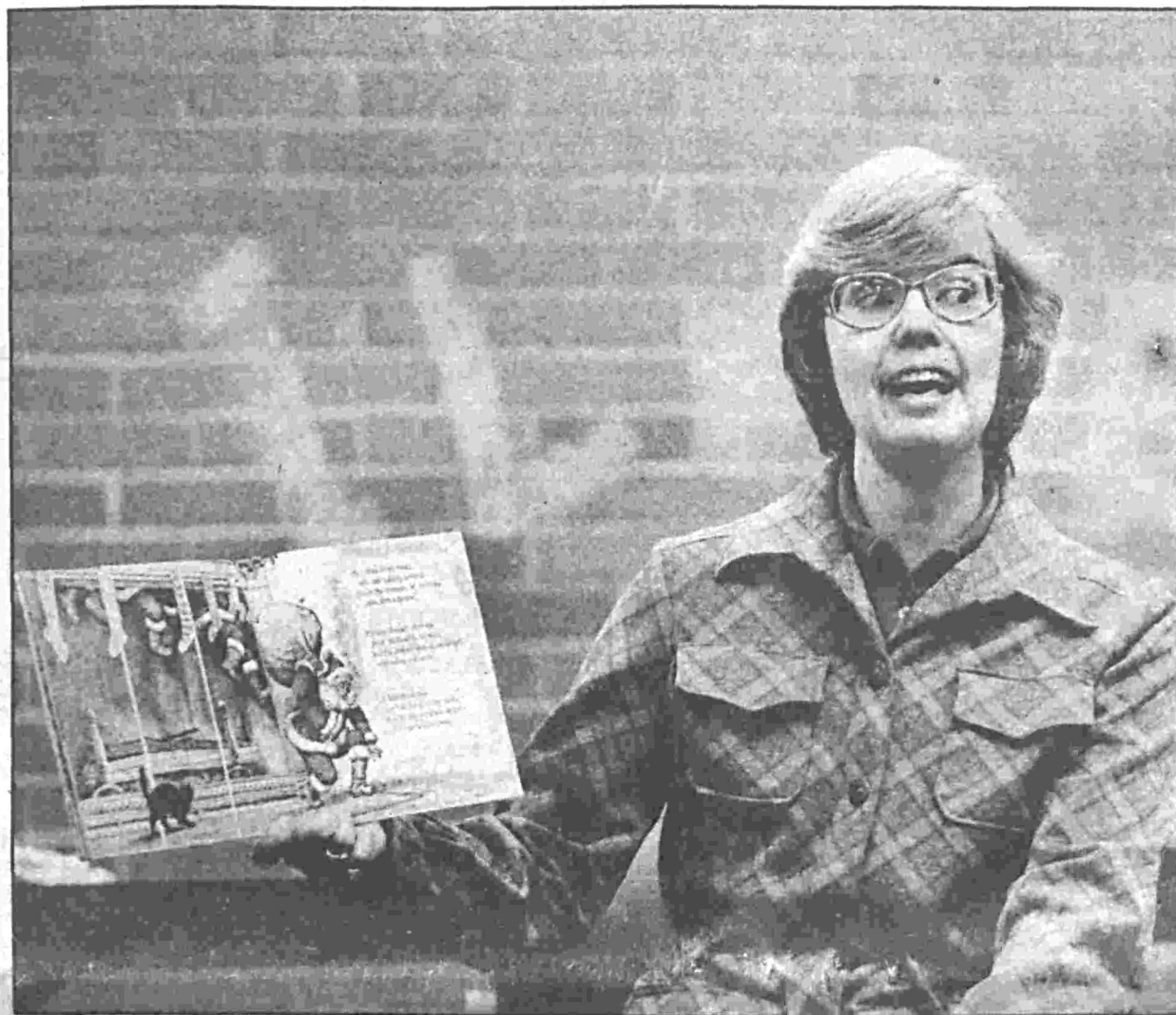

FW cityhood vote unlikely until fall

King County officials have once again changed the tentative date of the Federal Way incorporation election, and local cityhood advocates are anything but pleased.

"Originally the county was telling us we could expect a vote in the spring or summer of 1980," said Bob Stead, one of two co-chairmen of the pro-incorporation Federal Way City Committee. "But now they say it's not likely to be scheduled until

next November's general election."

Stead said the county has to comply with a number of complicated legal requirements and that he and his colleagues understand the problem.

"But sometimes the difficulty of obtaining an election seems to be deliberately designed to thwart any incorporation anywhere," he said.

Word of the revised date, and of a new timetable for the whole incorporation process, came in mid-

week from Brice Martin, the executive secretary of the King County Boundary Review Board.

THE BOARD is an appointed body that normally passes judgement on proposals to change city limits anywhere in the county, whether they are to be voted on or not.

But it also has jurisdiction over efforts to create new cities. It will conduct public hearings on the 1,743-signature incorporation petition filed by the city committee last summer.

The election date will be determined by when the hearings are concluded. But before the sessions can begin, the county must complete a study on the potential effects of cityhood — including its probable impact on taxpayers' pocketbooks.

Martin said county officials are moving as fast as they can.

He said it would be April before hearings begin. The first hearings, he said, will focus on the findings of the study, with later sessions devoted to discussing the ci-

ty limits proposed in the incorporation petition.

THE PETITION calls for formation of a city of about 59,300 persons that would occupy most of the land within the Federal Way School District.

It's northern boundary would be South 255th Street, its western boundary Puget Sound, and its southern boundary the Pierce County line.

The eastern city limits would include the boundaries of Kent, Auburn, Algona and Pacific,

omitting a small unincorporated area in the vicinity of Lake Fenwick.

While the review board can vote to change the proposed city limits, it cannot revise other portions of the incorporation measure. These call for the city to be governed by a manager and a council, and for it to be named Federal Way.

Incorporation advocates had originally been hoping for an election last fall.

Relief, but no bucks, planned for highway flooding here

Those motorists who suffered soggy brakes or were late for an appointment last week because of the flooding on Pacific Highway South next to SeaTac Mall may be consoled in that the government is drafting a solution to the drainage problem there.

But don't expect miracles. It could be a year before the project to keep heavy rain from building up on the highway will even be initiated, King County Public Works reports.

So far, all that's been determined is that there is a problem with drainage on Pacific Highway South between South 320th and 326th streets. A solution also has been devised, but there's one lit-

tle catch: there's no federal, state or county monies available for the project.

It's a problem with a \$3 million solution, Larry Gibbons, south section supervisor for county hydraulics, said Wednesday, a price tag that he described as a "very high cost."

THE PROBLEM with the highly-developed stretch of Pacific Highway is that the drainage system that presently serves the area was constructed for more land and less concrete. As more concrete is poured over the remaining earth, more rain runs off instead of soaking into the ground, creating pools of water on the street.

That street was closed at least

three times in the last week as water runoff levels reached a foot on the highway, creating a hazard to motorists.

Public works, which is working with the State Department of Transportation to solve the problem, said studies completed last June of the drainage system indicated that the best solution will be to increase the size of the culverts serving the area. An additional retention pond also is being considered near South 348th Street to hold the water until it is piped about a mile south into the Hylebos Creek, Gibbons said.

THE MAJOR item now is how to fund the project. Since no government funds are available, Gibbons suggested the project be

funded through a Local Improvement District (LID) that would require property owners adjacent to Pacific Highway pay for the improvements.

"The dollars just are not available now and I don't know of any that are coming up later," he said. "A LID is the only way I can see."

For now nothing will be done until the county completes a similar project in Kirkland's Juanita district. "We intend to benefit in how to conduct such a project by doing this one first. It's better than dealing with two identical problems at the same time," Gibbons said.

The Juanita project is tentatively scheduled for completion in about a year.

