## Rate hike

### Sewer bills will go up

Federal Way Water and Sewer District commissioners approved a 39-percent sewer rate increase Tuesday.

The increase raises sewer rates for residential customers from \$9.50 a month to \$13 a month. It raises rates for commercial customers from the existing \$9.50 for the first 500 cubic feet of water used and an additional \$1 for each additional 100 cubic feet of water used to a new rate that charges each commercial customer a base rate of \$9.50 plus \$1.40 for each 100 cubic feet of water used.

The rate increase, which had been under consideration for months, will go into effect April 1.

Rate increases are needed primarily to help pay for the \$34.1 million Lakota secondary sewage treatment plant now under construction.

The sewer rate increases will still make the Federal Way district the sixth lowest in charges among 50 utilities in the Puget Sound area surveyed by the district.

The new rates are intended to last through 1990, according to commissioners. However, one commissioner questioned whether the new rate will be sufficient to raise enough revenue to cover district expenditures through 1990.

THE NEW rates assume that the district will grow by at least 6 percent through that same time period. That growth estimate may be too ambitious, said Commissioner Bev Tweddle.

Last year, the Federal Way district grew by only about 5 percent. If incorporation is approved by Federal Way voters in the March 14 vote-by-mail election, Tweddle predicted the new city will clamp down tighter on growth and development.

"It appears to be that incorporation is going to go through," Tweddle said. "The 6 percent growth rate is very much on the high side. It's still on the high side if incorporation doesn't go through."

Tweddle suggested the board put a moratorium on all discretionary expenses, such as minor capital expenditures, all hiring of new employees and on all major capital expenditures until the third quarter of 1989.

The district should have a better estimate by then of what the real growth rate is, she said.

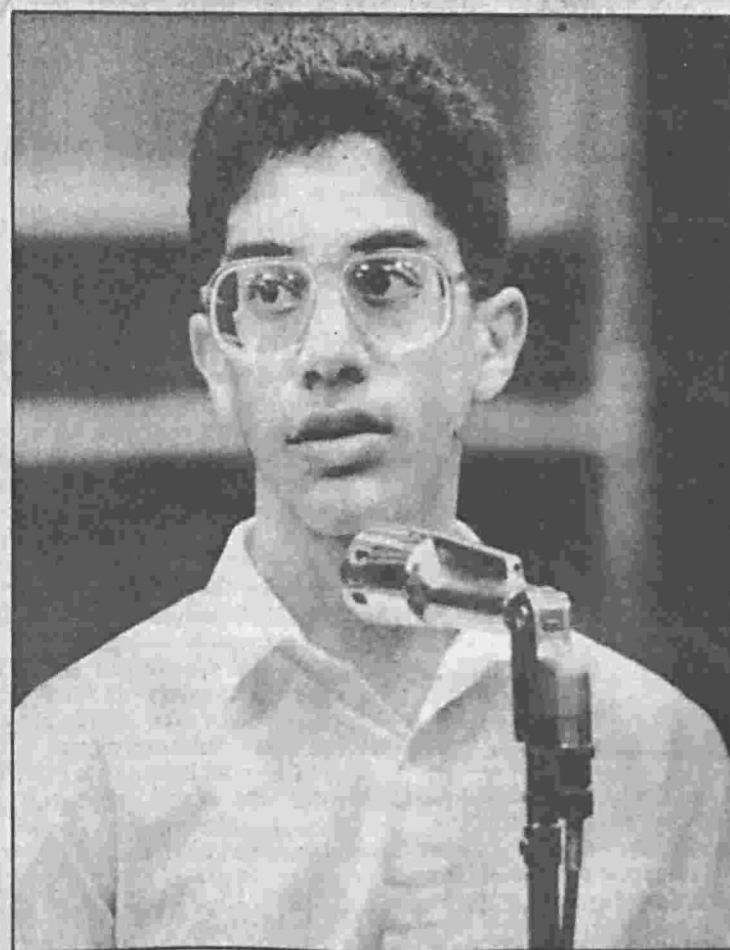

## City foe piqued by pamphlet printing

Six days before the March 14 incorporation election, a Federal Way cityhood opponent is criticizing the typography used in the voter's pamphlet, citing, among other things, that dashes were used.

