## Senate hangs EIS mandate over burner

Washington state senators have agreed with a growing number of Northeast Tacoma and Federal Way residents that Tacoma's incinerator should be subject to a full environmental review.  
The Senate approved HB 1671 33-12 last Thursday with an amendment introduced by Sen. Peter von Reichbauer (R-30th) that would prohibit incinerators

from operating without first completing an environmental impact statement (EIS). The bill now returns to the House for concurrence.  
The Dash Point legislator introduced the amendment in response to citizen complaints that the \$48 million plant under construction on the tideflats never received the scrutiny required by the State Environmental Policy Act. Instead, the city,

which owns the plant, declared that the environmental effects of the plant are not expected to be significant.  
**THE INCINERATOR** is scheduled to begin producing electricity by burning sorted garbage, wood and coal by the end of this year. But if the bill with von Reichbauer's amendment also clears the House, Tacoma may have to delay the plant's opening date while it

completes the EIS.  
Though HB 1671 passed the Senate by a wide margin, von Reichbauer had to fight off several attempts on the Senate floor to delete the amendment from the bill.  
Sen. Mike Kreidler (D-22nd), responding to heavy lobbying from Tacoma and Tacoma Public Utilities, tried to convince other senators that the amendment technically lies out-

side of the bill's "scope and object." HB 1671 is a broad bill that would mandate increased recycling throughout the state, and the amendment is inappropriate for the bill, Kreidler stated.  
The bill addresses all aspects of the collection, transportation and disposal of solid waste, so the amendment is well within the scope of the bill, von Reichbauer argued.

Sens. Slim Rasmussen (D-29th) and Lois Stratton (D-3rd) then tried to dump the amendment, arguing that requiring Tacoma to stop the project midstream would be unfair and costly. The city complied with all state regulations and determined that an EIS was not necessary, they said.

Dressed in denim, wearing gloves and wielding a rake, he looked every inch the contented retiree.  
Just don't call him a gardener.  
"I'm a *student* gardener," corrected Dr. Bertold Bruell. A soothing Austrian accent and twinkling eyes removed all sting from the admonishment.  
The distinction is necessary, he explained because his wife, Edith, deserves credit for the couple's handsome yard.  
"She's really the master gardener," he said. "She grows the largest, most beautiful edelweiss."  
Now, after 38 years of delivering babies and removing tonsils, Federal Way's first physician hopes to have time to hone not only his gardening skills, but take painting lessons and learn about computers.  
Bruell, who came to the community in 1951, retired last month.

## Schools ponder ban on smoking

The Federal Way School District is considering adopting a sweeping no-smoking policy that would ban use of all tobacco products on district property and in district vehicles by July 1, 1990.  
The school board will review the proposed policy at a special meeting Tuesday at 6:30 p.m. at the Educational Service Center, 31405 18th Ave. S. Public comments will be accepted.  
The policy calls for the smoking ban to be phased in starting Sept. 1, 1989, when the use of tobacco would be limited to designated areas.  
A complete ban then would take effect July 1, 1990.  
The policy covers all district employees, students, volunteers, outside contractors, visitors and the general public.  
A staff committee of smokers and non-smokers developed the proposed policy to "protect the health of students, staff, and the general public, to provide a healthy working environment and to promote good health for students."

## Deadline extension helps last-minute tax-returners

Procrastinators have been given more time to practice their craft.  
Because the normal April 15 Internal Revenue Service (IRS) deadline for tax returns fell on a Saturday, late filers have been given until midnight tomorrow, April 17, to mail in their taxes.  
The Federal Way and Auburn post offices are preparing for a rush of late filers and are setting up two special mail boxes at each office tomorrow night for tax returns, said Ben Meservey, postmaster.  
The post office will collect the mail in those boxes at midnight, Meservey said, and make sure it has an April 17 postmark.  
Fines for late filings can amount to 5 percent of the total tax due for each month a return is not filed or not filed completely, up to a maximum of 25 percent.

Extensions are available for those who can't get their 1988 taxes done by tomorrow, but they apply only for the paperwork, and not tax payments, said Gerhard G. Mueller, president of the Washington Society of Certified Public Accountants (WSCPAs).  
Late filers must use Form 4868 and file it by tomorrow to receive an automatic four-month extension. But to receive that extension, the filer must estimate the tax due and put at least 90 percent of the amount in the mail by tomorrow.  
Taxpayers who make mistakes in their filings can use Form 1040X to correct mistakes. The WSCPAs recommends making copies of tax returns to check for accuracy as well for personal records.

