## Ballot is set

### Trigg, Massey to stay in city council primary

It's too late to challenge the voter's registrations and candidate eligibility of two candidates who are running for Federal Way City Council in the May 16 primary election.

The residency requirement of candidate Tom Trigg, who is running for Position 4, has been questioned by several Federal Way residents and by another candidate who is running against Trigg.

Also, the voter's registration, and consequently the eligibility to run for office, of Steve Massey have been questioned by residents and elections officials. Massey is running for Position 5.

Trigg listed his business address as his residence with King County Records and Elections Division officials and signed an affidavit stating that the address was his residence. However, he also owns a home on Vashon Island.

Massey was convicted of burglarizing a Federal Way church in 1983 and served less than a year in prison in 1985. As part of the criminal justice process, his civil rights were revoked by the state and have not yet been officially restored. That means he is not eligible to be a registered voter or a candidate,

according to state elections laws.

**THE DEADLINE** for administratively challenging the voter's registrations of both candidates through an elections division hearing ran out two weeks ago.

The deadline for challenging their registrations and having their names taken off the ballot through the judicial system passed April 21.

For that matter, ballots already have been printed. Absentee ballots became available last Wednesday at the elections division at the King County Courthouse. The rest of the absentee ballots will be mailed out tomorrow.

Since neither Trigg's nor Massey's registrations or candidate eligibilities were challenged, they remained on the ballot, despite calls to elections officials from Federal Way voters and Trigg's own admission to elections officials that the address he listed was his business address.

Unless a registered voter officially challenges those requirements with elections or court officials by a written challenge, elections procedures

## Health department delays burner permit

The Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department will not issue its decision May 8 about whether to grant the Tacoma incinerator its solid waste permit.

May 8 originally was the date set for the decision, to be made after a series of March and April public meetings about a health risk study for the tideflats plant. Concerned residents of Northeast Tacoma and Federal Way raised so many questions, however, health department staff say they need until June to address

them all.

Questions regarding the air emissions, ash, economics and other issues about the incinerator have been grouped, but staff have not yet begun to answer all of them, said Susan Alotrico, spokeswoman for the health department.

The incinerator, owned by Tacoma Public Utilities, is scheduled to begin producing electricity by burning sorted garbage, wood and coal by the end of this year.

The health department, which governs solid waste

management, has the authority to issue the plant a solid waste permit, without which the plant cannot burn garbage. The health risk study is part of the permit process.

The health risk study by the Bellevue firm EnviroSphere states that the plant will pose to the public a one-in-a-million risk of contracting cancer.

Health department staff will write a summary of all the issues presented at the meetings and will answer all questions verbally or in writing, Alotrico said.

In addition, four workshops will be scheduled, probably in early June, to answer residents' questions about the legal aspects of the health risk study, the study itself, the solid waste permit process and the engineering aspects of the study. No definite date for the workshops has been set.

The health department expects to issue its decision on the solid waste permit sometime in June at a press conference, Alotrico said. For more information, call Alotrico at 591-6498.

## Society museum seeks new home

The Historical Society of Federal Way museum is looking for a new home.

The society moved its temporary exhibit of Federal Way history from inside the mall to an empty store in early March, but the mall has rented that space and the society is in search of a new site for the museum, said Shirley Charnell, society president.

The mall gave the space to the historical society free of charge until a paying tenant was found. That new tenant will be Hickory Farms, a mall spokeswoman said.

Charnell said the museum will be moving out of the mall May 7 and hopes to have someplace to go by then.

"I've promised people it won't be to a storage unit," Charnell said.

**THE GROUP'S** president said she has been talking to the managers of local shopping centers and has been consulting other contacts in search of space.

"There's lots of empty space

in Federal Way, the trick is to find somebody who will let us have it for free," Charnell said.

She said the historical society cannot afford to pay rent, but if it must, it can pay utilities, although it would ask a small donation from museum visitors to help foot those bills.

The society is open to suggestions from anyone who has an idea or property to offer, she said. There are limitations, however, she added. One is the price. The other is space.

Since the museum opened in the mall and hosted some 30-60 visitors a day, offers of donations and loans of artifacts and other historical items have been pouring in. The historical society is running out of space to display the items and would like a larger home so it can accept donations that have been put on hold pending the acquisition of additional space, Charnell said.

**SHE SAID** 200 photos have been added to the society's store of artifacts since the museum opened March 11, as well as

A dead skunk near the Federal Way News office got our publisher, Mike Robinson, to thinking about incorporation Friday morning.

