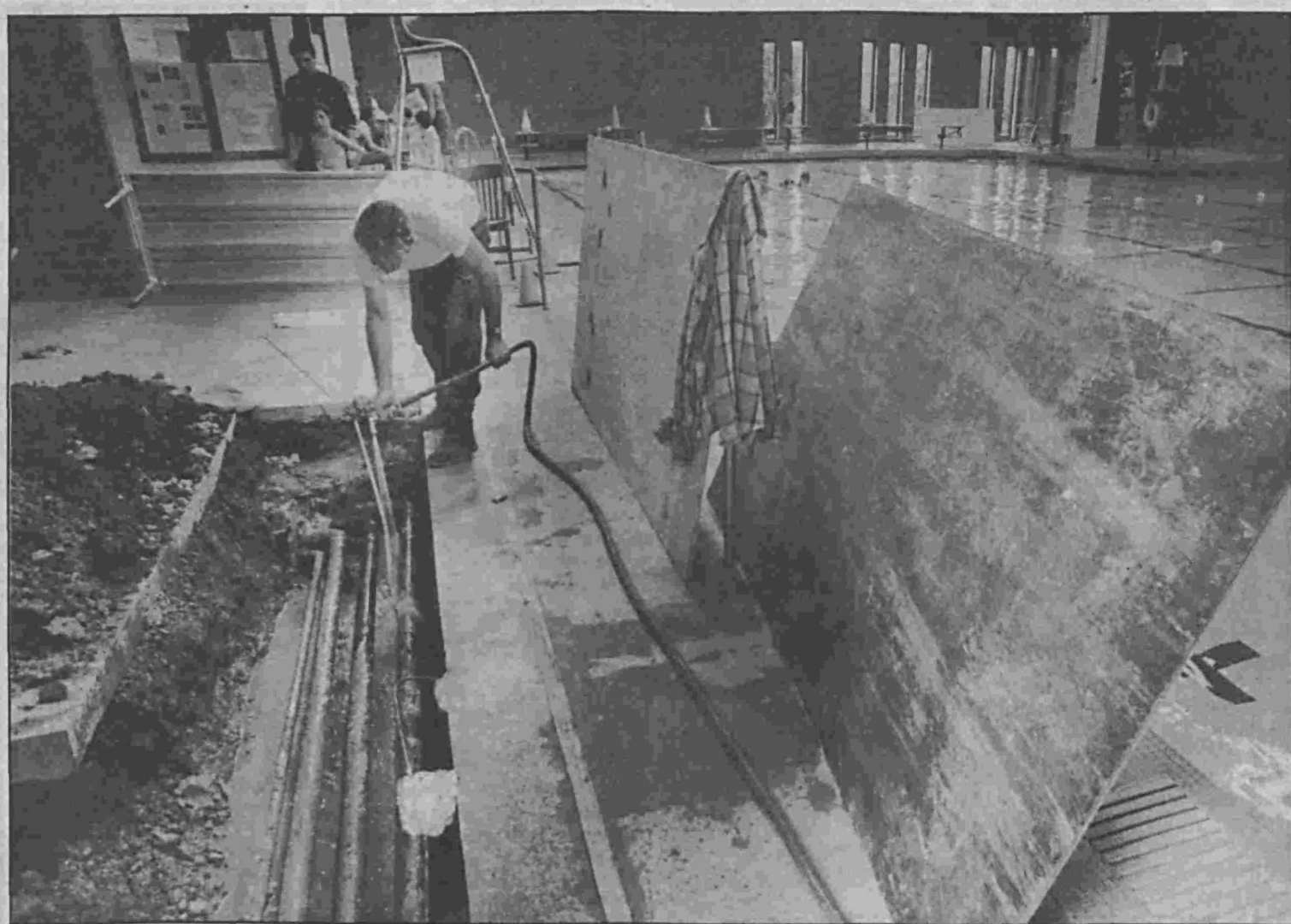

County plan for parks causes stir

Federal Way conservationists are skeptical about the King County Council's proposed plan for spending \$3 to \$6 million a year in conservation futures money.

The money, collected countywide through property taxes, will be earmarked for regionally important green spaces, greenbelts and trails if the county council passes a proposed bill Monday.

The conservation futures tax was approved by the state Legislature in 1984. Until now, the money has been spent for farmland preservation and to purchase green space in individually reviewed cases.

Federal Way has gotten little or none of the money, said Eileen Marckx, a Federal Way resident and activist for the preservation of the Hylebos wetlands.

Fast-paced development in Federal Way has left almost no open space that could be considered regionally important, Marckx said.

Marckx said she fears if the conservation futures plan passes, Federal Way will get nothing from it because the available open space won't fit the definition.

A meeting will be held tonight in the Group Health doctor's lounge, 301 South 320th St., at 7:30 p.m. to discuss the proposed ordinance. County council staff member Gene Duvernoy will attend to answer the community's questions.