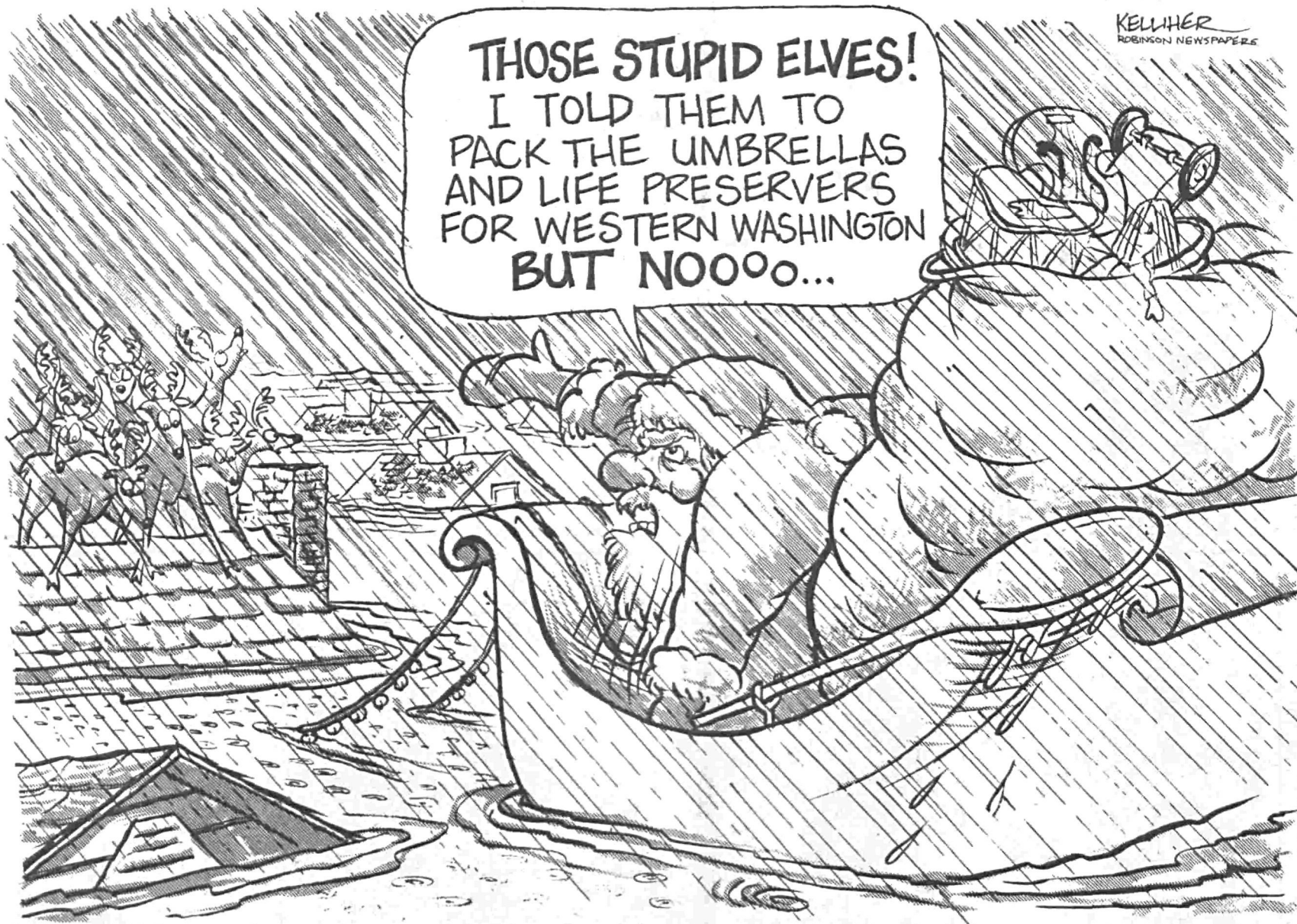

"Though I'm known for my giving, since that's my desire, you boys are forgetting I'm the world's oldest flier."

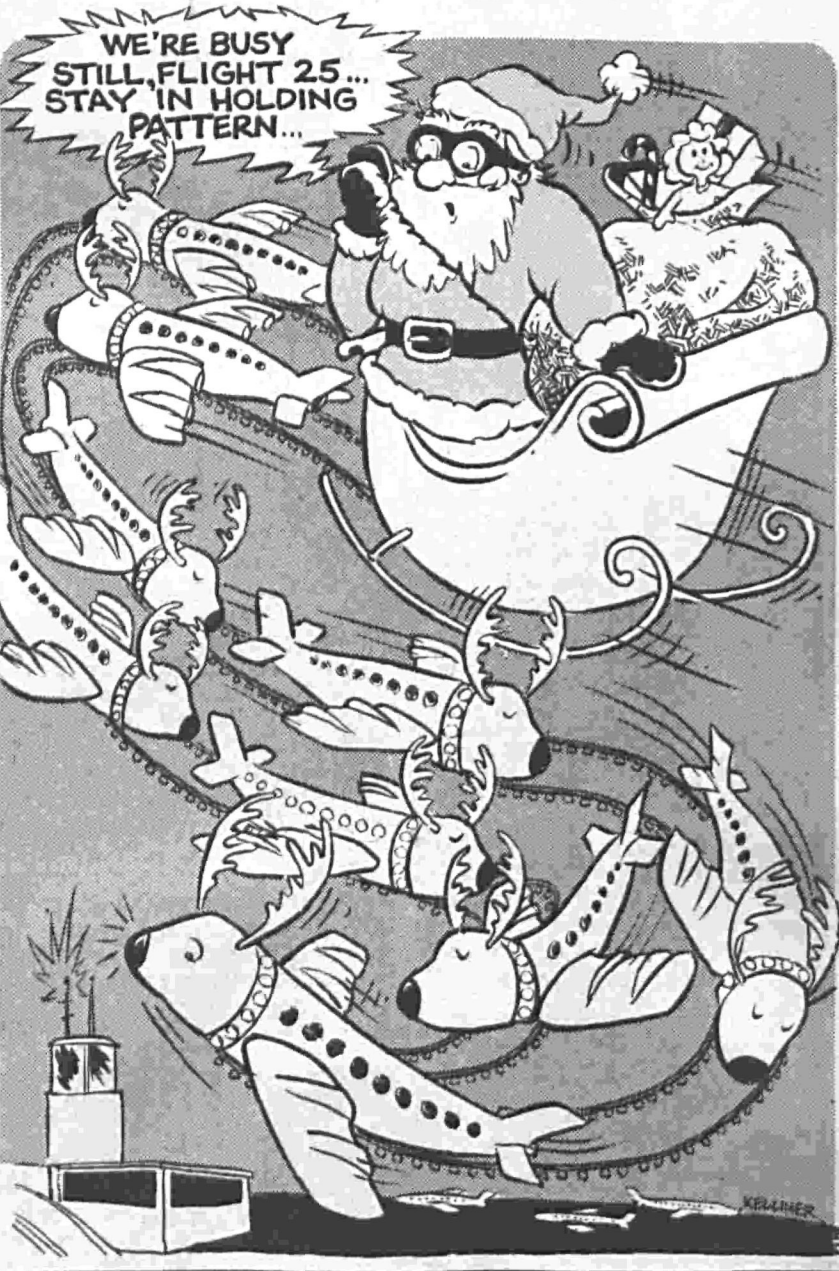
Without one more word he turned to his work. He filled up his sleigh then turned with a jerk.

Homeowner doesn't want developer to put him under water

When 80 acres of wooded land in Federal Way's Meredith Hills was proposed for the site of a housing project two years ago, residents warned that one of the repercussions would be flooding during heavy rains if Hillis Hills, the project's

developer, did not take adequate measures to ensure drainage.

This week that fear became a reality as a deluge of water and mud swamped a one-acre tract belonging to Leroy Westerlund, a resident who for 22 years has owned five acres of property that now border the Hillis Hills development on

South 296th Street just east of 51st Avenue South.

The mud and silt, which began settling on Westerlund's pasture during last week's rains, washed from the land across the street. Much of that land lies bare, already cleared for construction of the housing project that has not even received

final approval from King County. **WHILE LARRY HILLIS**, owner of the develop-

ing company Hillis Hills, refused to comment on the situation, Westerlund said there is "no doubt whatsoever" that the two-and-one-half-foot flood in his backyard is the result of the development across the street.

"There's always been a little drainage problem here, but never to this extent," Westerlund said. "When it rained before the water was crystal clear, now it's full of mud."

The problem appears to revolve around a drainage ditch that runs close to Westerlund's property. Westerlund said the ditch needs cleaning, but that it's the developer's responsibility to flush the drain since he bladed the land, causing the mud to slide.

King County officials who have been investigating the pro-

blem say there is more involved than just cleaning a ditch. According to the county Ombudsman's office, the land holding the ditch is recorded with the county as an easement, but whether the land is privately or publicly owned is not clear.

Responsibility for the ditch will rest with whomever is determined to own the land. It is evident that the owner is not Hillis Hills, but both the Ombudsman's office and Larry Gibbons of the county public works department are con-

cerned about possible violation of drainage agreements between Hillis Hills and the county.

"We're certainly going to look into it," Gibbons said.

Meanwhile, Westerlund said Hillis Hills representatives visited his property earlier this week, suggesting that possibly a larger culvert at a lower angle could divert the drainage problem. Owner Hillis said he was not aware of the meeting.

So Westerlund will have to wait for some action. But if he waits

FW school board's invocation described as 'unique'

by Cathy Stone
Opening a school board meeting with the pledge of allegiance is a fairly common practice in school districts throughout the state. Following that pledge with an invocation or prayer is not.

The Federal Way School Board regularly includes an invocation in its proceedings. Whether that practice violates the laws governing the separation of state and church is anybody's guess, according to spokesmen from two state legal offices.

Richard Montecucco, head of the education division, state attorney general's office, said he just didn't know if it was legal.

"The legislature starts each session with an invocation. The supreme court does the same," he said. "If it affected the students in the education process, it would definitely be a problem. It is certainly different and unique for a common school board to do."

Dr. Perry Keithley of the legal office in the superintendent of public instruction's office agreed it's somewhat unusual.

Keithley said he knew of only a couple school boards who say an invocation in their meeting. While he wouldn't tell them to stop, he said, he also would not advise anybody else to start doing it.

The district's attorney, Bill Coats, said he didn't know the answer either.

"The cases I've read were in the classroom, not in a school board meeting."

And like the other two legal experts, he said, "it's just never come up before."

The Federal Way School Board hasn't always included an invocation on their agenda. The practice started about six years ago, according to Jim Rowlands, coordinator of administrative services.

"It was probably an agreement of all the board members at that time," he said. "Like a lot of things, it got on the agenda and it's never been reviewed since."

Both Rowlands and superintendent Milton Snyder said they expect the agenda will be reviewed after the first of the year.

Snyder expects an agenda restructuring and policy development, he said, which will include a review of the invocation's inclusion along with everything else.

When that agenda is reviewed, the board could delete the invocation, but, said board president John Hickman, they've received no com-

plaints so far. "I guess it's kind of like the legislature opening their session with an invocation,"

he said. "It doesn't espouse any particular religious belief. I suppose to omit it wouldn't make

any difference." Hickman said the board says an invocation "simply because it's been done in past

years." But, he notes, "if there are people in the community who are offended by it, the

board would have no reservations in omitting it." The Federal Way School Board is the

only school district governing body in the area which opens its meeting with an invocation. Among

those who don't are But then, those the Highline, Auburn, districts haven't Kent, Renton, Seattle, repeatedly lost levy Fife and Tacoma elections like Federal Wave either.

