Design group OKs boat launch plan

Schematics for the "best of the bad sites" for boat launch facilities in south King County have been unanimously approved by the King County Design Commission for Redondo Beach.

Although Commission member Larry Peden said the "site looks ideal for everything but a launch" he and other members voted for the \$1.45 million design of Kramer, Chin and Mayo, Inc. Peden said the Redondo site, purchased last year by the county from Frank Todd, is "too small to start with and this will overtax and make a constant source of irritation and frustration. It is the wrong usage of the property."

Richard Gemperle, manager of the county architecture division, told the commission the boat launch would meet the voter mandate of the 1968 Forward Thrust bond issue which called for such a facility in south King County. "We've been trying to find a site for the past 11 years," he said.

The place favored by the county was Seahurst Park in Burien but the state, which will fund part of the project, turned thumbs down on that idea several years ago because the parking needed as an ancillary feature is not water-related. The closest other parking site would have been at the top of a steep cliff. Gemperle said, so the county scrapped the plans.

Bud Parker, county architect in charge of the Redondo project, told the commission "this is the last chance." He said there are no better places than Redondo to build the boat launch.

Parker said the schematic has been submitted to the state interagency committee for parks and recreation which will meet in November to determine the

suitability of the project. It is from the IAC that most of the money will come for the boat launch.

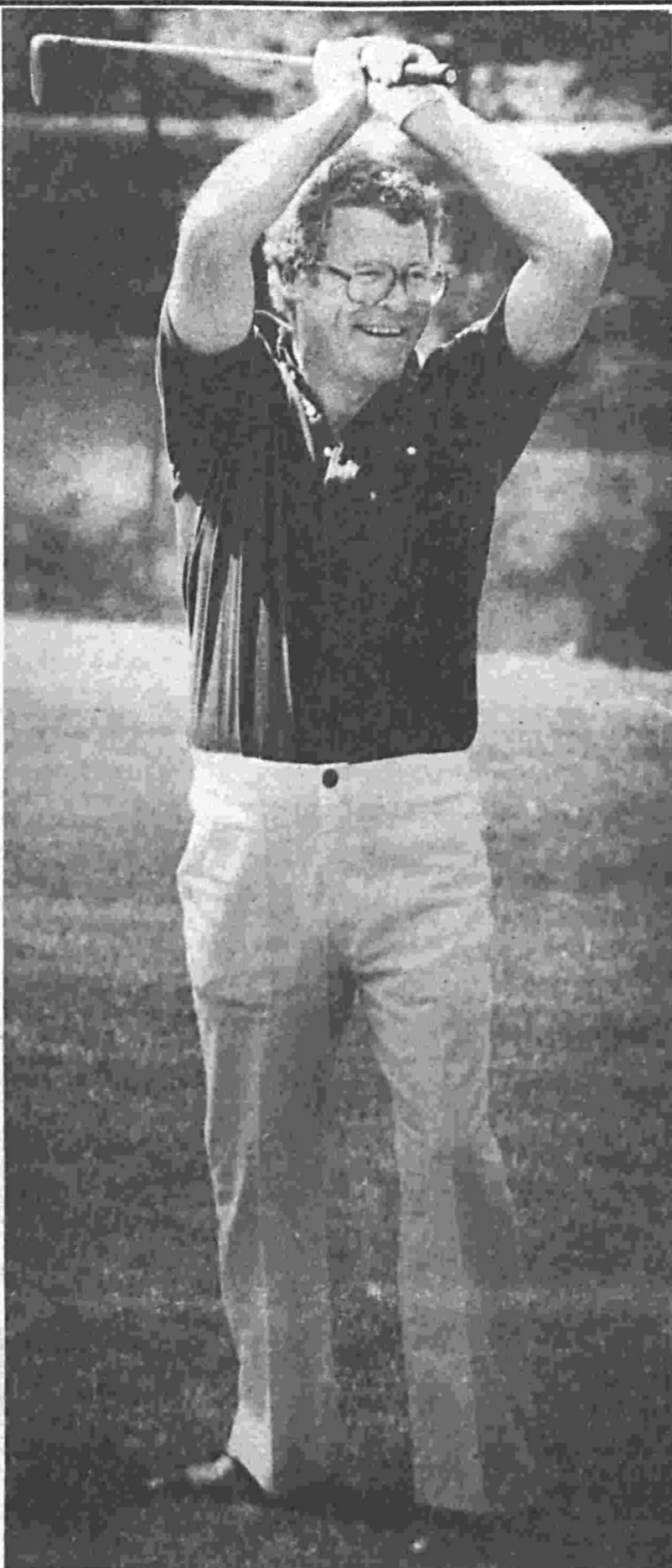
Although there is some question about how cars will be funneled into the launch area without causing problems for residents of a condominium to the south of the county property, Parker said the county will "try to do as much as possible to be a good neighbor to that community."

He said there will be parking for about 100 boat trailers in the lot and two launch ramps. The ramps will handle only eight to 10 cars each hour, he said, and lining them up in a configuration suitable to the neighborhood is still a problem.

Another issue still unresolved is the proposed restroom which would be built, according to the schematic, above the beach north of the pier. The cost of about \$112,000 for that design is several thousand dollars more than it would require to build facilities further from the beach. But Parker said placing the restroom away from the beach might encourage further "indiscriminate use of the beach for all sorts of things."

The county will not apply for funding to build a fishing pier at the site until at least 1982, Parker said, and will base its decision at that time on whether it "might overload our parking lot to an unbearable level. The community says no more on-street parking, but if the county puts up No Parking signs, they apply to everyone" Parker observed.

Gemperle said the funding from the state comes from boat gas tax and the project has to include the launch to qualify. "This is probably the best of the bad sites" the county has explored. "There are none better," Gemperle told the commission.

Citizens recommend pier-breakwater

A combination fishing pier and breakwater for the Redondo Marina was recommended by the project's citizen advisory committee last week, but the project's manager had some misgivings about the size of the recommended structure.

The marina will be served by a temporary fishing pier under current funding plans. However, since the committee has determined that a breakwater is necessary to guarantee operation of the proposed surface boat ramp planned for the marina, that committee also has decided that the breakwater should serve as a fishing pier.

Project manager Bud Parker indicated, however, that such a breakwater could be unsightly. He said that to create a breakwater that also would be a fishing pier would necessitate the structure be about 30 feet high — up to 25 feet above the water line when the tide is out. And, since the structure also is intended to serve as a breakwater, it would stretch not only out from the marina, but across it as well.

THE BREAKWATER project is not included in the funding currently being sought from the state. Parker estimates it will be at least three years until the structure is installed. Until then, a temporary fishing pier will serve the marina and Mel Ferron, president of the Redondo Community Club, last week emphasized that the temporary pier must be large.

"It has to be big," Ferron said. "We want the children from Federal Way to be able to come down. We want everyone to be able to use it."

Ferron indicated he is not satisfied with current plans for the temporary pier. "It's not just for Redondo. Right now it's too small," he said.

The committee last week also

recommended that basic provisions for divers be included in the marina. Those facilities include a ramp to the beach at the north end of the marina, unload parking stalls, and a cold water shower.

Renovation of the marina presently is pending funding from the state. That funding is expected in November.

Youth activities list is available locally

Got some kids who are looking for something interesting to do this summer?

Then contact Ginny Erdahl at 854-0471 and get a copy of a special "Summer Programs in

Federal Way" list that's been prepared by Federal Way Organized Services for Youth.

Put together by FWOYS members, the list is five pages long and includes everything from sports programs to counseling services.

Among the organizations listed are the Totem Girl Scout Council, the Federal Way Boys' and Girls' Club, Campus Life, the Mount Rainier Council of the Boy Scouts of America, Federal Way Recreation and the King County Work Training Program.

Others are the Federal Way Jobline, Valley Cities Mental Health Center, Mary Bridge Speech and Hearing Center and the Federal Way Youth Service Bureau.

Many of the services are free. For example, Mary Bridge, in Tacoma, provides language, speech and hearing screening at no charge.

THE JOBLINE services are available without charge, as are the work training program's and some of the activities at the boys' and girls' club.

Reasonable fees are charged for some of the other activities, and in every case the cost is included or approximated for the facilities on the list.

FWOYS members had hoped to prepare a substantially larger listing, they said, but many of the agencies they asked to send information did not respond.

"The list is as complete as we can make it," said Luanne Brown, the director of the Federal Way Youth Service Bureau and one of the members who helped prepare the document.

"dreds of agencies," she said, "but these on the list are the only ones that responded."

The group which prepared the list is a consortium of organizations and individuals who are concerned about solving some of the problems that youth encounter in the community.

Its general membership numbers about 160, and its steering includes school officials, representatives of local parent-teacher associations, social workers and one journalist.

THE GROUP intends to enlarge the listing next year and

will make it a permanent service.

It is also working on putting together a general directory of services and facilities for youth.

This publication, when complete, will be a substantially larger version of the summer directory and will include everything from counseling and job-seeking agencies to activity centers and sports programs.

Copies of the summer directory are also available through the local youth service bureau, at the South King County Multiservice Center and from the Federal Way School District headquarters.

County to install signal this summer

A temporary traffic signal will be installed by King County at the intersection of Dash Point Road and South 312th Street this summer, according to Paul Hooper, acting road engineer for the county.

Conflicting reports from the state and county as to when that signal will be installed have recently been caused by intentions to install different signals.

While both the county and the state are funding the installation of a permanent signal at that intersection next spring, the county has decided to install its own traffic control until then. The reason, Hooper said, is that the county is planning construction on South 320th Street which will reroute traffic to South 312th Street.

Without a signal, an already bad intersection will become even more dangerous, he said.

The difference between the signal to be installed this summer and the one to be installed next year is the ability of the light to respond to traffic situations. The one to be installed this summer will only be able to detect the traffic load on one of the intersecting streets. The one to be installed next year will detect the load on both streets, Hooper said.

