Busing decision stands:

Parents' pleas fall on deaf ears

Boycott. Recall. Continued pressure. Those were the reactions Monday of more than 150 frustrated parents when their pleas for additional busing fell on deaf ears at a Federal Way School Board meeting.

For nearly two hours, clergymen, working mothers, officials from the Parent-Teacher-Student Association (PTSA) Council, and just plain residents from nearby every elementary and secondary school service area in the district pleaded with the board to reconsider its decision of retaining the two mile minimum for bus service.

The board at its July 9 meeting rejected by a 3 to 1 vote an administration recommendation that school bus service be restored to the pre 1976 level of 1.5

miles for secondary students and 1 mile for elementary students.

After lengthy public comment, the board decided to reconsider its original position on a questionable motion from board member Dick Schoon. Under parliamentary procedure, a motion to reconsider can be made only from one who voted on the prevailing side of the issue. Schoon was the only one who voted in favor of restoring the bus service.

NONETHELESS, the board took another vote with the same result—only Schoon was in favor. This time the majority was 4 to 1, bolstered by the vote of John Hickman who was absent at the July 9 meeting.

Hickman then made a motion that the service be restored with the stipulation that if district fuel reserves dropped below a two week level that the two mile limit

would be reinstated. That motion failed 3-2.

Fuel availability was cited as a major reason for the board decision, but was clearly not the key issue. The board cited educational priorities as their reason for rejecting the restoration of transportation to the pre-levy failure days.

Board member Nancy Ise said that none of the board would argue with parents over the safety of Federal Way streets, but that it had voted its conscience on the educational priorities. "I feel very strongly about this," she said.

BILL MILLER, another board member said he had a list of educational items such as full accreditation of the secondary schools which would not be taken care of this year even with full state funding of schools.

The cost to the district general fund to restore the busing program is estimated at \$28,000. The bulk of the funds—more than \$200,000 would come from state formulas.

Parents presented a number of petitions supporting the bus restoration for the fall and one parent said that car pooling would cost the taxpayers approximately \$111,000 a year to drive the students to school. That was based on four students per car at \$.98 per gallon of fuel.

Dave Crossen, a parent from Nautilus, said that the only defense of the board is saving \$28,000 and "the loss of one child would cost everyone in this room a lot more than that. We're in a mass transit situation," he said.

Parents after the meeting indicated they won't give up the fight and hope to pack the Aug. 9 meeting with even more parents.

School board race:

Van Sickle vs. Hickman; one will go

At least one Federal Way School Board member won't be around after the November election.

John Hickman and Larry Van Sickle are both incumbents and both intend to seek re-election. They've served together for four years and the relationship has been friendly. Now, they'll run against each other.

While the entire district votes for all board members, each member represents one of five geographical areas. For the past four years, Hickman has represented District 5 and Van Sickle, District 2.

During Van Sickle's term, he moved into Hickman's district, which is the southwest portion of the district. Thus, in November, he and Hickman will be vying for the same seat, and the District 2 seat will be open to a newcomer.

Director District 2 is bounded by 46th and 56th Avenues South on

the east, South 288th on the south, Highway 99, South 252nd and 32nd Avenue South on the west and South 232nd on the north.

Hickman has been on the board five years and is currently the board president. He was initially appointed to the board to replace John Hale who had been recalled. Hickman won a four year term a year later.

VAN SICKLE was elected in 1976. "I'd rather not (run against Hickman)," Van Sickle said. "I have a lot of respect for John, he's a good board member. But I want to serve the community. I'm secure in the fact that if I don't make it, John will do a good job," he said.

The other position up for grabs is director District 3, currently held by Bill Miller. Miller said he intends to seek re-election.

Filings for the four year posts opens July 30.

But not this month

FW still focus for more gas

Federal Way still is in the running for more gas allocations, but it won't see any increased supplies this month, the State Department of Energy said this week.

Responding to a recent request by state representatives Bob Eberly, R-30th District, and Frank Warnke, D-30th District, Energy Director Jack Wood said that there may be some relief in August but not in July, as had been hoped earlier.

Eberly and Warnke asked DOE for additional fuel for the area about two weeks ago because the "population factor" was placing an undue burden on area residents. The letter to Wood read that "if gasoline were to be

allocated on a population basis — and using the population percent ratios of Federal Way and Washington State for 1979 versus 1978 — the adjustment to Federal Way allocation should begin at 111 percent of 1978 usage."

Wood agreed that the distribution of fuel should be more equitable according to population increases, saying at that time that there was a possibility for more gas in the area from the state set aside, emergency gas supplies that are equivalent to a five percent of the total gas allocation.

HOWEVER, NO increased supply was allotted for July, Wood said, because the request was too late for this month. There is a chance the area will receive some

of that set aside fuel next month but Wood said such an allocation would make no notable difference in the supply.

"Federal Way's not the only problem — it's the entire Puget Sound area," he said Monday. "I doubt the little we have to allocate could make a difference because there's not enough there to go around and be noticed."

Salvation still may be at hand, however, as Wood said he is attempting to convince the Federal government that Washington is not receiving an equitable allocation because of large growth throughout the state. In addition to the Puget Sound area, fuel also is needed in Vancouver, the Tri-Cities and Spokane, Wood said.

HE SAID he expected to hear

from the Federal government on his request last week, so is anticipating an answer soon. If the area was to receive a substantial allowance, however, Wood said that he may be hesitant to widely publicize the fact.

"It may cause a hazard if one area receives the gas and another does not," he said, adding that he would inform the area representatives and allow them to evaluate the impact.

Additional fuel, if received, would come from all oil companies serving the area. The amount would be determined on a percentage of what a station now is pumping. There would be additional amounts in all types of gas, Wood said.

Rope swingin' cowboy rode with the best

When Carl "Slim" Coates, a tall gangly youth from Grand Rapids, Mich. graduated from high school in 1922, he struck out for the wild west and "excitement. "I didn't even wait for my diploma," said Slim chuckling. "I just took off."

But, he soon found that excitement takes money. He settled down as a ranch hand, working as a cowboy in Pendleton, Oregon. His days were spent on horseback, roping and wrangling cattle. It didn't take him long to learn that the work was hot, dusty and hard.

When the rodeo came to town, he said he decided to try out his luck. Discussing the events, he said "I used to do that every day for peanuts. Why not give it a try."

That rodeo, where he pocketed \$100 after winning a wild horse race changed the direction of his life. His next 20 years were spent as a bronco rider and trick roper on the national circuit. "I never went back," he said.

Well known in the business, he starred in five consecutive Pendleton Round-ups, won six World Championships at a Chicago Rodeo and a seventh at the the Chicago World's Fair.

Sometimes working with a partner, he played the West Coast in the summers and the East Coast in the winters, beginning in November.

"There weren't many motels in those days," said Slim, now 75 but still thin as a rail. "You'd just head for the nearest stable with your bedroll and find a place to settle down."

To pad his income, Slim developed a routine that included a smooth line of patter with snappy jokes and comments. It wasn't long before he had added nightclubs and promotions to fit in between rodeo schedules.

Still able to tell a joke with the best of them, Slim said he could find all the jokes he needed by just reading about Congress or leafing through the newspaper.

During a performance at Madison Square Garden that he considered the climax of his nightclub career, he was

discovered by talent scouts. His next few years were spent touring the states and abroad as part of the Tom Mix circus, a member of "Tex" Austin's famed rodeo outfit.

Eventually reaching Hollywood, where there was a demand for western performers who could handle a horse and a rope, he played in over 200 movies.

A stunt man in one movie, he said he was killed 11 times before they got it right. "I fell off horses, from roofs and off cliffs and always managed to come out of it pretty good," he said.

Leafing through a stack of autographed pictures of the stars, Slim said he got to know some of them pretty good. "Hoot Gibson was quite a guy. You know, he made millions but he died broke. He was always handing out money to anybody who was down and out."

But, being a cowboy occasionally presented problems. Slim mentioned one instance where he was required to wear low-heeled boots in "Under Two Flags." "The director came over and told us to look real tired and I sure didn't have any trouble doing thatwith those boots on."

Occasionally, while watching a late, late movie, Slim said he finds himself as an Indian, Royal Mountie, cavalryman or cowboy. "It's kind of like seeing your whole life go by you again."

When someone asks how to find him, he always says just look for the tall one with dark hair and that'll be me.

Though he retired from rodeo and westerns in 1941, Slim has never been far from the limelight. Over the years, in the insurance business, he's volunteered his time every chance he got to keep the wrists agile and the ropes oiled.

Now at home with his son, Bill Kullman and his family of Star Lake, Slim said if he had to do it again, he wouldn't change a thing. "I felt better on a horse in the arena for 15-20 seconds than I ever felt behind a desk."

City committee official says county will approve petition

A Federal Way City Committee spokesman said Monday that the dispute over the community's incorporation petition appears to have been resolved and predicted that the certification process will now proceed normally.

The spokesman, Information Chairman Ross Davis, said that the "alleged" errors in the legal description of the proposed city limits are "so minor that the (King County) election officials decided to go ahead."

As a result, said Davis, the petition will be passed on to the King County Council, which has the authority to correct the errors before the King County Boundary Review Board begins to consider the matter.

But county Superintendent of Elections Don Perrin said Monday that nothing has changed.

"We're going to do just what we said last week," he said. "We'll tell the county council that the description is correct — with certain exceptions."

Perrin also said that his staff has begun the second step in the certification process, the checking of the petition's 2,000-odd signatures to determine if they are valid.

THE DISPUTE erupted last week, after Perrin reported finding the errors and a deputy county prosecutor indicated that the errors would give the county council an opportunity to determine whether or not it would accept the petition.

Earlier in the week it had appeared that Perrin's staff might invalidate the petition, but the prosecutor's opinion was that the certification effort should be continued.

Certification involves two steps, checking the accuracy of the description of the proposed city limits and determining whether the signatures are valid.

Davis and other city committee officials say they have no doubt that the signatures will pass scrutiny.

"It appears that the stumbling block has been removed," Davis said of the boundary dispute. "They (the election officials) have changed their tone from a belligerent one to a much more conciliatory one."

BUT PERRIN said that "All we did was what I said last week: we checked with the prosecutor's office because we knew we needed a legal opinion. I can't see where our position has changed at all."

"I really don't know what they mean by 'more conciliatory,'" he said.

Davis had complained last week that election officials had not "bothered" to notify the city committee of the problem. He said the committee learned of it through a local newspaper reporter.

The proposed boundaries in question include Puget Sound on the west and the Pierce County line on the south. The northernmost proposed boundary is South 255th Street, while on the east the city would end at the approximate limits of Kent, Auburn and other valley cities.

But the boundary review board will have the final word in fixing the proposed limits. The board cannot, however, change the proposed name, Federal Way, or the proposed form of government, manager-council.

Festival reception set for Thursday

The Federal Way Festival in the Forest Association's reception to thank Gov. Dixy Lee Ray and the legislators who helped win approval for construction of the local performing arts center will be held tomorrow (Thursday) evening at the Federal Way Elks Club.

To begin at 6 p.m., the reception will feature as guests Rep. Frank Warnke, D-30th District, Rep. Bob Eberly, R-30th District, and State Sen. Peter von Reichbauer, D-30th District. Each of the legislators supported construction of the center in Federal Way.

The 1979 Legislature approved a \$5 million expenditure for the project — it would be called the Pacific Northwest Center for the Performing Arts — and the governor signed the measure into law.

U. S. Rep. Norm Dicks, D-6th District, has meanwhile introduced a bill that would provide an additional \$15 million in federal funding.

When completed, the center would house Seattle Opera's annual Wagner festival and provide facilities for a variety of musical and theatrical performances.

State legislator setting bad example

When a governmental agency, in this case the Port of Seattle, forces 400 families out of their homes, you'd expect some resistance.

Of course there would be some homeowners who'd plant their heels and say, "No, no, I won't go!"

But a state legislator? We're referring to Rep. John Jovanovich, a 31st District Democrat, who is forcing the Port to evict him and his family from their home north of Sea-Tac Airport.

Jovanovich, a first term legislator, owns property in the north clear zone, an area which is being brought out by the Port in its land acquisition program. Just like 400 other families, Jovanovich was notified he must sell his property to the Port and relocate.

But unlike other

homeowners, Jovanovich has sold his property to the Port and stayed put.

Jovanovich was informed three years ago he would have to relocate. When the two parties, Jovanovich and the Port, reached an impasse over the price of his property, the matter went into condemnation. In June 1978, the condemnation jury decided \$75,000 was a just price for Jovanovich's three bedroom home, a far cry from the Port's original offer of \$42,000.

At that time, the Port also committed an additional \$13,000 replacement housing payment, available to Jovanovich when he found another home. That totals \$88,000.