Sites selected under the plan could not be as small as a neighborhood lot, but would not necessarily have to be big enough to attract visitors countywide, said King County Councilmember Paul Barden, who supports the proposal.

A 70-acre farm at 21st Avenue Southwest and Southwest 350th Street is an example of property that might be considered for purchase, Barden said.

Parcels would be recommended for purchase by a citizen's advisory committee made up of two members from Seattle, two from the suburban cities and five from unincorporated King County, Duvernoy said.

The county council will make final approvals of recommended sites, he said.

BUT EVERY parcel chosen must fit into the guidelines developed with citizen input for the open space bond issue last

Multi-family housing moratorium is killed

An attempt to stall multi-family housing construction in Federal Way failed yesterday in the King County Council's Growth Management and Environment Committee.

A tie vote killed the proposed ordinance, despite testimony from Federal Way residents that the rapid growth of multi-family housing is clogging roads and making the community unlivable. Council members Audrey Gruger and Greg Nickels voted against the moratorium, while Cynthia

Sullivan and Paul Barden supported it.

Barden, who introduced the ordinance, said he would try to convince absent committee member Ron Sims to sign the bill over for a full council vote. But Sims said later he would not support the moratorium because he believes it undermines the 1986 community plan that allows growth.

Developers and real estate agents told the committee that a moratorium would only increase housing prices in Federal Way.

Two-time liver recipient dies

Dolores White Hotton, the 41-year-old Trout Lake-area resident who underwent two liver transplants last July, died of multiple organ failure Monday.

According to Carol Hill, a friend of the Hotton family, she became ill two weeks ago and returned to Virginia Mason Hospital in Seattle, where she earlier had been recuperating from her transplants. The transplants were performed at the UCLA Medical Center in

Los Angeles.

While the new liver was fine, the rest of her body simply wore out from the effects of 17 years of liver disease compounded by diabetes, Hill said.

Hotton underwent emergency surgery on Wednesday, Feb. 15, and was attended by family members until she passed away.

Hotton was born July 5, 1947, in Seattle, and was a 1965 graduate of Federal Way High School. She is survived by her

husband, Sandy, and her son, Jeff.

Other survivors include her parents, Giselda and George White, Kent; her brothers, Mike White, Renton, and Jim White, Moses Lake; her sister, Kathie Blanchard, Spanaway; her mother-in-law, Wendall Hotton, Enumclaw; and numerous nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a.m., Feb. 25, at the Enumclaw Funeral Home.

Apartment fire destroys two units, singes three more

FIRE DESTROYED TWO units of the Greystone Apartments on First Avenue South and South 312th Street on Wednesday morning, and damaged three more units nearby. The fire was started by heaters used to dry sheetrock, according to Fire District 39 (Federal Way) and King County inspectors.

Fire District 39 (Federal Way) was called into action this week to fight an apartment fire and stand guard over a gas leak.

Fire destroyed two uninhabited units at the Greystone Apartments, now under construction at First Avenue South and South 312th Street. Another apartment was damaged by flame and two more suffered smoke damage from the fire, which struck at 5 a.m. Wednesday.

The roof and floor of both apartments were destroyed by flame. Damages were assessed at \$200,000. Because the apartments were empty, no injuries were sustained and no personal possessions were lost.

The fire was sparked by propane-fueled heaters which were being used to dry sheetrock in the building, said Boyd Johnson, spokesman for the fire department. The heaters apparently ignited nearby combustible material, possibly a cardboard box.

The apartments had no ceiling sprinklers to stop the blaze, Johnson noted. The units were built before a King County sprinkler ordinance was recently enacted, so no sprinklers were required, he said.

Sprinklers would have been triggered by the blaze and could

have quenched flames early, Johnson said.

"Had this been a sprinkled building, it would be a fair estimate to say the fire would not have spread so far," he added.

FOUR engines, two ladder

trucks and 30 or 40 firefighters were called in to fight the fire. It was the first major structural fire for the department's Engine 40, a new firefighting vehicle that sports a nozzle at the tip of

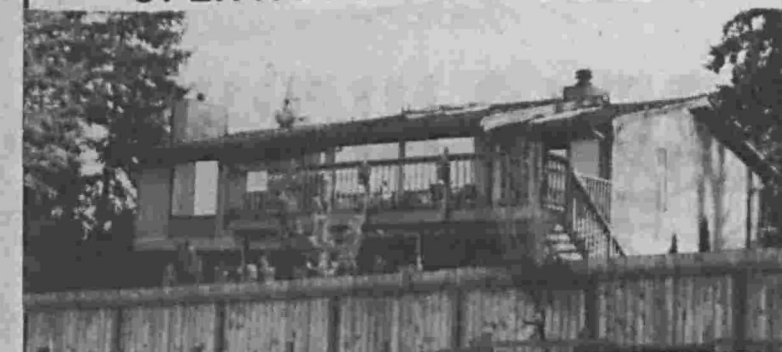

Teens tune in college radio

Federal Way high school students have become a targeted audience. But they're not really the only ones.

