Inspectors put heat on stands

Holiday hazards targeted

It's 9 a.m. and the Payless fireworks stand has just opened. But Dale Edd is already on the prowl, eyeing the stand's fire extinguishers and scrutinizing colorful rows of sparklers, pinwheels and smoke bombs.

It's one of three inspections this fireworks stand will undergo today and every day it's open.

Firefighters and fire prevention specialists, like Edd, from various outposts of Fire District 39 (Federal Way), will hit each of 12 local, legal fireworks stands at least once a day between now and Tuesday, the Fourth of July.

In addition, inspectors from the King County Fire Marshal's office will review those stands and 80 more in unincorporated King County twice a day up to the holiday.

That represents beefed-up security for the King County office, where Deputy Fire Marshal John Klopfenstein says twice-a-day inspections have been the goal for some time.

But the Federal Way fire department has included daily inspections of fireworks stands in its holiday schedule for some years now, and this year has added an emphasis patrol of fireworks hot spots to try to stop trouble before it starts.

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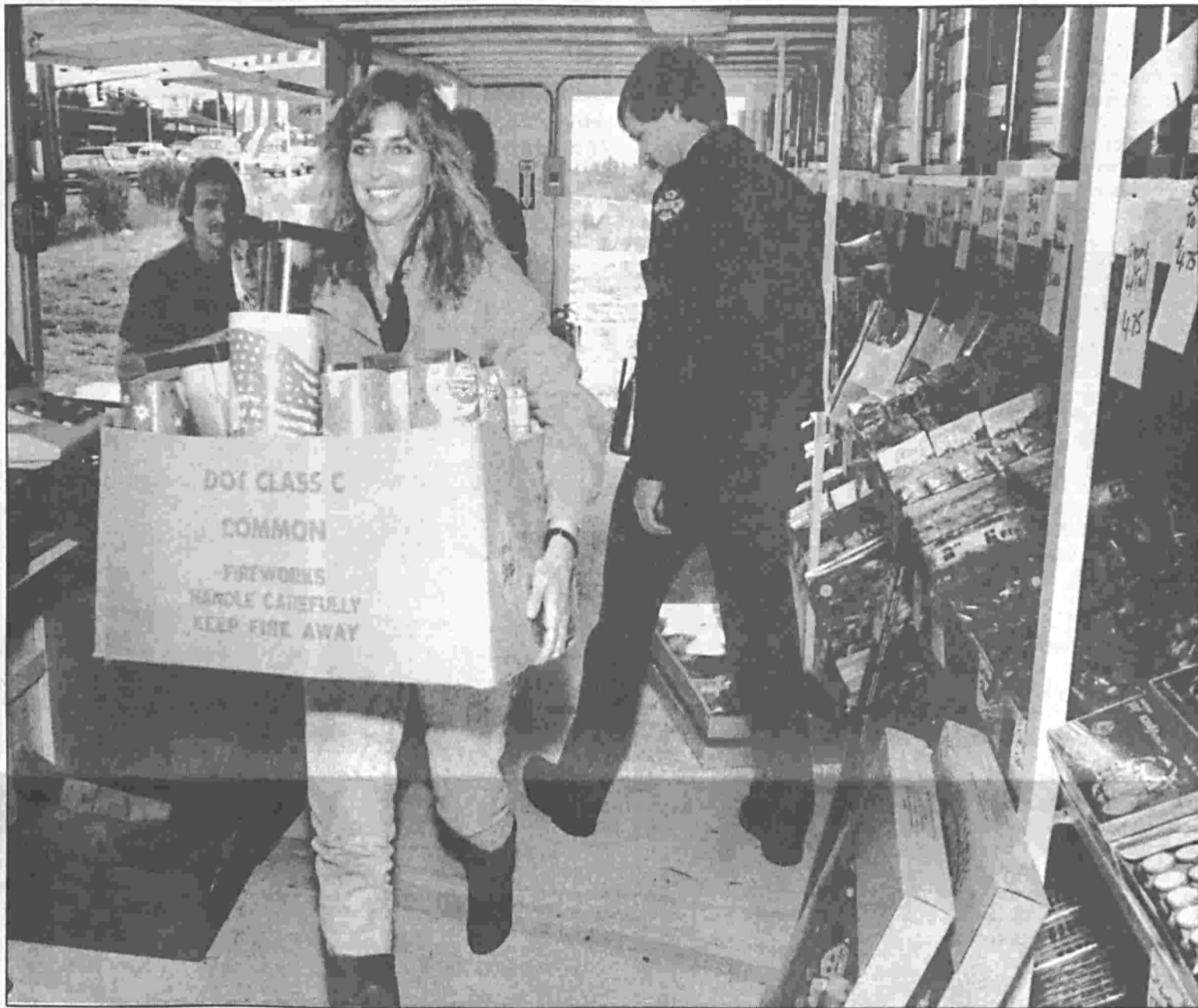

Council retreats to study policies

The on-going battle between the King County Council and newly incorporated cities over the cost of county services could come to a head after a council retreat on July 25.

Councilmembers plan to spend the day resolving thorny questions such as which services the county should continue to provide and how much it should charge for those services.

New and existing cities have been at loggerheads with the council since council staff proposed a set of policies that could result in higher bills for county services including health care, parks, police, and roads.

The new cost policies were designed to offset projected revenue losses when the new cities leave the county's tax base.

COUNCILMAN Paul Barden said on Friday that he hoped the council retreat at Robinswood Park in Bellevue would help the council craft a stronger county government.

"I hope we can reach a consensus that says we want to be a regional purveyor of services, rather than disintegrate into a provider of marginal services for unincorporated areas," he said.

THE SUBURBAN Cities Association formally joined the fray on Friday when the mayors of Bellevue, Renton and Auburn told a council hearing that the staff recommendations would punish all cities.

Auburn Mayor Bob Roegner said the council is asking city

Student placement gets board approval

A somewhat altered and much-decried student placement policy is now in effect at local schools, and the fate of an unused West Campus school district site will not be decided until next year.

