## Child abuse: it goes on here

Eight-year-old Sean lives in
Federal Way, an area still
classified as a quiet suburban
community.
It's touched by crime, but little
crime touches the majority of its
residents. It's burgeoning
development continues, but acres
of green still stretch on both sides
of Pacific Highway South.
It's a cluster of neighborhoods,
dotted by lakes, where some
65,00 residents retire each even-
ing in their modest to ex-
travagant homes. But for Sean,
who lives behind the doors of one
of those homes, life is not as easy
as it appears.
Sean is only one of approx-
imately 15 to 18 Federal Way
children who are reported each
month as abused by their
parents. If he is the typical child,
he may have sustained beating or
neglect for years, always doing so
in silence, for fear of future
abuse.
But throughout the past decade
South King County abuse cases
have become more public
through the Department of Social
and Health Service Children's
Protective Services. That pro-
gram, dedicated to isolating and
eliminating child abuse, deals
with 85 to 100 new neglect and
abuse cases each month in
Federal Way, Auburn, Renton,
Kentand Des Moines.
BILL CAUGHEY, supervisor of
the progaram in Federal Way and
Auburn, said most of the reports
of child abuse are initiated by
neighbors and relatives of the

abused. "Helping" professions, also are required by law to report any suspected cases of abuse. The majority of those reports-
more in South King County than in surrounding areas such as Seattle - pertain to sexual abuse. Caughey said although there is no
theory as to why sexual abuse theory as to why sexual abuse

While the most common report is sexual abuse, constituting about 20 percent of the Protective Services' case load, the remain-
ing 80 percent of the calls which scan a variety of abuses usually involve children less than 12 years old. "Most of the reports deal with younger people because defenseless," Caughey said. Once a child is referred to the
Protective Service, one of the Protective Service, one of the
program's five counselors will program's five counselors will
confront the problem, either by talking to the child, the parents or both. Often, Caughey said, the
child will be taken from the home child will be taken from the home
until the parents can cool down until the parents can
from the confrontation.
"If a child has been abused, the parent may perceive the child as the cause of being confronted by
the law. His anger may cause fur
ther abuse," he said.
PARENTS, WHO may or may not have to appear in court depen-
ding upon the severity of the ding upon the severity of the case,
are assigned a mandatory counseling program. The case is not closed until the Protective Service counselor is convinced
that risk to the child is reduced, Caughey said.
Once a parent has finished counseling, there is a very low reoccurance rate, he said,
although some do need additional help in coping. Often failure in coping with
everyday life is just whe everyday life is just what causes
the abuse. Caughey cited condi-
tions such as stress and isolation as reasons parents may hurt their

specific services causes it to be less effective than he would like. The program now is associated

But Caughey is the first to ad mit that things have notably improved throughout the past two decades. "In the early 60s, the
most complaints were about neglect. No one recognized the abuse," he said. "Now abuse and

For the 15 to 18 Federal Wa children who are reported each month, that's good news. For "We need more services to b really effective," he said. "It's the only way to deal with the pro blem."
