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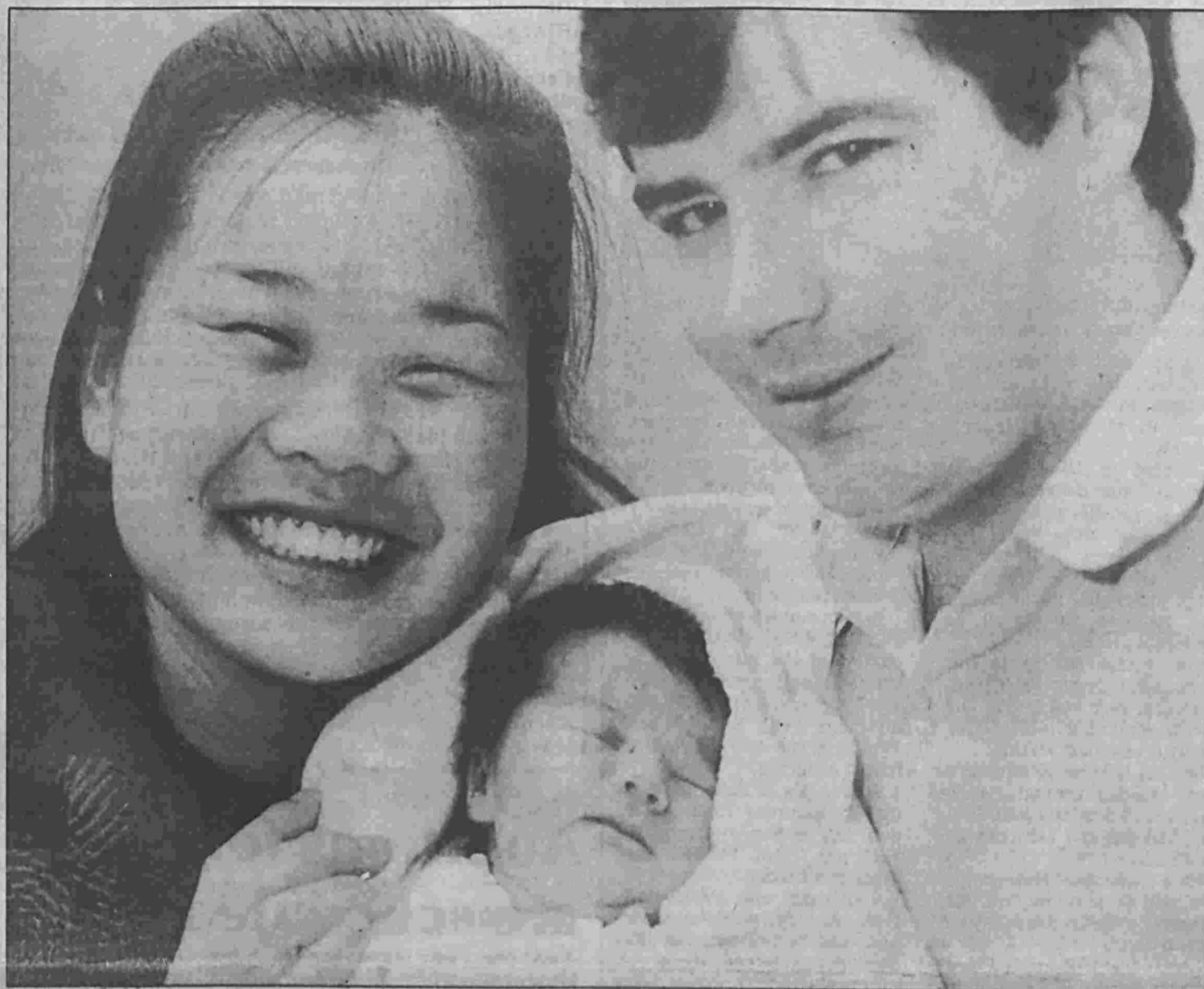

## Barden may go; Brough eyes council

In the wake of reports that King County Councilmember Paul Barden may be headed for a federal appointment, at least one person has expressed interest in replacing him.

State Rep. Jean Marie Brough (R 30th) of Federal Way said she has always been interested in local politics and would consider seeking an appointment to Barden's position if it becomes vacant.

Brough said she is confident she could do a good job on the county council since she's familiar with local issues, including Metro. She has been actively working in the Legislature on a bill to reorganize the Metro Council that would shrink the size of the unwieldy body.

News of Barden's possible appointment to a post in the Bush administration was leaked and published this week in a local paper. It stated he is under consideration for a top post in the Navy that would take him to Washington, D.C., an administrative post in the Federal Emergency Management Agency or a post in the General Services Administration in the Northwest region.

BARDEN WOULD not deny the report, but would not confirm it. He did say he has not yet received an offer and would have to carefully consider it if one materializes.

Barden has been an active campaigner in the Washington Bush effort for the past eight years.

If he does step up to a federal job, his seat on the King County Council will be filled by appointment. The Republican precinct captains will choose from among candidates that present themselves and recommend several to the party county chairman.

The chairman will then select three to recommend to the King County Council chairman for appointment. A final decision will be made by a vote of the county council.

Brough said she has not yet talked with local supporters to begin that process, but plans to approach precinct captains to see if they're interested.

Any appointee to Barden's position will have to begin campaigning with voters immediately. His seat will be up for election next fall.