The Federal Way School Board unanimously approved the student placement policy Wednesday night. The policy expressly states that principals are responsible for matching students and teachers at each elementary school.

The policy was introduced earlier in spring to cut down on parent requests for particular teachers for their children. A mild uproar ensued, however, when parents responded that such requests are necessary, and that if all teachers were equally capable, no special re-

Shooting tips grow; victim getting better

Police have received more than 60 phone calls from people with tips on last Sunday's shooting of a Kent man.

Chad Parkhurst, 19, was shot in the head as he and two companions were driving westbound on Highway 18 near the Weyerhaeuser Way exit. The shooting was a result of a driving altercation during which Parkhurst made an obscene gesture to the occupants of a car that was tailgating the car in which he was a passenger.

Parkhurst, whose initial prognosis was not good, is recovering and conscious, and listed in satisfactory condition at Harborview Medical Center, a hospital spokeswoman said Friday.

King County Detective Earl Tripp said he has been told Parkhurst is expected to make a full recovery.

Most of the calls received by police have been about the

black late-model Pontiac Firebird driven by the assailant. The car, with tinted windows, was driven by a young Asian male, about 20 years old, who also fired the shot. He was accompanied by another Asian male, also about 20 years old.

In part, the large number of calls can be attributed to the easily identifiable car, Tripp said. Another factor, he added, is that many people identify with what happened, thinking it could have happened to them.

Tripp said sifting through the numerous calls will take time. "They have to be eliminated one by one," he added.

The car, which had Washington license plates, was last seen by Parkhurst's companions headed south on Interstate 5 at 10:30 p.m. Sunday.

Another Democrat joins race to replace Tim Hill

The newest entry in the King County Executive race is calling on the incumbent, Republican Tim Hill, to stop behaving like a petulant child toward newly incorporated cities.

Democrat Marvin Durning, who formally announced his candidacy on Wednesday, accused Hill of pouting over the incorporation votes in Federal Way and Sea-Tac, instead of helping the new cities get started.

"(We have) a county government that is fighting to hold onto power, a power it badly misused over the years, resulting in almost all of these incorporation votes," he said.

"The citizens of Federal Way and Sea-Tac were sending county government a message with their (incorporation) votes. They were saying that they've had it up to their eyeballs with bad planning decisions and lack of vision for their future."

Durning's remarks weren't

foe so far, Democrat Bruce Hilyer.

Hilyer, who announced his candidacy in March, charged Hill with "abandoning" certain areas to growth. "Federal Way is a classic example," he said.

DURNING put it another way. He called Federal Way a place "where shopping centers discharge into shopping centers." He promised to manage growth more effectively than Hill.

"You can't put up a barricade (to stop growth), but growth can

Candidates walk new-city dollar trail

Federal Way and Sea-Tac City Council candidates got a lesson in municipal financing last week.

Candidates from both soon-to-be cities attended a workshop sponsored by the Association of Washington Cities last Wednesday on how they'll be able to pay for city services.

After the city councils are

elected on Sept. 19, they'll have until March 10, 1990 to pass resolutions officially incorporating the areas. The county and state are currently setting aside for them revenues collected from various taxes such as the sales tax, property taxes, motor vehicle excise taxes, liquor taxes and road taxes.

Once the areas officially incorporate, they will begin

receiving those funds. However, the state and county distribute many of those revenues only quarterly or bi-annually.

One of the main questions city council candidates had is how the city councils will fund operations between the time after the election and the time they begin receiving revenues.

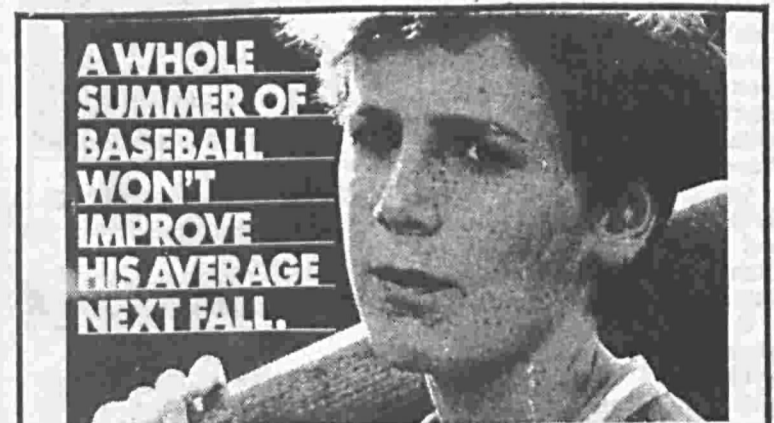
The city councils will have to rent space to meet, hire a city

manager and other staff, and pay for other necessary expenditures.

Three options are available to cities for interim financing, according to Stan Finkelstein, assistant director of the Association of Washington Cities.

The first, and most likely option, is to pay off expenditures

Flag's promise not always kept

A buddy of mine once told me that if you folded the flag the wrong way, you could get arrested.

We were both Boy Scouts, so I knew he was telling the truth. He said it solemnly, the way one boy tells another that black widows can kill you, or a woman once swallowed a baby octopus while swimming in the ocean — and it lived!

I still have reverent feelings about the flag. I get choked up watching strangers' faces during flag salutes at football games. Like George Bush, I get weepy when I see the flag, waving over a bunch of old guys in a parade, grandfathers who fought in Korea or Germany or the big war, back in 1914.

But I can think of half a dozen things that bother me more than stomping on a flag. When somebody decides to stomp on our flag, I figure he must be pretty disappointed. To a black man who can't find a job to support his family, America may be a broken promise. The flag would be a symbol of his discontent.

Stomping on the flag in a public protest would not be treason or disloyalty, but a very personal act, like getting a divorce from a wife who betrayed you, or telling your boss to take the job and shove it.

In a way, the decision to destroy the flag confirms a fundamental freedom. It takes advantage of a privilege America guarantees in the name of individual liberty. I can imagine a bitter Vietnam veteran doing that. I can imagine a widow doing it, to show her disgust over the way her soldier husband was handled by the brass.