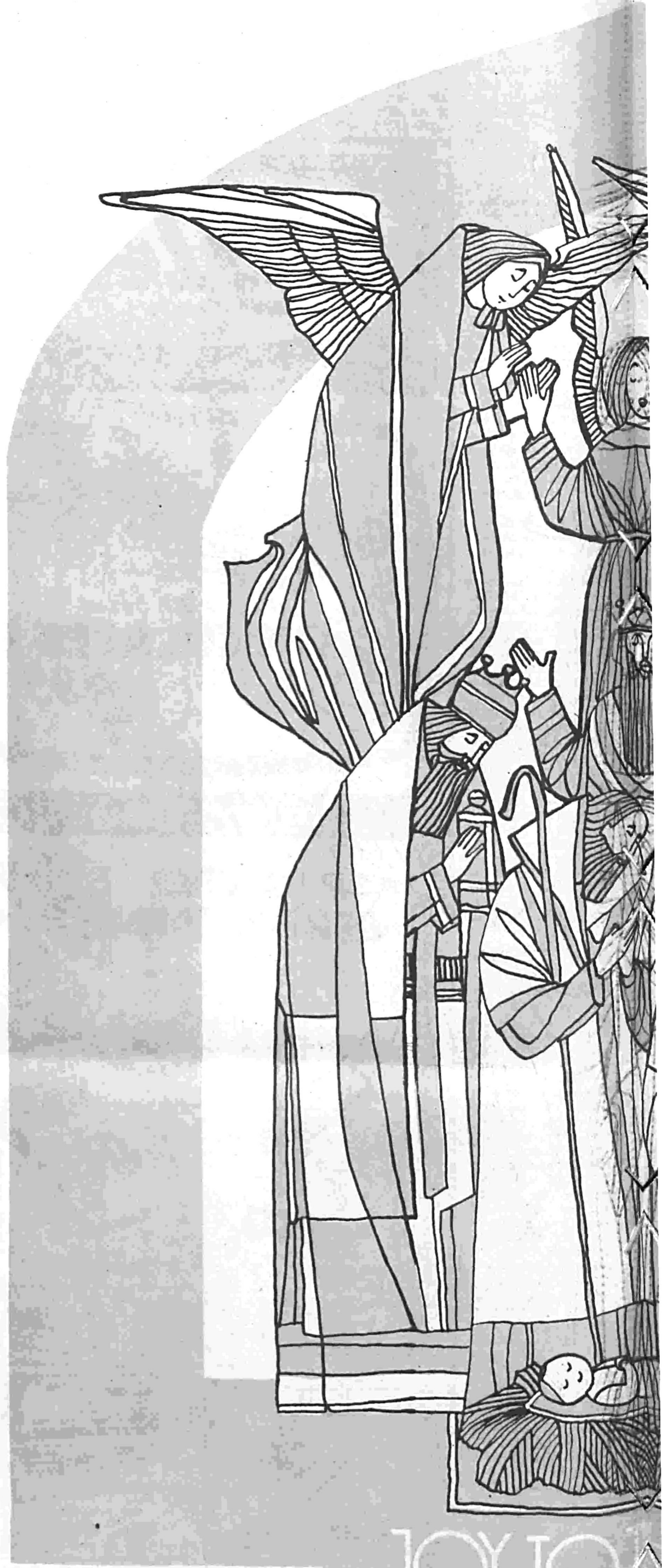

Activity and sharing, tools for depression

For most people, the Christmas holiday is a time of joyful sharing, fellowship and laughter.

Friends, who haven't seen one another in years, make it a point to reach out and say hello, either by letter or in person. Neighbors, who often see little of each other throughout the year, mingle socially for a taste of fruitcake, grogg and friendly conversation.

Extended families plan to share Christmas day together. Babies, youth, parents and grandparents mingle in a special feeling of closeness.

But, for some, Christmas means loneliness, despair, and shattered illusions. "People expect to be in a situation of great joy and excitement," said Dorothy Swanberg, clinical director of Valley City Mental Health that services Federal Way, Auburn, Renton and Kent. "When they don't find themselves in that situation, they are often depressed."

Clinics that handle mental depressions, report that the hardest problems for people to face usually concern divorce, death, financial set-back or separation from their spouse.

More often than not, the clients are women who have no family and no one to share their concerns with.

If they have children, they are faced with the responsibilities of buying gifts, often with reduced income and providing a semblance of holiday cheer.

CHILDHOOD MEMORIES often trigger depressions, said Michele Pomorico, a clinical social worker for Valley City Mental Health in Auburn. "Either they are all good and in contrast, their present situation is bad or they stir horrible memories of fights, deaths, or other traumatic situations."

Rich Sorrensen, coordinator of advocacy group, Mental Health Association that is based at the Multi-Service Center in Federal Way said that many newcomers are away from their families and are unused to the climate. "They have a feeling of incompleteness," he said. "The Christmas atmosphere is missing, triggering depression."

Joan Anderson, marriage — family counselor for a Lutheran counselling service (LIFE) that operates from Calvary Lutheran Church summed it up in a nutshell when she said they have "nothing to look forward to and their future doesn't look bright either."

Counselors agree that the answer is for people seek help and talk and talk out their problems and become involved with others.

Clinical director Swanberg suggests that people can eliminate many of the needless pressures "by taking a look at their activities and outlining what they can't give up." They should organize their time so that their tasks may be accomplished with the least amount of pressure.

If they are still unable to cope, they should seek professional help. Though friends are important, she said they are not always the best sounding boards for advice. An impartial, trained person can often be more helpful, she said.

LIFE counselor, Anderson recommends that people become involved with others by signing up for classes, becoming involved in their church, or taking part in a sport.

"It's difficult for people to be depressed when they are involved in a physical activity," she said. She suggests that people who have recreation facilities at their place of employment, take advantage of it.

She also proposes that people do things for others by visiting shut-ins, or becoming involved in volunteering with children.

But, Norman Nelson, pastor of Calvary Lutheran Church, said there would be less problem if people would be more aware of loneliness in others. "Depression comes from a feeling that nobody cares," he said.

"One of the blessings and one of the problems of Christmas is that it is always geared to the family. If you've got one, you're okay. But, people should be sympathetic to those who are divorced or separated even if those people don't outwardly express it."

"A show of love and genuine kindness to one another can help those who need it," said Nelson.

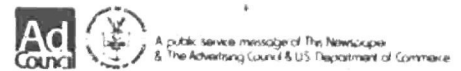

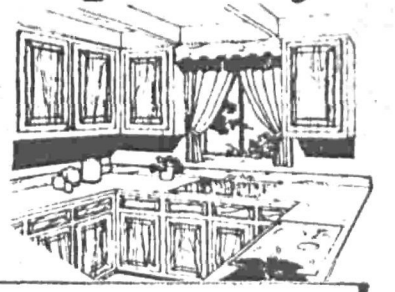

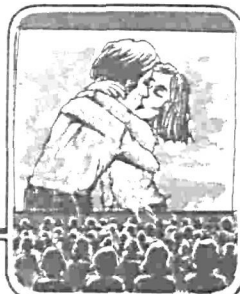


Christmas reflections

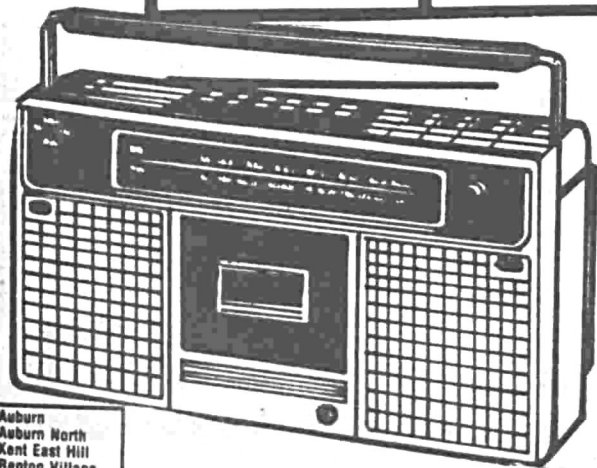

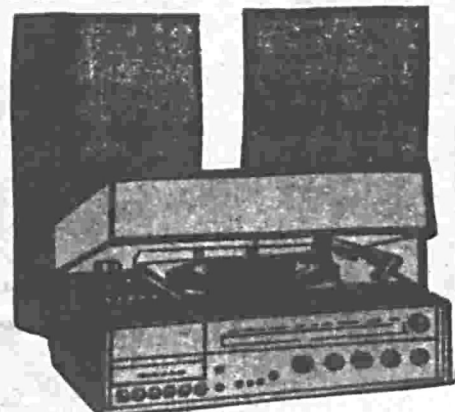

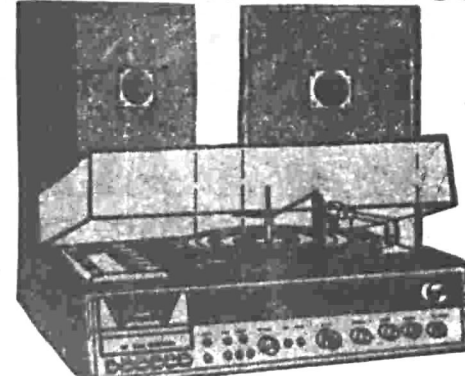

Medical student heads for Honduras clinic



John Kaschko

Working in the hot and humid climate of Honduras among the Miskito Indians and living in huts built on stilts will be a far cry from picking the bones of medical text books while researching cardiology at Harborview Hospital. But, John Kaschko, 25, a University of Washington School of Medicine senior, will be doing just that. He will leave in January to spend three months working among the primitive natives of Central America.