Long-time incorporation opponent Vern Benson said at a hastily announced press conference attended by three reporters Wednesday that he objects to the pamphlet's pro-incorporation statement because it violates King County administrative rules for voter's pamphlets.

The Federal Way First! statement uses dashes in front of three statements. That violates administrative rules, Benson said.

In addition, the Federal Way First! statement has 43 words that are all in capital letters, which is also a violation of the administrative rules, Benson said. Rules say words can be

## Public missing reorganization bus

Until the general public begins to raise a fuss over the Metro Council, it's likely nothing much about the sprawling sewer and transportation agency will change, says one local legislator.

Legislators and other elected officials have been trying to reorganize the Metro Council for years, claiming it is too big, lacks fair representation and — because it is entirely federated — lacks accountability for the millions of taxpayer dollars it spends each year.

But so far their fervor has not been matched by the public. More public outcry is needed to spur enough lawmakers into action and force change, say those who have pushed hardest for that change.

## Hearings scheduled

Locally, the hearings are scheduled for 7:30 p.m. May 5 in the Kent Senior Center and May 15 at Highline Community College.

last week overwhelmingly approved a Metro reorganization bill, 96-1. But that's still not cause for celebration, said Rep. Jean Marie Brough (R-30th). The House did the same thing last year, but that bill died in committee in the Senate.

That scenario is likely to repeat itself, she warned those attending a county government forum Wednesday in Federal Way.

Brough joined Kent Mayor Dan Kelleher, King County 2000 member Debbie Ertel and King County Councilman Paul Barden on a panel that discussed proposed changes to Metro and King County government.

House Bill 2030, sponsored by Rep. Lorraine Hine (D-33rd) and seven other representatives, was the only one of five bills before the Legislature to survive the Local Government Committee.

But HB 2030, which would reduce the Metro Council to 15 from 40 and make three of those positions directly elected ones, may face the same fate as the Senate bill that died in the Senate

last year. "IT STANDS virtually little or no chance in the Senate," Brough said. "They perceive no public outcry against Metro."

Several hearings and forums on the reorganization have been sponsored countywide, but those in attendance have generally represented county, Metro and elected officials, or officials of agencies who work with Metro.

There also has been lobbying from Eastside cities, such as Mercer Island, Bellevue and Kirkland, to keep the federated structure. Those cities currently benefit from Metro's alignment and would stand to lose some representation on the council if it is restructured.

Three Eastside senators, Alan Bluechel (R-45th), Emilio Cantu

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## Past makes points at local pub

The Scoreboard Pub has gambled on its future by betting on its past.

The 7-year-old Federal Way tavern moved down the street Tuesday and opened for business as the first tenant in the new Neon Plaza at 1200 S. 324th St.

Irreconcilable differences with the landlord at Century Square formed the impetus to change locations, said Ron Zaffino, co-owner of the Scoreboard.

Although moving always presents somewhat of a business risk, community support and the pub's history in Federal Way should help keep business healthy, Zaffino said.

Zaffino is one reason the pub's community ties reach back far into Federal Way history, even though the pub is a fairly young establishment.

He and two other graduates of Federal Way High School, Steve Hanson and Ed Barkow, opened the pub together in 1982, filling what they saw as a need in Federal Way for a sports-themed tavern.

BARKOW WAS bought out two years ago and Hanson, who taught for a time at Kilo and Sacajawea junior high schools, has since moved to Morton to teach.

Hanson remains co-owner, but it is Zaffino who has stuck around to oversee the tavern, remember when the three used to play baseball together and keep other Federal Way sports memories alive at the pub.

Jeannie Jevas, a Decatur High graduate, and manager Lisa Tisdell, who attended Thomas Jefferson, have worked at the Scoreboard on the pub's start. They help Zaffino stay on top of current events.

For instance, when the girls swim team from Federal Way High won the league championship last year, the crew at the Scoreboard posted a notice on the pub's readerboard, joking that the team's coach, Al Hopenrath, should be fired.

"THE FIRST year (Hopenrath) taught, I was in his P.E. class," Zaffino said. "That was a way to pay him back for all those years in school."

Then Zaffino asked the coach for a photo of the winning team to add to the pub's collection.

The Scoreboard has dozens of framed photographs lining the walls — pictures of people play-

ing baseball, basketball and football.