Like a kid who says, "I hate you," or runs away from home because of his frustration with parental ignorance, a flagburner may have a genuine resentment.

His attitude may be immature. His gesture may be futile. But he worries me far less than a Congressman who takes kickbacks. He worries me a lot less than a guy at the tavern who won't vote because he has a bowling league on Tuesdays.

Of all the unpatriotic gestures my fellow Americans make, wrecking a flag is a minor offense, hardly worth a Constitutional amendment. It is an easy thing to suggest, for a president whose first six months have been lackluster, and who is looking for something to make himself memorable.

I'd rather see him spend his time on improving veterans' benefits than on punishing some poor slob who thought he could call attention to his political cause by turning a flag into confetti.

ti. I'm sure the president is sincere. That's what worries me. He waves the flag around and the patriots all jump to their feet, on the lookout for anybody who isn't quite as quick.

Where were they when those white folks in Howard Beach chased a black man into traffic and got him killed? Was that a patriotic gesture? Where were they when the same Supreme Court said high school newspapers don't have the same rights to free speech that other papers have?

The guarantee of freedom is what matters most. It is what brought us here, what still sells tickets to America. To Asians who are dying in refugee camps in Cambodia, to Irishmen who are burnt out by the religious war, to Central American natives fearful of murder and enslavement, America is heaven.

That's pretty funny, when we are reading headlines about CEOs who admit to ripping off the Pentagon for years by padding their bills for spare parts.

That's pretty funny, when we all know patriots who adore the flag but don't think twice about littering the landscape with their beer bottles.

I'm not proud of America when the president makes a speech about a couple of yards of colorful cloth, ignoring the human dilemma of single mothers who need day care assistance so they can feed a family.

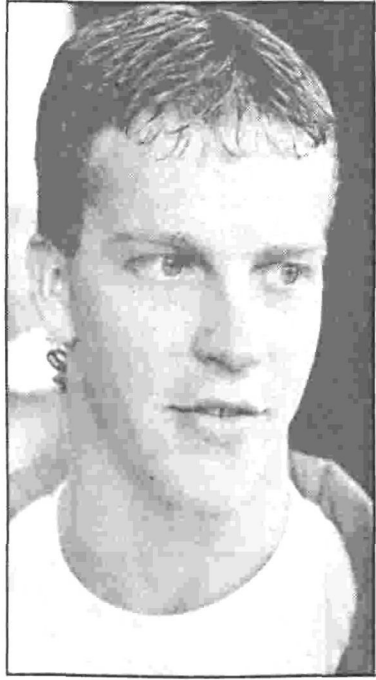
If I ever got so mad at America that I felt like burning our flag, I still wouldn't do it. But if, in my sorrow or anger or pain or confusion I felt that hopeless, I think America ought to be concerned.

Wrecking a flag, I would not be hurting America, after all. I would be screaming for attention. I would be shouting that the country I love had abandoned its ideals. I would be carving up my own heart, tossing a rock through the window of democracy.

It's not the sort of thing I'd consider in Nicaragua. If this was Ethiopia, I wouldn't dream of damaging the flag. If I lived in China, I wouldn't make a peep. I'd just suffer, knowing that protest was futile and would probably get me killed.

But here, where speaking out is the first of our freedoms, I would assume my right to protest came before the right of the state to squash me for my belief. If the president doesn't understand that, I'd be pretty worried.

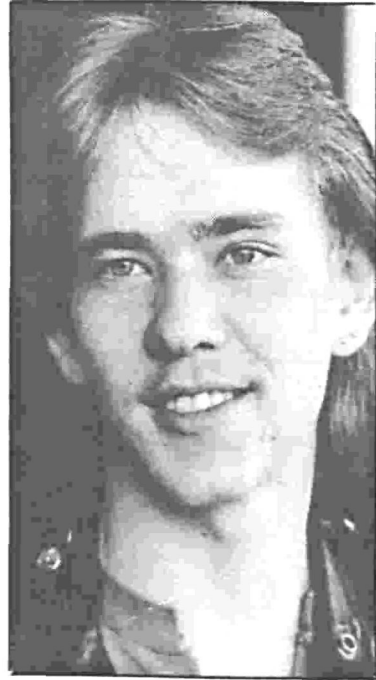

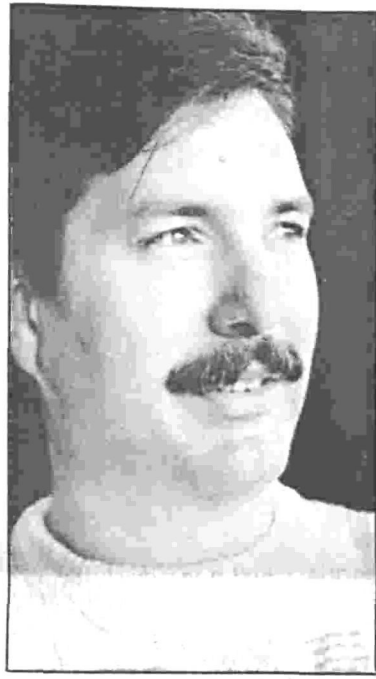

Oops! We've got more committees

I was gently reminded that I omitted two Federal Way First! Transition Team committees from the article of last week, and I had better be more careful in the future! The Contracted Services Committee, chaired by Jeanne Burbidge, was one of the first committees formed and has been quite active.

During the incorporation campaign some of the most common questions were about the police and fire departments. "Will we have to form our own police force?" "Will we join the fire district or form our own?" These decisions will be up to the new Federal Way City Council, but after the election they will have to be made quickly. Contracts for essential services (fire, police, health dept. services) must be signed before incorporation.