Along with high school-age teens in Auburn, Kent and Renton, young Federal Way listeners are the focus of about 50 students at Green River Community College who work at KGRG FM Radio, the college's station.

"Our main emphasis is on high school kids who may want to come to GRCC," said John Ramsey, radio instructor, KRGR advisor and Green River graduate himself.

But the 100-watt station goes beyond the usual advertising designed to lure kids to the college. The college students gear the station's music to that age group and take their show on the road to area high school dances — for free. Most stations charge up to \$250 to entertain at a high school dance, Ramsey said.

"It's a way to get directly to our listeners," Ramsey said.

KGRG (89.9 FM) plays mostly contemporary hits, following a format similar to KPLZ and KUBE, Ramsey said. But the station also has departed somewhat into what Ramsey terms, "mainstream alternative" music. Coining the

slogan, "Today's Rock," KGRG plays alternative tunes on the verge of becoming popular tunes.

THE STATION relays those tunes into Fife, Enumclaw, Puyallup, Sumner and Orting from a transmitter at Lake Tapps in Pierce County.

Federal Way is still somewhat of a hazy market for the station, which relies on listener contributions and sponsorship from local businesses to operate its \$9,000-a-year program.

The FM signal gets lost in some pockets of Federal Way, Ramsey said, and requests from high schools in the area haven't been coming in as he would like. But all that is due to change

soon, he said.

The station currently is applying to the Federal Communications Commission to increase its wattage to 500. That should clear up the weak signals in some parts of Federal Way.

The high school dance scene also is looking up. No date has been set yet, but Federal Way High School has expressed an interest, mainly due to the efforts of Mitch Cook, a Federal Way resident and KGRG disc-jockey. COOK AND four other KGRG DJs from Federal Way are tuned in to listeners in their home town.

"Most of the students in Federal Way are starting to catch on to it," said Cook, a 19-year-old graduate of Federal Way High.

"And the dances are a major way to get our name out," Cook

continued. "We want to get into all the schools over there (in Federal Way)," he said.

At the same time KGRG may be gaining a good name in Federal Way, Federal Way may be nurturing a good name for KGRG.

Mark Bottorff, another KGRG DJ from Federal Way, landed an internship with KVI AM Radio in Seattle in the promotions department, and the station recently offered him a job.

"This is a training facility," Ramsey explained.

"We're not 100 percent perfect, but we sound really good for a community college radio station. We're never going to be a 50,000-watt station serving all of western America, but we'll settle for getting in real well to the areas we want to reach," Ramsey said.

Knife-wielding man tries to rob eatery

A masked man armed with a knife attempted to rob a Federal Way restaurant early Wednesday morning but had to settle for an employee's wallet.

Employees at Diamond Jim's told King County police a man wearing a navy blue ski mask entered the bar from the kitchen area armed with a 4-inch knife. He took the wallet from a female bartender's purse and then tried to open the cash register.

When employees told him the cash was in a drop-safe for which they had no combination, he left. A waitress followed him out of the restaurant and saw a second masked man.

The two men left in an unknown direction and a police perimeter search and K-9 unit were unable to find them. Police lifted fingerprints from the restaurant safe that had been touched by the first man.

The man with the knife is

described as white, 25 years old, standing 5 feet 6 inches and weighing 135 pounds. He has dark brown hair and wore a gray jacket as well as the navy blue ski mask. The second man is described as white, 5 feet 10 inches tall and weighing 160. He wore a red ski mask and dark jacket.

Woman attacked in business office

A secretary at a Federal Way construction business was attacked and robbed by a man who posed as a customer.

King County police reports state that the woman told officers a man came into the office at 5 p.m. last Friday as she was closing, and said his mother needed a house.

As he was talking to her, she said, he grabbed her twice before taking her to another room in the business, where what happened next is unclear, reports state. The woman was extremely upset and had trouble

relating what happened, police said. Co-workers arrived to comfort her and find out what happened, but had no luck getting any more information from her. They also told police they believed she was holding back information that upset her.

The woman had a bruise and scrape on her chest and a red mark on her face where she may have been struck. She declined any medical attention.

She could describe her attacker, who stole her wallet before he left, only as a black man 25 to 30 years old.

Helpless woman robbed of jewelry

A stroke victim living in a Federal Way nursing home was robbed of more than \$20,000 in jewelry, some of it taken directly off her fingers.

A grandson of the woman told King County police that he was contacted by nursing home staff Feb. 2 and told of some missing jewelry. He declined to notify police at that time. He elected instead to try to remove his grandmother's remaining valuable ring and put it into safekeeping. He and staff were unable to get the ring off,

however.

On a subsequent visit, the grandson noticed that the ring had been removed and was missing, and called police.

The grandson told police his grandmother had a stroke two months ago and lost the ability to speak and no longer recognizes anyone and would be unable to help identify who stole her jewelry.

He also said the only people who had access to her room were family members and nursing home staff.