## Smith seeks to stiffen sentence

Robin Smith was a normal 21-year-old Des Moines woman looking forward to setting a date to marry her fiancé, Larron Crowston.

"She was looking forward to a happy life, to being a wife and someday a mother," said Robin's mother, Edna Smith.

"She had a long life in front of her had this not happened," Smith said.

Instead, both Smith and Crowston are dead and Darren Dee O'Neall stands guilty of Smith's murder.

O'Neall, 28, suddenly pleaded guilty to first-degree

## Health clinic moving into new temporary quarters

King County Health Department officials are hoping to have the doors open at a new temporary health clinic in Federal Way within the next two weeks.

County health services in Federal Way currently are housed in just three rooms at the South King County Multi-Service Center. The health department plans to sign a new lease this week on 6,000 square feet of clinic space in a pediatric clinic at 1814 S. 324th Street, behind SeaTac Mall, said the department's Judy Pierce.

Meanwhile, by this time next year, officials expect work to have begun on a new permanent home for the clinic. SLR, a private consultant and a community group, the volunteer Health Care Campus Corp., have narrowed the site selection for a new health center down to two sites, said the volunteer group's chairman, Dick Schoon.

Schoon wouldn't pinpoint the exact sites because no offers have been made for either piece of land. Recommendations from the consultant and community group first must be reviewed by the county before a purchase can be made, Schoon said.

The new clinic will be paid for in part by a \$99.8 million health-care bond approved by county voters in 1987.

ONE SITE is near SeaTac Mall and the other near St. Francis Community Hospital. Schoon said the West Campus site near the hospital would be preferable because it would be large enough to construct a building that could house an envisioned one-stop shopping center of sorts for social services.

The health department, the community group and the South King County Multi-Service

Center have been looking at the possibility of locating the multi-service center and the health clinic on the same site. Schoon said the state Department of Social and Health Services, the Red Cross and the Salvation Army also have expressed interest in moving into such a center.

The mall site would likely prove too expensive for such grand plans and probably would not be large enough to house all of those organizations, Schoon said.

"Ideally, we would create literally a campus of health care and emergency services. You could go to one place for emergency housing, food stamps...and health care," he said.

Schoon said the actual site selection is four to six months

## Police seize suspected 'mule' car

King County police, responding to a report of shots fired, arrested two Yakima men early Saturday morning for possession of 1/2 to 1 ounce of cocaine and impounded what they believed to be a drug-transporting car.

The incident began when two passersby, one from Kent and the other from Mount Vernon, were shot at after they apparently had driven into the middle of a drug buy or drop involving the white Camaro, police speculate.

After shots were fired, two cars, the white Camaro and a red Camaro, went separate ways. The two men told police they were shot at while driving down South 348th Street by someone in the red car and said it

was accompanied by the white car.

The two called police and gave descriptions of the vehicles. The white car was spotted moments later driving westbound on Southwest Campus Drive by a King County patrol officer. He pulled the car over a few miles later at Southwest 330th Street and 21st Avenue Southwest at about 12:30 a.m.

THE TWO MEN in the car had no valid identification or driver's licenses and at first claimed to speak only Spanish. They later admitted to being American citizens living in Yakima and the 22-year-old driver gave police permission to search the car, which is registered to a third party living in Yakima.

Police found a baggie of cocaine and two handguns — one verified as stolen — in the gear-shift console of the car. A Seattle Police Department drug-sniffing dog was brought in and discovered a set of drug scales and a small amount of suspected heroin in the car.

Police believe the car to be what they call a "mule" car, used for transporting narcotics. Most of the panels inside the car showed signs of being loose or often-removed, although no other drugs were found. Drug Enforcement Unit officers believe the car had been used for carrying drugs in the past, because the police dog showed signs of detecting drugs in the panels of the car. The dogs can detect the smallest traces of

narcotics, even after the cargo has long been removed, its handler said.

Yakima is a hotbed of drug trafficking, police say, and a good deal of the drugs sold in this area come from there.

The 22-year-old driver of the car also bore tattoos that may link him to Los Angeles street gangs. Neither he nor his companion, a 30-year-old male, were carrying identification. Police found their wallets hidden in boxes in the back of the car, along with a large box of suspected stolen merchandise.

The car was impounded for a more thorough search, which turned up nothing more. Both men were booked into King County Jail.

## Federal Way's menu fattens

One of the benefits of a booming Federal Way is the seemingly endless openings of new restaurants. Since summer, several have opened their doors and others are scheduled to make future appearances in the Federal Way dining scene.

The following menu is a sample of what's here now and what's yet to come.

The old **Dynasties Restaurant** is scheduled to open in a new location sometime in January at South 304th Street and Pacific Highway South.

Formerly the Spectrum Disco, the space is currently being remodeled to feature a new and improved **Dynasties**, which may not even be called **Dynasties**. Owner Warren Chinn has not yet decided on a name.

He does know, however, that his new spot will look more modern than the old Century Square bar, and will feature a piano bar in the lounge and some new, spicy Mongolian dishes on the menu.

In the Federal Way Shopping Center, the **Rom Thai restaurant**, replaced **Thanh's Vietnamese Cafe** in July.

Sid Permpool is at the helm of the family owned and operated restaurant that features authentic Thai food and decor.