King County recently issued a staff report on possible new contracting policies that has been helpful in listing services the county currently provides to other suburban cities. Originally it seemed clear that we would probably continue most King County services on a contract basis, at least until the new city was properly launched, but this document describes a new contracting philosophy. The county suggests they will recover all costs of providing the services, including all county overhead. That would mean some healthy increases in contract rates above what local cities are now paying. County policy has not yet

been set on this issue.

Recently there was a hearing on these policies and transition team members spoke out against this non-competitive attitude and one-sided approach to providing services under contract. King County may still be the most efficient provider of some services, but who else can provide the services and what will they charge? The Contracted Services Committee will provide this information on services required, possible providers, and some comparative prices to the new city council.

The other committee that was overlooked last week has a new chairman. Margaret Ward is organizing the Parks Committee as the Quality of Life Committee with four sections representing different services often provided by parks departments.

The parks section includes Dave Kaplan, who is also on the site selection committee

for the upcoming King County Open Space bond and is becoming very familiar with available open space and parks in Federal Way. The arts section includes Nancy Ise, a member of the King County Community Arts Commission. Funding is often available for fine arts projects, but the new city council will have to know what sources exist and what is needed. Shirley Charnell, president of the Federal Way Historical Society, is a member of the historical preservation section. The recreation section will consider recreation facilities and programs, ballfields for example. If you use these facilities and are concerned about possible new locations, you can call Margaret Ward at 946-3912.

It seems that every city approaches these services in a different way, and much of this committee's work will be to document approaches that work well in cities similar to Federal Way. The committee also will have to advise the city council about transfer of King County parks facilities to the new city.

These two committees bring the total to about nine, all working in some way to gather information and list options for the city council. If you would like to assist with this effort, call the Transition Team phone machine at 839-2805.

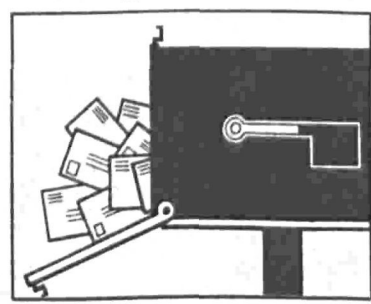
Logging old-growth exacts future price

Editor: As a cranky senior citizen who has spent a good portion of his adult life raising seven kids to adulthood, I have had much experience in detecting "partial stories" — those with important details left out. And I think I have just spotted another one.

One of today's critical issues is the question of do we, or do we not log off the few remaining stands of old growth timber in this state.

It seems that over the past 100 years, logging interests have pretty well cleaned out all privately owned trees, and state-owned ones as well. Now they want permission to clear cut federal land, too. The claim is that unless such permission is given, 100,000 or more jobs will be lost.

Nobody likes to see a working man lose his job, but just how good a fix will this be? In five or 10 years, they will have all the federal timber cleaned out, too,

and then what happens to said 100,000 jobs? Do we invade British Columbia and seize their forests, or what?

Opening federal lands to cutting would merely postpone the need for loggers to retrain for other work. The loss of our old-growth trees, however, would be permanent. Do you think it's worth it?

Burglar arrested, released, arrested

Police released a man they suspected of attempted burglary Wednesday morning, only to have to turn around and arrest him again the following morning.

King County police report the man, who lives in the Woodmont area, was arrested Wednesday morning after trying to break into a home in the neighborhood behind Federal Way Shopping Center. He confessed to trying to break into that house and to other crimes, and was released pending an investigation.

He had barely been released when he broke into a house across the street from his first victim of the day, stealing three handguns.

Police learned this Thursday when they arrested the young man again, this time in the process of burglarizing a home just down the street from his other two victims. A neighbor spotted him entering the house through a window and called police. A patrol car arrived while he still was in the house and police found the burglar hiding under a bed with an unloaded .357 magnum and jewelry belonging to the occupants of the house.

When he was arrested Thur-

sday, the man confessed to Wednesday's second burglary and to a car prowling incident just a block away on June 23. During the car prowling, the man was discovered inside the car by its female owner, who jumped in and tried to hang on to the intruder. They struggled for a while before the man was able to escape, but not before giving the car owner a black eye.

Police say the burglar was released and not booked Wednesday because they were working out an arrangement regarding stolen property and admissions to other crimes with the man. Now, they also hope to clear more cases with his arrest.

with registered warrants. A registered warrant is something like a post-dated check, although Finkelstein doesn't like that term, in that the city enters into an arrangement with a bank to have that bank cover its checks until the city receives revenue.

The second option is to issue tax anticipation notes, similar to selling bonds.

The third option is to simply take out a loan from a bank. It isn't clear yet if that's legal for a new city to do.

In fact, several legal issues surround incorporation that haven't been resolved yet, said Finkelstein.

"The law is incomplete," he said.

THE PROBLEM is that Federal Way and Sea-Tac are the first two cities to incorporate under a law passed two years ago providing the framework for incorporation.

The Association of Washington Cities plans to lobby for new legislation that will clear up some of the questions and will provide a framework for funding cities in transition, Finkelstein said.

Besides some pointers in the funding available for cities in transition from county to city government, candidates also found out about financing available after official incorporation.

Property taxes will provide the cities with most of their revenue. The workshop did not specifically define the exact amounts of money Federal Way or Sea-Tac will receive, but in a study completed on incorporation earlier this year, a consultant estimated Federal Way will

get about \$7.3 million a year in property taxes and Sea-Tac \$2.4 million a year.

The cities will also receive revenues from retail sales, and other assorted county taxes. Other state-shared revenues such as fuel taxes and liquor taxes are also available.

Finkelstein advised council candidates of some new trends in municipal financing. Liquor taxes are steadily declining, he said.

One of the new sources for cities is user fees, he advised. Statewide, city-imposed user fees have increased 100 percent in the last five years, he said.

Another potential revenue source for cities is a municipal business tax, also called a business and occupation tax. Workshop moderator Doug Sutherland, Tacoma's mayor, warned candidates that some businesses may move outside of city limits when slugged with a

business tax because counties are not empowered to impose such a tax.

Wednesday's workshop was the first of five workshops the association is sponsoring for candidates.

