

Sex charges filed against local men

A Federal Way resident and three Seattle area men pleaded not guilty in King County Superior Court Friday to charges that they promoted prostitution at two Sea-Tac area businesses.

A fifth man, John J. Azzoline, failed to appear for arraignment on the same charges and a bench warrant was issued for his arrest. Calvin Vernon Hiatt, Jr., P.O. Box 3465, Federal Way, was arrested Thursday at his Lake Doloff home after King County police vice officers raided the Kinky Korner, 17024 Pacific Hwy. S. and the American Sexuality Society, 14004 Pacific Hwy. S.

Hiatt, 31, is said to have been the manager of both establishments and, according to police information filed with the prosecutor's office, his was "involved in a well organized juvenile/adult prostitution ring." His occupation is listed as carpenter.

Hiatt was charged with promoting prostitution in the second degree. In an affidavit filed Thursday, Deputy Prosecutor Michael McKay said Hiatt was the leasee of the property on which the American Sexuality Society was located and knew of the prostitution. Hiatt allegedly told one witness he "knew the business was a 'whorehouse,'" according to McKay.

Donald G. Jessup, a member of the Gypsy Jokers motorcycle club, is charged with forcing a woman to commit prostitution at the Kinky Korner and threatening her with physical violence if she did not. McKay's affidavit claims Jessup, of south Seattle, hired prostitutes to work at both establishments and received profits from their work.

Patrick Putnam, 3834 S. 144th St., worked at both businesses as a prostitute recruiter and trainer and a bouncer, McKay said. He also was "protector of the girls" and received money derived from

acts of prostitution.

Azzoline is charged with receiving money from prostitutes. He was the bouncer and manager at the American Sexuality Society.

A fifth defendant, Haldon G. Croasmun, is said to have received money from a 17-year old prostitute for whom he provided housing and helped her hide from police when warrants were issued for her arrest. The woman worked at the American Sexuality Society and elsewhere, according to McKay.

Hiatt was convicted in federal court in 1976 of violating the Mann Act by transporting women across state lines for prostitution. A 15-year old runaway girl was also arrested with him at his home Thursday, according to Sgt. Robert Evans, head of the county police vice unit.

Evans said the raids Thursday on the two businesses followed an intensive, two-month investigation and netted so much evidence "we haven't even gone through

them yet." Among other things seized were customer information sheets and pictures. The information included the customer's name, home address, telephone number, place of employment, driver's license number, vehicle license number, credit card numbers and marital status. Some included the customer's sexual preferences. There was also a Polaroid picture of each customer.

Trial for the five was set for Nov. 15 to allow the prosecutor to evaluate the massive amount of evidence.

Hiatt is free on \$20,000 bond; Putnam is free on \$5,000 bond; Croasmun is free on \$10,000 bond and Jessup posted \$10,000 bond and is also out of jail. All have been instructed by the court not to have any contact with the seven witnesses in the case and they cannot leave the King, Pierce, Snohomish County area without the permission of the court.

Labor Day

Wages increased; but so did prices

In World War I, laborers earned less in two weeks than many children receive for their allowance today.

And that was in the early 20th Century when working conditions and salaries looked pretty good as compared to earlier periods in the development of the country.

It wasn't too long ago in our history when laborers worked in unsafe factory conditions for incredibly long hours for just pennies a day.

Laborers in the same kinds of factories today have good wages, carefully monitored working conditions and an 8-hour day.

Few remember those very early years before child labor laws and labor laws in general improved life for the working person. But there are still those who remember earning as little as 25 cents an hour.

Fred White of Des Moines earned that wage as an apprentice mechanic at the Ames Shipyard in Seattle in 1918 at the start of World War I. His wages really skyrocketed when he changed his job to a shipfitter's helper, he said. He made 60 cents an hour, which was later raised to 80 cents.

Today, 61 years after White earned 25 cents an hour, apprentice mechanics are earning 24 times that amount. Their beginning wage is \$7.07 an hour. Beginning shipfitter's helpers earn \$9.80 an hour with mechanics earning a cool \$10.14 an hour.

Overtime hours earn double those wages and they receive a cost of living wage increase every three months.

Working conditions have improved in more areas than just dollars. Shipyard workers, as members of the Metal Trades Union, receive major medical coverage, pensions, holidays, paid vacations, life insurance, and a multitude of other benefits.

While wages may have seemed low in World War I, White said, "the worst conditions for working people was during the depression."

White had left the shipyards

after World War I ended and took up driving a cab.

As a taxi driver, he earned 35 percent of what he took in with a guarantee of \$3.25 a day. He managed to earn about \$20 to \$25 a week to support his wife and two children. Taxi drivers now earn 50 percent of their fares which comes to about \$40 a day.

"Times were so tough," White said, "it was an unwritten rule that if you weren't earning enough (through fares) you would turn your cab in."

In 1939, the taxi drivers negotiated a contract for a minimum guarantee of \$4.50 for eight hours.

"As far as we knew, that was the highest wage for cab drivers in the world," White said.

While the wage seemed high to White and his fellow cab drivers, he said, they were astounded to hear what White would make when he returned to the shipyards at the start of World War II.

When he told them he would be earning \$1.10 an hour, they didn't believe him, he said, adding that was considered to be an extremely high wage in those days.

If the cabbies were incredulous at what White had expected to earn, they probably would have voted him into the Liar's Club had he told them what he actually was paid. As a lead man, in charge of from 12 to 18 men, he earned the astronomical wage of \$1.59 an hour.