"When you're a medical student, there's always someone else who's responsible," said Kaschko who spent nine years growing up in Federal Way schools. "It's no big deal if you don't get everything done. Somebody else will do it." Down there, he said

he will be able to get practical experience in a field that's taken him almost eight years to master. The 1980 graduate will get a head start on his two favorite occupations, working with people and working with science.

He received a \$500 grant from a Reader's Digest sponsored Mission Assistance Program. The Illinois-based program provides funds for medical personnel to be used in third World countries. They pay three-fourths of the air flight. The balance has been donated by a friend Jack Talley, a former Federal Way resident who now lives in Beaverton, Ore.

KASCHKO, son of Harold and Marie Kaschko of 1215 S.W. 296th, will join Dr. Sam and Grace Marx, a middle-aged couple who operate 12-bed the Evangelica Morana Clinic, 25 miles from the coast on the gulf side of Honduras in Ahuas.

Honduras is a small country, sandwiched between Guatemala and Nicaragua on a narrow strip of land that joins Mexico and South America.

Kaschko said he expects to spend one month in the clinic giving shots, working with minor surgeries, infections and abscesses and two months at neighbor-

ing villages working on his own.

The people, descendants of shipwrecked Jamaican slaves who have intermarried into the Indian population, speak a simplified version of Spanish and English. There are few tenses and word forms, but what words they do have, they use often.

Though Kaschko said he has had several years of French, he expects communicating will be difficult. To ease that situation, he's been drilling himself with Spanish foreign service tapes for two hours a week since September.

"They tell me you can pick the language up quick if you have to," said Kaschko in reference to doctors who have previously visited the mission.

Though he admits that medical terms may be a problem.

However, translators are available at the clinic. Indians have been trained to assist with medically-oriented duties wherever possible.

Kaschko said the Indians, who are virtually ignored by their government have very few social services and limited education. A person with a sixth-grade education there would be comparable to one with a high school education in the United States. The few schools that have been erected within the last few years, have been done so through programs such as the Peace Corp and C.A.R.E.

BECAUSE OF THE PRIMITIVE living

conditions, Kaschko said he is packing light. He's taking warm weather clothing, sandals and shorts; a satchel of his favorite pieces of medical equipment; and spiral notebooks that stress practical medical application instead of "disease processes."

Except for the purchase of gifts to bring home, he said he'll have little use for money. His lodging and food will be provided by the clinic.

Kaschko will also be taking along his trusty guitar, an instrument he's played for eight years. Involved as a youth in the Christian-based Young Life group, Kaschko said he "hopes to pitch in with music" at the

mission services. While living in Federal Way, Kaschko attended services at Steel Lake Presbyterian. He has been associated with the University Presbyterian since

moving to Seattle. He said he also expects to put some of his other to work. He's an skills car buff; worked summers in plumbing antique and building; spent time in Canada drilling

wells and has driven trucks. "I expect it will all come in handy," said Kaschko. "I'll probably be doing as much of that as I will be practicing medicine."

Also for children are the Collectibles, 10 imported dolls. Largest of the group is twenty six and one-half inch Carmen. Her dress and matching hat are silver-gray polyester with nylon lace trim. The light-brown hair is arranged with tendrils falling over her shoulders. The price: about \$50. (The other Collectibles range from about \$13 to \$40.)

For bigger children and grown-up hobbyists there are miniature house kits made of wood. They're precision scaled: one inch equals one foot. The five authentic designs

are Cape Cod, colonial, farm house, Mt. Vernon and Victorian. All have clapboard siding, removable floors and room dividers. Prices range from about \$40 to \$140. Sorry, no condominiums yet.

The Wish Book offers the Fantom Four Hover Craft, which flies on its own cushion of air. For more power the plastic toy is flown into the space station for a recharge of its battery-operated motor. It's about \$16. The Sportavia, an electric radio-controlled airplane, is a higher flier. It soars on a battery charge and its 70-inch wing span keeps it aloft for gliding. A two-channel radio controls both rudder and elevator to allow tricky maneuvers. Ready-to-fly, Sportavia's made of molded polystyrene foam and plastic with factory-decorated finish.

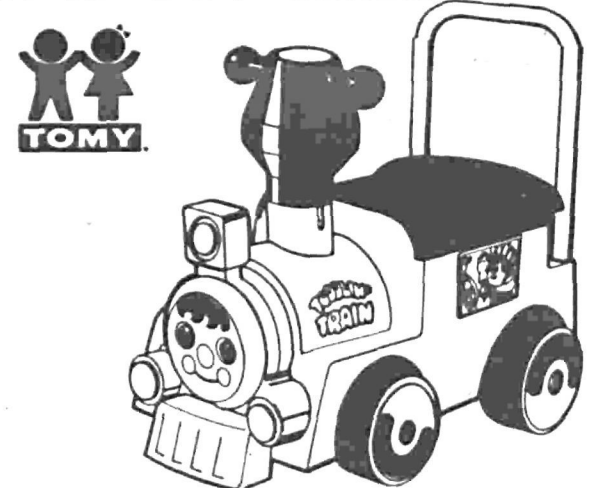

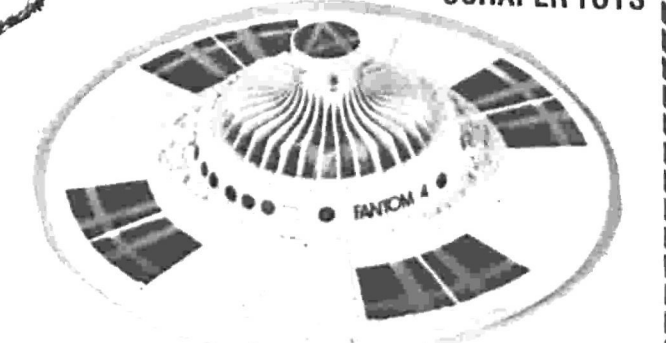

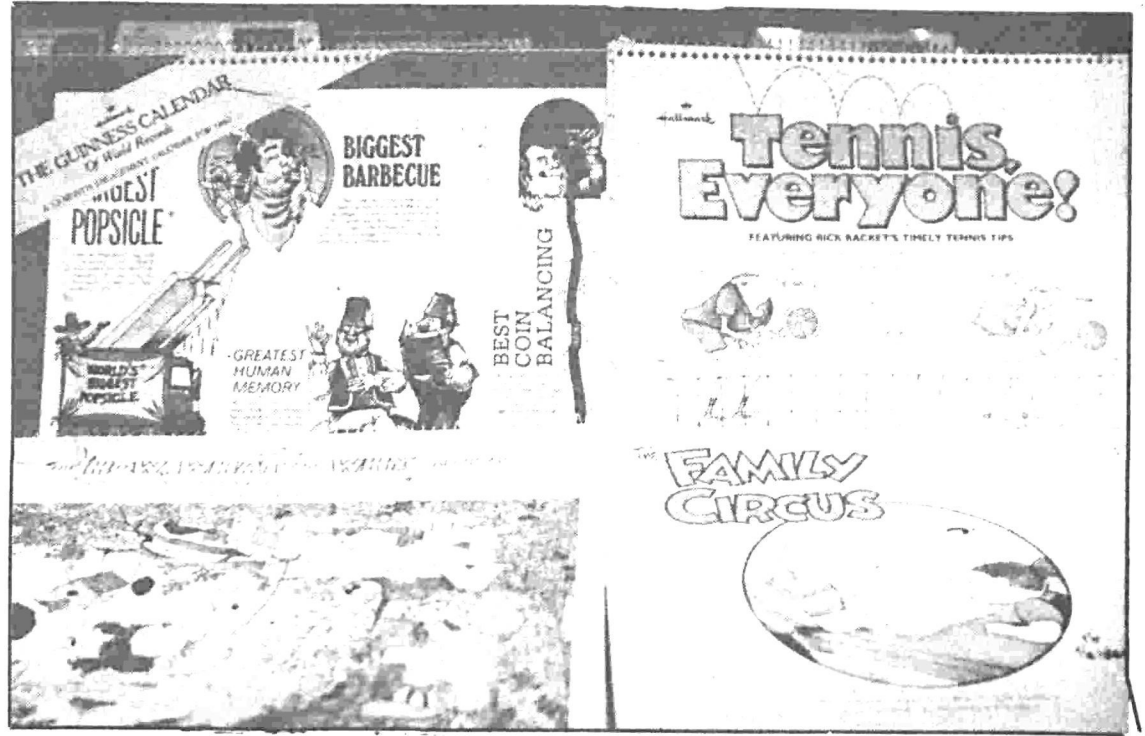
The engagement books provide space for writing notes, guests lists, address and a variety of other important information.

An inexpensive gift, but one that will last a year or more, calendars range in price from \$2.50 to \$7 Ms. Sherman said.

