Council candidates speak up at forum

Voters give group mixed reviews

You might call it the Federal Way City Council Parade of Candidates.

But it was not an event for the hard of hearing.

Thirty of the 37 city council candidates spoke at a Meet-Your-Candidate event sponsored Thursday by the Federal Way Community Council.

Candidates were given one minute to introduce themselves and give a short speech to the 100 interested voters in attendance. However, after about seven candidates had spoken, the sole microphone dropped dead and it was hard to hear what many candidates had to say.

"It was difficult to decide anything about them because of the sound," said Lorraine Spalding.

However, her husband said he couldn't tell anything about the candidates after hearing from them for only one minute anyway.

"You can't make anything from this," said Glenn Spalding. "I want to know what each of them expect to get out of (being on the council)."

The Spaldings said they planned

The process...

Number of positions: Seven. Elected at-large. Non-partisan.
Date of elections: Primary May 16. Top two vote-getters from each position will advance to Sept. 19 general election.

Length of terms: All positions in the first election will be two-year terms. In 1991, four of the positions will become four-year terms and three will remain two-year terms. In 1993, the three two-year terms also will become four-year terms.

Pay: Council members will receive \$400 a month. The council will elect one of its members mayor and that person will receive an additional \$100 a month. The mayor will have no more legal authority than other council members, but will preside over council meetings and handle other ceremonial duties.

Date of official incorporation: Sometime between the Sept. 19 election and March 10, 1990.

One fire station gets sold, another awaiting a buyer

Anybody want a hot buy on a fire station?

You're too late to get the old Fire Station 4 at 28th Avenue South and South 312th Street, which King County has just agreed to buy from Fire District 39 (Federal Way).

But cheer up. Old Station 1, the first station built by Fire District 39, might be had for a mere \$71,500.

Its selling points include a few pews and an unfinished baptism font, located below the hose tower. Both were left by the most recent occupants, a small church that disbanded.

The old Station 1, located on

South 368th Street and about 30th Avenue South near Five Mile Lake, also boasts a long and interesting history. Before it was built in the early 1950s, Federal Way already had a fire engine waiting for it. The engine was kept in the barn across the street.

The old Station 4, on the other hand, doesn't boast as long a history, but has been in the middle of a real-estate tug-of-war between the fire department and the county.

WHEN THE DEPARTMENT abandoned the old Station 4 for a new station located on South 320th Street near Interstate 5, county officials said they would

purchase it for park property at the \$175,000 appraised value. Then the county waffled, as the money temporarily was cut from the budget.

Fire department officials finally issued an ultimatum: buy it, or forget it. Oh, and if you buy, they added, don't plan to sell it within five years unless you first offer it to the new city of Federal Way.

Chief Bud Thorson said he got confirmation in early April that the county would buy the station — for \$168,500.

"I said no, I won't even take that back to the commissioners."

Schools' traveling team to glean gang insight

Eight weeks ago, Maj. Ollie Moore of Precinct 5 (Federal Way) got a first-hand look at gangs and gang-related police procedures in Los Angeles.

Tomorrow, six administrators of Federal Way schools, including three principals, will take a similar fact-finding mission to Los Angeles, a city with third- and fourth-generation gang members.

Included in the two-day, \$1,800 trip are Ed Novak, elementary principal; Joe Pope, junior high principal; Ann Gentle, high school principal; Tom Murphy, assistant superintendent for secondary programs; Pam Morris-Stendal; coordinating teacher for school drug and

alcohol education; and Ron Sensenbach, director of district security.

They will talk to officials and parents of the Los Angeles Unified School District, which includes 600,000 students (Federal Way has almost 17,000 students).

WHAT THEY HOPE to gain is experience, said Murphy. The Los Angeles Unified School District has formed community task forces, has created an extensive self-esteem program and employs DARE, a drug-

education program that introduces police officers to students, all to battle gang involvement.

The Federal Way School District wants to know how to get all that done here, Murphy said.

The district is particularly interested in the California school district's connections with parents and the community.

"One of the things we've learned as we've gone along is that this is not a problem that can or should be addressed sole-

ly by the school district," Murphy said. "I'd like to see us be able to start a community effort against gang involvement, and not just treat this as a school problem."