Jovanovich accepted the \$75,000 but did not move from the now Port-owned home. By law, he had 90

days, until November 1978, to vacate. November came quickly and Jovanovich was busy winning his election to the state house.

He served in the Legislature until adjournment in the spring and returned to his home. He has not moved yet.

The Port charged him \$500 per month back to November, but for some odd reason Jovanovich has not given the Port a cent. So just recently, the Port started eviction proceedings.

The Port was lenient in waiting until now to evict Jovanovich. Perhaps too lenient. Do other families get an eight-month grace period after their 90 days are up?

Probably not. Port officials say they wanted to leave Jovanovich alone while he was in Olympia.

But enough is enough.

Jovanovich has had three years, \$75,000 and a promise of \$13,000 more to buy another home.

He says it's difficult to find another place in the 31st District, where he must remain as a legislator. But he was informed of Port plans for his property long before he became a legislator.

Jovanovich took the \$75,000 but refuses to pay rent. "I'm trying to make a point," he says. "Somebody's got to dig their heels in."

What is the point? That a state legislator is above the law?

If Jovanovich was John Q. Citizen, this affair would receive little attention. But he is a high-ranking elected official and should be setting an example for the public. Some example.

Get tough on run-up curfew violators

One recent night around midnight, a Hughes Airwest Boeing 727 reportedly conducted had an almost hour long run-up at Sea-Tac Airport.

A run-up is when full power is applied to an aircraft's engines for test and tune-up purposes. It is extremely noisy—the constant rumble can be heard from many miles away—and there are laws to prevent airlines from conducting the operation during late night hours.

The Hughes Airwest run-up was a flagrant violation of the county noise curfews, but

the airlines can only be fined a ridiculous \$10 for the incident. Would a \$10 fine prevent the airlines from going out and doing it again? Probably not.

The County Council is currently considering a new county noise ordinance which could make airlines officials think twice about authorizing illegal run-ups.

The new ordinance would require aircraft to be aligned with runways during run-ups (so the noise would go north and south, instead of east and west).

Run-ups would only be

allowed from 6 a.m. until 10 p.m. if an amendment submitted by County Executive John Spellman is accepted. The proposed ordinance originally prohibited run-ups before 7 a.m. but Spellman apparently feels some airlines with early morning commuter flights would be hurt if they couldn't conduct run-ups before 7 a.m.

We won't take issue with that. The difference between a 6 or 7 a.m. curfew cutoff time seems minimal.

What we would like to see in the new ordinance is a higher fine and procedures for enforcement. How about

a \$100 fine such as in the city of Seattle's noise ordinances?

Even \$100 seems too little. Perhaps the county could assess a penalty of \$1 for every person bothered by the run-up noise.

Whatever the penalty may be, it should be tough enough to prevent violations.

Airport area residents have pretty much accepted the fact they must put up with noise from general airport operations.

But a middle of the night run-up is different. It can be avoided.

Park bonds OK, but should be on ballot

What may become known as the "Son of Forward Thrust" is currently under consideration by the King County Council.

It is a massive park bond which could pour millions of dollars into recreational facilities in unincorporated King County. Facilities from White Center to Federal Way

have already been mentioned in the proposal.

In our view, parks in Southwest King County should be a high priority for future development and expansion.

The parks are crowded now, but what will happen when one-quarter of a

million more people find a new home in King County by 1990, as experts are predicting?

If we don't need bigger, better and even more parks now, we soon will.

The catch, of course, is money. A homeowner would pay about \$23 a year on a \$75,000 house to pay off a 30-

year, \$100,000 general obligation bond.

The county council could approve the bond issue without placing it on the ballot. That would be a mistake.

The cost is high enough to warrant a vote by the persons who will pay the bill.

Teen disco to reopen following code violations

Federal Way's Money Tree, a teen disco on South 288th Street and Pacific Highway South, will be open again this weekend if it is able to comply with Fire and Building codes violations charged against it last week.

Owner Joe Zorich said he will be in compliance with the major violations this week, allowing the disco to open again.

The Money Tree was ordered

closed last week when Federal Way Fire Department officials learned that the establishment had not obtained a building permit for remodeling. A closer look at the restaurant-turned-disco showed that the remodeling had caused the building to be in violation of 14 Fire and Building codes.

Although the closure order was posted on the Money Tree door a week ago Monday, the activities

in the building were not curtailed until Friday when Federal Way Fire Marshal Dave Crossen, and King County Fire Marshal and Police officials arrived at the establishment to enforce the closure. Zorich said he had been out of town for four days and was not aware of the order.

MOST OF THE violations pertain to lack of adequate exits. According to the violations posted on the Money Tree door, some exits were not adequately illuminated, others did not afford sufficient space around the door and others were not wide enough. There also are not sufficient exits on the upper floor.

Tom McDonald, King County Fire Marshal, said he met with Zorich Monday to remedy the problems. Apparently, Zorich will be allowed to reopen if he adds one exit on the upper floor and reduces the occupancy load on the lower floor.

Other violations will be corrected after the major ones are addressed, McDonald said.

Crossen said last week that the building had been inspected and OK'd a few months ago by the King County Fire Marshal's office. However, that office was not aware at the time that no building permit had been received to remodel the establishment. Once that was learned, a closer look was taken, revealing the violations.

ZORICH SAID he did not care to discuss the existence of a building permit, indicating that he questioned whether one was necessary when the bottom floor of the building was remodeled into a disco. He did say, however, that it is "funny" that King County would close his disco after it had been operating for more than a year.

"Now we're just trying to get this place open again," he said.

Star Lake weeds may face spray

Action Monday by the King County Council may have cleared the way for use of a herbicide in Star Lake to control Eurasian Milfoil.

Although it has no force of law behind it, a motion adopted by the council found that spraying a herbicide into Star Lake would not interfere with the normal use of the water or shoreline and was therefore exempt from the Shoreline Management Act.

The motion, introduced by Councilman Paul Barden, indicated that the county building and land development division (BALD) acted "arbitrarily" when it blocked the spraying of the lake last Wednesday.

Ed Sand, manager of BALD, said after the council adopted the motion by unanimous vote, "we don't have to grant them a permit but we probably will."

Sand's division posted a "stop work" order on the chemical spraying of the lake just before a commercial crew arrived to spray the water with endothal, a herbicide. Residents of the lakefront had hired Aquatic Control to spray the lake because the weed is overrunning the lake and makes swimming dangerous, especially for children.

King County, which is participating with Metro in an experimental Milfoil control project on Union Bay in Lake Washington, "doesn't have a policy or any staff who are experts" according to Councilman Gary Grant in whose district the 25-acre lake is located.

Grant said Monday "our

building division has used the Shoreline Management Act as a device to prevent the use of any herbicide including endothal. I don't really think the Shoreline Management Act was meant to be used in this fashion. If we don't permit application, it's probable that the citizens will go out and apply herbicides themselves and maybe in quantities that could be dangerous."

Barden said the fern-like stalks are "smothering the beach and rendering it useless for swimming." He said, because of the shallowness of the lake, it would cost too much to use an alternative to a herbicide such as aqua screens which are placed over the young plants preventing their growth.

Greenpeace, an environmental protection citizen lobby, opposed the Star Lake spraying and volunteered to help harvest the weeds by hand if such a method could be proved environmentally safe.

According to county Planner Donovan Tracy, Milfoil is carried from lake to lake by birds and boats and there is no known "cure" for it. Herbicides, aqua screens and harvesting are only temporary means of controlling the feathery weed for one season.

Bryan Glynn of the county department of planning and community development said the county and the state department of ecology would meet tomorrow to decide what action can be taken on Star Lake. DOE, according to Glynn, issued a permit for the spraying.

Electric cars to shock the conventional car industry?

What has 20 batteries, an old bomber motor and a plug? Most people would call it an electric car, but the manufacturers of the vehicle that visited Federal Way last week call it the transportation of the future.

It was the XDH-1, on display at SeaTac Mall's Sears store, a car that on first glance appeared to be a sleek gas-engined 1976 Fiat. But its motor sounded more like a small jet when starting, purring when accelerated, whirring when stopped — and operating entirely on electricity.

Mike Kestly, driver of the car for manufacturers Globe Union, said the electric car is undoubtedly

the second family car of the future. "You wouldn't use it to take a long trip, but it's great for driving around town, he said.

The XDH-1 is a short-jant car because it will travel only 60 to 100 miles before requiring charging, a process that takes six to eight hours depending upon the voltage used. But, Kestly pointed out, it only costs about 85 cents per 100 miles to charge the same car that would take about \$3 to drive with conventional fossil fuel.

THE FIAT SHELL, now wired with 20 Sears DieHard batteries lined up under both the hood and trunk of the car, travels with an

old jet bomber motor that allows the batteries to recharge when coasting downhill. The extra equipment weighs about 200 pounds, Kestly said, adding that the car lost about that much potential weight when it removed the back seat, disallowing extra passengers.

Unlike the conventional car, the electric car requires that the batteries be replaced about every two years. On the other hand, the vehicle requires no tune-ups, oil and filter changes, anti-freeze, muffler and exhaust pipes and cooling systems service, Kestly said.

The car can travel up to 70 miles per hour, but freeway driving lowers the mileage the car receives before recharging is necessary. The key, Kestly said, is the slower the car is driven, the farther it will go.

THE CAR WAS engineered two years ago to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the Sears DieHard battery at a cost of \$26,000. Kestly said he expects the vehicle — or one similar to it — to be on the open market within two years for about \$6,500.

And why not? Instead of standing in line at the pumps, motorists can just plug it into a socket in their home. And soon they may be available in Cadillacs and vans, too.

Chow proposes boat tax

Local boaters who have not had to pay property or license tax on pleasure craft may be in for a shock if King County Council Chairwoman Ruby Chow has her way.

Chow was successful Monday in getting support for a motion by the council requesting the county assessor to get lists of those vessels registered in King County and "vigorously pursue the collection of revenues" from the owners.

Chow's motion also calls for an ordinance to seek revenues to

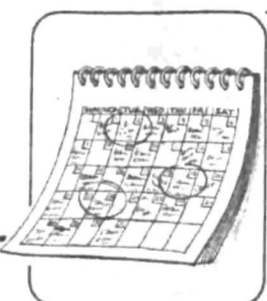
support the public safety marine patrol which now costs the county almost \$5 million a year.

There are an estimated 420,000 pleasure craft in this state worth a total \$2,300,000,000. Washington does not require registration of pleasure craft and in 1977, King County managed to collect only \$454,984 taxes on pleasure boats. More than three-fourths of that was remitted to the state.

Chow said she has been working on the matter since she took office in 1974. "I am going to see if it is possible to register and tax" the boats, she said.

Woman, badly hurt, won't press charges

A 34-year-old Federal Way woman remained in critical condition at Tacoma General Hospital Monday after she was assaulted early Sunday morning at her 22nd Place South residence.

The woman, who police said was apparently struck with a heavy blunt object, went to a local emergency facility to obtain treatment for her injuries and passed out shortly after arriving. She was rushed to Tacoma, where she has been on the critical list and has remained unconscious.

Police said the woman had indicated before she lapsed into unconsciousness that she did not want to press charges against her assailant.

TWO DRUNKEN teenagers ran amuck at Twin Lakes Country Club early Sunday morning, harassing an elderly woman who police say is partially crippled and becoming involved in a shouting match with local security guards.

King County Police arrived on the scene at about 7:30 a.m. and collared two suspects, a Southwest 298th Street boy aged 16 and a Southwest 326th Street boy aged 15.

Police said the two were subdued after an extensive struggle

in which two security guards helped by holding one of the suspects.

The 16-year-old, police said, had to be sprayed with a chemical substance before he could be handcuffed.

Both boys were booked at King County Youth Center. The 16-year-old was charged with underage drinking, obstructing an officer and resisting arrest.

His companion was charged with underage drinking and obstructing an officer.

Murder trial begins

A 38-year old Army Master Sergeant is on trial in King County Superior Court charged with the March 9 murder of a Tacoma woman at his home in Federal Way.

Paul Manuel, Jr. is accused of the second-degree slaying of Pheolia Pleasant, 33, in an early morning episode at his home at 35213 34th Ave. S. The defendant, who is not in police custody, allegedly shot the victim in the head with a .357 magnum handgun then stuffed her body into a silver Lincoln Continental.

The body of the "obviously dead black female" was

discovered in the car by police who were summoned to the house by Louise Moore who shared the house with Manuel, according to a police affidavit read to the jury by Deputy Prosecutor Pamela Holliday.

