

Rollin' out New bicycle patrol hits the road today

Two King County police officers have given up the comfort of their patrol cars for the challenge of all-terrain mountain bikes to patrol the Federal Way shopping district.

Walt Olson and Lisa Pepin will be making their rounds on Raleigh, 21-speed mountain bikes beginning today, with a 1 p.m. inauguration by bike-riding County Executive Tim Hill at SeaTac Mall.

Pepin and Olson have been practicing for their new duty since mid-June, with special training provided by the Cascade Bicycle Club in Seattle and morning practice rides through the busiest of Federal Way's streets.

The bike patrol will cover everything from South 312th Street to South 325th Street, and from Interstate 5 to 11th Avenue South, including Steel Lake Park. The bike patrol district will overlap with patrol car districts, and patrol cars will continue to respond to calls in the area.

THE TWO-WHEELED patrol

will ride from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. through September, when Maj. Ollie Moore will evaluate the program and decide if and how it will continue.


"It could end in September, or be curtailed and brought back during peak times, for summer and special events, like parades and fairs," Olson said.

When not patrolling the streets, Olson and Pepin will take what they learned from Cascade instructors and pass it on to young cyclists. The officers will receive additional training at the bike club in how to teach bicycle safety.

Although both officers have been frequent recreational 10speed cyclists, they were new to mountain bikes, fat-wheeled, sturdy, yet light-weight (22 pounds) bikes built to jump curbs and handle rough terrain. So far, they're impressed.

Pepin said she has had little trouble adapting.

"I NEVER rode a mountain bike before, but it's much easier than a 10-speed and more com-







School staff ratios rapped

By MELODIE STEIGER Nobody argued with Bill Hansen when he called the teacher-to-student ratio in Federal Way schools

"deplorable." But the district's method of dealing with that ratio next year is not exactly what Hansen, the Federal Way teachers' union president, and about 30 other teachers had in mind when they attended a school board meeting last week.

The teachers told the Federal Way School Board that next year's projected decrease in high school students offers a good chance to beef up the ratio of certificated staff per students, including teachers, librarians and aides.

Keeping the same number of certificated staff at the high schools and hiring more teachers to handle an expected influx of junior high students would increase the number of teachers per 1,000 students at the high school level, Hansen said.

District administrators see it another way, however. Some high school staff should be moved to junior highs, where the students will be, they say. If class sizes are to be lowered anywhere, it will be at kindergarten, first, second and third grades. We will address overall staffing, but the need for teachers is at the elementary level. That's our first priority now," said Superintendent Richard Harris. But moving high school teachers would disrupt high school programs, particularly the smaller programs such as shop classes, Hansen argued. It would also disrupt the careers of the nine high school teachers lowest on the seniority list, who

Modest top cop credits consistency

The list of shining adjectives used by one of his bosses to describe Officer Mike Pendrak is nearly as long as the 10-year veteran's police career.

But Pendrak, who has been named 1988 Police Officer of the Year at Precinct 5, more modestly attributes the accolade to "being consistent and not causing trouble." Pendrak will be honored today at a Federal Way Chamber of Commerce luncheon as the top cop in

Federal Way, so voted by a panel of his superiors at Precinct 5. The precinct's sargeants, Lt. Max Osburn and Maj. Ollie Moore put their heads together to decide who would be tapped for last year's honor.

Osburn said every aspect of a police officer's job is considered when choosing an officer of the year.

"WE LOOK at everything from courage to good paperwork. But it's not just how he would perform in a hail of gunfire, but how well a person does their job overall and consistently.

"We think of the 47,000 different hats that a police officer wears and consider how well he wears each one," Osburn said.

Pendrak, who has spent most of his nearly 10-year King County Sheriff's Department career in Federal Way, came to the department via a stint in the Army and then at the Pierce County Jail as a jailer. He has a two-year degree in criminal justice from Fort Steilacoom Community College.

The quiet-spoken 35-yearold officer said he enjoys his work and finds it satisfying. He has spent the majority of his career on patrol, although he did a stint at the precinct as a burglary/larceny detective.

"When you hire on you want to be chief of police, but as you go, your goals change with your perspective," Pendrak said.

Car pools encouraged **Commuters urged to shift gears**

When autumn rolls around, Tim Hill hopes King County residents will travel to work with a buddy.

The King County Executive recently offered the building blocks for what he calls a Public-Private Commuter Campaign to alert King County residents to the many ways they can get to work other than sitting by themselves in a car.

'We have to have a dramatic change in commuting habits over the next few years to have the system work," Hill said.

Because money is tight in the county's transportation budget, and roads continue to clog up,

Hill said carpooling, vanpooling, bicycling and busing are the new commuting habits people must consider.

Backing up Hill was Penny Peabody, president of the Seattle-King County Economic Development Council, who said daily commuters are not the only ones frustrated with the congestion problems. In a recent poll, one out of five King County business owners said they may change sites because of the traffic problems.

HILL SAID this campaign will urge businesses and local government to study the example of companies like SAFECO Insurance Co., Boeing Co.,

CH2M Hill and Puget Power, which offer incentives to employees for sharing rides to work.

