Builder's brushfires trigger smoke alarm

If Ed Coutts has his way, local residents will make things pretty hot for a company that hopes to conduct land-clearing burns at a construction site in Northeast Tacoma.

Coutts, fire marshal of Fire District 39 (Federal Way), says that proposed controlled fires at the future site of Harbor Ridge Estates near Dash Point State Park would bring smoke and ash not only to Northeast Tacoma, but Federal Way as well, particularly Twin Lakes.

"There is no doubt in my mind that this would affect our community. I don't feel we should eat Tacoma's smoke," he said.

Block Brothers Industries USA Inc., a land-development company in Seattle, wants to conduct land-clearing burns over the course of five years as it develops the 200-acre Harbor Ridge housing development.

To do that, the company must get a variance to burn in one of

the region's new no-burn zones, which include Northeast Tacoma, from the board of the Puget Sound Air Pollution Control Agency. A public hearing has been set for July 13, at which the board will consider the variance.

Coutts says the burning would have widespread effect, because although the development site is in Northeast Tacoma, winds from the south and southwest will pick up the smoke and ash of land-clearing fires and take it to Twin Lakes.

Those winds are particularly strong in February and March. South and southwest winds buffeted Northeast Tacoma 44 percent of the time those months in 1987, according to Puget Sound Air Pollution Control figures.

LAND-CLEARING burns would make the removal of materials such as tree stumps and brush cheaper for Block

Rock and soccer join fest agenda

A soccer challenge, music by Eric Tingstad and Nancy Rumbel and a teen concert by local rock group Legend have been added to the list of events at Family Fest, a two-day celebration to be held in Federal Way in early July.

Last-minute arrangements are still being made for the festival, to be held at Steel Lake Park on South 312th Street on Saturday and Sunday, July 8 and 9. But Family Fest coordinator Susan Key says most of the schedule is set.

"We're very, very far along — I'm pretty happy, at this point," she said.

Family Fest will feature live performances, food booths, hands-on craftmaking and displays, almost all at no

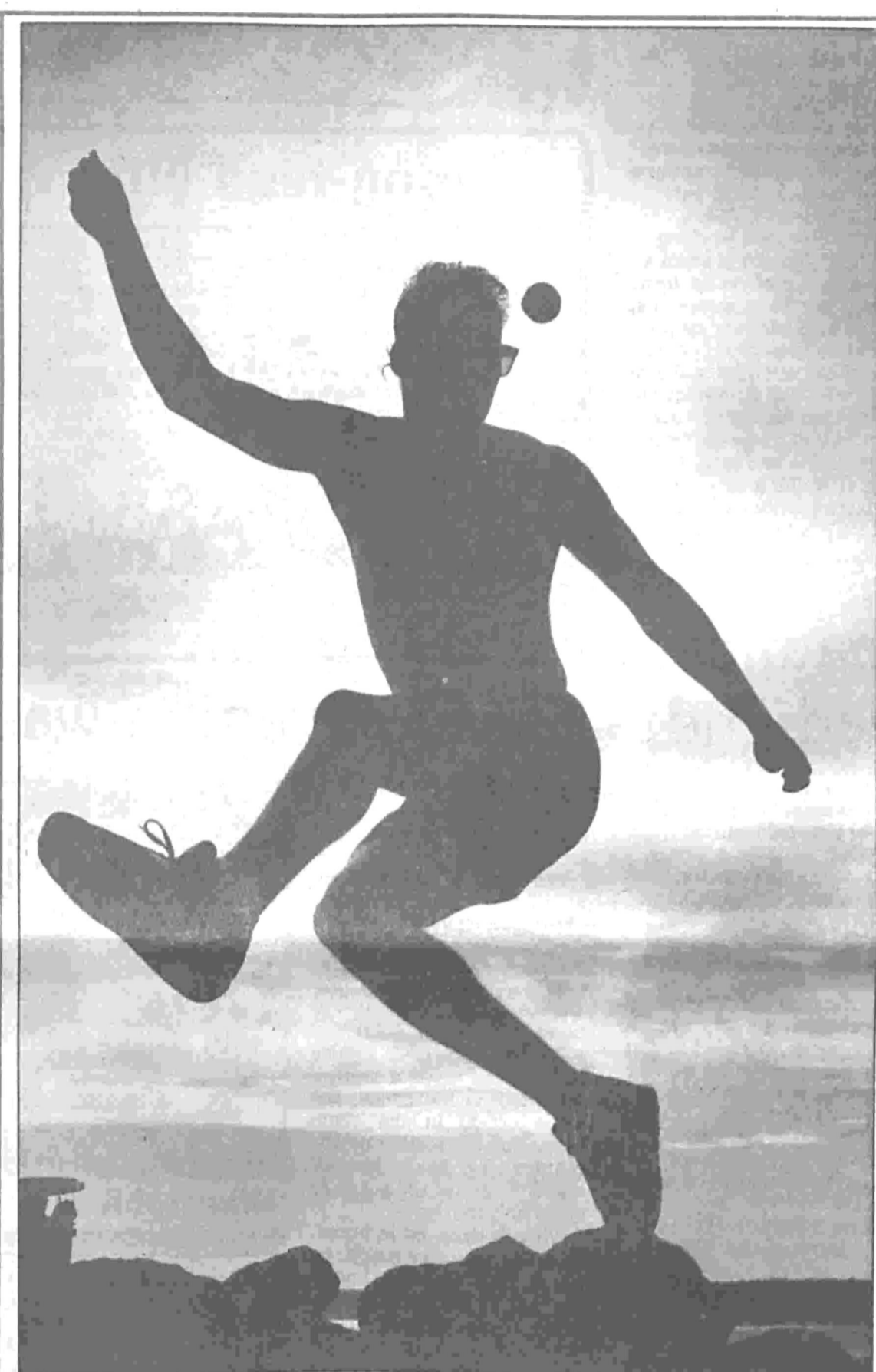
cost. The program is sponsored by the Federal Way Centennial Committee, an organization in charge of local events relating to the state's centennial.

Police still seek youth's attackers

A young Kent man, just days shy of his 19th birthday, lay in serious condition yesterday morning in Harborview Medical Center with a gunshot wound to the head.

Chad Parkhurst, a recent Kentwood High grad, and two friends were driving westbound on Highway 18 shortly after 10:30 p.m. when an altercation with passengers in another car ended in gunfire.

King County police report that Parkhurst was sitting between Lisa Shinaberger, 21, Kent, and Robin Summer, 22, Seattle, in the front seat of Shinaberger's Pontiac LeMans. Summer was driving the car.

Shinaberger told police she had advised Summer to drive slowly because her car had not been running well. Summer was heading into Federal Way in the left-hand lane of the highway on a stretch between Military Road and 32nd Avenue South, when a late-model black Pontiac Firebird with smoked-glass windows approached from behind and began to tailgate.

The women said Parkhurst made an obscene gesture at the Firebird, but it continued to tailgate. Parkhurst then reached across Shinaberger and repeated the gesture out the passenger window.

At that point the Firebird slowly pulled alongside their vehicle in the right lane and the driver reached out with a gun in his hand and fired into the passenger window of their car, Summer said.

Parkhurst was hit in the right side of the head. The Firebird was last seen headed toward Tacoma on Interstate 5.

Summer drove to St. Francis Community Hospital, where an emergency room physician told police Parkhurst was struck by what appeared to be a small caliber bullet that remained lodged in his head.

He was airlifted to Harborview Medical Center, where surgeons operated through the early morning hours to remove the bullet.

Police are seeking two young Asian males, approximately 20 years old, in connection.

Health clinic site would consolidate services

Federal Way social service activists had two reasons to cheer on Monday when the King County Council approved a \$3.5 million dollar appropriation to buy land for three new health clinics, one of which will be built in Federal Way.

They were pleased that the county is moving forward on plans for the health clinics, but they were even more excited about the site selected for the

new clinic.

Councilman Paul Barden confirmed that the Seattle - King County Health Department had chosen a 2.5 acre site adjacent to the Elks Lodge near West Campus for the new clinic.

That choice will enable the social service activists to carry out a dream of consolidating all social services at one location in the Federal Way area.

AS PLANS NOW stand, the

new health clinic will be joining the South King County Multi-Service Center, which is currently negotiating to buy the Elks Lodge building at 1200 S. 336th St. The multi-service center plans to move into the building by early September.

In addition, there is enough vacant land in the adjoining area to locate several other social services, including food and clothing banks and

emergency housing, in the complex.

State Rep. Dick Schoon (R-30th), who chairs a group of citizen activists working to bring the one-stop social service center to Federal Way, praised the council's vote and the land site decision.

"This brings to fruition the health care clinic we've been envisioning for several years," he said.

SCHOON ESTIMATES that the entire complex could encompass five acres of land in the centrally located spot.

He said his group will be talking with organizations such as the Salvation Army and the Boy Scouts of America about locating their headquarters in

the complex also.

The new health clinic, which will not be complete until the spring of 1991, is part of a \$99.8 million bond issue approved by the voters two years ago.

Officials say the clinic will serve between 15,000 and 20,000 clients a year.

Affordable housing

Project targets median incomes

Will employers soon have to pay housing supplements to attract entry-level workers to the Seattle-King County area? Will developers be forced to build housing units for low- or moderate-income people?

Businesses in cities as far away as Boston and Boulder, Colo., are paying the consequences of a lack of affordable housing, and some Puget Sound employers fear the trend will arrive here.

Concerned employers and private developers say they also want to stop another trend:

moderate-income family homelessness. They are acting through a new partnership to increase the supply of affordable housing.

The newly launched King County Housing Partnership has been organized by the Greater Seattle Chamber of Commerce. Its goal is to encourage the production of 1,000 new housing units by 1995 for families earning \$12,000 to \$25,000 a year.

THE NON-PROFIT GROUP of housing and finance experts is a mediator between private developers and 31 suburban cities, negotiating a variety of

incentives to build affordable housing. It is contacting apartment developers, looking for a commitment from them to work with the partnership.

Terry Axelrod, co-chairwoman of the King County Housing Partnership and vice chairwoman of the Seattle Chamber, said a study begun two years ago on downtown homelessness turned out to reveal the tip of a huge housing affordability problem.

"Nearly 25 percent of the homeless are working full-time," Axelrod said. "In many cases, there are two adult wage

earners in the family and still they are unable to afford the rents that are out there."

Over the past decade, salaries have not kept pace with rents in King County. The average monthly cost of an apartment climbed from \$267 in 1980 to \$446 in 1988 — representing a 67 percent rise — while the median income rose only 47 percent, from \$20,700 to \$30,400, according to county and real-estate industry figures.