In opening statements, the prosecution contended that Ms. Pleasant was killed after a fight between Moore and Manuel over who would drive her back to Tacoma. Manuel allegedly got a pistol from the bedroom and told Ms. Moore he was "going to show you something you have never seen before." He then shot Ms. Pleasant, the prosecution claims, and forced Ms. Moore to help him

put the body in the trunk. David Allen, attorney for the 20-year veteran of distinguished military service, claimed in his opening statement that Ms. Pleasant had a reputation for violence and was holding the gun at the time of the shooting. He said his client tried to take the gun away and it fired, fatally injuring the woman.

Allen also said that Manuel wanted to call police but that his girlfriend, Ms. Moore, wouldn't let him.

The trial, which is expected to continue through tomorrow, is being heard by Judge Robert W. Winsor.

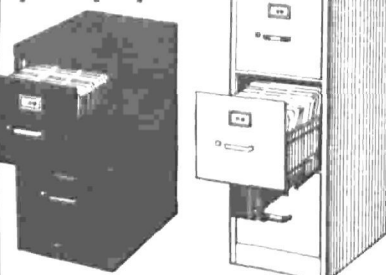

New FD 39 station construction to begin

Construction of a new Federal Way Fire Department station at South 360th Street and 32nd Avenue South is expected to begin within a month and be completed within six months, the department said this week.

A \$657,956 bid was awarded to F.R. Bourgault construction at the last fire department commissioner meeting. The new station will feature accommoda-

tions for round-the-clock manning and more room to house fire vehicles, Assistant Chief Bob Hash said.

The building is planned to be 91,000 square feet, about the size of the new headquarters, but will not have second floor space of the new headquarters.

Eventually, the new station will be manned 24 hours. However, if budget will not allow such manning when the building is

completed, it will initially house a night firefighting team seven days per week.

Dog stories hound shelter

Controversy continued to stalk the King County animal shelter in Kent this week following the reports of two more disappearances of dogs, including one from the shelter itself.

In both instances, which were brought forward after this paper published last week an account of the disappearance of a Normandy Park family's dog from the Kent facility, owners of the animals claim the shelter literally had their dogs one minute and didn't the next.

The most recent incident was last Tuesday when, according to a family that lives near Five-Mile Lake, their white Samoya was picked up at the lake's county park by what they believe was one of the shelter's animal control trucks.

But somewhere between the park and the shelter, the dog vanished they say.

In the other incident, which occurred a year ago, a Federal Way man claims his dog, after it came up missing, was seen in a pen at the Kent shelter by his neighbor; 24 hours later, the dog was missing again, and this time, no one had a clue to its whereabouts.

BOTH CASES are similar to one that developed last May. That's when Linda and Bruce Hempel of Normandy Park discovered their dog had mysteriously disappeared from the shelter, where it had been impounded the day before.

Shelter personnel said the dog apparently escaped or was stolen from the shelter a regular occurrence there, they said.

Bill Gerard, supervisor of the county animal control service, reiterated statements he made last week when contacted Monday for comment on the latest reported dog disappearances.

"There are no problems with thefts or escapes that I know of," he said, although he "may" confront employees at the Kent facility to determine if there is a problem he has been unaware of.

Gerard admitted again that thefts and escapes happen occasionally, but pointed to the fact that one of the latest reported cases happened last year proves his contention that they occur "only a few times a year."

Hempel also, for the second time, refuted assertions of inadequate security at the Kent shelter.

THE SECURITY of the shelter's trucks, used to transport stray animals to the shelter, was brought into question by the alleged incident at Five-Mile Lake.

Last Tuesday afternoon, Naomi Shannon sent her 10-year-old son and his friend to the lake to look for their 6-month-old white Samoya.

"They asked around," Shannon said "and some people who were there swimming told them they'd seen our dog picked up by a white truck."

Animal control trucks are part-

ly white, so Shannon called the Kent shelter—which serves the southern end of the county—and asked if it had her dog.

"They said he could have been picked up, but that we'd have to wait until the truck came in and then come down and look for the dog because they couldn't give out any information over the phone," she related.

Shannon and her husband were unable to go to the shelter that evening, so a neighbor, Joe Scigliano, went in their place.

BEFORE going to the shelter, Scigliano telephoned ahead to ask if the Shannons' dog was there.

"They said it was still in the truck, and that the truck was on the way in," Scigliano said.

But when the truck arrived at the shelter, the Shannons' dog was not aboard.

"They said it probably was stolen from the truck," Scigliano said. "Five different (shelter employees) gave me five different explanations, and I didn't buy any of them."

The simplest explanation, Gerard said is that the Shannons' pet was not picked up by the shelter at all.

"If we have no record of ever being called to the park that day, that tells me we never had the dog," he said.

Sgt. Hugh Dougherty, a supervisor at the Kent shelter, found no record Monday of one of his trucks paying a visit to the park, and conjectured that the Shannons' dog may have been stolen from the park by private citizens.

AND, Dougherty said, it is "next to impossible" to steal a dog from a shelter truck.

Ron Lewallan, manager of Five-Mile Park, said he did not call the shelter last Tuesday to rid the park of dogs. "It's rare when I do call," he said.

In the other newly reported incident, a Federal Way man said his dog vanished from the shelter the day after it was seen there by a neighbor.

The owner, who asked not to be identified, said his purebred German shorthair hunting dog was one of several nabbed by the shelter in a sweep through a Twin Lakes-area neighborhood.

"My neighbor and his wife went down to the shelter to get their dog," the missing dog's owner said. "He came back and said he saw Fritz down there. But it was just before the shelter's closing time, so I decided I'd wait and go down and get him the next day. I didn't call ahead. I just assumed it would be all right."

The owner stopped at the shelter on his way home from work the next evening, only to discover the dog was inexplicably gone.

PAPERWORK confirming that the dog had been at the shelter the day before was hanging on a wall. But attendants were unable to explain what had happened to the dog, and referred its owner to a supervisor.

"The supervisor started out

saying maybe they'd never had my dog," the owner said. "Then he said my dog escaped."

"That's the last I heard. They said they would contact me if anything came up. I haven't heard from them, and I haven't contacted them."

The owner placed the dog's

value at \$75. Naomi Shannon said her dog was worth more than \$100.

Gerard said he does not plan to investigate the disappearances. "These are isolated cases," he said. "Other than that, I don't know what to tell you."

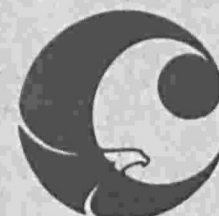

Mental health center finds new quarters

The Highline-West Seattle Mental Health Center has a welcome new member of its "family."

Sunny Terrace Elementary School has been tabbed as the center's new Burien facility, following approval by the Highline School Board Wednesday of a five-year lease agreement giving the center use of the vacant buildings.

Center director Don Seidemann said he and his staff were looking for a more desirable location for their Burien facility, and Sunny Terrace fit the bill.

"We're thrilled," Seidemann smiled. "It's a really pleasant setting, and the buildings have a modular design. It's like a little campus, which is perfect for our needs."

The school, which housed Seattle Christian School's elementary program before that tenant moved after the 1978-79 school year, will replace the center's existing Burien facility at 922 S.W. 151st St.

Seidemann said Aug. 10 is the target date for moving into Sunny Terrace, 1010 S. 146th St.

SEIDEMANN SAID several factors prompted the move.

"The lease was up on the other office, and our rent was going to rise," he said. "Also, our people were cramped for space. And we wanted to find a place where we could better diversify our services."

The adult outpatient program has been the only service offered in Burien. But in the spacious new quarters, "we now can add adolescent services and intake services," Seidemann said.

Also billeted in Burien will be some of the center's business personnel. They will be shifted from the center's hub in North Shorewood Elementary School in White Center, where the bulk of the mental health services will remain.

At the same time the Highline school directors approved the Sunny Terrace lease, they renew-

ed their lease agreement with the center for North Shorewood. The latter pact, also for five years, calls for a payment of \$7,500 a year. Sunny Terrace's rent is \$8,400 annually.

Seidemann said an architect will visit Sunny Terrace next week to begin preliminary planning for remodeling. Funding for the work will be applied for from King County block grant monies and "possibly" from the Boeing United Good Neighbor Fund, he added.

Seidemann said the center is "grateful" to the Highline School District for leasing its unused facilities at "very reasonable rates."

"The district has been very responsive and flexible to our needs, which indicates to us that they are supportive of" the center's programs, he said.

Arson suspected in fire

Federal Way firefighters responded to a grass fire Friday night at Southwest 356th Street and 15th Avenue Southwest to find a pickup truck burning in the blaze.

According to Assistant Chief Bob Hash, the grass fire was reported at about 11:30 p.m. The truck that was found was a Chevy Luv, year undetermined, that ap-

parently had been stripped and burned to cover the damage, Hash said.

The burning truck then ignited the surrounding grass.

No license plates or other identification could be found on the vehicle. King County Police will now attempt to locate the owners, Hash said.

Splashing in color

Take 10 gallons of paint in 10 different colors and there's a lot that can be done to brighten up the drab face of an elementary school.

A group of 10 teenagers, involved in King County's Federal Way Work Training Program are finding that out.

This past summer, they've been applying brilliant colors to the walls of Olympic View and Valhalla Elementaries.

In Olympic View, they painted a panoramic view of the Olympic Mountains, 57 feet by 12 feet on the end of the gym wall. In chromatic shades of blue, yellow and purple, the scene ties in with the name and feeling of the school.

On a front wall, a 17 by 15-foot mural of a cougar perched on a rock in the sunset ties in the school's theme.

Students, paid minimum wages through a federally subsidized program for low-income students between the ages of 14-21 are now working on Valhalla Elementary.

They are adding Viking scenes to doorways, halls, and exterior walls.

It's obvious that the crew enjoys the work. But, crew supervisor Loyd Wesche, art teacher at Illahee for the past four years says it's not all fun.

Wesche takes ideas submitted by interested principals and works up designs. These designs are then transferred to paper by the kids, chalked, imprinted on the walls and painted.

Wesche said that sometimes the ideas are sketchy and other times they are exact. The designs, he said, "are not always just what I want or what the kids want, but are scenes that are agreeable to everyone."

Last year, the crew painted murals on walls at Woodmont, Lake Grove, Lakeland, Valhalla and Lake Dolloff Elementaries.

Scenes ranged from the cartoon Roadrunner streaking down halls and up walls to landscapes to silhouettes of students involved in dancing.

This year, many of the principals have asked for additions to already painted scenes.

The response from parents, teachers and students has been terrific, said Wesche. "It really keeps me going."

The project, in a sense, is due to the cooperation of school, community and county. The King County Work Training Program (WTP) finances most of the program by paying for crew wages at \$2.90 per hour per student plus equipment. The school district pays for the paint. Wesche estimates the cost of the Lakeland Elementary Roadrunner scenery at \$1,200. The paint store, where they purchase latex enamel allows them to mix paints in small amounts.

"When you have everybody working together, it really makes the whole thing rewarding," said Wesche.

On their next project, the crew will be allowed a free rein in devising scenes to decorate the WTP facilities located in a portable behind the Educational Service Center at 31455 28th Ave. S.