THE VISIT is one of the first big steps toward creating a cohesive plan for gang prevention in local schools, said Murphy. And gang prevention is certainly on the minds of administrators and parents alike, particularly since police in the Northwest confirm that out-of-state gang members are plying their trade in Seattle, Tacoma and their suburbs.

So far, Federal Way high schools have suffered a few incidents with suspected gang members from out of town.

Principals are on the alert for gang members and gang "wannabes" who imitate the actions of gang members.

"And the principals are concerned because they've started seeing outside influence that

could lead to that kind of problem," Murphy added.

THE SCHOOL DISTRICT'S trip has the fervent backing of Maj. Moore, who said no signifi-

Man who shot himself was parolee

A man who killed himself when police stopped his car Thursday was wanted by Seattle police as a suspect in a Capitol Hill rape the night before.

Seattle Police Department spokesman Don Church said Kristin Asmundson, 35, of Federal Way, had been identified by "evidence at the scene

and other sources." as a prime suspect in the Wednesday evening rape of a 26-year-old Seattle woman.

Asmundson, who was on parole from the state Department of Corrections for 1980 convictions on negligent homicide and first-degree assault charges, shot himself at about 1:15 p.m. Thursday when a King

County police officer stopped him as he drove through Federal Way.

Officer Ed Brown stopped Asmundson at the northwest corner of the intersection of Pacific Highway South and South 272nd Street. Brown, who knew Asmundson was wanted by Seattle police for rape, ordered him out of the car.

Asmundson did not get out, and as Brown got out of his patrol car to approach Asmundson's Toyota pickup, Asmundson put a 12-gauge shotgun to his own chest and pulled the trigger. He died at the scene.

Church said Asmundson was a suspect only in the Wednesday

Candidate signs may violate law


Editor:

The Federal Way News has done a good job in encouraging city council candidates to run for office and in reminding voters of some of the factors they should consider in evaluating candidates.

I would like to add to that list of factors to be used in evaluating candidates: "Does the candidate advocate or allow use of illegal campaign signs?"

Candidates for public office should demonstrate respect for the law. If they do not know the law regarding campaign signs, they certainly have an obligation to find out. Even if there were no laws governing the placement of campaign signs, is it not obvious that respect for public and private property rights requires that they not be placed on the side of roadways, on school and park property, in greenbelts, and on property of absentee owners — unless they have consented in writing?)

If we cannot trust a candidate to inform himself or herself concerning sign laws and then to exercise sufficient control over the campaign to see that campaign workers follow the law, how could we possibly trust such a person to follow the law and respect property rights as they

make decisions concerning operation of the city?

The only proper place for campaign signs is on private property with the prior written consent of the property owner. King County Code, Chapter 12.74 In some neighborhoods, restrictive covenants may place additional restrictions on signs.

Violation of the sign ordinance is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not more than \$250, and not more than 90 days in jail. Each day that the violation occurs is a separate offense.

Entering onto the property of another for an unlawful purpose, such as placement of an illegal sign, could also constitute the criminal offense of trespass.

If cityhood is silly, so was Jefferson

Federal Way is not a city.

A city is tall, grimy, dark. Think of a city and you think of New York, the dazzle of light off pyramids of glass, a thicket of skyscrapers, reflections of secretaries in department store windows.

Federal Way is flat, its streets open to the sky.

Think of a city and you think of alleys full of trashcans where detectives get way-laid. Winos in the alcoves. Sullen kids on tenement steps.

In Federal Way, if you find an alley, you use it as a shortcut. Mike Hammer would hate it here. We're short on bums and bimbos. Out here a wino needs a part-time job.

A city has colorful characters, chain-smoking short order cooks, Irish cops, big league ballplayers, wisecracking waitresses.

In our neighborhood the only colorful characters are Ronald McDonald and the Burger King. Maybe the chamber manager's name is Bob Green, but he's hardly Irish. I checked. He's from Enumclaw, and has the scrubbed look of a kid on a jelly jar.

If we ever become a city in the way that New York or Chicago or Detroit are cities, most of us would move out. But there is another vision of cities toward which we can aspire.

A city, after all, is more than architecture and night life. It is an idea rooted in the hope that great clots of humanity can live together peacefully.

In the Greek philosophy, the city-state was the ideal, an expression of the highest state of community, what we learned to call civilization. Each had a guardian god.

