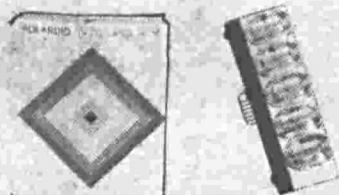
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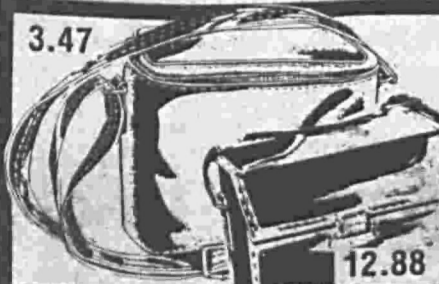
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Crime reports:

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Kent-Des Moines Road to be upgraded

At certain stages of the work, traffic will be controlled by flagmen on a one-way basis. However, the roadway will be open to traffic at all times, the department reports.

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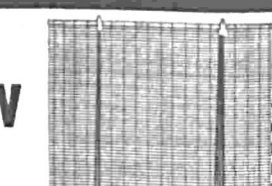
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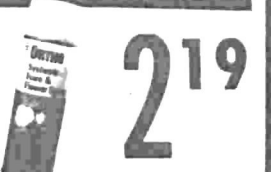
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'Be assertive'

Divorcees, widows building new lives

(In an earlier article, Karen Johnson and Alice Plummer were introduced as participants in a displaced homemakers program. Today, their progress toward a place in the business world as independent women and their recent activities in the program are reported.)

A circle of women sat in a classroom at Highline Community College Tuesday afternoon and talked about what their lives are like now that they're not married.

With gentle prodding from Jan Reha, director of the Pre-Vocational Program for Displaced Homemakers, they told each other about the trials, tribulations, and successes in rebuilding their lives after being divorced, separated, or widowed.

Foremost in the minds of many of the women was a growing willingness to be independent and do the things required of in-

dependence — "becoming assertive," as Reha put it.

Karen Johnson, separated and awaiting a divorce, is one who is beginning to take a stand when necessary.

"WHEN YOU get control of your life, decide what you want to do, and do it," she asserted.

Relating to the group the case of a friend who sought too much solace from her when he was divorced, Johnson said, "I told him, 'You've got to decide what you want to do. I'm not going to help you.'"

Several other women, when asked by Reha to discuss "what good things happened to me this week," told of situations they'd grown tired of and dealt with by declaring, "I've had enough."

Each account brought applause from other members of the group and plaudits from Reha.

"I want to congratulate each of you for standing up for yourself

and going with the consequences," she said.

"What I want us to start doing more is doing some of your own problem-solving."

The 12-week program — now half completed — is geared to bring the participants face-to-face with their personal problems and emotions brought on by suddenly being single again.

THE PROGRAM is also designed to make the women active working members of society, either for a first or second time in their lives. But first, they must decide what profession to pursue, which was the purpose of a visit Tuesday to the career exploration center in the HCC library.

Field trips and interviews with working professionals will also lead up to a mid-July job sampling that will place the women in an on-the-job situation and give them some experience in the field they think is "theirs."

Johnson has decided cosmetics is to be her career.

"I like people, and I want to work with people," she said. "Cosmetics seems to be a good thing for me to go into. Maybe some kind of social work would be good for me, too."

Alice Plummer already has some nursing training, and she wants to expand it and enter the medical industry now that she and her husband have separated.

All of the women have been tested to discern their personalities and how their personalities will affect them on the job.

It's a difficult period, but ultimately rewarding, Reha said.

"I'm so glad this is a 12-week course," she noted. "Most programs like this are five sessions and that's it. With our program, we can take time to digest what we've done and discussed and to re-energize."

Citizens give tips against gas crunch

The "little guys" are fighting back against the gas shortage. Here are some of John Q. Citizen's ideas.

Patrick Jordan of Burien was waiting in line at a First Avenue South and South 157th Street service station recently. Only Jordan wasn't wasting gas by starting and stopping each time the line inched forward.