Marcia Gamble Guthrie, executive director of the housing

Chamber's agenda shows who cares

In its annual retreat last month, the Federal Way Chamber of Commerce board turned its back on the past but in mapping the future, showed it will be true to its tradition of leadership in the community. In the absence of local government, for years this chamber has been uniquely active as an advocate of non-business concerns in Federal Way. St. Francis Hospital grew out of a health care campaign backed by the chamber. Cityhood itself was a chamber concern for more than 20 years.

With a city in the making now, the chamber board rightly will re-direct its attention to matters more purely beneficial to business.

But the top two goals on the list for the coming year are evidence that this chamber will be an active partner in the community for years to come.

First on the list is the plan to support the Goodwill Games and the aquatics facility under construction here. Chamber members can help themselves and the community gear up to host the thousands of spectators and participants who are expected to visit the area in 1990.

The second objective is the plan to "create a working relationship with the new city." While that might seem inevitable, since the city will oversee such matters as licensing, transportation and zoning, this chamber appears to appreciate that taking the initiative is both wise and helpful.

The new city faces a hectic schedule in its first year of life. Just building the staff and services will occupy the city manager's agenda. If the chamber can tend its own garden while nudging city officials to create the kind of climate that makes doing business attractive and tolerable, both the city and the chamber will be winners, and so will the community at large. For that, the chamber gets a vote of confidence, and thanks for its nurturing attitude, a welcome one as Federal Way enters what will be its most momentous decade yet.

In traffic, madness leads to dead end

A young man lay in critical condition in a Federal Way hospital Monday, shot by an unidentified assailant. But all of us were wounded.

We are all wounded when angry outbursts in traffic lead to random violence. We are all left shaky, insecure, knowing how common such outbursts have become.

They happen often enough in our own vehicles. Even if we resist the impulse to leap from our cars to attack another driver, the temptation may have occurred to us. Even if we have never considered the ugly idea of physically assaulting someone for cutting us off at the stoplight, we may have cut someone up with our words, offended mightily that he would have the nerve to enter traffic too quickly.

In those temptations, in those words, in that impulse to attack, we lose a little of our humanity. How many of us have found after driving through freeway traffic, that we carry some of that automotive hostility home with us?

As traffic volume rises around us, how many of us have spontaneously wished to vaporize the cars ahead of us, along with all their occupants? It must be the most common fantasy of 20th century life. It has spawned an entire line of toys, not to mention a dozen automotive expressions (like "road hog" or hot-rodder) that show the psychic toll taken by our daily drive to work.

We may blame the assailant, for having such a thin appreciation of life. But how thick is ours? We may blame the victim, for not thinking twice about how a competing driver might react to a flippant gesture. But mainly, we can blame our own attitudes toward speed, space and each other.

Whenever we are tempted to leap from the car to pulverize some pipsqueak who had the nerve to get in our way, we invite a violent disregard of our own humanity.

Whenever we feel compelled to insult another driver in our hurry to get home, we surrender a little more to an ugliness that lurks in all of us.

Even a peaceful demeanor in traffic is no guarantee. Slowpokes are more despised than speed merchants in hasty America. We seem compelled to drive, though we hate the experience, and as a consequence to hate the others who have decided to join us in this cruel communion.

Slowing down, the standard plea, is not likely. Obviously, we need a different mode of travel — mass transit is the current panacea — and soon, before we all succumb to the survival instinct that rides beside us in our upholstered assault on the other road warriors who have the nerve to tempt us.

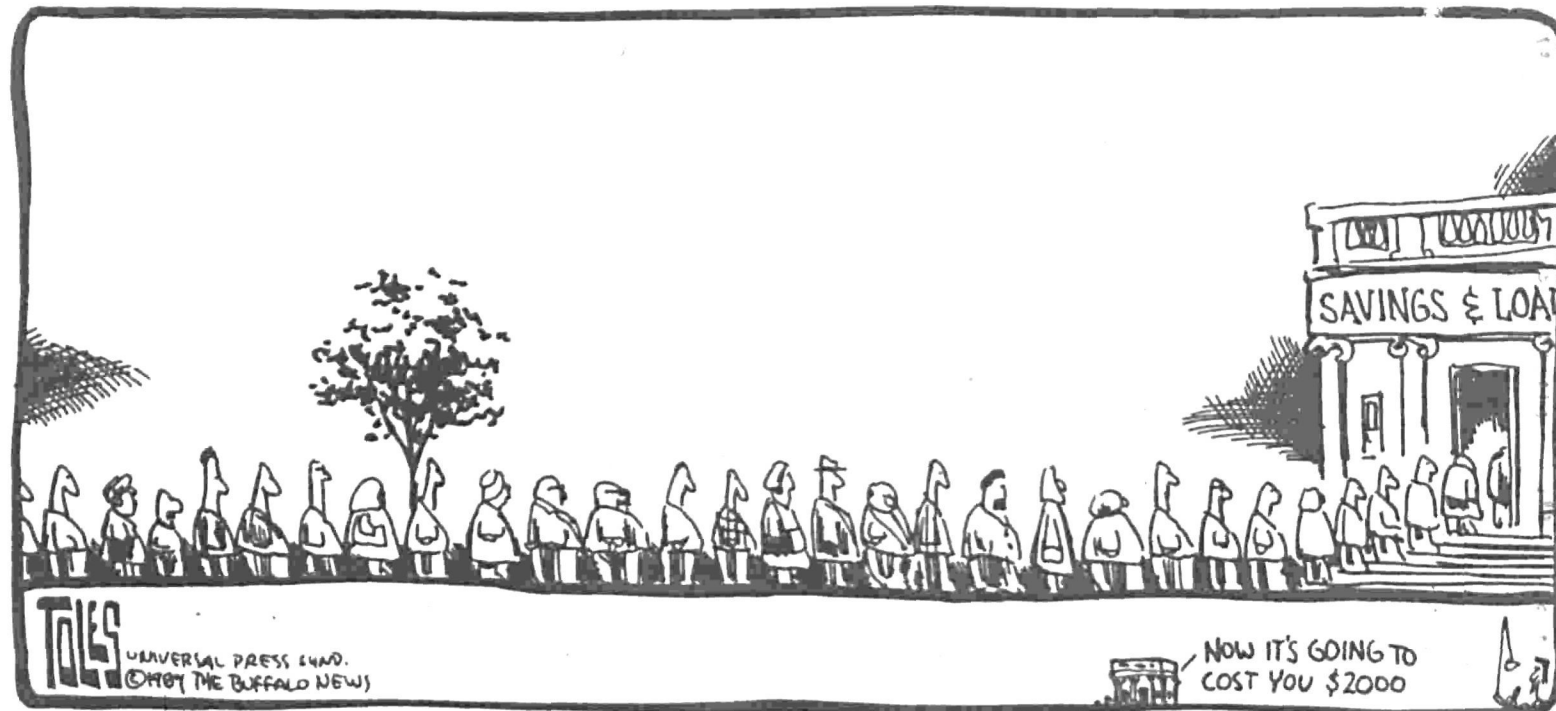
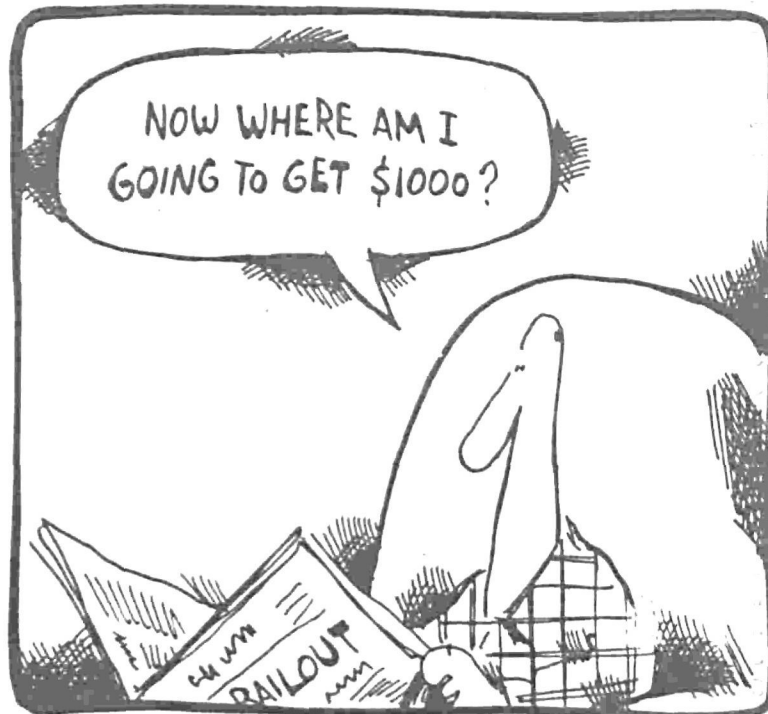
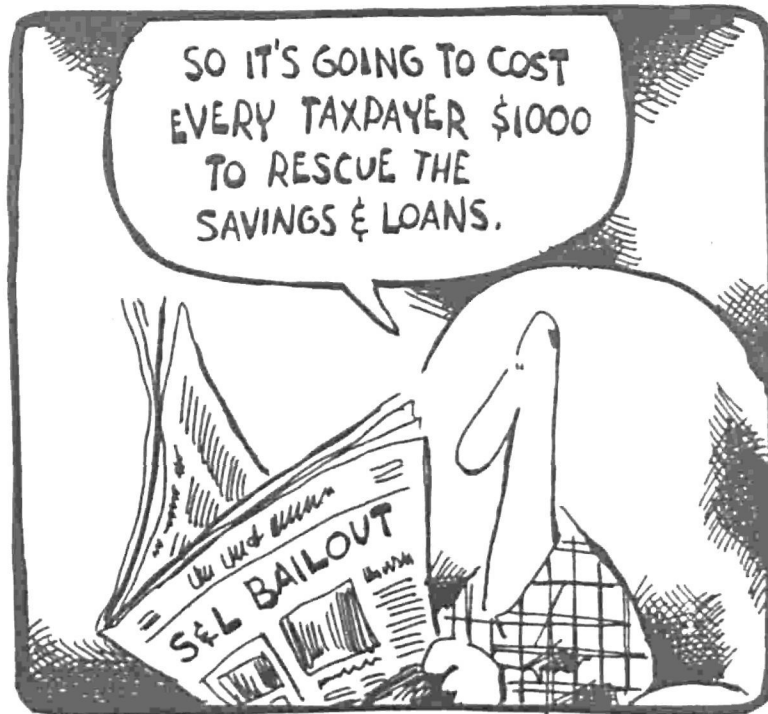
Correction: Open-space letter out of date

Bored caveman was first philosopher

In the first days of true summer, waking up late in the bright bedroom, a kid feels uneasy.