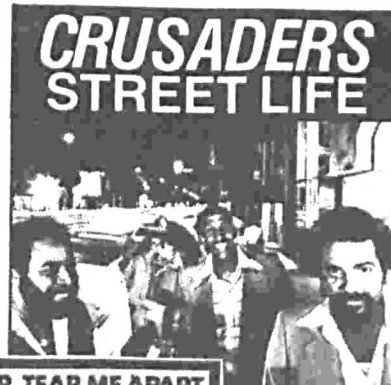

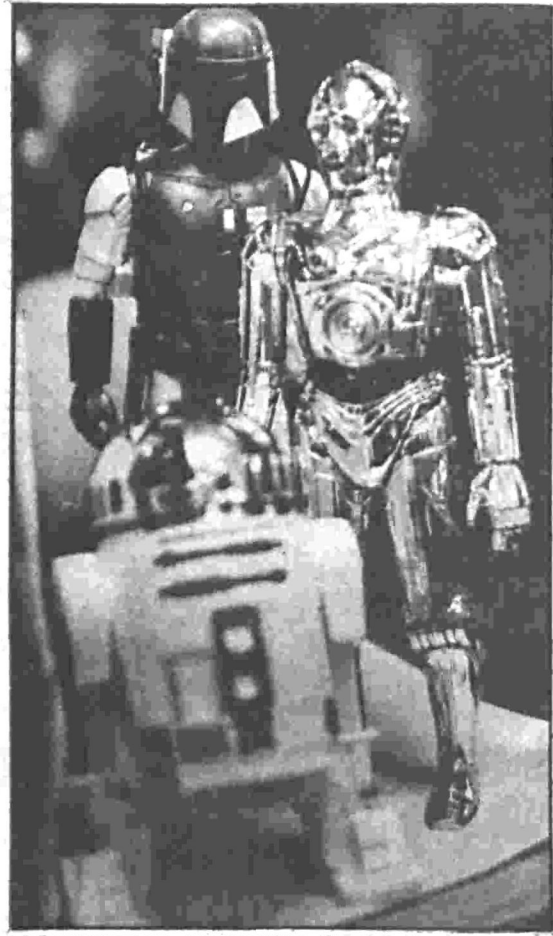
Traditional toys have lost some ground with the children, Ms. Mauser notes that half of the sales of the exquisite dolls are sold to the parents. Many

Locals are pumped up about Christmas gifts

Sports enthusiasts may have trouble lifting their packages from beneath the tree Christmas morning, as area sporting goods dealers report pumped-up sales of weights and exercise equipment for the holidays.

Scott's Athletic Supply of Federal Way, Fred Meyer and the Sea-Tac Mall Bon Marche and Sears stores are having trouble cleaning and jerking training gear onto the shelves fast enough for physically-minded shoppers. Americans now want to be as fit as the endless stream of athletes

who run across the television screen this time of year.

"People really want to get into shape, and most of them need to," said Gail Ahlquist of the Bon Marche sporting goods department. "The weight tables, we can't get enough of them; we've sold all of them, and I don't know

if we'll have another shipment in before Christmas."

The rising popularity of weight training cannot be confined to the macho populace.

"I'm selling weights to women, too," Ahlquist said. "We sell the little 'smartbells' to them."

The story sounds much the same from store to store. Roller-skates, racquetball equipment, backgammon boards and the usual array of basketballs and soccer balls are still being given by dozens of Santa Clause imposters, but more people will hear the barbells on Christmas day.

"SEEMS LIKE more people are into weight training this year," said Kathy Greer of the Sea-Tac Mall Sears. "Gosh, we've practically sold out of everything; people are really building up the old muscles."

Jim Jones of Scott's Athletic Supply in Federal Way is also working up a sweat to supply training equipment to customers seeking the perfect gift for their athletic or out-of-shape friends and relatives.

"All of the exercise stuff is selling well. We've sold out of a lot of the boxing equipment," Jones said. "The weight lifting equipment is still selling; it sells good all year and it still sells at Christmas."

Gym bags with logos from local high schools and junior highs are big sellers for Jones, and posters and pennants will hang from the chimney with care as stocking stuffers. The Scott's salesman has even catered to a few parents blessed with the foresight to invest in baseball mitts which carry a lower price tag as reindeer prance and rain floods the diamonds.

As Santa approaches, however, it is the sale of fitness gear that is keeping Scott's and other sporting centers jolly and in fine

financial shape.

"We're selling a lot of jogging suits and shorts, too," Jones said. "It's just a trend; so many people are getting into the fitness scene. The health clubs are emphasizing lifting weights and getting into shape."

"The exercise equipment, weight sets and so forth are selling better than last year," said a salesperson from Fred Meyer in Midway, another store whose sports department is experiencing healthy sales in fitness training gear. "The kids and teenagers are into weightlifting; it's football season, and the players are saying how they built up with weights."

AMERICANS, particularly the Northwest variety, head for the hills (including the large one called Mt. Rainier) for the exercise of hiking, and Fred Meyer is also doing well in moving outdoor equipment for hiking and camping fanatics. But what about the more traditional basketball and the beloved pigskin. Are they to roll out from beneath the tree.

"Basketballs are good, footballs are fair," said the Fred Meyer representative on the sale of those bouncing presents. Yes, the elves are still making a few of the traditional yuletide sporting gifts, including the ski equipment which will hit the slopes shortly after Christmas.

"Ski equipment is selling good; in fact, I think it's selling better than last year," said Cindy Simpson of Sportswest. "Moon boots," rubberized footwear designed to be worn after skiing, are doing exceptionally well in the Christmas rush.

Backgammon sets and racquetball equipment are enjoying popularity amongst Sportswest's stock also. "I'd say the sales of racquetball equipment and backgammon sets is up 40 percent from last year," Simpson

said. Still, with all of the other sales, Sportswest is being pressed like the rest when it comes to weight training devices.

"They're selling better than ever; the 110-lb. steel weightlifting sets are doing the best. The inclining lift benches are selling well; we have to special order a lot of them," Simpson said.

One dealer not concerned with the current trend towards physical fitness is Alix's Sporting Goods in Des Moines. The store caters to the hunters and fishermen who may snare Christmas dinner from the wilds.

"There's somewhat of a decline in gun sales. The black-powder line, including muskets and guns that use black powder, are selling basically about the same as last year," Carola Alix said. Unlike Simpson from Sportswest, Alix believes that people are not spending as much this year, preferring to buy smaller gifts.

"PEOPLE WHO do have someone who is a hunter or a fisherman in the family and don't know what they want buy shooting accessories, gun cases and ammunition, rather than buying a rifle or something," Alix said.

So there will be those among us who get a bang out of Christmas rather than working up a lather pumping weights. Then, of course, there are those who will do nothing more strenuous than moving a joy stick and watching electronic blips skate across the T.V. screen. Video games are selling at a rapid rate, and will run interference for the blizzard of televised bowl games.

The sporting theme of Christmas 1979, however, is turn down the T.V. and tone up the muscles. So, "Deck the halls with beads of sweat, falalalala la la la lift!"

At this rate, Santa may trade his bowl full of jelly for balloning biceps.



Jefferson stands tall in 72-59 win over Decatur's boy cagers

Height is an element of basketball that can counteract other deficiencies, and the Jefferson Raiders used their size superiority to overpower the Decatur Gators 72-59 Tuesday in the sparsely attended Decatur gym.

Dave Christensen, a 6-5 senior forward, and Tony Frazier, a 6-9 junior, controlled inside play throughout the contest and scored 19 and 14 points respectively. Most of those points were produced by lob passes for shots in the five-foot range and offensive-rebound putbacks against the

Gator's smallish front-court personnel.

Christensen and Frazier had an easy time canning unmolested shots against the tallest Gators, 6-1 Keith Bragg and 6-1 Rich Price.

"HEIGHT DEFINITELY made the difference," a surprisingly downcast Ed Erickson, the Raider coach, muttered after his team's second win in a row. "I'm not satisfied. Our big men certainly should have had a bigger field day than they did, and we didn't do a very good job of shutting them down inside."

The game's final stats proved Erickson's point. Bragg, who was

far quicker than the taller Raiders, hit a game-high 25 points and Price bagged 10 mostly from inside the key area. Their combined point production matched that of Christensen and Frazier.

"I really didn't have any trouble moving around them," Bragg said. "They were big but they couldn't move side-to-side very well. I really think we should have beaten them, but we have them again (Jan. 29)."

Rebounding was where the Raiders dwarfed the Gators. Jefferson out-boarded Decatur 34-23. Christensen snagged a game-high

12 caroms.

JAY GARD turned many of those deflections into buckets at the other end of the court. With an accurate outside shooting touch, the junior guard consistently sank jumpers and led Jefferson scorers with 20 points.

Decatur coach Carl Buchholz, who saw his club drop its fourth South Puget Sound League game in as many tries, praised the Gator effort.

"We showed a 200 percent improvement over our last game 95-35 drubbing by Puyallup last Friday," he noted. "We had trouble giving the ball away (19 tur-

novers) and didn't deal with their size in the right way.

"But the guys never quit. The problem was that we hit one cold spell and couldn't get back close enough after that."

The cold spell from the Decatur standpoint was a three-minute, 21-second period, which began late in the first quarter and stretched into the second. During that time, Jefferson scored 15 unanswered points to hold a 25-8 lead at 7:37 of the second period. Gard hit three field goals and Christensen had 5 points during the blitz. Decatur could only manage to narrow its deficit to 8

the rest of the way.

Both clubs hit the road tonight. Jefferson, 2-2 in the SPSL, meets winless Summer. Decatur will look for its first win at Lakes. Both games begin at 8 p.m.

3rd straight win FW boys dump Curtis cagers

Whether the best South Puget Sound League boys' basketball team resides in the valley or on the hill may be decided Friday night when the Puyallup Vikings travel up to the Federal Way High gym.

That is the nest where the high-flying Eagles are making life miserable for their opponents. After losing their league opener to Lakes, the Eagles have polished off three consecutive opponents. Puyallup's brand of Vikings have been even more awesome in previous outings. Puyallup hounded its league record to 4-0 Tuesday with an 83-62 victory over Sumner. The Vikings haven't been

kind to Federal Way District teams this season, having pounded Jefferson 81-35 in their league opener and Decatur 95-35 last Friday. An 82-65 victory over Lakes was sandwiched between those two.