What do you do with a dead skunk, he asked as he arrived at work, and how will that change when Federal Way is a city?

In the interest of keeping the public informed about these matters, here is what happens to a dead skunk in unincorporated King County.

First, we tried calling the local King County Police Precinct at 9 a.m. They recommended calling King County Animal Control (296-3935) which seemed logical. Except that King County Animal Control doesn't open until 10 a.m. There is, however, an emergency number for "stray injured animals, livestock and vicious dogs" but not for dead skunks.

To kill time (no pun intended), we gave the King County Health Department a ring and ended up talking to their Seattle office.

That office doesn't handle Federal Way matters, but the lady did note: "We're getting all kinds of dead animal calls today — last week it was a full moon and this week it's dead animals!"

She advised me to try animal control or the local environmental health office. We chose the latter, because, of course,

animal control doesn't open until 10 a.m.

The King County Southwest Environmental Health office thought we'd enjoy six minutes of the Drifters singing "Up on the Roof," followed by Simon and Garfunkel's "The Boxer."

When they got back, they advised we try animal control — still not open.

Still looking to kill time, we thought we'd see how a real city handles dead skunks, so we tried Milton, a fourth-class city.

Miltonians need only phone the local police department, which handles dead skunks by calling the Pierce County Humane Society. If they have time, Milton Police officers actually go out and bag the dead fauna themselves to make the Humane Society's job easier.

At 10:02 a.m., we finally got to call animal control. We got a busy signal.

We got another one at 10:14 a.m., and at 10:36 a.m., and at 10:41 a.m., and at 10:53 a.m. and at...

And how will the soon-to-be city of Federal Way handle dead skunks?

"The city of Federal Way would have to contract with the county for animal control, or it would have to have its own skunk scraper," joked King County Councilman Paul Barden.


## Please put music among priorities

## New cities could get Seattle nosebleeds

In downtown Seattle these days they are wondering how high is up.

It's a question Federal Way and SeaTac will have to answer before long. In Seattle, the question involves a choice between two difficult theologies: (A) Small is beautiful; (B) Growth is probably good.

The position statements on both sides reek with religious overtones. Out here, we're pagans, luxuriant, spoiled by free parking flanked by motels with California mission motif and banks that started out as mobile homes. On our turf, a high-rise rarely gets above the level of a Little League single.

The tallest building between Tukwila and Tacoma (on old 99) is probably SeaTac Office Towers at 11 stories. That's no mushroom, but hardly alarming, compared with pinacles like the 26-story Columbia Center and its nose-bleed neighbors.

That vision, of once lovable Seattle becoming a thicket of glassy shards housing microcomputers and acres of legal briefs, is what moved some citizens to urge a building height restriction for the city.

The Downtown Seattle Association (DSA), a coalition of merchants and developers and alleged architects, has countered with a campaign that says putting a lid on Seattle would amount to a chokehold on growth, leading to a decline in jobs and eventually to the collapse of the city's infrastruc-

ture.

*Infra-structure* is a wonderful set of syllables. Technical, potent, ambiguous. Put simply, it refers to transit systems and sewers, phones and roads.

In arguing that the infrastructure may crumble if the buildings are short, the DSA may seem loony. There is good sense in the dogma, however. In developer logic, if you can't build up, you build out, and there is no out in Seattle.

All the out is out here, in suburbs already pinched for open space, but possibly receptive to a pitch for office parks anchored by 30-story pigeon coops gleaming like egos.

That's the look the DSA wants to keep in Seattle, not for esthetic appeal, but for economic whammy. In those eclectic coops, attorneys negotiate while the water-

front is restored or a bus tunnel built. What gets ignored in the DSA litany is that Seattle has other options. Growth does not always mean up.

Keeping the cityscape within human scale is the opposing view. It sounds a little smug sometimes, but even then, it errs in the right direction. It was once fun for a kid to saunter downtown among pudgy buildings like the old Rhodes or the old Bon Nordstrom's when they only sold shoes.

Seattle's new look is stark and — on certain streets, unkind. Getting used to it would be the architectural equivalent of adjusting to divorce. The Smith Tower, once a favorite of occasional visitors, now looks a little dumpy, a mother-in-law in muumuu beside a bunch of leggy stallions wearing something by Anne Klein.