European cities, which were the models for the first American cities, typically were built around central points, organized like concentric circles. American cities are linear, built along railroads or highways, strung out like a chain of broken beads.

The shape of a city shapes our feelings about it. In the case of Federal Way, there is a shapelessness that cries out for a plan. That's what some cityhood advocates hope to see happen. They'd like the new council to blow this place up like a balloon, to give it shape and dimension.

This seems backwards, compared with the way other

American cities have evolved, along riverbanks, around ports where great ships unleashed their cargo, or at crossroads where merchants gathered to swap horses, furs, or stories.

If anything resembling a great city is to grow here, its roots will be neither architectural nor mercantile. This infant city was born by spontaneous combustion.

Federal Way is a political burp. Out of the pile of people who came here to live — pulled by affordable housing or the convenient location, cityhood began with a rumble of dissent. The city was created mainly to save itself.

That's not a bad place to begin. It is, in fact, an echo of American history, and if we can keep it alive, it could even guide us to a rather wonderful discovery.

Cities — whatever their geographic features and their political character — are mainly ideas in action. So cityhood is a chance to live out a dream about the best way to live.

That dream, forced through the sieve of many

opinions, will have to wade past traffic problems and the fear of taxes. Luckily, it is a durable dream, as old as the Magna Carta, which guaranteed the freedom of the church and the customs of the towns. And it is plastic, it can stretch to accommodate the theme of individual freedom that became the American Revolution, as well as the rejection of aristocracy that drove the French Revolution.

If cityhood never occurred to you in these grandiose terms, such talk may embarrass you or make you feel silly. If so, consider the possibility that Jefferson, Hamilton and Washington were more than mere philosophers.

They were practical men with realistic expectations. In the face of their own doubts and the jeers of detractors, they were willing to risk their lives.

Two centuries later, I don't hear anyone calling them silly. I suppose, to be honest, we must admit the experiment is not over. There is still this city to attempt.

cant amount of gang activity exists in Federal Way yet but that the schools and police must join to ward it off.

"This trip is a perfectly reasonable thing to do...the schools can't operate in a vacuum," he said. "Nowhere does anybody know more about the gang situation than in Los Angeles, where there are 70,000 gang members now. Why reinvent the wheel?"

One parent, however, ques-

tions not the trip itself, but the choice of administrators taking the trip.

Include at least one minority in that group of administrators, or perhaps one parent, urged Merrigon Sommerville. Black students could easily be singled out in the furor over gangs, she said, and should be more closely tied in with any solution to the problem.

"Why not make a student body (group) for black kids, so they can take pride in their schools themselves? Now, somebody

else does that for them, and they don't want that," said Sommerville, a black parent whose son attends Illahee.

"It's nothing personal about the people who are going (to Los Angeles), but this is how the kids are thinking. They're turned off," she added.

Judy Wall, district communications director, said the members of the visiting team were suggested by Los Angeles school administrators, who picked them for their jobs and not for their race.

WHAT THE VISITORS will learn in two days is that self-esteem is considered by Los Angeles administrators to be the best tool to use against gang involvement, said Lulu Lopez, coordinator of instructional planning and development there.

A good self-image, backed by support from parents, the community and other students, makes for less of a chance that a student will join a gang, Lopez said.

"There's a tendency for kids

to need gangs...they need acceptance and a sense of belonging," she said. "If we eliminate those needs, we eliminate the need for gangs."

"It's a solvable problem, but it's like, how do you eat an elephant? One bite at a time."

Self-esteem is emphasized in the classroom through visualization ("They see themselves having positive results," said Lopez) and relaxation. Parents should also learn those techniques, "Because they can't give these kids what they don't have themselves," Lopez said.

The visiting team will not see all of Los Angeles, but will ex-

amine the part of it Lopez and fellow administrators feel most closely mirrors Federal Way.

There, they will meet parents, community leaders and students who deal first-hand with gangs and gang-prevention.

It may give the visitors a look at what they hope won't be in Federal Way's future, said Murphy.

"We could sit back and hope that it doesn't happen here, and if it indeed doesn't happen, great," he said. "But if we're not prepared to step in and head off any problem, we don't have a prayer."

ed to get most of their candidate information from newspapers. (The Federal Way News will publish a special section on the candidates on May 10.)

OTHER RESIDENTS said they were pleased with the forum and with many of the candidates.