## Highline Hospital buys out Riverton

After years of unsuccessful courtship, the owners of Riverton Hospital have agreed to sell it to Highline Community Hospital.  
Highline's board of directors signed purchase agreements Wednesday morning with Universal Health Services, the Pennsylvania-based corporation that owns Riverton. Auburn General Hospital, also owned by Universal Health Services, will not be sold.  
The sale will not become final until Highline receives approval from the state Department of Social and Health Services to acquire Riverton. Fall is the earliest it could happen, said Paul Tucker, administrator for Highline. Both hospitals will continue to operate separately until Highline receives the go-ahead from DSHS.  
The decision to sell Riverton wasn't a short-term necessity, but came as a result of long-term planning, said Kirk Gorman, senior vice president and

treasurer at Universal Health Services.  
"We saw the competition between ourselves was detracting from our ability to provide cost-effective service," Gorman said.  
"This is not a situation where a derelict or insolvent hospital is being taken over," he added. Gorman said that Riverton turned a profit last year, though he wouldn't say how much.  
"EVER SINCE I've been here, we've had a desire to buy Riverton," said Tucker, who was hired in 1978, just before Highline's board of directors purchased its assets from California-based Monterey Life Systems Inc., and turned non-profit. "It's a pretty big event for us - we're real pleased."  
"I see it as a step forward for both (physicians and patients)," said Dr. Stephen Bunch. Like many physicians in the Highline area, Bunch has privileges at both hospitals. The sale will alleviate a scattering of energies and allow the hospitals

to eliminate the duplication of expensive equipment, Bunch said.  
Some of his patients who feel loyal to Riverton will feel saddened by the sale, Bunch said. But he has other patients who already use both hospitals.  
Tucker said the most common question he gets asked is whether Riverton Hospital's name will change. That hasn't been decided yet, and other details about how the hospitals will operate after the sale must

still be worked out, he said.  
However, he added that very few Riverton employees would be laid off as a result of the sale. Those in high management positions at Riverton will be replaced by Highline people, he said. Universal Health Services indicated that some top management people may be offered jobs in other hospitals owned by the corporation.  
Tucker declined to give the

## Pendulum swings in abortion debate

Because they are potential human beings, unborn children in America are treated as likely citizens, as if they could already enjoy the blessings of liberty.

Born elsewhere, they might face instant poverty, famine or religious war. Here, they are assured to deserve a high standard of living, two cars in the garage and a charge card, even before they enter the world.

The trouble is, even in America, some of those embryonic citizens face a bleak future, because the expectant mother is too young, too poor or too limited in her skills to provide for the child.

Between those two poles — the right to life and liberty and the expectation of a life of comfort and dignity, neither of them guaranteed by nature or by fate, the argument over abortion is strung.

It hinges on religious convictions which are not shared by every American, and not guaranteed by our Constitution. So the abortion debate is a Constitutional debate in spiritual clothing.

Since the Constitution puts personal liberty on equal footing with religious liberty, current law allows a woman to decide for herself whether to carry an infant to term.

If that offends anyone, it is equally offensive to impose on the unborn child a life of obligatory poverty or shame or neglect. Even if that might happen only to a quarter of the unborn children, a law that bans abortions would also amount to a prison sentence of sorts for both the expectant mother and the expected child.

Lately, the pro-life movement has suffered two setbacks. One was the vivid evidence — a protest march — showing national sentiment in favor of a tolerant policy on abortion.

The other was the judicial ruling that threatened harsh penalties for anyone who blocks another person from getting treatment at a medical clinic.

The backlash was predictable. Civil rights cannot be made a function of mob rule. Once you use that tactic, you sacrifice the most precious liberty we have.

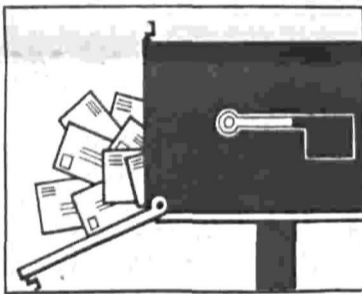
Let the contest continue, but humanely, with regard for the rights and motives of both parties to the debate.

