## Chamber withdraws support of Auburn General plans

Auburn General Hospital has lost the support of the Federal Way Chamber of Commerce in its application for a "Certificate of Need" to build a \$1 million emergency health care facility in West Campus.

The board of directors of the Chamber voted Monday to withdraw its letter of support for the facility and has organized a task Force of Federal Way area physicians and community members to explore the alternatives and make a recommendation for a future course of action.

In the letter to the Certificate of Need Unit of the state office of Health Planning and Development, the Chamber said it questioned the need for an additional emergency center in the area when two are already in ex-

istence, and is "particularly concerned that a unit such as proposed may, in the future, hinder the development of a complete medical facility for our citizens."

The board supported the Auburn proposal in an April 16 letter to the state unit. Since that time there has been interest from several areas in providing more complete medical facilities.

FEDERAL WAY presently has the Minor Emergency Center at South 320th and Pacific Highway South, and the St. Joseph Hospital sponsored Emergency Medical Center in the Torquay medical complex on South 348th. In addition, National Medical Enterprises Inc., a Los Angeles, Calif. based group, has expressed interest in building a full hospital.

Bill Erickson, Auburn General administrator, said he was not surprised at the Chamber action. "As I understood their (the Chamber's) original action, it was endorsing a concept rather than any specific concept. I presume that in withdrawing they're going to give it more thought and I think that's probably good."

Erickson also said Auburn has asked for a 30-day extension on its Certificate of Need application in order to work with the Tacoma hospitals at reaching agreement on future Federal Way medical facilities.

The Auburn administrator said "it looks very hopeful" that agreement can be reached within the 30 day extension.

## Finger pointed in sewer district strife

Tension appears to hang in the offices of the Lakehaven Sewer District these days, a tension that some employees of the district maintain has been building for four months.

That's how long the new operations manager has been on the job.

Stress between that manager, Russ David, and office manager Caroline Meyer surfaced at the Lakehaven commissioners' meeting two weeks ago when the two managers could not agree on a process for handling developer extension agreements, necessary paperwork in a sewer district. At that time, Commissioner Chairman Byron Betts chastised David for creating problems within the functioning of the district.

Investigation since that meeting proved that agitation with the new manager runs deeper than with Meyer alone. Three members of the office—the branch of the sewer district that oversees accounting—and the chief inspector also voiced discontent last week with the activities of the new manager.

The conflict appears to center around procedural changes initiated by David since he was hired by the district in January. Meyer, who has worked in the district books for five years, and inspector Roger Gates, who has been with the district for 20 years, agree that those changes are unnecessary and create problems

with smooth operation of the district.

MOST OF THOSE problems are in overlapping of the operations and accounting functions of the district. Commissioner Betts maintains that when David was hired, he was strictly instructed to direct district operations alone, leaving the office management to Meyer. Furthermore, Betts said, both managers were instructed to work out their jobs wherever they interfaced. Meyer said she has attempted to do that but has received little cooperation from David.

It's David's apparent need for control of certain properties necessary to accounting that is causing much of the conflict, Meyer maintains. Some of the women who work in the office agree.

Judy Taylor, the accountant for both Lakehaven and Water District 124, objects to David's insistence on seeing all purchase orders and subsequent slowing down of the bill paying. "The books are open to him. Why does he need to have a copy of every purchase order?" Taylor asked.

SHE ALSO complains that bills get lost in David's office and are paid late and that David requests blanket vouchers for commissioners' meetings that create a conflict with water district vouchers.

David responded that he was not aware of the purchase order problem. Meyer said she told

David they had to speed up the process.

David said he sometimes keeps bills if there appears something may be incorrect and that Meyer should remember which bills he has in his possession. "I have better things to do than remember where all the bills are," Meyer said.

As for the vouchers, David said that Meyer sets that deadline. "I could receive them the next day," he said. "No, he set the deadline so he could include the voucher in the meeting packets," Meyer said.

PAT FUHRMAN, executive office secretary, complains that records previously stored in the safe now are kept in David's office. That creates a problem because the records are not in one area.

"We talked about getting a fifth book to keep these unprocessed assessments in the main office but we haven't done it," David said. Meyer said she'd never heard him mention moving those assessments from his office.

Ielene Mosich, office supervisor, says she has problems billing developer agreements because she doesn't receive them to record. She added, however, that after three months of seeing no developer agreements, six appeared on her desk last week after David was criticized by the board for his handling of that paperwork.

At the bottom line, it's the district that is damaged from confused procedures. "Russ and I still get our paychecks. It's the district that's losing out," Meyer said.

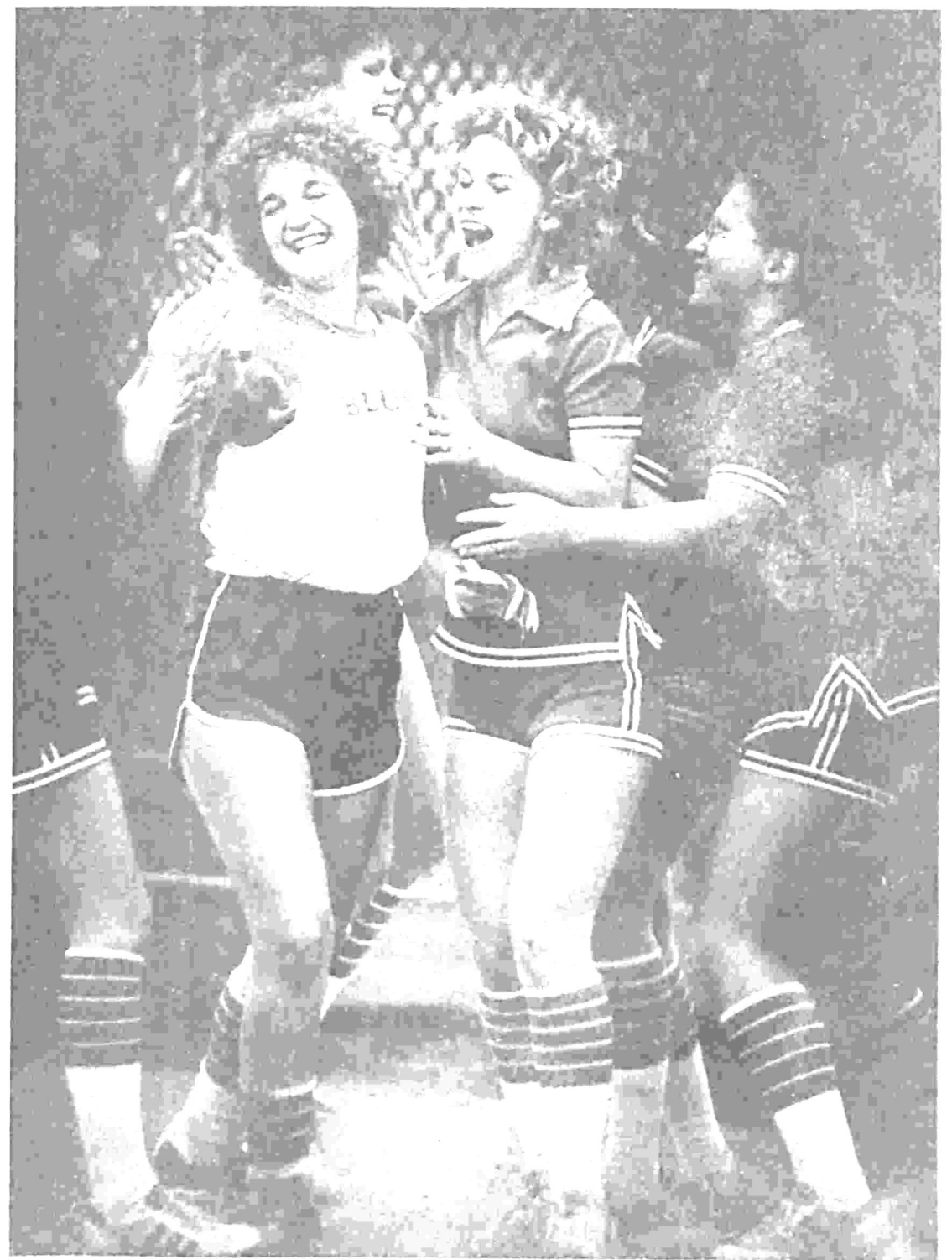
SHE EXPLAINED that after presenting perfect books to the state auditor for five years, there now is a real threat that the district's books will be unacceptable. "I feel for five years I've created a good image for the district," Meyer said. "With this situation I can't be sure of that. If I don't get proper documentation to do the books properly, I may think seriously about leaving."

Inspector Gates already has turned in his resignation, but is in the process of reconsidering. He gave his reasons for resigning as personal but "once a week since he (David) has been there I've been on the verge of quitting." Gates said the working atmosphere is just deteriorating.

Commissioners Betts and Bob Green agree there is a problem they'll have to help work out. While Green declined to comment on whether he is satisfied with either David's or Meyer's work, Betts said he is "disappointed" in Russ and supportive of Meyer who, he said, has proven her ability in the office.

Green did say, however, that if the problem can't be worked out and the problem remains disruptive, the board will have to take drastic action and get rid of the problem.

Commissioner John Sawyer is out of town and not available for comment. The other two commissioners said they would address the problem at tomorrow's commissioners' meeting.

## Victim in local shooting jailed after gun incident

A 25-year-old Tacoma man who narrowly escaped death in a gangland-style shooting last fall was arrested Sunday and charged with displaying a firearm during an argument at a Federal Way discotheque.

The suspect, Ferdinand Velasco Liwanag, was booked at King County Jail and released at about 10 a.m., King County Police and jailers' records show.

Liwanag was shot in the back of the head on Oct. 30, 1978, as he was standing at the bar in The Forum, a posh Federal Way nightclub that caters to relatively high class clientele.

The bullet, fired from a .25 caliber pistol, passed through the bony portion of his skull and lodged near his nose, missing his brain entirely.

Liwanag was hospitalized for some time following the October incident.

His assailant, Noel Z. Castillo, 21, of Seattle, was convicted of the shooting and sentenced to prison.

Police believe the October incident was connected to an ongoing rivalry between three Filipino gangs that are part of the Pacific Northwest underworld.

But at the time of the October shooting, police said they had been unable to link Liwanag to any of the gangs.

Liwanag was talking with a security guard in the discotheque's parking lot at the time the gun was displayed.

Two men in an automobile drove past where the victim was standing, they said, and one held up the revolver so that it could be seen through the car window, apparently as a warning.

Liwanag was shot in the back of the head on Oct. 30, 1978, as he was standing at the bar in The Forum, a posh Federal Way nightclub that caters to relatively high class clientele.

## Gasoline tax now highest in nation

Thanks to the 1977 Legislature, Washingtonians will soon be paying what the Washington State Research Council says is the highest state gasoline tax in the nation.

And the reason, ironically, is that the legislators wrote a tax law with a sliding scale, so the tax rate goes up as the price of gasoline climbs.

The tax, which was challenged in an unsuccessful referendum last year, is based on a complicated formula which weighs three factors.

These are the price of gasoline at the pump, the amount of gasoline that motorists are buying, and the demands of the state budget.

The tax is structured so that it can range between nine and 12 cents-per-gallon, with 12 cents being the current maximum.

As soon as the law was passed the tax jumped from nine to 11 cents, which is where it stands today.

BUT IN JULY the tax will go to the uppermost level, not because consumption is down but because price and budgetary needs are up.

The increase, says a Washington State Research Council report, is the only state-level tax hike that will be facing residents this year.

Most of the money raised by

the tax, says the council, an independent research and watchdogging agency, goes to build and maintain roads and highways.

The council's report, dated June 15, did not comment on the irony of additional money going for road and highway programs in the middle of a fuel shortage that is sharply curtailing automobile travel.

But motorists, who have seen the price of gasoline soar from about 65 cents per gallon to 90 cents and above since January—that's an increase in price of nearly 50 percent—will no doubt supply the comments themselves.

The tax rate is set by the state Department of Licensing, which under the 1977 law was made responsible for recalculating the tax rate every six months.

Advocates of the 1978 referendum, which sought to throw the tax out, claimed that it was a regressive measure that would actually discourage conservation.

They also argued that the tax was unnecessary and that it would pump into road and highway programs funds that should more properly be spent on mass transit.

And of course they predicted that the tax would quickly rise to the maximum rate permitted by the law.