The reason for the delay in installing the permanent signal is that the fully-actuated signal takes several months to obtain. The signal to be installed this summer probably can be found in storage within the county, Hooper said.

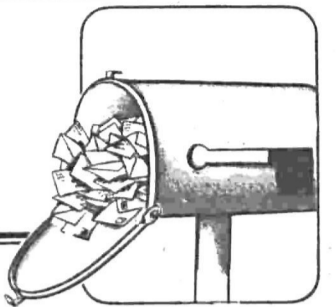

Water District 54 meeting questioned

Editor:

I was in attendance at the meeting of Water District No. 75 on Wednesday, June 6, 1979, as the chairman of the water and sewer committee for the Concerned Citizens of North Hill. As the chairman of this committee, I have been present at most of the meetings of Water District No. 54 for the past two years.

The commissioners of Water District 54, their superintendent, their attorney, fire marshal of Fire District 26 (Bob Arnold), private developer, (Vince Varacalli) and a friend or advisor were also present at this meeting. "The appearance of fairness doctrine" was shot down when this group removed themselves from a public meeting and closeted themselves in a private conference room. The implication was that no one else was to be allowed in this private meeting.

Water District 75 continued with other business in their regular meeting, awaiting the outcome of this private meeting. Unfortunately at the end of their private meeting this group did not return to the public meeting and no information about it was forthcoming to the people of the public meeting or the commissioners of District 75.

Bob Ricketts, a commissioner of Water District 54, was asked for a copy of the minutes immediately after this meeting and his reply was "we didn't keep any minutes." Commissioner Dodge said "the only thing we discussed is not a thing I can discuss with you or anyone else." A commissioner of Water District 54, also stated he didn't think they were having an illegal meeting. I

would like to point out ignorance of the law is no excuse.

According to the statement of August 1978 in EIS Draft on page 77, by personal communication with John Markwell, superintendent of Water District 54, that (1) Hidden Harbor Motel is within the area served by Water District 54. Water District 54 has a copy of resolution dated 12-78, from Water District 75, stating they will not serve anyone outside their district; (2) According to the district engineer "water flow and pressure are sufficient in the area to meet the demands of this project, without adversely impacting flow and pressure in the surrounding area"...yet, at the same period of time the EIS draft was released to the public, Water District 54 sent out a letter to all consumers in that district dated Feb. 28, 1979 which stated, "present capacity inadequate to assure fire protection in the event of a major fire, or even assurance of adequate domestic water supply during certain peak, critical times of the year." In view of this fact...Why didn't the fire marshal, Robert Arnold recommend rejection of this building permit?

In view of these facts our question is: Why is the fire marshal and the commissioners of Water District 54 engaged in a continuous effort to aid and abet the construction of this motel? A project which is in direct conflict with the Highline Community Plan, which designate the site as single family homes. In zoning disputes the Highline Community Plan shall govern.

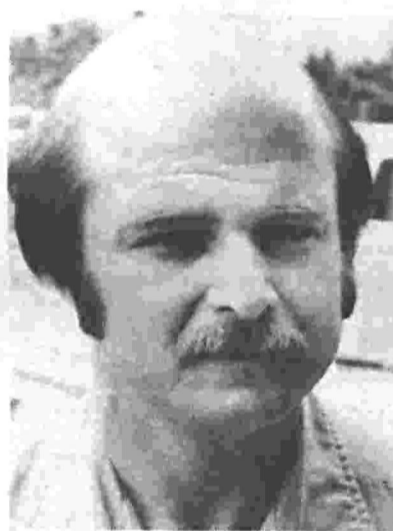

Signed on the Sound

Caryl Oros is doing what she likes best and she's making money at it.

You can find the petite, dark blond, ex-stewardess sitting amidst a tool-box filled with brushes and paint cans on the Des Moines pier most any sunny day.

Balanced securely near the flying bridge of a cruise or perched by the bow of a sailboat, she'll be applying heavy enamel to names such as "Boomerang", "Shady Lady" or "Polish Princess."

In the past two years, since starting her boat lettering business, Caryl has painted 50 boats, each hand-lettered to tie in with a family's theme or traditions.

"I always try to fit a style to a name, whatever that name may mean," said Caryl who chooses styles from a commercial lettering book with 120 choices.

With a name such as Valkyrie or Norsk Vind, she gives the letters with a heavy slant that brings to mind the Scandinavian countries. With "High Life," a 40-foot Richardson cruiser, she used a style similar to Miller High Life beer. On "Boomerang," a Hunter 27 sailboat, she slanted all the letters backward to symbolize the boomerang's return.

She said she finds that people really come up with some interesting names. Delving into her creative subconscious for a tie in with letters, she said it's not always easy to find the perfect script. "Sometimes it comes in a flash, other times it take a while."

But, she loves the challenge, she said. "I meet so many interesting people. They are just neat characters. When men come to work on their boats, they're happy and in a good frame of mind. They're doing exactly what they want to do."

Caryl, who grew up in Dash Point as part of the Keizer family, said she fell into the lettering business quite by accident. She and her husband Mike, a Northwest pilot, purchased a 28-foot sailboat and looked for someone to paint "Samurai" on its bow. Few, if any commercial artists were interested in such a small-time job, said Caryl. "We finally got somebody but it took a long time to get it done."

Looking further into the business, she found it would fit into her life by allowing her to set up her own hours around her husband's strange schedule, she said. Besides that, it would give her some money to either blow or spend wisely.

She registered at Highline Community College and took several courses including calligraphy, sign painting and one quarter of graphic design.

Commercial artist and friend, Jim Timlick who works at Western Sign Co., helped her

with the mechanics plus numerous tips. "He said it was all in the interest of better lettering," said Caryl. "Now I see he's right. I hate to see chopped up lettering."

Not a freehand artist, but a mechanical one, Caryl has set up a system to satisfy both her customer's and her own need for perfection.

First, she visits her client and they discuss the style, boat proportion and lettering size and color. Then, she's back to her home where she said she "does 60 percent of her work."

She makes three drafts, altering space and size when necessary over a light-box she made herself. On the third and final draft, she perforates the letters with a pounce wheel that will be eventually taped to the side of the craft. "A bag of charcoal goes through the perforations guaranteeing perfect lettering," she said.

Sometimes the lettering is done when a boat is in drydock, but generally the paint is applied while the vessel is in the water. Though sailboats need to be anchored securing to keep them from tilting, Caryl said she'd gotten used to the motion of the water and it doesn't bother her concentration.

"It must have been those years I spent as a stewardess," she said laughing.

She must be good at what she does, because business is rolling in. Maybe it's because of the listing she put in the yellow pages, or the cards she's tacked to the Des Moines Marina or maybe it's because she's there on the dock having a good time.

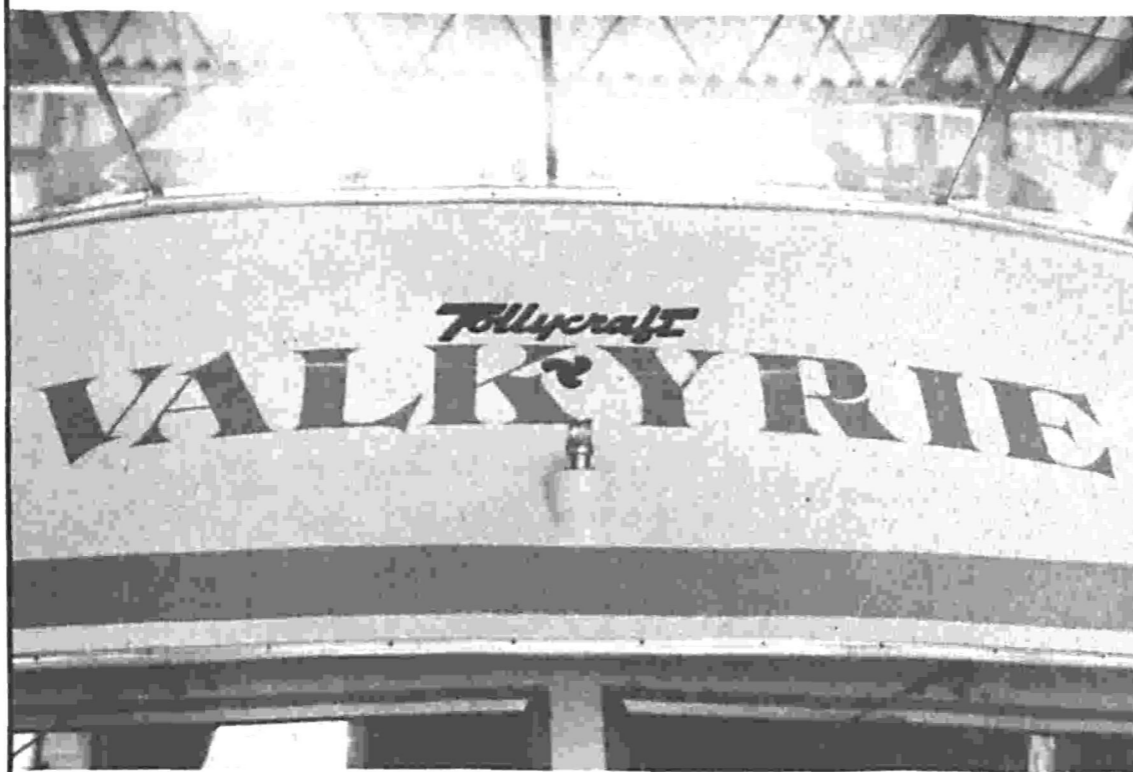
"When I'm at the marina, sitting on the dock, it creates a lot of interest," said Caryl, a member of Three Tree Point Yacht Club with her husband. "It's really fun, people dig up all kinds of things that need to be painted."

Caryl said she's even been asked to paint vans, but she's sticking to her first love, anything that'll float.