While wages were considerably less in earlier times, White said, prices were also a lot lower.

You could get three loaves of bread for a quarter, he said, and 25 bus tokens for a dollar.

"People look at the prices in those days and say it must have been great," he said, "but when you look at the wages, it wasn't so great."

Some might look at the prices today and say wages really aren't so great now. But at least in the 1970's, as the prices increase, so do the wages of most laborers.

In the early 1900's, a cost of living raise was as far-out a concept as a trip to the moon.

Warrant out for local man

A bench warrant was issued Friday for a McMicken Heights man who failed to appear with four other defendants for arraignment on charges of promoting prostitution.

John Joseph Azzoline left jail Thursday after posting bond but did not return to be formally charged with the crime of promoting prostitution in connection with two Sea-Tac area businesses raided by county vice officers Thursday.

Azzoline, 40, lives at 16800 - 33rd Ave. S. Richard Powers, an attorney standing in for Azzoline's lawyer, said the defendant's wife had called his office to say her husband would not be able to appear in court for the arraignment.

At the request of Deputy County Prosecutor Michael McKay, Presiding Superior Court Judge Lloyd Bever issued a bench warrant for Azzoline.

Opera center impact:

\$22 million shot-in-arm

Studies obtained from Seattle Opera officials show that completion of the proposed Pacific Northwest Center for the Performing Arts would pump an estimated yearly total of \$22 million into the local economy and create at least 126 new jobs in Federal Way.

The studies, which range from economic projections to examples of the impact that similar facilities have had on local cultural climates, also suggest that the center would be a powerful factor in attracting new business to the community.

One of the documents, prepared in 1977 by Economic Research Associates (ERA), a Los Angeles-based think tank, says that it "will be a primary source of personal intellectual and aesthetic enrichment to individuals and of pride and satisfaction to the community."

The financial projections, part of the same study, show that the facility would also increase state and local tax revenues by nearly \$600,000 per year.

SANDY LORENTZEN, the administrator of Seattle Opera's annual Wagner festival, says that the figures are decidedly on the conservative side.

Economic Research Associates is one of the oldest organizations of its kind in business," she said, "and when they prepared these studies, they approached it just as if they were a corporation planning an expansion."

"Our experience with the Wagner festival shows that the actual economic impact will probably be much greater," she added.

For example, when Phoenix, Ariz., completed a cultural facility that included an auditorium, an exhibition hall and 20 meeting rooms, it triggered about \$300 million in new construction.

And a list of similar projects contained in the ERA study show that the impact of new cultural facilities elsewhere was proportionately just as great.

The center — it is also called the Festival in the Forest — would be the home of the Wagner festival. It would be built at Panther Lake in West Campus and would be used year-round for a variety of performances and cultural events.

ERA SAYS THAT in addition to the monetary benefits, the festival would bring to Federal Way a number of "major intangible benefits" that include:

- developing the growth potential of the Pacific Northwest's already expanding art scene;
- encouraging the development of a broad spectrum of locally based cultural events and facilities;
- bringing a great many visitors from throughout the nation and abroad, thereby turning the community into an international cultural crossroads, and

— providing residents with a beautifully landscaped 30-acre park to which they would have free access.

Though the ERA studies and the other material do not address the question directly, they also indicate that completion of the festival would provide a newly incorporated city of Federal Way with "a clean new industry," that of high-income tourism.

TO THE PERSON in the street, all of this means good news. Even the persons who are troubled by Federal Way's uncontrolled and sometimes haphazard development — that is one of the major issues in the current incorporation drive — say they like the proposal.

One of these is Ross Davis, the chairman of the Federal Way City Committee's information group. Davis believes that completion of the festival at Panther Lake, in what is already a planned community, will provide a strong incentive to correct many of the abuses of past development and turn the community into a model of attractiveness.

The advocates of incorporation, he says, have therefore backed construction of the festival here all along.

Most persons connected with the project believe it will be completed by about 1984. The land has been donated by the Weyerhaeuser Company, and \$5 million in state funds have already been allocated by the Legislature.

A bill to provide for the rest of the construction budget, a total of about \$25 million, has been introduced by U. S. Rep. Norm Dicks, D-6th District, and is pending in Congress.

Complete bus routes provided in this issue

Listings of all currently approved bus stops in the Federal Way School District where transportation service is provided can be found on pages A6 and 7 of this newspaper.

The district is providing transportation for all students living beyond two (2) miles from the school within their assigned attendance area. Some "Safety" routes are being provided less than two (2) miles for students who may be required to travel a hazardous route to and from school. It is anticipated that additional "Safety" routes will be initiated during the school year.

Route numbers will be displayed in the forward right hand side window of the bus. The bus number will no longer be used for identity.

To insure smooth operations, the following suggestions should be followed:

1. Students should embark and disembark at the stop closest to their home.
 2. The time listed is the Expected Arrival Time at the stops. Students should be at their bus stops at least five (5) minutes prior to the listed time, but no more than ten (10) minutes. This will insure no loading delays, and at the same time should reduce noise, confusion, and vandalism at the bus stops.
 3. Students should wait OFF the roadways.
- Adjustments to the routes may be necessary during the school year. Notification of any adjustments will come through the school principal, the bus driver, or both.