"No. It affects my business. Prices go up and that makes unhappy customers. They should have stronger regulations on cleanup, but not drilling."



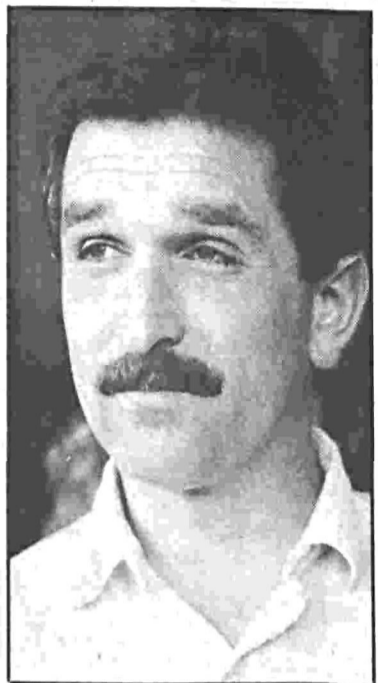

Hosted by guys who look like they bought their teeth at a Dick Clark recycling bin, these shows flatter the viewer by suggesting that any of us might have a chance on television if we just teach our pets to eat pudding from our ears or can do exotic tricks — maybe stuff our heads into pencil sharpeners.

That's the Dick Clark tradition: All-American, pleasant but not obtrusive, hinting that we're all a little lonely and weird (even the famous among us).

Since we made you what you are, tuning in all those weeks, I guess you must have been right. I guess we're just what you thought we were: hungry for affirmation, willing to take it intravenously if we have to, through the tube of television.

I guess you were doing something nice for us, even if we didn't know it at the time. When I think of it that way, I feel almost grateful, Dick.

When we look back, from old age, on those who made a difference in our lives, you'll be among them, not hogging the spotlight, but standing just off camera, waiting for your cue, your smile primed. So long, Dick. Be good.

# Bruell's patience recalled by longtime patient

an open house held in his honor at St. Francis Community Hospital.

**THE OPEN HOUSE** was hosted by the man Bruell calls his best friend — Dr. Robert Lundeen.

"He is like a brother," said Bruell. "We've been together since 1954. Although we're not partners financially, we're friends and used to share calls."

It's not surprising Bruell holds Lundeen in such high regard.

After all, when Lundeen became Federal Way's second doctor in 1954, it allowed Bruell to take his first vacation in three years.

The early days were difficult, but that is when Bruell forged what became long-term relationships with many of his patients.

Edith Bruell recalled that dinner often was dry by the time her husband got home. Dr. Bruell said he was weary enough to drink two cups of coffee before going to bed and still sleep like a baby.

"That was a tough time," he recalled. "That was a rough, rough time. I didn't realize I was going to be so busy so quickly. My office was just like an emergency room."

Fay Rogers, who came to

Redondo in 1941, recalls first meeting Bruell when she and her husband and the doctor and his wife were invited to dinner at the home of Kenneth Jones, then school superintendent.

"I think he's a wonderful man," said Rogers. "He always gives you his full attention. You can just count on him doing his best for you."

"I'm very unhappy that he's retiring, but after all, I can understand, he's not a young man."

**BRUELL** knows that, too. The doctor, who will turn 77 next month, said he does not feel as if he has lost any of his medical abilities, but he wanted to quit while he was still on top.

"I didn't want to get in a position that because of my age I would make a mistake that I would have to live with the rest of my life," he explained. "I can't think of anything worse."

Edith Bruell said she and her husband had made a pact.

"If I saw he wasn't doing things correctly, I was to tell him. I had not told him. He was still doing very well, working

harder than most doctors half his age."

Edith Bruell is a registered nurse who helped her husband in his practice from time to time. A more constant presence in the office was Evelyn Hanson, Bruell's nurse from 1953 to 1979.

"His patients were the most important thing," she said. "Each person to him was an in-

dividual. He never hurried away from anyone."

**THAT'S NOT** exactly true. Bruell, born in Austria and schooled in Vienna, did not waste much time departing his native country after the German invasion.