"Some of them are pretty darn good," said Fayette Balew. "They seem really concerned about the new city."

Her husband, Ted Ballew, also said the overall quality of the candidates seemed high. A 24-year Federal Way resident, Ballew said he will consider how long each candidate has lived in Federal Way when deciding who to vote for in the May 16 primary election.

"I like the ones who have lived here awhile," Ballew said. "I think they might care more about the area."

Another resident said there were at least some qualified candidates in each of the seven council positions, but others simply shouldn't be running.

"In my opinion, every position had at least two reasonable candidates," said Steve Waters. "But some seem like they shouldn't be there."

Waters said the most important campaign issue is taxes. Nobody wants to see increased taxes when Federal Way becomes a city, but if quality of life is going to improve here, an increase might be justified, he said.

"Rather than say they should

limit taxes, maybe we should keep an open mind," Waters said.

LONG-TIME resident Juve Robertson said listening to the mini-speeches helped her make up her mind about some candidates, but she's still reserving judgment on others.

"I'm glad we came," said Robertson. "It helped me to decide on a few, but I'm still waiting. We've just got to get a good council here."

The council candidates who did not speak at Thursday's forum at Thomas Jefferson High School were: Fred Jaber, Position 2; Bill McConnell, Position 2; Harold Johnson, Position 4; Tom Trigg, Position 4; Steve Massey, Position 5; Ken "Kap" Pease, Position 6.

Candidates who had filed for the election but later officially dropped out are: Bob Hanson, Position 1; Jack Loudon, Position 5; Lorille Bird, Position 6; William Kearns, Position 7.

Many of the candidates still in the race spent another hour after the introductions talking with voters informally and handing out campaign literature.

After the May 16 primary election, the top two vote-getters in each position will face off in the Sept. 19 final election. After that, the newly elected council will go about arranging for the provision of services. Federal Way will officially become a city when the city council passes a resolution incorporating Federal Way.

The council has until March 10, 1990, to pass that resolution.

County agrees to purchase old Station 4

They won't go for it," Thorson told the department's board of commissioners Thursday.

Last week, though, Thorson received word from the county that the full \$175,000 was forthcoming.

The abandoned station probably will be used for parks storage and some office space, according to King County Parks

officials.

The old fire station, along with the rest of nearby Steel Lake Park, could still wind up under the charge of the new city of Federal Way. Ownership of local parks and park facilities has not yet been decided by the King County Council.

Meanwhile, the deal between the fire department and the county probably will close within the next couple of weeks,

Thorson said.

THAT STILL LEAVES the old Station 1 on the department's hands, however, since the church that purchased the building some years ago could not continue making payments. With the necessary paperwork out of the way and the title back with the fire department, the board of commissioners has agreed that the building must go. A newer Station 1 on South 360th Street covers that area now.

The old station may be snapped up quickly. The firefighters' union has expressed interest in it, and the board of commissioners gave the union right of first refusal to the purchase.

Union president Greg Brozek said the union would decide within a month if it wants the building, which may be used for union meetings.

"It's not a bad little place. The church put in a drop ceiling and carpets, and it's a clean place for us to hold meeting. At least we can make (the department) an offer," Brozek said.

The \$71,500 asking price was based on an assessment of the land and building by Hugh A. Thompson and Associates.

Thorson said money from both sales would go into the department's general fund, some of which could be used to buy more property for more stations elsewhere in Federal Way.

rape, and would not speculate whether he might be linked to any other Seattle assaults. King County Special Assault Unit Sgt. John Duncan also said he was not currently looking at Asmundson as a suspect in any county rape cases.

Police said Asmundson left a suicide note and that his girlfriend had reported that he was despondent and might harm himself.

The Federal Way resident worked for a Seattle dry-cleaning company, and was no longer under active supervision by the Indeterminate Sentence Review Board. He had received his conditional discharge from direct supervision for the negligent homicide conviction February 1987 and for the assault conviction July 1988. Conditional discharge is the next-to-last step before being completely released from corrections.

Students learn pressure of diving

Many oil wells now sink 1,000 feet below the surface of the ocean, and commercial divers must travel that deep to maintain and repair them. To acustom a diver's body to the pressure at that depth takes several hours. Decompression can take a week.