Fifteen lunch and dinner entrees are prepared carefully and presented with style. Pan fried chicken with curry and coconut milk, beef and broccoli with oyster sauce and shrimp with garlic and white wine are a few of the offerings, each served with a selection of sauces.

"We not only have good food, but reasonable prices, atmosphere and good service. That's my strategy," said Permpool.

Entree prices range from \$3.75 to \$5.05. **Rom Thai's** hours are 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Call 839-6848 for more information.

Also in the Federal Way Shopping Center, the doors to the old **Fog Cutter Restaurant** remain closed.

Frank Mudrovich, regional manager for the shopping center, reports that no new tenant has signed a lease yet.

In August, **Caffe Latte** opened in the Twin Lakes Shopping Center on Southwest 336th Street.

The espresso and steamed milk drink that is the

restaurant's namesake is one of 10 types of espresso made at Caffe Latte. Almond and vanilla flavored espresso are some others.

The quaint little shop, decorated with a modern flair in red, black, white, mirrors and neon, also features pastries from Kringle's Bakery in Federal Way, soups and homemade sandwiches.

Six small tables invite guests to sit and relax to supplement the espresso-to-go traffic.

Owners Barbara and Kerry Callison and Ron Prohaska plan to begin selling in January several varieties of whole coffee beans from Stewart Brothers. Their espresso drinks are made with Stewart Brothers coffee, too.

Coffee lovers also can find all the coffee paraphernalia they could want at Caffe Latte. Mugs, espresso machines and cups, grinders and aprons are sold, across from the frozen yogurt machine and yummy yogurt toppings.

Caffe Latte hours are 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. weekdays and 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. weekends. Call 874-5264 to find out more.

If you're looking for frozen yogurt hot spots, make **Sue-ZQ Frozen Yogurt and Pizza** a stop on your list.

"Yogurt is what we're here for," said owner Wayne Kelley, who shares the business with his wife, Nola.

Industrial-size machines offering six flavors daily are prof. Kelley says that the brand

he sells, Ambrosia brand, is less fattening and has less sodium, fat and cholesterol than most other frozen yogurts.

Located in Hillside Plaza next to Drug Emporium and Target, **Sue-ZQ** also features 13 kinds of pizza that come already baked or ready to bake, hot Italian sandwiches, soup, spaghetti, garlic bread and rootbeer floats, all at moderate prices.

The restaurant is bright, clean, and is decorated in pretty hues of rose and gray. Four booths and nine tables offer plenty of spacious seating.

**Sue-ZQ** is open 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Saturday, and 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Sunday. Call 941-2177 for more information.

Fine Japanese restaurants are hard to come by, and the **Sakura Ya Restaurant** may be quite a find.

Located in Woodmont Place at 26218 Pacific Highway S. in Kent, **Sakura Ya** offers an extensive menu of authentic Japanese specialties and a beautiful sushi bar boasting 26 preparations of raw fish, octopus, fish eggs, eel and even sea urchin, when it's in season. All sushi is ordered fresh every day.

Although he opened **Sakura Ya** as recently as August, owner Thomas Lam is proud that he's already had regular customers who return for the sushi as well as main menu items.

**Yakisoba** (pan-fried noodles, \$5.25), **yakiniku don** (barbequed beef on rice, \$4.95) and the **beef teriyaki/tempura** combination (\$9.25) are some of the favorites, he said, and come in large portions.

With dinner prices ranging from \$4.95 to \$10, his restaurant is one of the most reasonable Japanese eateries around, Lam said.

Guests can watch his expert chef at work cooking their food. And the atmosphere is comfortable for waiting, with wooden floors, a wood-slat ceiling and real plants. The lighting is subdued over tables to seat about 50.

**Sakura Ya** is open Monday through Saturday 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. and on Sunday from 5 to 9:30 p.m. Call 946-5051 for more information.

You may not think that Federal Way needs another fast food restaurant, but it's about to get one more — maybe even two.

**McGovern's Burgers To Go**, a Redmond-based company, is planning to open one, possibly two of its Irish-themed restaurants in the area. But owners Gene and daughter Margie McGovern aren't ready to disclose where.

## Griffith works in 'Working Girl'

"Working Girl" is a working success.

The actors, the dialogue, the direction — everything clicks together so well in this movie. In fact, it's one of the most enjoyable movies of the year.

Central to the movie is one actress who's finally making it big and is responsible for making "Working Girl" a success: Melanie Griffith.

Griffith plays a 30ish New Yorker from the wrong side of the Manhattan-insider tracks trying to make it in the take-no-prisoners world of finance.

She's not having much luck, either in her love life or her

career, until she connects with a kind of good-looking version of T. Boone Pickens, played by Harrison Ford. They team up on an acquisition and merger that turns out to be more than just financial.

The only problem is that to pull the deal off, Griffith must somehow outsmart her boss-from-hell, played by Sigourney Weaver.

All three actors do an excellent job. Ford has perfected the kind of understated humor that he's shown in other movies and he even manages to come off with a likable eccentricity.

Weaver is excellent as an overbearing confident yuppie

on the rise.

But it's Griffith's show. Somehow, without looking like a fashion model and without seeming brainy, she manages to be both extremely attractive and smart.

Also, "Working Girl" has some of the funniest scenes in the movies this year.

There is no deep message to "Working Girl" and you're not going to have to do any deep thinking to figure it out. But, that's all right.

It's still one of the most funny, enjoyable movies to come around in a while.