Noting that dollars are scarce, Hill said, "We have to work with what we've got."

One such opportunity is the underused carpool/bus lanes on area freeways. According to state Department of Transportation figures, special lanes may look inefficient, but the ones on Interstate 5, for example, actually carry 3,300 people per hour compared with only 2,300 people in the general purpose lanes.

Sharron Schinbo, Metro transit promotion supervisor, ap-

plauded Hill's effort, which amounts to courting the businesses that don't already participate in Metro's five-yearold business rideshare program.

Hill's campaign also will push the benefits of ridesharing for employers. John Chelminiak, spokesperson for Hill, posed this scenario:

Instead of offering free parking places to employees, a local business chooses to offer a subsidy to employees so they can pay for their parking places. If three of the people working for that business decide to carpool, they pay for just one parking

Smoke signal says talk to neighbors


he Pierce County line looks harmless on a map, a clean slice through Federal Way, from Dash Point to Milton. In the next decade, it could become an open wound if regional planning does not address several issues that affect residents on both sides.

While the most obvious concern is transportation, which will squeeze Northeast Tacoma as much as southwest King County, planners also ought to consider issues like the environment, public safety and public services.

That point was brought home to both communities when Fire District 39 Fire Marshal Ed Coutts (Federal Way) recently called for the continuance of controls on proposed land-clearing fires at the Harbor Ridge housing development, now under construction in Northeast Tacoma.

The smoke and ash generated by that project will ignore the county line as it drifts across neighborhoods from Twin Lakes to Panther Lake. Coutts' concerns will be aired at a hearing July 13 when Block Brothers Industries USA Inc. - a development company in Seattle - seeks a variance of new no-burn guidelines, so the company can continue with its land-clearing fires. The hearing will be held in Tacoma (Pierce County Annes, 2501 S. 35th Street) at 9:30 a.m. That's an inconvenient hour for most working folks, and an inconvenient place for Federal Way residents. But public comment also will be taken by mail (Anita Frankel, Puget Sound Air Pollution Control Agency, 200 West Mercer Street, Room 205, Seattle, 98119).

It is time to consider revising the public process, when an issue cuts across several adjacent jurisdictions and in-

least initially thought it did. Last Thursday the council's executive board decided to go with both newspapers. The council's full membership is expected to vote on the matter tomorrow night.

Neither paper has said it would drop the whole thing if its particular proposal isn't chosen over the other, but a representative of the Times said it would have to reconsider if both proposals are chosen. "We'd have to give it serious consideration," said Cynthia Meagher, managing editor for the Times. The Tribune has said it will go ahead and hold its own forum whether it is officially chosen by the council or not. It has already reserved room at Decatur High School on Sept. 11 for the forum. The council has sidestepped having to choose one paper over the other, so far. in part because it knows it has to work with both papers. Ehlis acknowledged the council is concerned about being caught in the middle of a circulation war.

volves more than two agencies. Whether that applies to water supply (as in the case of Pipeline 5), to traffic (as in the discussion of rerouting Port of Tacoma trucks through Federal Way), or to environmental matters like the controversial tideflats incinerators, populated areas like Federal Way must have a say. That also goes for law enforcement agencies, and services to the elderly and needy.

Decisions in the new city of Federal Way could also affect Milton, Fife and Northeast Tacoma, so the sword cuts both ways.

For that matter, since regional growth affects folks from Everett to Olympia, they ought to be consulted whenever local governments propose actions that could have areawide impact. It makes sense to begin that process in our own backyard, over the invisible fence that separates North Shore residents from their neighbors in Twin Lakes. The example could be infectious.

Polluter had timing just right for crime

he criminal who dumped chemicals into the Duwamish River two weeks ago deserves harsh punishment, but the government's response system that let the criminal get away with it merits some criticism itself.

In the still of a Sunday morning, someone intentionally poured hundreds of gallons of a toxic chemical into the sewer system that feeds into the Duwamish, state Department of Ecology officials believe.

The maliciousness of the act is unpardonable, but the criminal knew what he or she was doing. The dump was timed to best catch residents and DOE officials off-guard.

By the time a sleeping DOE inspector awoke to the sound of his beeper, dressed, ate breakfast, headed to DOE headquarters in Redmond, got lost and finally made it to the spill site, two hours had passed since the spill was reported.

Almost none of the chemical was recovered. The DOE never determined exactly what it was, how much of it there was or where it came from. But the investigation is formally closed now.

A better system is needed desperately.

The nation is buzzing with the recent discovery that no one is prepared to respond to catastrophes such as the Alaska and other recent major oil spills.

Politicians, including those of Washington state, are harping on the need to set up a response system to the major spills. Puget Sound and the Washington coastline must be protected, they scream.

In the clamor over the big-time disasters, someone should take a look at what the state is prepared to do with smaller, but more malicious spills such as the one on the Duwamish River.

An accident can happen at any time, but a crime is worse because it can happen specifically at the time when the criminal knows enforcement is slack. The DOE should see to it that there is no slack time for criminals to aim for.