Under the Capitol Dome

Increasing use of the initiative and referendum process by local governments has prompted consideration of a uniform law to govern the practice at all levels.

The house Local Government Committee is currently studying the issue, and a Senate-House joint Select Committee on Home Rule also will probably take it up.

Counties Can't Do It
Under existing law, noncharter counties don't have the initiative and referendum process.

But some counties occasionally have managed to get around the prohibition by holding special advisory elections.

Though they aren't binding, county commissioners usually act in accordance with the results, and have found them useful in settling particularly controversial issues.

City Practices Vary
Meanwhile, some of the county home rule charters on the ballot this November have provisions for initiative and referendum procedures similar to those of the state.

As for cities, state law makes provisions for initiatives and

referenda mandatory for those which operate under the commission form of government.

Among the others, some non-charter cities have them and some don't. The law is hazy as to their legality, a point which the lawmakers hope to clarify.

Hotter Than It Looks
Though the issue lacks the glamor of liquor, sex, or anti-crime legislation, it can become quite emotional.

Legislators have been frustrated by some initiative or referendum from time to time ever since provisions for their use by the voters were incorporated into the constitution 67 years ago.

But it is difficult to openly oppose in principle such an instrument of representative government. So there could be a concerted behind-the-scenes battle to keep the issue from ever reaching the floor.

A Mixed Blessing?
State officialdom is hoping that the gasoline crunch may have curtailed driving in urban areas to the point where mandatory inspections of exhaust emission systems won't be necessary.

A law enacted during the last legislative session calls for mandatory inspections where contaminants exceed accepted levels established under the federal Environmental Protection Act.

While its application could be statewide, it was anticipated that originally it only would affect such urban areas as the Seattle, Everett, Tacoma, Vancouver and possibly Spokane.

Too Early to Tell
The Department of Ecology has been monitoring these areas for the past 30 days to determine if curtailed driving as a result of the fuel shortage has improved air quality.

But representatives of the agency told the House Ecology Committee that at least 90 days will be needed to ascertain whether a trend has been established through car pooling and increased use of mass transit.

If air quality doesn't meet federal standards, the state's failure to act could lead to the withholding of up to 10 percent of the state's share of federal gasoline tax money.

New Worry for Boat Owners
It hasn't happened yet, but there has been discussion among some legislators about possibly repealing the current 80 percent exemption granted pleasure boat valuations for personal property tax purposes.

They believe removal of the exemption might soften resistance to enactment of a state registra-

tion law for pleasure craft regulation.

As predicted a couple of weeks ago, release of coast guard registration lists to county assessors, making boats accessible to assessment of personal property taxes, hasn't squelched efforts to enact a state registration law.

Graduated Fees Proposed
The Marine and Aeronautics Subcommittee of the House Transportation Committee was scheduled to hold a hearing last week on HB 812, which was introduced last February.

Boats under 20 feet in length would be charged annual registration fees ranging from \$3 to \$10, according to horsepower.

But boats in excess of 20 feet would be charged \$10 plus \$1 for each additional foot, regardless of horsepower or market value.

Age Disregarded
The bill would exempt pleasure craft from the present personal property tax, but there have been objections to the fact that the fees don't differentiate between types of boats more than 20 feet in length.

The fee would be the same for a craft built of fiberglass as for one built of wood or steel.

Some have pointed out that the owner of a sleek new express cruiser with twin screw propulsion wouldn't pay any more than somebody with an ancient clunker of the same length.

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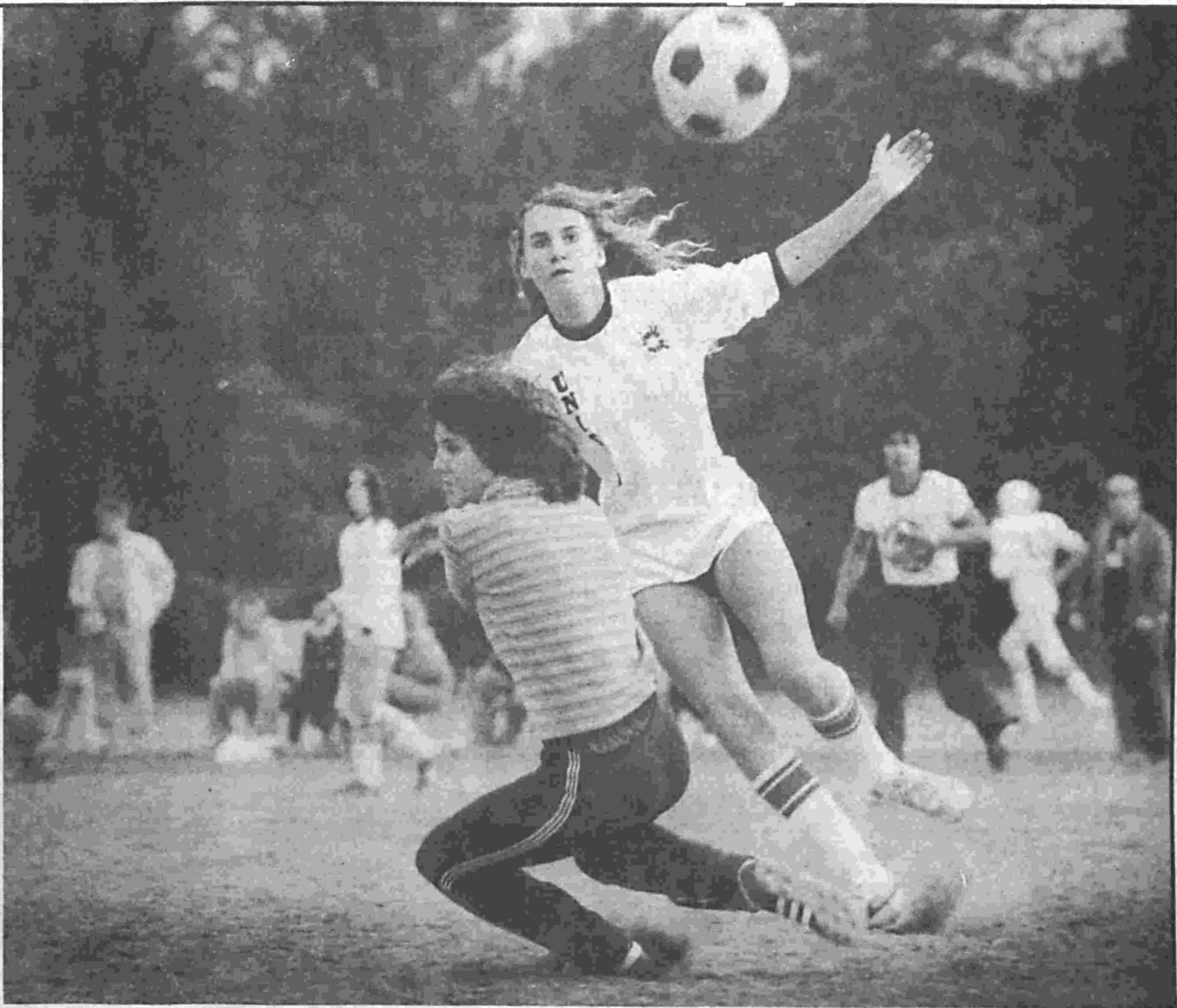
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Soccer '79 kicks off in a big way