Why? Because she loves working outside, choosing her own hours, and most of all, working with people having a good time, she said.

Trading needs and deeds:

Barter bank offers service for seniors

Henrietta, 72, needs her plumbing fixed.

George, 80, is a retired plumber.

Susan, 67, worked for nearly 30 years as a newspaper reporter.

And Harold 91, needs somebody to write letters for him.

What these folks have in common is the King County Senior Barter Bank a recently organized and unique setup designed to enable older persons to trade services and thereby beat inflation.

The barter bank opened an office at the South King County Multiservice Center recently but thusfar only about 20 persons have signed up to exchange what bank officials call "needs and deeds."

So Henrietta George Harold and Susan don't really exist — yet.

But Katte von Oldenburg the coordinator of the local office and Jim Neher her assistant hope to have at least 200 Henriettas, Georges Susans and Harolds listed in the bank's needs and deeds files by the end of July.

"The bank" says von Oldenburg "has two purposes. One is to provide services for people

who don't like to pay today's inflated costs say for hiring a plumber. The other is to give people an opportunity to help others."

For example suppose George fixes Henrietta's plumbing. Henrietta buys the pipes and the other stuff that's needed and George does the work.

When the work is finished George has credit entered into his "account" with the barter bank while Henrietta's account is debited for the same amount.

Credits and debits are accumulated at the rate of one per hour of service.

Later when Henrietta Provides a service — let's say she refinishes furniture — the debit is removed. And if she does some additional work she accumulates additional credits.

"It's a new version of an old tradition" says Von Oldenburg. "Barter has been around for a long time and it goes on now on an informal basis. But with the bank we can involve many more people."

WHILE THE organization is primarily intended to give the community's seniors an opportunity to swap their services a number of younger persons

have expressed an interest in it as well.

"Anybody can sign up" von Oldenburg said. "And we're just as eager to find people who need things done as we are to get people who can provide services."

Neher believes the bank "gives people a chance to make new acquaintances and helps build a stronger community."

Both he and von Oldenburg say that since the bank has opened a number of younger persons who

work in the multiservice center have offered their services.

"That's very gratifying" he said.

The bank operates under the sponsorship of the King County Office of Aging Programs.

Persons who wish to utilize its facilities should drop by the multiservice center in the old Mark Twain Elementary School on Star Lake Road or telephone 839-8150 and ask for extension eight.

Plan for teaming paramedic service in county's hands

The who, what, and how of consolidating South King County's paramedic service has been left up to the Emergency Medical Services Division.

A June 15 deadline passed without any of the affected fire districts and departments submitting proposals on what should be included or excluded when three paramedic service areas join forces by the end of this year or early next year.

Now it's up to the EMS, and division manager Judy Pierce is confident its proposal will satisfy all parties.

"I'm sure each district will be receptive to our proposal," Pierce said. "They all want to consolidate, and we're going to make the best proposal we possibly can."

Consolidating the south county paramedic provider groups — Highline, Valley, and Auburn-Federal Way — is expected to streamline the groups' administration and make better use of manpower.

PIERCE SAID the EMS plan will be designed "to keep the service areas the same, keep the response vehicles as they are, and allow each service area to retain its individual identity."

Also in the outline, Pierce said, will be a provision for "one administrative head instead of three" for the provider groups.

Another important proviso in any consolidation proposal requires that all 25 paramedics now employed in the provider groups be retained. That will be part of the EMS proposition, Pierce assured.

The county had hoped at least one fire district would offer to become a lead agency in the consolidated paramedic service, thereby assuming the administrative and financial responsibilities for the provider groups. But the ball was passed to EMS when no proposals were made by the districts.

"None of the districts seem to want to take the financial responsibility," Pierce said. "I guess none feel they have the ability."

Becoming the lead agency "would be quite a bit to handle for a fire district," said Ed Stuhlman, director of Highline Medic 1, part of the consolidation move.

IN JULY, the EMS will take its proposal to each service area and "discuss it with them," Pierce said. With input from the paramedics, fire districts, and administrators, the plan will then be presented to the EMS Review Committee and finally the county council for approval.

Stuhlman, like Pierce, foresees no difficulty with the proposal.

"Everyone will probably go along with it," Stuhlman said. "We (Highline) have no special requests. I would just hope it will be a good system and that we will continue to provide good service for our communities."

Provider groups and county officials have been calling for consolidated service for more than a year. Expected benefits include a reduction of administration costs and the establishment of mutual aid agreements that will set guidelines for the response of paramedic units to aid calls outside their service area.

Swimmers Itch is prickly problem

Health Department officials are once more scratching their heads over what to do about the problem of Swimmer's Itch. It's widespread every

summer, and many King County lakes are expected to become infested again this year.

The culprit is a small, free-swimming

parasite larvae called schistosomes which is commonly associated with snails and waterfowl. After the victim emerges from the water, the organisms begin burrowing into the skin, probably stimulated by the drying which occurs

through evaporation.

After penetration the parasite dies, causing an allergic reaction with an itchy rash that gets steadily worse for two or three days, then gradually subsides. Fortunately swimmer's itch is not dangerous and can't

be transmitted from one person to another.

The Seattle-King County Health Department has come up with some advice to take some of the sting out of the situation. The swimmer should take a shower immediately after

emerging from the water, then briskly dry the entire body with a towel to remove the parasites before they start to burrow.

No specific treatment is available, but in severe cases antihistamine drugs may help control the itching.

Tugboat rescues Des Moines teens

Three Des Moines teenagers were rescued from the waters of Puget Sound last Thursday after their 15-foot sailboat capsized off Dash Point.

The girls who had been in the water for about 20 minutes were picked up around 9:20 p.m. by a passing Foss tugboat. The skipper dropped his load and returned to pick up the girls when he saw their life jackets in the water.

Other than being cold wet and very scared the girls were in fine condition said Pat Webb mother of two of the girls.

The girls were Candy 13 and Ginger 17 Webb daughters of Jerry and Pat Webb Des Moines and Suzan White 17 daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard White

Des Moines.

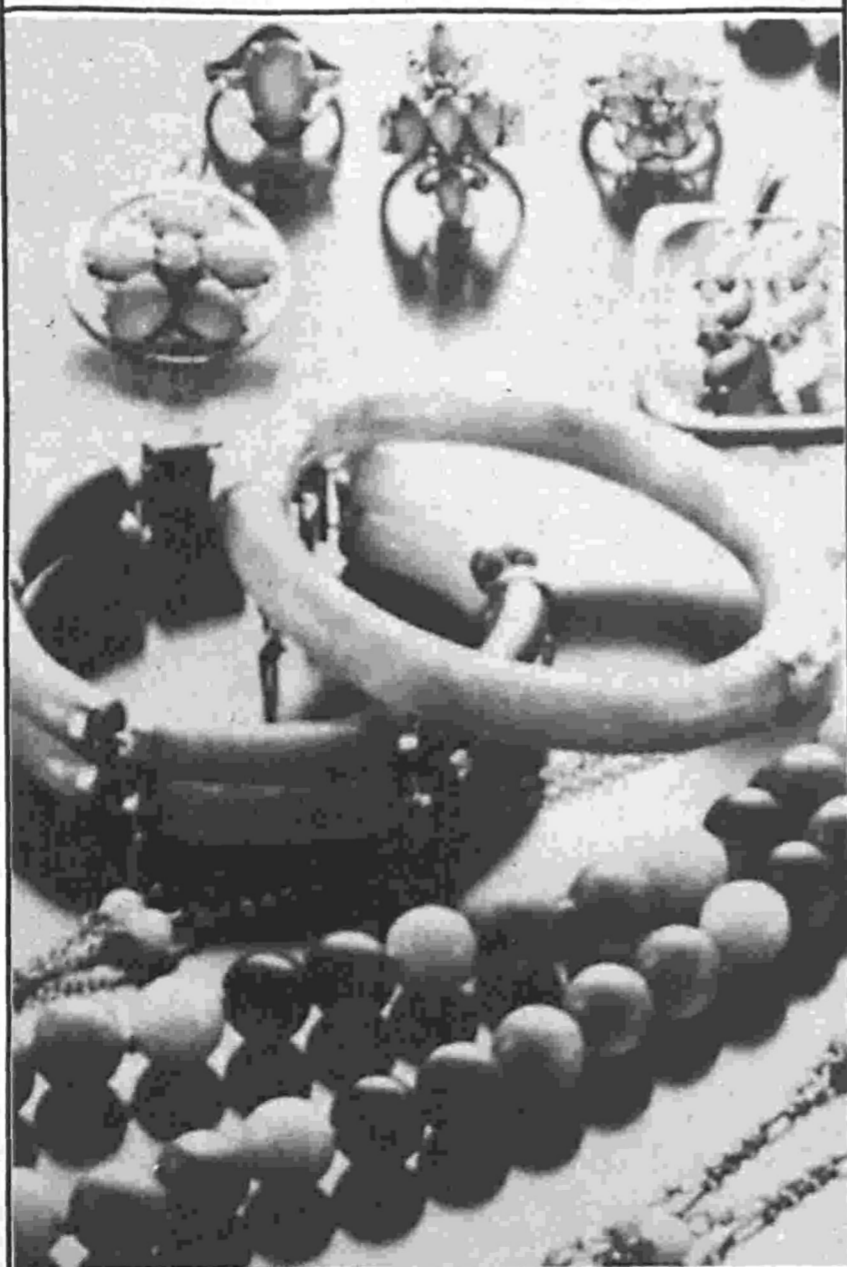

Road money shifted

A county council committee has approved the transfer of funds from one section of the proposed widening of South 320th Street to another. Full council action is expected on the matter tomorrow.

The public facilities and utilities committee voted Thursday to switch the funds to the portion from 8th Avenue South to 1st Avenue South from the budget of the rest of the roadway to the west.