At the council's last monthly membership meeting, the council received proposals to co-sponsor Federal Way City Council candidate forums from both the Morning News Tribune and the South Times bureau of the Seattle Times.

"This is unusual for us," said Mary Ehlis, chair of the council's community relations committee. "Usually we're trying so hard to get coverage.

Let me interject here by stating the obvious. I work for the Federal Way News. Consequently, I preface my remarks on the Tribune's and Times' courtship of the council by stating that anything I have to say is biased and somewhat selfserving.


I am confused and upset! Within the last few months:

Teachers critical of staffing ratio

would move to junior high classrooms.

"It would be devastating not only to those people involved, but to programs, tco," Hansen told the school board.

THE CATALYST for the disagreement is a March report by the Superintendent of Public Instruction which states that Federal Way's 45.53 ratio is certificated staff per 1,000 students, although Hansen noted that the ratio has been raised over the past school year to 46.01 certificated staff per 1,000 students.

However, the average for the state's 148 school districts is 49.34 certificated staff per 1,000 students. Hansen pointed out that several districts similar in size to Federal Way, including Auburn and Northshore, are at or near that average.

The ratio generally affects class size - a larger ratio means smaller classes, or more certificated staff. A smaller ratio means larger classes, or fewer certificated staff.

Hansen considers Federal Way's standing far below par. "I find it deplorable as a citizen with children in these schools, and as a teacher," he said. "We have to do better.

"I'm not asking that Federal Way be number one in the state, but I do ask that we at least be at

the state average," he added. SUPERINTENDENT HAR-RIS agreed that the state average is desirable, but that keeping teachers on at high schools despite shrinking enrollment is not the best way to reach it. The district expects 200 fewer high school students next year, but 200 more junior high students than it had this past school year.

"It seems natural to switch from where there is excess to where there is need," he said.

But Thomas Jefferson High School teacher Carol Lee told the school board that what looks natural is not necessarily right. Lee said she teaches several large French classes, but her fourth-year French class has only eight students enrolled. Fewer classes may mean com-

bining those eight students with the 25-student third-year French class, she said.

"I think it's a tragedy that we cannot give support to those eight students who want to be fourth-year French students," she said.

SCHOOL DISTRICT administrators have another staffing headache as they prepare the 1989-90 school year budget. The state's funding formula is based on providing districts with enough money to pay for 49 certificated staff members per 1,000 students, with the district largely responsible for deciding how to spend that money. This year, however, the state has offered enough money to pay for 51 certificated staff per 1,000 students to districts that increase their staffing to 49 per 1,000.

But the Federal Way School District would have to make the jump from 46-per-1,000 to 49-per-1,000 on its own before it could even begin to close in on the 51per-1,000 funding.

State money intended to pay for the 49-per-1,000 ratio is eroded by non-employee related costs, such as books and special programs administrators.

"We've had to offer all the same programs to be competitive with other districts, and at the same time we've been catching up with other districts while we've collected smaller levies," said Harris.

Cost analysis for any decisions to be made are still shaky. As it now stands, district administrators say next year's budget could reach \$69 million to fund the same programs and staff ratio it offered last year. Department heads have requested some \$72 million for new and existing programs.

Last year's budget was set at \$60.7 million.

The Federal Way School Board will work on next year's budget throughout the summer, to beat the state's late August deadline.

fortable for me," she said. The biggest adjustment. Pepin said, was learning to ride aggressively in traffic.

'They told us, 'If you're going to be a vehicle, be a vehicle and be out there in the road.' That takes some getting used to," she said, noting that Federal Way has few streets accomodating to bike riders. Joining the traffic flow on busy South 320th Street takes nerve.

Olson said he's found a new appreciation for bicyclists. He joked that in the past, he had on occasion told bike riders to get off the street over his patrol car P.A. system.

"I've learned a lot since then," he added.

Olson and Pepin are two of 10 officers who applied for the new duty. Both had to pass extensive physicals before they were able to order their new bike patrol uniforms and start prepping for a summer of pedaling the streets, rain or shine, said Lt. Max Osburn.

PEPIN AND OLSON will wear their traditional uniform shirts, complete with badge and gun, but trade in their trousers for custom-made bike shorts. Their bike helmets will sport the familiar King County Sheriff's Department star logo.

Osburn said the entire program cost between \$1,200 and \$1,500 in start-up costs, including equipment and training. When he first arrived at Precinct 5 early this year, precinct commander Moore said one of his goals was to put a bike patrol on Federal Way streets. Having officers on bikes to weave through gridlock traffic at peak hours should speed response times in the shopping district, he said.

It also provides a form of more personalized service, getting officers out of patrol cars and making them more accessible to the public, Moore added.

He likened the bike patrol to a cross between motorized patrol and foot patrol. Cars have a greater range and faster response time than bikes in most instances, and the bikes have similar attributes as compared to foot patrols.

MERCHANTS in the area like the idea of the bike patrol, said Sally Manz, SeaTac Mall manager. She believes it will be a good public relations move for everyone concerned.

The quiet, less conspicuous besides providing ikes. frequent patrols, will "add an element of surprise. I think the whole program is terrific." So too does Kevin Jordan, regional manager for Nickels and Dimes Inc., which owns and

said, because officers must have expertise in serveral areas. "You don't get to specialize."