He's so taken with her, he refuses to believe his 13-year-old daughter's warnings that Celeste eats batteries and displays other unearthly qualities common to aliens. Be prepared to overlook a shaky plot, but this is a comedy that has its moments. It has the spark of Aykroyd's zaniness that saves the film. It's also got adequate special effects and Basinger, who changes in and out of many skimpy outfits. But the real saving grace is watching Celeste's touching initiation into the human race. 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# Two sites eyed for permanent health clinic

away, and he hopes construction will be underway on the permanent health and services building by early 1990.

WHILE PLANS for a permanent health clinic are being laid, the current make-shift clinic is bulging at the seams of its small quarters at the multi-service center. Low-income families receive health care, food vouchers and nutritional counseling through the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program there. The clinic also offers pediatric care.

At the new temporary site, the clinic will be able to offer expanded services, Pierce said. A social worker has been added to the staff and nearly all programs offered by full-service clinics, such as the nearest one in Auburn, will be available. The only service not offered at the new temporary site will be the issuance of food handler permits, she said.

Pierce also said the clinic plans eventually to base its local public health nurse program in Federal Way as well. Currently, nurses who serve this area work out of the Auburn clinic.

It didn't take long for the clinic here to outgrow its cramped three-room quarters at the multi-service center, Pierce said, and the need for county health services is growing at a steady clip.

THE CURRENT caseload for WIC services in Federal Way is 300 people per month, clinic records state.

"There is substantial community growth in Federal Way and a lot of it is low-income and those without proper health insurance, those who need our services," Pierce said.

It was earlier hoped that the Federal Way Food Bank, part of the multi-service center, might join the health and social services campus. The food bank has been looking for a new home, too, but its space needs are likely to force it into a home of its own, said Schoon.

The food bank is looking for at least 8,000 square feet of warehouse space, with room to comfortably accommodate freezer and refrigeration units. It recently received a \$74,469 federal grant to go toward the purchase of a new building or property on which to build a new food bank.

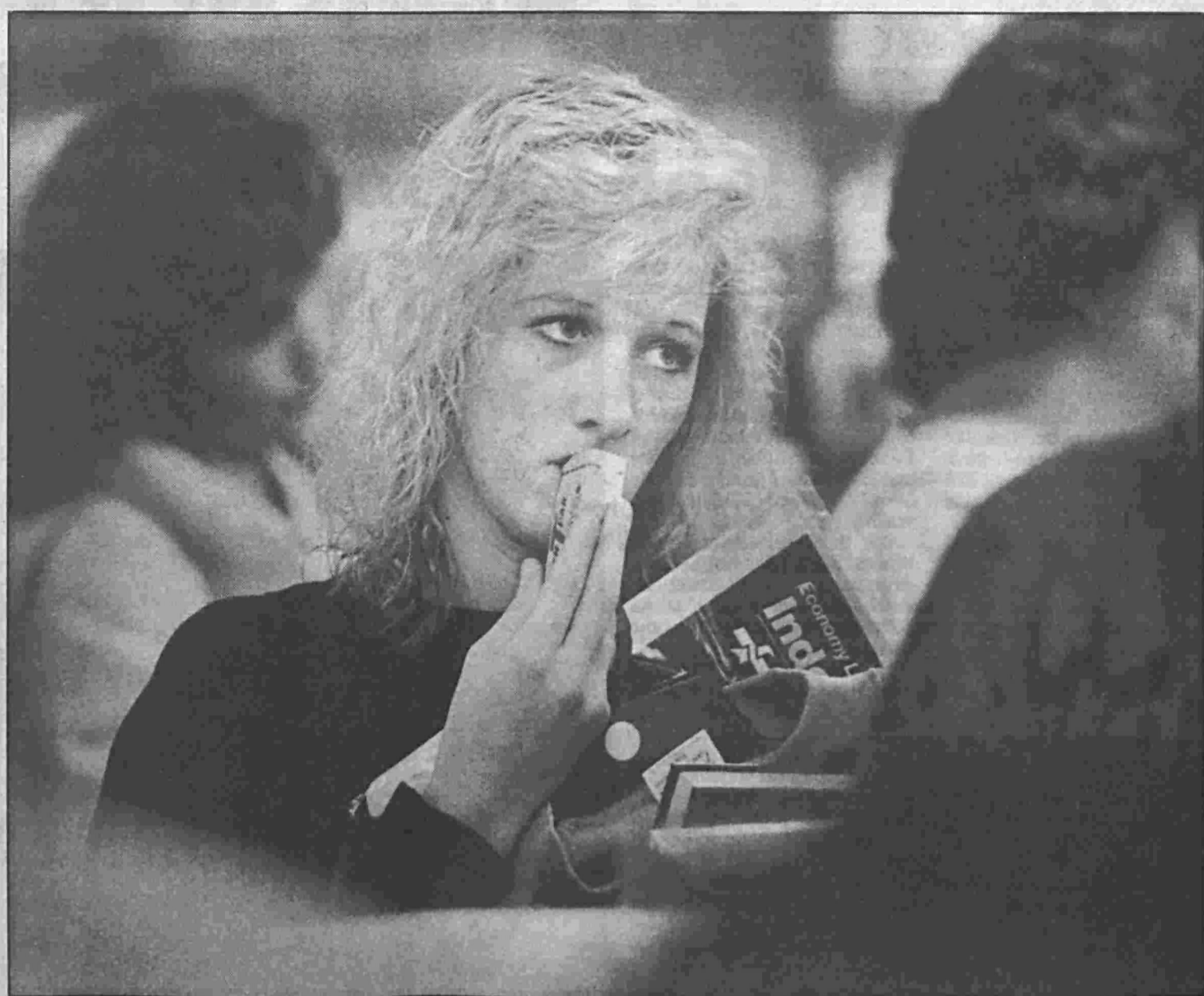

# Two businesses hit by similar robbers

King County police are investigating the possibility that two Federal Way businesses robbed over the weekend may have been hit by the same man.