The public works department said it will be ready to begin work on the smaller phase within 60 days and, pending further federal funding, should begin work on the section from 1st Avenue South to 21st Avenue Southwest in the 1980 construction season.

The approximate cost of the contract for the first project is \$650,000 according to Rex Knight of the public works department. He said contract costs on the 1.25 mile construction set for next year will be about \$1.3 million.

Knight said the money transfer was necessitated by federal regulations that mandate all of one fund be used before seeking more money. He said he expects full funding of the 1st Avenue South to 21st Avenue Southwest to be available to the county from the federal government next year.

Knight said the new road will be four-lanes with a median left-turn lane and bicycle and pedestrian paths on both sides of the road.

No notice, no hearing

The public hearing on Stones Landing, a 44-unit condominium project for the Adelaide area, was continued from Thursday to 9 a.m. July 17 due to lack of legal notice of the hearing.

Hearing Examiner Jim O'Connor told more than 40 Federal Way residents who gathered at Kent City Hall that no testimony could be taken by King County because it had no documentation that the hearing had been published.

Apparently, the notification is

to be posted by the project's engineer or architect both of which indicated they received no notice from the county to publish the hearing.

O'Connor said that failure to publish a legal notice is rare. "In my two years as an examiner this is the first time we haven't gotten anything back showing that the hearing hadn't been published," he said.

The continued hearing will be in room 402 of the King County Courthouse.

Woodside career education expands

Highline School District's Woodside School is more than a school for special children. It is a career center where its students, upon graduation, can take their place in the world of work.

Students in each of their seventh and eighth grade classes interchanged learning experiences. "This taught them to work together, instead of working in competition," Cook said.

The career study course entailed learning about various kinds of jobs, what local jobs are available, finding the appropriate job for the individual, and then shooting motion

picture film of the business people at work.

The filming of the jobs was a distinct part of the career study, Adler explained.

"First, the students had to learn the rudiments of photography. They learned how to operate and understand a camera, dark room techniques, proper lighting, and finally, how to edit and cut the film. They spent two months on photographic theory."

The students wrote reports about the jobs, touching on such subjects as job responsibility and monetary gain, each giving his own version of a particular job area.

In preparing the sound track in Cook's class, they read their own scripts about each job. The finished sound-tape, "Close Encounters with Kitchen Counters," a 24-minute film, will be shown in the career classes at Woodside, and possibly in other Highline School career classes.

Many kinds of jobs were first studied in the career course, ending in visits to the various industries or businesses where the photographic knowledge could be applied. During the visits, the students could evaluate their interest in a particular kind of work,

Cook said.

A number of Woodside students work part-time in a variety of businesses, such as warehousing at King County Directors' Association, in greenhouses, or at restaurants. Some other businesses visited and observed included the machine shop of Orion Industries, the Highline laundry, maid service at a motel, a kennel, a day care center, and a service station.

"We feel good about the program," Cook said. "The studies are job-related and fit in with our career education program, helping us to realize our goals for our students."

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Grass Roots Gardening

The public relation persons for the All American Rose Selections must have worked overtime to come up with the names of 1980 winning roses, Love, Honor and Cherish. One rose from the three major classifications, hybrid, grandiflora and floribunda is chosen for the coveted awards. The selections have been presented for 40 years. Entries are observed throughout two-year trials and also entered in rose test trials in other countries. All three AARS 1980 winners won certificates of Merit or Gold and Silver Medals.

Unique is the fact that William Warriner, hybridizer for Jackson and Perkins in Tustin, Calif., created all three AARS winners. This awards Bill the distinction of being the only hybridizer in the 40 years to produce all three AARS winners at once.

Be sure to visit Seattle's Woodland Park Rose Garden or the rose beds at Point Defiance in Tacoma. They are peak bloom now. We were impressed with all three 1980 AARS choices.

Bill Warriner tersely describes Honor, the hybrid tea, as "stately, tall and formal". Glistening white blooms unfurl from long one- and one-half-inch pointed satiny

blooms are four to five inches across on long straight stiff stems. Honor has the right number of petals for this climate, not too many to ball in spring but double enough to hold up in hot weather. The full, well-branched plant has rather large olive green leathery leaves clothing sturdy upright canes. Most of all it is mildew resistant. It's a rose we look forward to adding to our rose collection as there are too few good white roses to date.

The AARS floribunda, Cherish, is a vigorous, free-blooming compact rose bush covered with dark green glossy foliage. Cherish blooms early and profusely until frost. The pleasantly fragrant blooms are a soft salmon pink. They have high centers and the perfect form of hybrid teas. Flowers are up to four inches in diameter.

Because the bush is compact and free-blooming it makes an ideal shrub for group or mass plantings. Cut blooms are long lasting and the bush is supported to be almost totally trouble free.

The other AARS long stemmed winner is a grandiflora, Love. The brilliant reds blooms have contrasting silvery white petal reverses.

Although not as large as hybrid teas, blooms are beautifully form-

ed like a classic hybrid tea rose. Flowers exude a delicate spicy fragrance. The plants grow to an average height and have thickly set medium green foliage on sturdy canes. It has shown resistance to mildew and is expected to remain free of other rose diseases.

The three AARS 1980 roses will be

available for planting in late fall.

There are not too many insect problems in our rose garden this year. We've only sprayed three times. Aphids fly in and out and the pesky spittle bugs have moved to a n o t h e r neighborhood. Observe the rose bushes daily and spray with Orthene to eradicate insect pests.

Mix according to label directions. Apply by drenching top and bottom of leaves and canes.

Unfortunately, it's mildew time in the rose garden. If certain roses are continually covered with mildew, rogue them out and plant mildew-resistant roses next winter. Mildew can be prevented and even eradicated by spray-

ing rose bushes with benlate (Benomy) one time, then alternate and use Phaltan the next spray. Benlate helps prevent mildew but the mildew apparently becomes immune if only Benlate is applied. Spray from seven to 10 day intervals. Orthene, a pesticide, can be safely mixed with benlate or Phaltan

(fungicides) as a combination spray. Most rose gardeners keep roses on too lean a diet. Apply one-third cup rose food monthly, March through August, water in and watch the plant respond with new canes, healthier foliage and more large blooms. Apply a minimum of three to four inches of water weekly.

Water only in the morning so leaves can dry off before evening. To measure water depth spot containers throughout the rose garden and when there is three or four inches of water in containers the roses will have sufficient water. Make a calendar note to attend the free Valley Rose Society Show at Southcenter Mall on July 7 and 8.

The previous contract for the attendants expired Dec. 31, 1977. Bargaining between themselves and the airline has been conducted periodically since then.

Northwest has 528 flight attendants based in the Seattle area.

Green River offers job-finding workshop

The unemployment rate in Western Washington may be below the national average, but local job seekers will have to polish their job finding skills in order to compete for the best opportunities.

To help them do so, Green River Community College is sponsoring a Job Finding Workshop June 18-22 at the Enumclaw Community Education Center.

The workshop, which is timed to help high school and col-

lege graduates entering the labor force this summer, will emphasize ways to run a practical, productive job search. Surveys indicate that 75-80 percent of all available jobs are not advertised. The workshop will benefit recent graduates who may

Shell Oil applies for rental of 66,000 acres

Emphasizing that all discussions so far have been of a preliminary, "fact-finding" nature, State Game Director Ralph Larson announced that Shell Oil Company has applied for oil and gas exploration and development leases on over 66,000 acres of department land.

Seven Game Department wildlife recreation areas, or units within them, as well as a former department property where mineral rights were retained, are involved. The land is in Yakima, Kittitas, Grant and Benton counties. The oil company has also discussed leasing arrangements with the Department of Natural Resources for land adjacent to

Game Department property.

Larson expressed concern that many sportsmen might "over-react" to the news of the oil firm seeking leasing rights and it is the state agency's duty to see that all regulations are followed and that the best interests of the citizens are upheld. "No commitments have been made," Larson commented, "and we're going to look at the applications very closely before making any recommendations."

Larson said that although filing and rental fees have been received from Shell, the rental fees would be returned if the application is turned down. "While the potential income from these leases is

sizeable, especially if development is successful," says Larson, "just how much would go to the Game Department is uncertain."

Larson points out that Department of Natural Resources regulations govern leasing of state-owned lands and so DNR is the "lead agency" in dealings with Shell. The Game Department, however, would have rights of review and all contracts would be subject to Game Commission approval.

The Game Department's Environmental Affairs office is working with regional personnel to assess the leasing proposal and determine its possible effects on the wildlife resource, as well as management and recreation.