In a previous interview he said he left Austria in 1938, motivated by "my dislike for Adolph Hitler and my lack of desire to serve in the German army."

Just before he left, Bruell found himself listening to a radio broadcast of the historic heavyweight boxing match between American Joe Louis and the German champion, Max Schmeling.

Listening with him were several other doctors, Austrian

Nazis who were pulling for Schmeling.

While the Nazis were stunned by the American's first-round knockout of the German, "I was quietly rejoicing for Joe Louis," said Bruell.

**THE DOCTOR'S** Viennese roots are reflected in his affection for the fine arts. Numerous paintings, many painted by former patients, adorn the Bruells' airy home overlooking Puget Sound, and they have season tickets to the Seattle Symphony.

After 50 years, a hint of the Old World still influences his life.

"My tastes go in that direction, even though I adjusted very quickly to being an American," he said.

His wife believes he will adjust equally well to retirement.

"He's adaptable," she said. "He'll find something else to do."

Besides gardening, painting and learning about computers (he calls them "fascinating"), Bruell hopes to perform medical missionary work abroad.

"And last but not least I'll try to do whatever I can for St. Francis," he said.

No one waited longer and few worked harder for the hospital than Bruell.

During the dedication ceremony two years ago, Bruell was given the shovel used during the hospital's groundbreaking in 1985.

When Bruell arrived, only about 3,000 people lived in Federal Way, but it wasn't long before he could foresee the growth that has swelled the population to more than 80,000.

"That's why I tried to be so forceful about getting a hospital for Federal Way," he said. "I'm proud that I was able to help a little."

He also is happy he made medicine a career and will miss seeing his patients now that he has retired.

"It was difficult to tell patients, it was difficult to get rid of things I've become accustomed to, it was difficult to get rid of patients I've become accustomed to," he said. "They are just like family."

Bruell said he has heard from many patients since his retirement was announced.

That's not surprising, said Dr. Lundeen.

"I think he's unique in that he always put his practice and his patients above other considerations," he said.

## Burner foes need House vote to make mandate stick

Federal Way residents have taken particular exception to this argument. No plant exists in the world that is exactly like Tacoma's plant, so no accurate information about its emissions is available. An EIS would require that information to be available, as well as other environmental data, residents have said.

The city currently is undertaking a less comprehensive environmental study of the incinerator as well as a study of the plant's health effects. The health risk study is being reviewed by the Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department, which has the authority to issue the plant its permit to operate.

Two recent surveys of residents in the Northeast

Tacoma area, one distributed by von Reichbauer and one by the residents themselves, has revealed a great deal of concern over the health and environmental effects posed by the incinerator.

On the Senate floor, Lt. Gov. Joel Pritchard weighed von Reichbauer's arguments with those of the other senators and ruled in favor of keeping the amendment in the bill. The full Senate then overwhelmingly approved the measure.

HB 1671, known as the Waste Not Washington Act, now returns to the House for concurrence on changes made by the Senate. If the House does not concur, the bill may be assigned to a conference committee, made up of members of both houses and both caucuses.

"A BILL that big often goes to a conference committee," said

Rep. Jean Marie Brough (R-30th), who predicted that the bill as written may not fare well in the House.

"We tried a similar amendment about the Spokane incinerator when the bill was in the House, but it didn't hang," Brough said.

Brough indicated that she is supportive of von Reichbauer's amendment, however, and will do what she can to see that it passes.

Brough's seatmate, Rep. Dick Schoon (R-30th) was urged by King County Council member Paul Barden at a recent Federal Way Chamber of Commerce meeting to take the lead in the House to keep von Reichbauer's amendment. Schoon said he agreed with Barden.

purchase price of Riverton Hospital, saying he had an agreement with Universal Health Systems not to reveal it. However, the purchase price will become public record later when Highline applies for a state certificate it needs to finalize the sale.

**HIGHLINE AND** Riverton hospitals are only about three miles apart as the crow flies. Over the years, both hospitals have made bids for each other and discussed the possibility of divvying up some services. But none of the discussions progressed very far.

Last year, Universal Health Services responded with a vehement "no" to Highline's suggestion that the two hospitals work together. Highline had proposed taking over all major medical services, while Riverton would provide specialty services—such as the eating disorders clinic and the chemical addiction unit it already had in place. (Incidentally, Riverton had

made the opposite proposal to Highline 10 years before, meeting with resistance from Highline's board.)