"It's just a big composite of some real famous people like Mickey Mantle and some faces that are popular but may be only recognized in here," said Zaffino.

"The toughest thing we have finding is pictures of women and sports," Zaffino said.

Currently, the high school swim team and a 1988 women's basketball team from the University of Washington are the only ones to boast about, he said. So if anyone has a picture to share, Zaffino would consider displaying it.

The Scoreboard tries to cater to sports enthusiasts of all kinds, "from horseracing fans to recreational volleyball players," Zaffino said.

THE PUB sports eight TVs, including a big screen, which show sporting events 90 percent of the time, usually several events at once.

In addition, the Scoreboard sponsors four softball tournaments a year and assists in sponsoring about 25 teams, ranging from basketball and football to volleyball and darts.

During the summer, the pub hosts a golf tournament every month and, for the past five

years, it has sponsored a trip to Reno every spring. Interest in that venture has grown from about 15 people the first year to 135 who signed up this year.

Although the pub's sports haven't waned because of the move, Scoreboard operations are not quite up to speed. The kitchen and walk-in refrigerator are not complete yet, and grand opening festivities will have to wait until they are, Zaffino said.

When everything is ready, the pub will have a full-service kit-

chen to compliment its 800-900-square-foot bar area, along with a shuffleboard table, two pool tables, two dart boards and pull-tab games.

The Scoreboard has been successful by recognizing that playing the game is only half the fun for amateur athletes. The other half comes during post-game gatherings.

"Adult amateur athletics... are often times as social as they are competitive," Zaffino said.

The Scoreboard Pub has learned to cater to both sides.

### At the Movies

#### "DANGEROUS LIAISONS"

Sexual and emotional games are the subjects of "Dangerous Liaisons." John Malkovich and Glenn Close play 18th Century French aristocrats who are associates and self-proclaimed masters of betrayal and sexual gamesmanship. The games they play are humorous, but eventually lead to a tragic ending. The dialogue is shockingly enjoyable and much of the movie is decadent fun. Nonetheless, the movie preaches a timeless message: human emotions are not to be trifled with so callously. Rated R. "Dangerous Liaisons" is playing at SeaTac North.

#### "THE NAKED GUN"

Leslie Nielsen and Priscilla Presley in this zany film from the comedic tradition of the "Police Squad" series. You're bound to laugh at least at some of the non-stop antics, no matter how stupid and how tasteless some of the jokes and slapstick humor are. It doesn't matter what the plot

is. Nielsen and co-star Priscilla Presley (making her film debut) obviously have fun in a world where Laurel and Hardy would fit. An impressive list of celebrities agreed to make fun of themselves by appearing in the film, including George Kennedy, O.J. Simpson, Jennifer James, Ricardo Montalban and several TV sportscasters. "The Naked Gun" is rated PG-13 and is playing at Gateway Center.

#### "RAIN MAN"

"Rain Man" is a classic contrast between character playing and character stereotyping. Tom Cruise plays his usual slick self, this time a high-strung Los Angeles businessman. Dustin Hoffman is his autistic math genius brother. Hoffman's performance, as usual, is impeccable. The two brothers meet, essentially for the first time, when their father dies and leaves his fortune to the autistic's institution. Cruise's character kidnaps him as leverage and as a way out of his latest business failure. The two set out on a cross-country road trip in dad's classic convertible — it's a rocky road into the sunset. Hoffman fans will love "Rain Man," which is rated R and is playing at SeaTac North.

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# House is firmly behind reorganization of Metro

(R-41st) and Dan McDonald (R-48th), have created a "political lock" on the issue, Barden said.

If the Legislature fails to pass a law to force Metro to reorganize, then the county will pick up the fight, Barden said. Although the Legislature created Metro, the county can put a charter amendment on a general election ballot and ask voters if they want to change the Metro Council.

Barden said he doesn't foresee such an amendment until the 1990 election. Trying to get

enough citizen opinion on the issue by this fall would be pushing it, he said.

Putting Metro on the ballot also might force the Legislature to take action in 1990, Barden added.

BUT METRO isn't the only target of reorganization talks. Although voters rejected the idea in 1979, most officials still agree the final goal is to combine Metro with the King County Council. King County 2000 has come up with such a plan, as has King County Councilman Greg Nickels, among others.