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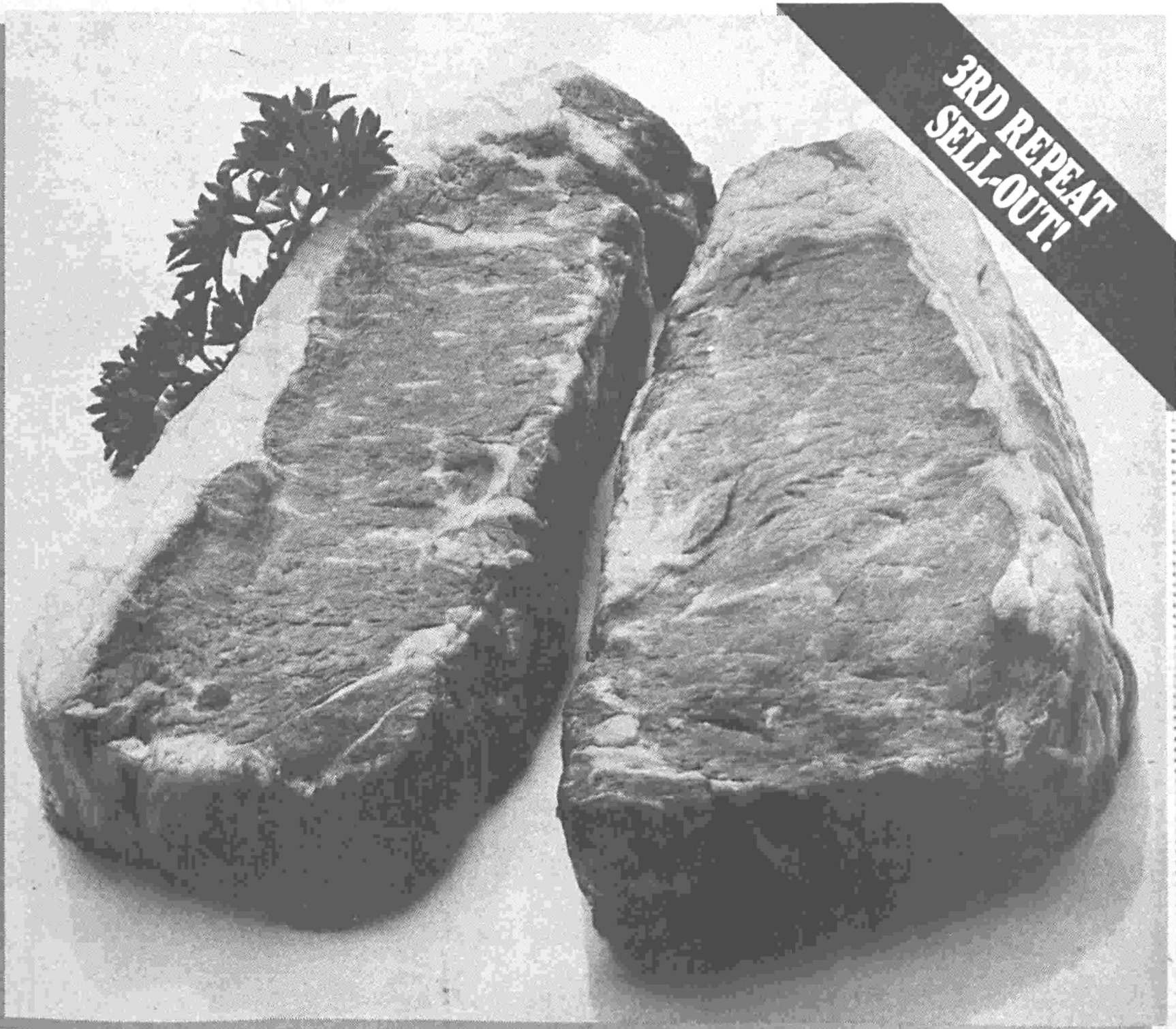
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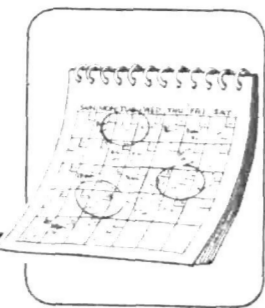

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Old-fashioned concerts soothe frazzled nerves

In the early 1900's, community picnics in the park where families and neighbors could visit and listen to good music were not unusual.

On a Sunday afternoon, people would flock in, dressed in their Sunday-best finery and relax to the sound of John Phillip Sousa's marches, Dixie-land jazz or classical favorites.

The Renton Musicians' Park

Band, who have been performing at Renton and Redmond for years are trying to get "the ball rolling in Federal Way," according to Roland Schanzenbach, conductor and band director at Decatur High School.

They will be presenting a series of four concerts, scheduled for Steel Lake Park at 1:30 p.m. the first four Sundays in July.

"It's a beautiful thing to watch" said Schanzenbach who

joined the group as a trumpet player in 1961 when he was teaching at Foster High School South of Seattle.

"People bring their lawn chairs, blankets, picnic baskets and have a good time. Through the years, a lot of people get acquainted and get to know one another.

The band made up of 38 professional musicians who either play professionally or teach have been staging summer concerts at Marymoor Park in Redmond and Liberty Park in Renton since 1964.

They are all members of the musicians union, Renton Local 360. Monies paid through recording fees help support the concerts through the American Federation of Music Recording Industry Trust Fund. The trust fund was established to promote live music.

The tab for concerts, which cost \$1,000 per performance is picked up by the trust fund who pays two-thirds of the cost and the co-sponsor, in this case King County Parks Department. Performers are paid \$30 per concert.

A great success that Schanzenbach said he feels is due to a well-developed program plus years of consistency, Marymoor draws up to 800-900 listeners and Renton concerts average 300-400 people. "People come back year after year," he said.

The Marymoor concerts are held at 7 p.m.; Redmond concerts are held at 4 p.m., also on consecutive July Sundays.

They play a range of music designed to fit the tastes of young and old who are interested in many kinds of music. They in-

clude music such as "Trumpeters' Holiday," featuring trumpeter and long-standing band member Jerry Woodman a Franz von Suppe overture, and "Victory at Sea."

"We always get requests for Sousa marches," said Schanzenbach. "So we always try to include at least one of those." Sousa's "Golden Jubilee" is scheduled for the first concert at Steel Lake on July 1.

The programs last about an hour and a half and include an intermission. During that time a small Dixieland jazz group also members of the band pick up the tempo for jazz lovers.

Though there have been previous attempts at presenting concerts in Federal Way there has never been a series of programs planned said Schanzenbach. Consequently attendance has been small.

Schanzenbach said he recently met with park officials and they decided it was about time they scheduled something for the southend on a more consistent basis.

"Even Seattle's trying to get some concerts started. There are so many rock concerts where people just get bombed out. It would be nice to see some family outings for a change" said the

family oriented instructor who was raised with eight brothers and sisters.

"We need that kind of thing in Federal Way," said Schanzenbach who grew up with close community ties in the small town of Wapato near Yakima. "People get used to coming out and sharing an hour together. Sometimes you see four generations sitting together. It's nice to see."

What happens if it rains? They may have to start late or quit early but it doesn't happen very often. In the last 10 years, Schanzenbach said they've missed only four performances because of it.

Diet secondary

Exercise is at the heart of health

Twelve years ago an overweight Ralph Willie suffered from back aches, leg tension and fatigue. He blamed it on his job. As a successful Federal Way dentist he spent countless hours standing, bending and concentrating.

Today, still that same dentist who frequently finds himself in uncomfortable positions, Willie suffers no aches and is not worn out by the end of the day. He's lost 20 pounds and, although he's changed his eating habits, he doesn't attribute his good health to any faddish diet — he attributes it to exercise and healthy habits in general.

Several years of study have unveiled the secret for Willie: good health is attained by keeping the heart and vessels in shape. He has synthesized his learning in his recently published "Health is Happiness," a 98-page soft-cover book that explains Willie's theories on body functions.

The key is cardiovascular fitness because those are the life-sustaining forces in the body, Willie theorizes. Each day the heart pumps an equivalent of 4,300 gallons of blood through 60,000 miles of vessels in the average body. With that stress, it is not surprising that more than half the deaths each year in the United States are attributed to cardiovascular failures,

Willie said. BUT THAT number can be decreased, he is convinced, if more care is given to the cardio-vascular system. There are several factors that can attribute to heart problems. These include family history which, although not predominant in the male; the coupling of stress and personality — how a person reacts to stress; inactivity, including lack of sleep, drinking too much (coffee as well as alcohol), and working in stressful conditions; and high blood pressure, an indication that the heart has to work too hard to pump the blood.

Also cardiac risk factors are smoking, obesity and ingestion of too much cholesterol, triglycerids — fat in the blood — and sugar.

But watching the types of foods eaten alone will not give a person good health, Willie said. Moderate exercise of heart also is required.

BY "MODERATE" Willie said a person should not exceed 80 percent of his maximum heart rate. That

rate is determined by subtracting a person's age from 220. Exercise should not cause a person to exceed 80 percent of that figure.

The best types of exercise for the heart are long, distance work outs. A person should start with walking, jogging or running, depending upon what strain will reach the maximum heart rate. "I know of overweight people who could reach that maximum just by moving up and down on their heels," Willie said. And, to start with, that was enough for them.

For those who are bored by jogging, the author said they only need to start the program with that type of exercise. "Then move to another endurance exercise, such as swimming," he said.

The details of the cardio-vascular theory are outlined in Willie's book, available in Federal Way at Book King No. 2 and in Puyallup at LDS Bookstore. "Health is Happiness" also may be ordered through the mail by sending \$4.50 to Health, PO Box 3493, Federal Way, 98003.

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Neighborhood building on friendship and care

A poet once said: "Heaven is not built of country seats, but little . . . suburban streets."
And it is apparently true for at least one neighborhood in Federal Way and the people who live there.
The neighborhood — formed by a cul-de-sac in the Wedgewood development off 21st Avenue S.W. — looks like many other new suburban developments. Most of the residents have lived there less than a year.