He also must keep up with ever-changing statutes and police procedures - "The boring stuff." But it definitely isn't all boring.

There's a certain challenge in being faced point-blank with a situation and having to respond instantly, Pendrak said. There often is no time to ask for advice or assistance. But that decision ultimately will be reviewed in great detail.

"You make a decision in just a few seconds, but then there's a mass of people to review that decision afterward. And they have all the time in the world."

Pendrak and his wife, Kathleen, live in Puyallup with their three daughters, ages 7 months to 8 years.

KATHLEEN WORKS as a civilian identification supervisor for the Tacoma Police Department, and her job, like

her husband's entails working different shifts. She just finished a stint on swing shift, and Pendrak has been on graveyard for the past three months. Getting together sometimes is a challenge.

Finding time for family hiking and biking outings is tough when both parents work different shifts, but tougher yet is finding child care for three kids when both parents are working nights. "We used a lot of relatives,"

Pendrak said.

Police work and weird hours can take their toll on family life. Pendrak said it's tough explaining to his youngsters that dad needs to sleep during the day, especially on weekends, "when they want me up all the time."

Another difficulty is leaving the ugly aspects of the job on the job and not taking them home to family and friends.

"We're listening to people's problems all the time, you don't want to go home and listen to more," he explained.

ALSO, DEALING with what usually turns out to be the worst side of folks, makes an officer jaded after time, Pendrak said. "You have to be careful to keep that under control and try to avoid the attitude of 'us against them.'

His superiors say he does well on that and other aspects of the job. Osburn describes Pendrak as, "stable, intelligent, responsible, consistent, considerate, caring and professional. He does a very, very good job."

Pendrak said he was surprised but pleased by being tagged as officer of the year. "It's nice, but it's not something people really try for." If he stood out among his peers it was because of a personality trait, he said.

"I'm a meticulous-type person. I don't like to be embarrassed. If I do make a mistake, you can bet I'll never make the same one again."

will be called between Aug. 15 and Sept. 15, when the state is scheduled to receive two new passenger-only ferries that should have been funded in the transportation budget.

If the state is unable to come up with the money for the ferries and cannot take possession, the federal government may demand repayment of grant money that helped pay for the ferries, Schoon said. He estimated the gas tax will need a minimum 4 cents increase to meet those and other transportation needs in the next two vears.

Von Reichbauer said he's hoping a special session, if called,

will be a one-day session. He said the governor's office and staff should lay the groundwork for the session and call the legislators in simply to vote on a prepared package.

Von Reichbauer also wants to deal with sentencing reforms for sex crimes because of the recent outrage over the rape and sexual mutilation of a 7-year-old Tacoma boy. Police have arrested a suspect in the case with a long history of sex crimes.

But Brough has her doubts about such a session, although she recognizes the need to go back to Olympia. She said the reason the governor might call legislators back would be to work on the transportation budget, but because of public sentiment, the session also

would have to deal with the sex crimes issue.

That's where the problem lies, she said.

"We can't deal with the gas tax until we're ready to deal with the sexual assault thing, and we're not ready to do that," she said.

The sex crimes issue is too big to tackle in such a short time, she said. "We'll be dealing with everything from the handling of evidence to the right to privacy of convicted felons. It's an enormous task," Brough said.

The governor has assembled a task force to look into the sentencing and handling of felons convicted of sex crimes, and Brough said she was disappointed not to be a member.







ple file through pricey, immaculately decorated homes, usually on the east side of Lake Washington. And they pay for the privilege.

People attend the Seattle Street of Dreams for a variety of reasons - some want decorating ideas, some want to see the latest in kitchen design, and some, perhaps, just want to see a clean house.

Some visitors inquire about the prices of the homes (half a million, give or take a few hundred thousand). Some even engage the builder to construct their own home. Most don't.

In fact, when surveyed about what they did and didn't like in the Street of Dreams show, many visitors had a suggestion for the Heller Co., the real estate agency that puts the show on: 'Make these homes affordable!"

Ask and ye shall receive. THE HELLER Co., which opened a Federal Way office earlier this year, has arranged for a more affordable Street of Dreams - in Federal Way in fact.

Affordable Street, now under construction in the Madrona Park development on South 356th Street, will open July 8 and run through Aug. 20.

Six builders are involved in the show - five of them with two homes and one with only one model. Prices range from \$90,000 to \$120,000.

Unlike custom builders who participate in the luxury home tours, the Affordable Street builders specialize in moderately priced homes, and each has a repertoire of different models to choose from.

Lew Mason, managing broker of the Heller Co.'s Federal Way office and coordinator of Affordable Street, said that each of the builders selected the home they thought would "show" the best

And because the houses are "look but don't touch," temporary outhouses will be located

Madrona Park is by no means filled up, so if home hunters find a model they like and think the area feels like a good place to live, it won't be difficult to make the arrangements with the builders. Brokers will be on hand to match buyers with financing and builders with sites.

You won't, however, find the custom-carved wood bannisters, marble floors or state-of-the-art security systems that typify projects such as Street of Dreams.