Candidates rated by Seattle Muny League

The Seattle Municipal League released its ratings of candidates for county and Port of Seattle offices today showing County Assessor Harley Hoppe bested by challenger Hank McGuire and very few "outstanding" candidates.

Of candidates for the four King County Council races, only Republican Lois North was rated outstanding. The 57-year old state senator is seeking the 4th District post being vacated by Democrat Bernice Stern. She has been active in politics including the women's movement for many years.

Art Skolnick was rated very good while fellow Democrat Dave Wood received only a good rating

for the 4th District job. Skolnick is an architect and community activist on Queen Anne Hill and Wood is a Magnolia public affairs consultant.

Incumbent Democrat Bob Greive, running unopposed in the 8th District, was rated merely "good". The West Seattle attorney won his first four-year term on the council in 1975.

Incumbent Democrat Pat Thorpe and Republican challenger Bruce Laing both received ratings of very good from the League in their battle for the 6th District County Council post. Republican Bill Johnson is only adequate as a candidate for the office, according to the ratings.

Thorpe left a teaching position with the Highline School District in December when she was appointed to fill the vacancy on the county council created when Mike Lowry was elected to Congress. She is also a former Renton City Council member.

Laing served for 10 years as the King County Zoning Examiner and was largely responsible for reform of the county land use hearing process. Laing is a resident of Bellevue.

In Council District 2, both Democrat Dick Kelley and Republican Scott Blair were rated very good. Kelley is the 29-year old former deputy mayor of Seattle. Blair is an aerospace engineer and state representative from the 46th District.

Hank McGuire, who has waged a campaign against county assessor Harley Hoppe charging that Hoppe has not kept assessments up to date, was rated very good as a candidate. The journeyman electrician is a 34-year old Queen Anne Hill resident.

Hoppe, two-term incumbent, is a conservative Republican who has run for governor and county executive in past elections. When he announced his candidacy for a third term as assessor, Hoppe said he would not seek other office during the coming four-year term. He lives on Mercer Island.

PORT COMMISSION
Incumbents Jack Block and Henry Simonson both received

"very good" ratings as did Robert Buck who is challenging Block and Bill Sage who seeks to unseat Simonson.

Captain McManus, a retired airline pilot and former port commissioner, was rated not qualified for the post. State Senator King Lysen, a 37-year old White Center real estate developer, was only given an adequate rating as a candidate for position 4 now held by Simonson.

Block, 44, has been on the commission six years. The Normandy Park resident is a ship and dock foreman.

Buck, 62, is a banker and active in Seattle community affairs.

Simonson is the president of a small import-export company and has also served on the commission for one term. The 60-year old Seattleite is active in trade associations.

Sage is a 33-year old lawyer employed by Northern Tier Pipeline.

Candidates not rated for the two positions include Bob Daly, Seattle; Jack Leffler, Des Moines; Tom McManus, Maple Valley; Charles (Bill) Rinehart Jr., Kirkland; Michael Royer, West Seattle; Anthony Zuanich, Seattle; Tom Fairchild, Seattle; Bob Maxie, Seattle; Richard E. Van Horn, Seattle and Robert Lindley Wood, Seattle.

A SUPERIOR COURT judgeship for an unexpired one-year term was also rated by the League, the first time that office has ever been given a rating.

Terrence Carroll, 34, appointed last month to fill the vacancy until the election, was rated very good. Carroll is a former King County deputy prosecutor and a judge pro-tem in Superior Court.