But Ann and Robert Randall, who live there, have a story that they say shows its uniqueness.
Several weeks ago the Randalls ordered chipped bark, peat moss, railroad ties, plants, seed and logs for a split-rail fence. They were going to put in their lawn, a task that they agreed was overdue. They had moved into their home at 33829 35th Place S.W. in September of last year.
But Randall was notified of his sister's death shortly before the piles of lawn mak-

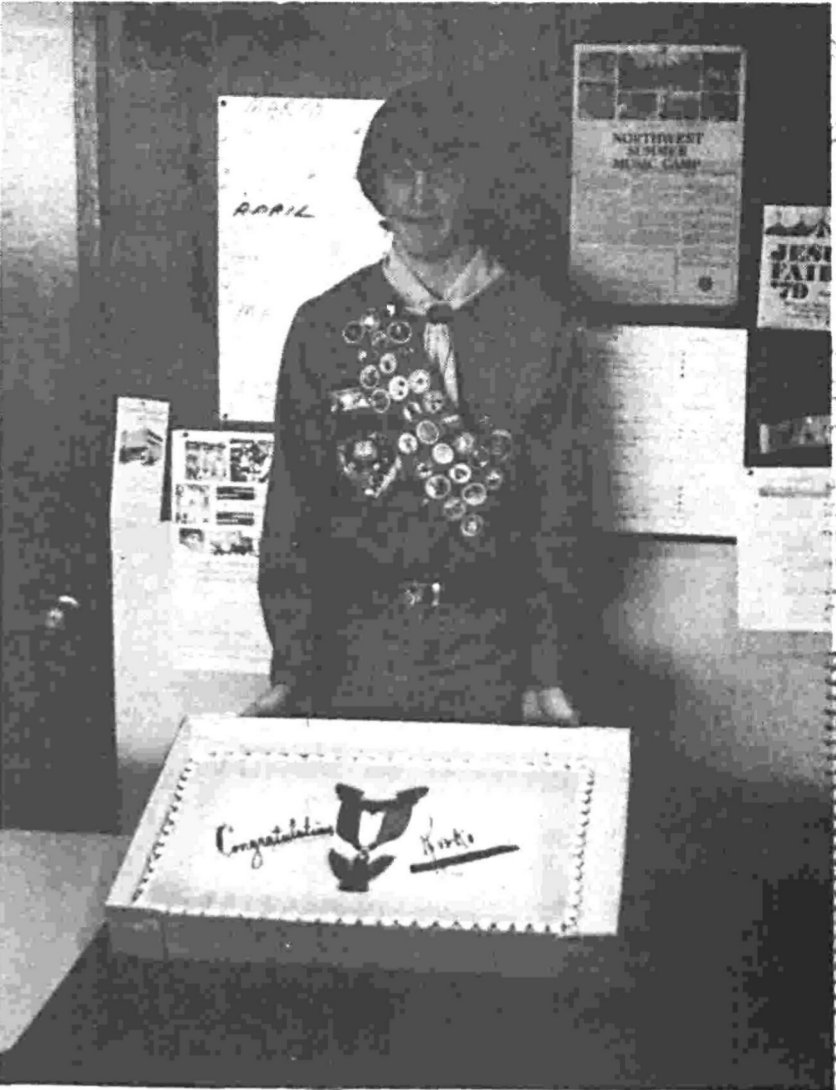
ings arrived. He and another sister and brother-in-law, Bob and Maryann Bratton of Renton, started out immediately on their long drive to Billings, Mont., for the funeral.
The next day Mrs. Randall said she looked at her rock-filled yard and the huge pile of chipped bark that covered her driveway and almost cried. It was just too much for her to do herself, she said.
At 5 p.m. the next day she again looked

at her yard and once more felt like crying — but this time for a different reason.
In the two-day period her neighbors — men, women and children — had pitched in to help, and the yard had been transformed into a neat, attractive lawn, fronted by a new fence.
The neighbors who were credited with the good deed were Bob and Merrily Abner, Mike and Anita

Sumner, Dianna Seely, Jane Kaess, Mark Lang, Bill Serefine, Marsha Trivett and their families.
"You hear about things like this," said Mrs. Randall, "but I never thought it would happen to us. I just love these people."
Upon his return Randall, exhausted after an overnight drive, said he was overwhelmed. "It's hard to respond to these neighbors," he said. "It was so much.

I wanted to thank them, but it did not seem to be enough."
But this was not an isolated incident, according to the Randalls. "We have a rare thing here," Mrs. Randall said. "We know that if we need help, we can go to any of these houses and get it."
According to their neighbors, the Randalls only received in kind what they regularly give. "They are always right there to do anything for anybody," said Anita Sumner. "And everyone in the neighborhood has the same special spirit," she added.
She and those who live in the 11 houses that form the neighborhood had similar stories of concern and helpfulness.
Mrs. Sumner told of a few weeks in April when her husband was in the hospital recovering from an attack of spinal meningitis. She was eight-

and-a-half months pregnant and still working at her full-time job.
"The neighbors were fantastic," she said. "They brought over meals and took care of my three-year-old. There wasn't a one in the neighborhood who didn't volunteer to help."
Mrs. Sumner, whose husband Bob was often described as the nucleus of the neighborhood, said her experience led her to believe that this was a special situation.
Dianna Seely, who moved from California to Federal Way last year, was also helped when her husband died in February.
"This is the sort of thing you usually see in a small town," she said. "I have never seen it happen in a city."
"I wouldn't trade Federal Way for anything."

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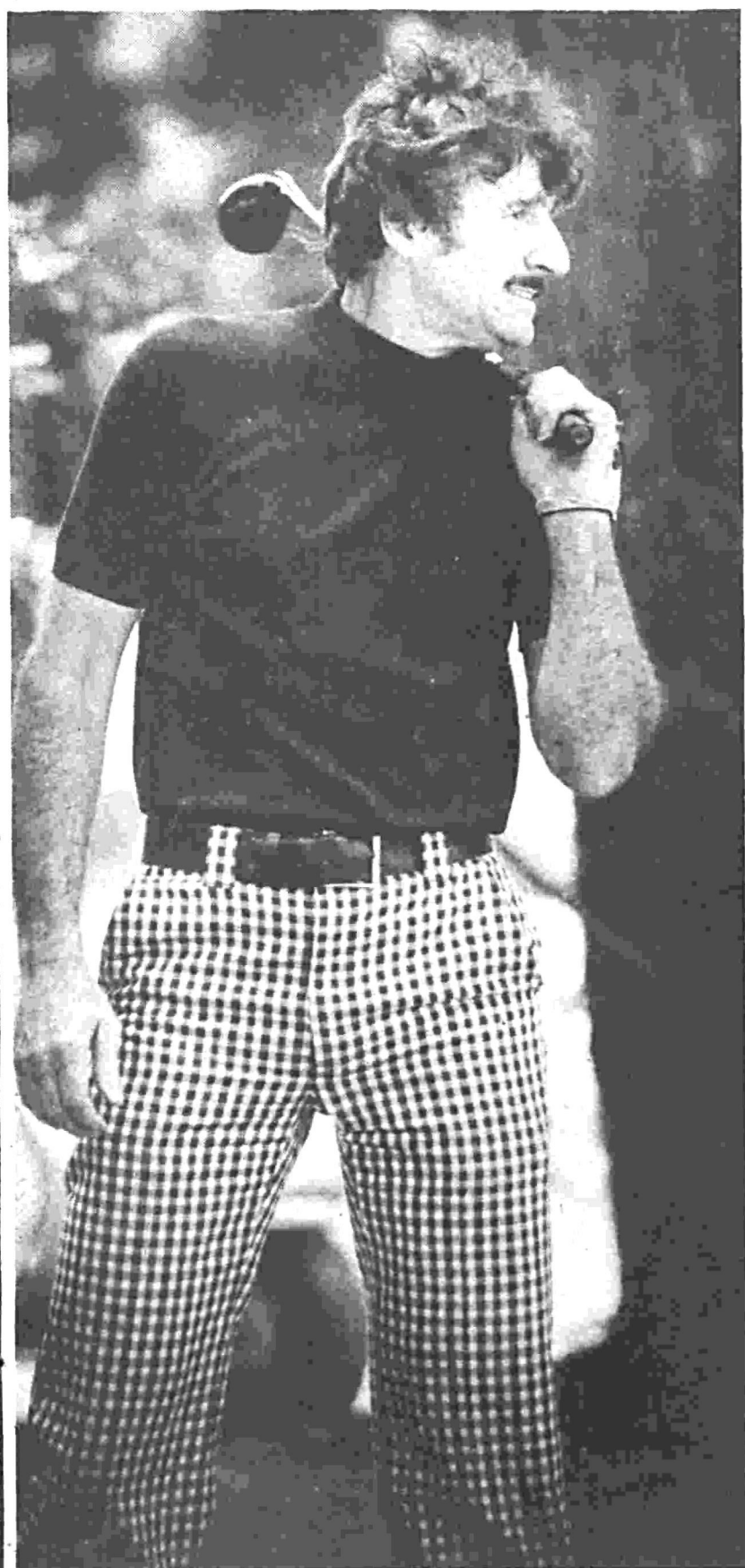
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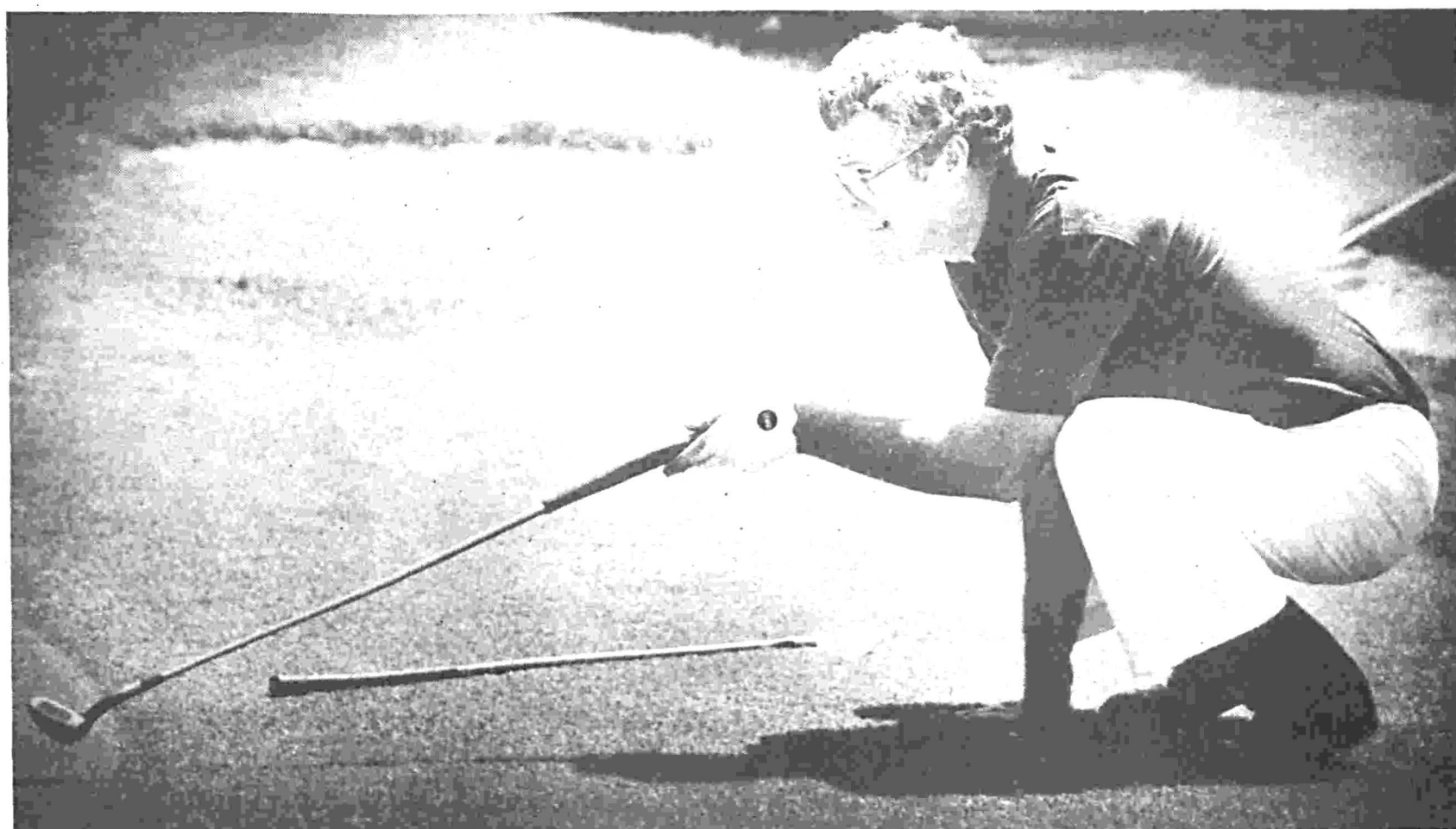
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LES HABEGGER, the assistant coach of the World Champ Seattle SuperSonics, eyes a drive down the 10th fairway at Twin Lakes.