Nickels' plan is the most re-

cent to surface. It calls for consolidating Metro and the county council, creating a nine-member, non-partisan council.

King County 2000 goes a step further by restructuring the county council districts into six criss-crossing districts. Three would run east-west and three would run north-south, with one representative from each district plus three at-large positions.

People would vote for a council rep in the north-south district

in which they live and one in the east-west district in which they live. They also would vote on each of the three at-large positions, giving them a say in five of the nine council members, Ertel explained. Making all positions elected also would solve accountability problems, she added.

Once the new county council was settled, Metro duties would be phased in, as would two new at-large council members, bringing the total to 11 and the

number of positions on which voters would have a say to seven.

BUT BARDEN said that plan could have just the opposite of its intended effect. The at-large positions could probably be considered givens for Seattle, which has the largest and strongest voter base. And it is conceivable, he said, that representatives from several of the east-west, north-south districts could come from Seattle.

"That gives you seven out of

nine from Seattle," he said.

Ertel admitted that the at-large seats could easily end up as Seattle-dominated seats, but said it doesn't have to be that way. Voters in less densely populated areas need to create a more unified voice.

"There is no established voter base in the suburbs as there is in Seattle, but the opportunity is there," Ertel said. "It's going to be up to the citizens. They're just going to have to work harder for it."

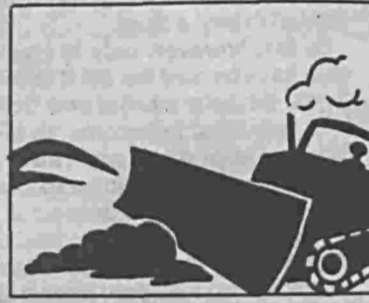
King County officials have determined that the construction of three apartment buildings with 48 units at 28602 16th Ave. S. does not require preparation of an environmental impact statement.

## Woman says crowd watched rape occur

An 18-year-old woman told King County police she was raped by two men March 1 while a group of five more stood and watched.

The woman said she and her female cousin had attended a concert and stopped by a south Federal Way residence for a party afterward. She told police she walked into a bedroom and was thrown to the bed by one man, who began to undress her.

The woman said she struggled and asked the man to stop, but he kept trying to undress her and he finally was aided in

removing her clothes by some of the other men in the room.

The first man then raped her while another man simultaneously sodomized her, she said. Meanwhile, the other men in the room stood and watched, despite her pleas for help.

When they were finished raping her, the woman said the men simply left the room. She dressed, found her cousin and began walking home, police reports state.

The county special assault unit is investigating the incident.

"If we don't do that I'm concerned we'll have a substantial shortfall," she said.

MANY OF the district's budgeted capital projects are scheduled to occur before the third quarter of 1989 because most construction must be done during the drier summer months, responded Steve Wieneke, district director of engineering.

Other commissioners said there was no need for a moratorium and did not act on Tweddle's suggestion.

The district can raise rates again before the end of 1990 or opt to cut some capital projects later if a revenue shortfall materializes, said Board President Leonard "Doc" Thompson.

"I think we're going to be OK," said Commissioner Bob Piquette.

Only one resident attended Tuesday's meeting to comment on the rate increase.

District resident Walt Lind-

berg said the district should consider a more fair way of charging residential customers than just charging a base rate of \$13 for each customer.

RESIDENTIAL sewer charges should be based on water use just like commercial sewer charges are, Lindberg said.

Lindberg said he is single and lives in his home alone. He is paying the same amount for sewer service as a family of eight, he said.

"This is unjust," Lindberg said.

Also, charging people according to how much water they use will encourage water conservation, he said.

The district may consider charging by the amount of water used in 1990, said Jim Miller, district general manager.

Meanwhile, construction on the \$34.1 million Lakota treatment plant is proceeding, but is about two months behind schedule because of the unex-

pected snow and other bad weather this winter.

The plant is about 30 percent completed.

It was originally scheduled to begin operations by January 1990, but that date may now be pushed back until at least the end of February 1990, according to Larry Julius, the district's project manager for the plant.

The main contractor on the job, Pease and Sons, is asking the district for another eight weeks to complete the plant, Julius said.