The shadows of the school year follow him like detectives. As he leaves his room, entering the cool hallway to the kitchen, he has a hunch that he is alone in the house. Maybe aliens have silently taken his family.

Even after he finds a puffy sister at the table, a brother sprawled on the couch, the same cereal in the same boxes and the toaster on the counter, he holds himself apart, waits for the scene to come fully into focus.

When it does, he is bored. No book, no board game, no toy attracts him. If a buddy dropped by, he would ignore him, grunting answers like a captured ape. If asked what's wrong, he will not know what to say.

Looking back, I think I can tell him. He is entering a period of clairvoyance. Something tells him that life will not always be a seamless adventure. There will be other times like this.

This mood will visit him again when he retires, or changes jobs, or finishes col-

lege, or ends a marriage. It will come some vacant Sunday when the yard work's done, the fence painted, and nobody's home — the wife on a trip, his kids grown up.

Solving that riddle again and again, his inner resources will be put to the test. But now, at ten or eleven or twelve years old, he is a novice, only beginning to learn the shape and size and texture of his boredom. It is as if someone handed him a heavy hammer, but no

nails, or a loaded paintbrush, but no canvas, or a solitary oar without a rowboat.

Wise men say there is opportunity in boredom. True, but telling this to a twelve-year-old is like trying to teach a turtle to foxtrot.

Still, we are bound to try. If we leave him to find his own solution, he might carve the bannister into a gargoyle, like we did, or concoct some sinister potion that will explode in his closet, soaking his only suit.

So we put him to work, teaching him, we hope, that labor is the antidote to uselessness. Perhaps it is, but it seems fair to wonder whether our ancestors arrived at the same conclusion.

We have defined our lives by the schedules and the rhythm of work only for a few centuries now. In the doldrums of pre-history, what did our hairy cousins do on Sunday? Without a weekend to recover from the work week, how did a caveman know when to relax, and where did he hang out, when there was only the world around him, streetless, mapless, all terrain and no taverns.

Unless you count this column, the history of boredom has not been written. So we cannot read it. Neither could the caveman. But we can guess at it. Like the boy in the breakfast nook, the caveman must have made a choice.

He could meditate, vegetate or initiate. Even without a prodding parent, his human intelligence would lead him to some choice. Shall we take that choice away from the drowsy boy?

I say we leave him to invent his own solution, not only because it is good for him, a training ground for similar dilemmas he will face. But also because he is a symbol of our hopes. In his newness, he may stumble over choices we ignored.

In his curiosity, he may turn to magic or madness or mischief. If we save him too soon from his boredom, we may save him from some beautiful potential only boredom can manufacture, as it must have manufactured our first temples, our first music, our first philosophy, our first words.

Schools should delay surplus-site sale

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Meeting targets traffic on Eighth

A dangerous road near Mirror Lake Elementary School has spurred a public meeting to be held at the school July 5. Parents, school district representatives and King County Councilman Paul Barden have been invited to the meeting, which will begin at 10 a.m. at Mirror Lake school, 625 S. 314th St. To be discussed is a segment of Eighth Avenue South, between South 314th and 315th streets, where parents say children cannot cross the street because of speeding cars. A crossing guard was stationed at that portion of road last year, said Rebecca Watling, meeting coordinator, but traffic continued to speed along. The guard's flag was run over one



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day, she added. Additional crossing guards, flashing warning lights and beefed-up police enforcement on the street will be considered at the meeting. For more information, call Watling at 839-7284.

Free disposal offered

The first weekend of a new month is almost here and that means Federal Way residents have an opportunity to dispose of garden waste for free. For the third month in a row, King County will accept garden waste (lawn clippings, leaves, etc.) free of charge at the Neighborhood Recycle Center, South 343rd Street and Pacific Highway South.

The site will be open Saturday and Sunday from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. The goal of the program is to reduce the amount of waste being dumped in county landfills. All material collected at the site will be recycled at a commercial yard-waste composting facility. For more information call 296-4483.

Carpenters call strike

Carpenters in western and central Washington have walked off several worksites, including construction at Thomas Jefferson High School, since a strike against Associated General Contractors was declared Monday. The Federal Way School District is in a wait-and-see position until it assesses the potential length of the strike and its effect on work at Thomas Jefferson. The school

is scheduled for major modernization construction up to August 1990. Contingency plans for the opening of school, including late starts and double shifts, have been drawn up for Sacajawea Junior High and Thomas Jefferson, in case of a lengthy strike. Work at Sacajawea will not be affected, however. It is not yet known if the fall startup of school at Thomas Jefferson will be altered.

Legislators meet tonight

All three 30th District legislators are sponsoring a town hall meeting at 7:30 tonight at the Federal Way Library. Sen. Peter von Reichbauer, Rep. Dick Schoon and Rep. Jean Marie Brough will talk

about the recent legislative session and answer questions and address constituent concerns. The library is at 848 S. 320th St. Another meeting is at 7 p.m. tomorrow at Edgewood Junior High, 10909 24th St. E. in Puyallup.

Company asks for OK to burn

Brothers Industries, which would otherwise have to remove them from the site for disposal or churn them up at the site. "Every other option is more expensive, but they are viable options," said Mario Miller of the Puget Sound Air Pollution Control Agency. "It costs a little more for clean air."

Block Brothers Industries did not respond to a call for information about its land-clearing plans. Until recently, land-clearing burns have been allowed in most areas under Puget Sound Air Pollution Control regulations. But complaints about smoke and ash led to the agency's decree that highly populated areas, including Northeast Tacoma and Federal Way, should be off-limits to such fires. Some development companies

already had received permits for land-clearing burns before the new rules went into effect, and so can conduct such fires until September. Any developers without a burning permit, however, are to adhere to the no-burn regulations after July 8, or face penalties.

BLOCK BROTHERS has conducted legal land-clearing fires at the Harbor Ridge site. Based on complaints of smoke and ash by neighbors, however, the company was last week handed fines for mismanagement of its fires. To be allowed to continue burns at the site, said Miller, Block Brothers must convince the agency's board that "What they're doing is of greater benefit to the community than if they don't do it." Block Brothers Industries is the first developer to request a variance from the new regula-

tions, said Miller. The company requests that the variance be allowed for five years. The effect of smoke and ash is one of two reasons Courts has for wanting to see the variance denied by the board, which is made up of representatives of various cities and is chaired by Tacoma Mayor Doug Sutherland. His second argument is that allowing one variance to the no-burn zones probably means more variances for other developers in the future. "Once they give in to one con-

tractor, how can they turn others down?" he said. The Block Brothers' variance hearing will be held at 9:30 a.m. on July 13 in the public meeting room of the Pierce County Annex, 2401 S. 35th St., in Tacoma. The hearing is open to the public. at various times, too. A petting zoo will be open to children.

Children are invited to try out the Chiquita Challenge, a soccer skills test to be conducted on the park's south side both days. Participants will bounce, juggle and boot soccer balls through an obstacle course, and the fastest will receive prizes from the Chiquita food company. Signups for the challenge will be held the mornings of July 8 and 9, at the park.

The Seattle Children's Museum Mini-City also will be on display both days. The Mini-City is a child-size collection of buildings, including a post office, fire station and grocery store, open for exploration by kids. The city will move to Gateway Center after Family

Fest as part of a week-long donation drive for the Federal Way Food Bank.

Besides concessions, two items will have price tags attached: a kitemaking workshop, at which kites can be made for about \$2, and a craft booth that features hats made of recyclable materials, for about \$1.

Key has also secured the services of Metro Transit for the event. Buses will leave the Metro park-and-ride lot near SeaTac Mall every 15 minutes, and head for the park. Round-trip rides from the lot to the park and back will cost 25 cents.

"The idea is to avoid the hassle...just leave the car and go," said Key. Family Fest will be open from 9:30 a.m. to dusk both days.

Calling all spare tents...

Coordinators of Family Fest are putting out an all-points bulletin for much-needed items.

Last-minute needs include two family-size tents, to be used as dressing rooms for Tickle Tune Typhoon and other children's entertainers, and electrical cable and ground-fault interruptors for food booths.

The items would be needed both July 8 and 9, and would be

returned at the close of Family Fest, said coordinator Susan Key. Borrowing the tents and electrical equipment would help cut costs for the event, sponsored by the Federal Way Centennial Committee.

partnership, believes that public-spirited developers, concerned about high rents, will address the need before local regulations force their involvement.

"Quite frankly, they're pragmatists," Guthrie said. "They would rather demonstrate a good faith effort to provide affordable housing, and to, perhaps, head off what will be a growing tide of panic." GUTHRIE, FORMERLY employed by Seattle's Department of Community Development, said that the group is asking apartment developers to work on at least one of their projects with the partnership.

For example, if the developer of a 100-unit project wanted 20 percent of the units to be available to moderate-income people, the project details would be reviewed by the partnership for approval. The partnership

then would negotiate with the city for developer incentives.

Cities might offer a "density bonus," which allows a greater number of units per acre to be built. Or, innovative concepts in financing can be arranged, because many lenders are active on the partnership board. Tax incentives may be available in the future.

The partnership's two-year budget is \$65,000, half from corporate contributions and half generated by fees paid by developers and cities, according to Axelrod. Offices of the King County Housing Partnership are located within the Greater Seattle Chamber of Commerce. The telephone number is 461-7200.

The reception from local city planning departments toward the housing partnership has been good. But, both Axelrod and Guthrie now look to them for a political mandate in order to move the affordable housing issue forward.

Stephanie Warren, principal planner for the city of Bellevue, said affordable housing was one of the city's 1989 priorities. She endorsed the partnership.

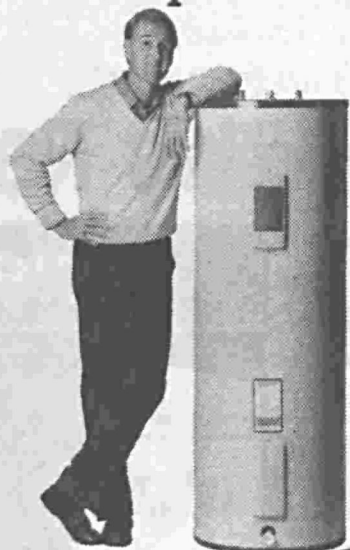
"We see it as complementary to the work we're doing. They can get housing on the ground," she said.

ON THE OTHER hand, the city of Kent thinks that it has done more than its share toward producing affordable multi-family housing, according to Jim Hansen, assistant city administrator.

"We're overrun with apartments in the moderate price range," Hansen said. "Just 15 years ago, 25 percent of our housing stock was multi-family units, but today it's 65 percent."

Kurt Creager, chief of housing and economic development for King County and another public-sector member of the partnership, is supportive of the partnership's efforts.