Experience and depth are Puyallup's biggest attributes. Four front-liners saw starting duty on last season's squad, which finished sixth in the State AAA Tournament. Three other lettermen also are seeing duty this year.

In fact, Puyallup's second-year coach Jim Clifton couldn't name a starting lineup for tonight's contest.

"It could be any of eight players," he said.

Clifton wasn't being evasive; he really doesn't know who will be on the floor come tipoff time. The Viking skipper has shuffled players in all previous games. "The least number of quarters anybody has is eight," he pointed out.

Puyallup's all-senior team features a balanced attack. The Vikings can fast-break with gusto or

pick opponents apart with crisp passing for high-percentage shots.

THE VIKING backcourt is highlighted by the playmaking of Greg Hammermaster, the quickness of Morrie Bogrand and the lethal outside shooting of Ron Balmer. Underneath, Puyallup is physically dominating. The Tomal twins, Jerry and Tom, each beefs a 6-3 frame with 210 pounds.

Tim Bradbury, an All-SPSL selection last season, is a constant double-figure scorer. He stands 6-4 and weighs 215. Jerry Williams, 6-2 175, scored 24 points against Decatur, and Ken Owen, 6-3 185, adds rebounding support.

The rest of the Vikings are nearly as talented as those mentioned above.

But Federal Way coach Gary Brines isn't looking for any corners to hide in.

"We will do better against them than the rest have; we will give them a basketball game," he confidently assured. "The secret against a team like Puyallup is to get a game plan and

stick with it. If you get behind, you work your way back. If you rush it, you play right in their hands."

Brines doesn't believe Puyallup will be able to blow his squad off the court with its fastbreak, which sent past opponents reeling.

"I won't be able to do that to us," he said. "Speed is not a factor. Reacting to change of possession is the key to beating the fastbreak. If our transition goes well, we'll limit them to four or five fastbreaks."

Scott Loucks, a 6-6

senior, appeared to be the key to a bright FW basketball future at the season's start, but he injured a leg against Lakes. Other Eagles have rallied to make up for Loucks' absence. Mike Elliott, a 6-6 senior center, scored 29 and 26 points respectively in the last two games.

Butch Cratsenberg is "doing a super job" of quarterbacking the Eagle offense from the point guard spot, Brines noted. Dan Weedman is bombing opponents from the outside. Bob Turcott is pounding the

boards, and Sylvan Miller is adding outside support.

CLIFTON doesn't regard Federal Way as his team's best opponent of the young season:

"It's hard to say. We beat Lakes pretty good, and they beat Federal Way, but we haven't played anybody with Federal Way's size yet."

"I don't really figure this game is more critical than any other for either team. In this league, there's not any game more important than another."

Illegal fishermen

Two elderly fishermen have been charged with possessing overlimits of trout amounting to more than 1,200 fish, according to State Game Department wildlife agents.

The case is without precedent and said to be the "largest ever" case to be filed involving game fish, excepting steelhead. Twelve is the current possession limit for trout.

Charged were Louis Corti, 78, of Monroe, and his fishing part-

ner, Clyde Dorsten, 75, of Renton. Both men have summer cabins on upper Conolly Lake in Okanogan County.

Wildlife Agent Mel Sharp reported that he observed the pair illegally using feed to attract fish at the lake on Oct. 31. Sharp said at least 64 trout were pulled from the lake by the two while he kept them under surveillance.

Search warrants were obtained and late in November the two men were contacted at their homes by state wildlife

agents. A search by agents Jeff Boone and Bill Hebler of Corti's home turned up over 400 canned and frozen trout. Agents Terry Abrams and Bob Schafer found over 800

trout canned, frozen or smoked, at the home of Dorsten. Both men cooperated fully during the searches.

Citations were subsequently filed in King and Snohomish

counties and both men face charges of exceeding the catch limit and fish feeding on Oct. 31, as well as multiple counts of exceeding the possession limit.

Rain slows steelhead

Heavy rains throughout western Washington brought the traditional steelheader's lament as most steelheading streams reported a total wash-out. Previous heavy runoff had brought many new, bright steelhead migrants into the streams but the high, muddy conditions made them impossible to catch.

Southwest Washington streams have been the exception to the rule as they remained fishable later than streams to the north. The Cowlitz in particular provided some hot angling as 70 fishermen checked in the Castle Rock area had landed a total of 32 steelies, for a nearly 50 percent success rate.

Checks at the hatchery showed a third of the anglers there were successful.

Hendricks buckets 30 points as Ram girls beat JFK

Technically, the easiest shots in basketball are the layin and the free throw.

Mt. Rainier guard Denise Hendricks demonstrated proficiency in both shot specialties while running the Rams' girls basketball squad past Kennedy, 58-52, Tuesday night. Hendricks scored 12 of her game-high 30 points on layups and tallied eight more from the charity stripe.

"We're a quick team, and we use our speed when we have the opportunity," Ram head coach

Rusty Llewellyn said. Mt. Rainier rebounders like senior Pam Gossman keyed much of the Ram offense with long outlet passes to Hendricks and other teammates, who sprinted around and through the Lancer defense.

The Rams, with a 3-3 record, host Kentridge tonight at 7:30.

"We always have a good game with Kentridge. They should be comparable to Kennedy," Llewellyn said.

Llewellyn's team had a better game against Kennedy than the

final score indicated. Mt. Rainier never trailed in the contest, and held a 58-44 lead with under two minutes to play. Seven straight Lancer points made the score respectable.

HENDRICKS edged the Rams to a six-point lead with four free throws early in the second quarter. Kennedy kept tabs with Mt. Rainier until sophomore Robbie Singleton's fast-break score and Hendricks' short jump shot gave the Rams a 31-23 halftime margin.

Kennedy made its move early in the third quarter. Amidst a flurry of turnovers for both squads, Lancer center Becky Wetli hit a turnaround shot and Lisa Falsetto stole a Hendricks pass and scored; with 3:35 left in the quarter and Kennedy within four points, the Rams called time.

"We lost our intensity. You just need to call time out when that happens, particularly if you know that you're team is capable of playing better; it's different if

they're not capable," Llewellyn said of the situation.

Capable turned into the Rams' watchword for the rest of the game. Singleton caught a Hendricks pass and scored following the timeout. Gossman took over from there, rebounding the next two Mt. Rainier shots and converting them into four points and a 10-point Ram lead.

The fourth quarter belonged to the quickness of Hendricks, as did most of the game. The 5-6 Ram scored twice on the fast

break, pierced through the right side of the Lancer defense for two more points, and drove the lane for an eventual three-point play to conclude her effort.

"All around that was her best game, defensively and offensively," Llewellyn said of Hendricks.

Olympic Games hold pre-events

It's not too late to get tickets for the XIII Olympic Winter Games, which will be held in Lake Placid, N.Y., Feb. 12-24, 1980. But for those who can't make it to the Olympics, the Adirondack Mountain resort community has events scheduled in a variety of sports throughout the two months preceding the games.

Bobsled and luge, ice hockey and speed skating, and biathlon, cross-country, and ski jumping will all be held in Lake Placid in December, January, and early February. Tickets will be available for each, and each will offer a chance to see Olympic athletes compete on Olympic sites.

Tryouts and competitions will be held each weekend from Dec. 22 until Feb. 3. Two-man and four-man bobsled trials are set for alternate weekends, with the final four-man trials scheduled for Feb. 7 and 8.

On the luge run, Empire State races are scheduled for Dec. 21 - 23, North American championships for Jan. 11 - 13, and U.S. Olympic trials for Jan. 15 - 20.

The bobsled was built for the 1932 Olympic Games, and reconstructed and refrigerated for 1980. Alongside it at Mt. Van Hoevenberg is the new 1,000-meter luge run, which was completed last winter. In luge, the athletes lie on his back on a small sled, feet first, and steers by applying pressure to the runners. Luge was ad-

ded to the Olympic Winter Games in 1964, with men and women competing in singles and men in doubles. Lake Placid's luge run is the only one in the Western Hemisphere.

A Nordic combined 70-meter ski jump will be held on Dec. 27. On Dec. 29 - 30 tryouts for the U.S. Olympic jumping team will be held at the Intervale jumps. Seventy-meter special competitions are set for both days. A week later, Jan. 5 - 6, 90-meter jumping trials will be conducted, along with Nordic combined jumping.

Tickets for all the jumping, except the Dec. 27 Nordic combined, will be \$5 for adults, \$3 for students under 18 years of age, and free for children under 12 who are accompanied by a parent.

Prices for the Dec. 27 Nordic combined have not been determined. Tickets can be bought at the Intervale jump site the day of the events, which are sponsored by the Lake Placid Sports Council.

Cross-country skiing begins at Mt. Van Hoevenberg on Dec. 28 with men's and women's special races, and a Nordic combined event. On Dec. 30, a Nordic combined event will also be held, along with men's and women's relays. Jan. 3 - 7, United States Ski Team tryouts will be held in Nordic combined and cross-country.

In biathlon, U.S. Olympic trials are set for Jan. 12-13.