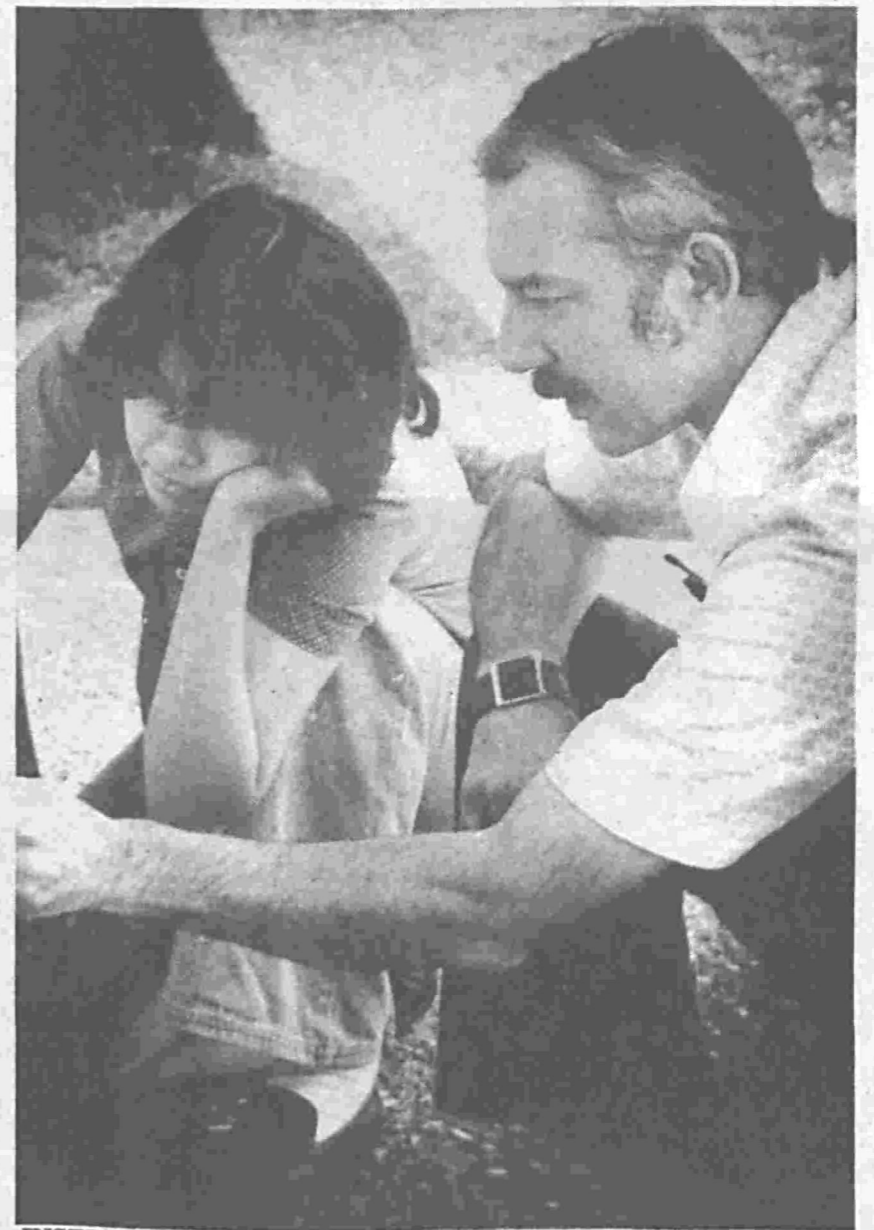
"Some kids will be doing their own designing and executing," said Wesche. "It's the only place they can be free and easy and put some of their newly acquired knowledge to use."

Roger Sundberg, Federal Way program coordinator said that painting the murals has been an interesting project for the crew as well as the community.

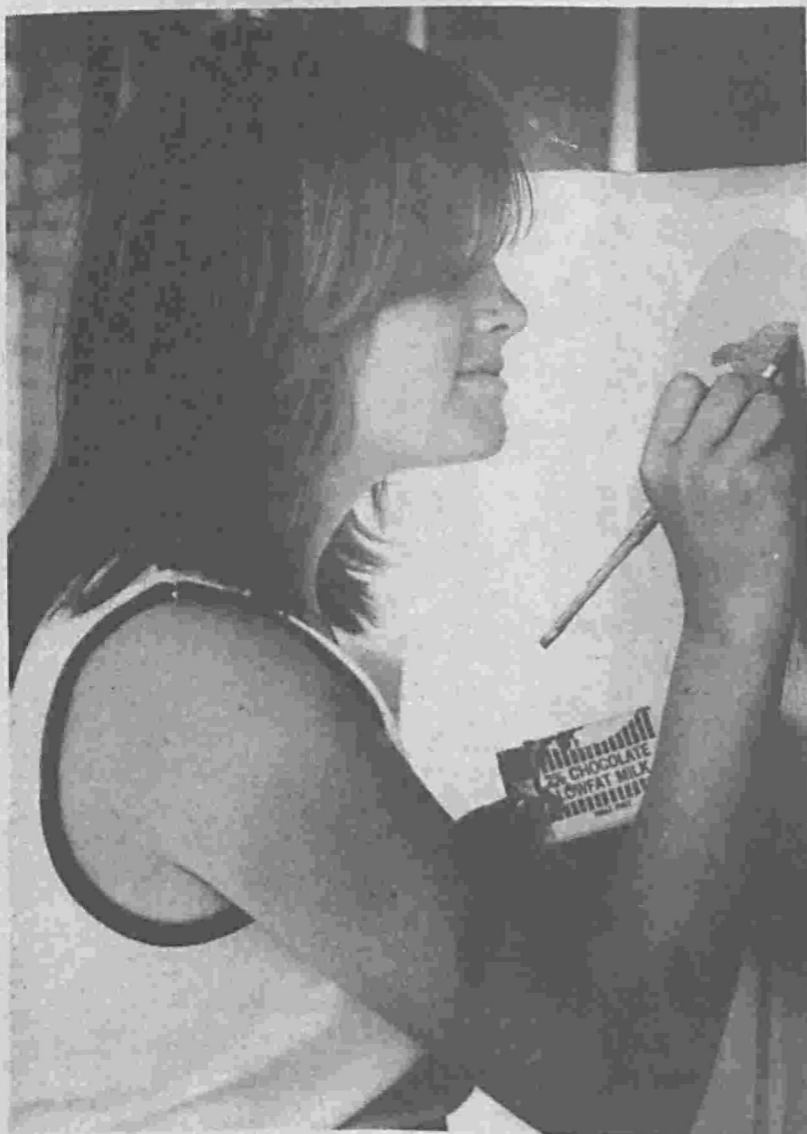
"If they have pride in what they're doing they become totally involved. It's too bad there aren't more tangible jobs like this."

DSHS information service gives elderly independence

Elmer, an 80-year-old retired worker, calls to say that his fixed income no longer lasts through the end of the month. Clara is having trouble getting to her doctor's office because mobility problem prevents her from riding the bus. Stan calls to say that his wife will be released from the hospital next week and, because he can't care for her by himself, he fears she will have to enter a nursing home. Elmer, Clara and Stan have called their local information and assistance office, a service designed to help older people get the help they need to remain independent and in their own homes. And, while the above situations are hypothetical, they are typical of the kinds of calls received daily by 44 such centers throughout the state. "With federal, state and local programs available to older people, it's easy to become confused about where to go when you first need help," explained Charles Reed, director of the bureau of aging of the Department of Social and Health Services. "So we have established information and assistance centers as an entry point where people can call with their questions and be guided to the appropriate source of help."

Housing, transportation, financial and health questions are typical. "Many people call and just ask for one phone number," Margaret Strachan, director of the King County center, said. "But instead of just giving out the number, we try to get behind their reason for asking. An older woman might call and ask for the number of the Seattle Housing Authority, when she's facing an eviction notice and needs immediate help. We are always questioning to learn the other factors in their lives." In Elmer's case, the phone worker would tell him about the Supplemental Security Income and Food Stamp programs, which are available through DSHS community service offices to supplement his Social Security income and enable him to remain independent. For Clara, the worker will arrange for the local transportation cooperative to drive her to the doctor and to the grocery store on a regular basis. For Stan, whose wife will require nursing care for four to six months, the worker will refer him to the local visiting nurse agency, where in-home care is available on a sliding fee basis, depending on his income. Because of their interviewing skills, phone workers can usually tell if a person needs more help than

the initial question indicates. Sometimes, they simply refer callers to appropriate agencies. Other times, they check back with the caller to learn if they got the help they needed. Then there is a third type of call, where the person is very frail, has several health problems or can no longer maintain their home alone. When a lot of help is needed, Case Management is called for. Caseworkers go into the person's home, discuss the situation in depth and help the older person get the services they need to remain independent. "Sometimes all that is needed is for someone to organize the family into a routine of sharing care of their older relative," Reed said. Some people who contact the offices are not troubled by acute physical needs, but they are experiencing

the drabness and emptiness of inactivity; they no longer feel useful and need something to do. In many areas they can be directed to volunteer programs designed for older citizens - the Foster Grandparents and the Retired Seniors Volunteer Program - offering meaningful, rewarding part-time work opportunities.

Reed says, "Because many older people attach a stigma to 'charity,' they don't call for help until their situation becomes intolerable. We want them to know that our I & A centers can deal with a very broad range of questions, and they should get into the habit of giving us a call before their problems become too difficult." 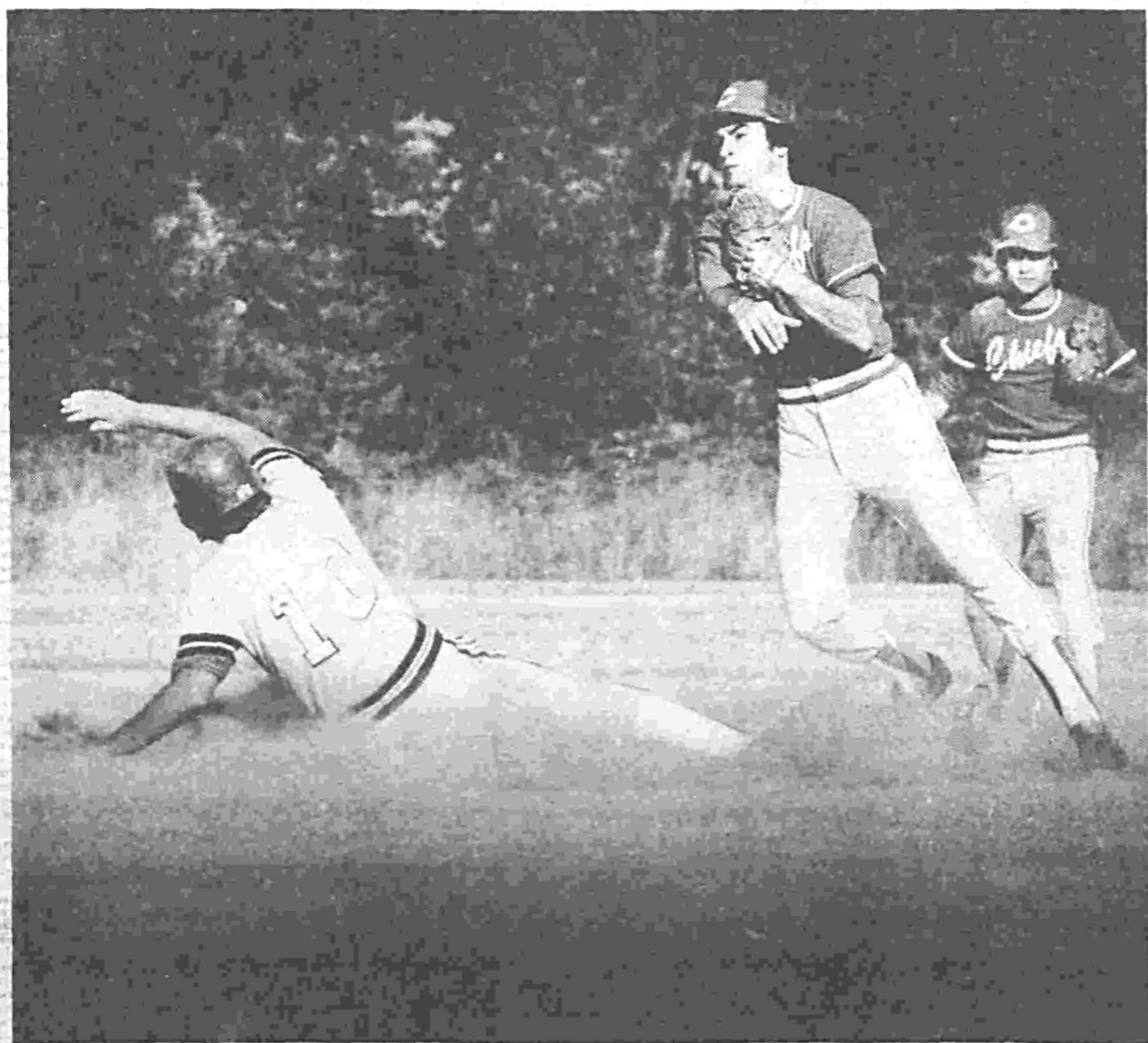

action, Bendorf feels that resting this week will benefit his players.

"I think it will help; it gives the guys a couple days off, and then we'll practice Wednesday or Thursday. We'll also get 'em together Saturday; maybe have batting practice, which

we haven't had before," Bendorf said. HOPEFULLY the rest will result in two more victories, the number of games left on Federal Way's first WIL schedule. That would make everyone, including coach Darrell Holloway, very happy.

If you've never seen a Kissel Dive, you may have lost your chance. The poor guy will probably never venture onto a diving board again.

It began so innocently for him. Gary Kissel, a photographer and a member of a local athletic juggernaut, the Ancient Mariner softball team, arrived at the Wenatchee motel swimming pool just after the team diving competition had ended. Kissel was urged up on the board to show his stuff.

All weekend long, Musitelli and second baseman Steve Botkin had asked each other, "When are we going to do something REALLY crazy?"

I think we finally had.

Bicycle racing documentary to air

More than 90 million Americans own bicycles and have made the racing tempo the most popular model. But few have ever raced professionally, or even seen a bike race.