District officials are meeting with the construction management consultants, HDR Engineering Inc., to decide if the construction delays are justified.

The state Department of Ecology (DOE) had given the district until January 1990 to have secondary sewage treatment on line at the plant. However, district officials are meeting with DOE officials to see if the state will allow a

delay.

The entire plant, including landscaping and tennis courts that are part of the project, was scheduled to be completed by the end of August 1990. That date might also be delayed.

MUCH OF the concrete work on the plant has been completed, Julius said. Soon, some of the permanent equipment for the plant will be brought to the site.

Construction on a new administration building for the plant will begin this spring and will be finished by the end of the summer. The district plans to hire another 15 people this year, most of whom will work at the new treatment plant.

The new plant, at 3045 Dash Point Road, will double the existing facility's capacity from 5 million gallons of effluent processed each day to 10 million gallons.

The effluent discharged into the Puget Sound will be 10 times cleaner than the current discharge.

## City critic says pamphlet is profane, vulgar

italicized, but not all capitalized, he said.

"This is not a joke," Benson said.

However, the administrative rules Benson cited do not apply to county or local elections, said Bob Bruce, King County elections superintendent.

The rules did apply to candidate races in the 1988 general election, but do not apply to Federal Way's incorporation election, Bruce said, even though those rules were mistakenly distributed to members of the committees that wrote pro and con statements.

Benson also said the Federal Way First! statements are

"profane, vulgar and defamatory."

The Federal Way First! statement is profane in that it shows contempt for King County when it states that "development is out of control in Federal Way," Benson said.

He did not identify what statements are vulgar.

The pro-incorporation statement defames the opposition by stating "the opposition does not trust the people to govern themselves," Benson said.

Benson, a retired Army reserve officer, said some members of Voters Want Facts, a new group he has formed, are considering contacting King County elections officials, the King County Prosecuting At-

torney, the state Attorney General and the state Public Disclosure Commission about the administrative rules violations and about "inaccuracies" in fliers distributed by Federal Way First!.

Benson, who lives outside the cityhood boundaries, could not identify the members who might contact authorities or even how many members the new group has.

Representatives of Federal Way First! said the use of

bulleted items and capitalized words is not unusual in voter's pamphlets. Also, the statements were submitted to the county, which oversaw coordination and typesetting of pamphlets.

"It just seems to me it's a case of sour grapes," said Jim Handmacher, Federal Way First! legal counsel. "Vern Benson did not help prepare the opposition statement. He's not a resident of the proposed city. His comments can be safely ignored."

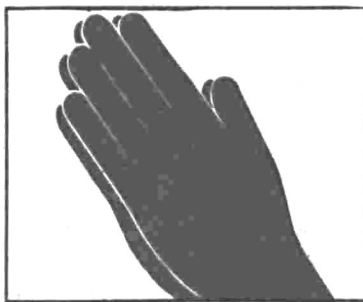

## Caregivers cast off training wheels

The Federal Way Community Caregiving Network has what it takes to incorporate — a board of directors and \$325 for the filing fees.

"We're incorporating now matter what the rest of Federal Way does," said Paul Owens, a board member and representative of Good Shepherd Episcopal.

The caregiving network first formed in May 1987 to see what could be done to unify the emergency resources available in Federal Way. Kathleen Parks and Nancy McEleney, two of the earliest members, explained at the time that their church, Calvary Lutheran, was seeing a rise in the number of people asking for help.

A check of other community churches revealed the same thing — a church running a food bank here, a church with a clothing bank there, but no one central referral service.

Because the idea initiated at Calvary Lutheran, counselors from that denomination's Lutheran Social Services were asked to help get the ball rolling.

IN APRIL 1988, the group held its first communitywide meeting. The attendance list read like a directory of the Federal Way faith community

Lutherans, Catholics, Baptists, Methodists, Episcopalians and Presbyterians all gathered together in Calvary's meeting hall that night.

Joleen Palmer and Naomi Maasberg were the Lutheran Social Services counselors sent to guide the group through its early days. They shared with the group their experiences in similar networks and speculated about its future.

Maasberg cautioned the varied membership not to let doctrinal differences stand in the way of a great idea.

Last Tuesday, speaking to the network's board of directors, Maasberg repeated that advice for the last time.