To save time, divers live in a pressure chamber on a boat deck between shifts, riding to and from the work site in a pressurized bell. Commercial divers often spend 30 to 40 days in such confined spaces.

"After that you want to take off for at least a month," commented Maurice Talbot, instructor at Highline Community College's 20-year-old diving technician training program.

Still, a month before graduating from the program, Burien native Bob Boucher is eager to begin his diving career. "I've fallen in love with the industry. I really enjoy the challenge of diving."

When they graduate this spring, Boucher and several of his eight classmates receiving an associate degree in applied sciences from Highline's diving program will head to Louisiana and Texas to accept jobs maintaining offshore oil rigs in the Gulf of Mexico.

"THE MAJORITY of today's commercial divers are used in offshore oil. That's where you get your experience," Talbot said.

E.R. Cross, an adviser to Highline's diving school, commented, "Highline specializes its training for the offshore oil industry, but lots of Highline divers don't end up in that work." Divers could, after gaining experience, choose to specialize in salvage, surveying for geologists, harvesting sea urchins and geoducks, constructing piers and bridges, or inspecting dams.

Commercial diving takes a physical and emotional toll, and after years of working underwater, divers often branch into jobs that keep them on dry land. "Most active diving careers, when you're spending seven to eight months of the year off-

shore, will last maybe 10 or 15 years," Talbot explained.

He noted that though the best divers can earn more than \$100,000 a year, "There comes a time when you're not willing to spend all your time out in the sea."

Talbot dove for more than 20 years, but now teaches for most of the year, diving only in the summers. Cross dove for the Navy and then on oil rigs, then began teaching, and now writes books and articles and produces instructional videotapes on diving.

TALBOT'S STUDENTS are busy in the weeks before graduation, weighing offers for diving jobs. They're also thinking about careers on land.

Boucher, who has accepted a job inspecting and maintaining oil rigs with American Oil Field Divers in Louisiana, wants eventually to own a diving store or salvage company.


Alfred Barrientos, a second-year diving student, will go to work for the same Louisiana company when he graduates. He dreams of someday owning one of the companies that maintain oil rigs in the Gulf of Mexico. He acknowledged that this is a distant target to aim for, "but to come here to Highline to dive was also a dream goal once."

Cross said Highline's program is one of two in the United States to offer in-depth technical knowledge and hands-on training in operating the complex equipment used to maintain modern oil-drilling platforms.

"What differentiates our graduates from sport or recreational divers is that they know more than just how to dive," Talbot said. "They can work topside as technicians, on environmental-control systems, life-support apparatus and saturation systems. Anybody can dive. It depends on what you can do for the company."

Cross said the program's thoroughness produces the ideal diver for oil companies. "This two-year program is what the industry needs."

BARRIENTOS CAME to Highline from his native Mexico. "I looked for the best

schools, and applied here," he said.

Highline boasts extensive — and expensive — equipment needed to acquaint students with state-of-the-art technology. The original equipment was purchased with help from the federal Sea Grant, a marine research fund. State funds and donations from local diving stores round out Highline's facilities, based at Redondo Pier on Puget Sound, according to Talbot.

The 16 first-year students now enrolled dive "only enough to keep them interested," Talbot said. They spend most of their time in class, studying

oceanography, engineering, math, English and report writing.

Second-year students gain experience diving in open water and using a variety of equipment, including decompression chambers, a saturation-diving system, gas recirculators, helmets and masks.

Both Talbot and Cross noted that many Highline graduates have begun careers and gained expertise diving for oil companies.

Elementaries join for giant concerts


Local elementary school musicians and singers will perform simultaneously at two sites Tuesday.

Firefighters near contract OK

A tentative agreement has been reached in contract negotiations between local firefighters and the administration of Fire District 39 (Federal Way).

Greg Brozek, president of the firefighters' union, said several elements of a contract were "roughed together" early last week by representatives of both sides, with the help of a professional mediator. Those elements are scheduled to be clarified at a meeting Tuesday. If the results are agreed to by both sides, the contract will go before a three-day vote of the firefighters.

Any contract agreed upon by the union would then go before

the fire district's board of commissioners for approval.

No particulars of the tentative contract were made available. The firefighters' contract affects the wages and working conditions of 75 union members, including some officers.

Firefighters have been working without a new contract since January. Brozek said some proposed changes to the old contract would likely be retroactive to that time.