He was coasting. Downhill. To get the energy-free trip, he released his brakes to move ahead.

Jordan suggested that lines on either side of the gas pump islands be marked "for regular" or "for unleaded" or whatever, thus segregating users to speed the lines.

TOM HARRIS of Federal Way believes he knows how to combat potential pump prices.

The dilemma that Harris wants to outsmart is that station operators may have to pay about \$300 per pump for equipment conversion whenever gas reaches \$1 per gallon. Pumps generally only have three slots, accommodating, say, 81.9. Harris knows that the \$300 may be passed onto consumers.

"Here is a simple solution," he said. "Leave the pumps alone, but make the price read 50 cents and put a sign on each pump like this:

"This price is for a half a gallon. Your total cost will be double the cost registered on the pump."

Emma Harris, his wife, plugs the 80-year-old's brainstorm. "Tom has good common sense," she said.

Timing your trips is important to Mike Reichenberger, Burien, who steers clear of Mondays and Fridays when shopping for gas. On Tuesday, he was waiting in a short line, avoiding the before and after weekend rush.

OTHERS, like Harvey Sprague and Ralph Burkhard, both of Burien, counter the crunch by

simply driving less. "I cut down my driving by 50 percent," Sprague said. "As long as I can drive to work and go shopping, I can endure this."

Then there's good, old chain letters. Only today's chain letter is currently circulating locally with the message:

"If you believe this entire situation was contrived by the oil companies, this letter should be of some interest to you... Now, no one in the world understands the first law of economics better than a major oil company: 'Charge what the traffic will bear.'"

"There is absolutely no way we can take on all the major oil companies so let's start with one. Shell Oil Company on July 1, 1979. We think we should start with Shell for two reasons: It is foreign owned; it was the first company to ration gasoline to its dealers... So mark your calendars July 1 — 'To Hell With Shell' — and just don't buy any more Shell products until we get their attention. In addition, make five copies of this letter and send it to five friends..."

SOME ADVOCATE increasing air pressure in tires to cut gas consumption. Others argue that overinflation wears out tires faster.

Lee Johnson, U.S. Department of Energy spokesman, said:

"Inflating tires five pounds over the suggested pressure will probably give fuel savings over wear in tire tread. (However) you may have to buy a new tire a week before you normally would."

When motorists load up for vacation, he suggested overinflating because the extra load actually can offset the overinflation.

Then there are those who practice alternatives.

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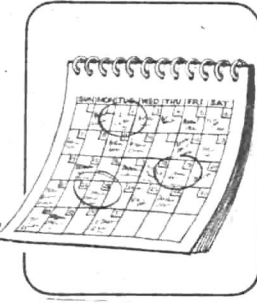

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Auto repairmen miffed at mischaracterizations

Local auto repairmen have voiced opposition to the Department of Transportation's auto repair survey as inaccurate and mischaracterizing their industry.

The survey, which found 53 percent of each service dollar was spent on unnecessary repairs, was based on the work performed by 62 automobile repair shops in seven cities. According to Lloyd Erdahl of Lloyd's Auto Clinic Inc. in Midway, the survey was not based on a representative number of shops and cannot typify the majority of repair business throughout the country.

However, he does admit there are some "rip-off" shops, "But they don't stay in business for very long," he said.

Owners such as Erdahl and Gailen Olson of Evergreen Auto Repair in Federal Way, explained many of the major problems that exist between the customer and the auto mechanic is the lack of communication and the customer unfamiliarity with the car.

Olson points out that under state law shops are required to provide written estimates and obtain oral or written permission from a customer if the price should exceed the original estimate.

In this area some repair shops charge

for estimates while others do not, "I have talked with several shops and they say they cannot afford to write estimates all

County-wide no-shooting ordinance possible

Benedict shoots to quell firearm-caused destruction

Sal Benedict is gunning after those who are indiscriminately using their guns to destroy the natural habitat around his Spyder Lake property.