The next will be on alternative approaches for service delivery such as contract services. It will be held 6:30 p.m., July 12, at the Angle Lake First Station in Sea-Tac. For more information, call the association at 1-759-4197.

Phony car bomb could mean trouble

A woman who placed a fake bomb in the front seat of her car to deter vandals may face criminal charges for reckless endangerment.

King County police received a report Wednesday afternoon of a bomb in the front seat of a car parked in a Camelot area neighborhood.

The first officer on the scene found what looked like two sticks of dynamite attached to a

clock placed in the front seat in a car parked in front of a residence. A woman inside the house said the car was hers and the bomb was a fake to keep neighborhood kids from vandalizing her vehicle.

The fake bomb was confiscated and police are forwarding case information to the prosecutor's office for possible charges.

Unusual job interview leads to arrest

A call regarding an after-hours interview for a job at a Federal Way store didn't sound right to a female job applicant, so she took a male friend along with her. Police say it's a good thing she did.

The interview, she told police, had been arranged for just after closing Wednesday at a local discount store. When she arrived with her friend in tow, the man waiting to "interview" her became nervous and said he would need to finish the interview elsewhere. He gave the woman an address, but he never showed.

That's when she decided something definitely was wrong with the interview, and called police, said Lt. Max Osburn, Precinct 5.

Police investigated and discovered it was not the man's job to interview job applicants, and a computer check showed

he had two outstanding felony and five misdemeanor warrants for his arrest.

The man was arrested Thursday afternoon at the store and booked into the King County Jail on the warrants.

The felony warrants were for burglary and a probation violation stemming from an earlier rape conviction, Osburn said.

The job interview incident won't likely result in charges, he added, because no law was broken. But the woman probably would have been in danger if she had arrived at the interview alone, Osburn said.

"We don't know exactly what his intentions were, but you can bet he wasn't going to take her to Disneyland."

Osburn said it appeared the man got the woman's name and phone number from her job application in the store's offices.

Woman is injured in nursing home

An 80-year-old nursing home resident suffered a broken arm Wednesday, and claimed she was injured when someone hit her.

King County police reports state the woman was found in an upset condition Wednesday morning by a nursing home housekeeper. The housekeeper reported that the woman kept

repeating, "He hit me. He hit me."

The woman was not lucid, reports state, and could not give an account of the incident or who hit her. Police, however, are hoping to interview an employee of the home concerning the incident.

X-rays showed the woman's arm was fractured above the elbow.

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Frequent inspections ensure safety at stands

"I guess you can say we're bullish about it — that's probably the right word," said Ed Coutts, fire marshal for Fire District 39.

EMPHASIS PATROLS are underway in neighborhoods that have in past years suffered repeated grass fires or similar problems from the misuse of fireworks. Camelot is one target — the neighborhood has plenty of kids, says Coutts, and those kids play with plenty of

fireworks.

Coutts himself was on emphasis patrol there last week and found teens lighting off fireworks. One of the teen-agers was in a wheelchair, and could not move quickly enough to get out of the line of fire, he said.

"Nobody wants to stop the use of fireworks, but if that young man's clothing had caught fire..." Coutts said, shaking his head.

The fireworks stand inspections are something of an emphasis patrol, too. Owners of fireworks stands are fully in-

formed of the many rules under which they must operate before they receive a business permit, said Edd.

The inspections ensure those rules are carried out.

ALTHOUGH FEDERAL WAY fire inspectors have no jurisdiction at the popular stands on nearby Indian reservations, where more powerful devices are sold, they can confiscate illegal fireworks at local stands. They can also close down any local stand that does not comply with safety regulations. Most

often, they tell stand operators to immediately change the hazardous situation. And most often, the stand operators comply.

"We tell them to do it now or they don't open. If you're going to enforce rules, that's just what you have to do," said Edd.

This morning, Edd looks over the Federal Way Shopping Center parking lot, where the Payless fireworks stand is cordoned off from traffic and parking. Traffic is supposed to be at least 25 feet away from the

stand. Other buildings must be at least 50 feet away, and gasoline pumps must be 100 feet distant.

Check.

Now for fire extinguishers, both within reach and working. And two exits from the stand, in case of trouble. And a competent adult, at least 18 years old, staffing the stand.

Check, check and check. And "No Smoking" signs, one on each side of the building. Check...uh, almost.

"Hey, you've got some tarp

covering your sign in the back," Edd announced.

No problem, said Payless manager Joe Hegenauer. A staple gun or nails will straighten that out.

Hegenauer says neither he nor his employees mind the constant scrutiny that goes with a fireworks stand. As a matter of fact, he welcomes it — he's not crazy about fireworks in the first place.

"I'd hate to have one of these things go up and hurt my people, or a fireman, or burn a store. It's not worth it," he said.

Stay off reservations, and other fireworks advice

Officials of Fire District 39 (Federal Way) offer several recommendations about the use of fireworks on and near the Fourth of July.

Tops on the list: Avoid illegal fireworks, particularly the high-powered devices sold on nearby Indian reservations.

Although the fireworks can be sold legally on the reservations, by law they cannot be discharged off the reservations, and that includes Federal Way neighborhoods.

"That warning should be put in letters a foot tall," said Ed Coutts, fire marshal for the Federal Way department. "Those fireworks are illegal (to

use here) and are very, very dangerous."

Fire officials have several more precautions for both children and adults who plan to light their own fireworks this year:

- Use only lawfully purchased fireworks, between 9 a.m. and 11 p.m.

- Use fireworks outdoors, away from buildings, dry fields and wooded areas.

- Light one item at a time. Move away quickly and stay a safe distance away.

- Never throw or point fireworks at people, pets or moving vehicles.

- Have a hose and wet the area before lighting fireworks. Place discarded matches and fireworks in a bucket of water, to make sure any flame is snuffed.

- Read and follow all instructions and warnings on the fireworks label. Do not use

fireworks that have no information about the manufacturer or instructions for proper use — these are probably illegal, and may be unsafe.