Richard Ishikawa, 46, also received a rating of very good for the post. He is also a former county deputy prosecutor and is now a court commissioner for King County Superior Court.

Traffic sign vandals may face jail terms

King County Councilman Paul Barden will introduce an ordinance Tuesday requiring mandatory jail sentences for persons convicted of traffic sign vandalism. The proposed law is patterned after the state law mandating jail terms for persons found guilty of driving while intoxicated.

The action followed the death recently of an employee of the King County department of

public works. The Woodinville resident died after his car was hit at an intersection where a county road sign had been toppled.

The ordinance would prohibit meddling with traffic signs. Anyone violating the law would be subject to a fine of up to \$500 and/or a jail term of up to six months. If the act of vandalism results in bodily harm to someone, the jail sentence could not

be suspended or deferred by a judge unless it was determined that imposition of the sentence would pose a risk to the person's physical or mental health.

Dennis English, staff aide for Barden's operations, police and judiciary committee, said there is no precedent for the proposed law. He said it would be introduced then sent to the county prosecutor's office for analysis and

review.

A spokesman for the prosecutor's office said Thursday he had not seen the proposed ordinance but did not know if the county council has the legal authority to impose a mandatory sentence which may strip the court of judicial discretion.

English said the ordinance will probably have a first public hearing in about three weeks before Barden's committee.

Police seek owners of recovered goods

King County detectives have recovered a variety of stolen goods worth well in excess of \$1,000 and are hoping to return as many of the items as possible to their rightful owners.

Among the loot, which was picked up as an offshoot of a narcotics arrest at a Steel Lake area residence, are several firearms, a mountaineer's pack and climbing gear, and several items of jewelry.

a Redondo area household.

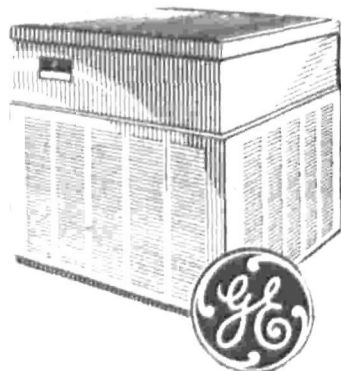
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Alternative school strives for quality

What would have seemed to be an impossibility has become a reality for four couples in the form of the G. Webster Academy in Des Moines.

ing shown that the impossible can still be done as the school is nearly doubling its enrollment in its second year.

The school strives to offer a quality education, while teaching values and principles ignored in public schools, said Chris Spaun, administrator.

"We stress Christian principles such as respect for country and authority, modesty in dress, and

discipline. While the school stresses Christian principles, it does not teach Bible doctrines or classes, he said, noting they feel that should be conducted within the home and church.

The school curriculum follows a "back-to-basics" program, Spaun said.

They stress language arts, reading, writing and grammar. Their curriculum also in-

cludes a foreign language, science, art, music, physical education, home economics and shop, Spaun said, but they don't teach "luxury" courses, such as photography.

In addition to teaching academic skills, the school concentrates on motivating the children to want to learn.

"Some of the children that came

here didn't like school," he said. "They hated going to school in the morning, but after about a month, those children wanted to learn."

The school had an enrollment of 40 students last year, he said, with an expected enrollment of 70 to 80 this year.

The students, who came from Seattle, Issaquah and South King County, were enrolled in the school for a variety of reasons, Spaun said.

"Most are here because their parents want to give them a good education," he said. "Others are behind in their work and some were so far ahead they were not getting motivated.

Parents are also concerned about the bad influences in the public school systems."

The school is unique, Spaun said, in that the small classrooms with 10 to 15 students, each, allow the students to

advance at their own pace and also allow the teachers to give students individual attention.

Unfortunately, the alternative education offered by the G. Webster Academy does not come cheap. Tuition is \$1,550 per school year for the first child, \$1,350 for the second child and \$1,150 for each additional child.

In the minds of the parents of Academy students, it may seem a small price.

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Saga of Kaiser 'boys' continues

The Kaiser boys are growing up.

Roy, Kenny, Kevin, Danny and Russell moved to Federal Way with their parents, Roy Sr. and Doris, about eight years ago. As a dancing team they have performed extensively in this area and toured nationally with the well-known group, the Singing Angels.

The five lovable brothers, who tapped their ways into many a motherly, or fatherly, heart in the Federal Way area and far beyond, are turning heads of a different kind these days.

Part of the new interest, no doubt, can be attributed to their maturing into men of striking good looks. Roy is now 21; Ken, 20; Kevin, 18; and Danny, 16. And 12-year-old Russell probably gets the eye from the younger set.

But some of those taking note of the Kaisers are interested in talented ballet dancers.

Roy was recently accepted as a full-fledged member of the Pennsylvania Ballet Company in Philadelphia.

The 1975 graduate of Federal Way High School has worked his way through the lower levels of the school to the company since he first went there in the summer of 1977 as a student on a full scholarship.

Last summer, he was one of six students selected as an apprentice to the

company. Roy's new home is the third largest ballet troupe in the country, the first outside of New York. About 34 dancers form the nucleus of the company, supported by a large artistic, administrative and technical staff.

Since its founding in 1962, the school has become known as one of the best professional ballet academies in the United States.

This past summer it drew 204 students; among the 23 boys who went for a few months of intensified studies were three of the Kaisers — Roy, Kevin and Danny.