Man exposes self to two young girls

Two girls told police a man exposed himself to them and then chased them a short distance as they played at a Federal Way school Thursday.

The two girls, 10 and 13, said they were at Mark Twain Elementary School at about 7:30 p.m. when they noticed a man standing in the breezeway. The man had his jeans down around his knees and was exposing himself to them.

The girls said that they ran toward South Star Lake Road and that the man ran after them shouting something they could not hear.

A witness told police she saw the girls running away from the school and noticed the man getting into an older, white over metallic blue car and drive away. She did not know the make or year.

The man is described as white, 25-30 years old, standing 6 feet tall and weighing 150 pounds. He has brown hair and wore blue jeans and a T-shirt.

Couple fight over car-cocaine trade

A Federal Way couple got into a fight Tuesday morning when a woman learned her husband had traded their car for cocaine.

She told police they argued, and she was sitting at the kitchen table when her husband punched her in the jaw. She fled to the bathroom and he followed, and punched her in the forehead.

Police were summoned by a friend who had been visiting, and arrested the 31-year-old husband and booked him into the King County Jail for investigation of fourth-degree assault. His 29-year-old wife had visible swelling on her forehead and a sore jaw, but was not hospitalized.

Boy tells his mom teen molested him

A 5-year-old boy told his mother he was molested Wednesday by an older neighbor boy.

The boy's mother told King County police her son came running home frightened and afraid to talk Wednesday morning. She finally persuaded him to tell her that he had been playing in the woods with a 16-year-old neighbor, and that they had been setting fires.

The boy's mother said she noticed her son's pants were unzipped, and asked him about that. He told her the older boy had touched his "privates," and she called police.

An officer spoke to the young boy, who showed him where the alleged incident occurred. The officer was told the teen-ager had rubbed the younger boy's back and stomach and unzipped his pants.

At the time, police were unable to contact the older boy.

Restroom is scene of reported rape

A woman told King County police she was raped in a restaurant ladies room by a man she had met earlier that evening.

The 21-year-old Des Moines woman told police she was at Billy McHale's Restaurant with a girlfriend when they were joined by two men, one of whom was known to her girlfriend.

The woman said she left the table to use the restroom and upon leaving the restroom stall, was confronted by the man who had been introduced to her earlier as "Jeff." She said he forced her back into the stall by grabbing her throat, removed her shorts and bathing suit bottom and raped her.

In the meantime, her girlfriend came in to the restroom to check on her and became alarmed when she saw the woman's clothes on the stall floor, she told police. The woman said her friend asked if she was OK, and the man, who had his hand over her mouth, told her to say she was being ill.

According to police reports, the friend left and the man continued to rape the woman.

When the attack was over, the woman told police the man returned to their table. She said he was still there when she returned to the table five minutes later, and when the man moved over to sit beside her, she kicked him and he left the restaurant.

Police are investigating the incident.

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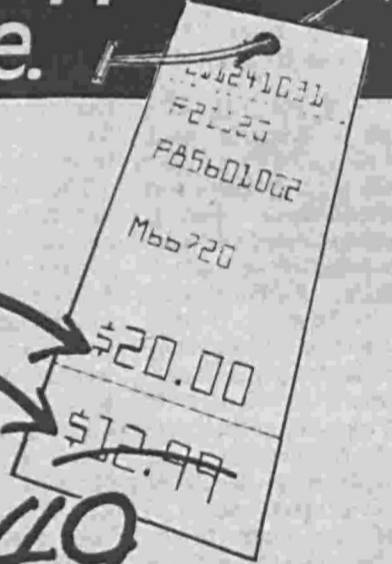
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Top teacher excels at running, too

Bob Maplestone says he had to channel his enthusiasm for running into enthusiasm for teaching when he was hired at Highline Community College.

He now has his reward, 15 years later. Maplestone, an instructor and coordinator for the college's engineering and technology program, has been named Highline Community College's Outstanding Teacher of the Year for 1988-89.

Maplestone is the second recipient of the award, presented by the college and sponsored by Puget Sound Power and Light. Edith Bailey, former reading instructor for the college, was the first recipient of the award in 1987.

The award and \$1,000 was presented to Maplestone by Dee Eklund, local manager for the power company, at a faculty/staff brunch June 8.

Maplestone is one of eight instructors at Puget Sound-area community colleges to receive recognition from Puget Power.

Maplestone is a Sumner resident and a native of Great Britain who first came to the United States to compete in track. While attending classes at

Eastern Washington State University, however, he was steered into education and classroom teaching.

He was hired at Highline in fall 1974.

"Roger Powell, then the (engineering) division chair, told the faculty I was an internationally recognized miler, but not noted as an outstanding teacher because this would be my first teaching assignment," Maplestone recalled.

Maplestone came to the college with two diplomas from Llandaff Technical College in Wales, a machinist's diploma and a technician's diploma. He received a bachelor of science degree in industrial design from Eastern Washington State University in 1974.

He has worked as a tool and dye maker and a mechanical examiner before being hired at HCC.

Since coming to the college, Maplestone has helped set up a manufacturing-engineering pro-

gram. Owen Cargol, HCC dean of instruction, said Maplestone was chosen as teacher of the year largely because of his help in establishing a computer-aided drafting laboratory and for advancing his own education to enhance his teaching skills.

Maplestone said he was surprised by the honor.

"There are numerous outstanding teachers on our campus. My selection merely brings recognition to our teachers in general. By recognizing one, you recognize all. But I'm still happy I was selected."

Maplestone has also brought his track skills at HCC, serving as the college's cross country coach from 1974 to 1977. He set and held the mile record for Great Britain from 1972 to 1982, and was a four-time national champion runner at 1,500 meters.

Maplestone now lives in Sumner with his wife, Cheryl, and three children, Rodney, Kimberley and Leanne.

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Concerned mother steals stolen guns

A Federal Way woman worried that her daughter might be harmed by her boyfriend broke into the man's car and confiscated three handguns.

The woman told King County police that her daughter had been evicted because her 20-year-old boyfriend had caused a disturbance at her apartment and that there were hard feelings over the incident. County seeking markets for recycled products

The King County Council is tackling the problem of depressed markets for recyclables by creating a county-sponsored commission charged with developing markets for products made from recycled goods.

By a vote of 8 to 0, the council approved the 21-member commission to "promote the use of products manufactured from recycled materials."

Councilman Paul Barden said after Monday's vote that the Commission for Marketing Recyclable Materials would "raise community awareness so that people demand that their products be made from recycled materials."

"If we can get business and households to demand recycled goods, we will be doing our part

to reduce the rate at which we are filling up landfills," said Barden.

FUNDING FOR the commission was to have come from a 50 cents a ton surcharge on disposal fees at the county's landfills, but that proposal was dropped in part due to objections from the city of Seattle.

Barden said the commission could get started even without funding, since it could take staff from the Solid Waste Division of the county's Department of Public Works.

Barden said he worked with state legislators this session to create a state-wide recycling commission, but the effort was not successful. He added that if the state does create a commission in the future, the county commission could be dissolved.

Man offers ride, gives beating, rape

A woman who accepted a ride from a stranger was raped and severely beaten by that man Friday evening.

The 26-year-old woman told King County police she accepted the offer of a ride from Federal Way Shopping Center to SeaTac Mall just before 8 p.m. Instead of driving to the mall, the man drove to a wooded vacant lot northeast of the mall.

There he ordered the woman out of the car at knifepoint, placed handcuffs on her wrists, then beat and raped her. When he was finished, he left her at the vacant lot.

The woman managed to attract attention by screaming,

and was discovered by four striking grocery clerks who were picketing nearby. She told police as much as an hour might have passed before she was able to call for help.

She was taken to St. Francis Community Hospital and treated for a possible broken collarbone, cracked ribs and scrapes and abrasions.

Her assailant is described as white, 19 years old and standing 5 feet 8 with a medium build. He has black hair and was wearing a black leather jacket, blue jeans, a green T-shirt and green boots.

He drove a newer-model brown Chevy van with a gray interior.

Alleged gun play may have gang link

King County police responded to an alleged assault with a gun Friday that may have been gang-related.

Reports state that a 22-year-old Yelm man was riding his bike in a store parking lot on the southwest corner of South 312th Street and Pacific Highway when he was approached by several youths in a car.

The man said the leader of the group pushed him off his bicycle. Fearful for his safety, he told police he ran across the street to a grocery store to call police. When he looked back, the 16-year-old youth who pushed him was pointing a black, semi-automatic .22 caliber handgun in his direction.

Police stopped the youth, a 16-year-old Federal Way boy, later at a carnival in the SeaTac Mall

parking lot but found no gun on his person, in his car, or on either of his two companions.

At first the youth denied knowing the alleged assault victim, but later admitted he had approached the man because he had heard that man and another youth intended to shoot him and two of his friends.

The man who called police said he is affiliated with the Crips gang and that his alleged assailant is affiliated with the Bloods. The police report noted that each was wearing the appropriate gang colors (red for Bloods and blue for Crips).

Since no gun was found, the youth accused of threatening the man was released to his mother's custody after questioning.

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Cycle survives home fire then disappears

Last month, a fire destroyed all that 17-year-old Scott Littell owns, said his mother — all but a racing bicycle, that had been damaged but not ruined by heat. Last week, the bike was stolen.

"He was going to race that bike. It was his plan and his dream," said Scott's mother,

Sally Littell. "And I'm going to find that bike."

Sally Littell says she has shown a picture of the GT racing bike to everyone she meets, from construction workers to striking grocery clerks, in hopes that somebody knows something about it.

The bike was taken the night of June 20 from a home in the Westway housing development at 21st Avenue Southwest, where Scott had left it on the porch while staying overnight with a

friend, she said.

The bike has a bright red seat, jacked up high, red handgrips and black and red pipe cleaners covering the cables that run from the grips to the bike's pedals. It has heavily treaded wheels and GT stickers on its fork and bar.

Sally Littell said the bike was noticeably damaged by the fire that struck their Steel Lake home in May. The handgrips are melted to the handlebars and the seat is scorched.

The fire began when Scott left a small candle burning in his bedroom before going to sleep. The candle somehow lit his room on fire during the night. Sally Littell says anything he had that didn't burn, melted.

But firefighters wheeled the GT bike from the damaged home, scorched but still usable. The bike had been purchased three years before, and its former owner had won races on it.

Now Sally Littell says she

hopes she can find the bike before it is taken out of the area, or taken apart and sold for parts. It would cost \$800 to \$1,000 to replace, she figures.

"Scott was so happy when he saw them bring that bike out after the fire...It was his prize possession," she said.

The Littells are seeking any and all information about the stolen bicycle. They ask that anyone with clues to its whereabouts call them at their Westboro apartment, 874-4411.