Reports say a suspect described as a white male, 20-30 years old, standing 5 feet 7 inches to 5 feet 11 inches tall and weighing 150-160 pounds, robbed the Flower Market Jan. 1 and the Frame It shop Dec. 30. In both incidents, the robber was said to have brown hair, dark eyes and a mustache.

King County robbery detectives have noted the similarities and are investigating the possibility the crimes may be related, a detective said.

The Flower Market was robbed at 8:30 p.m. New Year's Day when a man entered the tiny shop at the corner of South 347th Street and Pacific Highway South and ordered the clerk to lie on the floor. He told her he had a gun and demanded money. After taking the shop's money he left on foot and was tracked by county K-9 units to South 349th Street and 11th

Place South, where the scent was lost. No gun was seen.

The Frame It shop, at South 320th Street and 20th Avenue South, was robbed at about 5 p.m. last Friday. The robber entered the store and stuck what the clerk later identified as a stun gun in her back and ordered her to hand over the store's money.

The robber took money from a cash box and left on foot headed south on South 320th Street.

Police lifted fingerprints from the cash box and a picture frame the man touched.

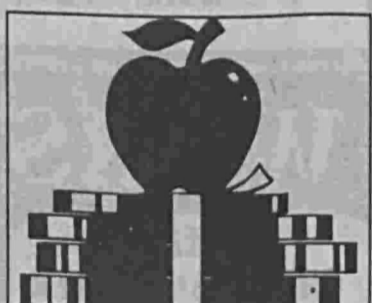

# O'Neill suddenly admits to murder

murder charges Wednesday during jury selection for his trial.

Prosecutors contend O'Neill gave Smith a ride after a party in Edgewood March 28, 1987. Her body was found on Memorial Day, 1987, in a wooded area near Greenwater in eastern Pierce County.

O'Neill changed his plea early Wednesday afternoon at the start of what promised to be a difficult three-week trial.

Defense attorney Ray Thoenig told Pierce County Superior Court Judge E. Albert Morrison that O'Neill made the plea in the hopes the prosecutors won't ask for a sentence longer than the state standard, 27 years, 9 months in prison.

BUT EDNA SMITH feels that's not enough time to pay for the life of her daughter.

"If we can't have an eye-for-an-eye, I feel this man should be locked up forever so this won't happen to any more girls," she said.

"It's not enough time to com-

pensate for what he did," she said.

Smith said she believes that Crowston, who died in November after apparently mixing sleeping pills with alcohol, died because he was remorseful he left his fiancé at the party where she was last seen.

"As far as I'm concerned, he literally died of a broken heart," she said.

There's still no official word on the exact cause of Crowston's death.

O'NEALL WAS one of the most wanted criminals in the country during the time after Smith's murder until he was found under an assumed name in a Louisiana jail last February.

He is still the leading suspect in two other murders. Police in Bellingham want to question him about the disappearance of 29-year-old Wendy Aughe, who was last seen drinking beer in a Bellingham bar with O'Neill about a month after Smith's murder.

Oregon State Police would like to question him about the death of Lia Elizabeth Szubert, a Boise woman whose body was found in La Grande, Oregon in June, 1987.

Edna Smith said she was pleased the trial was over, even though she was prepared to go through the painful process of reliving her daughter's death.

But she said she didn't feel the punishment was enough to fit the crime. She said she hopes people will write to Judge Morrison and ask for a longer sentence.

She was pleased O'Neill admitted he killed Robin, she said.

"But it bothers me we don't know why he killed Robin," she said.

"Why do you kill somebody, then turn around a month later and kill somebody else?" she asked. "He did three in a row. We don't honestly know if Robin was number one or not."

SMITH SAID SHE will first work to make sure O'Neill gets a longer-than-normal prison sentence.

Morrison has the option of going beyond the state's sentencing guidelines if he decides there were aggravating factors in the murder.

Edna Smith wants people to write to Morrison to tell him he should keep O'Neill in prison longer. Beyond that, she hopes to start a group to help victims of violent crimes. She said she's working through the Pierce County Chaplaincy organization to set up a memorial fund to help other victims.

"The public has been so supportive of me and my family," she said. "They have a chance now to say to the judge how they feel about this person."

PROSECUTOR TOM Feltnagle said the case against O'Neill was strong, although circumstantial.

He said he would have put Dennis Morrison, a high school classmate of O'Neill's, on the stand to testify he saw something kick against the back seat of O'Neill's car.

Feltnagle also said that two teeth missing when Smith's remains were found were located in the trunk of O'Neill's car.

For Edna Smith, the pain of her daughter's death will never go away.

But she realizes she was more fortunate than many families of murder victims, especially Green River victims, who don't know who killed their children.

"We are fortunate," she said. "We caught our killer."