Affordable Street homes are better described as: "3 BR, 11/2 bath. Nice kitchen. Convenient to schools. Good deal for firsttime buyers or empty nesters." First-time buyers and "empty-nesters" (people whose children have moved out) are in

fact the sort of buyers Mason expects to be interested in Affordable Street and Madrona Park.

He expects 40,000 to 60,000 people to file through Affordable Street, which will run in conjunction with the Heller Co.'s more pricey Street of Dreams. Admission tickets to one show will count toward the purchase of tickets to the other. Street of Dreams will run July 15 to Aug. 13 in an area north of Redmond, Northeast 128th and 175th Northeast streets.

The Heller Co. has been running Street of Dreams since its president and founder, John Heller, visited a similar project in Portland and found himself standing in the rain for two hours waiting to get in.

IF PORTLANDERS were willing to do it, Heller reasoned, Seattleites probably would, too.

Affordable Street is not the first home show to come to Federal Way, where land for such projects is less expensive than on the east side. Last year, the Tour of Elegance was held in The Ridge. The custom-built luxury homes in that show were priced in the \$300,000 range, although as of June of this year, not all had sold.

Still, organizers considered the Tour of Elegance a success - another set of homes will be featured in a show next summer.

Home shows, Mason said, have proven to be a valuable marketing tool for just about everyone involved in the new home business. Decorators get a chance to show their stuff. Makers of every conceivable household item get their wares displayed in a home environment instead of a showroom. Even car dealers are anxious to have their vehicles parked in driveways.

Admission to Affordable Street is \$5 for adults, \$4 for seniors, \$3 for children ages 5 to 16, and children under 5 are admitted free.

To find Affordable Street, head west on South 356th Street from Pacific Highway South and look for the signs. It is on the north side. On-site parking will be available.

Petunia pinching will save annual blooms

Red geraniums, white petunias and blue lobelia may be exploding with color this week, but don't let all that flag-waving color fool you. Your summer blooming annuals and bedding plants are in a crucial stage of development right now.

They're thinking about reproductive matters. If you should fail them now and allow seed heads to form from the faded flowers, you'll be cutting their life span short. Flowering annuals will begin to age and decline if their faded blooms are not picked and their leggy stems pinched.

This is the week to deadhead the geraniums, pinch the petunias and maintain the marigolds with a ruthless cleanup of faded flowers.

Q. I bought this house several years ago and there is a nice row of flowering plums (I think that's what they are) in the front yard. I gave them a good pruning last year and they all blossomed beautifully this spring, but there is one rebellious tree that is acting very weird.

It insists on sending new shoots or branches up from the base of the trunk. These sticks shoot straight up from the ground and even get leaves that match the branches overhead. What should I do?

M.H., Auburn A. What you should do is get tough. Those branches from below are really suckers from the rootstock of your plum tree.

Sometimes ornamental trees are grafted onto a hardy rootstock. This way, the more fragile variety can develop a vigorous root system.

The rootstock on your renegade plum tree is trying to take over. It will sneak up and overpower the upper half of your tree if you let it. Get control of those suckers now by cutting them off close to the trunk even if you have to dig down to find the source of the escape.

Pile a few inches of mulch around the tree to block any light from reaching the grafted rootstock. Often these suckers emerge from a grafted tree that has been planted too shallow.

I suspect the suckers earned their name because of kindhearted gardeners who decide

to wait a while and let the volunteers grow. Be kind to a sucker and you'll be sorry.

Q. My husband grows great broccoli, but I can't stand cleaning off the bugs! I've found green worms and aphid on both broccoli and cabbage and it takes me forever to wash each and every leaf. What can I get him to do about this problem? O.G., Puyallup

A. There's more than one way to deal with broccoli bugs. In Plan A, we put that man to work spraying with a forceful jet of water before he brings home the broccoli, or he could use row covers of spun polyester, Reemay, to shield the crop from flying insects, or he could spray his vegetables with B.T. (an organic pesticide) or some other over-the-counter bug killer.

The problem is he probably won't get around to doing any of the above this year, so you'll have to resort to plan B.

All you do is soak the broccoli in a pan of warm water and white vinegar for 10 to 15 minutes. One tablespoon of vinegar will send the bugs swimming to the top, where they can be easily skimmed off.

If bug skimming doesn't sound like fun to you, just learn to eat with your eyes closed. Those bugs may be ugly, but they are high in protein and probably safer than the pesticides found on grocery store produce. And at least worms and aphid don't crunch when you chew them the

Real Life Home Gardens: An experienced lazy gardener from Puyallup wrote to suggest easy options for filling whiskey barrels and other large pots with flowers that never need replanting.

I was tickled with her suggestions, because I had the same success she did at planting annual flowers that reseeded and returned each year - it's just that the self-sowing wasn't planned and I always thought it was a rare and wonderful piece of luck.

If you want to try letting your annual flowers seed themselves, just let your petunias, allysum and primroses stay in those whiskey barrels all winter. Toss in some nastursium seeds and pansies. Now allow everything to mature and go to seed in the fall, tucking the long stalks back into the barrel when they start to wander over the sides.