Man tries to entice girl into his pickup

An 8-year-old Federal Way girl told police a man offered her \$20 to get into his pickup truck.

King County police report the girl was riding her bicycle at about 11 a.m. Tuesday morning and had stopped for a moment to rest on the 1600 block of South 308th Street. A man in a light silver-blue small pickup truck with a white canopy stopped and asked her to get in. She refused

and he asked again, this time offering her money.

The girl refused again and went home to tell her grandfather what happened.

The driver of the truck is described as white, 30-40 years old with blond hair. He was wearing a shirt that looked like a gas station uniform with some type of badge on it.

Hidden recorder found in bedroom

A Federal Way woman discovered Monday that the walls — or in her case, the furniture — have ears.

The 28-year-old woman told King County police she discovered a voice-activated tape-recorder taped to the underside of a bedroom nightstand. She contacted her lawyer first, who advised her to contact police.

During the investigation, the woman told police she suspected the recorder may have been placed in her bedroom by a friend of the family who had ac-

cess to the home but recently had become estranged. Police contacted the man and the incident has been resolved to the woman's satisfaction, police said. No charges have been filed.

its 50-foot ladder.

The new engine made the backside of the building accessi-

ble to firefighters, and was able to instantly douse some flames, said Johnson.

"The damages to the building are a couple hundred-thousand

dollars, and the price of the truck was a couple hundred-thousand dollars," he said. "And the dollar loss could have been much greater — I figure the truck just paid for itself."

The Greystone Apartments are expected to open March 15.

As at the apartment fire, no injuries or explosions resulted from a gas leak at South 296th Place and Third Place South on Tuesday afternoon.

FIFTEEN homes were affected by the leak that began in a separated gas main nearby, said Bob Adams, spokesman for

Washington Natural Gas. The Federal Way fire department evacuated residents from the eight or nine homes where people were present.

The gas leak was reported to the fire department by representatives of Washington Natural Gas after a resident complained late that morning of gas smells.

The cause of the leak has not been determined, said Adams. It was repaired at about 2:30 and residents returned to their homes at 4 p.m., although four or five homes did not have gas until early evening.

fall, Duvernoy added.

Potential parks must have value as either wildlife habitat, scenic resources, shoreline access, community separators, recreation areas or agricultural lands, Duvernoy said.

"Federal Way has one of the most regionally significant open spaces in the county — the Hylebos wetlands," said King County Councilmember Cynthia Sullivan, who heads the committee responsible for the bill.

Marchx said saving more of the Hylebos, part of which already is preserved by a state park, isn't enough, however.

SULLIVAN SAID the plan may actually put more parks in unincorporated areas than the present system.

Marchx said she would like to see Federal Way get the money it generates from the tax. King County cities are lobbying for a

similar proposal.

If the City of Seattle and other suburban cities are successful in lobbying the state Legislature, the county would lose control of money collected in those areas. It would be returned to the cities.

That would give Seattle between \$1.3 and \$2.6 million a year, Sullivan said. Federal Way's prorated share is about \$33,000.

On the other hand, the county council will keep control of the entire fund if it can convince the Legislature the proposed plan is better. Cities can apply for money subject to county council approval.

The proposal also requires any city or county receiving money for parks to match the amount, thus doubling the fund.

"The intention is to protect the unincorporated areas," Sullivan said.

Parks budget passed

After more than three months, the King County budget battle is over.

The county council fit the final piece in the \$668 million budget puzzle when it passed the \$8.1 million parks budget Tuesday. The budget passed unanimously with no comment from the council.

It will include over \$400,000 for buying open space near Marine Hills from the Federal Way Water and Sewer District, \$305,000 to light the Steel Lake ballfields and \$175,000 to purchase Federal Way Fire Station #4 near Steel Lake.

In Highline, the purchase list includes the old Lake Burien School site (\$130,000) and about \$700,000 development money for North Sea-Tac park.

All in all, the budget looks much the same as the one passed 8-1 in November by the county council. Only Councilmember Paul Barden voted against it.

County Executive Tim Hill vetoed that budget, saying it spent too much on parks and not enough on police.

That quickly escalated the budget fray into a partisan fight in which the five Democratic councilmembers removed the Marine Hills open space money from Republican Barden's district and put it into cops.

Hill then signed the main budget, but vetoed the parks section.

Monday's vote restores the entire parks budget, including the land near Marine Hills.

That land may not be available, however. Developer Andy Cratsenberg said he will offer \$490,000 when the water district puts the property up for

public bid.

The council has not yet decided what to do with the \$400,000 if it loses the water district property. Cratsenberg has said he may sell or donate some of the land back to the county if he is successful in purchasing it.