## New Agers look for God inside themselves

Pinning down New Age beliefs is a bit like chasing leaves in the wind — just when you've got a grasp on them, they move further ahead.

It's impossible to stereotype New Age beliefs because no one person or group is the New Age movement. Rather, New Age is an umbrella term referring to a way of thinking and perceiving reality.

A small sample of New Age activities includes psychic healing, spirit channeling, yoga, self-improvement, holistic medicine and the use of crystals to synchronize body energies. In some form or another, all of these are practiced by the 300 active members of Federal Way's Unity Church of Christianity.

It's leader, the Rev. Thomas Coates, said that such activities help individuals to realize the God spirit inside them.

New Age, according to Russell Chandler, author of the new book, "Understanding the New Age," is the country's rising star of alternative belief systems. Its effects touch everyone, regardless of whether or not they believe its philosophy, which basically says that man can achieve godhood because the Christ spirit is in everyone.

If you saw any of the Star Wars movies, you know that the Force is supposedly an energy field generated by all living things, which Chandler says, "easily passes muster as the New Age definition of God."

YOU MAY like the music of pianist George Winston — that's New Age. And if you're into self-improvement, that's New Age, too.

New Age adherents, often young, well-educated and well-heeled, attract much commercial attention. That accounts for the attention paid to headliners like JZ Knight (channeler of Ramtha, the spirit warrior) and Bhagwan Shree Rajneesh (Indian mystic and leader of a now-defunct Oregon commune).

Ramtha/Knight brought national attention to the Northwest when actresses Shirley

MacLaine and Linda Evans went public with their belief in Ramtha's power.

Knight, however, doesn't have a monopoly on the spirit market, or even on the local spirit market. The Pacific Northwest is popular with Ramtha and his brothers, Mafu (channeled by Penny Torres-Ruben in Oregon) and Zanzoonia (channeled by MariJo Donais in Vancouver, Wash.).

The three selected the Northwest, Zanzoonia says, because when the "New Age" comes and the earth purges itself of its pollution, the area will be the least hard hit.

ZANZOONIA, "Z" to his followers, is a particular favorite at Federal Way Unity Church. The "ascended master" is said to make his presence known to Federal Way followers even when Donais stays in Vancouver. His strong presence, said Coates, requires no physical form.

Followers heard Chandler interviewed on KIRO radio last month when the author visited Seattle on a book promotion tour. The Z people didn't care much for what Chandler, a Los Angeles Times religion writer/New Age skeptic, had to say about the less tangible aspects of New Age—the powers of crystals, the merits of psychic healing and the validity of channelers.

KIRO wouldn't have dared let Chandler be so critical had the subject been Judaism, said Coates.

"It's cheeky," protested Herb Huseland, a Federal Way mortgage broker and sometimes-spokesman for Zanzoonia. A group of Z followers will have a