The union and department administration have been hammering out points on the proposed new contract for about a year now. A mediator, supplied by Public Employees Relations

Commission, stepped into the bargaining process three meetings ago to help move things along, Brozek said.

Working without a contract is not new for Federal Way's firefighters. Negotiations have been snagged for some time in past years, once for an entire year.

Firefighters work under a no-strike clause, however, which means they continue to serve under their old contract until a new one is drawn up.

Firefighters are now paid between \$22,952 and \$33,684 per year. Captains, also affected by negotiations, are paid up to \$39,744 per year.

Phony phone calls showing up again

A caller who tries to make women believe their husbands have been in an accident and then makes obscene suggestions has been working Federal Way again.

The calls, an old ruse, generally are made to a woman. The caller, a man, tells her he is a police officer or someone who has been in an accident involving her husband. The caller often tells the woman the other people involved in the accident have kidnapped her husband, and unless she does as they tell her, he will be killed.

The demands made by the caller usually are obscene and involve undressing in front of a window.

The most recent call reported to King County police was made

Wednesday to a 24-year-old Federal Way woman. She figured out the ruse when the caller, who said he was a county policeman, made obscene suggestions and then referred to her husband by the wrong name.

Another similar call was reported a few weeks ago, and last month, two other Federal Way residents called the Federal Way News to report such calls.

Police advise people not to give out any information over the phone and to hang up when receiving such calls. Also, if you believe the call could be real, hang up and call the police agency the caller said he represents, using the number in the phone book, police say.

Locals shine at Federal Way invitational

Casbere stands out in 27th annual track meet

Some outstanding individual performances carried the Federal Way and Thomas Jefferson track teams to second- and third-place finishes in the 27th annual Federal Way Invitational Wednesday night.

Weather conditions were perfect for the meet, as a brief rain shower at the beginning only temporarily put a damper on the activity at Federal Way Memorial Field.

The skies soon cleared and local participants shined in the 16-team field that featured some of the top track and field athletes in the Puget Sound area.

North Puget Sound League entry Auburn, which will become part of the South Puget Sound League next year when the SPSL expands to 15 teams, won the meet with a team score of 148. Boys' and girls' results were combined to determine final placings. Teams were allowed to enter only one athlete or team per event.

Federal Way captured second place with 123 points, while Jefferson was close behind in third at 115. Decatur finished 12th overall with a score of 44.5, despite having numerous personal bests.

"This has been a real good meet as far as personal bests," said Decatur's Larry Hoffman, who placed second in the 400 meters (50.2) and helped the Gators' 1,600 meter relay team to a sixth-place (3:31.9). "I think just about everyone on the team has had a personal best."

I don't think the scoreboard is going to show it, but overall we should be happy with this meet."

JEFFERSON SPRINTER Jesse Casbere and Federal Way distance runner Andrea Anderson certainly had to be happy with their performances.

Casbere repeated her four-win performance from the Mount St. Helen's Invitational four days earlier.

Wednesday, Casbere won the 100 meters (12.4), the 200 meters (26.0) and the 400 meters, and also anchored the Raiders' winning 1,600 meter relay team (4:06.9), only one second off the state best time. Also competing on that relay team were Darcy Neil, Barb Beesley and Barb McCarthy.

Casbere had a time drop in the 400 and also set a school record with a personal best in the 200 by three-tenths of a second. She had set the school record in that event at the Mt. St. Helen's Invitational.

"She had a full workload," commented Raider sprint coach Bruce Larson. "About as far as a sprinter could go. She's definitely a workhorse."

ANDERSON, WHO set meet records in winning three events at the Tacoma Invitational on Saturday, won by 100 meters Wednesday with her time of 5:05 in the 1,600 meters and also added a second win in the 800 (2:18.6).

Commenting on his stellar athlete's performance in the 1,600, Federal Way girls' track coach Bill Harris said, "We'd hoped to go under 5:10. She obviously did that. It was an easy race for her. She didn't have to battle anyone."

Anderson, who had to come

"It was the first time I've ever ran it," said Dawson of his 100-meter race. "I went 11.2. It wasn't that bad, I was kind of happy. I didn't do the 110s today, because they wanted to get more team points. They split Ed (Miller) and me up, but for the first time I was happy."