It was Kevin's second summer at the school, and he had adjusted to the rigor of the curriculum — three to four classes a day and additional practice, adding up to at least 4 1/2 hours of strenuous ballet dancing that leaves one, according to the Kaisers, in a state of sweaty exhaustion.

But being Danny's first summer there, it took some adjusting for him.

"I had been taking two classes a week at Cornish Institute in Seattle," Danny said. "Going to four classes a day was a big change."

But Danny, like his brothers, Roy and Kevin, had been bit ten badly by the ballet bug.

"I can hardly wait to get back there," he said.

Kevin, who has been on scholarship at the

school since January, will return to Philadelphia with Roy this fall. But it will be a while before Danny makes it back there, despite the fact that he has a full scholarship also.

Danny has two years of high school to complete. But he is thinking of speeding up the process as Kevin when he graduated from high school early by going to Green River Community College. "Kevin crammed 1 1/2 years of work into three months," Danny said, with an admiring look at his brother.

Cramming a lot of work into a limited amount of time appears to be an occupational necessity for ambitious ballet dancers.

Although Kevin and Danny realize this after only a relatively short period with the school, Roy's rapid rise to the company has given him a bird's-eye view of the difficulties of a dancing career.

Roy came into ballet quite late. He took his first class when he was a senior in high school at the urging of his tap-dancing teacher, Sandee Denn. Ms. Denn, who has a studio at 23800 Pacific Highway S., is credited with starting all of the Kaiser brothers in ballet.

Only by assuring Roy that it would help his tap-dancing did she overcome his reluctance to venture onto what was considered feminine territory.

But it soon became a challenge to him, as it did later with three of his brothers. Only Kenny is heading in another direction — jazz and tap.

After a year studying with the San Francisco Ballet (on scholarship) and then more studies at the Cornish Institute, Roy said he knew that his career would be professional ballet.

And because of his late start, he said he knew that it was time to go to the East Coast.

"I knew it had to be that year," he said. "We have an age limit, just like athletes. They say the mid-30s is the limit, but I'm not sure I believe it."

"Men's bodies go more quickly than women's because we do a lot of lifting, and it does funny things to your back."

As a student, Roy said he worked about four hours a day and danced about four more. Then as an apprentice, he worked even harder.

He said he thinks being in the company will be easier. It most certainly will be more lucrative.

Apprentices in the company are paid a small stipend, he explained. But as a member, he will be making about \$10,000 a year at the beginning and will have union-regulated hours and regular raises in pay.

His salary can be greatly increased by "guesting," he said.

By hiring out to do guest appearances with other companies, dancers can make much more.

"The prospects of a career salary are what you make it," he said. "Most companies have contracts similar to the Pennsylvania ballet," he said, "which signs up dancers on 36-week contracts."

But it's a hard life, he added.

The hours are long; the pay is relatively low; and the facilities are usually not that comfortable, he said.

"The air conditioner breaks down in summer, and the heater breaks down in the winter," he said. "I wear wool on my legs in winter in order to keep warm."

And in addition to being tired when one gets home at night, there is little time left over for personal or social lives, he said.

What makes it all worthwhile, he said, is the challenge.

"I just want to do the best I can, as long as I can," Roy said, "to keep accomplishing more throughout my career. If that ever ends, the dancer becomes a machine."

"And it's not that great a life to begin with. I don't think I could survive without the challenge."

Grass Roots Gardening

I'm often asked by homeowners, "If you could plant only three small deciduous trees what three would you choose?"

One instantly thinks of maples, flowering prunus and majus, birches and dogwood. But most gardens contain spring flowering trees and a maple, but for sheer year 'round fascination of color, foliage, flowering, winter silhouette and texture these are the trees I would plant.

Oxydendron Arboreum, sorrell or sourwood tree. Called sourwood because the leaves taste bitter. This extremely handsome tree is native to the Eastern United States. It grows about 20 feet high with a slender trunk and slightly spreading top. Showy spring leaves are bronze tinted green, in summer a rich green and in autumn turn brilliant orange and scarlet. The leaves are shaped like peach leaves, but heavier texture. Creamy bell shaped flowers droop from branch tips in late July and August. The seed pods form and turn upward on the branch. The hairy capsules fade to a silver grey and add winter interest.

Oxydendron require acid soil and dislike competing with large trees, shrubs or lawns. This member of the Ericaceae family objects to cultivation that could disturb roots. Young plants are good container plants and the trees

are superb shade trees for patio or terrace.

The Franklinia Altamaha of the saxifrage family is a remarkable small tree almost extinct when John Bartram discovered it in Georgia in 1790. He named it for his friend Ben Franklin. All known Franklinia trees in cultivation now originated from cuttings from Bartram's Philadelphia garden. This rare tree is available in larger nurseries. There is a fine stand at the U.W. Arboretum.

The branches grow sparse and thin, leaves are narrowly oblong, slightly toothed and a medium green. They persist long into late autumn ultimately turning bright crimson. There is the added autumn bonus of flowering in late September and October. Solitary buds form at the leaf joints on very short stems. The blooms are usually white, occasionally pinkish, fragrant and waxy, about three and one-half inches wide, resembling a single camellia. The center of each waxy bloom is filled with golden yellow stamens.

The Franklinia's culture is exacting. It must be planted in an area protected from wind, in rich humusy soil with an acid Ph of five to six. It requires excellent drainage but plenty of moisture and some high shade.