- Check over the fireworks area the next day for wires and other hazardous debris.

- If clothing catches fire, the

victim should drop to the ground and roll, smothering the flames. A blanket or towel can help put out the fire. Burns should be cooled immediately with water or cold, wet, clean compresses, then treated by a doctor.

- If any fires are started or injuries occur while using

fireworks, call the fire department at 9-1-1 immediately.

The Federal Way fire department has drawn up a list of recommendations and warnings about fireworks safety. The pamphlet is available at department headquarters. For information, call 839-6234.

quests would be made.

Star Lake parent Donna Frey argued that the policy put too much power in the hands of principals by stipulating only that those principals "may" consider information about children supplied by their parents.

The approved policy and regulations took note of that, instead stipulating that principals "will" consider such information.

Parents are now invited to note any special educational, social or physical details about their children that might affect to which teacher they are assigned. The forms should discourage parents asking for favorite teachers with no sound educational reason to do so.

The school board put off any decision to surplus its unused Site 40, located on 10th Avenue Southwest in West Campus, until Jan. 1 or later next year.

Site 40 is a 10-acre, wooded lot, just across the street from the

Barclay Place housing development.

School district administration had recommended surplus the property, the first step toward selling or swapping it, based on a recommendation by a district surplus site committee. With a protected wetland and a steep slope, the land would be costly to build on, the committee recommended.

But residents of Barclay Place argued that the land should remain in the school district's hands until Federal Way's first city council is installed. That city council, they hope, might consider purchasing the property for use as a park or open space.

Superintendent Richard Harris said that he still agreed with the committee's recommendation to surplus the site, but that public opinion and reaction from "individual board members" convinced him to go along with the delay.

The delay was unanimously approved by the board.

be managed. If it isn't, you end up with what we have now — crime, congestion, and sprawl," he said.

Durning characterized Hill's style of "quiet leadership" as "procrastination, timidity and incompetence."

"(His leadership) is so quiet you can't hear it over the protests in Federal Way and the roar at Sea-Tac."

Durning also found fault with the King County Council for suggesting that new cities should pay more for county services such as police, health care and parks maintenance. The new cost policies were written after the county totaled up the revenue it will lose when the new cities incorporate.

"THE COUNTY shouldn't be charging the cities more because its (the county's) tax base has shrunk. After all, the county is losing responsibilities as well as revenues," he said.

Durning also pledged to work for construction of a rail rapid-transit system, preservation of open spaces, and a halt to what he called wholesale clearcutting of the Cascade foothills.

He called for a cooperative effort by business, labor and government to improve schools in the county, and he offered a program to put non-violent prisoners in work camps to reforest heavily logged areas.

Durning, 60, is an attorney, but he is best known as an active conservationist.

He served in the Environmental Protection Agency under President Carter, and he ran unsuccessfully for public office three times.

HILYER, 37, practices business law with a downtown

firm and lives in the Shoreline area north of Seattle. In 1981 he managed Seattle Mayor Charles Royer's campaign, then served as his legal counsel for three years.

Hilyer's Federal Way visit was sparsely attended, but he took the opportunity to challenge Hill to declare an immediate moratorium on issuing new building permits for apartments in Federal Way.

He said the moratorium should be lifted only when King

County enacts a comprehensive set of impact fees requiring developers to pay their fair share for construction of new roads, schools and parks.

"When an area is going to grow, we need to phase it in to link the growth of public facilities with the growth," he said. "Let's not pretend we're in the business of passing out building permits like popcorn."

He said recent efforts by Hill to enact impact fees for roads and study impact fees for

schools are not comprehensive enough. He questions why Hill didn't act sooner.

Hilyer said the best way to halt new apartment construction while a comprehensive set of impact fees is being prepared would be to "play hardball" with developers by putting every project through a fine-tooth comb of environmental review.

"A 1,000-unit apartment complex ought to have an EIS," he said.

Hilyer believes King County and Metro ought to be integrated to form a regional government, with the county executive leading the negotiations.

He said such a regional government should be responsible for land-use planning throughout the county, including cities, although individual zoning decisions still would be made by local governments.

Hilyer said the county should "bend over backwards" to work out contracts for services with

the new city of Federal Way, especially police services. Contracts should not force the city to pay for overhead on county services it does not use, he said.

Although he now has at least one rival in the Sept. 19 primary in Durning, Hilyer said the focus of his campaign will remain the record of the current county executive.

"I'm not going to go after my Democratic foe," he said. "We have more in common than differences."

taxpayers to pick up the bill for services the county provides to unincorporated areas.

"If these policies are adopted, the cities would have no voice in what is charged for county services, and who pays for them. We would end up supporting (unincorporated) areas for which we are not responsible," he said.

THE DEBATE centers on an historical dispute between the cities and the county on who subsidizes who. In writing the proposed policies, council staff have said that the county subsidizes cities. Cities, on the other hand, maintain that they are being asked to subsidize county services to unincorporated areas.

Roegner and the other mayors suggested that the council set up a new committee to re-write cost policies as well as land use and growth policies.

Roegner said the committee could make the difficult decisions on which services the county will provide in the future, and whether it should continue to provide costly municipal services to unincorporated areas.

The Auburn mayor said he believes the county should get out of the business of providing services normally provided by cities.

"The county should adopt policies that make it clear that if you live in an unincorporated area, you will have a lower level of service. That's what the county's comprehensive plan says — it's designed to encourage people living in urbanized areas to form their own cities," he said.

Barden disagreed with that viewpoint, but said the council could consider it at next month's retreat.

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Aussies pick up some tips on U.S. game

An Australian baseball team came to Federal Way to say more than the customary, "G'Day, mate." The Saint Cubs also came to play some ball.

The Saint Cubs are from the town of Gosford, which is 50 miles north of Sydney, New South Wales, in the Central Coast area of Australia.

The Aussies arrived here June 21 and left Friday morning. While they were here, they played three games, attended a baseball clinic at Green River Community College, went to a Seattle Mariners game and also enjoyed sightseeing with their host families.