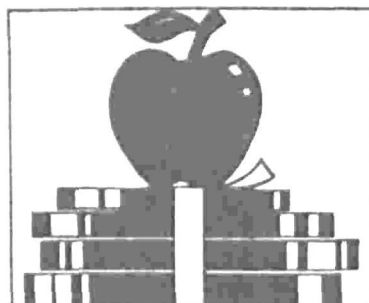

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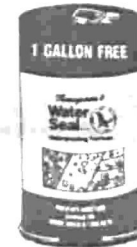
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Failing heart, lungs pit mom against clock

A snapshot of Debby Matsumoto rests on the mantle in the living room of her Milton home. In it, she's standing on a beach next to a rock. With jeans on and hair down, she looks like any 32-year-old mother of two on vacation.

Across the room from the picture, the real Debby Matsumoto is anchored to the couch. Just released from St. Francis Community Hospital, her arms are covered with bruises from IV lines. Her feet are propped on the coffee table to keep them from swelling excessively.

She's gained about 60 pounds of water and it's unlikely the jeans she wore at the beach would fit. Her hair is drawn back and her face looks tired. There is little resemblance between the Debby Matsumoto on the mantle and the one on the couch.

The photo was taken in February in Oregon, says her husband, Jay.

SINCE Christmas, Debby has been struck by a vicious and relatively unknown disease, Antiphospholipid Antibody Syndrome, which has attacked her immune system and left her in desperate need of a heart and lung transplant.

Pronouncing the name of the syndrome was one of the few things the Matsumotos could laugh at on Friday, the day Debby was released from St. Francis, again. It also was the day her case worker notified her that her insurance carrier had turned down the transplant surgery because it is considered "experimental."

Jay's employer, Calvin Victor, owner of Federal Way

Foreign Auto Service, immediately began arranging for a trust fund for Debby and soliciting the publicity it will take to pump it up. Jay works as a mechanic for Victor.

Donations can be made in her name at any branch of Puget Sound National Bank.

Jay Matsumoto isn't sure exactly how much money he needs to put up to get his wife a place on the waiting list for a transplant at the University of Pittsburgh Hospital. He estimates the surgery itself will cost \$100,000, and ancillary costs will swell it higher than that.

ONCE SHE is on the waiting list for a transplant, Debby will have to be within a few hours of the hospital at all times, which means the family will have to move closer to Pittsburgh. The University of Pittsburgh is the only hospital that would consider her for the procedure.

But Jay is determined to make sure his wife sees their children, Justin, 5, and Staci, 2 on Friday, grow up.

"She's my wife," he said. "She's got the kids to look forward to — we've got to try."

"I want to see my kids grow up," Debby said, tears rolling down her cheeks.

Jay's parents have rented out their home in Hawaii and moved to Milton to care for the children and Debby while he works. And her own mother, Debby said, moved into the hospital during her most recent two week stay.

IF SHE has no more complications or setbacks, Debby's doctors say her heart could last another three years. She measures it in the ages of her children. Justin would be 8 and Staci 5, she said.

Before that, she said, a transplant was just a possibility, something that would be necessary only if her other treatments, including chemotherapy, failed. Now, it's her only option, and her husband is determined to see that she gets it.

As soon as they got the word that their insurance company

had turned down the transplant operation, Jay went to work getting the home they bought five years ago ready for sale.

BEFORE her illness, Debby worked as a credit manager for Star Machinery in Tukwila. She hasn't been able to work for months and has spent much of her time at St. Francis and University hospitals undergoing

tests to figure out what is wrong. Although confined to the couch at home, she said she prefers to be there — to see her kids and because the food is better. She managed a smile when asked about the quality of hospital fare.

Thursday night's lasagna was good, she conceded.

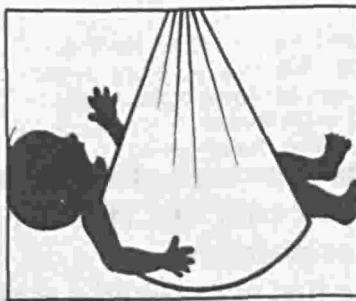

Harvest weeds now or that's all you will harvest in autumn

Your vegetable garden should be full of sprouting beans and corn by now. It's also probably full of sprouting weeds.

This means it's time for a hoe down and heavy mulch. First, you use a sharp hoe to slice and expose the roots of the weeds. Do this in the morning of a sunny day so the afternoon sun can bake the life out of all the weed you uproot.

Wait a few more days and then pull out any weeds that haven't turned limp and gray from the sun. Now you can spread a mulch right over the tops of those dead weeds. Bark chips and cedar shavings will look attractive, but newspaper and black plastic are cheaper and more effective weed blocks.

Tuck the ends of your plastic and paper mulches into the soil to keep slugs and other pests from hiding underneath.

Composted grass clippings mixed with soil and peatmoss makes a fair weed block and an excellent soil conditioner. Sawdust and rotted hay also improve the soil while they smother the weeds, but you'll have to add a high-nitrogen fertilizer with these mulches because they suck nitrogen from the soil as they rot.

Blood meal is a cheap organic form of nitrogen, or use any all-purpose fertilizer alongside the planting rows or mixed in below the mulch.

There is another way to win the war on weeds — shrink the size of your garden. If you plant vegetables in raised beds at least 8 inches deep, you will get higher yields in less space. Plant your crops closer together making the beds no wider than 4 feet.

Now you can reach easily to the middle of the beds without walking on prepared planting soil. The less empty space you have, the less space weeds have to pop up.

Q. My radishes don't turn into radishes. They have nice greens on top with regular skinny roots on the bottom. I used lots of rotted manure and compost in my garden before seeding and have been keeping the plants moist.

T.C., Ballard

A. It could be too much of a good thing that's making your radishes form hairy roots instead of swollen ones. Too much

nitrogen from the rotten manure may be to blame. Another reason radishes fail to form is overcrowding. You must harden your heart and pull out radish seedlings until you are left with plants spaced 1 to 2 inches apart.

Thin your carrots, lettuce and bean plants while you're at it. Just like people, plants get stressed out and perform poorly when they have no space to call their own.

Q. We have a good crop of blueberries coming on and I don't want a repeat of last summer. For one thing, the birds got more than half the crop, and the fruit we did harvest was sour. What can we do to sweeten up the berries and beat back the birds?

B.C., Federal Way

A. There's only one guaranteed way to keep the birds from the berries. Wrap the entire bush in netting, securing the ends tightly at the bottom with a drawstring. You can find bird netting at large garden centers and if you hurry, there should still be time to wrap your bushes before those birds invite themselves to an all-you-can-eat buffet.

Netting the bushes may help you with the second problem. The longer the berries stay on the bush, the sweeter they become. If you pick a sour, unripe blueberry, it stays that way. The netting will make it easier to resist the blueberries until at least five days after they turn blue.

Cloudy, rainy weather also cuts down on the sugar production in ripening berries, so you can put part of the blame on the weather if you end up with sour berries.

Q. What is the difference bet-

ween geraniums grown from seed and those from cuttings? Also, what tips can you give on growing a better geranium?

F.G., Vancouver
A. Seed geraniums are hybrids that have more vigor and disease resistance. They tolerate heat and cloudy weather better than the old-fashioned ones started from cuttings.

Use the seed geraniums for mass displays in a flower bed, but go with the traditional geraniums if you garden in pots and they'll be seen up close. Both types need quick-draining soil and lots of water and fertilizing.

Q. I just killed my Martha Washington geranium, but my other plants are doing well. I treat all my geraniums alike, but I don't have much luck with the hanging ivy geraniums or fancy Martha Washington ones. Why are they harder to grow?

W.M., Sumner
A. You are not the only one who murdered Martha Washington. Judging from the confessions I hear, Martha is a bit of a snob and demands lots of water and food along with filtered sunlight in a cool location.

You can't grow a Martha Washington geranium in the same hot spot your other geraniums thrive in. The ivy geraniums can tolerate more heat and plant breeders have been improving their tolerance for abuse. The biggest killer of fancy geraniums is letting them get thirsty. Skip a watering just once and these beautiful plants may never forgive you.

Q. Is it true that pink petunias don't need to be fertilized? My neighbor grows a huge bed of pink petunias every summer and claims they never need fertilizing.

E.N., Aberdeen
A. The secret is out and lazy gardeners had better listen up. Pink, multiflora petunias are quite tolerant of poor soil and can still dish out a heap of blossoms even if you forget to fertilize.

The multiflora petunias have smaller flowers, but are more prolific bloomers than the grandiflora petunias. Use the grandifloras in pots and the multifloras for mass plantings in the ground.