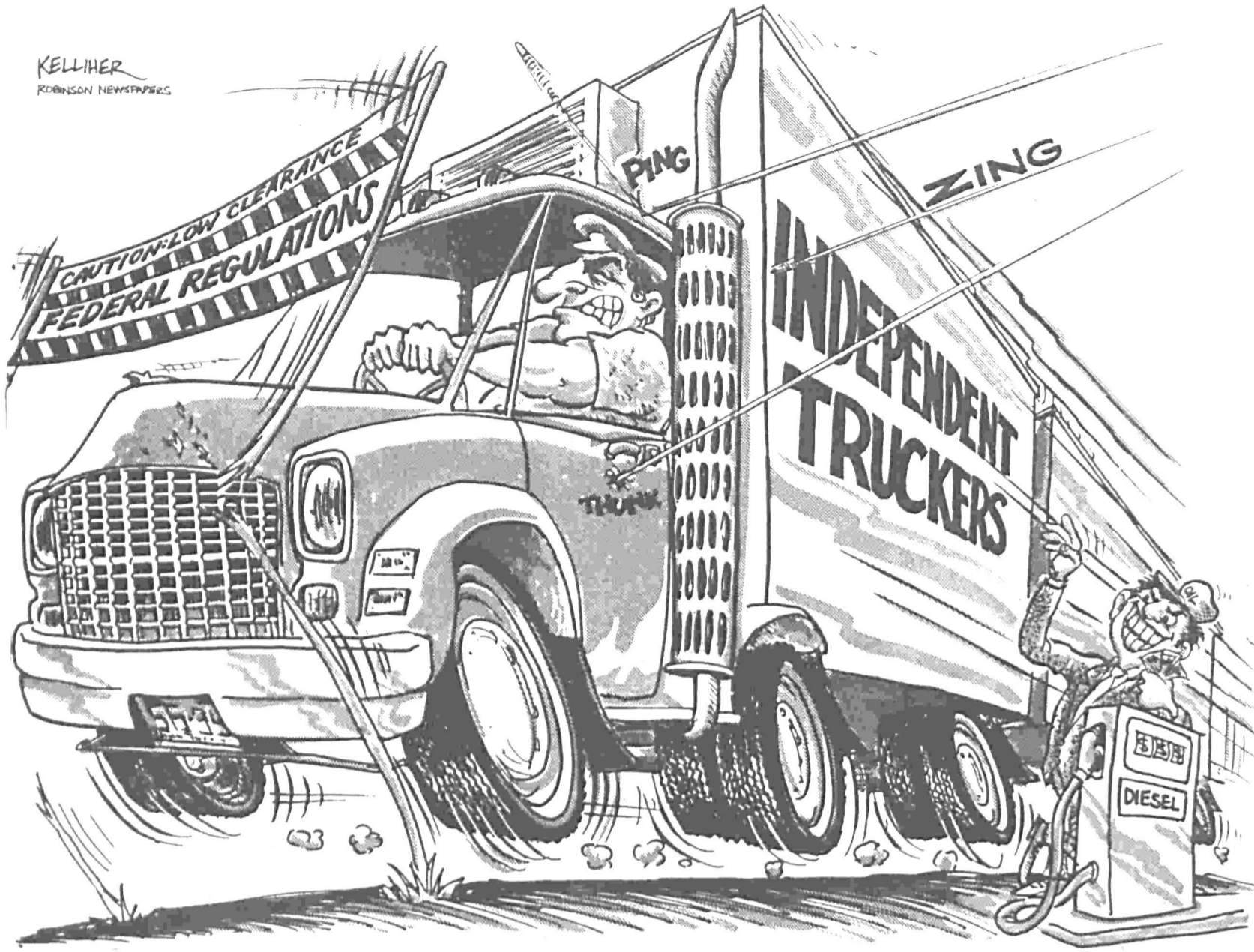

## The truckers have got a point

Usually we view strikes, walk outs, shut downs and lockouts as counterproductive, disruptive and on the bottom line, detrimental to those doing the picketing. Sometimes however, there just doesn't appear to be any alternative. Such was the case last year in the United Mine Workers strike, and such is the case in the recent slowdown of the American independent truckers. We condemn and abhor the sniping incidents and other violence associated with the

truckers' protest, and we think they're off base on the 55 mile an hour speed limit issue. But when it comes to skyrocketing diesel fuel prices, the scarcity of same, and federal regulations, they've got a point and a problem. Truckers rates are regulated by the federal government via the Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC). However there's no such regulatory agency when it comes to the price of

diesel, the cost of tires and maintenance, or the interest on the bank payments on the 18-wheel rig. The ICC has approved a 5.6 percent surcharge to help offset the increased price of fuel. The truckers have said this isn't enough and it probably isn't. Truckers, it seems, have no choice but to resort to social protest to call attention to their plight. As one trucker at a blockaded Federal Way truck stop put it, "It doesn't make any dif-

ference (profit wise) if I'm sitting here or hauling on the road." We sympathize with the plight of the hard working, independent trucker and support the idea of a surcharge that would be tied to increasing fuel costs and subject to ICC review every 30 days. Over the long haul, the consumer will pay for it in higher prices, but it's only fair that the truckers be allowed to make a living.

## Club's land should go to proposed park

Although few decisions of magnitude have been rendered by the Brooklake Community Club throughout recent years, the organization's stockholders may soon be faced with a decision that could greatly affect the future of a state park planned for the area. That natural swamp park is planned for 135 acres of land adjacent to the community club's 15 acres on South 356th Street just west of Pacific Highway South. But whether

that 15 acres is deeded to the park will determine whether the recreation area will have adequate access and whether it will include a building, currently the clubhouse, in which to house a center for the park. According to area residents who have been planning the park for several years, obtaining the community club land is key to progress because the center is vital to educate the park's visitors on the geological structure and for-

mation of a swampland. Without such information, the park would be virtually meaningless to many. Despite this obvious benefit to the general public, the local American Legion is contending that it, too, has a right to the building and has requested that the land be donated to that organization. Suggestions that the building be donated to both groups have been heard, but we do not think such a plan is feasible.

The land should be donated to the park—and only to the park—to ensure that the greatest number of people have unrestricted access to the unique wetland. To allow one special-interest organization use of the clubhouse would only set a dangerous precedent for similar requests by other groups. We encourage the community club stockholders to weigh the alternatives carefully. The answer can only be to deed the land to the park.

## No more guessing on airport noise

Sea-Tac International Airport and its neighbors are soon to embark on a new era with the recent installation of a noise monitoring system and around the airport. The system is now in place — noise monitors are set up in nine areas surrounding the airport with data being fed into a central terminal in the airport garage — but the equipment is being "debugged" and accurate readings won't be available until this fall. But come this fall, the quantity of noise from the planes flying in and out of Sea-Tac will no longer be a

matter of guesswork. The aircraft noise has not been accurately monitored since 1973 when the noise remedy programs in the Sea-Tac Communities Plans went into effect. Those noise remedy programs — home acquisition, sound insulating and home purchase guarantees — were based largely on the sound readings taken in 1973 and estimates of future noise impact. But those estimates could be way off, particularly if you look only at the dramatic increase in passenger traffic at the airport. Because of federal mandates, jets are becoming quieter. Additionally, the wide-bodied aircraft of today carry hundreds more passengers than the aircraft

of 1973. So the quantity of noise hitting areas around the airport has been anybody's guess and will continue to be until the permanent noise monitoring system begins operation. The results from the monitoring system may dictate the future of noise remedy programs in noise-impacted areas, something vitally important to residents there. We're delighted to see the monitoring system become reality, and we congratulate the Port of Seattle for a promise come true.

I got burned out on graduation ceremonies when I was in my high school band. Every June for four years straight, I sat in the hot gymnasium and trumpeted "Pomp and Circumstance" over and over until my lips felt like they were going to fall off. It was tough being a trumpeter in a commencement ceremony, especially if you had allergies, as I did. A few toots, a few sneezes. A few more toots, a few more sneezes. Graduation was always a bore and a hassle. Even my own. Therefore, I wasn't too excited a few weeks ago when my wife informed me I was to attend her graduation exercises at the University of Washington. I'd be spending another long afternoon in a stuffy gymnasium listening to speeches from long-winded aristocrats. Cathy assured me that I'd be proud to see her go through the graduation ceremony. After all, it marked the end of four years of dinnerless evenings, "I've-got-to-study" weekends and numerous letters from the bank informing us we were overdrawn. Putting someone through college is no easy task these days. In our case a moderate income (Cathy worked before she went to college) was replaced with bills, bills and more bills. Bills for books, bills for campus parking, bills for campus parking tickets, bills for tuition (that was a killer!) and bills from restaurants via VISA. And oh, her endless hours of studying. Night after night, all I saw of my wife was her head stuck in a book. I'd ask a question: "Did you fix anything for dinner?" Silence. "Would you like me to fix something?" Silence. ## Plan gets support

The concept of preserving the Brooklake area as a state wetlands area with the Community Club as an educational interpretive center, was endorsed Monday by the Federal Way Chamber of Commerce board of directors. The area involved is a 150 acre tract south of South 356th. The plan is to preserve the area, which is the West Hylebos headwaters as a nature trail system. "This project, we believe, would be a regional attraction and very compatible with the nearby Festival in the Forest. It

might be possible to physically connect the two areas through the system of greenbelts," the Chamber said in a letter to Francis L. Marckx, a property owner and spearhead of the plan. The Festival in the Forest is a planned \$20 million performing arts complex on the shores of Panther Lake. The letter, which was sent to various state and federal politicians, urged that "all speed" be made in achieving maximum visibility to the concept to ensure a timely plan for the acquisition of the area.

# Sleeping freeway giant awakens

The day that motorists can drive on the State Route 509 freeway draws ever closer. Construction is booming into full gear.

The \$5.5 million extension between South 165th and 188th streets is expected to be completed in mid-1980.

Motorists driving along South 188th Street, near Eighth Avenue South, can watch construction unfold on the overpass, anticipated for completion this fall.

A wood framework reaches toward the sky. Mounds of earth are pushed up close to the frame, in preparation for the incline and decline. Huge pieces of equipment that workers drive around the site resemble a herd of dinosaurs, 1980 style.

Work is in preparation for the ribbon of pavement. Pouring is planned for later this year.

One step forward was the recent opening of the South 176th Street bridge, giving Westside Hilltoppers a long desired egress out of their pocket of land. A section of South 176th Street had been closed while the bridge over the freeway was built.

Another step in the process is an environmental one. A seeding of grass on the slopes, not immediately adjacent to the roadway, is intended to help prevent erosion.

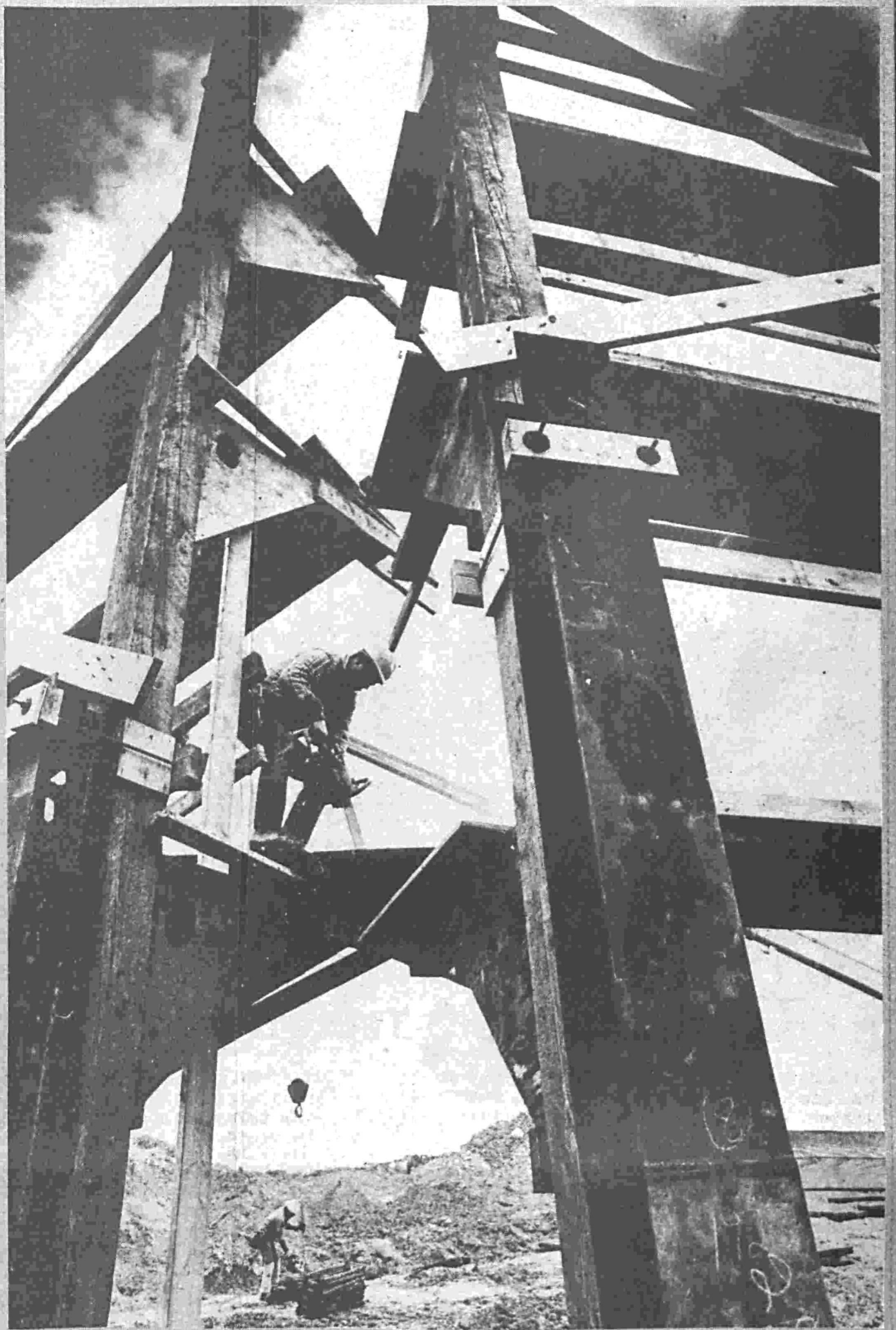
Seeding is done at this time of year to take advantage of the rainfall, rather than planting in the summer.

William Moats, project engineer at the 19265 Des Moines Way S. field office, and Ray Grey, assistant project engineer, are in charge of the project.

Grey expects that South 168th Street, between Eighth Avenue South and Des Moines Way, will be closed Thurs and Friday to allow for work on some crossbeams.

The freeway was first funded by the Legislature some 10 years ago. "Citizens' concern with the control of Miller Creek delayed starting the project," according to Grey.