3/2 cup butter or margarine 1 cup chopped nuts





Racing couple leading way at Monroe

Tanners enjoying life in the fast lane

Kelly and LeAnne Tanner are enjoying life in the fast lane.

The husband and wife NASCAR race car drivers are leading their respective divisions of racing at Evergreen Speedway in Monroe.

Kelly, 26, has won the most main events in the super stock division this year with 6 wins out of 12 races, while LeAnne, 21, is the leader of the mini-stock division.

For the two Cambridge residents, automobile racing is deeply rooted in their past.

Kelly, a graduate of Thomas Jefferson High School, began racing quarter-midget cars at the age of 5. LeAnne, a graduate of Monroe High School, has been watching automobile racing since she was 5. Her parents have been racing cars for 23 years and she's been a regular at the speedway all of her life.

Kelly raced the quartermidget cars up until he was 16, traveling across the country. When he was 17, Kelly began racing a Carmen Ghia in the mini-stock division, primarily at Evergreen Speedway, as well as on a traveling circuit that took him to such places as British Columbia and Oregon.

Kelly captured three championships in six seasons of ministock racing prior to making the jump to the super stock level at the age of 23.

Kelly then ran a Camaro for two years before switching to a Buick Regal this year.

LEANNE CAUGHT the racing bug at an early age, too. She won her first trophy on a gearshifting game at a car show at the age of 14. About a month after her 16th birthday, her father and his pit crew built her a demolition car.

LeAnne's first demolition competition came at the Evergreen State Fair when she finished second. She competed in the demolition derby for a year, finishing in the top three in five of them and winning one.

The racing buff then entered powder puff racing for a while, then on her 17th birthday her father brought her home a NASCAR mini-stock car. She finished in the top 20 her first year of racing at a time when racing wasn't the only thought on her mind. It was her senior year in high school and sometimes she would skip a weekend of racing.

"Now if I took a weekend off, I'd probably die," said LeAnne, whose car is kept in Snohomish. "I wouldn't know what to do on a

Saturday night. I'd be lost." ALTHOUGH KELLY and LeAnne had known each other before, they never were formally acquainted until they met at a Kingdome car show in February of 1988.

They met afterward at a dinner and dance held in the press lounge.

"He walked by looking rather lost and I said he could sit at our table," she said. "Then he sat down and proceeded to pour popcorn over his head."

Kelly maintained it actually was a friend's head he dumped the popcorn on, but at any rate, "He was being obnoxious," she said.

One year later to the day, the two were married, and they've been busy racing ever since. They also work together at Longacre Automotive Racing Products in Redmond.

Their pit crews work next to each other at the track and Kelly offers pointers to LeAnne on her racing when possible, but their marriage hasn't really affected their racing, Kelly said.

"When you have a race car, your car racing goes up and down," he said.

But Kelly's racing has been on the up and up this year. After going through two "dry" years with the Camaro when he didn't win a race, his team switched car bodies to a Buick Regal and he's been on a tear.

Kelly is in second place in point standings at Evergreen,

but is leading the region. On any given night, he runs in a trophy dash, a heat race and the main event. Because only main event results count toward the region while Evergreen adds up all three, it's possible that Kelly could win a regional title, but not take the track track title.

He's set his sights on the regional title, though, as it pays \$11,000.

Should he win the national title, he would be awarded with \$60,000.

LeAnne also is enjoying a big year and has set winning the track championship as her goal.

'This year we're in first place in the point standings," she said. "It's gotten better every season. We set a goal to get a little better every year. Last year, we were third overall. There's not too many more places to go. We're hoping to finish a little better than we did last year."

LeAnne is one of only four women race car drivers out of about 40 who compete in the mini-stock division at Evergreen.

The two are often asked why they don't talk more to each other when they're at the track, but the two drivers have their own thing to do.

While LeAnne likes to socialize with her friends, Kelly is more concerned about the racing, so the two don't have much to say to one another.

"We both feel comfortable not talking at the race track," she said. "We just let each other do their own thing."

Both LeAnne and Kelly are gearing up for a big weekend of racing July 14-16 when the Washington Winston 500 will take place at Evergreen Speedway, featuring Bill Elliott. Both Kelly and LeAnne will race on Friday and again Saturday if all goes well. But Sunday, the Winston Cup race will take place for the national caliber hot rods.



The route will take walkers north to the Hylebos Wetlands on South 348th Street, through the wetlands and back on First Avenue to the log cabin.


"It's a good walk, but it's a nice trail," said George Cohee of the Federal Way Noon Lions Club.

States agree to open fishery at mouth of Columbia

The state Department of Fisheries and its Oregon counterpart have agreed to open the popular Buoy 10 sports salmon fishery at the mouth of the Columbia River on Aug. 16. Fisheries Director Joe Blum said the later opening this year was to ensure that no restrictive regulations would have to be enforced later to slow down the catch to meet the quota.

Last year the Buoy 10 fishery opened on Aug. 6 and many unpopular restrictions had to be enforced. The Port of Ilwaco has pre-sold all of its moorage slips and most motels are booked up.