Our Franklinia, although planted in accordance with its exacting demands did

suffer from last winter's extreme cold. We pruned off damaged branches after they leafed out, later than usual. It apparently expended all its energy recovering as no flower buds are visible. Even though we will not be able to exclaim over the exquisite autumn flowers we will enjoy the flaming fall foliage.

The Sumac, Rhus typhina, a small native tree is often overlooked as a specimen tree in a naturalistic garden. Sumac tolerates dry sites, wind, cold, poor soil and near neglect. There are 15 species but only four are of garden interest. Sumac reach anywhere from 10 to 30 feet and expand about three-fourths as wide.

The Staghorn Sumac, the most exotic and desirable has branches covered with short brown velvety hairs like the deer antlers. Foliage is deep green, greyish underneath. The

variety R. lanciniata has very finely dissected leaves. Small inconspicuous flowers, greenish yellow, grow in conical clusters on branch tips. They turn into reddish brown fleshy hairy fruit and the decorative clusters linger all winter long. The autumn display of brilliant red foliage is spectacular. The branches bend gracefully often growing from tortuous main trunks adding to landscape interest after foliage has fallen.

Staghorn sumac's one drawback can be the weedy shoots that sprout from root run-

ners. Don't cultivate under sumac and lay down a heavy bark mulch using black polyethylene under the bark but out beyond the tree's perimeter drip line. It is not a big chore to pull up or cut off the sprouts then paint with a pruning bomb that also has a sprout

inhibitor. By carefully digging, to get a good root portion, you can dig and pot up sumac suckers and share with friends.

Providing containers are large enough, sumac are excellent container plants to use as focal points on patios and decks.

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'Hawks start NFL season today

The Seattle Seahawks open the 1979 National Football League season today with a Kingdome confrontation against the San Diego Chargers at 1 p.m.

Coming off a 3-1 pre-season, Seattle will be seeking its first opening-day victory in the club's four-year history. The Hawks and Chargers (both 9-7 last year) opened the 1978 season in the Kingdome as well; San Diego took a 24-20 victory in that game.

The two teams have met three times during the regular season, with San Diego holding a 3-0 series lead. The Chargers won a 30-28 contest in 1977, and came out on top of Seattle twice last year.

Seattle, on the other hand, has won two of three pre-season affairs with the California squad. The Hawks flew to victory in 1976 (17-16) and 1978 (17-0); the Charger's only pre-season win was a

38-20 decision in 1977.

The Seahawks are coming off of a fine series of warm-up contests, including a 55-20 pasting of San Francisco in the Kingdome August 24. Seattle has also downed Minnesota (12-9 in overtime) and Dallas (27-17), while dropping one to the Los Angeles Rams, 21-17.

The Chargers have incurred losses to Los Angeles and San Francisco in pre-season competition. Victories over Minnesota and the New York Giants put San Diego's pre-record at 2-2.

Quarterback Dan Fouts will lead the Chargers' arial attack through the Kingdome air Sunday. The San Diego signal caller has completed 71 of 101 passes against the Hawks for 866 yards, seven touchdowns and three interceptions.

Seattle head coach Jack Patena will send rookies Robert Hardy and Manu Tuaiasopo

after flinger Fouts. Hardy figures to replace regular defensive left tackle Dennis Boyd, who suffered a hairline ankle fracture against San Francisco, while Tuaiasopo moved in at right tackle after Bill Sandifer suffered a knee injury against Dallas.

"They have done a real good job during the pre-season," defensive line coach Jim Mora says of the two rookies. "They both have a chance to be real good football players in the league; they have a lot to learn by they've shown the ability."

While Tuaiasopo, Hardy, and the Seattle defense work at keeping San Diego out of the endzone, Seahawk quarterback Jim Zorn will fire at the Charger defensive unit. Zorn has averaged 235.3 yards passing against San Diego, including a club-record 329 in last season's opener.

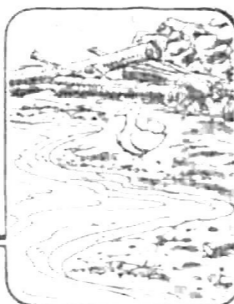

Highline soccer begins tomorrow

The Highline Soccer Association starts its tenth season tomorrow and Sunday as youngsters from the select and district teams enter league play. The house teams, or the younger kids, don't begin league play until Sept. 15 and 16.

The select teams play on a "fairly high level of competition," said Diana Johnson, president of the HSA. But the majority of the players in the HSA play for recreation.

The select league teams are for 12- to 18-year-olds. The district and house teams play within the Highline area, whereas the select teams play in a state league.

The house leagues play until Thanksgiving, and the select and district league teams compete until Christmas, Ms. Johnson said.

However, in January and February three tournaments are available to the teams for post-season play. The first one is an open competition for girls and boys. The second one is the Washington State Challenge Cup, open to girls and boys ages 10 to 18. The third tournament is sponsored by the state and is available to 8- and 9-year-old boys and girls.

Last year, 206 teams competed in

the HSA, a member of the Washington State Youth Soccer Association.

FW Soccer Assoc. begins '79 campaign

The Federal Soccer Association begins its 1979-80 regular season schedule when the select teams as well as some of the district teams open competition this weekend.

The balance of the Federal Way teams begin competing on Sept. 22 and 23, when the house teams (or 6- and 7-year-olds) take to the field.

The house leagues play on a smaller scale field than the older kids and "concentrate on the teaching aspect rather than the competitive aspect," said Mike Keim, president of the FWSA.