In fact, the suggestion so offended Universal Health Services, that it was with utmost care that Highline approached Universal nine months ago about buying Riverton, Tucker said. Until a couple of months ago, it didn't seem likely that the two would strike a deal, Tucker added.

Negotiations were held secretly. Tucker said his counterpart at Riverton, Phil Gustafson, didn't learn of the pending sale until a week or two ago. Staff members were informed Wednesday morning, he said.

Gustafson, Riverton's administrator, declined to comment on the sale beyond a press release. Vivi Hammond, who heads the senior volunteer program at Riverton, said that employees were told not to talk to any media about the sale.

News of the purchase agreement didn't come as much of a

surprise to Rich Roodman, the administrator at Valley Medical Center in Renton.

The hospital community has speculated for some time that declining census rates would force Riverton to make some changes, Roodman said.

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

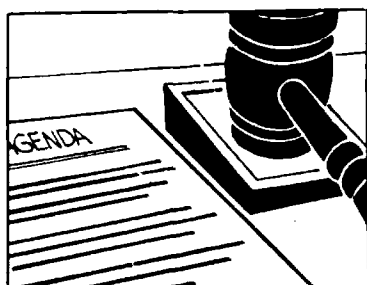

**Bill would allow city to levy taxes sooner**

A bill passed by both houses in the state Legislature could make financial life easier for the new cities of Federal Way and Sea-Tac.

Rep. Jean Marie Brough (R-30th), who sponsored HB 1370, said the law will allow the new cities to gain their taxing authority from the county sooner than the old statutes would have allowed. It will give city officials the ability to begin collecting property taxes as soon as January 1990.

The bill changes the date by which a new taxing district—in

this case the new cities of Federal Way and Sea-Tac — sets its boundaries, to March 31 from March 1. That means Federal Way and Sea-Tac's incorporation votes March 14, setting the boundaries for the new cities, were in time to allow them to possibly start collecting their own taxes next year.

The new law states that property tax levies must be based on districts existing in the last day of March in the year the tax levy is set. Councils elected in September could officially incorporate the cities by

November and set a property tax levy for 1990, Brough said. Laws state that taxes collected in 1990 must be levied by Nov. 30, 1989.

If a city does not incorporate by November and set its own property tax levy, it will receive its share of the county road taxes, instead. The actual dollar amounts won't vary much, Brough said, but having the option of collecting its own taxes will give the new city more flexibility and make budgeting easier.

HB 1370 also takes care to ensure that during the transfer of taxing authority, other taxing

districts, such as fire and library districts, will not lose any money and that taxes will not be duplicated, Brough said.

The bill passed easily out of the House, Brough said, and was adopted by the Senate Monday. It now goes back to the House for approval of amendments tacked on by the Senate. That process will be smooth, she said, because those amendments were suggested to the Senate by those who worked on the House bill as an afterthought to make the language even more clear.

Brough said she expects the bill to be on the governor's desk this week.

**Woman appreciates boys who saved her daughter**

Teen-agers take a lot of flak these days, says Belen Foltz, so when they do something good, she'd like everyone to know about it.

Foltz is particularly thankful two teen-age boys — whose identities are unknown to her — happened along at the scene of an auto accident April 6 in which her daughter, Emilia Carter, 26, of Federal Way, was injured.

The boys found Carter, who had been ejected from her car, face down in a pool of water and pulled her out. She was unconscious from injuries sustained when her car was struck and knocked off the road and into a fire hydrant and fence.

According to King County police, the accident occurred about 11:30 p.m., when a man suspected of threatening a woman with a gun fled the scene of that incident and ran a stop light at South 272nd Street and Star Lake Road. Carter was in the intersection at the time and her car was hit nearly head-on by the suspect's car. He was arrested by King County police.

Carter broke a vertebra in her neck and took 20 stitches to the forehead, Foltz said. She's recovering at home, but the damage could have been much worse if the two teen-agers hadn't decided to get involved, she added.

Foltz, a counselor at the state's Echo Glen youth detention center, said she sees and hears plenty about what is wrong with today's youth, but believes that most kids will do the right thing.