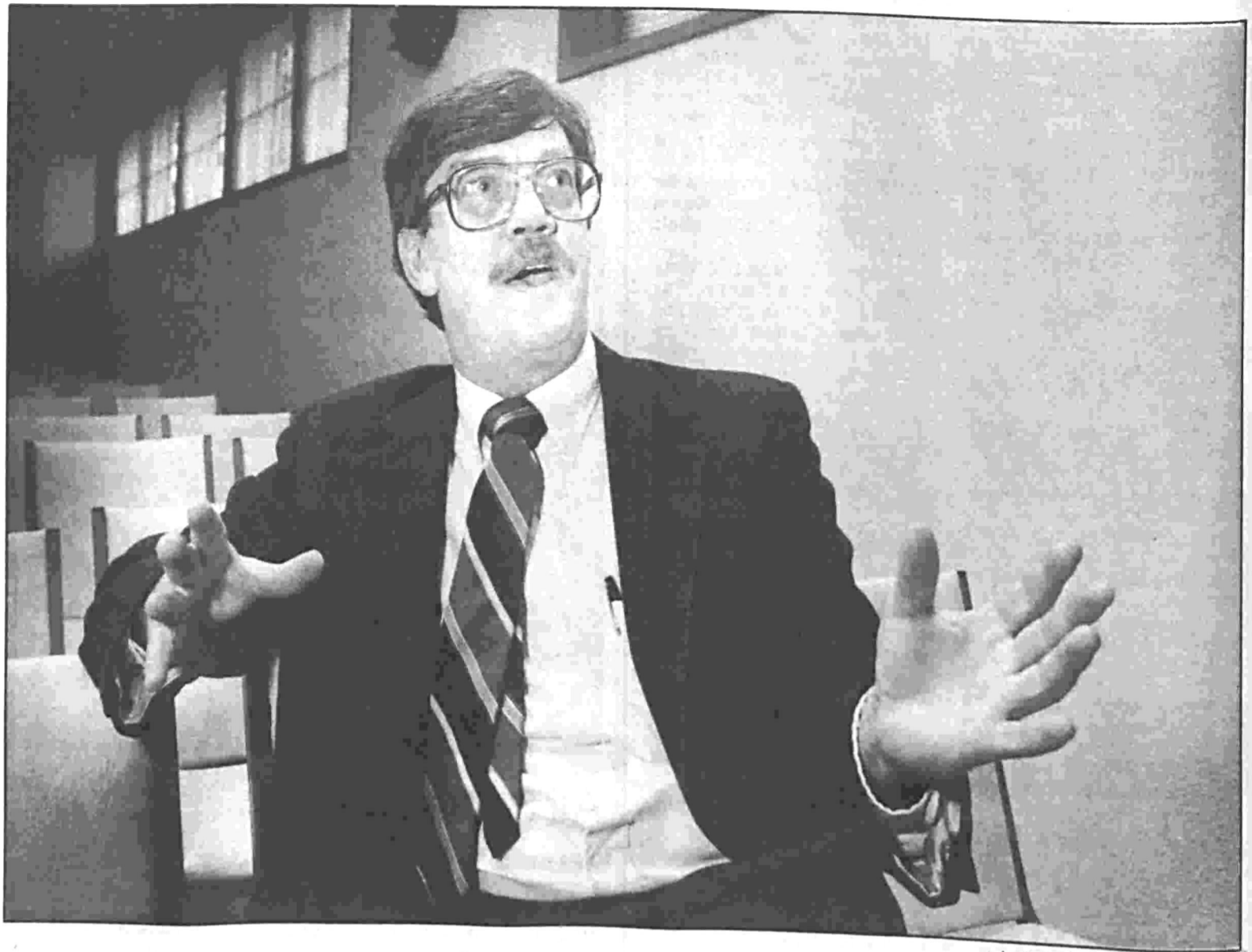

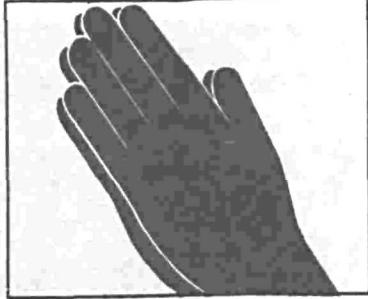

chance to rebut Chandler on KIRO at 11 a.m., Jan. 13.

**SPIRIT GUIDES** are only a part of New Age and of Unity — the major New Age center here, though Huseland explained that his church has as many belief systems as it does members.

"We try to stay away from channeling people toward a specific area of belief," Huseland said. "Unity isn't all of New Age and New Age isn't all of Unity."

Still, some beliefs are shared by most New Agers.

Chandler and Coates agree that reincarnation is a central New Age tenet.

Reincarnation is, Coates said, a forgotten staple of mainline Christianity, and it fits well with the New Age belief that humans are souls passing through this particular plane.

Zanzoon, for instance, says he's an incarnation of Agamemnon, who you may remember from your ancient Greek history as being a Greek hero of the Trojan War. He was murdered soon after his homecoming by his wife, Clytemnestra.

As Zanzoon explains the story, Clytemnestra didn't finish him off. He escaped to a monastery and finished his days

in meditation. It was there that he achieved enlightenment and ascended to his current form.

Ascension is another belief central to New Age — humans can achieve Godhood through the Christ spirit inside them. This is one of many areas where followers get in trouble with mainline Christians, who assert God is separate from man and earth, not a collective energy force.

"THAT'S QUITE different from the Judeo-Christian view that God is a person (and) stands apart from his creation," said Chandler during a local interview.

Perhaps the best way to understand the difference is to examine the New Age, Unity-style, religious structure. As the church's name implies, Unity is a Christian church, steeped in the Bible, though not exclusively. The denomination is nearly 100 years old, but the Federal Way congregation is unusually progressive, said both Huseland and Coates.

But, Coates said, where traditional denomination-bound Christians get "hung up" on the name "Jesus," Coates proceeds to "Christ," which, he explained, is not a name but the God spirit, a title. The real way to look at "Jesus Christ," Coates

said, is "Jesus, Christ."

In New (Age) Thought, the Christ spirit is in all of us.

"Jesus knew who he was. We have forgotten who we are," Coates said.

Achieving that state is the focus of a variety of New Age practices — the list includes the above-mentioned spirit channeling, crystals, yoga, meditation, self-improvement, holistic health care and numerous Eastern-based religions and exercises, such as acupuncture.

New Age has redeeming qualities, said Chandler. Its advocacy of world peace, the environment, and social causes has merit. And holistic health care is gaining the respect of western medicine.

"There is a real tie-in between emotional and physical well-being," Chandler said, adding, that "You don't have to be a New Ager to adhere to that."

BUT THE frauds who attach themselves to New Age riches (remember the New Age profile — young, educated, professionally) also attach a "snake-oily" shine to the business, said Chandler.

Hangers-on are attracted by the riches accumulated by Knight through Ramtha-inspired books, seminars and classes. And don't forget the

Bhagwan's penchant for Rolls Royces, although Zanzoon hasn't hit it that big, said Huseland and Coates.

Chandler's criticisms are aimed at phonies like the "psychic surgeon" exposed when chemical analysis showed blood supposedly coming from a woman's body actually came from a chicken. Channeling also has been the subject of many explanations — everything from the emerging subconscious of the channeler to actual entities have been named as the cause.

Still, if they are actually entities, Chandler rings a warning bell.

"I'm not convinced that the entities that come out are what they say they are or that they have the wisdom to guide people's lives," he said.

On a more positive note, Unity will hold a fundraiser for its Baby Amber fund, at Z's behest. # Cost split set for Redondo RID

Federal Way Water and Sewer District commissioners agreed Tuesday on a split over the costs of improvements to the water and power lines of some residents of the former Water District 56.