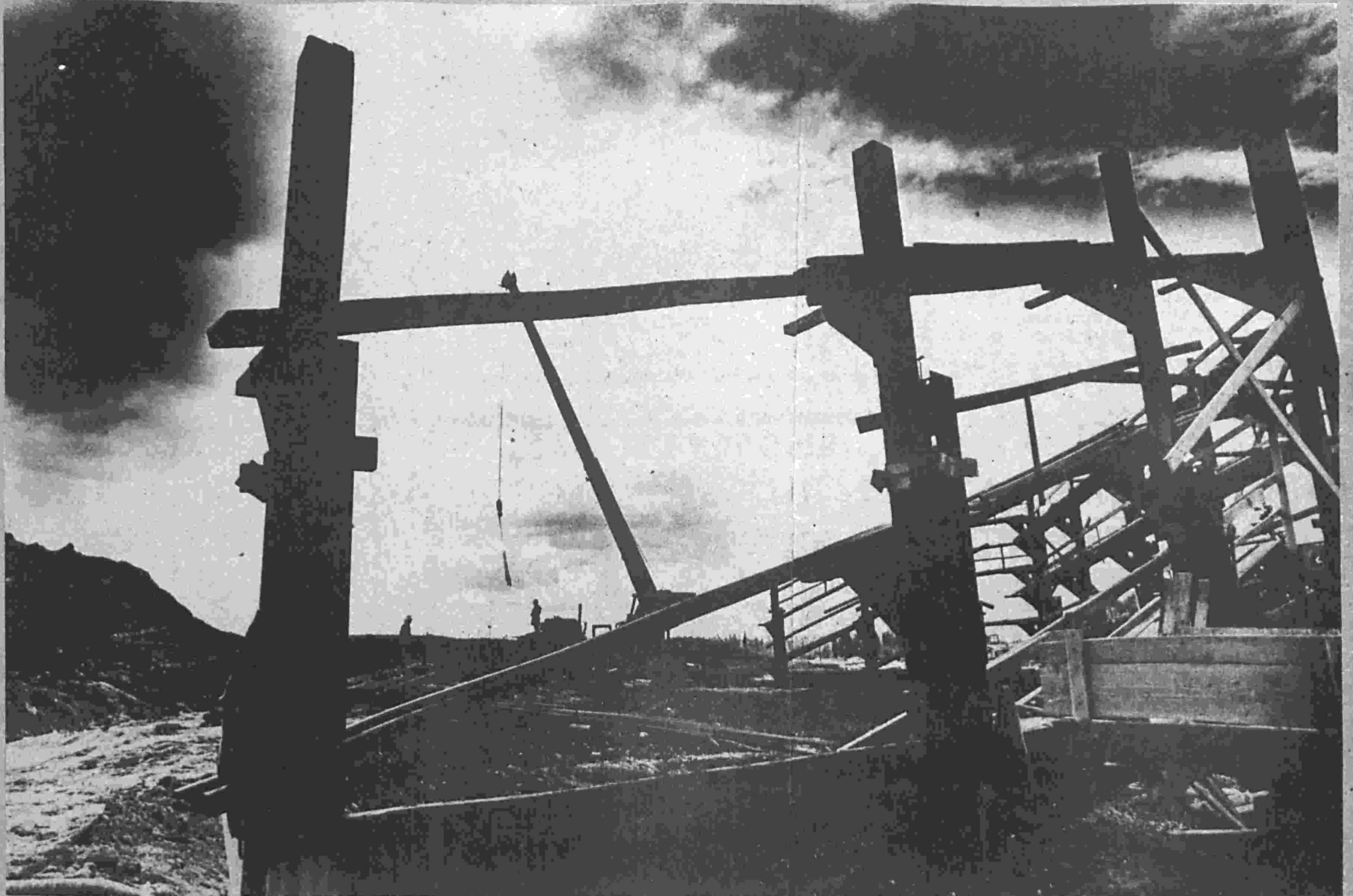

# Crime report: Police probe girl's complaint of abuse

A 14-year-old Federal Way girl who told police that her injuries were inflicted by her mother and her mother's lover was treated for cuts and bruises at Group Health Clinic here Thursday, King County Police records showed Monday.

The girl, whose case is being investigated by police and social workers, said that her mother and her mother's male companion were beating her during a quarrel.

One of the two is said to have hurled the girl against the front door, breaking two small windows in the door and severely gashing her arm.

The victim was taken to the clinic by a neighbor early Thursday morning.

**VANDALS WERE** busy in the community during the weekend, doing approximately \$1,000 worth of damage in three separate and apparently unrelated incidents.

The greatest damage, about \$750, occurred in the parking lot of South 320th Street apartment complex, where an automobile's tires were slashed and its sides bashed in early Sunday morning.

Police believe the incident may be connected to a drinking party that occurred at the address late Saturday night and earlier Sunday morning.

Vandals damaged a vinyl car top Friday around noon as the car was parked at SeaTac Mall. The top was slashed, apparently by someone armed with a knife.

Rocks were hurled through the window of a Southwest 339th Place residence that has been targeted by vandals on three other occasions this year.

**POLICE RAIDED** a teenage

drinking party on South 300th Street early Saturday morning, citing two persons for illegal possession and consumption of alcohol and a third for possession of marijuana.

Several officers arrived at the residence shortly after midnight and found the party, which involved about 30 teenagers, in full swing.

A 16-year-old and an 18-year old were cited on liquor charges, while a 19-year-old was cited on the drug charge.

The 18-year-old told police that his parents were out of town and that he had been left to watch over their house.

**SIX LARCENIES** were reported between Friday and Monday, with arrests in two of the cases. Four burglaries were also reported.

In one of the larcenies, two females, one of them 20 and the other 16, were charged with shoplifting baby clothes from a local retail store. In the other, two boys, both of them 14, were accused of stealing go-cart parts from a local residence.

Only one of the burglaries involved losses of \$500 or more. This episode occurred sometime Friday, when tools valued at approximately \$1,000 were stolen from a 32nd Place South residence.

**TWO OTHER** local teens were cited on charges of illegal possession and consumption after officers found them passed out in an automobile parked near the intersection of Southwest 312th Street and 16th Avenue Southwest early Sunday morning.

The suspects are accused of drinking beer from a large plastic jug.

## Adelaide residents rally to block proposed condo

The quiet neighborhood above Adelaide Beach soon may be the sight of 44 condominium units if the residents of that area cannot block the development that they see as threatening their lifestyles.

The 15.5 acres planned for the condo project stretches toward the beach along 21st Avenue Southwest, the only street that serves the neighborhood from Dash Point Road. The 98 percent of those living in the area—all of whom have signed a petition in opposition of the project—see the road situation as unsafe.

"We only have one street and if there's an accident that blocks the intersection of (South) 312th and Dash Point Road there's no way an emergency vehicle can get down here too," resident Elfi Hornby said this week. "It just can't serve a condominium

development." In addition to safety factors, the residents contend that they moved to the area to live in a single family neighborhood. They don't object to construction of free-standing homes, but condos were not intended for that area, they agree.

"WE'RE JUST trying to preserve what's existing now and that's a single-family atmosphere," Hornby said. "If this project goes in, you know what's going to happen, it's all going to be developed. I'm not going to live next to a big box."

Some of those currently living in the area own several acres of land and raise horses, goats and other animals. Construction of condos in the area may change all that however, residents maintain, because it may jack up property taxes.

That increase could be caused by two fac-

tors, they predict. The area homes are served by septic tanks for sewage, not a sewer system.

However, since that land doesn't perk, law now requires that development include sewer lines. The current residents will not be assessed for those lines because they won't hook up, but the sewer is available, increasing the value of the surrounding land.

**THE SECOND** factor is the possibility that close proximity to expensive development also could increase the value of the surrounding land.

The neighbors of that area have conducted three community meetings to muster support against the proposed construction to be called "Stones Landing." Final permission to build will be granted or denied by King County following the public hearing slated for 3 p.m. tomorrow at Kent City Hall, 220 S. Fourth St.

in Kent. The public is invited to voice its opinions at that meeting.

Don't forget to watch for the special incorporation insert in Friday's edition of the NEWS.

The insert, a self-mailer, includes a special copy of the Federal Way City Committee's incorporation petition with spaces for six signatures.

City committee officials are asking that the 25,000-odd households which will receive the insert fill out petitions and mail them back to an address that will be printed on the form.

Designed so that it can be signed and folded, the form should be dropped in the

mailbox with a 15 cent stamp affixed.

The petition calls for King County to hold public hearings and schedule an election on the measure.

As proposed, the city would include about 59,300 residents, would be governed by a manager and a council, and would extend from about South 255th Street to the Pierce County Line. The western border would be Puget Sound, and the eastern border the limits of Kent, Auburn and other cities at the eastern side of the Federal Way school district.

# Burien Boys' Club will open this fall

The Seattle King County Boys' Clubs Corporate Board voted Thursday to establish a new facility in Burien and to consolidate all of the South King County clubs under the leadership of a regional director, Lynn Templeton, currently the branch director at Federal Way.

Wally Watson, executive director of the Boys' Clubs of Seattle-King County, said the Burien club will be housed at Sunnydale Elementary School and will begin operation Sept. 1.

As regional director for Federal Way, Des Moines-Midway and Burien, one of Templeton's first tasks will be to assign a staff for Burien and put together a citizen steering committee and board.

"He'll move on that between now and Sept. 1," said Watson.

Templeton will maintain his position as branch director at Federal Way while serving as the regional administrator.

WATSON said he envisions a full-time program director and

two part-time assistants initially staffing the Burien club.

A branch director will then be named in January. Watson said the club's budget for the first year will be \$57,500. United Way is being asked to contribute \$25,000 to that budget in order to help the club get started.

Additional money will come from government sources, foundations and fundraising ventures.

Watson expects the new facility, officially called the Burien Boys' and Girls' Club, to attract 500 members the first year. Some of the major programs being considered are gymnastics, wrestling, dancing, cross country, soccer and head start.

In three years, Watson said he anticipates that the club will have between 1,500 and 2,000 members.

THE VOTE to plant a new club in Burien broke a four-year non-expansion policy by the local Boys' Clubs. Watson said one reason for the move to Burien was the positive response

received from a recently conducted feasibility study.

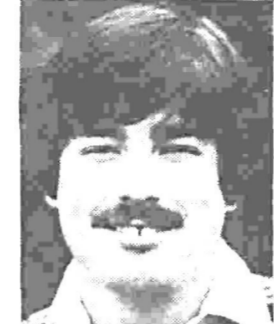

Watson added the Highline School District has been extremely cooperative in sharing the use of its facilities.

Sunnydale already houses a limited Boys' Club program and its ever-shrinking enrollment is creating more room for the club to expand for next fall.

Through the Des Moines-Midway Boys' and Girls' Club, two programs, a day camp at Seahurst Elementary School and gymnastics lessons at Highline High School, are being

offered in the Burien area.

"This is an opportunity for people to observe the kinds of programs Boys' Clubs have," said Watson, a resident of the Sunnydale area.

Watson said he has long supported establishing a Burien club.

"It's exciting because it's in my community and I've always tried to create a positive feeling among people who have participated in our small program at Sunnydale."

## Foundation reaches half-way mark

The Green River Community College Foundation's 1979 Interurban Campaign is well on its way towards its \$75,000 goal, according to its two co-chairmen, Beverly Schoenfeld of Kent and Ralph Renemo of Federal Way.

So far, \$35,290 has been generated by approximately 80 volunteers from in and around the Green River Valley area.

Participants are working toward a program to re-unite major "Interurban Region" communities, 10 in all, served previously by the Interurban Electric Railway (1902-1928).

Proceeds from the six-week endeavor are earmarked for programs in the arts, education, health ser-

vices and recreational activities.

Among those areas in need of community support are expansion of Green River CAPRI, community arts programs in planning and children's theater, two-year merit scholarships, and the final development of a physical fitness-jogging trail adjacent to the college plus a feasibility and design study of six handball-recquetball courts.

Established in September of 1975, the Foundation is independently governed by a Board of Directors composed of citizens from area communities. The goal is to improve community environment by providing better services and programs.

# Police arrest man on narcotics charge



Both camps offer programs that include fishing, swimming, archery, arts and crafts and nature study, allowing disabled children and adults the opportunity to enjoy these activities despite their handicaps. Camp sessions for adults, 30 and over, will be held from June 26 through July 2 and from July 5 through July 11. The schedule for youth camping sessions is: ages 9 to 13, July 14 through July 20; ages 13 through 19, July 27 through Aug. 2, and young adults, 18 to 35, Aug. 5 through Aug. 11 and Aug. 14 through Aug. 20. Campers who are unable to pay camp fees are eligible for Campership Aid.

# Ex-offenders have second chance with Job Therapy

What chance does an ex-offender have of getting a job once released from incarceration? Not much, according to the crew who works out of the Seattle-based Job Therapy organization.

"They need to know that yes, there is somebody to help them; yes, they can get a job if they want one; and their feelings about work are as important as somebody else's," said Phyllis Ellermeir who counsels women on a referral basis and at various institutions.

A staff of 25 includes job counselors and developers, a youth counselor, intake counselor, instructors, and administrative personnel.

They handle King and Snohomish counties and have placed 2,157 ex-offenders in jobs since January, 1,500 of those in King County.

Asked to speak before the Federal Way Council recently, Bill Southern, public relations specialist said they are looking toward expanding their services.

Federal Way, a growing community and a likely candidate for incorporation has the makings for a satellite service if there is sufficient need.

Also interested in preventative measures concerning wayward youth, Southern said Federal Way should take a good look at their existing programs and see if there are sufficient jobs available.

"If you can keep kids busy, with change in their pockets, you've got a good chance of keeping them honest," he said.

SINCE JANUARY, increased emphasis has been placed on working with youth. Scott Gordon, youth job counselor schedules individual counseling sessions for drop-ins and referrals. He handles between 20-25 cases per week. They range between 16-21 years old.

Jake, he said was a typical case, at 19, he was married and divorced. His wife cared for their child. He was busted for robbery, had served time and was having difficulty getting a job.

"He came in here with long hair and a beard, and he was despondent," said Gordon. "He had little confidence in himself and lacked a sense of responsibility."

Gordon held daily sessions, usually an hour a day for the first week with Jake. They discussed what kinds of jobs Jake would be able to handle, amount of salary necessary for him to make restitution toward his previous

crime, short term goals and personal attitude.

Jake eventually got a job working for a foundry for \$5 an hour and has been employed there for the past year. He expects to be out of debt in two years, said Gordon.