"The Race for the Yellow Jersey," premiering Sunday, Aug. 5, at noon on Channel 9 follows six young Americans as they form a team and train together for a 365-mile, four-day race through the hills of French Canada. The six — a hospital administrator, a teacher, an accountant, a chef, a construction worker and a warehouseman in a distillery — are from the Century Road Club of America, a top-flight bike racing club in New Jersey.

In the world of professional bike racing they are considered amateurs, but their drive, perseverance and ambition enable them to endure the many pressures encountered during this grueling competition, usually entered by only the best American and Canadian cyclists.

The race consists of seven stages. At the end of each day, the

leader receives a yellow jersey to wear the next day, which is then passed on to subsequent daily winners. At the end of the race, the one who finishes the 365 miles with the lowest total accumulated time takes home the jersey — the symbol of victory — and a modest cash prize.

Following the team as they train and race, it becomes apparent that these men are driven by ambition that keeps them straining past the barriers of exhaustion. Beyond the physical requirements of the race, each racer must employ strategy — pacing, jockeying for the lead, yet always functioning as part of a team until the time comes to break away and think only of oneself and the finish line.

The snow line is quite low in the northern counties, with heavy snow reported on some of the higher trails, hanging heavier on the northerly exposed slopes and ridges. Snowfall late in the season means tough going on trails above 4500 feet, although continued warm weather is sure to improve the situation.

Some of the high lakes reported ice-free in King County include: Thompson, Mason, Snoqualmie, Otter, Azurite, Bear, Racher, Nadeau, Moolock, Hancock, SMC, Upper and Lower Wildcat, Derrick, Illswoot, Gem, Locket and all other Necklace Valley Lakes although considerable snow remains in the valley.

In Snohomish County, lakes observed open include Barclay and Eagle, while in Skagit County, the only lakes reported open were Slide, Upper Jug, Lower Granite, and Lower Falls. Heavy snow was still sighted in the Twin Lakes area of

Snohomish County. For local trail, fire and camping regulations, check before leaving on a trip with the U.S. Forest Service station in the district.

But often the same members ride the bench while a set lineup tends to the playing chores. The Federal Way Boys' and Girls' Club Pony squad follows through with its total participation concept.

"Everybody plays at least three innings," Eilertson said. "The guys who don't start know they're going in no matter what. We don't just put reserves in when we have a big lead. We substitute ir- regardless of the score.

"IT KEEPS our kids sharp. They know they'll be in during competitive situations. It gets a good team feeling going when everybody contributes."

The substitution policy was a positive element in Federal Way's Thursday win over Kent. Wayne Lewis, John Bowman and Todd McDonald entered the game in the fourth inning. The three figured into Federal Way's two-run sixth inning that enabled the Feds to edge Kent.

Federal Way plays an exciting to watch, scrambling style.

"We try to jump out quick," Eilertson said. "Our leadoff hitters have had success getting on and getting around. We usually score in the first inning. Then, we rely on strong defense and steady hitting the rest of the way."

The Feds also are aggressive on the

bases. The team averaged 11 stolen bases per contest during the league season.

Will Federal Way come out running tomorrow? "You bet," Eilertson flatly stated. "We're going to challenge them right from the start. That's how we got this far, so we're going to keep it up."

PIERCE COUNTY might find it a little tougher to take extra bases.

Federal Way's Mark Roberts is "the best (Pony) catcher around" in the eyes of his coach. His strong arm thwarted many base-theft attempts during the regular season. Also, Federal Way outfielders Jason Dutt, left, Don Hall, center, and Chuck Woods, right, have the ability to rifle down extra-base tries.

Bowman and McDonald add strong support to the out- field.

Eilertson pointed to the infield as the strongest part of Federal Way's defense. Dale Pac exhibits a zippy cross-diamond throw from third to first. Clay Marrs and Scott Eilertson are consistent at shortstop. Wayne Lewis and Benji Mogenson are solid at second and first, respectively.

The all-around abilities of Dan Lippman and Marrs give the Feds infield flexibility. Lippman alternates between second and first. Marrs is effective in all infield and outfield spots.

Either Dutt or Eilertson will be on the mound tomorrow. Both are right handers. Dutt posted a 4-0 record during the regular season. Eilertson logged a 7-0 slate, which included Thursday's win over Kent.

FEDERAL WAY'S offense is highlighted by a combination of

consistency, power and speed.

Leadoff man Dan Lippman leads the club in extra-base hits, average. Roberts leads the team in hitting with a .500 mark. Marrs pounded four triples and a .460 average. Eilertson aided the Federal Way attack with a .410

percentage.

A Federal Way win against Pierce County would put the locals in the double-elimination tourney's semifinal game, which will be played at 8 p.m. tomorrow. A loss to Pierce would move the Feds into a Friday double-header.

Your Money

While the shock of your 1978 tax return is still wearing off, take a look at our local municipal bonds. "Tax problems" — once the exclusive burden of the very rich — now affects many of us right here in South King County. Because Washington state has no state income tax, for local residents the tax that weighs most heavily on us is the Federal income tax. However, under provisions of the Internal Revenue Code, the interest income from municipal bonds is exempt from Federal income taxation.

If a tax-payer can legitimately lessen his tax bite and increase his spendable income he owes it to himself to explore that possibility. The higher an individual's tax bracket, the more benefit he derives from tax-free income. In the 50 percent tax bracket, an investor would have to receive 14 percent taxable yield to equal the tax-free yield of a 7 percent municipal bond.

Safety of principal is an important consideration in purchasing municipal bonds. It is interesting to note that the historic record of municipal bonds for meeting principal and interest payments on time is second only to that of the United States Government in handling its debt. During the depression of the '30s, the default record of all outstanding municipals as a group came to about two cents on the dollar — and the vast majority of these situations were ultimately rectified.

Investors should be aware that the selling price of the municipal bonds will be directly affected by current interest rates. Bonds sold before maturity might bring more or less than what an investor paid for them. A profit might be obtained if he sold his bonds when interest rates declined after his purchase. A loss might occur if he sold his bonds after interest rates increased, and before maturity.

A few rules of thumb which many bond buyers find to be useful:

- Use funds for which there is no immediate need. (Your "savings" dollars).
- Vary the dates that the bonds mature.
- Vary the locations of issuers.
- Select bonds from the four highest rating categories. (AAA, AA, A, BAA) as rated by Standard and Poor's; or select them from the four highest Moody's ratings.

In this regard remember that its easy to invest in bonds with lower ratings but harder to dispose of them if you had to sell. One reason is that the Federal government mandated that most financial institutions (i.e. banks, insurance companies, etc.) can invest in municipal bonds of only the four highest categories. Consequently, this can significantly narrow the spectrum of quality buyers causing the poorer rated bonds to decline in value.

Pounds-off packing

Are you a proponent of former naturalist Euell Gibbons who could fix a hearty meal out of dried pine nuts and thistle greens?

If so, this article is not for you. It's intended for those who've tried loading themselves or their bicycles down with food and clothing only to find that within a few miles, they're too tired for the adventure.

Naturally, when you go out into the wilds to get away from it all, you want to be totally sufficient. You want to feel able to survive without a direct line to a grocery store or snack bar.

Believe me, it can be done...even for several weeks at a time. But, it takes careful planning to ensure the lightest possible load and nutritious meals.

If money is no problem, take the easy way out and head to the sportscenter. There, you can buy packaged meats, vegetables, casseroles and desserts individually or by the meal for a family of four.

Everything is either freeze-dried or dehydrated and packaged in sealed plastic containers. Just add water and wait for it to swell to a meal fit for a...let's face it, camper. Some of that reconstituted hamburger tastes like shoe leather.

However, the trick to keeping the price down for a large family is to shop both the sportscenter and your nearest grocery for dried foods that can be combined into nutritious meals.

Selected foods should have as little bulk as possible, resist crumbling or molding, need no refrigeration and naturally, be as lightweight as possible.

Breakfast foods depend on the appetite of the travelers. In our family, we are usually up and out in a hurry so we eat a very light

breakfast.

A popular cereal is Quaker's instant cereal that comes in five varieties. Each packet weighs slightly over an ounce. Just add hot water and it's ready, with or without milk. Add an orange drink and you're off.

For the kids, I also take several of their favorite cold cereals though you have to be careful because many cereals are extremely heavy.

For those who want eggs and pancakes, dehydrated eggs are available and good through a sportscenter. Any of the pancake mixes that require only water can be pre-measured and mixed in a plastic zip-loc bag with a minimum of work. Don't take any more than you expect to use. Pancake mix is heavy. Also take small plastic containers of oil, jam, and syrup. Cinnamon sugar or powdered sugar is also good on pancakes as a substitute.

Lunches are usually a combination of prepared cheeses available in squeeze tubes and hard breads such as lefse, rye crisp or crackers. I also throw in dehydrated dried crisp fruit, a packaged drink and nuts. For variety, I use hard salami that does not require refrigeration.

Dinners tend to be somewhat starchy without the addition of green leafy vegetables and fresh produce. I get occasional comments on "concentration camp rations" from the kids but I know they don't mean it.

Grocers carry numerous boxed foods such as hamburger helper, noodles almondine, rice-a-roni, and flavored rice. Many can be substantially helped by adding dried vegetables or dried beef or sausage.

There are many kinds of instant soups, some of which are stocked with dried vegetables and meats of their own. They are

usually expensive but can be a complete meal in themselves. There are also instant puddings which, if pre-mixed with dried milk in a zip-lock bag provide a tasty dessert with the addition of water.

To reduce the weight, it is necessary to remove all the foods from their heavy cardboard containers and prepackage components into meals in a gallon-sized zip-loc bag. All ingredients should be pre-mixed so that water is the only necessary ingredient left. Be sure and throw directions in if you're trying a new recipe.

Snack foods, those kinds of treats that can be roasted over an open fire while everyone is congenial and relaxed are a must. Everyone seems to enjoy toasting biscuits stuffed with cheese or cinnamon-sugar to a mellow brown as they test their cave-man skills.

One problem. Bisquick is heavy. I usually carry a large bag of bisquick and plan to purchase another later if we're near a store. I also take re-packaged-in-a-pan popcorn marshmallows, and hersheys candy bars and graham crackers for s'mores.

Cooking utensils should be minimal. We take a Coleman one-burner, two small kettles, a frying pan, pitcher and tea kettle. Everyone is responsible for their own eating utensils including keeping them clean. The duty of scrubbing the pots is rotated.

Just for fun, I always throw a bag of high-energy gorp in each pack. I purchase bags of nuts, banana chips, raisins, sunflower seeds, chocolate candy, coconut chips and mix them together before dividing it amongst the group.

It doesn't last long, but each person has their own. It gets everybody off to a good-humored beginning for a fun trip.

SURPRISE BISCUIT BALLS

Mix one cup Bisquick and one-fourth cup water. Place dough on piece of aluminum foil; pat into 6-inch square. Cut dough into 3x1 inch strips. Wrap each strip around a 1-inch cube of process American cheese, completely covering cheese. Insert pointed end of peeled green stick in cheese ball; rotate slowly over hot coals or campfire five minutes or until evenly browned. Yields 12 biscuit balls.

MAGIC MALLOW

DROPS

Cocoa Sauce (below)
16 marshmallows
Coconut or chopped nuts

Prepare Cocoa Sauce. Secure marshmallows on pointed sticks or skewers; dip into warm sauce, then roll in coconut or nuts. Keep sauce over low heat while dipping marshmallows. Let drops cool before eating. Yields 16 drops.

COCOA SAUCE

Combine in small saucepan one cup sugar, two tablespoons cocoa and one-half cup milk.

Cook over fire, stirring constantly, until small amount of mixture dropped into cold water forms a soft ball.

S'MORES

For each serving, place four squares of a milk chocolate candy bar on a graham cracker. Toast a marshmallow over campfire; slip onto the chocolate and top with a second graham cracker. Eat S'more like a sandwich.