A player must be 12 years or older to try out for a select team, but he or she cannot be older than 18.

Select teams play on a higher level of competition than do the district teams, and they play in a state league which draws select teams from all over the state.

District teams draw 8- to 18-year-olds, and most of them compete against teams from one of the seven soccer clubs around the Federal Way area.

However, some do play in the Washington State Association League, the loop designed for the select teams.

When the house leagues swing into full action, there will be 210 teams from the Federal Way area, Mike Keim said. And when that number is multiplied by the membership of each team, which varies from 15 to 18, the number of kids playing in the FWSA comes out to somewhere between 3,150 and 3,780.

Last year several teams from the Federal Way area fared rather well in post-season play outside of Federal Way.

The Totem Force, the boys' under 12 team, captured the State Championship in its division. This year, the force has nucleus off last year's team and are a select team.

Other state champions from last year were as follows: the Hot Socks, the girls under 9 team; the Totem Wolfpack, the boys under 11 team

and the Levitt Sockeyes, the boys under 10 team.

The post-season tournament available to the Federal Way league teams is the John Campbell Tournament, which starts in January. It determines the champions from Federal Way.

Also beginning in January is an open competition tournament, which is available to any team. The winner of that tournament qualifies to the Regionals, which are usually held in Las Vegas, Nev.

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The Washington Huskies: bowl-bound in 1979

There are plenty of Washington Huskies around who remember 1977. That should be enough to insure that 1979 does not look much like

1978. Oh, yes, 1977. In that heady year, the Huskies went 6-1 over the final portion of their Pacific-Eight football schedule to

claim the conference crown. And then came the daring 27-20 win over the heavily-favored Michigan Wolverines in the Rose Bowl.

A portent of things to come? Maybe, but not in the immediately following season. A largely veteran Husky crew played puzzlingly inconsistent football and finished with a 7-4 record. No bowl bids were forthcoming in 1978.

But this year, the attitude is reportedly different in the Husky camp. Players have worked in the off-season to reach peak condition, and the talk is again of roses.

To get to the Rose Bowl again, the Huskies will likely have to knock off USC, which has as talented a team as any in the nation. Short of that goal, there are other

bowls, and an attractive record at season's end will likely garner an invitation.

The reason for optimism in Seattle is not simply because of a new, tough attitude. The Huskies have the talent to back up any talk.

On the target end of Porras' passes will be Ron Blacken (5-10, 188) at split end and Keith Richardson (5-10, 186).

A since-changed rule that allowed freshmen that did not play in that year to receive an extra year of eligibility will greatly benefit the Huskies' offensive line. At guard, both 1978 starters return:

Dan Chavira (6-2, 238) and Phil Foreman (6-2, 245) Joe Sanford (6-5, 275) and Randy Van Divier (6-5, 268) are the tackles, giving the up front men both size and experience.

Tight end, a gaping hole since the graduation of David Greenwood, will be filled by David Bayle (6-4, 221), a transfer from Pasadena City College.

THE DEFENSE will be keyed by a superior defensive line. Doug Martin (6-4, 246) is being hailed as one of the best linemen in the country, and he enjoys an outstanding year if he fully recovers from off-season knee surgery.

Chris Linnin (6-4, 243) is an unheralded but integral part of the Husky defensive line. Stafford Mays (6-2, 233) returns at nose guard after an injury in 1978.

The linebackers are led by two-year letterman Bruce Harrell (5-11, 220). He will be joined by Bret Gagliardi (6-4, 220) of Glacier High School, Antowaine Richardson (6-1, 193), and Jerry McLain (6-3, 218).

Lance Theoudele (5-11, 186), a three-year letterman at cornerback, returns for his fifth year after being granted a retroactive redshirt year. Mark Lee (6-0, 185) will be at the other corner. At safeties, the Huskies will go with Greg

Grimes (6-0, 192) and Derek Harvey (4-11, 195).

Punting, a severe weakness last season, will be capably manned by transfer Rich Camarillo. Mike Lansford hit on 13 of 22 field goal attempts last season and 33 of 33 point-after-touchdowns, so placekicking is very solid.

All in all, the Huskies are talented, deep and ready.

Coach James is a proven winner. What it should all add up to is a bowl year.

Those roses sure did look nice on the Huskies' uniform jerseys, didn't they? The Huskies who remember 1977 would certainly agree.

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Change in trout limits

The State Game Commission has adopted a change which will lower the state trout catch and possession limit from 12 to 8 fish-per-day.

The new limit will begin with the 1980 season. The weight limit will remain the same at six pounds and one fish, not to exceed eight fish.

In addition, the juvenile limit has been reduced from eight to five fish-per-day, with the weight limit remaining at four pounds and one fish. The commission also decided to impose a two-fish catch limit on cutthroat trout in Puget Sound, Hood Canal and the Strait of Juan De Fuca, as well as the Stillaguamish River and its tributaries.

of "catch" and "possession" have been approved, with catch defined as "When a fish is brought to hand or net with the option to keep or release the fish." Possession is now officially "When a fish is retained (dead or alive) after a person has caught the fish."

Adopted in conjunction with the new definitions is the dropping of the daily catch limit on bass statewide with the possession limit only applying.

The commission approved recommended dates for the opening of the general fishing season, April 20, 1980; the summer stream and beaver pound opener, May 24; and the winter steelhead season opener, Dec. 1.