Both youth and women usually have survival, rather than violent crimes, said Southern. "Most people don't realize that," he said. Youth are usually picked up for crimes such as robbery, burglary, narcotics or shoplifting. Women are most often involved in welfare fraud, prostitution, narcotics or bouncing checks.

Finding employment for women presents a special problem, said instructor Ms. Ellermeir who sets up workshops at correctional institutions. Most women have responsibilities such as one or two children to support and they need sufficient earnings, not often paid for menial jobs.

A typical client, said Ms. Ellermeir has an eighth grade education or less, probably ran away from home and has worked the streets as a prostitute. She has, most likely, never worked in a legitimate job.

"In many cases, she's been physically and emotionally abused by an older man or a pimp and she's afraid to try anything new," she said.

HOWEVER, UNDER A new program, in effect since January, women are being encouraged through orientation workshops to

prepare for non-traditional jobs. When they are released, they are assisted with training programs or found job interviews in the field of their choice.

Finding potential jobs for ex-offenders falls under the responsibility of job developer Barry Brindley.

Weaving a web of reliable contacts and resources, Brindley said he contacts employers, keeps in touch with Alcoholics Anonymous, various organizations, phone books, industrial and business centers and the want ads in newspapers.

Once he finds something interesting, he contacts them, makes an appointment and "sells" his client if necessary.

The government offers the employer many benefits that make the ex-offender less of a risk. On-the-Job-Training monies, up to 50 percent reimbursement for eight to 10 weeks are available through King Snohomish Manpower Consortium. The Federal

government gives the employer a two-year tax break, up to \$6,200 for two years and the state bonds the employee for \$10,000, free to the employer. And if the employee qualifies as economically disadvantaged youth as certified by the state employment department, the state pays for 50 percent of their wages the first year and 25 percent the second, said Brindley.

"We want to get these guys back to work and into society," said Brindley. After a careful screening program, "the employer gets a good person." If it doesn't work out, the employer's not obligated to keep them, he added.

Are jobs the answer? Will they keep ex-offenders from slipping back into their old habits? Southern said it's bound to help. "If they can make a decent wage and get what they want, that will be a deterrent to criminal behavior. At least, we're giving them opportunity to try."

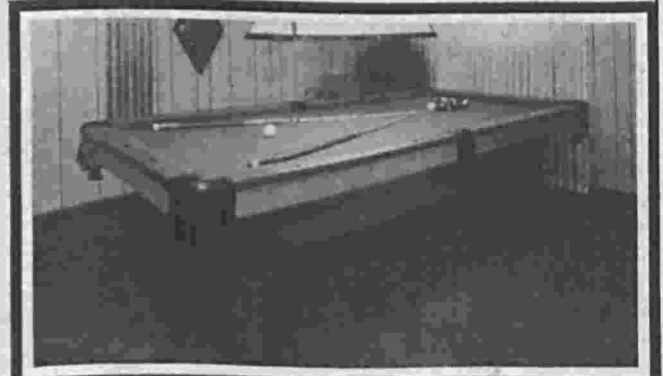

# Aspiring theater talent plans on being well-fed and happy

If Decatur High School graduate Lori Mead — actress, director, singer, dancer and choreographer — is as talented and dedicated to the theater arts as her colleagues say she is, what is she doing in Tacoma?

The 23-year-old graduate of Northwestern University in Evanston, Ill., who is now working with the Falstaff Co. Dinner Theatre in Tacoma, rushes into the theater, late for her interview because of oversleeping after an all-night choreographing session, and answers that question without a pause.

"Because I have no desire to go to New York and be a starring actress," she said. "And I like the West Coast."

Ms. Mead, who graduated with a bachelor's degree in speech in March 1979, said that as graduation neared, she started looking around for an area in

which to begin her theatrical career.

Surprisingly, she said, the Puget-Sound and Cincinnati areas were named again and again as the most promising.

"Both areas are growing, and there are places to go," she said. "There are more auditions than actors available."

Ms. Mead said that most actors would not think of going to any place other than New York or Chicago. "But I was already in the Chicago area attending Northwestern," she added, "and I knew I didn't want to endure those winters."

Her plans are to go to Los Angeles eventually, because "that's where it is." First, however, she must upgrade her singing, she said, and is now taking lessons. "My acting and dancing are up to par," she added.

They got that way partially by an early start, she said. "When I was little, I was knock-kneed and pigeon-toed, and my

mother was worried about it," Ms. Mead said. "She she enrolled me in ballet school when I was three years old."

"I loved dancing from the beginning. And I liked the audience and applause too."

Her mother, Halliefaye Mead, said that she believes her daughter was destined for the theater.

"Since she was a baby, about three years old, she would stand with her shoes in her hands and cry to go on stage."

Ms. Mead's mother and father, Gale, live at 32353 10th Ave. S. in Federal Way.

Their daughter was born in Tacoma and moved to Federal Way when she started junior high school. She attended Sacajawea Junior High School and Decatur High School when it was still called Ilahae, she said.

Ms. Mead moved back to the area in December of 1978, before she completed her college work at

Green River Community College. She landed a job at the Falstaff Co. Dinner Theatre. She was hired to act in and to choreograph "Godspell," which opened March 27 at the theater.

Since then she has acted in and choreographed "Star Spangled Girl" and has just completed choreographing "The Fantasticks," which opened Friday, June 15, at the theatre.

She will perform in "The World of Carl Sandburg," opening at The Entertainer Theater in Seattle on July 14.

Ms. Mead also recently acted in a Father's Day television commercial for The Bon stores. It was aired in the Seattle-Tacoma area.

She says that her goals are as yet undefined. "Lots of my friends want to

make it big on Broadway or on television," she said. "But I don't have a driving desire for any one field. I want all of them — television, movies, theater."

"I want to be good at my work and to be recognized for it. Being a national star is not that important to me."

Ms. Mead, who was Miss Federal Way in 1976, said she could be quite happy living in Federal Way and working in some capacity at the proposed performing arts center near Panther Lake.

But she also plans to marry and to have children. She said she is looking for a mate who is involved in the arts. "I want someone who will understand what I'm going through," she explained, "someone who will

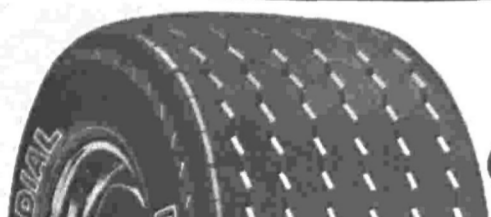

# Federal Way, Burien split double-header

The Burien and the Federal Way American Legion baseball squads each picked up its second win and Sunday loss of the young season Friday.

Federal Way rapped 10 hits while starter Dennis Worth and reliever Bob Bolam shut out Burien on one hit as FW took the first game of the double-header, 8-0. Burien fought back with 10 hits of its own in the second game, winning a 5-3 contest.

The Burien Legionnaires next scheduled action is against Bothel at Mosier Field tomorrow evening at 8. Federal Way played Kent yesterday, with results unavailable at press time, and hosts Georgia Pacific at Sacajawea Park tomorrow night at 8.

"Today we took a good look at everybody," FW skipper Jim Torina said of Sunday's twinbill. "We had a double-header early, and that's okay."

"Federal Way is a good team; anytime I can split with them I'm happy," Burien head manager Lou Bomber said.

The Feds proved their worth in the first game early. Dave Green-

ing and Jim Bendorf led off the bottom of the first with walks; Greening advanced to third on a steal and scored when Burien catcher Dale Fite mistimed to second on an attempt to steal the stealing Bendorf.

Federal Way leftfielder Pete Weymiller re-directed a Bruce Rieker pitch over the outfield fence in the second inning to give FW a two-run lead. Rieker entered the game in the first inning when starter Dan Kain left with a sore arm.

Bob Bolam followed Weymiller's shot with a double, advancing to third two batters later when Kain, who switched to Rieker's third base position in the opening stanza, mishandled a Greening hit. Another Fite throwing error at second as Greening stole allowed Bolam to cross home plate.

WORTH PITCHED five and a third of an inning while giving up just one hit, that one to Rieker, who doubled in the second inning. Control problems which put runners on second and third with one out in the sixth stanza put Worth in the dugout and brought Bolam

in from right field to the mound.

Bolam retired shortstop Kelly Sutton on a fly to center field, where Pat Buckholz caught the ball and fired it home in time to catch Dennis Fite, who had tagged up on third. Catcher Doug Springer made the tag, and the Feds were out of the inning unscathed.

Burien pitching woes continued in the bottom of the sixth when the team's second reliever, Jeff Ainsworth, was pounded by FW bats for six consecutive singles. Those hits, combined with Springer and Bolam steals and one Burien error, gave Federal Way five insurance runs.

"What's happened is my three starting pitchers are all injured; Dean Holmes and Dan Kain have sore arms, and Bruce Rieker has a pulled groin," Bomber explained. "We used everything we had; some of those kids hadn't thrown before."

"We might have been more competitive the first game, but we already had a pitcher selected for the second game and we decided to stay with him all the way."

That pitcher, Kerry Boat-

wright, responded in the second game with a four-hit performance while giving up one earned run.

Federal Way took a second-inning lead in the second contest when cleanup hitter Ed Camden reached on error, advanced to second on a hit-and-run, took third on a wild pitch and turned for home when Dale Fite made yet another throwing error, this one over the head of third sacker Keith Gettis.

Burien scored its first runs in 100 innings against the Feds in the third, as Jim Doane walked, went to second on Dennis Fite's single and scored on Mark Westbrook's single to right field. Fite scored Burien's second run when catcher Brent Haney made a pickoff attempt on Westbrook stealing second.

The Feds evened the count in their half of the third as right fielder Collins walked, stole second and advanced to third on a mishandled throw. Collins crossed home on Greening's grounder to short to tie the score at 2-2.

BURIEN BATS came into the fifth inning. Federal Way

starter Dave Crain struck out the first two batters of the inning, but Dale Fite began a two-out rally by singling to right center. Westbrook followed by belting a shot to right field which took one hop and sailed over the head of Collins and to the fence, scoring Fite.

Rieker simultaneously blasted a double to left field, scoring Westbrook, and blasted Crain from the game. Bolam again stepped in as a reliever, getting Boatwright to ground to third and end the inning.

Burien tallied another run in the seventh as Dale Fite walked, moved to second on a Westbrook single to right, and scored as Boatwright aided his own cause with a line single to right.

The FW squad fought back with two outs in its half of the final inning, as first baseman Jeff McCauley reached first on shortstop Kelly Sutton's error, went to second on Camden's check-swing single between first and second, and scored on Buckholz's shot up the middle. The comeback fell two runs short as Weymiller grounded into a fielder's choice

successfully handled by Sutton to end the game.

Attitude is one key to the Federal Way Legion team this year, and a key to the "never say die" philosophy exhibited in the final inning.

"We have the ability to come back this year," FW co-captain Greening said. "We didn't give up today, but Burien just started making the plays."

"Our team has a good attitude; we just didn't hit the ball when we had to the second game," Torina added. Greening and Weymiller, the other co-captain, look at attitude and depth as the main differences between this year's Legion team and last year's squad, which was defeated in the opening round of the Legion playoffs.

"We're going to be competitive with all of the ball clubs in the league," said Burien skipper Bomber, exhibiting a winning attitude of his own. "We've got a good group of guys."

Federal Way mentor Torina is also confident in his squad, stating, "there's no reason we can't do it all."

## Fastpitch fans mourn Perry Grove's death

On and off the mound, Perry Grove Jr. was a major contributor to fastpitch softball.

Perry, 52, died last week after a two-year bout with cancer, but his exploits and personal demeanor over his 30-year pitching career are well remembered by his former teammates.

"He was respected by everybody," stated Steve Potoshnik, who was Perry's batterymate in the highlight era of the Federal Old Line team during the late 1950s and early 1960s. "He never had a bad word against anybody, and that's rare for a ball player. He was head and shoulders above everybody in sportsmanship."

"He was a credit to softball," noted Bobby Beyers, another former Federal Old Line player who now coaches Westside Federal's fastpitch squad. "Perry was a heck of a man in all walks of life."

Perry's stylish character won him the 1960 Chapman Inspirational Award, which is annually given to a player for being a credit to Seattle-area softball. In 1978, Perry, a long-time Federal Way resident, was inducted into the Seattle Metro Chapter of the Amateur Softball Association Hall of Fame.

Perry could fling a softball and good will with the same vigor.

He competed in four national championship tournaments with Federal Old Line

(1956, 1958, 1960, 1961) and hurled in 15 Northwest regional tourneys. Perry notched five no-hit, no-run games in one season.

"He had a strong fast-rise ball and a great changeup," Beyers recalled. "No one has ever been able to throw a change like Perry's."

"I remember one game when we were in the nationals at Sacramento (1956), he had the hitters so off-balance with that change that they were stumbling all over themselves. I was playing center field and spent about the whole time almost laughing at those guys trying to hit off him."

Potoshnik and Beyers both pointed to two contests in the nationals as highpoints of Perry's career.

In 1956, Perry won a 1-0 dual against a vaunted Lake Jackson

(Texas) squad and its ace Weldon Haney, who became a 10-time All-America hurler. Federal Old Line finished fifth in that year's nationals.

Two years later at Minneapolis, Perry had his "greatest" showing in national tournament competition, Beyers noted. He aided Federal Old Line to third place, the highest finish by a Northwest team in the nationals and matched only by Peterbilt in 1977.

The highlight of that performance was Perry's 1-0 victory over All-America Harvey Sterkle of the highly-touted Aurora, Illinois team.

Perry continued zinging strikes and balls until 1976. In 1975, he joined with the Potoshnik Fuel team, sponsored by his old batterymate, and helped the club win the Renton-Bellevue League title.

He ended his playing days in 1976 with Peterbilt Western, where he also worked as an accountant.

Perry is survived by his wife, Marjorie, a son, Gordon, a daughter Peggy Grove Duncan, his father Perry Grove Sr. and thousands of local fastpitch enthusiasts.