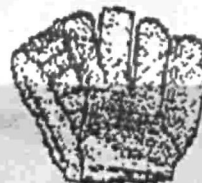

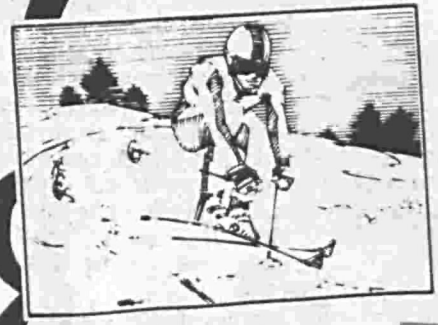

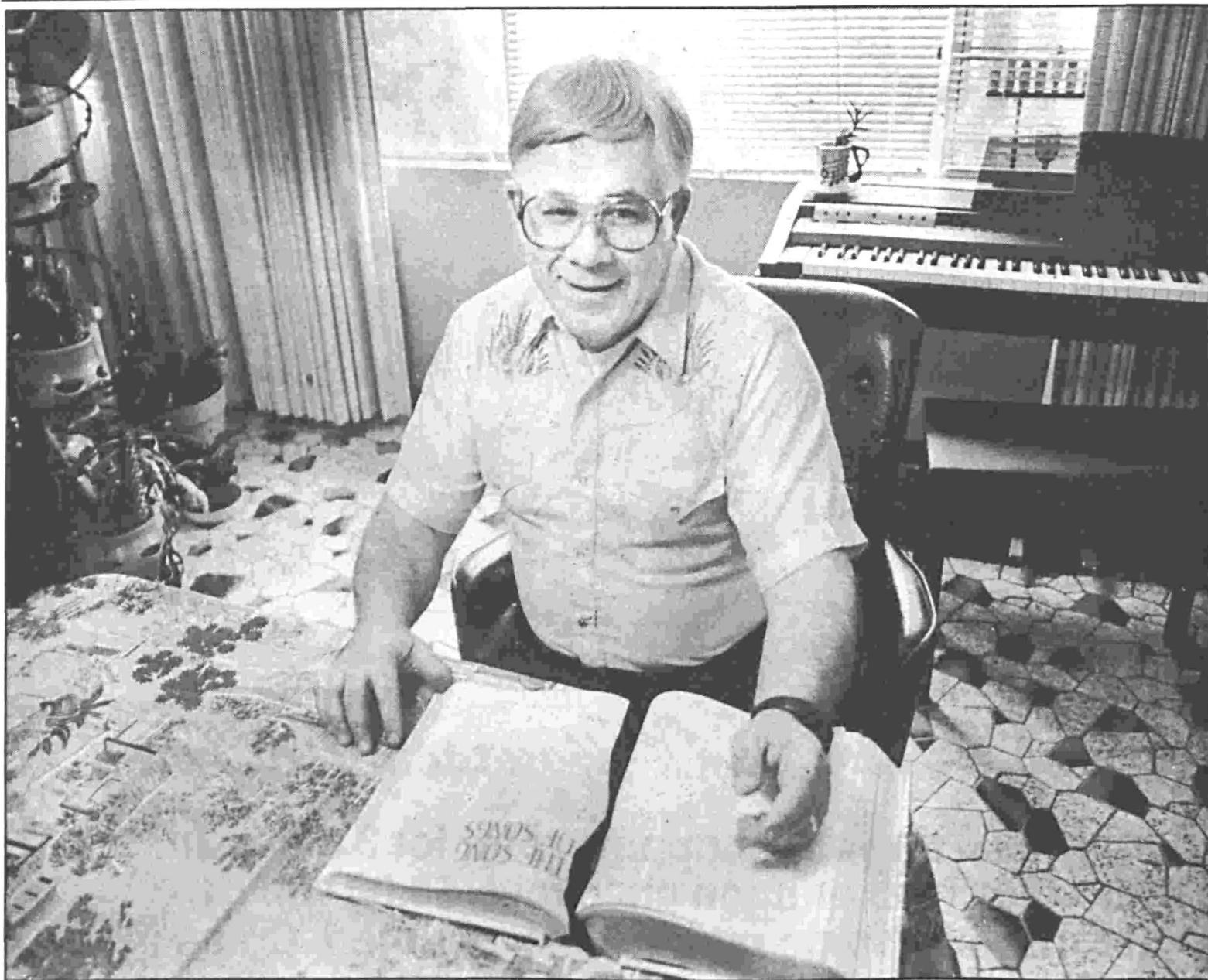

Jews in south end want own temple

Being close to a Jewish temple has always been important to Elaine and Roy Golub. So much so that when faced with buying a new home, they always made sure a temple was nearby before purchasing.

Havurah, or group of friends for the past three years. The group's original purpose was to gather for educational and social purposes. Each year, they tackled a special project.

Last year's task was to write letters of support to Jewish families in eastern European countries. The group wrote letters galore, but never received any responses.

So this year, it decided to support Jewish families a little closer to home by pushing for the formation of an independent Jewish temple in South King County.

So great was the response that the group outgrew its meeting place at its first meeting. The next of the monthly gatherings will be at 7:30 p.m., March 17, in the Green River Room of the Kent Commons.