SUGAR HORNS

Mix one cup Bisquick and one-fourth cup water. Place dough on sheet of aluminum

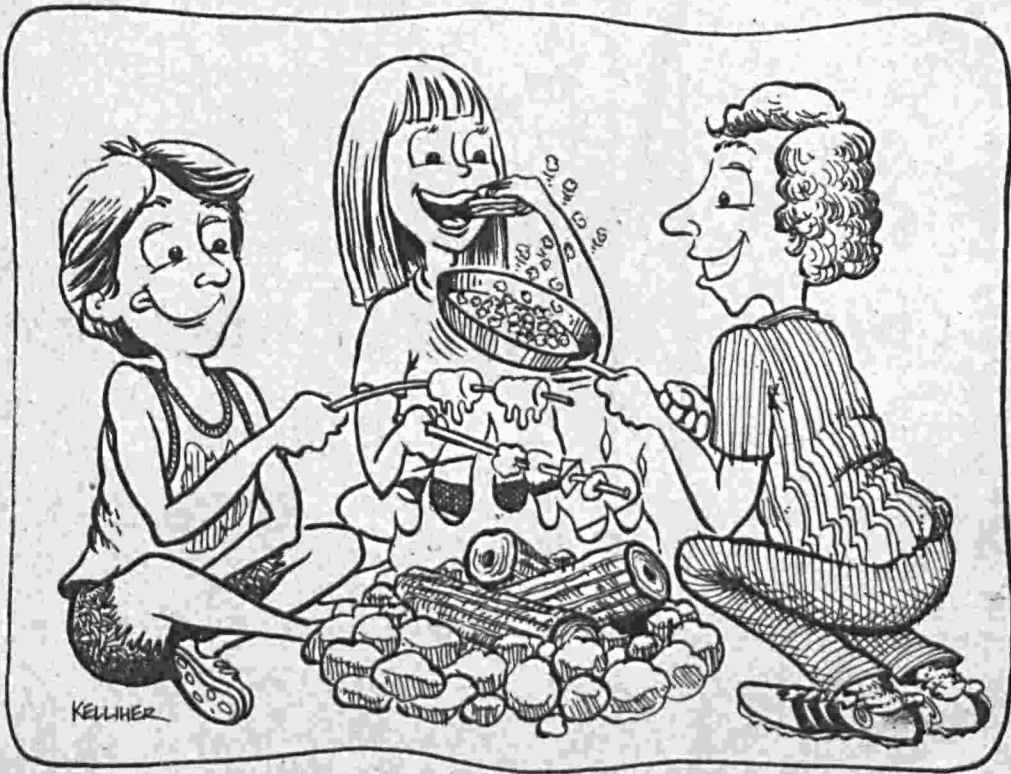
foil; with fingers pat into 12-inch circle. Cut dough into eight triangles. Wrap triangles around peeled ends of green sticks, making certain the top is sealed tightly. Rotating stick slowly, bake horns over coals 10 minutes or until evenly browned. Carefully remove from stick; fill horn with butter and brown sugar. Yields eight horns.

SUGAR BALLS

1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup Bisquick
1/4 cup water
1 cup sugar
1 tablespoon cin-

namon
Melt butter in small pan on grill. Mix Bisquick and water to form a soft dough. Shape dough into one-inch balls around peeled ends of green sticks; secure dough by pressing gently. Rotate slowly over hot coals or campfire five minutes or until balls are evenly browned. Push balls off stick into melted butter; roll in cinnamon-sugar mixture. Yields: 12 balls.

Chocolate Sugar Balls: Follow recipe above except substitute one-half cup instant cocoa mix for the cinnamon-sugar mixture.

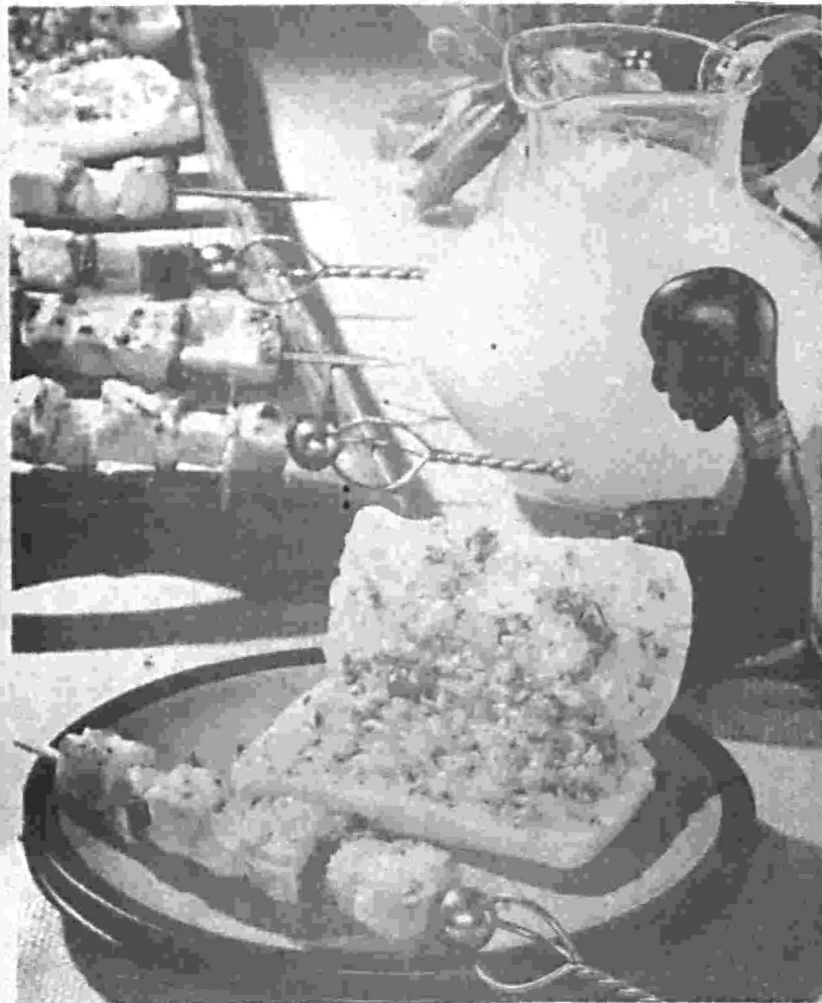

To Prepare Kabobs: Remove skin and bone from chicken; cut into 24 one-inch square pieces. (For ease in deboning, freeze chicken until icy, about 30 minutes). Thread alternately on each of six skewers four pieces chicken, three pieces celery and two pieces pimiento. Place kabobs in shallow dish.

Combine curry powder, salt, ginger, garlic powder and nutmeg; fold in yogurt. Reserve one-fourth cup marinade for brushing. Pour remaining marinade over kabobs. Cover and refrigerate several hours or overnight.

When ready to serve broil kabobs six inches from heat for 12 minutes. Turn after six minutes and brush with marinade. Use reserve marinade to brush top side two minutes before removing from broiler.

To Prepare Rolls: Combine cheese, parsley and peanuts. Place rolls cut side up on a baking sheet. Top each with a scant three tablespoons cheese mixture. Broil one to two minutes or until cheese is melted. To serve slide kabob between each kabob.

Gourmet specialties are not that hard if done correctly

When you need something to jazz up the menu for a special occasion or an extraordinary company meal, why not try your hand at gourmet?

Although the term "gourmet" "plain" cooks right out of their kitchens, it's really not all that difficult.

Simple rules for this cookery that should be followed to the letter are:

- 1.) Read your recipe thoroughly and follow it exactly;
- 2.) Buy - and use - only top quality ingredients - no substitutes.
- 3.) Be prepared to spend a little more time on each dish - you can't hurry gourmet;
- 4.) Serve promptly - gourmet food is at its best fresh out of the oven or off the range.

Here are some starter recipes - go forth and gourmet.

Shrimp de Jonghe

1/2 cup butter
1 large clove garlic, crushed
1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
3 tbsps snipped croutons
2 tbsps snipped fresh chives
3 1/2 cups cooked, cleaned and deveined shrimp
2 tbsps sherry
2 lemons wedges

Melt butter in a large skillet; saute garlic about 1 minute. Stir in cheese, croutons and chives. Add shrimp and sherry. Heat to serving temperature over medium heat, stirring constantly. Serve with lemon. 6 to 8 servings.

Chicken Kiev
1/2 cup butter
1 tbsps snipped fresh parsley
1 tbsps minced

Butter holds its fat in a world of other fats and oils as a superb ingredient and matchless spread. Gourmet-type cooking invariably calls for butter because of the flavor it imparts to foods. In gourmet sauces, it is incomparable.

Filbert Butter
1/2 cup (1 stick) butter
One-third cup chopped filberts or pecans
2 tbsps minced chives
1 tsp fresh lemon juice

Melt butter in a small saucepan; stir in nuts, chives and lemon juice. Serve with hot cooked fish. Yield: two-thirds cup.

Foamy Butter Sauce
2 eggs
2 tbsps fresh lemon juice

Bernaise Sauce
1/2 cup white wine

2 eggs, beaten

Efficient food storage

Storing food properly is the best way to avoid waste and reduce your total food expenditures — especially if you cook for only one or two.

Make good use of freezer space — meat items, leftovers and any foods prepared in quantity such as soups or casseroles should be packaged for freezing in single serving portions wherever possible — even if you're a couple. All freezer containers or wraps must be moisture resistant and air-tight, of course.

Many items that families often store on the shelf are better off in the refrigerator of the small household. Mustard, catsup, pickles and preserves stay around the single's kitchen long enough that they need the extra protection of the colder temperatures.

Organize your cupboards so that canned and packaged goods don't get lost or unnecessarily duplicated. You might even invest in a wax marker to label these items with the purchase date.

Avocados are like many tree fruits — they should not be refrigerated until they reach the desired texture for eating. At this point they can be refrigerated. A softened avocado will stay in good eating condition in the refrigerator for up to five days. If you find yourself with a ready-to-eat avocado and no chance to use it, let your freezer save your investment. Simply peel and seed it, mash the pulp with a little lemon juice and freeze it in an airtight container. Better yet, use the fruit to make this different and delicious frozen dessert; serve it for a special dinner for two. Set your freezer at the lowest temperature for the finest texture.

AVOCADO ICE
(Yields: 2 one-half cup servings)
1 soft California avocado, peeled, seeded and sliced
½ teaspoon grated lime peel
One-eighth teaspoon salt
¼ cup lime juice
¼ cup honey

Blend avocado with remaining ingredients in electric blender until smooth. Pour into refrigerator trays. Freeze until firm, stirring once when semi-frozen.

They'll like Green Beans Parmesan. Place 1 ½ pounds fresh green beans, cleaned and cut, along with one green pepper sliced in thin rings, into a 2-quart saucepan with a small amount of salted water. Cover and cook for 20 minutes. Drain well and toss with one-fourth cup or one-half stick of softened butter and one-half cup of grated Parmesan cheese. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

Give any chicken or meat gravy the "Stroganoff" touch by using sour cream for part of the liquid in the gravy. Add just before serving, stirring only long enough to let it heat through.

China's cuisines are as varied as its customs and regions

A blindfolded gourmet dining in China could tell you where he's eating by sampling the local cuisine.

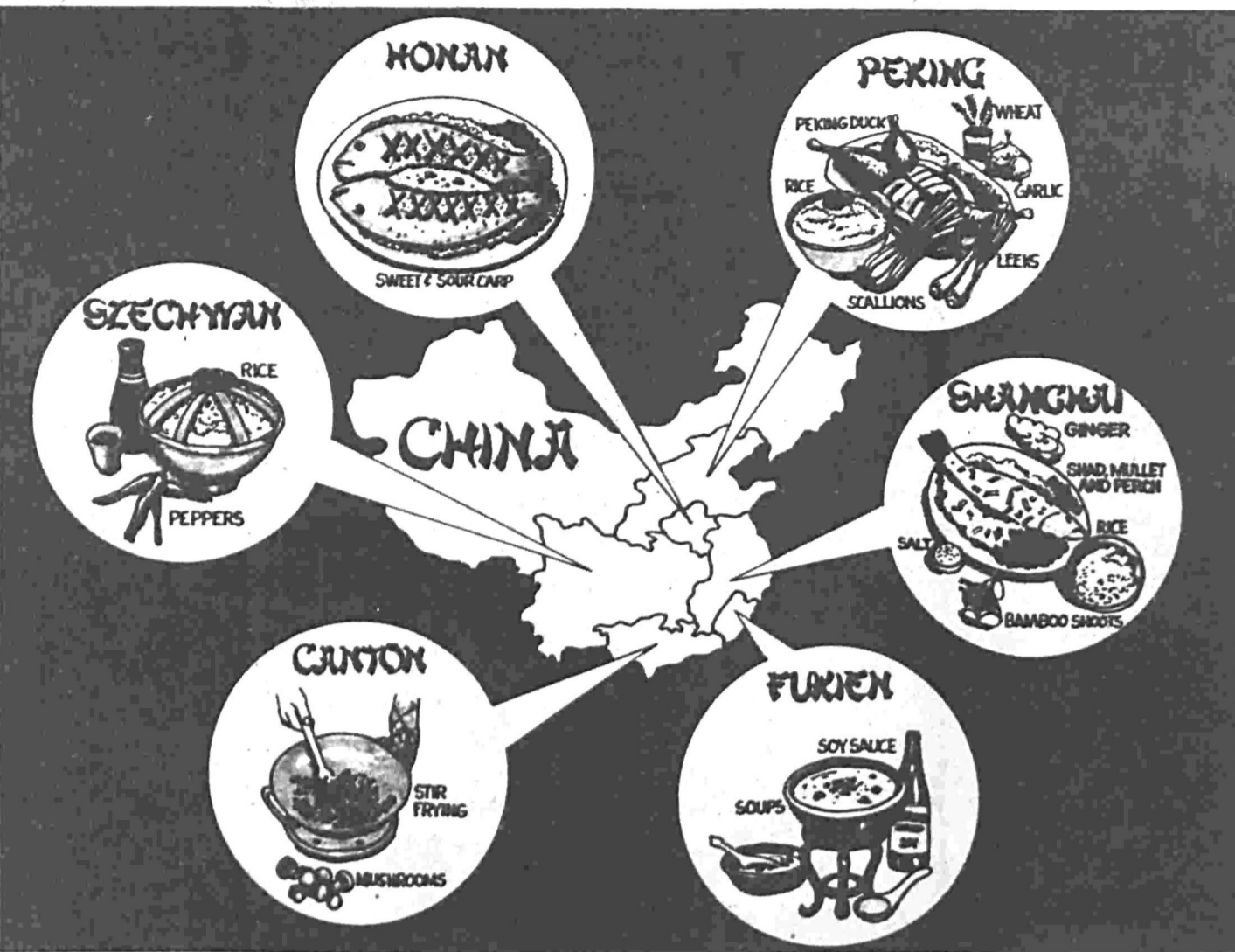
A duck, for instance, would be deep fat-fried in the Szechwan province, but would probably be roasted in Peking. Rice graces most Shanghai dinner tables, but noodles and dumplings reign in Peking.