## HO4 Homeowner policy for Renters

The insurance industry has devised a homeowner's policy for renters, the HO 4. Why would a renter need a homeowner's insurance policy?  
"The exposure to fire, theft, and liability is just the same, except that there is no dwelling, no structure, to insure," says Jack Stanford, vice president of G. Allan Craig and Associates. "It doesn't matter whether it's a house or apartment, even an office or cottage, any where you don't own or have an interest in the structure itself."  
With the HO 4, personal property is insured against loss from all sources including fire. The renter may have as much furniture as the homeowner and other things of value as well. Typically a lease makes the renter state that he will hold the landlord blameless for damage to his property. This means that if a pipe in rented quarters breaks, the landlord is not responsible for damage to the renter's furniture, rugs, and so on. The HO 4 picks up the difference.  
Renters have the same liability exposure as homeowners. That is, if their negligence makes someone else get hurt or damages property, their insurance will protect them.  
"People don't realize their exposure

away from their dwelling," Stanford says. "Their negligence could cause injury anywhere. In addition, their loss from fire or theft could occur anywhere."  
Usually ten per cent of the value of the policy applies to loss of property away from the rented quarters. Thus a theft in a motel or fire in a summer cottage or on a boat would be covered up to that amount.  
Stanford suggests checking over an existing policy to make sure it offers these coverages worldwide. That quick business trip to B.C. or the vacation in England could otherwise be expensive.  
For renters of mobile homes, the industry offers the MH 4. It covers the same sorts of things, but specifically with regard to mobile homes.  
Renter's insurance is more readily available now than it has been in the last five years, Stanford thinks. Often the policy now will require deadbolt locks, security bars or locks on the windows, and a higher deductible, often \$250, for theft. These higher deductibles have cut down on the tiny "nuisance" claims and make the insurance more reasonable for the company to carry. Yes, you can lose your insurance if you make too many

tiny claims, so common sense is needed. Well, what's the bottom line? How much will it cost? Surprisingly little. While the rates are higher than they are on the HO 3 (the similar policy for homeowners), less insurance is usually needed because there is no home to insure, so the cost is less.  
Example: the industry assumes that a \$100,000 house has \$50,000 of contents to insure. On an HO 3, the cost would be about \$275 for house and contents. Insurance on the same \$50,000 of contents, but without the house, on an HO 4 for renters, would cost about \$139. (These are annual rates.)  
Once you have an HO 4 or other insurance policy, keep it in a safety deposit box or other secure spot with other valuable papers. For one thing, policies change, and you will want to find out what the changes are: this year, on July 1, policies are changing to the easy to read format, the biggest single change in years. The other reason to keep the policy in a safe place is that it would be a pity to lose it in a fire. The agent and the company certainly have the information, but it is easier if the policy didn't get burned up, too.

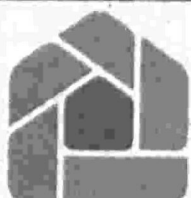

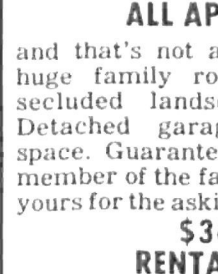

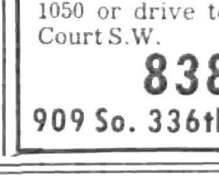

## Breaking the Hollandaise mystique

Ever wonder why that Hollandaise sauce suddenly separated just before the big dinner party, or the Bearnaise sauce tasted like an over abundant herb garden?

Greg Lucas, executive chef at The Keg restaurant, recently helped supply answers to these questions and others to 16 women of the Weyerhaeuser executive staff.

During a luncheon demonstration, Lucas prepared the two white sauces. As he talked the chef, formerly of Boston, shared the culinary secrets that have helped make sauces his specialty.

"The first important step in an elegant Hollandaise is allowing enough air in the eggs while whipping them," he instructed.

This is accomplished by beating the eggs with a wire whip or an electric beater. He suggests whipping the mixture 3 to 4 minutes.

"However, don't over do," he warns. "If whipping by electric mixer, don't beat too long or else the eggs will peak like meringue."

While the eggs are cooking over a double boiler, Lucas is constantly stirring, "If the eggs are too close to the heat they may cook too fast and will scramble." They should have a glossy look, like custard."

If the eggs begin to cook too fast, he recommends adding water.

When adding melted butter to the egg mixture, he told the audience to add it slowly, since the butter pulls the air out of the eggs. If margarine is substituted he stressed it should be added slowly to avoid separation.

He also noted the butter should be cooler than the egg mixture or else the two will separate.

If the sauce appears too thick,

Lucas instructs to add cold waer.

He notes most people overpower their sauces with massive doses of spices. Just a tiny amount can lend a delicate flavor.

Bearnaise uses the same base as the Hollandaise to which tarragon, beef stock and shallots have been added.

"When cooking use whole tarragon leaves," Lucas said. "They will release the herb's aroma."

The tarragon leaves and onions are then cooked for 20 minutes in beef stock over a low heat. This allows the flavors to blend and soak-up the beef juices.

Bearnaise sauce is delicious when served over Beef Wellington or Dungeness crab, while the Hollandaise is a natural with fresh broccoli and asparagus Lucas said.

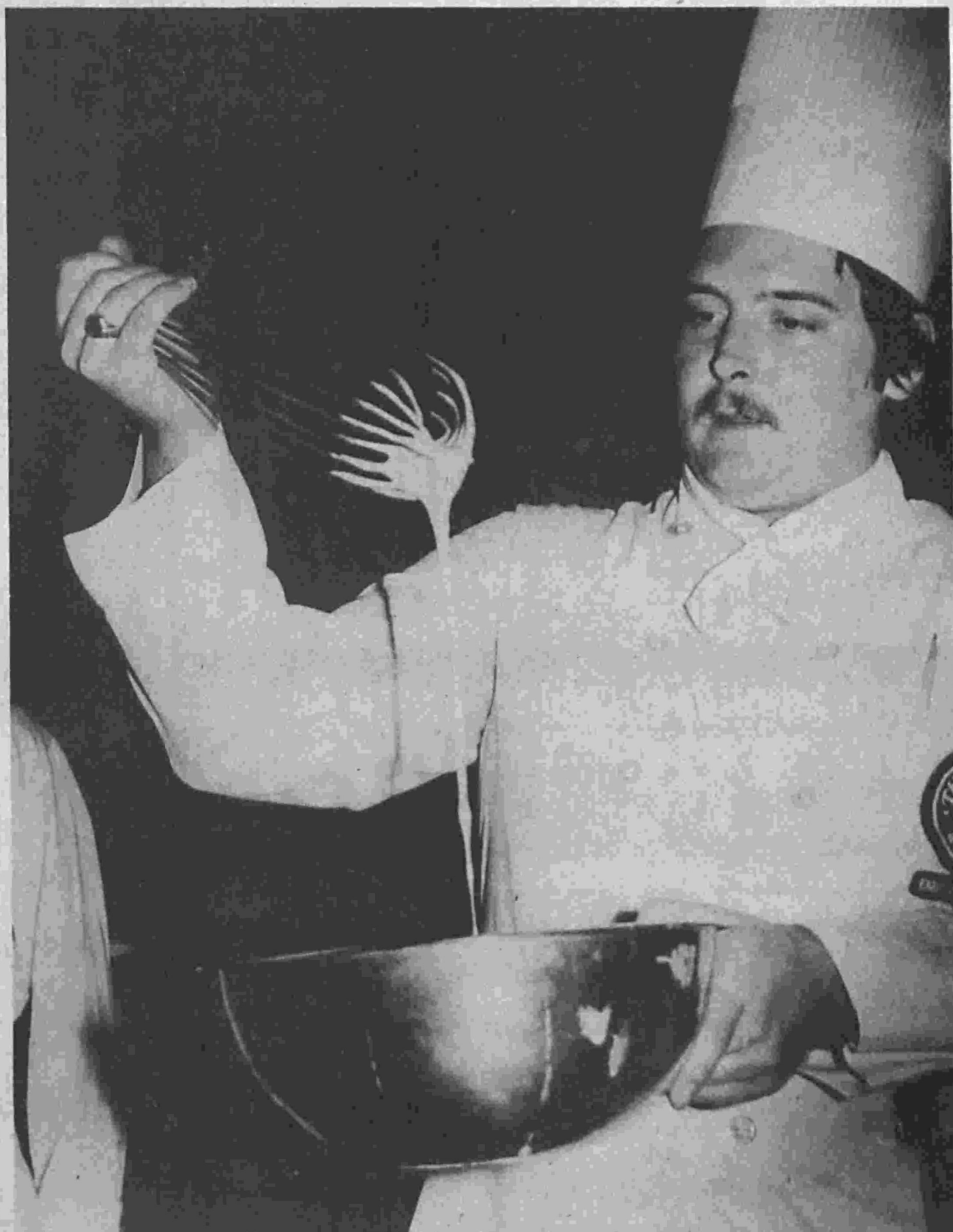
There is new thinking with Hollandaise sauces. Now they can be stored over night in the refrigerator and revived the next day just by adding a tablespoon of hot water and whipping the mixture again. However, contaminants such as bits of other food, may spoil the mixture, the chef explained.

He has noticed many cooks do not obtain the right sauce consistence - some are either too watery or thick, "It takes the proper amount of stirring to achieve the correct texture. Also many cooks tend to over indulge in the spices and this can ruin the flavor."

With an interest in cooking for over 11 years, Lucas has made sauces and soups his specialty.

For beginning cooks he offers this bit of encouragement, "If the basic techniques are learned, making sauces can be very simple."

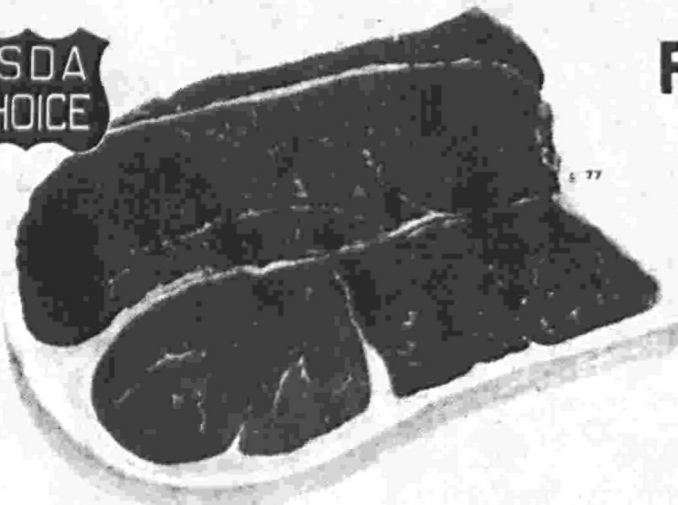

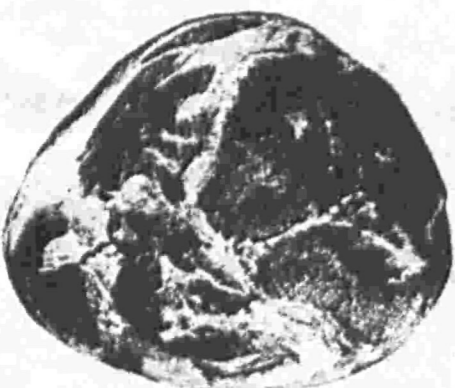

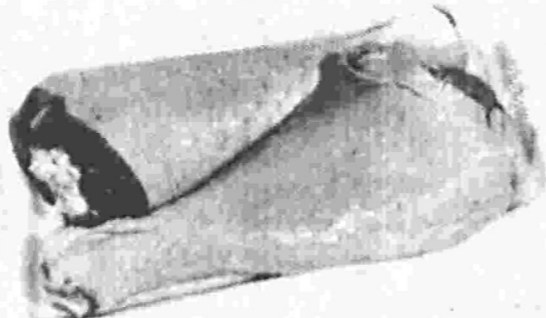

# 'Best of best' to compete in special baking contest

If you were going to dream up the most competitive recipe contest ever devised, you might start by restricting it to people who had already won a major national recipe contest.

Pillsbury has gone even further. To enter its recently announced "best of the best" recipe contest, you must have been a finalist in at least three Bake-Off contests.

Although the restricted contest has similar rules and categories, it is entirely separate from the regular contest. One major difference is that winners will be picked by Pillsbury, rather than food editors, who judge the regular Bake-Off contest.

Grand prize is a vacation trip for two in Hawaii, in addition to a trip to the February Bake-Off in Miami for all contestant activities except the baking contest. Two others will also win Miami trips.

The spouse,

children and parents of three-time winners are eliminated from both the regular Bake-Off and the "best of the best" contests. This has necessitated close reading of the rules in some families. Josephine DeMarco, a three-time winner from Chicago has a daughter and a granddaughter who also have been finalists. This year Mrs. DeMarco's daughter cannot enter either contest, but her granddaughter can enter the regular Bake-Off.

Mrs. DeMarco's Caramel Apple Cake won \$5,000 in the last Bake-Off in the flour category. A moist, exceptionally good tasting cake, the flavor combination of caramel and apple plus a little cinnamon in the frosting appealed to the judges.

Since this "scratch" cake is economical, has high family appeal and is more nutritious than many cakes, it is the kind of recipe that might be

entered in the economy group of flour category recipes this year.

Like the majority of the three time or more Bake-Off finalists, Millie Snow, a realtor from Bloomfield Hills, Mich. never won a money prize in her six trips to the contest.

The Sugar and Spice Puffs, which brought her to the last contest, were inspired by rolls she bought at a bake sale. The tender slightly sweet yeast rolls are bake in muffin cups and taste almost like raised doughnuts. This "scratch" flour recipe is one that might be served for a special occasion, like a company brunch or coffee party.

When making these relishes, you might want to double the recipes so that you will have enough for gifts for neighbors and friends. The relishes will keep up to a week when stored in the refrigerator.