The idea of reaching into the south end, Golub explained, came when the Seattle Jewish Federation identified 200 Jewish families here, most of whom were finding it difficult to participate regularly in Jewish worship services.

ESTIMATES SAY that 80 percent of the south end's Jewish population does not attend ser-

vices regularly because of the distances involved.

Melissa Brooks is a Federal Way mother of two young children. She considers herself a member of Temple Beth El in Tacoma, but says that as a King County resident, she doesn't identify geographically with the temple.

"We don't feel part of the Tacoma community," she said, explaining why a local temple is important to her. Also, her children are getting close to the age where they need to go to the temple for Jewish education classes, and she isn't looking forward to the commute.

The south end group still has several years to go before it can be considered a full-fledged congregation. It could take as many as three years to get a full-time rabbi, Golub said, though rabbinical students could provide support until then.

RABBIS ARE not required for services though. Golub himself led Friday's brief service, which was aimed at children.

The congregation-to-be still has many decisions to make, such as what sort of congregation it will be. Many of the people at Friday's program

speculated it will become a reform congregation. Golub, however, was reluctant to commit to that this early.

Reform Jews, like their Christian counterparts, the Protestants, have dropped much of the ceremony that attached itself to worship over the years.

"The Jewish religion isn't so much what you do as how you act," Golub said. He is reform himself.

He also pointed out that there is a moderate reconstructionist movement going on within the Jewish faith, so it could go that way, too.

The most immediate goal of the new group is to hold high holiday services for the upcoming holiday, Passover, which begins April 20.

The March 17 meeting will celebrate the Feast of Purim, or the thwarting of King Ahasuerus's plan to exterminate the Jews throughout the Persian Empire in 400 B.C.E. (Before the Christian Era).

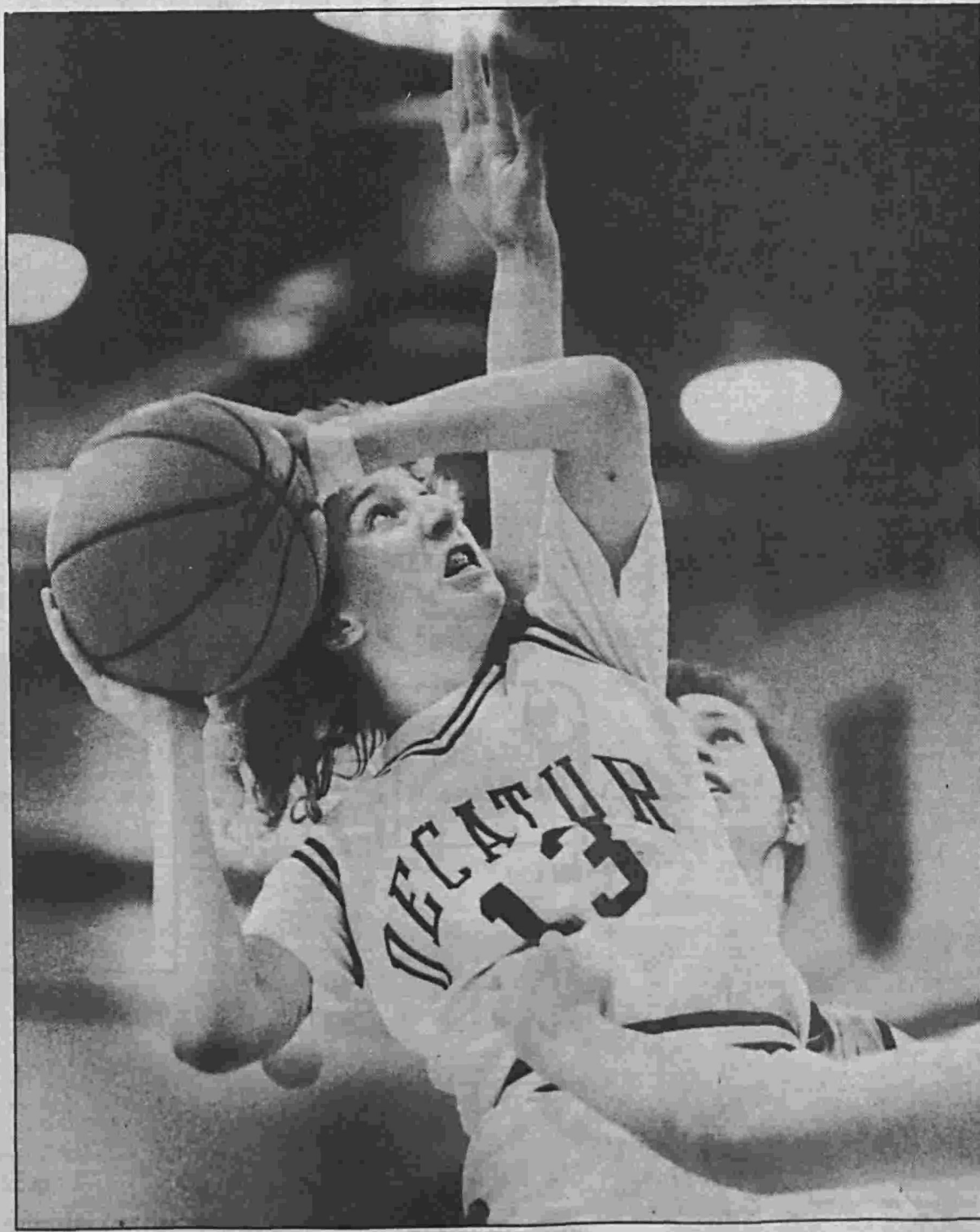

Chuck and Kelly Czubin play two different roles when they're on and off the basketball court.