"Recognize that you have differences — respect them — and search out the commonalities," she said. "What drives you may be different, but you're all here for the same thing."

AS OF TUESDAY, the Federal Way Community Caregiving Network was standing on its own. Maasberg and Palmer of Lutheran Social Services relinquished "The Big

File" containing much of the administrative data compiled since the beginning of the project. Shirley Karli, a network board member and a representative of the Federal Way Food Bank, took the file because the network will have its office at the food bank.

It will post a person there and

will have its phone there as well. The phone, which will have call forwarding to pass on evening calls to volunteers, will receive emergency requests for gas, food, clothing — whatever it takes to help a person stranded after most businesses have closed.

The initial list of churches and agencies interested in participating in the network numbered 77. Everyone from churches to the Federal Way Senior Center to King County Councilman Paul Barden wanted to lend a hand.

So far, however, only 20 churches have fronted the \$25 it takes to join the network. But now that it is preparing to become an official non-profit corporation, chairman Louie Liu expects more groups to get active.

HE ENCOURAGED board members to go back to their churches to ask for financial help. John Metcalf, representing the Federal Way Community Council, is the only board member who doesn't represent a church.

The network hasn't spent the last year just getting organized,

though. Liu, who represents both Steel Lake Presbyterian and the Chinese Christian Fellowship, recently received a call from a Seattle divorce lawyer.

His client, a 17-year-old lifelong Federal Way resident, needed help. Her husband had sold her car and she needed bus fare to get to school in Auburn. She and her baby live in Federal Way with a friend. She earns rent by caring for her friend's child.

Steel Lake Presbyterian came up with the first month's bus fare, and Liu wanted to know if any other churches would help out with future passes.

In addition to providing direct help to the needy, the network has outlined a list of monthly goals to help it focus on the future.

THIS MONTH, the theme is Easter baskets for kids. If you have any baskets, stuffed toys, Easter grass, or tooth paste/brushes to spare, drop them off at the food bank, 31623 Pacific Highway S., before Easter, March 26.

The next community meeting of the caregiving network will be at 7:30 p.m., April 26, at Steel Lake Presbyterian Church, 1829 S. 308th St. For information, call the church office at 839-1210.

## Federal Way opens at state tourney with loss

When a team reaches the state tournament, it seems no lead is safe.

The Federal Way girls' basketball team learned that painful lesson Wednesday night at the state AAA tournament in the Seattle Center Arena as the Eagles saw a 14-point lead in the third quarter disappear in a 68-59 defeat to Fort Vancouver.

"It's like Kennedy all over again," said Federal Way coach Chuck Czubin, whose team lost a big lead and then the game to Kennedy in its previous outing in the West Central District tournament.

The loss dropped Federal Way into a loser-against game against Port Angeles last night (after press time). A victory over Port Angeles would keep Federal Way's hopes of winning a state trophy alive and it also would advance the Eagles into an afternoon game today at 2:30 against either Blanchet or Puyallup.

Fort Vancouver's 5-11 sophomore forward Tina Geis proved fatal for the Eagles. She entered the game with a scoring average of 14 points per game, but finished with 30. She hit four three-pointers in the second half as the Trappers staged their comeback.

"We're in a man-to-man, we should be able to stop 10 (Geis) outside," said Czubin, whose team held off several runs by Fort Vancouver before finally giving way in the end.

"We had some turnovers again out front right down the stretch that hurt us," he said. "It's like we self destruct. We can't fault the efforts the kids

turned in. They worked their butts off."

IT WAS EVIDENT from the beginning that the Eagles came to play. Shannon Sehlin, who led the Eagles in scoring with 18 points and in rebounding with 10, scored eight in the first quarter as Federal Way blazed out to a 21-13 lead.

"We played like we did against Lakes in the first half," said Czubin, referring to his team's 58-51 win over Lakes in the South Puget Sound League championship game.

The Eagle lead grew to as much as 33-19 at the 3:46 mark of the second quarter as guard Jenny Mahlstedt hit a three-pointer.

Michelle Noel, who combined with teammates Geis and Miki Graf to score 66 of Fort Vancouver's 68 points, hit two jumpers to bring the Trappers back to within nine at halftime, 34-25.