### SUMMER'S END RELISH

1/2 cup Italian dressing  
1 can (8 ounces) tomato sauce  
1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper (optional)  
4 cups uncooked cauliflowerets  
2 cups sliced uncooked zucchini  
1 cup sliced celery  
Grated parmesan

**cheese**  
In large container, blend Italian dressing, tomato sauce, and red pepper. Add cauliflowerets, zucchini, and celery; toss. Cover tightly and chill, tossing relish occasionally, four hours or overnight. To serve, sprinkle with cheese. Store in refrigerator for up to one week. Makes about seven cups relish.

### CITRUS VEGETABLE MEDLEY

1/2 cup Italian dressing  
1/2 teaspoon marjoram  
1 cup cooked cut green beans

1 cup cooked sliced carrot  
1 cup cooked peas  
1 small orange, thinly sliced  
1/2 lemon, thinly sliced  
In small bowl, blend Italian dressing and marjoram.

In one-quart jar, layer green beans, carrot, and peas with orange and lemon slices, adding one-third dressing mixture between each layer. Secure lid tightly and chill, turning jar occasionally, four hours or overnight. Store in refrigerator for up to a week. Makes about three cups relish.

### MEXICALI FIESTA RELISH

1/2 cup Russian dressing  
2 to 3 teaspoons chili powder  
2 cups cooked corn  
1 cup finely chopped tomato  
1 cup finely chopped green pepper

In large container, blend red Russian dressing and chili. Add corn, tomato, and green pepper; toss. Cover tightly and chill, tossing relish occasionally, four hours or overnight. Store in refrigerator for up to a week. Makes about four cups relish.

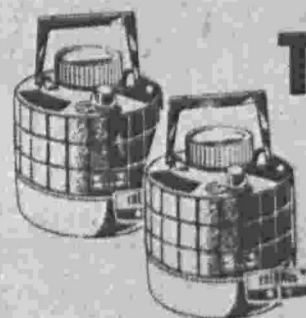

# Kitchen buffet is easy-way entertaining



A kitchen buffet is an easy way to entertain on warm summer evenings.

Cool 'n easy are the key words on a hot summer day for the best in dining. Have you ever thought of assembling the food in the kitchen for one of the simplest ways to entertain?

Fill the kitchen sink with ice cubes and then set among them the foods needing ice cold: a tureen or bowl of Chilled Mushroom Soup, made in advance and cooled; two ice cream beverages. Serve other foods on the counter top adjacent to the sink. The dessert can be assembled and frozen - then wrapped and held for a week or more. Remove from freezer 15 to 20 minutes before serving.

Some advance chilling is required for the preparation of the two sandwiches, namely, the topper for Triple Deck Meal-in-Ones and the spread for Tuna Open Facers. On other foods such as the Spinach-Yogurt Appetizers, Chilled Mushroom Soup and Swiss Cheese Salad advance preparation is in order, with chilling essential to hold the food until party time.

When it's almost time to serve, complete making each of the sandwiches, spread crackers with spinach mixture, set out the other foods and send out the call, "It's time to eat." You can be whirling the two beverages, Mocha Refreshers and Tropical Pleasers in the blender as everyone enters since these two beverages are served immediately. Or, you might mix them later if they're to substitute for dessert.

**SPINACH-YOGURT APPETIZERS**  
2 tablespoons butter  
One-third cup chopped onion  
2 tablespoons chopped walnuts

1 package (10 ounces) frozen chopped spinach, thawed and well drained  
1 container (8 ounces) plain yogurt  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder

Assorted crackers  
Melt butter in saucepan; saute onion and walnuts until onion is tender, about three minutes. Stir in spinach and cook about five minutes longer; remove from heat. **CHILLED MUSHROOM SOUP**  
One-third cup butter  
6 ounces fresh mushrooms, chopped  
2 tablespoons sliced green onion with top  
1/4 cup all-purpose flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon white pepper  
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder  
3 cups milk  
1 cup whipping cream  
1 cup chicken broth

Melt butter in saucepan; saute onion and walnuts until onion is tender, about three minutes. Stir in spinach and cook about five minutes longer; remove from heat. Combine yogurt and seasonings in small mixing bowl. Stir in spinach mixture. Chill, covered, one to two hours allowing flavors to blend. To serve, spread crackers with spinach-yogurt mixture. Yield: 4 dozen.

Use nonfat dry milk to add extra nutrition to meals without adding a lot of expense or extra calories, says Jan Grant, King County Extension agent. If you have recipes calling for whole, liquid milk, you can easily substitute nonfat dry milk. You can also add powdered milk to casseroles and breads - foods which normally wouldn't include milk. You're adding nutritional value.

There are other advantages, too. It usually costs less than even the most inexpensive whole milk. Since it's stored dried, it will stay wholesome much longer than fresh milk. Like whole milk, nonfat dry milk contains protein, calcium, phosphorus and riboflavin. Since it contains little or no milk fat, it's lower in calories than fresh whole milk. Eight

ounces of properly reconstituted lowfat milk contains about 90 calories instead of 160 for whole milk.

You can use nonfat dry milk in all the ways you would use fresh milk - plus others. But, says Mrs. Grant, even dry milk needs to be stored properly, away from heat, moisture, and direct light. Remember to rotate your stock once in a while.

**TRIPLE DECK MEAL-IN-ONES**  
1 cup cottage cheese  
1 cup grated raw carrot

One-third cup chopped nuts  
1/4 cup finely chopped fresh parsley  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon seasoned salt  
1/4 cup (one-half stick) butter  
1 teaspoon prepared mustard  
4 thin slices pumpernickel bread  
12 slices boiled ham  
6 pineapple slices, well drained  
Parsley sprigs, if desired

Beat cottage cheese in small mixer bowl until smooth, about five minutes. Blend in carrot, nuts, parsley and seasonings. Refrigerate, covered, about one hour to allow flavors to blend. Meanwhile, combine butter and mustard; beat until well blended. Spread one side of bread with butter mixture. Place bread end to end forming a long row. Fold ham slices in half. Overlap slices on top of bread. Arrange pineapple slices on top of ham. Spoon cottage cheese mixture over pineapple. Garnish with parsley sprigs. Cut into six pieces and serve immediately.

**TUNA OPEN FACERS**

24 thin cucumber slices  
1 can (13 ounces) tuna, drained and flaked  
1/2 cup dairy sour cream  
One-third cup thin diagonally sliced celery

2 tablespoons sliced green onion  
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
6 slices whole wheat bread, buttered on one side  
6 slices (one-ounce each) Colby cheese, each cut into two triangles

Place cucumber slices in cold water while preparing sandwiches. Combine tuna, sour cream, celery, green onion, Worcestershire sauce and salt. Cover and refrigerate one to two hours to allow flavors to blend. To assemble sandwiches, drain cucumber slices; pat dry with paper towel. Place four slices on each buttered side of bread. Spoon tuna mixture over cucumbers. Arrange two cheese triangles on top of each sandwich. Serve immediately.

**SWISS CHEESE SALAD**  
8 ounce Swiss cheese,

cut into one x one-fourth-inch strips  
3 hard-cooked eggs, chopped  
1/2 cup dairy sour cream  
1 1/2 teaspoons Dijon-style mustard  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
One-eighth teaspoon pepper  
Salad greens  
Thinly sliced green onion

Combine cheese and eggs in small mixing bowl. Combine sour cream, mustard, salt and pepper. Add to cheese mixture; toss well. Chill, covered, one to two hours to allow flavors to blend. Serve on crisp salad greens; sprinkle with green onions.

**STRAWBERRY ANGEL DELIGHT**  
1 purchased angel food cake (19 1/4 ounces)  
1 quart strawberry ice cream, softened  
1 cup whipping cream  
2 tablespoons confectioners' sugar  
One-third cup toasted sliced almonds  
Fresh whole strawberries

Place cake on foil-covered cardboard. Slice entire top from cake about one-inch down; set aside. Cut down into cake one-inch from outer edge and one-inch from center hole. Hollow out cake leaving a substantial one-inch base at bottom. Place cake in freezer for about one hour (this will keep cake from being crushed when filling with ice cream). Spoon ice cream into cavity of cake, packing carefully. Replace top of cake; press down gently. Wrap; place in freezer several hours to allow ice cream to become firm. To serve, whip cream until soft peaks form. Add sugar; continue beating until stiff. Frost sides and top of cake with whipped cream; sprinkle almonds over top of cake. Return to freezer until 15 to 20 minutes before serving. Garnish top with fresh whole strawberries. Slice and serve.

**MOCHA REFRESHERS**  
3 cups cold chocolate milk  
1/4 teaspoon almond extract  
1 pint coffee ice cream, softened

Place milk, extract and ice cream in blender container; cover. Blend on high speed until of desired consistency. Pour into tall chilled glasses; serve immediately.

**TROPICAL PLEASERS**  
1 can (6 ounces) frozen concentrated Hawaiian Punch, thawed  
1 cup applesauce, chilled  
1 pint strawberry ice cream, softened  
1 cup cold milk  
2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice  
Fresh strawberries, if desired

Place concentrate, applesauce and ice cream in blender container; cover. Blend on high speed until smooth, about one minute. Add milk and lemon juice. Blend until well combined. Serve immediately in tall chilled glasses, garnished with strawberries.

For added wine flavor when using angel cake mix, substitute one-half cup dry white wine for water in directions.

### LIME WINE SHERBET

1 envelope (one tablespoon) unflavored gelatin  
2 cups milk  
One and one-third cups sugar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 cups light cream  
One-third cup dry white wine  
1/4 cup lime juice  
1/4 cup lemon juice  
2 tablespoons lemon peel, grated  
Fresh strawberries

In small heavy saucepan, sprinkle gelatin on one-half cup milk to soften. Heat, stirring, until gelatin is dissolved. Combine with remaining milk, sugar, salt and cream. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Stir in wine, lime juice, lemon juice and lemon peel. Freeze

until frozen one-inch from edge. Turn into chilled bowl. Beat with Waring electric mixer until smooth but do not melt. Return to freezer. Freeze until firm.

To serve, spoon into dessert dishes. Garnish with strawberries. Makes six servings.

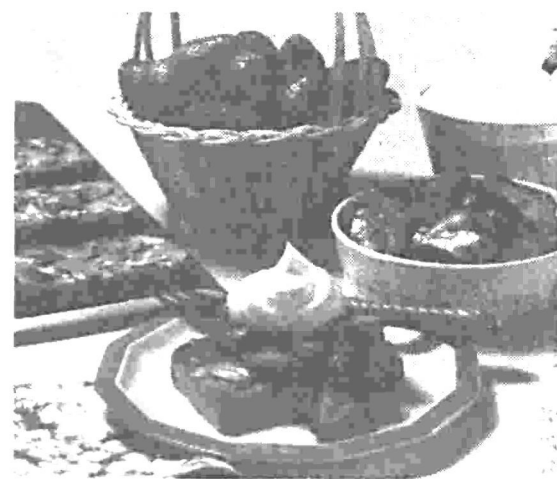

Finished parfait has a bottom and top layer of the berry-gelatin mixture. Middle layer is a combination of crushed pineapple, chopped pecans and sour cream. Chilling time until set is about 30 minutes, then on to the dining table with additional strawberry garnish.

Strawberry Pineapple Parfait

1 can (8 1/4 oz.) crushed pineapple in syrup, drained  
1/4 cup chopped pecans  
1/2 cup sour cream  
1 tbsps sugar  
1 pkg (3 oz) strawberry flavor gelatin  
1 cup boiling water  
2 cups ice cubes  
1 1/2 cups sliced strawberries, chilled  
Combine pineapple, pecans, sour cream and sugar; set aside. Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add ice cubes and stir constantly until gelatin starts to thicken, about 3 to 5 minutes. Remove any unmelted ice. Fold in strawberries. Spoon half the gelatin mixture into 6 to 8 parfait glasses. Add pineapple mixture and top with remaining gelatin. Chill until set, about 30 minutes. Garnish with additional berries, if desired. Makes about 4 cups or 6 to 8 servings.

# What's Cookin' in Ruth's Kitchen

Ordinarily to answer the question, "What shall we have for dinner tonight?" you look in the refrigerator and then in the freezer to see what you have on hand. But now there's a third dimension added.

"What do we have in the garden?"

Not everybody has a vegetable garden, but probably more people than ever before. Newsweek ran a recent feature on the boom in home gardening, and it listed the reasons as a desire for fresh foods, for foods that are free of pesticides, economic savings and the joy and benefits to the gardener, physical and "spiritual."

The word, "spiritual" isn't always easy to define, but I, as an enthusiastic gardener, find great joy in it. There's the good smell of fresh turned soil, the fun of seeing little plants sprout and grow and a feeling of working with Nature.

IF YOU GARDEN for the joy of it and the good exercise, then the produce is sheer profit. If you count the hours as drudgery, raising a garden isn't very profitable.

Economically it will probably be good for the country if more and more people cultivate the joy of gardening. In Europe I've seen small vegetable patches in the most unlikely spots along roads and railroad tracks, and we're told that in Japan every possible square foot of ground is under cultivation. It's one way of feeding the population.

Although commercial outlets do a fine job of getting fresh produce to the market, and there's nothing wrong with buying flash frozen vegetables, people who have raised their own agree that nothing tastes as good as fresh picked peas, fresh pulled carrots or corn right from the patch. It's well worth the water, the seeds and the bother.

We've been enjoying green onions, romaine, leaf lettuce, baby beets and beet greens with the promise of lots more things to come.

As you thin your lettuce and remain, you may want to transplant some of the plants, but the others make the world's best tossed salads if you have the patience to wash them thoroughly.

GARDEN DIRT seems to lodge in every opening in these tiny plants, but it's easily removed by cutting off enough of the end and passing the leaves through three or four containers of water. Do the preliminary washing on the lawn with the garden hose if you want to spare the kitchen sink.

Let the greens drain thoroughly before tossing with your favorite french dressing, which, in our case, is two parts olive oil to one part vinegar, preferably wine vinegar with salt and coarse black pepper to taste.