In the gym, Chuck plays the role of head coach of the Federal Way girls' basketball team and Kelly is his starting high post player.

Off the court, the coach becomes father and the player turns into daughter.

"The toughest thing about having your kid on your team is you can't take it home with you," said Chuck, who recently was named SPSL co-coach of the Year. "You've got to have a separation between what goes on here and what goes on at home."

Kelly, one of the key performers on a league championship team that enters West Central District play at 8:30 tonight at Clover Park against Kent-Meridian (a 60-36 winner over Bellarmine), has grown accustomed to her and her father's two roles.

"It's like two hours a day he's my coach and the rest of the day he's my dad," she said.

Although the two have learned to adapt to the different roles, Kelly sometimes has difficulty deciding whether to call her father "Coach Czubin" or "Dad."

"It was a real good experience," explained Kim, now a freshman at the University of Washington. "He's a real good coach. It was a total separate thing. When I played basketball, he was coach. He wasn't my dad."

SUCCESS SEEMS to have

followed Czubin wherever he goes. As junior varsity coach at Highline High School, his teams compiled a remarkable won-loss record of 120-9 and also put together a 67-game win streak.

Czubin also has been head track coach at Highline Community College for five years and an assistant there under Don McConaughy for several more, head track coach at Highline High School for seven years, and a football official for 29 years, including 16 in the Pac-

10. He also works the sideline chain gang for the Seattle Seahawks at home games. To top it off, his teams at Federal Way have qualified to West Central District tournament action all three years he has been there as head coach. This year they ended Puyallup's five-year reign as league champions by taking the title. And last year, the Eagles snapped a 77-game SPSL Puyallup win streak.

Now, the Eagles are one victory away from qualifying to the

state tournament. The last time they went to state was Bushaw's last year as head coach.

"He demands a lot from everybody, not just one person," explained Kelly.

WHILE CHUCK stressed the importance of leaving basketball at the gym at night, his daughter says that doesn't always happen.

"It goes home right with us at the dinner table," she said. "What I'm doing wrong and what I need to improve on."