For many, the first reaction would be not to get involved, Foltz said, but these youths apparently reacted quickly, witnesses reported.

"I don't know who they are, but I want them to know that whoever did this, I will pray for them until my last days," Foltz said.

**Council race loses four**

A total of four people withdrew from the Federal Way City Council race by Friday's deadline to have their names formally removed from the ballot.

Bob Hanson withdrew from Position 1, leaving behind Ethan Allen, Bill Shortt and Mary Gates, the fewest number of candidates for any of the seven

positions. Jack Loudon withdrew from Position 5, Lorille Bird from Position 6 and Williams Kearns from Position 7.

That leaves 37 candidates spread across seven positions, with the top two vote-getters in each position in the May 16 primary election advancing to the Sept. 19 general election.

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# Mobile home owners may get relocation assistance

Residents of South King County mobile home parks who suddenly find themselves evicted could receive relocation help from the county, under a program proposed by county Executive Tim Hill.

Hill's plan would provide \$121,500 in emergency assistance to move the displaced mobile homes, or, for those who cannot find another mobile

home park, to pay short-term rental subsidies.

The proposal was prompted by a recent study, which Hill said showed that mobile home park residents were being forced out of their homes due to development of the properties.

"That study shows we are close to creating a new category of homeless, people who have been evicted from mobile home parks to make way for new

developments. This program will keep us from creating yet another demand on our already overburdened shelters and forcing a number of people, many of them elderly, out of their homes," said the county executive.

Quoting the study, Hill said that conversions of mobile home parks in King County "will soon result in the loss of 239 spaces and the displacement of many low-income households."

**IF THE PROPOSAL** is approved by the King County Council, owners of a singlewide mobile home would be eligible for up to \$1,500 in relocation expenses. Owners of a doublewide home could receive up to \$2,500. The money would be matched by owners of the mobile home parks.

Rental assistance of \$300 a month would also be available for a four-month period.

The plan would pay for the relocation of 35 homes and would provide rental assistance for 23 households, families that Hill calls in need of immediate help.

Hill said the county could be reimbursed for the program if the Legislature approves a pending mobile home relocation assistance bill.

Under the proposal, the county would also set aside \$40,000 in earnest to begin developing a publicly owned mobile home park. Hill said that facility could provide needed space as mobile home parks in the county continue to close due to development.

# Brief, wild chase ends with arrest

A Des Moines man led police on a short-lived but dangerous high-speed chase Thursday night before crashing his car and getting captured by his pursuers.

King County police report that at 8:23 p.m., a patrol officer saw the 23-year-old Des Moines man driving fast and out-of-control near South 324th Street and 28th Avenue South. As the officer tried to stop the man, he took off toward Interstate 5, cutting off other drivers to get to the northbound on-ramp at South 320th Street.

The officer said he chased the man up the freeway to the Kent-Des Moines Road exit, where the driver, after passing other drivers on both shoulders, cut across several lanes to exit. Once on Kent-Des Moines Road, the driver headed westbound in the eastbound lane, hit one car and tried to ram another police officer's car, reports state.

The driver finally crossed back over the median, but lost control of his car and drove into a ditch. He tried to flee on foot, but was captured by police at

8:29 p.m.

After his capture, the man told police he initially was fleeing the scene of a traffic accident he had been involved in at South 327th Street and Pacific Highway South. He admitted hitting speeds as high as 90 mph, and the officer who chased him on I-5 said he was doing at least 85 mph.

A blood alcohol test was taken and the man was booked into King County Jail for investigation of felony flight and second-degree assault, for trying to ram the police car.

# Suspicious noise is nighttime intruder

A woman babysitting her sister's children thought the thing she heard go bump in the night was one of the kids, but it turned out to be a burglar.

The woman told King County police she had just turned out the lights and was about to go to sleep at about 11:30 p.m. Wednesday when she heard a noise upstairs. Thinking it was one of three children sleeping upstairs, she went to investigate. She found one child on the floor and assumed it had fallen out of bed, making the noise she'd heard, she said.

But as she was putting the child back to bed, the woman

said she heard someone run down the hall, down the stairs and out the front door. She did not see anyone, she told police, but found the front door standing open.

Upon further investigation, she discovered a window in a bedroom where two children were sleeping was open. Police say it appears the intruder climbed a tree, climbed onto the roof and then climbed through the window without waking the children.