The cooking styles in various regions of China are distinctly different, says Anne Byrd, a consultant for Chun King Oriental foods. "Culinary scholars disagree about how many different cuisines exist in China," she adds. "Four major cuisines are generally acknowledged. But some experts list five cuisines — and they differ about which of two regional styles qualifies as a fifth cuisine."

"The city of Peking is the heart of one regional cooking style," says Ms. Byrd.

"Szechwan ('sech-wan) province represents a second school of cooking, and Shanghai's cookery comprises a third style. The fourth cuisine, Cantonese, is the style most familiar to Americans. Fukien ('fu-kyen), an east coast province, is sometimes recognized as a separate cuisine, but sometimes Fukien and Shanghai are grouped together. Honan province has a cuisine which some consider a distinct style, and others classify it as part of the Peking school."

She said that different seasonings, raw ingredients and cooking methods identify the various cuisines.



CHINA'S CUISINES are as different as its geographic regions. The map illustrates the various cooking methods, raw ingredients and seasonings prevalent in the many Oriental foods.

"Peking is famous for its steamed breads, noodle dishes, dumplings and wheat-cakes with fillings," she notes. "Common meal ingredients include fish, duck, Chinese cabbage, sweet bean sauce, scallions, leeks and garlic. Meats are frequently cooked in wine or smoked, and sweet-and-sour dishes are popular. Delicate seasoning is a trademark of the Peking cuisine."

The renowned Peking Duck is an intricately prepared meal, Ms. Byrd adds. "First, air is puffed into the duck to separate the skin from the meat. After a

drying period, the duck is roasted and the skin removed. The skin is a delicacy that is served sandwich-style with onion-and-sweet-plum sauce, creating an interesting combination of sweet and tart flavors.

"The duck meat is slivered and combined with sauteed onions, pepper, ginger and bamboo shoots or water chestnuts. Soup is made from the crushed bones, water, onion, ginger, sugar and cabbage."

"In contrast to Peking's subtle seasonings, Szechwan province boasts a very spicy, peppery cuisine," continues Ms. Byrd. "The hot

peppers grown in the region initially strike the tongue as harmless, but then explode into a fiery sensation. The hot taste subsides into a combination of sweet and bitter flavors.

"In addition to the zesty peppers, other common ingredients of the Szechwan cuisine are garlic, nuts, rice, many spices and poultry," she continues. "A common way to fix chicken is to wrap the meat in oiled paper and deep fat-fry it. Hot-and-sour dishes are also common in Szechwan."

Soy sauce and ginger highlight the cuisine in Shanghai, China's largest

seaport, points out cooked alive is a Ms. Byrd. "Seafood specialty of the area,

and popular seafoods include shad, mullet and perch. Bamboo shoots, pork, rice, ginger and salt are often used."

Fukien cuisine is known for great fish dishes, since, like Shanghai, Fukien is a seafaring area. Light, clear soups are also a trademark of the Fukien style. Fish balls, turtle meat, fungi and clams are a few of the ingredients used in soup creations. Some culinary critics credit Fukien with producing the best soy sauce in China.

Though some chefs give the Honan province only a passing nod, others believe that one dish — sweet-and-sour carp — justifies recognition of the Honan cuisine. The recipe calls for carp from the Yellow River, which flows through the Honan province.

"The sweet-and-sour fish illustrates the Chinese belief that fine foods include contrasting tastes and textures," says Ms. Byrd. "The fish is deep fat-fried, which makes it crisp outside and soft inside. A

sauce made from the raw ingredients, wine, garlic, oil and sugar adds a pungent flavor to the recipe."

Ms. Byrd points out that Cantonese served in American restaurants is usually sparingly, substitute vegetable oil for lard and combine many vegetables. "Rice is a Cantonese staple, and high heat, is the most popular cooking method in Canton. Seafood and meat are seasoned with soy in one dish. Cantonese sauce, ginger root, favorites include chicken bouillon and shark's fin soup, pork wine. Cantonese and salted egg, won meals are usually col-ton, fried rice, bird's orful, since the light nest soup, egg foo sauces and stocks do yung, egg rolls and not mask the colors of turtle soup."

Barbecue with Caribbean theme

When the weather is fair, you may find fittingly festive fare among these easy-to-prepare dishes from Puerto Rico. They include a Tropical Chicken Barbeque that's just right for entertaining more than six people indoors at a smart supper buffet.

GREEN DIP
Mash a ripe avocado with one package (three ounces) cream cheese and one-half cup dairy sour cream. Thin to dip consistency with lemon juice and bottled salad dressing. Season with Tabasco and curry powder. Serve with cooked shrimp.

CHICKEN BARBECUE
1 clove garlic, crushed
1 onion, minced
½ cup chili sauce
¼ cup lime juice
¼ cup white rum
¼ cup honey
4 broiler-fryers, quartered

Combine sauce ingredients and simmer 10 minutes. Brush chicken pieces on both sides with sauce. Arrange in greased baking pan skin side down. Bake in preheated 425 degree oven 25 minutes.

Turn chicken, brush with sauce. Reduce oven temperature to 350 degrees; continue baking chicken until tender, 20 to 25 minutes. Brush with remaining sauce and serve hot.

ORANGE TROPICAL

(Yields: 10 to 12 servings)
10 to 12 medium oranges
2 cups sugar
2 cups water
½ cup white rum
One-third cup light corn syrup

Peel oranges, removing all the white pith. Sliver enough peel to make about one-half cup. Cover peel with water and boil until tender. Drain. Combine the remaining ingredients in a large saucepan and bring to a boil. Add slivered peel, reduce heat and simmer 10 minutes.

Add the oranges to the hot syrup and cook 10 to 12 minutes. Lift the oranges into a bowl and pour the hot syrup over all. Cool, then chill.

RUM DAIQUIRIS
To make nine Daiquiris, shake or stir one-half of a fifth of light rum and one-half of a six ounce can of limeade or lemonade concentrate or Daiquiri mix with ice until very cold.

If fresh fruit is preferred, substitute juice of nine limes and three tablespoons sugar for each can of frozen juice; or substitute fresh juice of nine limes and three tablespoons sugar for each can of frozen juice.

Because it's already sweetened, don't add sugar to frozen juice. For more Daiquiris, increase ingredients proportionately.

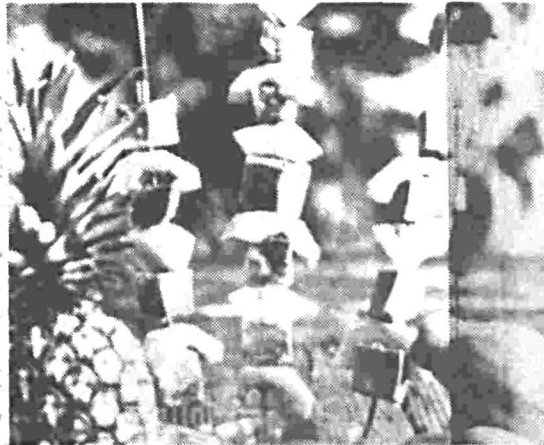

ham (preferably pork loin or fresh ham), papaya and pineapple on skewers.

These kabobs acquire their exotic flavor from the golden, juicy Hawaiian papayas. Available all year, papayas have been described as having the taste of a Crenshaw melon combined with the rich

sweetness of a peach. Whether green or full yellow, they are ripe when they yield to gentle pressure.

Rich in Vitamins A, C and potassium, papayas rate high nutritionally, too. As an extra plus, they are a dieter's delight. A half shell has only 78 calories.

Papayas are so versatile you may

want to keep several on hand to use in different salads and desserts. Try these Tropical Kabobs with papaya for your next barbecue, lunch, or supper. Smaller chunks can be used to make an eye-catching appetizer.

TROPICAL KABOBS
(Yields: 16 (eight-

inch skewers) pineapple chunks in natural juice 3 pounds cooked ham cut into one and one-half inch cubes 2 ripe papayas, cut into chunks (see note below) 1 cup honey

Drain pineapple, reserving liquid; alternate pineapple, ham and

papaya chunks on eight inch skewers.

Mix one-half cup pineapple juice and honey. Brush on kabobs. Cook over coals or under broiler for about five minutes—turning and basting with remaining marinade.

Note: To prepare papaya, cut in half lengthwise and scoop out seeds.

Pare skin and cut papaya into cubes.

Dressed up salads

Dressing a salad can be a ticklist affair. With today's food fashions breaking a lot of traditional rules, how can you make a salad a fashionable plate of tasteful goodness?

For dressing the long line of salads you'll be serving this season, follow a few rules of thumb that remain classics. Above all, remember that the dressing should blend and enhance the varied flavors of salad ingredients, yet assert its own distinct character. Sweet or tart, mild or spicy, clear or creamy, dressing varieties are almost unlimited. But they all fit into one of two categories: spoonables or pourables. Spoonables or viscous dressings, like mayonnaise and salad dressing, are creamy mixtures of oil, eggs and assorted seasonings that hold their shape softly when spooned from the jar. They are popular as a smooth base ingredient in dishes such as potato or macaroni salad, egg or tuna salad. Spoonable dressings make a creamy salad mold. They also provide an attractive, flavorful topping for fruit salads. Pourable dressings—poured from bottles—are most often used for tossed or combination salads. They're a convenient marinade, too.

Dressing Tips

Try a cheese-flavored dressing like Caesar or roka brand blue cheese to enliven green, vegetable and protein salads (made with meats, cheeses and eggs).

To marinate, perk up a bean salad or antipasto with Italian or herb and garlic dressings overnight. Just cover tightly and refrigerate.

Flavor meats and seafood with Catalina and French dressings.

For unmolding creamy salads with ease, lightly brush the inside of the mold with salad dressing before filling. When the mold is set, loosen edge with a spatula or knife tip. Shake gently. Place a serving plate on top of the mold and invert quickly. Garnish with parsley or some of the remaining salad mold ingredients.

Cut calorie corners by substituting the low calorie version for your favorite dressing.

Serve green goodness, green onion or creamy garlic dressings as dips for all kinds of raw vegetables.

As an appetizer salad, marinate last night's leftover vegetables with French, Italian or Caesar dressings.

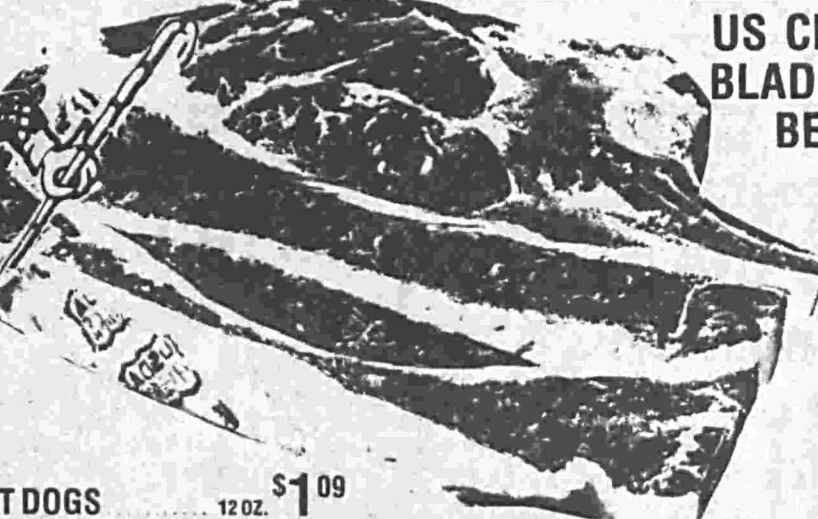

12 hard-cooked eggs
1/2 cup finely chopped celery
2 tablespoons finely chopped red pepper
4 crisply cooked bacon slices, crumbled
1/2 cup chunky blue cheese dressing

Cut eggs in half. Remove yolks; mash. Blend in celery, red pepper, bacon and dressing. Refill egg whites. Place two halves together.