So the new cities — if Seattle's citizens approve the CAP proposal — could be the dubious beneficiaries of a sudden and contagious enthusiasm to bring the building boom south.

For Seattle's sake, and ours, a wiser course would be to read between the

blueprints. Approving the Cap would not prevent creative development, might even stir a different kind of effort to life.

Out of their despair, the developers might manufacture more intimate spaces. They could learn from the example of Europe, in those ancient cities where street-level and eye-level and other homely standards were the natural, unconscious expression of our needs.

And in the churches, not the banks and institutions, the architects imagined to what heights a human spirit might soar.

It is difficult, riding the noiseless boxes that carry us like torpedoes up the office towers of Seattle, to feel anything but anonymous. That's the kind of city Seattle never wanted to become.

For new cities rising around it, Seattle's internal struggle over this issue will be an important object lesson.

If the good guys are going to win, it cannot be at the expense of the city's future. How the city makes the decision is what we ought to watch.

# Trigg says he can verify residence

are to keep those names on the ballot, said Bob Bruce, superintendent of elections.

Bruce's advice to voters who are peeved about those names remaining on the ballot is simply to wait until after the primary.

"Why not wait it out?" Bruce said. "If (they) don't make it through the primary then it ends."

The residency and civil rights questions have been published in the local media and it is unlikely that either candidate will be one of the two top vote-getters in the primary who will go on to the Sept. 19 general election, Bruce said.

HOWEVER, one candidate who is running against Trigg in Position 4 is frustrated that elections officials wouldn't remove Trigg's name even though Trigg himself told them his address was his business address.

"I find it hard to believe the registrar wouldn't revoke his registration," said Position 4 candidate Art Hagberg. "This is absolutely not proper. I don't think there's any way in the world he could take office."

Trigg responds that he spends at least 12 hours a day at his insurance agency office, takes naps there and pays taxes local-

ly because he owns the business. That should qualify him to run for office in Federal Way, he said.

Also, he lived in Federal Way for about 30 years before buying the Vashon Island house three years ago, he said.

"I think it's funny," said Trigg. "If they look up residence in the dictionary they might be better informed. It's going to be difficult for them to prove it's

not my residence because I get all my mail here...I spend all my time here.

"People ought to be more interested in what I do during my working hours than where I sleep."

MASSEY responds that he thought his civil rights had been automatically restored when he was released from prison. He has contacted the state Indeter-

minate Sentence Review Board to have his rights restored.

However, it could be several months before the board completes its investigation into whether Massey's rights should be restored, said Dennis Marsh, executive secretary of the board.

If either candidate does make it through the primary, the elections department administrative review process for revoking registrations and removing candidates' names from the ballot starts again.

If someone then officially challenges a candidate, the department will hold a hearing before the county canvassing board which both the challenger and the candidate who is being challenged attend.

If the canvassing board decides to revoke the registration, that candidate's name will be taken off the ballot.

Also, if the candidate's registration is revoked, the elections division could refer the matter to the King County Prosecuting Attorney for criminal prosecution.

Since candidates must sign an affidavit stating they meet the requirements of the state law to run for office, they could be charged with a misdemeanor if the division determines the affidavit is false, Bruce said.

# Accused man has a sex-offense history

A Tacoma man who was on work release from Western State Hospital's Sex Offender Program has been charged with molesting a 6-year-old girl at a Federal Way shopping center.

Charges filed by the King County Prosecutor's office on Wednesday say that Kenneth Lee Herald, 30, approached the child on Saturday, April 22 when she became separated from her father. Herald allegedly convinced the girl to follow him behind a display where he had sexual contact with her.

The father found the child a few minutes later, crying hysterically. When she told him what had happened and was able to point out the assailant, the father gave chase and caught the man.

Documents filed with the charges say that Herald was an out-patient at Western State, where he had been sent following a 1982 conviction for raping an 80-year-old woman. At that time, Herald was sentenced to 20 years in prison, but the sentence was suspended on the condition that he successfully complete the sex offender program at Western State.

Maureen Saylor, a counselor with the sex offender program, said that Herald would not be allowed back into the program.

"We don't take re-offenders back," she said. "He lied and he was deceptive and we don't want anything to do with him."

Herald is being held in the King County Jail on \$150,000 bond.

# Massey charged with pull-tab gambling fraud

Steve Massey, candidate for Position 5 in the Federal Way City Council primary election, has been charged with gambling fraud.

Massey was convicted in 1983 of burglarizing a Federal Way Church and served less than a year in prison for the crime.