"This is fun; it's obviously a change of pace, and no pressure," Habegger said. "I'm just out to have fun. It's nice that

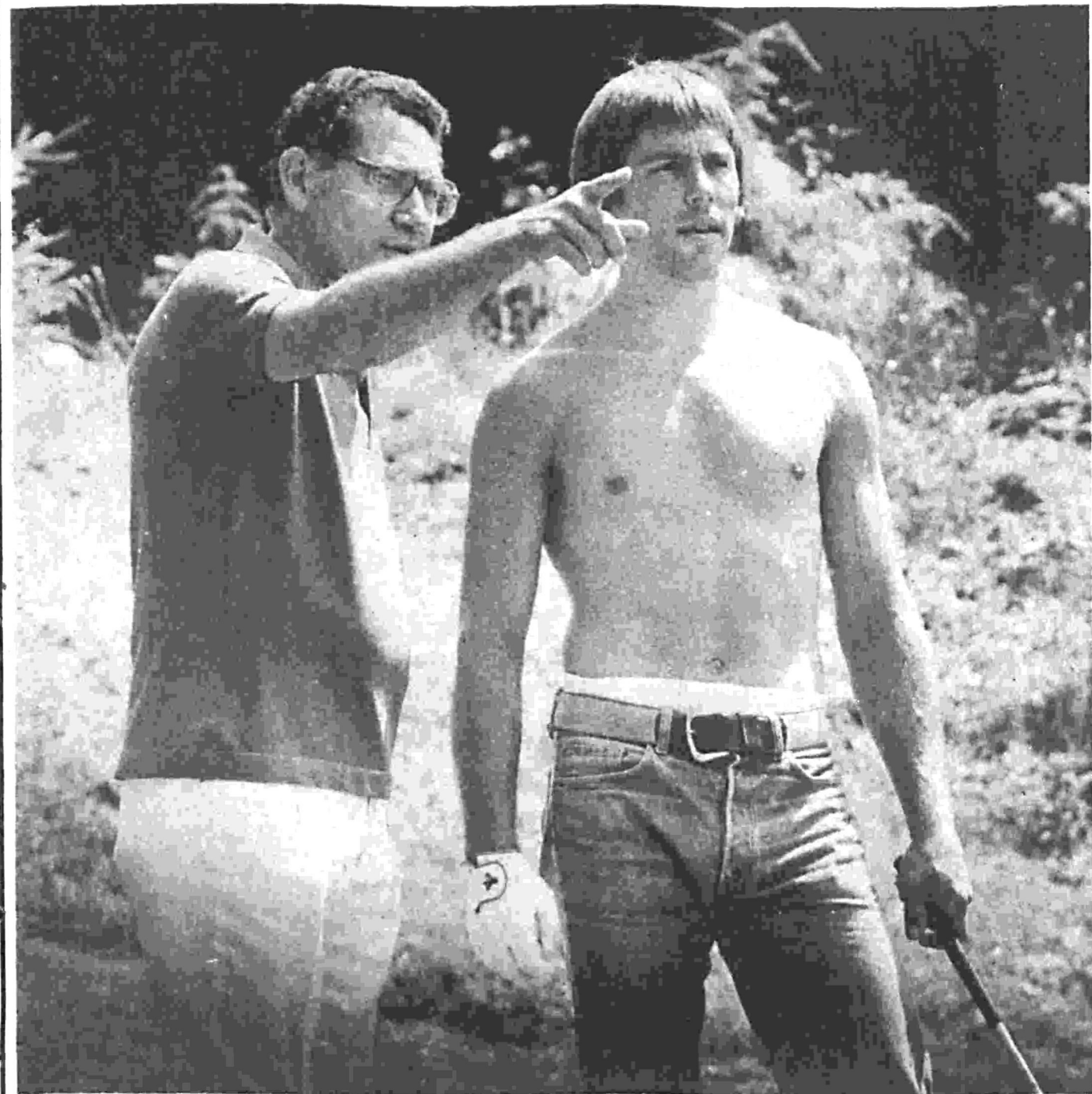
there's no refs blowing whistles out here."

"You can't blame anybody for what happened in that last inning," said Torina, who changed into street clothes and watched his club's seventh-inning downfall from the stands. "The strike zone seemed to get smaller and smaller, and they got those three straight walks. Then everybody gets pumpeled to make the play that will keep them down. Sometimes, bad things happen in that situation."

As an added touch, each fan that catches a ball hit into the stands will be signed to a special All-Star contract, and get his picture taken in front of the Mariners' All-Star Logo.

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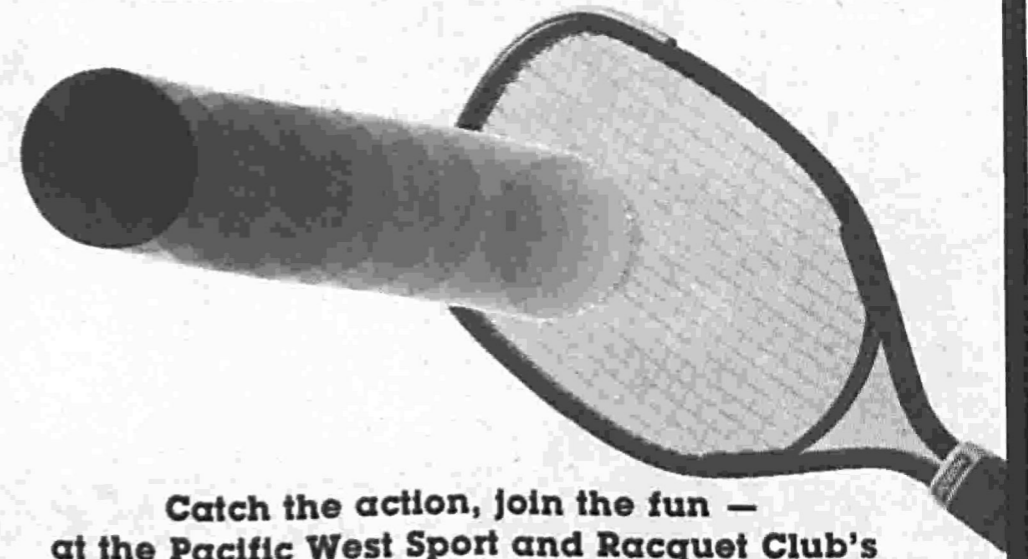
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Matman Mark Phillips is hungry for Hungary

Staying hungry has helped Mark Phillips win a chance to compete in Hungary. The 17-year-old wrestler, after losing five pounds in one week, recently took second place in the 115-pound class at the AAU Cultural Exchange Qualifying Meet in Cheney. He joined Federal Way High teammate Mike Hogaboam in qualifying to represent the State of Washington AAU team on a July 27 to Aug. 15 Hungarian tour.

Hogaboam, a two-time high school state champ, won the 165-pound competition at Cheney. He now is competing for state's AAU team on a European tour. The AAU pays for some traveling expenses, but each wrestler must provide \$1,500 for the Hungarian trip. Mark, one of four Phillips family children, considers his chance of raising the required funding as "a long shot." Wayne Sencenbaugh, who coaches the Federal Way High and Federal Way AAU wrestling programs, is searching for contributions to

"Wrestling is their national sport," he

pointed out. "The fans treat it like we do pro basketball around here. Some matches will have crowds of 18,000 to 20,000. "You stay over night with people you wrestle against, so you get to see how they live. Hungary is a Communist country, and we're the first AAU wrestling team to be invited there. It should be interesting." Mark definitely is making an effort to stay in shape for the tour. He works out about 20 hours per week. He usually

starts the day by running two to three miles. He attends various wrestling camps and competes in almost every tourney he can make. During evening hours, Mark pumps weights and jumps rope. He also holds a part-time job at a local A and W restaurant. Keeping in the 115-pound class is a problem for the growing boy. Mark elevated two inches last year and hasn't stopped growing yet. "Just keeping busy helps me make weight," he said. "As long as I don't think

about food, I usually don't get hungry. Most of what I lose is just water weight, so I don't lose strength. "I don't have to do what Hogaboam has to. He just stops eating. Sometimes, he has to lose over 10 pounds. The worst I had to go through was losing five pounds in one week for the cultural exchange tournament." Mark's dedication has paid off with grappling improvement. As a sophomore, he won only two matches during his varsity campaign at Federal Way High. Last

season, he boasted a 12-3-3 record. Next winter, he plans to move up to the 122-pound class and hopes to advance to the state tournament. Should the Hungarian tour become a reality, Mark will be wrestling freestyle and Greco-Roman matches. Each allows rougher moves than those allowed under high school rules. To prepare for the Hungary competition, the AAU club will spend four days at West Point, New York learning techniques.