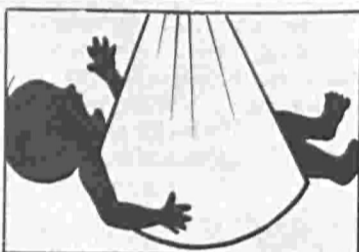

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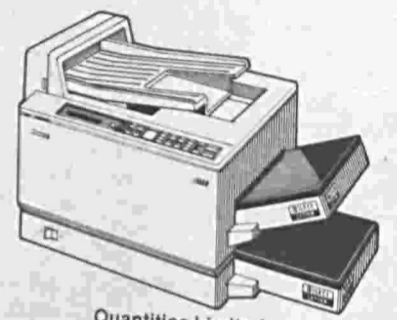
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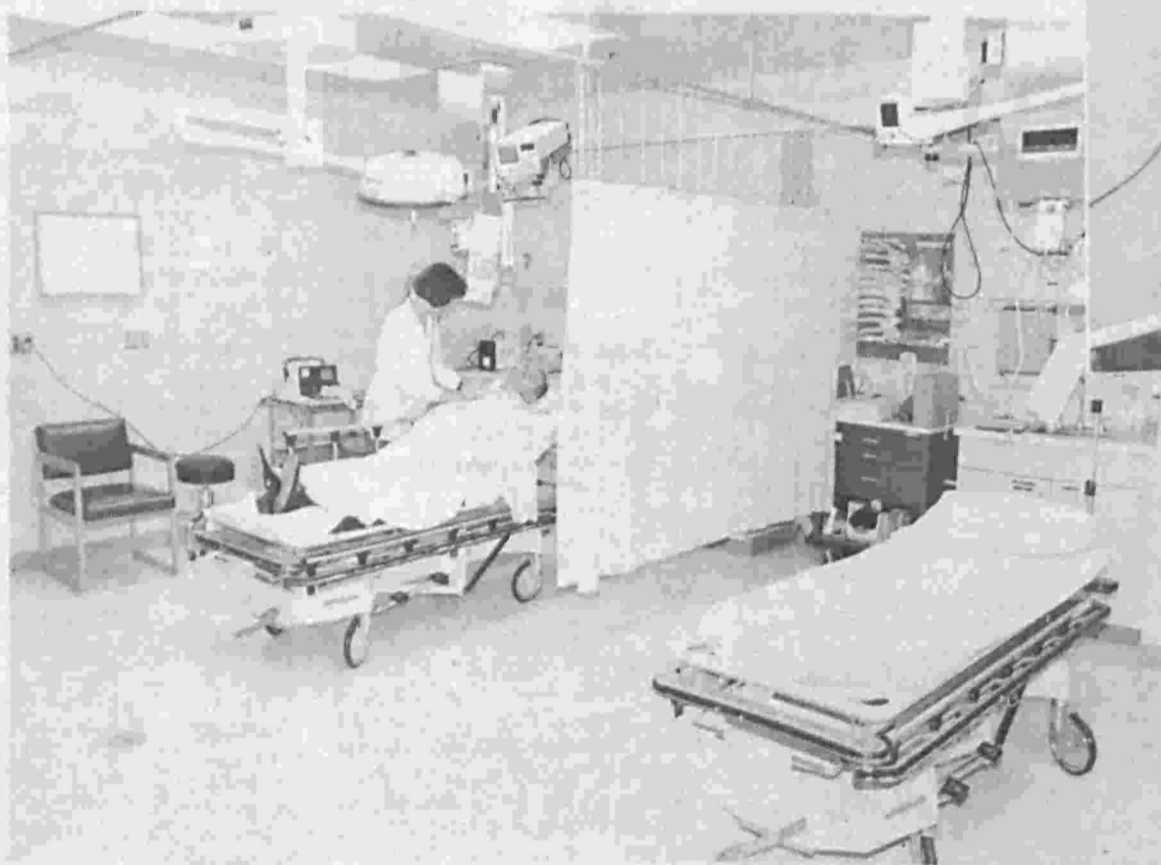
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Pets and Fourth don't mix well

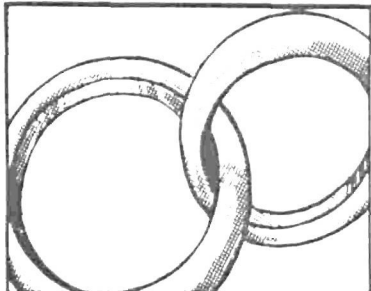

Don't blink or cherry season will pass you by

Northwest sweet cherries have begun their short season. Cherries are the first of the soft summer fruits and their six-week season ends in early August.

Two major varieties comprise nearly 95 percent of all Northwest fresh sweet cherry production.

BING: A Bing cherry is characterized by its large size, round plump shape and dark mahogany color.

LAMBERT: A Lambert cherry is heart shaped and more elongated than the Bing, but has the same rich flavor. They are usually harvested seven to 10 days after the Bings.

CHERRY-BERRY CONSERVE
 3 cups halved and pitted cherries
 1 to 1½ cups sliced strawberries
 3 cups sugar

¼ cup water
 2 tbs lemon juice
 ½ cup chopped walnuts

Combine all ingredients except walnuts in a saucepan. Cook and stir over low heat until sugar dissolves. Bring to a boil over moderate heat; cook 20 to 25 minutes or until thickened. Add walnuts about 5 minutes before removing from heat. Ladle into clean hot canning jars to within ¼-inch tops.

Seal according to jar manufacturer's directions. Place jars on rack in canner. Process 10 minutes in boiling water bath with boiling water 2 inches above jar tops. Remove jars from canner. Place on thick cloth or wire racks; cool away from drafts. After 12 hours, test lids for proper seal; remove rings from sealed jars. Makes 4 half-pints.

CHERRY ALMOND PIE
 ¼ to ½ cup sugar
 3 to 4 T cornstarch
 6 cups fresh sweet cherries, pitted
 3 T almond-flavored liqueur
 19-inch baked pie shell
 Coconut crumb topping

In saucepan, combine sugar and cornstarch; add cherries and liqueur. Cook and stir over low heat until mixture thickens. Spoon into baked pie shell. Sprinkle with coconut to within 2 inches of center. Bake at 375-degrees F. 10 to 12 minutes or until coconut is toasted. Makes 8 servings.

Coconut Crumb Topping
 Combine 1 cup flour and ½ cup sugar; cut in ½ cup butter with pastry blender until texture of coarse cornmeal. Stir in ½ cup coconut. Makes 2 cups.

GRAPE PITA SANDWICH

2 to 4½ cups California grapes, any variety

¼ cup each chopped pecans and shredded Cheddar cheese

1 package (8 oz) lowfat cream cheese, softened to room temperature

2 to 3 T chopped fresh cilantro (optional)

2 T mayonnaise

½ t grated orange peel

¼ t ground cinnamon

4 small pita bread rounds, halved

Lettuce (optional)

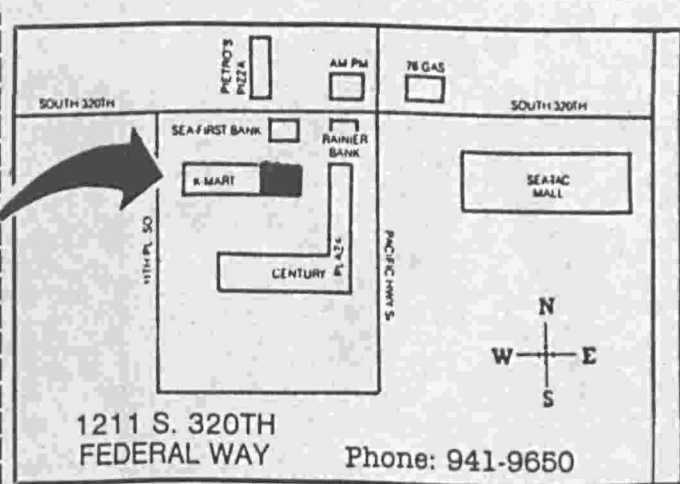

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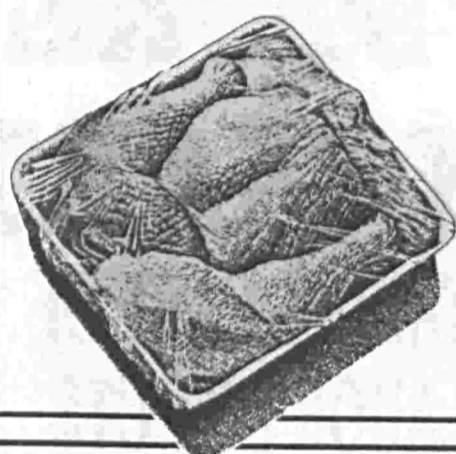

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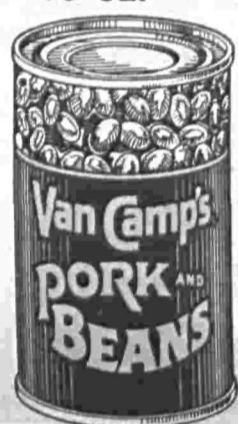

Tigers offer more than just baseball

It is sunny, clear and 85 degrees. As fans file into Cheney Stadium, Frank Colarusso is on his office telephone trying to arrange for the mascot's suit to be picked up from the cleaners.

The phone constantly interrupts the Tacoma Tigers' assistant general manager, with ticket requests, pregame details and greetings from associates. He tells one caller the Pacific Coast League team is on its way toward reaching the 300,000 attendance mark, for only the second time in club history.

"We've been drawing people like crazy all year long," he says. "The difference is the weather."

Tacoma has suffered just two home rainouts so far. The norm is five to seven.

He does not need to sell against the Seattle Mariners, Colarusso says. But he asks, "Would you want to be in the Kingdome tonight?"

Sylvester Schmidt wouldn't. "I like outside baseball better," says the longtime Tacoma fan, who has followed the city's minor league team for 40 years.

"I go to the Kingdome about once a year, but it's too expensive. Here, you see guys on the way up and the way down. The baseball's just as good."

Schmidt's grandson works in a Cheney Stadium concession

stand. He is at tonight's game with his granddaughter.

The Tigers are entertaining the Phoenix Firebirds, but the guest's identity does not matter much to most fans.

"We just like baseball," says Bud Thatcher, who is at the stadium with his son, Jerry, and son-in-law Rob Antos. "We didn't even know who the Tigers were."

All three moved to Puyallup a few years ago from New York, where they remember watching the Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants as well as the Yankees and Mets.

They attended their first Tigers' game last month. "We liked it so much, we just had to come back," Jerry says.

"The crowd gets more caught up in this type of game. These guys really try," says Antos. "It's like a college football game versus the pros."

Tiger baseball is so good it sells on its own merits, claims Colarusso. Yet he tries to guarantee a fun time even for non-baseball fans.

"We've got something going every night," he says.

Tonight is Albertson's Night, featuring giveaway tickets and a fireworks display after the game. Monday contests cost \$1 with a coupon from Winter-

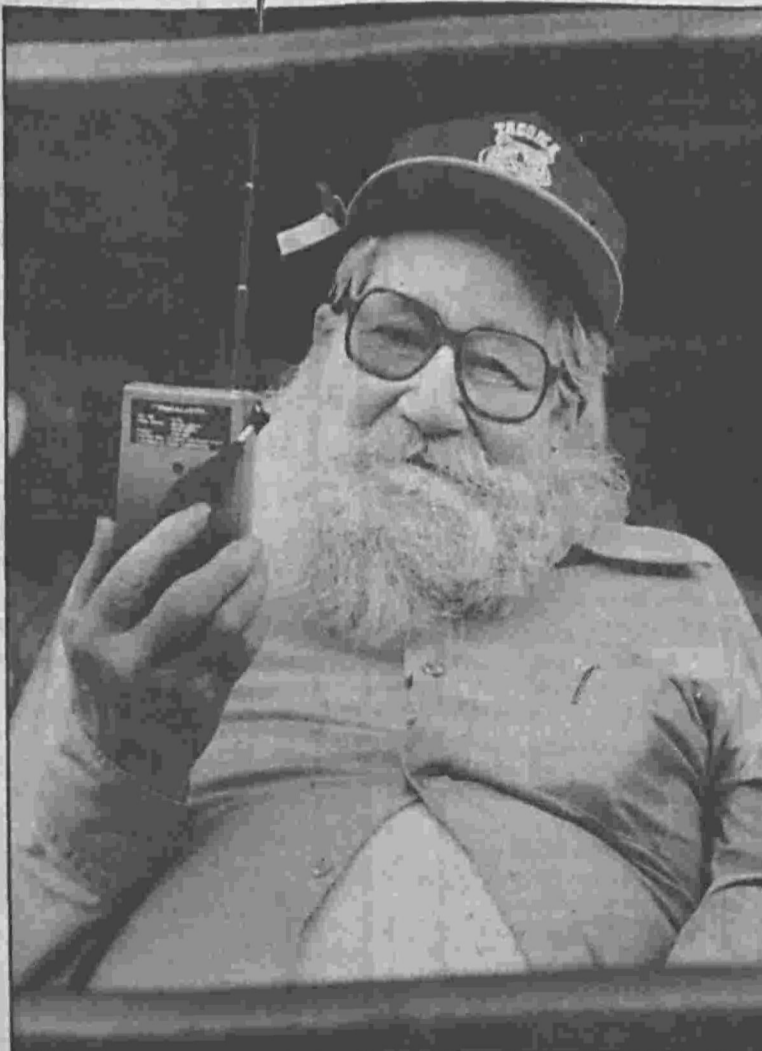

brook Seltzer. Sunday was cap night.
Rather than baseball, the Tigers sell entertainment. Their mascot leads cheers from atop the dugout, then wanders the stands exchanging hugs and high fives.
Between-inning contests feature numerous lucky number giveaways and a "pot of gold" event, in which a contestant tries to hit a target with a throw from home plate to pitcher's mound.
"Most people will not know we finished in last place last year. We had the second-best (attendance) in the history of the franchise," Colarusso says.
He claims a family of four can come to the park with \$20 and leave with change. That includes tickets (\$3-\$5), parking