Benedict, who lives in the Riverton Heights area but spends most of his leisure time on his Spyder Lake property, isn't going to shoot anyone. He is going through proper channels in an attempt to prevent anyone or anything from being the victim of a bullet.

His quest for preservation around Spyder Lake, a two-acre private lake near South 360th and 54th South, comes too late for some of the former resident wildlife. Last week, two adult geese and their two goslings suddenly disappeared from their nest on the lake shore. Benedict suspects the geese were gunned down.

"I'VE SEEN IT happen before," he said. "Two years ago,

I saw a man shoot a goose on the lake," he said. "I've caught youngsters with guns shooting on my property. They're trespassing. The police tell you that you're supposed to hold them until they arrive. In one case, the kid was a lot bigger than I was, so I followed him home. His father told me to get the hell off his property."

State wildlife agent Bruce Richards, who covers the South King County area from his Enumclaw base, said that illegal killing of animals is a continuing problem faced by the State Game Department and police agencies.

"It's mainly young people out to have a kick. If you have jerks — and the poacher is the classic jerk — they will shoot anything they want. They haven't learned respect for their surroundings or firearms."

Occurrences at Spyder Lake verify Richards' sentiments. Recently, shots were fired at an

occupied cabin. The owner, who chose to remain anonymous, complained and received threats from youths involved in firearms useage around the lake. That cabin and another house, occupied by a family of four, are the only two permanent residences on the two-acre lake. However, 30 homes are within a two-block distance of the lake shore, and more residential growth is expected in the area.

"With more people coming in, the danger of someone being shot increases," Benedict said. "When you figure there are over 30 houses within two blocks and a .22-calibre bullet has the range of one mile, you see that the danger is present."

IT IS LEGAL to discharge firearms in the Spyder Lake area because of its sparse population. Benedict has been trying to change Spyder Lake's status to a non-shooting area. He has contacted the office of King County Councilman Paul Barden but is disenchanted with the results.

"I guess he's too busy dealing with topless dancing to concern himself with the (Spyder Lake) situation," Benedict muttered.

On Oct. 23, he received a letter from Barden's office saying the matter was being looked into. Three months later, King County Councilman Gary Grant introduced an ordinance proposal that would make the Jovita and Spyder Lake areas no-shooting

zones. The proposal passed the county's Operations, Police and Judiciary (OPJ) Committee, but later testimony against a no-shooting zone by a Spyder Lake area hunting dog trainer postponed further council action.

According to Dennis English, staff advisor to the OPJ Committee, the council is holding off on actions pertaining to specific areas until June 18. On that date, a proposal on changing an eastside area to a no-shooting zone will be submitted. When that occurs, councilman Tracy Owens of North Seattle probably will issue an ordinance proposal that would make all of King County a no-shooting zone, English predicted. Owens already has a

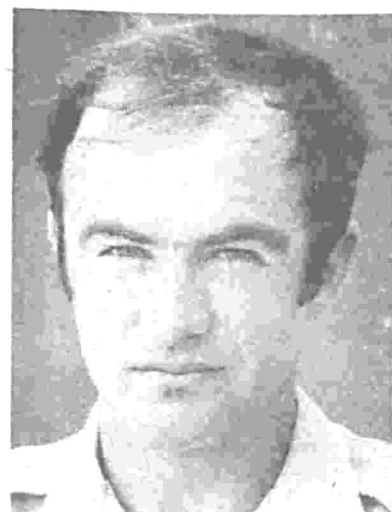
draft of his county-wide proposal ready for consideration.

ENGLISH CONSIDERS Owens' proposal as a remedy to the county's problem with unlawful indiscriminate destruction of wildlife and property through firearms misuseage.

"The Department of Public Safety (the King County police) says it's impossible to enforce shooting and hunting regulations when you have all these isolated areas, where it's OK to shoot firearms, sprinkled around the county," he said. "If we designate larger no-shooting areas or make the whole county a no-shooting area, enforcement would be easier."