Green onion tops at our house never go in the compost pile but are cut up and added to tossed salads, stews, casseroles, stir-fries and other mixed dishes.

Baby beets and beet greens are among the first and best of garden vegetables, but the joy of eating them is somewhat dampened if you bite down on sand.

Cut off the greens right above the beets,

cooked only a few minutes and started in rapidly boiling water, and since there's a relationship between color and vitamin content, they're probably the best nutritionally.

Start with a small amount, half inch to an inch, of rapidly boiling water in a large kettle. Put in the leaves a few at a time so that boiling never stops, pushing them over as they wilt to make room for more.

Very young spinach, chard, beets or

mustard greens are done almost as soon as you get them all to boiling.

If you have tiny baby beets, put them in the boiling water first, and they'll be done in no time.

Mature beets, which you'll have later in the season, are best washed and cooked with a portion of the stem on. Skin them after they are tender.

LOCAL STRAWBERRIES are one of the bounties of nature that we have

right now. We'll have to wait for garden berries, because ours are ever-bearings that will ripen a little later.

Berries that are shipped in are like plastic as compared to the local ones which are ripe now and ready to enjoy.

If you're making jam, remember that strawberries have no natural pectin; so if you want a jelled texture, use a commercial pectin and follow package directions to the letter, as to quan-

ity as well as proportions and timing.

Above all, don't double or triple the recipe. The increased cooking time that would be necessary to evaporate the liquid will destroy both flavor and pectin.

Whole perfect berries just washed and with the stems left on are fine finger foods to put on a tray with other fruits and cheeses. Even if you're weight watching it would be a shame to let the fresh

strawberry season pass without one fresh strawberry sundae or piece of shortcake, but if you want a light dessert that's delicious too, make a Bavarian cream. In case they're expensive it's a great way to make one box of berries serve several people and to top off a big meal. You can use this same easy recipe with fresh raspberries which will be along soon:

Strawberry Bavarian Cream

1 pint box strawberries  
 1/4 cup sugar  
 1 package strawberry flavored gelatine  
 1 cup boiling water  
 1/2 pint whipping cream

Wash berries, and leave a few with stems on to garnish individual dishes of Bavarian cream. Cut gealed mixture, and leave in the refrigerator until time gelatine in boiling to serve. Top each dish with a dollop of cool add the berries, whipped cream and a fresh whole berry. until the gelatine is

like a thick syrup. Then beat until it is fluffy.

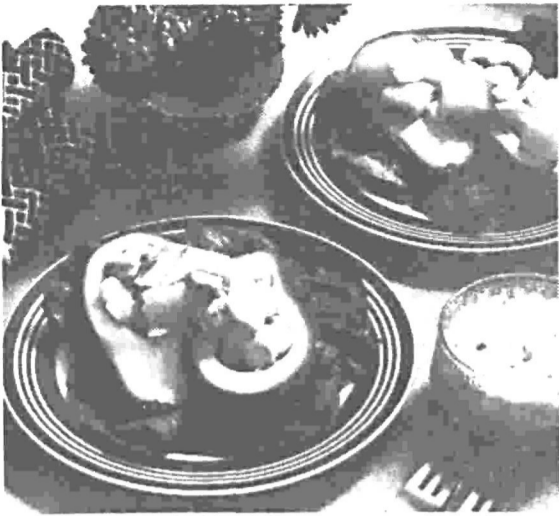

speed-set way by dissolving a 3-ounce package of lime flavor gelatin in one cup boiling water. Add one pint vanilla ice cream by spoonfuls and stir until ice cream is melted. Blend in one-half teaspoon peppermint extract and one square semi-sweet

chocolate, chopped. Chill until set, about 30 minutes. If you wish, garnish with thawed frozen whipped topping to dress up this creamy lime flavor gelatin-chocolate treat that serves six.

### BANANA MALLOW

Banana-Mallow is another speed-set dessert that serves six. Dissolve a 3-ounce package strawberry flavor gelatin in one cup boiling water; then add two cups ice cubes and stir until gelatin begins to thicken, about three minutes. Remove any unmelted ice before adding one sliced banana and one cup miniature marshmallows. Chill until set, about 30 minutes. This is a good way to provide additional fruit in the family menu.

If you have yogurt fans in the family, plan on a one-bowl Yogurt Fluff dessert to make a simple meal seem special. It's a great snack between meals, too. This speed-set recipe calls for dissolving one 3-ounce package raspberry flavor gelatin in three-fourths cup boiling water in an electric blender container. Cover and blend at low speed until gelatin is dissolved, about one minute. Add one cup crushed ice; cover and blend at high speed until ice is melted, about 30 seconds. Blend in one 8-ounce container vanilla yogurt and pour into a serving bowl. Chill until set, about 30 minutes, before serving. You should feel satisfied about serving this quick dessert because yogurt brings to the table the nourishing value of milk.

### QUICK BAVARIAN

Count a blender as a helpful "friend" when you prepare a Quick Bavarian. This one-serving bowl dessert calls for combining one 3-ounce package of raspberry flavor gelatin in three-fourths cup boiling water in an electric blender container, covering and blending at low speed until gelatin is dissolved. This takes about one minute; then add one and one-half cups crushed ice and one cup thawed frozen whipped topping. Cover and blend at high speed until ice is melted, about 30 seconds. Here's a great recipe that serves eight, ideal for those times when junior brings home a friend or two for dinner on short notice.

### GINGER PEACH DELIGHT

During fresh peach season, you'll get everyone's vote when you pass the serving bowl of Ginger Peach Dessert. It's light and refreshing and easily prepared by dissolving one 3-ounce package of peach or orange flavor gelatin in one cup boiling water. One 7-fluid-ounce bottle ginger ale is added and chilled until thickened. Then one cup sweetened diced fresh peaches, drained, is folded into the thickened gelatin and the mixture is spooned into a serving bowl. It takes about three hours to chill until firm. This dessert yields five servings.

# Are name brands the best buys?

Virtually every trip to the store means making a choice between merchandise with a familiar, highly advertised "brand" name and items with unknown, or at least lesser known names.

Many consumers wonder which is the best buy, according to Ann Parthum, King County Extension agent. Sometimes the choice is fairly easy. As there is a dif-

ference in price, the purchaser may buy the cheapest as a matter of budgeting. But frequently consumers are really in doubt; the familiar brand name versus unfamiliar ones.

Brand names are trademarks. A company uses a word, design or symbol to identify the items it sells. Ideally, the brand represents a certain level of quality; quality that will be

consistent in each product. Some consumers may prefer such an indication, Mrs. Parthum says, and are willing to pay a higher price if necessary. However, un-

familiar brands may offer excellent quality at a considerable savings. If a purchaser is dealing with a company he knows, one that stands behind what it sells, the less well-known brand

may be a real money-saver. A consumer may also know enough about a product to rely on his own judgment rather than a trademark or a merchandizing company.

That is really the ideal way, Mrs. Parthum believes. However, many of the things we buy today are so complicated, it is impossible to know everything about every product we

need. Know the product if possible; know the dealer. When this is not practical or possible, stay with a brand name recognized for quality and performance.



## Go Colonial with crab spaghetti

If anyone invited you for spaghetti and beer, you might surmise that the menu was inspired by the popularity of foreign cookery or international cuisine. You would be absolutely wrong. This menu comes straight from one of the founders of America—Thomas Jefferson—who was

noted for his wordy interest in food as for his brilliant concepts in the political field. Because he was intrigued by the Italian pasta, he brought back a spaghetti-making machine and is credited with introducing spaghetti to this country. That he was fond of beer and served it often at his

elegant dinner table was no secret since, eventually, he started his own brewery at Monticello and was complimented for the high quality of the beer he served. Although there are no accurate "receipts" for the sauce he served, it most surely was not a tomato-based sauce.

It is much more likely that he tried to duplicate a classic Italian fish sauce using ingredients which were easily available at home. In the Colonies, lavish use was made of butter sauces with onion and parsley as favored seasonings. Superb shellfish was always on hand. So an

ingenious gourmet cook of the 18th Century would quickly see the possibilities of spaghetti with a butter and crab sauce.

### SPAGHETTI WITH BUTTERED CRAB SAUCE

- 1 pound spaghetti
- ½ cup (one stick) butter
- ½ cup beer
- 1 small onion, minced
- ½ teaspoon nutmeg
- ½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- Dash of cayenne pepper
- 1 can crab meat, cartilage removed
- ¼ cup coarsely chopped parsley
- Salt to taste

Cook spaghetti according to package directions in rapidly boiling salted water. In a skillet, melt butter and add onion and beer. Cook over low heat until onion is soft and golden. Add nutmeg, pepper, cayenne and crabmeat. Stir to blend and heat gently until crab is piping hot. Stir in parsley and salt to taste, and cook one minute more.

Pour spaghetti into colander and shake until all the water is drained off. Place in serving dish, pour sauce over hot spaghetti and serve immediately. Yields: eight servings.

## Hang Town Fry goes outdoorsy

Hang Town Fry is a dish with a marvelous story behind it. The tale goes that a miner came jubilantly into Hang Town to celebrate his having "struck it rich." In a restaurant he requested the finest, most expensive meal they had.

When the miner was told that oysters and eggs were the most expensive items on the menu, he told the cook to put them together and serve up

the food. The result was delicious! Hang Town was another name for San Francisco during those Gold Rush days. The notorious part of that city during the 1800's was the Barbary Coast. If you were interested in indulging in a vice, the Barbary Coast was the place to go. As time went on the reformers hanged so many of the Barbary Coast's citizens that San Francisco gained

the name of Hang Town. Hang Town Fry is a delightful variation on scrambled eggs — good for those times when you want something a little different — a late night supper, a brunch, and outdoor cooking instead of the old standbys of hamburgers and hot dogs.

The addition of beer was not unlikely for milk was as scarce as eggs and few people trusted the water. The early colonists as well as settlers across the United States frequently drank and cooked with beer rather than chance the water. Today, the housewife can always be assured that the beer she purchases was prepared in the utmost of sanitary conditions and quality control. The convenience of purchasing beer in the modern containers guarantees both freshness and cleanliness.

And today, eggs and oysters would never be the most expensive items on a menu!

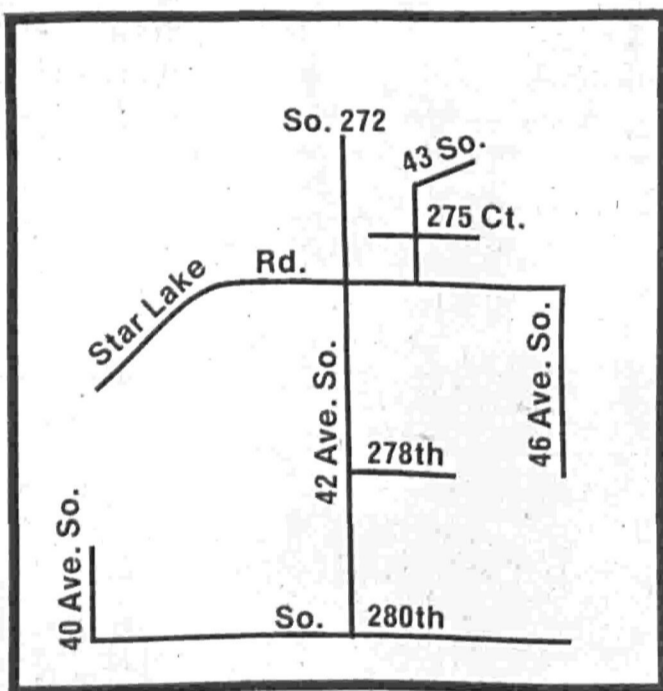

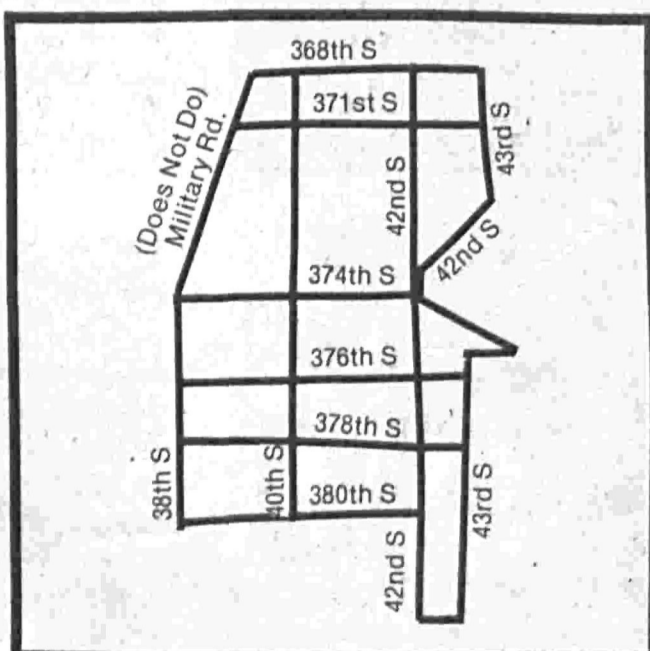

## Butterscotch Orange Roll is spring winner

Looking for a special spring dessert for a shower, reception, or just for the family?

You've got a winner in this Butterscotch Orange Roll. Prepare it ahead and store it in the freezer to await the big occasion.

First you add butterscotch chips, orange rind and spices to a delicate sponge cake batter. After baking the cake is rolled and cooled like a jelly roll.

When completely cooled, you unroll the tender cake, quickly spread it with slightly softened orange sherbet, then rereoll and store in the freezer until dessert time.

Note that the recipe calls for sifted flour. Very light cakes, such as sponge and angel food cakes, require sifted flour. Other baked goods have a less critical ration of flour to liquid and you needn't sift.