POTATO SALAD STACK-UP

3 cups shredded iceberg lettuce
1 quart chopped cooked potatoes
2 cups peas, cooked, drained
2 cups chopped tomatoes
2 seven-ounce cans water pack tuna, drained, flaked
1/2 teaspoon dill weed
2 cups chopped cucumber
Dill Sauce Aristocrat

Combine potatoes and peas. Toss tuna with dill weed. In three and one-half quart salad bowl, layer, lettuce, potatoes and peas, tomato, tuna and cucumber. Top with one and one-half cups Dill Sauce Aristocrat. Cover and chill. Serve with remaining sauce.

Combine ingredients; mix well. Serve with Potato Salad Stack-Up.

FRESNO FRUIT TOSS (Yields: 6 to 8 servings)

1/2 cup real mayonnaise
1/2 cup marshmallow creme

2 tablespoons milk
1/2 teaspoon coriander
8 cups spinach
1 cup pear slices
1 cup peach slices
1 cup grape halves
1/2 cup alfalfa sprouts

Combine mayonnaise, marshmallow creme, milk and coriander; mix well. Chill.

Combine spinach, pears, peaches, grapes and alfalfa sprouts; toss lightly. Serve with dressing.

AVOCADO ASPIC (Yields: 6 servings)

2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
1 cup cold water
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1-1/2 cups tomato juice
1/2 cup french dressing
1/2 teaspoon hot pepper sauce
2 avocados
1/2 cup finely chopped celery
1/4 cup finely chopped green pepper
1/4 cup finely chopped onion

Lettuce
Shrimp
Dissolve gelatin in cold water and lemon juice; stir over low heat until dissolved. Gradually add gelatin mixture to tomato juice, dressing and hot pepper sauce, mixing until blended. Chill until partially set.

Peel and chop one avocado; fold chopped avocado, celery, green pepper and onion into gelatin mixture; pour into lightly oiled one-quart mold. Chill until firm. Unmold; surround with lettuce. Serve with shrimp and second avocado, peeled and sliced. Garnish with mayonnaise, if desired.

TIENTSIN VEGETABLE PLATTER (Yields: 8 to 10 servings)

1 (eight ounce) Italian dressing
2 cups broccoli flowerets
2 cups celery, sliced diagonally
2 cups bean sprouts
1/2 pound Chinese pea pods
2 cups cooked rice, chilled
One-third cup cashews, toasted
1/4 cup green onion slices
1 quart shredded iceberg lettuce

In separate containers, in one-fourth cup dressing each, marinate broccoli, celery, bean sprouts and pea pods. Cover; marinate overnight. Drain, reserving marinade. Combine one-fourth cup marinade with rice, cashews and green onions; toss lightly. Arrange vegetables and rice on a lettuce-covered platter. Serve with additional

marinade, if desired.

Variation: Pea pods can be substituted for Chinese pea pods.

POLYNESIAN FRUIT CUPS (Yields: 4 servings)

2 pineapples
1 cup vanilla ice cream, softened
1/2 cup real mayonnaise
1 teaspoon rum flavoring
1 cup papaya chunks
1 cup banana slices
1 cup kiwi slices

Remove crown; cut pineapples in half crosswise, leaving shells intact. Core and chunk fruit. Finely chop one cup pineapple; combine with ice cream, mayonnaise and flavoring. Mix well; pour into shallow pan. Freeze.

Combine papaya, banana, kiwi and remaining pineapple; toss lightly. Spoon into pineapple shells; top with ice cream mixture. Garnish with toasted coconut, if desired.

2 strips pimento
1 medium carrot, cut up
3 parsley sprigs
Blend first five ingredients at high speed until smooth. Add pimento, carrots and parsley. Turn blender on and off quickly to just chop vegetables. Chill until serving.

THREE-WAY DRESSING
(Yield: 3 ½ cups)
1 carton (16 ounce) creamed cottage cheese
2 cups (8 ounces) crumbled blue cheese
1 green onion, chopped fine
¼ teaspoon garlic salt
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 cup sour cream
Mix cheeses together in blender until smooth. Add onion and seasonings; blend well. Stir in sour cream. Serve chilled as a salad dressing or on baked potatoes or crackers.

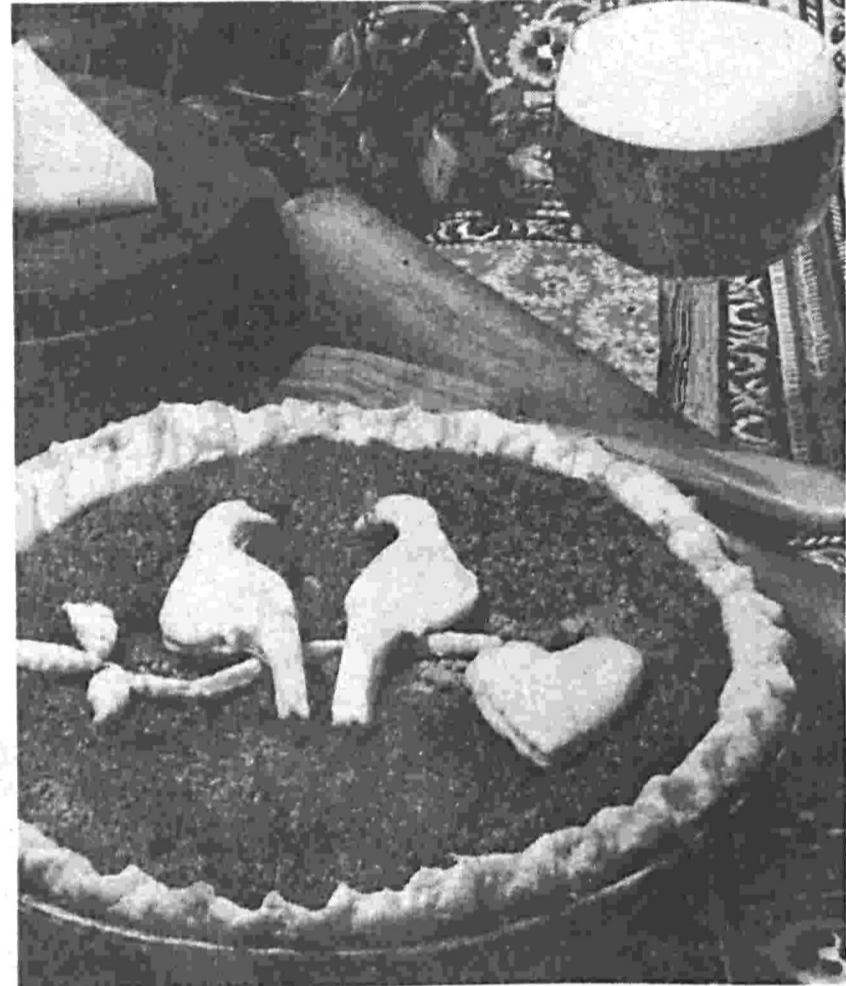
Shoo-fly pie is "old world" treat

In today's world of rapid change and mobility there are few areas remaining in the United States where one gets a feeling of the "Old World." The southeastern part of Pennsylvania, the home of the Pennsylvania Dutch, is one of these regions. In actuality the term Pennsylvania Dutch is a misnomer. These early settlers were of German descent. In explaining they were from Deutschland, it was mistaken for "Dutch" and the name stuck.

Being German, these people brought with them their culinary expertise, their traditions of hospitality. The Pennsylvania Dutch are famed for their original dishes — scrapple, waffles, apple butter and shoo-fly pie — as well as for creating great dishes with simple ingredients. Their cooking has endured as one of America's most regional cuisines, and many people travel to Pennsylvania just to eat. Typical of Pennsylvania Dutch dishes in that it is really unusual and not similar to anything else you have ever tasted is the shoo-fly pie.

SHOO-FLY PIE
(Yield: 6 to 8 servings)
Pastry for one crust, nine inch pie, uncooked
Crumb Mixture
 $\frac{3}{4}$ cup all purpose flour
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup firmly packed brown sugar
 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt
 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon cinnamon
One-eighth teaspoon ground ginger
One-eighth teaspoon ground nutmeg
One-eighth teaspoon ground cloves
2 tablespoons shortening
Liquid Mixture
 $\frac{3}{4}$ cup beer
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup molasses
1 egg, well beaten
 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon baking soda

Line pan with pastry. Place in refrigerator until ready for use. Combine ingredients for crumb mixture. Toss lightly with fork and set aside. Place beer in saucepan and bring to a boil. Stir baking soda and molasses into boiling beer. Remove from heat and gradually add liquid mixture to egg. Pour liquid into pastry shell. Top with crumbs. Bake in preheated 400 degree oven for 10 minutes. Reduce oven to 325 degrees; continue baking for about 30 minutes or until firm.

Coffee cakes for coffee breaks

The mid-morning coffee break has developed into an American institution. Nut breads and plain, unfrosted cakes are delicious with coffee and are easily transported to work or school. Suggested here are Apricot Peanut Bread and Marble Cake with Peanuts.

MARBLE CAKE WITH PEANUTS
2- $\frac{1}{4}$ cups unsifted cake flour
1- $\frac{1}{4}$ cups sugar
1 tablespoon baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup plus one tablespoon milk
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup peanut oil
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup chocolate-flavored syrup
One-third cup finely chopped cocktail peanuts
Sift cake flour, sugar, baking powder and salt together.
In large mixing

bowl combine sifted dry ingredients with one cup milk, peanut oil, eggs and vanilla extract. Blend on low speed, scraping bowl. Beat two minutes on medium speed, scraping bowl occasionally. Reserve one-half cup batter. Pour remaining batter into a greased and floured 13x9-inch pan. Combine reserved batter with chocolate syrup, cocktail peanuts, and remaining tablespoon of milk. Pour chocolate-nut batter over top and swirl.
Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes. Let cool in pan for 10 minutes. Remove from pan; cool completely. To serve, cut into squares. Makes one (13x9-inch) cake.



Barbecue brightens summer

Brighten summer entertaining with a back-to-basics barbecue... something easy and delicious to please friends, relatives or hungry neighbors who catch the delightful fragrance of barbecuing turkey. Roasting turkey on a spit was probably the original cooking method used by pioneers, and other hardy souls trekking the trails West. We've modernized this classic American bird by basting it with a zippy sauce.

Fresh summer fruits are extended to serve a crowd by teaming with economical, always available canned cling peaches. Top with luscious yogurt dressing for a summer delight. Serve it all with a zingy Sparkling Soda — a hearty, healthful sipping drink all ages will enjoy.

SPIT-ROASTED TURKEY
For outdoor spit-roasting, six to 12 pounds turkeys are best. If turkey is fresh-frozen, thaw, remove from bag, remove neck and giblets, rinse and wipe dry. Prepare turkey as you would for roasting, seasoning the inside of cavities with salt and pepper. Tie wings securely to breast with twine and tie drumsticks and tie drumsticks securely to tail. Do not stuff turkeys for rotisserie cooking. Insert spit rod in front of tail; run diagonally through breast bone. Fasten tightly with spit forks at both ends and test for balance, readjusting until satisfactory. If desired, insert thermometer into thickest part of thigh, parallel to the spit, making sure thermometer bulb is not touching bone. Cook according to timetable, brushing turkey occasionally with barbecue sauce.

Turkey can also be roast-barbecued in the oven. Any size bird can be used. Place unstuffed turkey on a rack in a shallow pan and brush generously inside and out with barbecue sauce. Insert roast meat thermometer in thickest part of thigh muscle, making sure thermometer bulb is not touching bone. Roast at 325 degrees F. for approximate length of time indicated on timetable below.

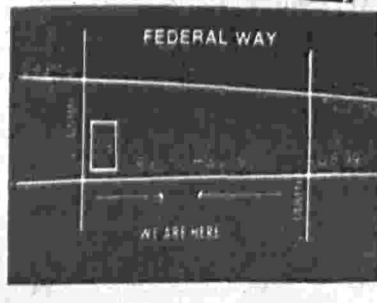