Many areas are managed for primitive recreational use to allow hikers to enjoy them in their natural state, and this use just isn't compatible with ORV use. Ephrata Regional Wildlife Agent Richard Hoyt advises that if you plan to use department lands for camping or other recreational use, check with the regional office first to be briefed on off-road travel regulations. Litter has been a particular problem in the Methow area, and wildlife agent Sig Bakke has made litter a primary target of his concern. Bakke noted that the bail for littering violations in Okanogan County is now \$140, and he cites this as just part of an overall effort to control the problem. Bakke says he's expecting to encounter people problems in the Pasayten Wilderness Area since it's opening up earlier than usual this year. The snow has disappeared enough, says Bakke, to allow vehicle traffic to Harts Pass, Thompson Lake and the Hidden Lakes area. Agent Bakke also advises campers wishing to stay overnight in the wilderness area that they must obtain a permit from the U.S. Forest Service before doing so.

The Tigers, who captured the league championship for the first half of the season in Blazer Colt baseball with a 9-2 record, are stumbling at the start of the second half-season. 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Outdoor tips and tales

The old standby dodger is one of the most popular of salmon lures. A few simple things can help make it a real fish fooler. One of the most important is making sure you have the right distance between your sinker and the dodger and between the dodger and your bait. Most dodgers come with a chart which tells the best average distances for the various sizes. But at times a little more or less can improve your chances of attracting a salmon. If you're using bait and it's extra small, a little shorter leader can be better. If you're using a spoon, you can go three or four inches longer than the recommended distance. The weight of your leader and line make a difference too. The heavier the line, the more the action of both is damped down. Heavier line could take a little longer lengths, so dodger and

bait will be able to work at their best. When you've taken all this into consideration, you have to get the best speed. Trail your gear alongside the boat and then come up to trolling speed, adjusting your speed until it's working right. Then lower it away and hang on. One final word of caution is in line here. The fish don't always act according to the book. So if you aren't getting bites and others around you are, increase or decrease your speed a little. One way to get the right speed is to fall in behind or alongside someone who is catching fish and match speeds. Just don't get too close, either on his stern or beside him. When you've matched speed, bring up your gear to where you can see it and note how it's working. Maybe at that point you should change the lengths of the line between weight, dodger and lure to get better action.

Colleges form new conference

Six colleges in the State of Washington have combined to form the Washington Intercollegiate Basketball Association (WIBA) for the 1979-80 season. That announcement was made by Seattle Pacific University basketball Coach Keith Swagerty, who has helped organize the association. The schools include Central Washington University, Eastern Washington University, St. Martin's College, Seattle Pacific, University of Puget Sound and Western Washington University. "With the traditional rivalries that exist between many of the schools, it's just a natural affiliation," Swagerty said.

"This is something the basketball coaches have been working on for quite some time and with all of us now scheduling as independents, the need for some type of association became even more apparent." The only commitment made by the member schools has been to schedule home and away games with one another for the upcoming campaign. National affiliation (four schools are in NCAA), financial aid, eligibility and related aspects will continue to be handled on an institutional basis. Some of the universities involved will have applied to other conferences which include a number of

varsity sports. "We're not sure where this basketball association might go," Swagerty said, "but for right now our main goal is to promote and publicize the basketball programs at our schools." He added that the alignment "gives the teams something more to shoot for during the regular season, although not having any direct bearing on post-season playoff berths." During the season, weekly releases and statistics will be provided by the WIBA to the news media. A player of the week is to be picked as well as an all-star team at the end of the basketball campaign.

Clam-digging license deadline set Oct. 1

Beginning Oct. 1, ages of 16 and 64 will have to buy a license from the Washington Department of Fisheries license office in Olympia or from official license agents throughout the state. Washington residents will pay \$2.50 and non-residents will pay \$10. License agents may charge an additional fee of up to 50 cents per license for handling the transaction.

Anyone between the ages of 16 and 64 who wants to dig razor clams on Washington beaches must display a license issued by the Washington Department of Fisheries.

On June 1, the legislature passed a bill that will create revenues that can be used to enhance the valuable and threatened recreation resource.

Those under age 16 and those 65 or older, whether residents of Washington or not, must also possess a license but must pay only the agent's handling fee. Those who obtain their licenses at the Washington Department of Fisheries license office at 902 East Union in Olympia will not be charged a handling fee.

This license will be non-transferable and will permit personal use digging only. It for a license, has must be attached to a maintained a permanent place of abode within this state and law enforcement officials. Washington Department of Fisheries officials hope to have the licenses available for sale early in September.

The new law describes a "resident" as a "... person who, for at least 30 days immediately preceding application paratus, are repaid.

Revenue from the sale of these licenses will be returned to the general fund until the appropriation monies, that will cover the costs of implementing the licensing paratus, are repaid.

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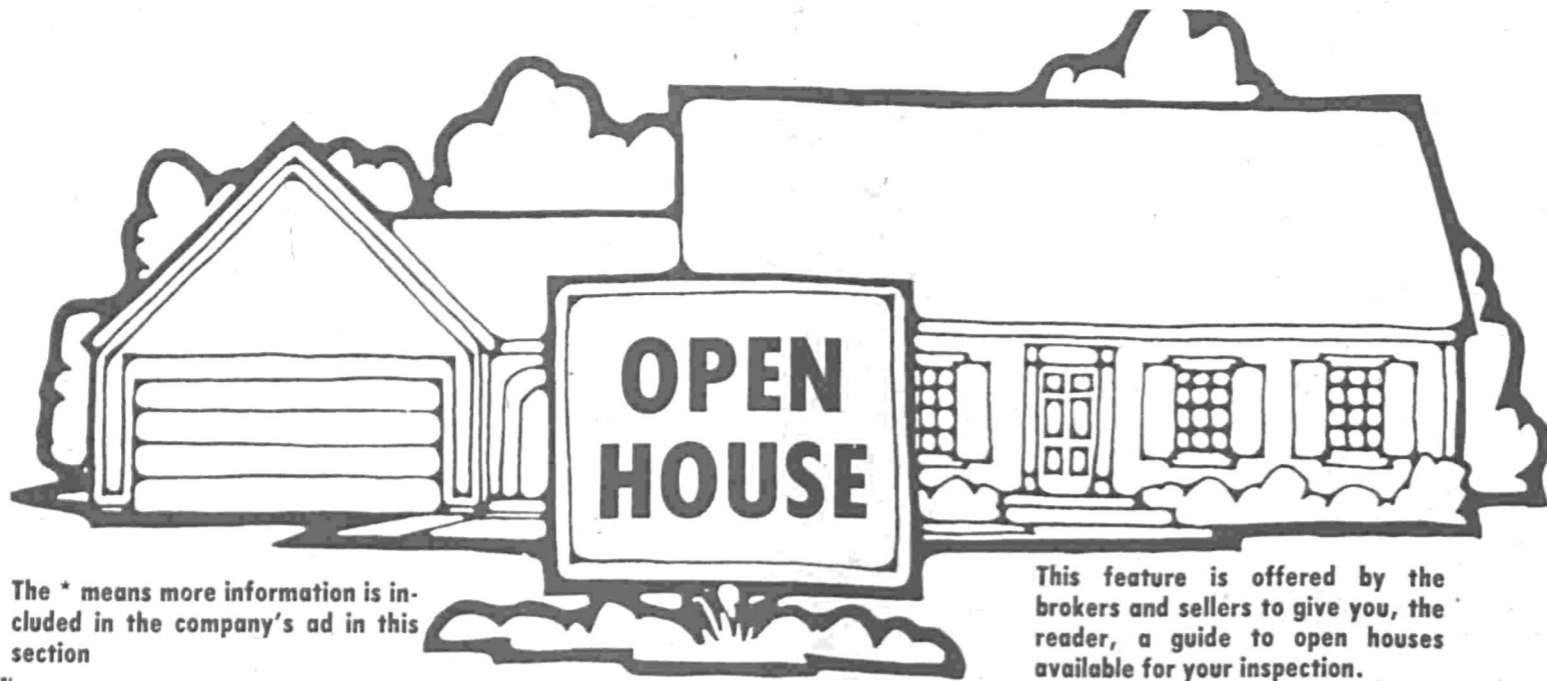

HOW LARGE A DEPOSIT

Rather frequently the question arises as to how large a deposit a buyer should put down or, to put it another way, how much deposit should the seller reasonably require. The deposit should be sufficient to make sure the buyer will have good reason to see the transaction through and to reimburse the seller for taking the property off the market and other incidental expenses in case the buyer defaults. The length of time from signing the agreement to the date of transfer may have a bearing on the amount of deposit, i.e., an agreement calling for performance in 90 days, for exam-

ple, should require a substantial deposit; a 30 day agreement might call for less. Even in the latter case, however, a 30 day agreement due to unforeseen circumstances may have to be extended and actually result in a 60 to 90 day agreement. The term "deposit" as used above is to be distinguished from "earnest money" which is a relatively small payment intended to bind a sale until a formal agreement can be written.