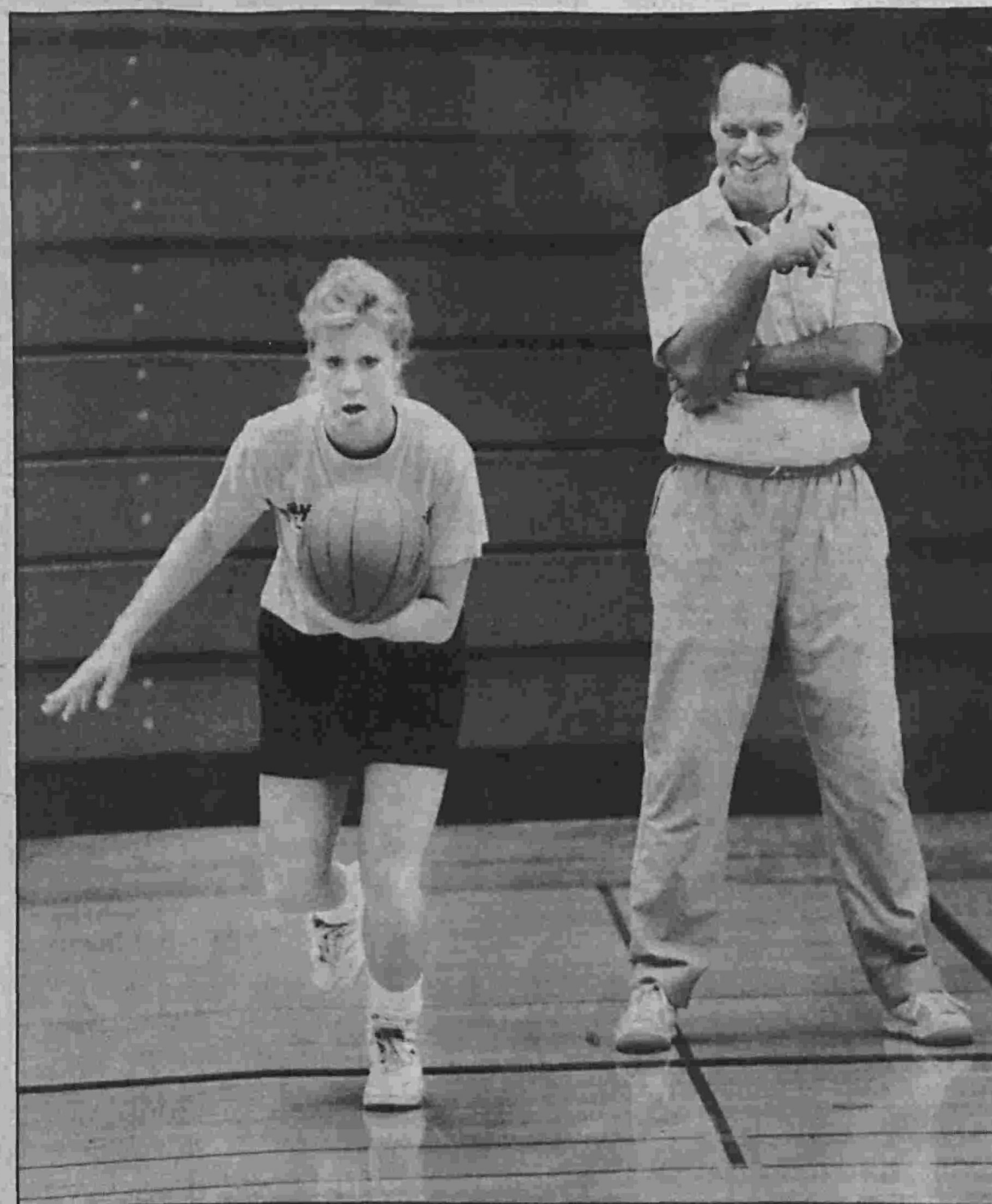
Athlete of the Week

Program for pregnant women, children gets a boost

Children and pregnant women from low-income families in the Federal Way area will be eating healthier diets in the months to come, thanks to an increase in funding for the Women, Infants, and Children program (WIC) in this part of King County.

Betty Clemen, who is with the State Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS), reports that for 1989 around \$80,000 in new funds was appropriated for King County WIC programs as a result of a slight increase in federal funds and state money from the 1988 legislative session.

Because of the funding increase, the South Public Health Center, located in Auburn with a satellite clinic in Federal Way, will be able to serve 350 more WIC clients in 1989 than it could handle in 1988.

WIC is a government program that provides healthy food for low-income women who are pregnant, breastfeeding, or have children under the age of 3. In order to be eligible, the mother or the child must have a dietary health concern, such as low weight, insufficient iron level, or a history of abnormal pregnancy for the mother.

Medical professionals at WIC clinics screen potential clients, free of charge, to determine if they have a dietary problem that will qualify them for WIC assistance.

"Pregnant women and infants are two of the groups that are at high risk for iron and calcium deficiency," says Dr. Faye Dong, of the University of Washington's Institute for Food Science and Technology. "It is very important that they receive the proper nutrients."

When accepted into the program, WIC clients are provided with vouchers every month which can be used to purchase the following: 28 quarts of milk or cheese; two dozen eggs; six cans of frozen juice; 18 ounces of beans, peas, or peanut butter; 36 ounces of low-sugar, high-iron cereal.

These types of foods are vital in the diets of children and pregnant or breastfeeding women. The WIC coordinator for Seattle and King County, Shirley Hutchison, knows that the program cannot meet all the dietary needs of children and pregnant women. "It is very

much a supplement," she said. Because WIC clients are on their own for rounding out a proper diet, WIC clinics also provide nutritional counseling, and even a few basic health care services.

Clients may simultaneously be eligible for food stamps. But unlike food stamps, which have been criticized because they are easy to abuse, WIC enjoys an excellent reputation for putting healthy food into the mouths of those who really need it, according to Hutchison.

She notes that WIC is highly regarded because it is cost-effective and more difficult to abuse. Clients choose the foods they will buy from a brief list of items, which are specified by brand name to ensure that the foods purchased are indeed healthy.

BECAUSE of lack of funding, Hutchison estimates that WIC nationally serves only 47 percent of those mothers who are eligible. Consequently, she is excited when additional funding becomes available for WIC to serve more clients, as is the case now.

Karate coach admits sex charge

A Federal Way karate instructor charged with indecent liberties and child molesting last December pleaded guilty in King County Superior Court Wednesday.

Terry Lee Faircloth, 29, was accused of sexually touching a 12-year-old student at the Academy of Martial Arts and asking her to fondle his genitals when he drove her home.

he chose to plead guilty only because he could not afford to fight the charges in court.

Faircloth's karate school is the largest in the Northwest, with more than 100 students. Last year students took 14 awards in regional contests for best school, Faircloth said.

Deputy Prosecutor Raymond McFarland said he will recommend 20 months in jail and counseling for Faircloth at sentencing, but said the state could consider reducing that recommendation if Faircloth receives treatment for sexual deviance.

Faircloth said his business is split almost evenly between children and adult students. From now on, he will teach only adult classes and hand over the children's classes to an assistant.