FORT VANCOUVER, which entered the game as champions of the Greater St. Helens League and the Southwest District with a 21-0 record, scored first to start the second half.

But Janelle Oakeley completed a three-point play by scoring on a breakaway and then hitting a foul shot to give Federal Way a 41-29 lead at the 4:06 mark.

Then Mahlstedt fed Brooke Edwards for a basket and Federal Way appeared to be in command at 43-29.

But the Trappers started a comeback late in the quarter as Geis hit her first of four three-pointers. Graf, a 6-1 sophomore center who scored 21 points, scored inside and added a free throw on a foul to close the

deficit to 46-41.

Geis hit another three-pointer with only six seconds left in the third quarter as Fort Vancouver trailed by just a 48-44 margin entering the fourth period.

FEDERAL WAY rebounded with baskets by Kelly Czubin and Cyndi Shahan to open the fourth quarter with a 52-44 lead. Geis answered for Fort Vancouver, however, as she hit back-to-back three-pointers to bring the Trappers to within two at 52-50.

She then tied the score at 52-52 with a steal and driving layup at the 6:11 mark. Geis fed Graf inside as Fort Vancouver took its first lead of the night at 54-52 with 5:08 remaining.

Edwards dropped in a shot at the 4:06 mark to bring Federal Way into its last tie at 54-54.

Federal Way was still within two at 59-57 at the 2:38 mark after Sehlin scored inside, but the Trappers went to Graf inside twice for close-range shots to extend the lead to 63-57 with 55 seconds left.

Edwards hit a pair of foul shots with 41 seconds remaining to cut the deficit to four points, but Fort Vancouver grabbed an offensive rebound after a missed free throw to wear Geis' time off the clock and Geis hit four three throws down the stretch to seal the victory.

CZUBIN was disappointed in his team's loss, but said he told his team to remember this game and think about a return trip to the state tournament.

"I thought we showed we could play with anybody," he said.

## Eagles' Mahlstedt heads All-News selections

It was a big year for girls' basketball in the Federal Way School District, and as a result this year's All-News team is brimming with talent.

Federal Way captured its first-ever South Puget Sound League championship and made it through the West Central District tournament into this week's state action, while Decatur finished only one game behind the Eagles in league play and made it as far as districts.

Thomas Jefferson did not make it to post-season play, but finished at a respectable 8-12 overall.

Leading Federal Way's charge into the state tournament was 5-9 junior guard Jenny Mahlstedt, and she has been named as the All-News Most Valuable Player.

Mahlstedt, who also earned the SPSL MVP award, was the Eagles' leading scorer with a 18-point average going into state, and she recorded a school record 107 assists for a 4.5 average. Mahlstedt also averaged five rebounds, and had 85 steals for a 3.5 average.

"She is the best in the league right now," said Decatur head

coach Gary Baker of Mahlstedt, who made the All-News first team last year as a Gator before moving.

DECATUR'S Kathy Laky earned her way onto this year's first team as a forward.

The 5-9 junior set the pace for the Gators with her 14.4 scoring average over 22 games and was second with rebounds at 10. She also led in steals with a 3.0 average.

"We could count on her open-court game," said Baker.

Shelley Richter, Decatur's 6-0 senior center, also landed a spot on the first team after averaging 11.5 points and a team-high 11 rebounds.

Another undisputed choice for the first team was Federal Way forward Kelly Czubin, a 5-11 junior.

Czubin, the daughter of Eagle head coach Chuck Czubin, averaged 7.5 points and a team-high 9.0 rebounds.

The guard talent was deep in the district this year, but the first team positions are going to Decatur senior Jana Medges and Federal Way junior Shannon Sehlin.

Medges drew a lot of respect throughout the district, and

averaged 6.5 points, 3.5 assists and 2.5 steals.

"Even though she didn't do a lot of the scoring, she did an awful lot for Decatur that you can't put in the stats," noted Thomas Jefferson coach Sam Mitchell.

"Jana toward the last half did as much as any other," said Baker. "She started controlling the ball for us and took control against the teams that were pressing us."

Sehlin was second for the Eagles in scoring behind Mahlstedt with a 9.0 average, and she averaged 6.0 rebounds and 1.5 assists.

"She is a penetrator, a driver and a shooter," said Czubin. "She takes the ball to the hoop."