Massey, 24, appeared at his trial on gambling fraud charges in Southwest District Court on Thursday. However, Massey and his attorney asked for a continuance until May 18, after the May 16 primary elec-

tion, so his attorneys could gather evidence.

Massey is accused of defrauding Trudy's Tavern in the Sea-Tac area out of about \$260 in pull-tab winnings. The incident allegedly occurred in November 1988 when Massey was working as a bartender at the tavern.

Massey said he is not guilty of the alleged fraud.

The alleged violation is a gross misdemeanor that carries a maximum penalty of one year in jail and a \$5,000 fine.

numerous newspaper articles that need to be sorted and laminated. To display these items, local historians are asking not only for donated space, but panels, display cases and cabinets to hold the items, Charnell said. Locking display cases are especially needed, to

display more valuable items.

The historical society also is hoping for the loan of a storefront or building for at least a month or longer, she added. Although society members have gotten the moving business down to a science, they'd prefer to move the items as little as possible.

Also important is location. Charnell stressed that a museum needs to be visible and easily accessible, with plenty of parking. Eventually, she surmises, the historical society will build a museum or be part of a new city hall or library.

"It's vital to be in a center of activity," she added. It's also

vital, she said, to keep the museum alive, especially now that Federal Way is a city.

"We've got a little bit of history going now and the community wants to keep it going," Charnell said.

# School district awards modernization bid

The Federal Way School Board has accepted Absher Construction Company's bid of \$8,840,800 to modernize Federal Way High School, part of which was built in 1938.

The decision was made Friday morning at a special meeting of the school board. The board also

approved the schematic design for the Lake Dolloff Elementary School modernization project.

Absher, a Puyallup firm, will begin the modernization of Federal Way High School this summer and is expected to work beyond next summer.

Modernization will include:

Updating the school's electrical systems, fire safety systems and handicapped access so that they meet codes, adapting the building for modern educational programs, giving the school a facelift, and making it more energy efficient.

The project originally was ex-

pected to cost \$7.5 million. Classes will continue to be held at the school while work is being done. Modernization will be paid for with money from a \$50 million bond approved by voters in 1984. The state will provide \$2.4 million in matching money, which was secured last year.

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# More candidates are introduced

## Charles Gittings

Charles "Ben" Gittings believes he has the right stuff to be a member of the Federal Way City Council.

"The job of a leader is to find out what his constituents want, look into it, bring it back, and allow them to make the decision," he said.

Gittings, 58, is running for Position 3.

The 18-year Federal Way resident is an Army veteran of the Korean War who has been especially active on veterans' issues and organizations. He is the State Adjutant for the Military Order of the Purple Heart; District 11 Junior Vice Commander for the Veterans of Foreign War (VFW); Commander of Federal Way VFW; Commander of the Federal Way Military Order of the Purple Heart; and Senior Vice Commander of the Federal Way American Legion.

Gittings also is on the board of several other veterans' and community organizations, including the Federal Way Community Center, which has been set up in the old Brook Lake Community Club. He is a

member of the local Elks, Moose and Eagles lodges.

Gittings has held numerous positions in private business. He most recently was a real estate salesman for Century 21 in Federal Way and Burien before obtaining a franchise to sell a health food product, Barley Green.

Gittings is married and has seven grown children. He lives near Federal Way High School.

## Kap Pease

Once the new Federal Way City Council takes care of hiring a city manager, Kenneth F. "Kap" Pease wants to get to work dealing with the road situation.

A 14-year Federal Way resident, Pease, 44, believes the roads currently are inadequate to handle the demand. The time and economic climate are right to impose road improvement costs on developers, he said.

"We're not overpopulated," he said, "but we are overpopulated for what we can accommodate."

As a licensed Realtor, Pease says he hears the reasons why people want to leave Federal Way and why some people don't want to move here at all. The roads, he said, are mentioned frequently.

He is running for Position 6 on the Federal Way City Council in the May 16 primary. He switched to that position after originally filing for Position 4. He made the move, he said, because at one point, it appeared Robert Stead was going to run unopposed. Now, five candidates are in the running for the two-year term.

While Pease has no college degree, he has taken many business-sponsored management courses and thinks his real world experience has prepared him well for the responsibilities of being a council member.

He and his wife have been active in working with troubled youth, including taking many of them into their Twin Lakes home.

They have six children.