Subs super as Mt. Rainier boys upset Kennedy cagers

 You can call them benchwarmers, or you can call them subs. You can call them reserves, or you can call them scrubs.
 But you also have to call them gamewinners because Mt. Rainier High School's second stringers played key roles for the Rams during their 67-55 North Puget Sound League boys' basketball upset victory over the Kennedy Lancers Tuesday at Kennedy.
 "A lot of them had been starters and they came off the bench and we didn't lose that much," said Rainier coach Merle Duncan, whose team had just won its second game in a row after opening the season with four straight losses.
 For the Lancers, Tuesday's

defeat was their first league setback this year.
THE RAMS were forced to lean on their bench when starting center Dave Rencher went to the sidelines with his fourth foul seconds after the start of the third quarter and starting guard Craig Maley limped off the court with a sprained ankle minutes later.
 Enter Doug Mahaffey for Rencher and Steve Edmiston for Maley.
 The score was knotted at 33-33 when Maley joined Rencher on the sidelines with 4:16 to go in the period.
 Ironically, that's about the time the Rams made their move as they broke a 35-35 tie to rattle off 13 straight points and end the third quarter ahead 48-35.
 Both teams were playing

defense from baseline to baseline and the game was ragged during that period. But it was the Rams who survived that style of play best with Mahaffey and Edmiston, as well as another sub, Pat Jackson, making significant contributions.
KENNEDY took a run at Rainier in the fourth period. Lancer guard Chris Simpson served notice his team wasn't dead when he pocketed three consecutive steals to open the final quarter, leading to five points he scored in as well as two more for teammate Gary Mack.
 Kennedy continued to make inroads in the Ram lead until the Lancers were within four, 57-53, with 1:26 left.
 That's when the Ram slide stopped. They managed to exploit

Kennedy's gambling defense for layins and free throws to pull away at the end. Rencher's late-game return also helped.
 "We had the momentum temporarily, but we just couldn't hang on to it," said Kennedy coach Henry Mengarelli.
 "They played very well; we played very flat.
 "We didn't try to run enough. We're basically a fast team, but tonight we weren't."
 For Mt. Rainier, a school that has been drifting in the basketball doldrums for the last few years, the triumph may have lasting significance.
 "It was a big win for us from the standpoint of getting the program turned around," said Duncan of the victory over traditionally strong Kennedy.

THE CONTRIBUTIONS of Rainier subs Mahaffey, Edmiston and Jackson, all seniors, aren't necessarily reflected in the box score.
 Mahaffey scored six points, Edmiston four and Jackson three, but it was their ability to function during the pressure-packed fourth quarter when Kennedy was applying the heat that earned them, as well as the rest of the Rams, kudos from their coach.
 "With the pressure Kennedy put on, I thought our kids' poise was, I thought — for us," Duncan said.
 "It wasn't a pretty game, but it was a win."
 It may have also been a costly game if Maley's ankle injury, which forced him to sit out almost the entire second half Tuesday, proves to be serious.
 Mt. Rainier forward Mark Fickes was the game's leading scorer with 19 points. He sank six of 12 field goal attempts and seven of nine free throws.

Rainier's balanced scoring was a plus with three other Rams reaching double-figures: Dan Eernisse 12, Maley 11 and Rencher 10.
 Dan Kain had 17 points and nine rebounds for Kennedy. Tinker Lambert added 12 points and Mack had 10 points and 12 rebounds.
 Mt. Rainier, 2-2 in league and 2-4 overall, travels to Kentridge tonight. Kennedy, 3-1 in league and 3-2 overall, will journey to Hazen, also tonight.
 Both games start at 7:30.

Des Moines

Police beef-up patrols to check bicycle thefts

Des Moines police continue an increased watch on Pacific Junior High this week after bicycle thieves struck the school two consecutive days on Dec. 10 and 11.

School officials reported the first theft of a \$70 bicycle from the junior high's bike rack at about 2 p.m. Monday. The following day, two bicycles valued at \$120 and \$80 were reported stolen by their student owners, police said.

In an apparently unrelated theft, a clarinet valued at \$130 was taken Nov. 30 off a school bus from a student en route to school, police said. School officials reported the theft to police on Dec. 7, officers said.

Police here are pursuing a suspect who cashed a check Oct. 25 at Seattle First National Bank in Des Moines that was later found to be stolen during a burglary in Federal Way, officers said. Police said the teller who cashed the stolen draft recognized the suspect, described as a black male under 30 years old, when he returned to the bank Dec. 11 trying to cash another check. The alert teller was able to get information about the suspect after asking him for identification, police said.

Police are investigating the armed robbery of a 13-year-old Des Moines youth which occurred around 8:25 a.m. on Dec. 12 on South 223rd Street, officers said. The youth was walking to school when he was approached by another youth, described as a 15-year-old male, and threatened with a knife, police said. The suspect then took a drink from a bottle of soda carried by the victim and walked away, police said.

An estimated \$3,000 in items were taken by burglars from a 24th Avenue South home sometime between 1:15 and 1:45 p.m. on Dec. 12, according to police. The burglars kicked in a door at the residence and took a color television, stereo equipment and an undetermined amount of jewelry, police said.

Des Moines police are investigating a hit-and-run incident on Dec. 3 at the King's Arm Motel at South 232nd Street and 30th Avenue South which occurred sometime around 9 p.m. Police said an older model car was pulling out of the parking lot and struck the side of another vehicle which was forced into hitting the car parked next to it. One car sustained damages estimated at

\$800, while the other car was damaged an estimated \$1,000, police said. Witnesses were able to obtain the license plate number of the hit-and-run vehicle, police said.

Burglars took an estimated \$100 in small change from the Rent-A-Dent car rental agency on Pacific Highway South sometime before 2:50 a.m. Dec. 4, according to police. A former employee driving by the establishment noticed that the bay door at the business was left open. After inspecting the area, the man called police.

Items valued at approximately \$860 were taken from a South 227th Street home sometime between 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. on Dec. 6, officers said. The occupant of the home told police she had friends staying over and returned home to find both the friends and a tv, stereo receiver, turntable, and speakers gone.

"A motorcycle stolen from an apartment house on 28th Avenue South and South 216th Street sometime Dec. 6 was recovered by Des Moines police on Dec. 10 in a wooded area about four blocks away from the owner's residence, police said.



Miracle of oil recalled during Jewish holiday

While much of the population is making last minute preparations for Christmas, the Jewish community is already celebrating a holiday — Hanukkah. Today is the seventh day of the eight day Hanukkah celebration commemorating the rededication of the Temple following a Jewish military victory.

The story is passed down that a Syrian king defiled the Temple and tried to force the Jewish people to worship the gods of the Syrians. The Jews, led by the Maccabean family, took to the hills to wage a guerrilla war against the Syrians.

After several years of fighting, the Maccabees drove the Syrian armies out of Jerusalem and regained the Temple. The Jews cleaned the temple and prepared to rededicate it. The eternal flame, situated over the ark containing the Jewish holy books, had gone out while in the possession of the Syrians.

The Jewish people were dismayed to find there was only enough holy lamp oil to last one day. The Jews believe a miracle occurred, however, as the little bit of oil kept the flame lit for eight days, during which time they celebrated the rededication of the Temple.

THE MIRACLE of the eight days of light is symbolized in the Jewish home by the lighting of eight candles in a candelabra known as a "menorah." Gary Crane, of Burien, whose family is currently celebrating Hanukkah, explained that the tall candle to the right of the menorah is lit first. It is called the "shamesh," or the worker candle. All the other candles are lit from the shamesh.

Crane explained that it is traditional that each person in the family lights at least one candle during the course of the eight days of celebration. No work is to be done while the candles are burning. Crane said the miracle of the oil is stressed more than the military victory "because Jews don't like war."

Kay, Crane's wife, stressed that Hanukkah is traditionally a family celebration. In the Crane household, the children, Daniel, 11, Paul, 8, and Jonathan, 6, receive one gift each of seven of the nights of Hanukkah. On the eighth night the family chooses a charity, and a check is sent, accompanied by a letter written by one of the children. "We feel we have more than enough and we want to share," Mrs. Crane said. The gifts the children receive are often silly or mathematical games.

TRADITIONAL gambling games are often played during Hanukkah. Young children often play with the "dreidel," a four-sided top marked with four Hebrew letters: nun, gimmel, he and shin. The letters stand for the four Hebrew words: nes gadol hayah shem, "there was a great miracle."

The dreidel is spun and the letter that shows after it is spun indicates what is to happen in the game. If "nun" is showing, the spinner gets nothing. If "gimmel" is showing, the spinner gets all the tokens in the pot. "He" means the spinner gets half of the pot, and "shin" means the spinner must put tokens into the pot. The player with the most tokens in his possession at the end of the game is the winner.

Mrs. Crane prepares the traditional "latkes," or potato pancakes, for the Hanukkah meals. Cheesecakes, she said, are also a traditional food item during the holiday.

The Crane boys make their own wrapping paper each year, using potatoes to make block prints of Jewish symbols on tissue paper. Blue and white, the Israeli national colors, are the colors used during Hanukkah.

"HANUKKAH HAS grown a little bit as an antidote (to the commercialism at Christmas)," Crane said. He stressed that the gift giving is a modern change, that generally Hanukkah is one of the lesser Jewish holidays. It is a fun holiday, he said, a time for the children to play games.

"Hanukkah is celebrated because the Jews regained their religious freedom," said Crane. "That's why it's great to live in America — religious freedom."