(\$1) and program (\$1.50).
"Let them go to the Kingdome or the Tacoma Dome. It'll cost them \$50-\$60," he says.
Another attraction is Cheney Stadium.
Its outfield grass is deep-green and lush. Sightlines are good everywhere, and the view over the outfield fences feature no sight of Tacoma's infamous smoke stacks.
Since its construction in 1960, it has earned a reputation as one of the finest minor-league facilities in the United States. It's also one of the toughest on batters.
Cheney's left field and right field fences are 325 feet down-the-line. Its center field fence is a 32-foot high green monster that stands a whopping 425 feet

from home plate.
Only Jose Canseco of the Oakland Athletics has ever hit a ball over it. That was during batting practice.
Through the Tacoma franchise's 30 years of existence, its team names have included the Giants, Cubs, Twins, Yankees and Tugs. It has helped produce major leaguers such as Mark McGwire, Juan Marichaal, Gaylord Perry, Walt Weiss and Canseco.
But its basic appeal remains unchanged.
"It was big-league baseball to us," says beer vendor Jan Lauterbach. She has attended Tacoma games since she was 10 years old.
She is tending bar in the Tap Room, which features six types of beer. Many customers greet her by name.
"You see all sorts of people,"

Lauterbach says. "Young, old, military, rich, poor, people from every walk of life. And you see them getting along. This is a happy atmosphere."
On this night a good baseball game enhances that mood.
Tacoma scores two runs in the bottom of the ninth inning to tie the score at four. Phoenix goes up one in the top of the 10th.
In the bottom of the frame, a Tiger runner is gunned down trying to score from second on a hit to right, and Tacoma ends up a 5-4 loser.
But as the sun sets and dusk descends around the edges of the field, the result matters little to most fans leaving the stadium.
Jerry Thatcher sums up the evening on his way out the gate: "Baseball's supposed to be played outdoors."

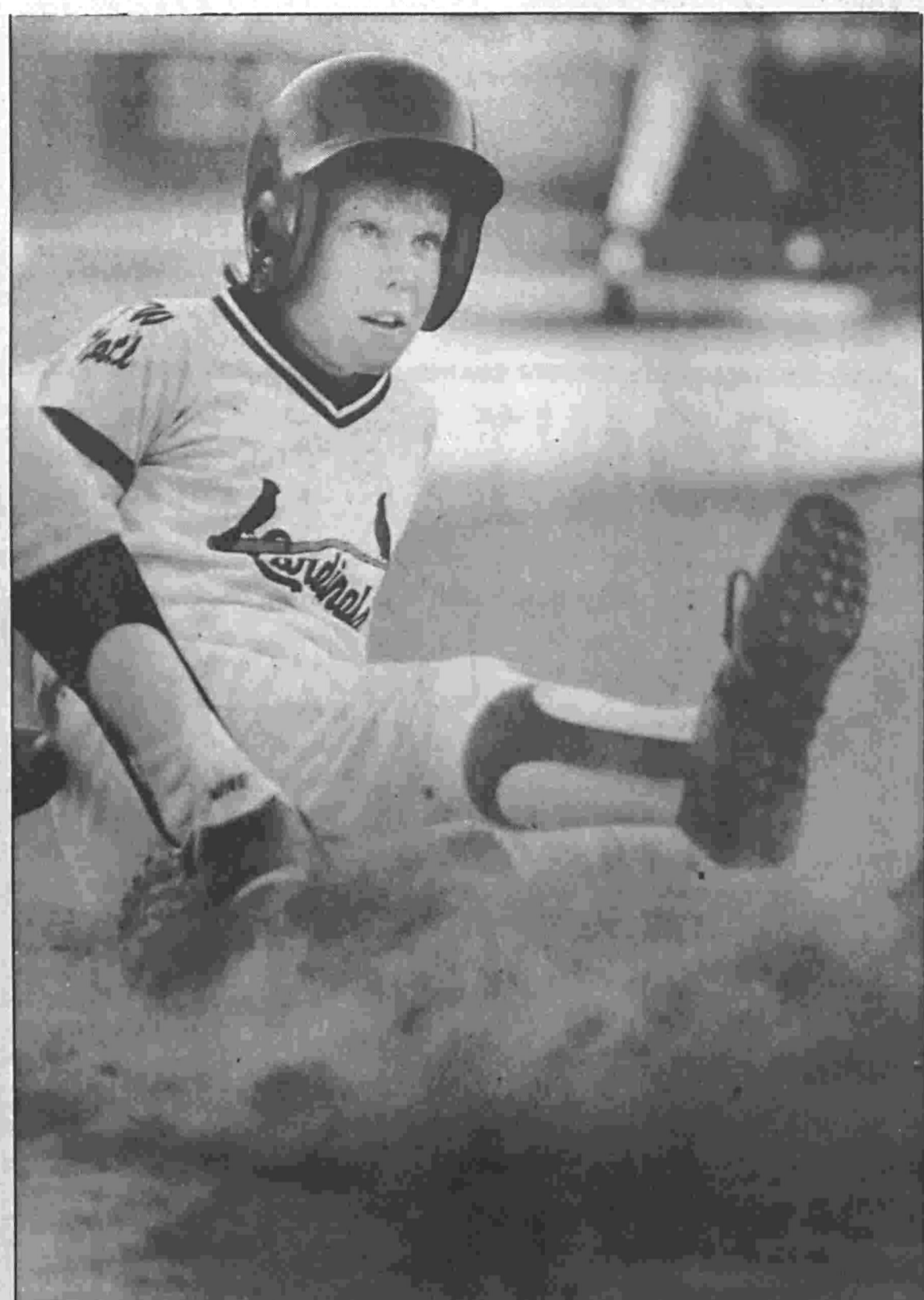

Final flyfishing frenzy brings in husky trout

The North Cascade Highway was busy with cars and campers as we threaded our way across Highway 20 late Friday night. Just outside Winthrop, my brother, Mike, and I pulled into the dark campground to catch a few hours of shuteye before dawn.

This probably would be our last hurrah for fly fishing because the weather is getting plenty warm. Moccasin Lake, our target, is a mile walk from the trail head that starts at the back of Moccasin Ranch.

Dawn found us donning float tubes and fins and slipping out into a mirror-still lake. A check of the shoreline discovered lots of damsel flies as well as leeches. A few fish were rising as we eased within casting distance. Although Mike had hit an eastern brook trout on an earlier trip, our primary prey were husky rainbows. It took several hours to define a pattern. We finally settled on a gray mayfly pattern. It worked, hit or miss, as well as anything else.

Late Saturday night and early Sunday morning a tremendous damsel fly hatch developed. Fish were worked into a feeding frenzy. Our float tubes were covered with nymphs crawling out to hatch. The highlight of the trip was using the building intensity of the wind to skip and dip our fly in and out of the water in one place. Soon swirls would appear and shortly thereafter a nice rainbow would arch skyward in a snapping leap. The fish

were not leader shy, and I used 5-pound test to keep them out of the weeds. The limit is five fish, but all of ours carefully were released. The biggest we hooked pushed 17 inches.

Besides catching fish, highlights of the trip included sighting several nice whitetail deer; starting down the trail before my brother and using that old cliché, "See you back at the ranch," and meaning it; and learning that the lettuce in a cheese-spread and peanut-butter

sandwich was for "crunchisity."

The Clay Banks off Point Defiance is kicking out some nice kings. Another source, who spent years on the pro-bass circuit back east, reports top-water plugs in the lilly pads in Lake Washington are good for bass right now.

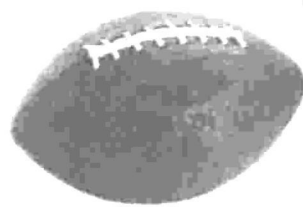

Homelessness also attacks working poor

The tall, slim 11-year-old girl jumped up and down on an eroded, cement parking curb at the Royal A Motel parking lot. The grinding cement made hollow, crunching sounds beneath her feet. Soon it would be supper-time.

She played between parked cars in the late afternoon sunshine behind the family's temporary motel-home in Auburn. Standing nearby, her 4-year-old brother and almost-2-year-old sister watched.

Gary and Linda Smith and their children lived in two different motel units for nearly seven weeks. Before that, they "doubled up" for a month-and-a-half with Linda's brother in Federal Way. In February, when the Smiths were paying off a medical bill and behind \$160 in rent, their landlord ordered them out.

"We've just been doing a lot of stuff the last few months that I wouldn't wish upon anybody," said Linda Smith, 33, wistfully, sitting on the edge of the bed.

AT THE time of their eviction, Gary's hours at a window-manufacturing company had been cut back and Linda was employed half-time as a food-service worker.

"It wasn't until January or February that somebody turned around and told me that you are eligible for unemployment for hours that you didn't work," explained Gary Smith, 32.

In today's changing economy, having a job no longer guarantees having a place to live. For low-income families who must spend more than half of their monthly incomes on rent, homelessness may be one paycheck away. Low wages, cyclical work or health problems can throw an ordinary working family from an apart-

ment into an emergency shelter.

The number of working poor is steadily rising, and so is the cost of housing. The monthly average cost of an apartment has skyrocketed in King County, to \$446 in 1988 from \$267 in 1980 — a 67 percent rise, according to county and real-estate industry figures.

For the same period, the median King County household income showed only a 47 percent increase, to \$30,400 in 1988 from \$20,700 in 1980.