Anglers will be allowed two salmon per day until Sept. 5 when the limit increases to three. Barbed hooks are permitted and the fishery is open seven days a week.

hosted recently by the South Lake Washington Chapter, you missed a good program. Lots of positive feedback came back on that program, so if you get the chance to hear Floor speak again, don't pass it up.

Reports are that salmon

are starting to show in south Puget Sound. I believe the weather will improve along with the fishing. Usually a good high-pressure reading and south breeze makes for better production. What I am hearing is that early and late are good. Recently some friends were off the Clay Banks in Tacoma with hoochies and dodgers and hit some nice fish 40 to 80 feet

down using downriggers. The fish moved up to 20 feet in the dropping light levels of evening.

Better reports on steelhead are coming from the Green River than first expected. Some nice fish in the 12- to 14pound class have been caught. Spinners and sand shrimp seem to be the popular baits. Initial indications by the game depart-

ment indicated a poor year, but more fish than expected have been showing up.

Sockeye seem to be coming in good numbers now and the report I hear is that they are bigger. My contacts say that usually means less fish, so your guess is as good as mine as to the official expectation. Stay tuned to learn whether there will be a sockeye season on Lake Washington,

and don't store away those black hooks.

Salmon anglers would do well to borrow a trick from : the bass angler's book. When a fish is preparing to jump, shove your rod tip deep into the water and reel down hard. Many a nice salmon has been lost near the boat from a half-hearted roll. Keep tension on those barbless hooks.

Voss' career had Northwest beginnings

When he was a six-year-old, Brian Voss rolled his first bowling ball in Anchorage, Alaska.

Now the former Des Moines resident rolls bowling balls as a top star on the Professional Bowlers Association Tour.

Last season, Voss set a PBA record by winning \$225,485. In the process, he collected two titles, including the Trustcorp PBA National Championship. By season's end, he had cashed in 26 of 29 tournaments and appeared in 10 five-man television finals. Additionally, he led the tour in points for the second consecutive year.

For these achievements, his fellow pros overwhelmingly voted Voss the 1988 PBA Player of the Year.

To reach this lofty pinnacle,

bowled his from the Northwest. In January of 1981, radar repairman Voss came to Fort Lewis. Nine months later, he became a civilian and began honing his awesome bowling skills.

From 1981 through 1986, Voss resided in Tacoma. Then came a year in Des Moines, followed by his most recent Northwest residence in Juanita.

During the Tacoma and Des Moines years, he practiced regularly at Sportsworld Lanes on Pacific Highway.

"I practically lived there," recollects Voss during a recent interview while practicing for the Seattle Open at Skyway Park Bowl. "Practice was essential."

Voss' 1982 debut on the tour resulted in moderate success.

events and made the championship final match in the PBA National Resident Pro Championship. Voss then lost a 192-190 squeaker to Darwin Skrznecki.

When the Greater Detroit Open was held in 1983, Voss took his first PBA title by defeating Pete McCordic in a rare threeframe roll-off after the duo tied in the final game.

With 1984, came the title in the Houston Open. It was 1987, however, that set .Voss' career

spiraling upward. After his grandmother died during a tournament in the Dallas suburb of Grand Prairie, Voss went on to victory and dedicated the triumph to his grandmother.

After finishing 1987 with \$115,710 in earnings and winning the prestigious Harry Smith Award for being points leader, the tour's "poster boy" went on to the glory year of 1988.

Keying his successes were a

number of factors.

Conditioning was uppermost in Voss' regimen.

"My weight fluctuates because I like to eat," admits Voss. "I try to stay active by running, walking, playing basketball, and golfing. The main thing is to stay physically active."

Strengths of Voss' bowling stem from his physical conditioning.

"As a fundamentalist, I have

a good swing that is easy to repeat," states the top star. "Strong legs, wrists, and forearms are the most important body parts in bowling. Along with the physical aspect goes an undefinable inner sense of being able to win or succeed under pressure. This separates bowlers who otherwise might be equal.

"Another thing that is impor-

Smith calls it quits after quarter-century

By ROB SMITH

Joanne Smith first set sights on Des Moines during the Great Depression.

Her parents often took her to visit an aunt and uncle who lived there. She was 10 years old.

"When we drove here, there wasn't much of a road," she remembers. "Pacific Highway was the only way to get here."

Twenty years later, Joanne and her husband moved to Des Moines from Alki Beach in West Seattle. They wanted to raise their three kids in a place they could run and play.

"And we've never been sorry," she says.

Sixty years after discovering Des Moines and almost 40 after making a home there, Joanne Smith is bidding goodbye to the people and the community she loves.

The long-time Des Moines News office manager, who has been responsible for placing birth announcements in all the Robinson Newspapers, including the Federal Way News and Community News, for years, has called it quits.

She'll continue to live in her home in the southern tip of Normandy Park. She promises she won't get bored.

She wants to spend time with her husband of 48 years. She wants to travel. She wants to take writing classes at Highline Community College. She wants to know her two grandchildren better.

BUT SHE'LL be sorely missed by all who know her, which is almost the entire city.