"I think they're enjoying the hosting, of course they didn't have hosting in San Diego," said Beryl Cain, wife of coach Tom Cain.

The Aussies stopped in San Diego, Calif., when they arrived in the United States June 9 and played six games during an 11-day stay in California. They were scheduled to fly back to Los Angeles for three days after leaving here for stops at Disneyland, Universal Studios and Knots Berry Farm, then fly to Honolulu for two more days before heading home.

While in Federal Way, the Saint Cubs battled the Federal Way Junior Legion team and were leading 1-0 going into the bottom of the seventh inning before losing, 2-1. They bounced back to beat the Federal Way Big League team, 8-0, with superb pitching from Paul Jones and Darren Cain.

THE PURPOSE of the trip to the United States, explained Tom Cain, was to learn more about baseball, "just to take it back and pass it on to the other players and clubs."

In Australia, baseball is played at the club level year-round. Under 8-, 9- and 10-year-olds play T-ball, while "live ball" is offered to those at the U-12, U-14 and U-16 levels. There also is baseball for those at the U-18 and U-21 levels. Once a player reaches the U-16 age group, however, he can play open ball against adults if he is good enough. There is no restriction on age at the "senior" level.

Australians use American rules for baseball and the players are amateurs.

"We don't play every day like you do here," said Warwick Dixon, one of the coaches who traveled with the team. "Where we come from, we play once a week."

The Cubs are one of six clubs in their district. They play each club four times and have 20 games per season. After that, the top four teams reach the playoffs.

BUT HIGH SCHOOL ball is much different, as they have what is known as "Knockout" competition. In this competition, a team keeps playing until it loses. A team could play one game in its season or play 26, as did P.J. Jones' son, whose Australian high school team advanced all the way to the state finals and played 26 games.

In addition to high school ball, he also played on an under-16 team last year as well as a senior team. On Wednesday, he would play for the high school team, Saturday for the senior team and then Sunday for the junior U-16 squad.

Baseball is catching on in Australia, but as the Aussies explain, it takes time. In Australia, the national sport is cricket and