A police K-9 unit searched the area and came up empty, and no fingerprints or other physical evidence was found.

# Student confronted by youth with gun

A 13-year-old Illahee Junior High Student told police another youth threatened him with a handgun Wednesday.

The student said the other youth approached him on the playground at about 11 a.m. and asked his name. When the student answered, the other youth pulled a black semi-automatic handgun, pointed it at him and asked why he had told on another boy.

The youth with the gun fled on foot when he heard teachers ap-

proaching, promising to "get" him later, the student said.

The student said he did not know the other youth, but gave police a description and said he would be able to recognize him again.

The armed youth is described as a black male, about 14 years old, standing 5 feet 7 inches tall and weighing 150 pounds. He wears his hair short, with a figure-eight shaved on one side. It is not known if the youth is an Illahee student.

# Man accosts girls in public bathroom

Two 8-year-old girls told King County police a man followed them into the restroom of a local athletic complex and then grabbed one of them.

The girls were at the complex at about 8:45 p.m. Monday when they went into one of the women's restrooms. They said the man followed them into the restroom, looked at them and said, "Oh, I must be in the wrong bathroom."

But instead of leaving, he grabbed one girl and tried to fondle her as she fought him. Both girls were able to go into

bathroom stalls and lock themselves in. They said the man tried to reach under the stalls to grab them.

He finally left the restroom when an adult woman entered. The woman did not see the incident, but told police she would be able to identify the man if she saw him again.

He is described as white, 20-25 years old, 6 feet 3 inches tall with brown hair and a brown mustache. He is athletic-looking and wore a dark blue T-shirt and shorts.

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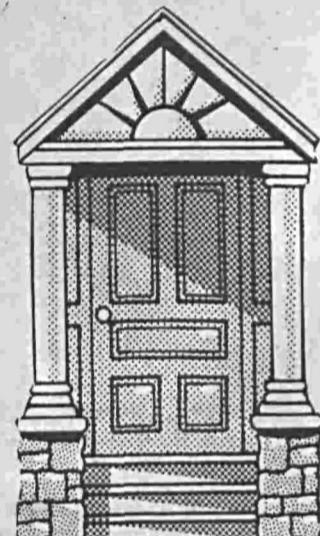
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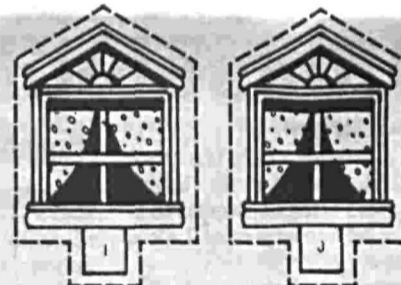
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## Federal Way girls find winning formula

Perry led a Federal Way sweep of both events, as Jon Brown (10:57.0) and Bill Sherman (11:03.6) crossed right behind him in the 3,200 and Trent Erickson (4:52.0), Troy Guertin (4:58.6) and Brown (5:00.9) backed him up in the 1,600.

Chad Klassen was victorious in the 200-meter dash at 23.6 in front of Brian Yount (24.6) and Scott Gallagher (24.9), and Erickson (2:09.1) won the 800-meter run.

Steve Cook won the discus throw at 112-1, ahead of teammate Paul Records (107-7), and Dawson took the long jump at 20-0.

Klassen placed second in the 100-meter dash (12.0) and Delane Jackson third (12.3), with Jackson second in the 400 at 56.3 ahead of Yount (58.3) and Charlie Carver (59.8).

Miller captured second in the 300-meter hurdles at 40.4, followed by Dawson (41.7) and Waylon Owens (43.9).

Scott Kinnaman was second in the pole vault at 9-6 and Kevin

Wolfe second in the triple jump (37-2¾) in front of Brian Anastasiadis (35-7½).

Sen Wen placed third in the 800-meter run at 2:13.7, Todd Trinneer was third in the shot put (41-2½) and Wolfe third in the high jump (5-8). Cook was fourth in the 110-meter hurdles at 15.5.

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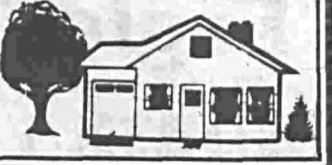