### BUTTERSCOTCH ORANGE ROLL

- 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon ground allspice
- ¼ teaspoon cinnamon
- 6 eggs, separated
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon grated orange rind
- 1 package (6 ounces) butterscotch pieces
- Confectioners' sugar
- 1 ½ pints orange sherbet, softened

### Local produce in season

Several different kinds of local produce are now being harvested. The vegetables include lettuces, spinach, radishes, edible pod peas and some greens. All are good tasting in salads. Strawberries are also coming into season. Local berries have a reputation for their delicious flavor. They can be eaten fresh or frozen for later use. Locally-grown vegetables and strawberries are most easily purchased directly from farmers. The salad crops can be found at farm stands, at several in-town farmers' markets, and at the Bulk Commodities Exchange in Seattle, according to Curt Moulton of the Cooperative Extension Service. Strawberries are best when fresh picked at the farm. Farm guides to locate local farms are available now through county and city libraries, many private businesses, and the extension service. Two maps covering the King County area are the "Country Fresh Farm Association Guide" and the Puget Sound Farm Markets Association map. Both organizations are comprised solely of local farmers.

The Bulk Commodities Exchange in Seattle is a farmer-consumer cooperative offering locally-grown products in bulk quantities at wholesale prices. For freezing or canning strawberries, the Food Preservation Hotline can be called for information. The hotline will refer callers to volunteer Master Cannerymen. Phone 344-7648. The King County Cooperative Extension can answer questions about the availability of local produce. Phone 344-2686 for more information.

## Chives enliven fluffy omelet

The fresh harvest of a window sill garden of herbs and seasoning can add a sparkling touch to your cooking. Chives, a member of the onion family, are easy to grow and can perk up sauces and cheeses and egg dishes. To keep the plants looking well, cut a few of the thin tubular leaves low rather than bobbing the top which will brown where cut. Remember that chives, like all bulbs, rely for plant renewal and strength on the leaves; so don't cut

any one plant too often. Cottage Cheese-Chive Omelets make a low-cholesterol luncheon entree when made with Egg Beaters Cholesterol-free Egg Substitute. Many people are now restricting their intake of saturated fats and cholesterol since diet has been found to be one of the risk factors associated with heart disease.  ½ pound dry cottage cheese  
 1 teaspoon chopped chives  
 ½ teaspoon pepper  
 2 tablespoons margarine  
 2 cups egg substitute  
 Combine cheese,

chives and pepper. Set aside. Melt one tablespoon margarine in a nine inch skillet over medium heat until bubbly. Add one cup cholesterol-free egg substitute. When bottom is set, lift edges to let uncooked portion flow underneath. Sprinkle one-half of the cheese mixture over top. When bottom is browned, fold over and onto a serving dish. Repeat with remaining ingredients to make a second omelet. Yields four servings.

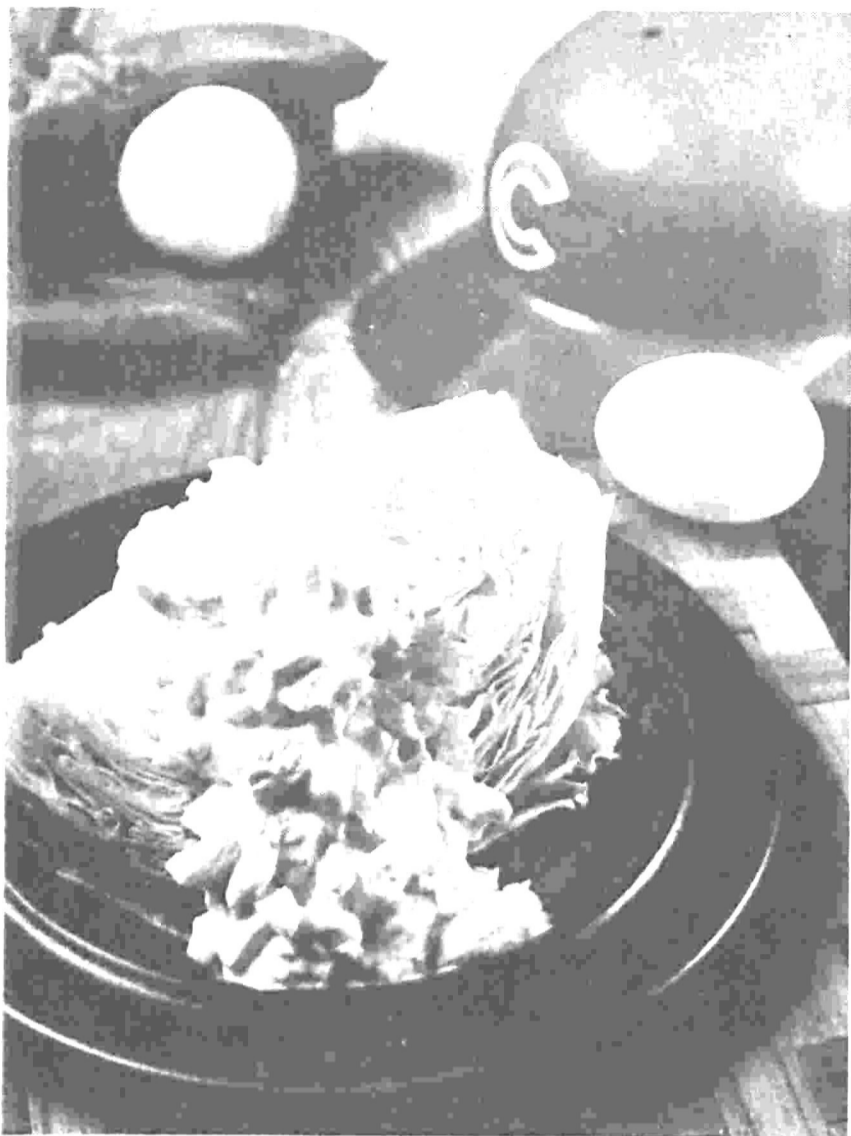

## Heart-healthy menu for barbecue chefs

These are important factors for good cardiovascular health since the intake of foods high in cholesterol and saturated fat is thought to contribute to the development of atherosclerosis, a major cause of heart attack and stroke.

In planning your backyard barbecue, choose lean meats, fish or poultry (avoid eating the skin which is high in cholesterol) and select fat-free or low-fat dairy products. Also be sure to use poly-unsaturated oils and margarines, such as safflower, soybean, sunflower, cottonseed or sesame.

**Barbecue Sauce**

- 1/4 cup water
- 1/4 cup vinegar
- 3 tbsps oil
- 1/2 cup chili sauce or catsup
- 3 tbsps worcestershire sauce
- 1 tbsps dry mustard
- 1 1/2 tpsps salt
- 1/2 tsp pepper

2 tbsps chopped onion

Combine all ingredients and simmer for 15 to 20 minutes. Good with beef, chicken or salmon. Yield: about 1 1/2 cups.

**Hobo Vegetables**

- 4 carrots, scraped
- 4 onions, peeled
- 4 potatoes, scrubbed
- 4 tbsps margarine
- Salt and pepper
- Heavy duty aluminum foil

For each person, place a carrot, a potato and an onion on a square of foil. Add 1 tablespoon of margarine, and the salt and pepper.

Wrap snugly and seal. Place over hot coals for 45 to 60 minutes, turning occasionally, until vegetables are done. Yield: 4 servings.

**Celery Slaw**

- 3 cups finely shredded cabbage
- 3 tbsps oil
- One-third cup vinegar, warmed
- 1 tbsps finely chopped onion
- 1 tbsps chopped pimiento
- 2 tbsps sugar
- 1/2 tsp dry mustard
- 1 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp celery seeds

In a large bowl, toss the shredded cab-

bage, oil and warm vinegar. Add the remaining ingredients and toss again. Cover and refrigerate until serving time. Yield: 6 servings.

**Fresh Fruit Ice**

- 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 1 cup orange juice

6 tbsps lemon juice

4 tbsps sugar

1 cup strawberries, peaches or other fresh fruit

3 bananas, mashed.

Soften the gelatin in the water. Stir over low heat until dissolved. Mix in the juices, sugar and sliced fruit, and place in the

freezer until almost set. Beat with an electric mixer on high speed until creamy, but fluffy.

Cover and return to the freezer. If fruit ice is made some time before serving, it must be beaten and then returned to the freezer for a brief

1 cup sour cream

1 can (one pound) salmon, drained and flaked

Melt butter in saucepan. Stir in green pepper and cook until tender, about five minutes. Remove green pepper and reserve.

Stir flour into butter to form a smooth paste. Blend in seasonings. Gradually add milk, stirring constantly.

Cook over medium heat until thickened, stirring frequently. Remove from heat and gradually blend in sour cream. Add reserved green pepper and salmon and heat to serving temperature.

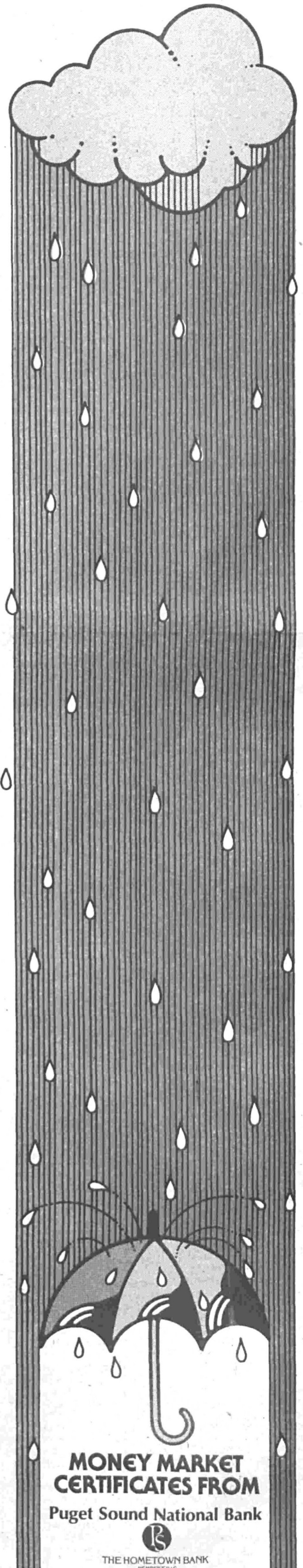

# Choosing the right career with care

For many recent high school graduates, choosing a career is the farthest thing from their minds, while others have one already planned.

"It's normal for a high school student not to know what they want to do," said Sandra Stonebreaker, counselor at Federal Way High School. Of the school's graduating senior class, Ms. Stonebreaker estimates students are split fifty-fifty between continuing on to college and taking vocational training.

For some seniors, this summer may be spent exploring career opportunities through summer jobs, travel and school.

Ms. Stonebreaker said the counselors at Federal Way, along with the other local schools, allow students to freely explore the career possibilities while they are in school, but they do not force the kids. Work-study programs vocational classes and speakers help introduce the young people to available occupations.

But for uncertain high school graduates who did not take time to pursue career information, community colleges and the business community can be used as resource tools.

When seeking a career, a person should first consider his or her type of lifestyle and what job best fits into the pattern.

"Self awareness is the key," said Michael Grubiak, counselor at Highline Community College.

In his career exploration classes, he tells students to take inventory of their skills, interests, life goals and values. The

experience in the business world can provide enlightening knowledge about actually working conditions.

Although many young people see part-time jobs as a means for extra spending money, the jobs may introduce them to other aspects of the industry. Often jobs in restaurants or gas stations may lead to careers in restaurant management or the auto industry.

Temporary employment agencies can also offer young people the chance to work in different jobs and learn first hand what the businesses are like.

Many high schools and community colleges offer community volunteer programs that can earn school credit. Here the person can work in various health occupations, recreation, youth and senior programs, education and crisis intervention. This type of experience may lead to a further interest in the medical or social work occupations.

For those interested in vocational occupations, The Federal Way, Highline and South Central School Districts have developed a vocational educational school which allows high school students to learn occupational skills along with their academic studies.

Along with the community college vocational courses, many trade unions may provide apprenticeships which may be worth investigating.

Also, don't overlook the armed forces when considering occupational direction. The services can provide education and technical training to those uncertain of



job should complement their lifestyle.

According to one study, many people will change occupations three times and change jobs seven or eight times, said Grubiak.

To avoid unsuitable jobs, false starts in, he recommends spending time and energy investigating various occupations.

For starters there are more than 45,000 jobs titles listed in the "Occupational Outlook Handbook" which along with the "Dictionary of Occupational Titles" is available in most high schools, community colleges and public libraries career centers.

A quick glance through these books will surprise the casual reader with the multitude of job opportunities.

The computerized Washington Occupational Information System is another tool career seekers can also use to find suitable jobs. Available in most school career centers, WOIS can provide occupation descriptions, job market and salary information, skills and training requirements, schools and educational programs available and a personalized list of occupations for further research.

The system does not make job decisions, give lists of job openings or provide information on jobs outside the state.

However, career exploration doesn't stop with catalogues and computers. On-the-job ex-

their goals.

Finally, when the large career spectrum has been narrowed down to a few, counselors suggest talking with employers and people involved in those particular jobs.

They suggest asking questions about the training and education needed for the job. Understanding what the working conditions entail hours, overtime and pay.

Other questions to ask might be, personal satisfactions, social obligations, problems and business ethics.

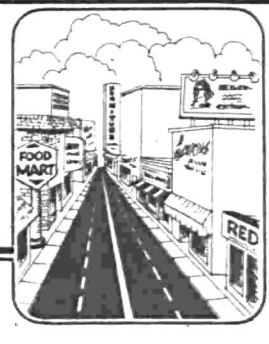
Future plans should also be considered, ask if there is room for advancement in the occupation.

When selecting a career, don't forget to look into non-traditional jobs and jobs, in smaller businesses. Many of the larger companies are flooded with applications.

Many small businesses are searching for people with a combination of skills that can fill several job positions at once. One local company was recently seeking an employee who could read blue prints and had a pilots license, said Phil Swanberg, director of student job placement at Highline Community College.

He said young people should not only consider special education or training when looking for a career, but also their hobbies and outside interests. These specialties can contribute greatly to a person's job opportunities.