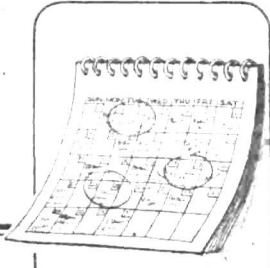

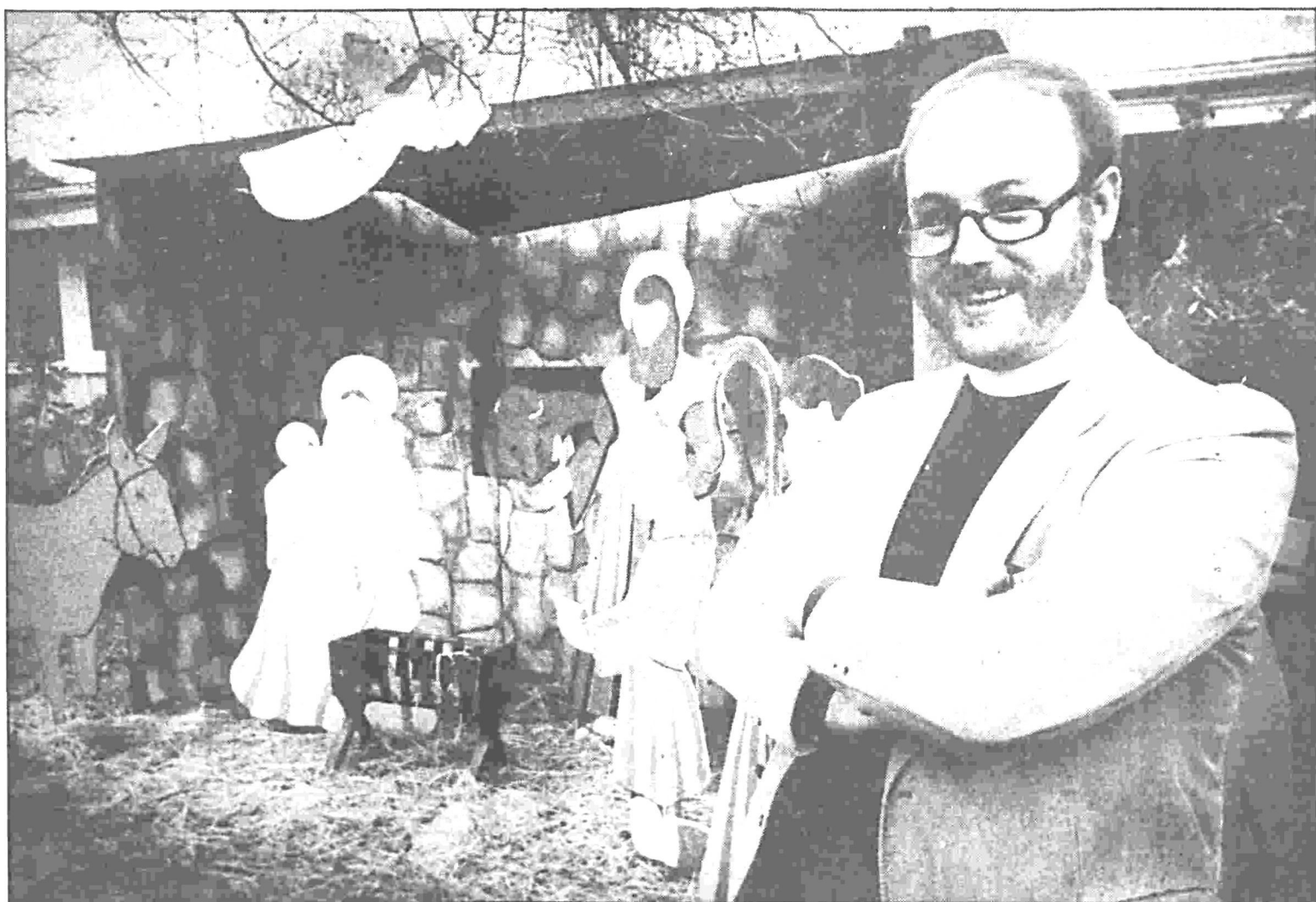

Vandals, burglars take grinchy pre-holiday toll

The Grinch who ripped off Christmas has moved into Federal Way with a band of his Troll friends — on so King County police reports indicated at midweek.

Three incidents of vandalism between Sunday night and Wednesday morning added up to a \$10,200 loss for two residents and a Missouri trucker, while thieves and burglars added about \$8,000 more to the grinchy toll.

The worst of the vandalism cases was reported to police by the trucker, who said that somebody drained all the oil out of the engine of his 18-wheeler while it was parked at Evergreen Truck Stop Tuesday night.

He told police that when he started the engine the next morning, it promptly destroyed itself. Repairs, he estimated, will cost at least \$8,000.

Investigating officers said that vandals had opened the oil drains.

Early on Tuesday morning vandals drove a stolen car into the side of Adelaide Elementary School on Southwest 304th Street, resulting in about \$1,000 damage to the structure. The automobile had been stripped of its radio, a camera and other items before it was deliberately wrecked, police said.

VANDALS ALSO torched an automobile parked in the driveway of a 22nd Avenue South residence, resulting in about \$1,200 in damage.

Police and firemen said that burning road flares were tossed into the interior of the car.

The owner saw the fire and put out the flames with a fire extinguisher, they said.

Meanwhile, thieves took five gold watches worth a total of \$8,000 from a display case outside a SeaTac Mall jewelry shop, and broke into a jewelry store on South 336th Street, making off with about \$500 in loot.

The South 338th Street store is the same establishment that was hit in November for a loss that was estimated at \$40,000.

Police have recovered about half of the jewelry that was stolen in the earlier case, and several suspects have been arrested. But all of them, police say, are now free on bail.

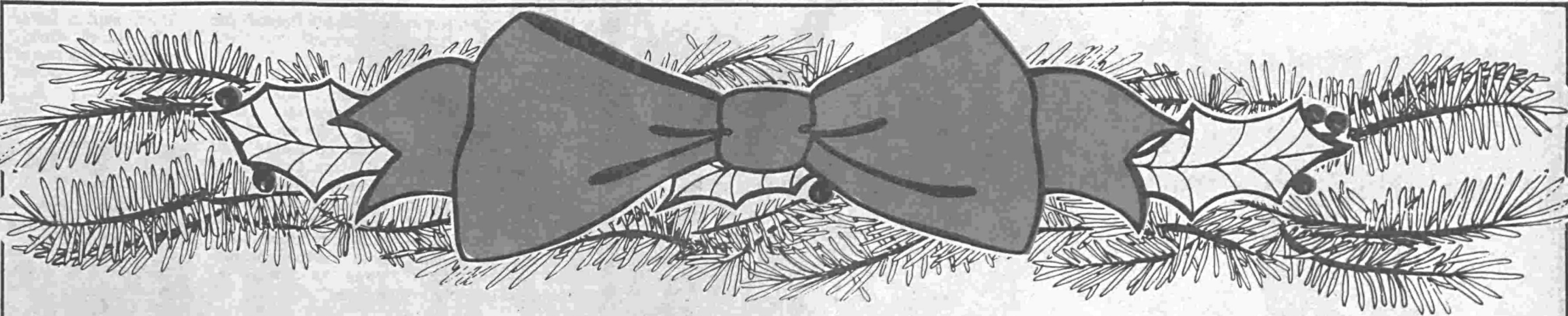

soaked grass and accelerated rapidly, thereby digging deep trenches in the turf.

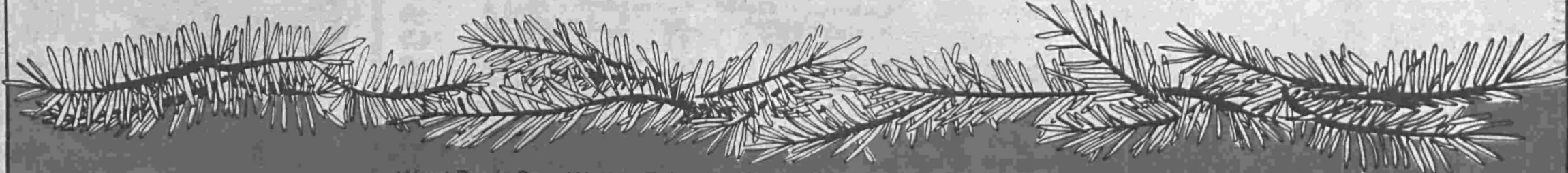

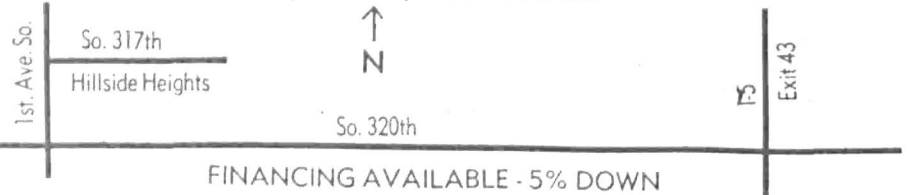

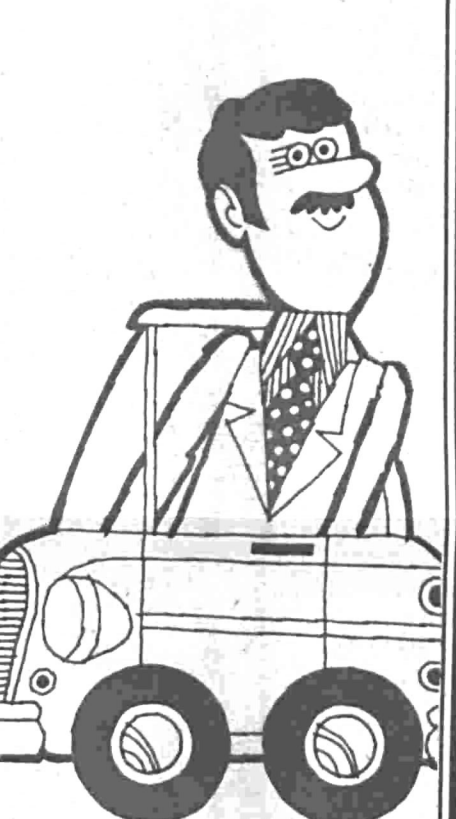