## Lewis Drohman

Lewis Drohman, a manager of quality assurance with Boeing Advanced Systems, is a candidate for Federal Way City Council in Position 3.

Drohman, 55, has lived in the Federal Way area since 1959. He currently resides near Federal Way High School.

Drohman has an associate of arts degree from Highline Community College and a bachelor's degree in accounting from the University of Washington.


Moncrief's award was based on earning the highest test scores during firefighter training sessions. Rice's award was based on a vote of the other recruits.

# Sewer district changes name, talks merger

Big things are happening at the Des Moines, er, Midway Sewer District.

The district's three-member board voted unanimously last week to change the district's name.

"It's kind of logical, I think," said district manager Jim Henry, noting that the district extends from Federal Way to McMicken Heights and Normandy Park.

But if another idea in the works becomes reality, the district may have to change its name again — to the Midway Water and Sewer District. Henry and board chairman Jack Hendrickson have been talking merger with Water District 75 Manager Ken Hall and water board chairman George Blomberg.

Talks are only in the early stages, officials say. Hall and Henry suggest hiring a consultant to study the issue. "But it's beneficial, probably, to the ratepayers," Hendrickson said.

COMBINING BILLING, engineering, equipment and office space makes sense, the officials say. As it is, the districts must coordinate on water use, lines and street restoration, Henry said.

"Have you had the urge to merge?" was Blomberg's campaign slogan when he ran unsuccessfully against sewer commissioner Bill Kemp two years ago.

The water district plans to purchase a new office building at 23850 30th Ave. S., near the Midway Drive In. The district's current office at 19863 28th Ave. S. sits in the middle of a planned road-improvement district south of Sea-Tac Airport.

Officials say enough land is available next to the Midway building to either expand it or build next to it if the merger occurs.

The sewer district is outgrowing its office at 22620 Seventh

Ave. S., says Commissioner Ron Nelsen.

BUT WATER District 75 Commissioner Dan Caldwell isn't so hot about the idea.

"The areas don't overlap well," he said. "It'd be better to do it with the Southwest Suburban Sewer District."

Water District 75 extends to Federal Way to the south, to State Route 518 to the northeast and to Three Tree Point to the northwest. The Southwest Suburban Sewer District ex-

tends to the Seattle city line to the north and to about South 208th Street to the south, lying entirely west of Sea-Tac Airport.

A merger, Caldwell contended, would be "probably just buying time" until the city of Des Moines takes over the utilities.

Henry and other sewer district officials say the name change was prompted by a combination of the incorporation of the Sea-Tac area and their belief that the city plans to take over the district.

It wouldn't make sense for the city of Des Moines to dictate sewer district policy when the district also serves parts of the cities of Federal Way, Kent, Normandy Park and Sea-Tac, Henry said.

DES MOINES City Councilman Richard Kennedy said the city is not necessarily planning to take over the district. The city is merely studying utilities as part of its long-range, comprehensive plan, he said.

"That (the new name) doesn't

change anything. Think of the cost to the ratepayers," he said, of changing stationery and signs. "What a foolish maneuver."

Kennedy introduced a resolution opposing the name change at Thursday's City Council meeting. It was approved unanimously.

Henry said the district would simply wait until it prints more bills and stationery to change the name. The district has only two signs, on the district office

and at its treatment plant on Des Moines Creek, he said.

"That's pretty much peanuts," Henry said. A merger, he added, is "where the real savings will come to the ratepayer."

The name change, in accordance with state law, has been sent to the King County Council for approval, Henry said.

Kennedy declined comment on a possible merger of the two districts.

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## Property taxes due

Property owners are reminded that May 1 is the deadline for payment of 1989 first-half property taxes in order to avoid interest and penalties.

April 30 is the normal payment deadline; however, since April 30 falls on a Sunday, the deadline has been extended to the next business day.

Taxpayers are cautioned that failure to receive a tax statement does not eliminate the responsibility to pay the taxes or any delinquency charges.

Many homeowners, however, include property-tax payments with their mortgage payments. Those who pay that way need not worry about the May 1 deadline if their mortgage company is making the payment.

Tax payments can be made by mail or in person at Room 600, King County Administration Bldg., 500 Fourth Avenue, Seattle WA 98104, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Mailed payments must be postmarked no later than May 1 to avoid the addition of interest.

The county can foreclose on property with taxes that are three years delinquent.

Property owners who have not received tax statements this year should call the King County Finance Division at 296-3850.