The improvements to the aging water system are part of the merger agreement approved by former District 56 customers in the November 1987 election. The costs for improvements to the water system of the entire area are expected to total about \$1.3 million.

Residents of the former district are being charged one-time payments of \$880 to \$1,640 or monthly surcharges to pay for those improvements.

After those improvements were already scheduled, about 100 property owners along Soundview Drive petitioned King County to bury electrical cable under the road. Since both projects require digging up Soundview Drive, the Federal Way district and the county decided to share some costs of the project.

THE COUNTY will take care of burying the electrical cable and will then assess the property owners along Soundview Drive for the costs of that work through a Road Improvement District (RID).

However, there are some costs that will be shared between the county and the district,

such as paving the road after the cable and water mains are buried.

The Federal Way district staff said since the property owners will benefit from having the electrical cable buried, they should pay for 50 percent of those shared costs.

Property owners, led by Redondo Community Club President Gene Achziger, said they were already paying for all those shared costs as part of their District 56 upgrade surcharges and they shouldn't have to pay anything else.

The district board agreed Tuesday to charge property owners along Soundview Drive 10 percent of the shared costs. Those extra charges, just for the shared costs, will amount to about \$60 per property owner, according to Jim Miller, district general manager.

Soundview Drive property owners will still be charged an average of about \$3,500-\$5,000 per property owner for the RID, according to King County staff.

A public hearing to decide if the RID will be approved will be held before the King County Council, 9:30 a.m., Monday,

Jan. 9, in the council's chambers in the King County Courthouse.

District officials anticipate construction will start in April and will be finished in early 1990. Most of the work will take place along Soundview Drive in Redondo and will involve digging two trenches about 4 feet and 3 feet wide.

Eight-inch diameter water pipe will be put in one trench and electrical conduit put in the other. The project will also include burying cable TV lines.

District officials say property owners will be inconvenienced during construction.

## Eagles bury Rogers, move into tie for first

The Federal Way girls' basketball team rebounded from its only loss of the season so far by routing the Rogers Rams on Tuesday, 58-39.

Coupled with Puyallup's 47-37 loss to Decatur, Federal Way moved into a three-way tie for first place in the South Puget Sound League's North Division with the Vikings and Gators at 3-1. Rogers fell to 2-2.

Puyallup had stopped Federal Way's unbeaten streak at seven on Dec. 19, 48-39, but the Eagles came back from the holidays with a vengeance after their only loss of the year.

"You forget Puyallup real fast when you play as well as the kids played tonight," said Federal Way coach Chuck Czubin.

Czubin, noting that after Puyallup beat Federal Way last year, the Eagles went on a seven-game winning streak, said, "I hope we can do it again."

The Eagles exploited the Ram defense for 41 first-half points while holding the Rams to only 17. Rogers was playing without its leading scorer, Sara Billings, who was sidelined with the flu.

"It was a little easier than we thought it was going to be," said Czubin, "but the kids played very well. We got 'em inside, we got 'em outside and we got 'em

on the fast break."

**SHANNON SEHLIN** scorched the nets for 20 points to lead the way for the Eagles and she also had eight rebounds, while Jenny Mahlstedt finished with 16 points, four rebounds and five assists.

Federal Way drew outstanding board play from Kelly Czubin, who pulled down a team-high 11 rebounds to go along with her four points. Cyndi Shahan scored eight points and also had eight rebounds and Brooke Edwards came off the bench to snare six boards and score two points. Guard Janelle Oakeley dished out a team-high seven assists while also hitting five of six free throws.

Rogers shot poorly from the field, as the Rams were just 14 of 62 for 22.5 percent against a tough Eagle zone defense. The Rams were 11 for 20 at the free throw line.

Meanwhile, Federal Way made 23 of 46 for an even 50 percent from the floor and the Eagles were 12 of 21 at the line.

Two baskets from out top by Rogers' Jenny Stewart brought the Rams to within two at 9-7 in the first quarter, but Federal Way went on a 9-2 tear to close the period on top, 18-9, after Sehlin sank a basket right before the buzzer off an assist from Mahlstedt.

Sehlin and Mahlstedt were a deadly combination for Federal Way, as the two combined for 25 of Federal Way's 41 first-half points.

The two had little problem cracking the Rams' defense. Sehlin drove along the baseline for a nice move inside to give Federal Way a 24-11 lead. She also hit from the outside later in the period to keep the Eagles up by 13 and then worked her way back inside to put Federal Way ahead by a 30-15 margin.

**OAKELEY SCORED** all five of her points from the free throw line in the second quarter to add to the Eagle assault, while Mahlstedt scored an easy two off the break and also nailed a basket from the outside to give her team a 38-15 lead. Edwards hit a running bank shot off the glass for a 40-17 Eagle advantage before Oakeley added a free throw prior to the end of the first half to make it 41-17.

Jennifer Evans gave Federal Way its biggest lead of the game at 48-18 with 1:46 left in the third quarter when she drove to the basket for two and then added a free throw after the foul.

"We need a game like that every once in a while to get their spirits back," said Czubin of his squad's easy win.

**IT WON'T** be easy for the next three games, however, as the Eagles travel to Jefferson tomorrow for a 7:30 p.m. tip-off against the red-hot Raiders, who have won three in a row.

Federal Way will then host Curtis Monday and travel to Lakes Wednesday before its next game — Jan. 19 at Spanaway Lake.