TWO THOMAS Jefferson players were named to the second team in senior guard Karen Mings and sophomore post Barb Beesley.

Mings finished with an 8.5 scoring average for the Raiders, and led the team with her 6.0 rebounds and 2.0 steals.

Beesley, who stands at 5-9, had a big sophomore year for TJ. She led the Raiders with her 9.8 scoring average and also averaged 5.3 rebounds.

The second team center is Federal Way's Cyndi Shahan, a 6-0 senior.

Shahan hauled down an average of 8.0 rebounds while scoring at a 7.0 pace.

Joining Beesley at a second team forward position is Tanya Fischer, a 5-10 senior from Decatur.

Fischer averaged a solid 9.0 rebounds to go with her 6.0 scoring.

"With rebounds she was always there, and she gained confidence as a shooter," said Baker.

Also taking second-team honors are guards Janelle Oakeley of Federal Way and Kim Houston of Decatur, both juniors.

Oakeley averaged 5.5 points and 3.8 assists, with 92 total assists that put her over the previous school record with Mahlstedt. Houston scored at a 6.0 clip and averaged 2.5 assists.

"If we didn't have Oakeley we'd be in deep, deep trouble, and I'd say the same for Kim Houston at Decatur," said Czubin.

ALL-NEWS honorable men-

tion choices include Shannon Skorupa, a senior guard at TJ who was nominated for her defensive and ball-handling skills, and 8-0 Decatur backup center Shannon Barrett, a junior. Czubin described as "a real comer."

Also drawing honorable mention are Eagle post Jennifer Evans, a 5-9 junior, and TJ sophomore guards Julie Kikuchi and Darcy Neil.

The All-News team was chosen by the Federal Way News sports staff, with nominations made by area coaches.

## State soccer action on tap this weekend

Two local soccer teams will be playing for state titles for sure this weekend, but there possibly could be even more depending on how others fare in semifinal action.

# Museum opens officially tomorrow

By MELODIE STEIGER Although some local residents have had a sneak preview already, the Historical Society of Federal Way officially opens the doors to its temporary museum at SeaTac Mall tomorrow.

Its doors unofficially opened Tuesday afternoon. Historical society members had been hanging displays that day, and had left the hangar-like door of the shop partway open.

"We had to open a little after 1, because people were trying to get in. They were crawling under the door," said Shirley Charnell, president of the historical society. The museum, located near Sears where Children's Corner once was, will hold its grand opening from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday, despite the early Tuesday opening. Tentative hours for the museum are 1 to 8 p.m. Thursdays and Fridays, 10 a.m.

to 6 p.m. Saturdays and 1 to 6 p.m. Sundays.

The museum features displays about Federal Way's past and its communities, such as Redondo and Star Lake. Displays that now line the walls and stand on easels in the small shop tell about early churches here, some founding families, logging in early Federal Way and local schools.

THE SHOP'S WINDOW display now sports pictures of early Redondo and the story of a stump that was split by lightning in the Star Lake neighborhood. The shards of the stump showed that "Kate" had been carved into the tree years ago, apparently by an erstwhile lover.

The window display will change in coming weeks, as will the display inside the museum, said Charnell. The Bon has loaned a pair of mannequins to the historical society, and those eventually will be used to model

antique clothing in the museum window.

Displays still are being made and information about the history of Federal Way still is being sought. The museum will offer not only a look at Federal Way history, said Charnell, but can also be a depository for Federal Way memories and paraphernalia. By 8 p.m. Tuesday, about a dozen local residents had looked over the display, and several had offered information about the community that had been missing.

THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY will have the museum space for an undetermined amount of time. The storefront was donated by SeaTac Mall management, and will be available until a paying tenant moves in.

The mall donated the site after the historical society had shown its display in the mall's Bon foyer from March 20 to 28. The

official agreement that turns over the site to the society was signed this week.

The all-volunteer historical society is now seeking a permanent museum site somewhere in Federal Way. Some of the group's 90 members are also collecting artifacts and oral histories from longtime residents.

The organization's next general membership meeting will be held March 28 at 7:30 p.m. at the Calvary Lutheran Church, 2415 S. 320th St. The guest speaker will be Kay Reinartz, principal author of "Passport to Ballard: A Centennial Story."