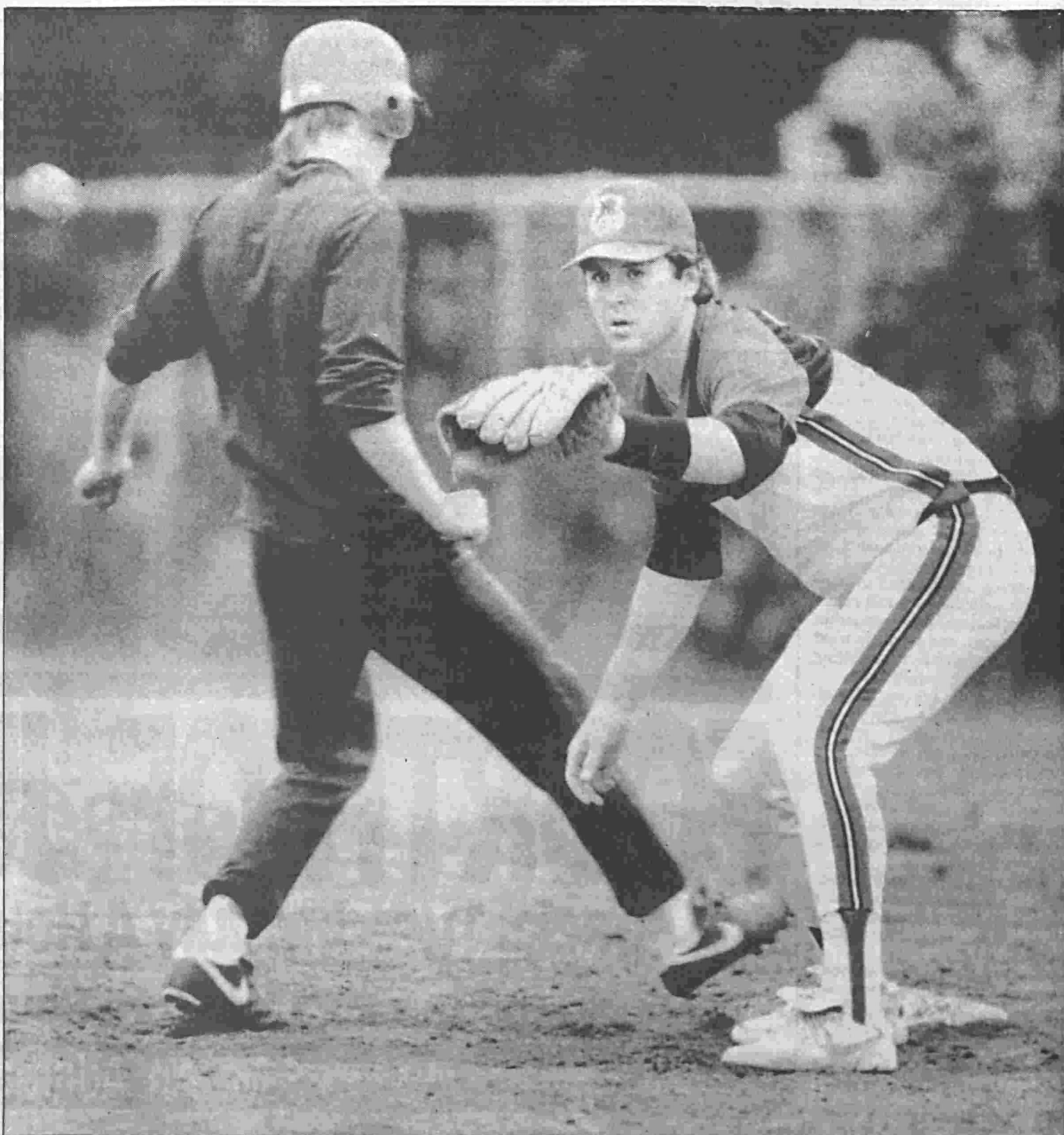

Gator grad looking to rebound from off year

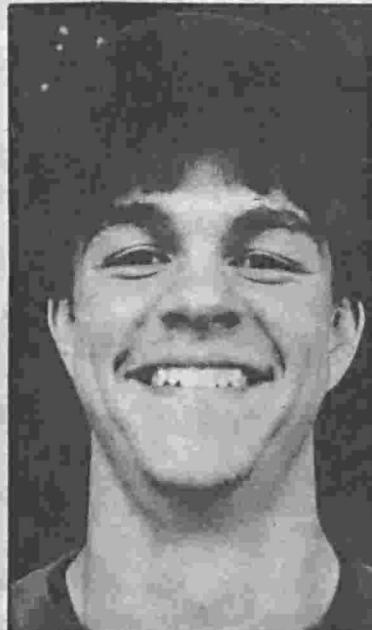
Dan Weis knows about the so-called sophomore jinx, but he would rather blame his second-year problems with the California Lutheran University baseball team on burnout.

Although this year had its bright spots for the 1987 Decatur High School graduate, his offensive production was down, with "The Goose" hitting .206 on 21 hits with two home runs.

Weis was coming off a freshman year in which he won the Coaches' Award and hit .293 on 41 hits with three home runs.

"There's always the sophomore jinx, but I don't want to blame it on that. It was just a bad season," said Weis. "I needed to start having some fun. After awhile it was just like a job. I haven't had a legitimate break from baseball since before my senior year. A few weeks, but not a legitimate break."

Weis has been going at it for a long time. After his senior year at Decatur he played for the Federal Way American Legion baseball team, and then he went into the fall season at California

Spring turnouts started in January and then he went into his freshman season, before playing semiprofessional baseball last summer for a Tacoma team. Then he had another fall season for the Kingsmen, followed by more winter turnouts and spring baseball this year.

WEIS IS taking this summer off from baseball and concentrating on work and a biology class at Pacific Lutheran University, and is looking for better times again next year.

"I'm getting hungry again," he said. "Next season is another season. I have two years left, and it's not a job, it's just a game. And it's a fun game."

Weis had an especially fun individual baseball game against Laverne Feb. 22, as he went 3-for-4 with both of his home runs for the year with four RBI.

Earlier, in the second game of the season against Master's College, he blasted a first-pitch double to win the game in the bottom of the ninth.

"There were two out, and we were down by one with runners on second and third," recalled Weis. "I got the green light with no count, and the first pitch I hit to the wall for a double and two runs. I never won a game in the bottom of an inning like that before with the guys mobbing me and everything. It was great."

Even though Weis didn't hit as well as he would have liked for

the season, he still started in 42 of 47 games.

He played right field most of the time instead of his normal first base, but wound up liking the position, although he will probably wind up back at first in the next couple seasons.

"We had a big left-handed first baseman who could only play at first base," said Weis. "If a guy hits that well you've got to play him, and I'm the most mobile of the first baseman."

"I still like first base better, but I had fun in the outfield. This year I made catches I didn't think I could make. Now I know how much you should know to be in the outfield. You're not into the plays as much, but in right field the ball is coming at you just as hard."

Weis also pointed out that he did not strike out as much, and had more doubles and was hit more times by the pitcher on the positive side of his statistics.

AS A team, the Kingsmen enjoyed a good year under second-year coach Rich Hill.

The team finished at 31-16 overall — the best record in the

history of the school — and wound up third in the Golden State Athletic Conference to reach playoff action.

California Lutheran was hotter earlier in the season, though.

"We were tearing it up in league, then the air just went out of our bubble," said Weis. "We made the playoffs, then lost 5-0 and 4-0 at the tournament."

The Kingsmen enjoyed good success over the year against Division I schools, taking three of four games, including a 2-1 win over Pepperdine. The lone loss was by a 7-5 score to Long Beach State.

But California Lutheran itself has been voted down from Division II to Division III play by its board of regents, effective the year after next, and that's a disappointment to Weis.

It will mean no more scholarships, and no more fall baseball program except for a scout

team.

"That was really depressing," he said. "Our program was humming along, and coach Hill was doing a real good job. In two years he turned us into a contender."

For next year, the Kingsmen will compete as an NAIA independent school, playing the same teams as this year only not as much, according to Weis. The following season they play in the Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference with such schools as Cal Tech and Laverne.

"Those are brain schools," said Weis. "I guess they wanted us to be more like a brain school."

But Weis will be sticking with the team.

"We had a great year," he said. "And for me personally there is always next year. It was just my down year."

Local athletes place high at district meet

Federal Way athletes gave it their best shot during a district Hershey track meet held recently at Auburn's Troy Field.

it is played in every state within every school. But baseball is not played at every school. Australia is improving in baseball, though, and it's amateur team is rated No. 7 in the world.

At the present time, there also is a movement from within Australia to create a playoff system between the various states to compete for a national title.

THE SAINT CUBS brought 16 boys with them to America, basically a U-14 and U-18 combined team. All the players have played an equal amount of games.

"All we came here for is experience, to see the country, have some fun and learn. I think we've done all that," explained P.J. Jones.

The Australians raised \$60,000 on their own through various fund-raisers, such as car washes, recycling and selling cakes. The Australians sold more than a million cakes. Their smallest order was 600 dozen, while their largest was 1,500 dozen, explained Beryl Cain. The players were expected to participate in the fund-raising efforts as well as in preparing the cakes.

"I think the boys will appreciate this trip more knowing they had to fund raise and work for it, rather than having it given to them," she said.

Daniel Paterson certainly appreciated the trip. Paterson especially enjoyed the baseball clinic, which he said taught him how to "catch properly" and how to "swing the bat properly."

Paterson added that baseball in America is "a bit more competitive" than it is in Australia, but also said, "they play more times a week than we do."

The Australians had one of the parents filming their activities on a video camera so that the boys' parents can see what they did when they get back home. The video camera also was used extensively during the baseball clinic so that people in Australia