"She's been a real anchor in Des Moines. She knows everybody and everybody loves her," says Jerry Robinson, former publisher of Robinson Communications. He hired Joanne in 1964.

"She's so dedicated to the paper and what it means to the community. She is the paper there. She's invaluable, a very important person.'

On a typical day, Joanne would rise at dawn and, depending on the season, head for a meeting.

One day, it might be a chamber board meeting.

Another, it might be a historical society get-together.

She served on the city's Centennial Committee. On the Memorial Elms Committee. On the Des Moines Chamber of Commerce.

ONE DAY last May, she attended a chamber board meeting at 8 a.m., a chamber lunch at noon, a Waterland Committee meeting at 6:30 p.m. and a Historical Society meeting an hour later.

And she still found time to bake a batch of cookies to give to the mailman.

"What am I going to do now that you're gone and I can't get any more goodies?" he joked to Joanne one day last month.

"You're more than welcome to come to my house," she told him in all seriousness. "And I mean it, too," she said later. 'Just because I don't work here doesn't mean I'll lose touch.'

At one time, Smith wrote a "country column" for the newspaper. Sometimes she'd make as much as \$65 per month. She was paid 10 cents for every column inch that appeared in the paper.

But she is probably best known for writing birth announcements that appear in each of the company's six newspapers.

While she may not have brought thousands of babies into the world, she did get their names in the newspaper.

"I developed my own method," she says.

SHE WOULD leaf through Seattle's daily papers to find out who had recently given birth.

Then, going on nothing but the names of the parents, she would thumb through a phone book to try and find out if the parents lived in a Robinson Newspaper circulation area.

"If they were unlisted, I couldn't talk to them. Even now, hospitals send me birth information and I have to call the parents to get the information. I've been doing it for ages," she says.

The biggest change Smith has seen in her 25 years with the company is the recent dearth of cigarette smokers.

Ten years ago, she says everybody smoked.

The funniest thing Smith remembers centers around something fairly common to newspapers - mistakes.

She once sold an ad to Ema Wagner, a woman who painted designs on china. Somehow, the woman's first name became jumbled in the ad.

It read, "Enema Wagner."

"Aggie (Webb, the first editor of the Des Moines News) and I put that up on the wall and laughed about it for years," Joanne says, tears of laughter filling her eyes. "God, that was funny. She continued to advertise with us, though, because she was a friend of mine.'

MORE THAN 50 friends came to give Joanne a rousing sendoff into retirement last Thursday night.

Longtime friends and coworkers praised her in speeches. Mayor Pat DeBlasio gave her a citation from the city for her years of service to the community.

Earlier in the week, some longtime friends lamented how much they'd miss her.

"She was so willing to give of her time. She was so helpful to everybody," says Melanie Draper, who has known Joanne since 1968.

Typical of many, Draper knew who Joanne was even before meeting her.

"I knew who she was because she worked for the paper," she says. "It won't be quite so easy to call her now."

"She'd cut off her tongue before she'd say anything bad about anybody," says Aleen Pease, personnel director at Robinson Publishing. "She's

Sewer extension up for board vote Speeder leads cop on high-speed chase

A King County traffic officer clocked a speeder on 21st Avenue Southwest at better than 80 mph, Sunday, then had to chase the man nearly to Dash Point before he could cite him.

The officer reported that he was running his radar gun at 21st Avenue Southwest and Southwest 347th Street just before midnight when he clocked a car doing 81 mph in the 40 mph zone. The officer signaled the driver to stop, but he instead took off northbound on 21st.

The officer said the chase continued northbound to Southwest 320th street, where the driver, a 21-year-old Federal Way man, turned eastbound. Speeds were up to 80-plus, the officer said.

At about Southwest 320th and Sixth Avenue Southwest, the driver, having hit speeds in excess of 90 mph, hit the curbing and then struck another vehicle. As the police officer caught up, the driver took off again, this time heading back westbound on Southwest 320th all the way to Hoyt road, where he turned nor-

Woman is reported attacked by man

A woman told King County police she was attacked Thursday night by a man to whom she was giving a ride.

The 35-year-old woman's friends called police because she seemed distressed but would not talk about what happened to her. She initially would not talk to police, either, but finally said the man grabbed her and hurt her.

To get the man out of her car, the woman told police she intentionally ran it off the road into the bushes. At that point the man became angry and left, and she drove home.

Police reports say the woman was uncooperative and could not give specific details and appeared to be heavily intoxicated. Her friends, however, said she had told them the man had kicked and hit her, and then raped her. The woman refused to go to a hospital for an examination.

Police found the area where the woman said she ran off the road, but were unable to find the man who had been riding with her.

The man is described only as white, about 25 years old, with dark hair parted off-center and worn straight back.

TV appearance provokes threats

A Federal Way woman who appeared on a television newscast as a spokeswoman for striking grocery workers was the target of a series of threatening phone calls.

The woman had appeared on a recent news segment, discussing strike issues. Just minutes later, the local store where she normally works received three phone calls from a man who claimed he knows where the woman lives and threatened to "get her."

The store manager called the woman to warn her of the calls, and she in turn notified police.