FOR WORKING people with a family, like the Smiths, getting back on their financial feet to afford today's rents is difficult. Moving into a \$446-a-month apartment might cost more than \$1,500, including the first and last month's rent, damage and utility deposits.

King County subsidizes housing for people in need, but the supply is inadequate. Only those with some source of income are eligible.

Out of a total 36,381 needy family and elderly renter households, only about one-fifth were assisted through King County subsidy programs in 1988, according to county figures.

Much of the current problem was caused by the Reagan Administration's decision to get out of the housing business, according to some government officials. Between 1980 and 1987, total national support for low-income housing was cut drastically, to \$7 billion from \$32 billion.

"The county isn't replacing the government's 78 percent withdrawal of housing funds," said Kurt Creager, chief of housing and economic development for King County.

HOWEVER, on the horizon is

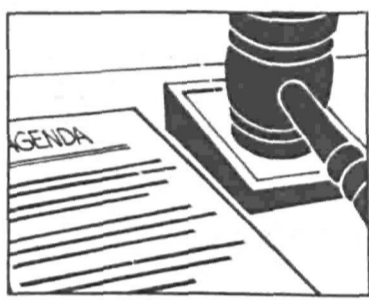

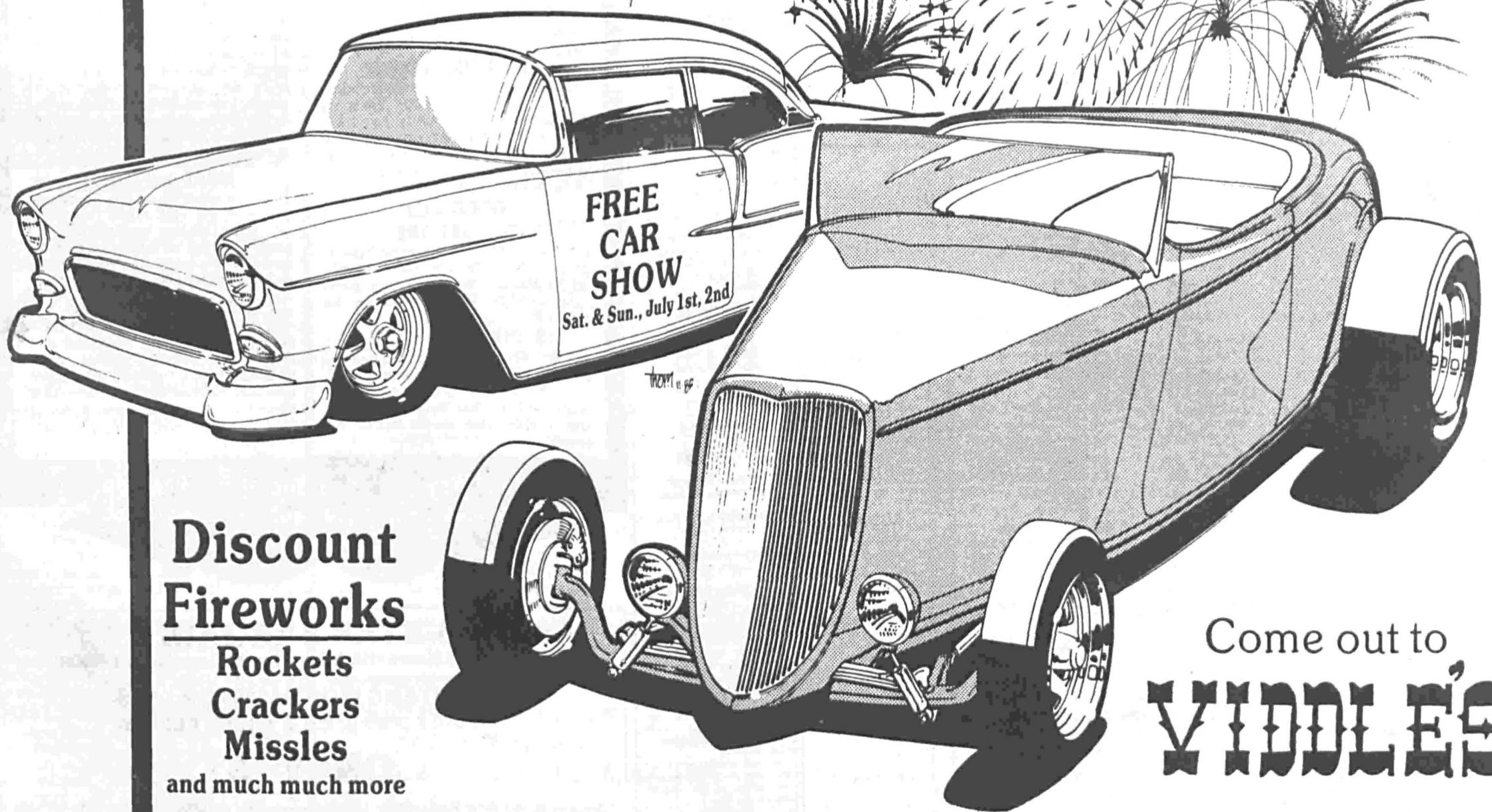
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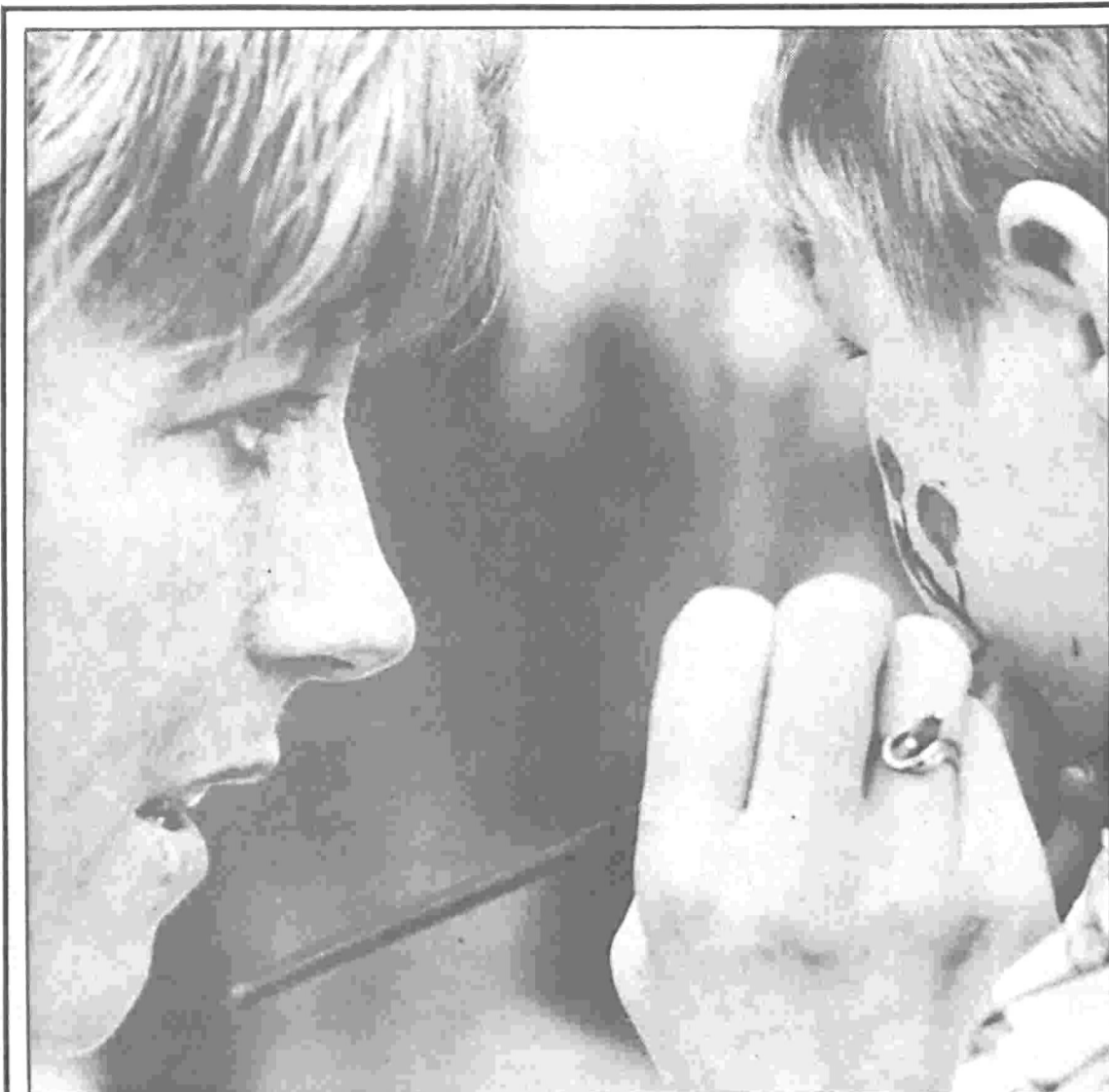

Higher rents hurt low-wage earners

the new King County Housing Partnership, which will serve as an intermediary between developers and local governments by offering various land-use incentives to create low-income housing, said Terry Axelrod, co-chairman of the King County Housing Partnership and a partner of the Axelrod Co., a development corporation.

Calling it a "bright spot for the future," Creager said the newly formed housing partnership, patterned after a Boston program, will provide 1,000 low-income units in new mixed-income developments within five to eight years.

However, this does not completely address today's pressing needs. Numerous low-income families are locked on long waiting lists for King County subsidized housing. Turnover is slow for most public housing, and for the Section 8 program. Under Section 8, low-income people find their own housing on the open market and the government pays part of their rent.

Despite some bright spots, such as the housing partnership, the future looks bleak for low-income renters. With predicted population growth in the Puget Sound area, the competition for low-cost housing will increase.

The situation will be compounded when a portion of existing King County low-income units is converted into market-value housing. During the 1960s and 1970s, the federal government contracted with private developers to provide low-income housing in exchange for mortgage and rent subsidies and tax benefits.

IN SEATTLE and King County, 7,569 units are endangered from now until 2009, because of expiring contracts and eligibility for mortgage pre-payment, according to Seattle's Fremont Public Association.

Organizations such as the Union Gospel Mission, Salvation Army and YWCA stand ready to offer shelter, food and clothing, among other emergency support services. Others, such as the Multi-Service Centers and Catholic Community Services, nonprofit social service agencies, offer limited Federal Emergency Management Assistance, or FEMA funds, to prevent homelessness.

Riding the bus to gather bits of help from various local agencies is time-consuming and costly, said Tina Spade, 31, who lives with her husband in a motel near Aurora Village. It was nearly a year ago when Spade's husband smashed his hand, losing part of one finger.
