If passersby don't first notice the sweet, pungent smell of cloves wafting from their long, slim white cigarettes, they might look twice at the circle of youths who, on this summer night, are dressed in somber black, a sharp contrast to their mostly ghost-

ly complexions.

They stand out because they're not a common Friday sight in Federal Way. Although they live in the area, they usually spend their free time elsewhere.

DANDRIDGE, 18, peering out from under a straight, sharp-angled haircut that

drapes over one side of his face, laughs when asked how he spends his Friday nights in Federal Way.

"The first thing you do is get into your car. The second thing you do is leave," said the former Decatur student.

Dandridge and his friends usually go to Seattle, particularly the U-District. The Underground is a favorite and fitting spot for groups of 18-19 year-olds known as "Back-cavers" because of their stark, black-and-white style.

They go north because they haven't found comparable entertainment south of Montlake, they say.

"You need a place to go, and most of the places you go to hang out have been shut down," said 17-year-old Jeff Wilson, a Decatur senior this year.

DOWN THE ROAD at Pattison's West roller rink, the crowd is large, noisy and varied. Skaters range from elementary- to high school-age, with an occasional adult taking a chance on the crowded rink.

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## Salute starts Silver Lake construction

Classroom plans are already underway and a PTA is being formed for Silver Lake Elementary School. Now, construction is finally ready to begin at the site of Federal Way's first new elementary school in 17 years.

The Federal Way School District will celebrate the start of construction with a groundbreaking ceremony to be held Tuesday at 10:30 a.m. at 1310 S.W. 325th Place, the site of the new West Campus school.

The public is invited to the groundbreaking, which will include district administrators and school board members shoveling the first loads of soil at the site.

Also invited to the party are James Webster and Mary Ellrod, co-chairs of a bond issue that included \$6 million for the school, and Silver Lake's teachers and staff.

So far, only soil samples have been conducted at the Silver Lake site, located just south of the Alderbrook housing development. The real work will begin July 19 or 20 with the removal of brush and the leveling of the ground, said Rick McGovern, architect for the project.

Site preparations will continue for months. Neighbors of the new school will not see the

beginnings of the building itself until November, McGovern said.

General contractors' bids on the project were opened Friday by the school district administration. The job is expected to be awarded to the low bidder by the Federal Way School Board tomorrow night.

Principal Mary Pachek, formerly principal of Sunnycrest Elementary School in north Federal Way, has been working with a core team of teachers on plans for secondary, primary, special education and gifted classes to be held at the school.

Silver Lake teachers, parents and students met last month at a meeting held at Mark Twain Elementary School near Star Lake, where Silver Lake students will attend class next year until their new school is complete.

Silver Lake is expected to be completed by July 30, 1990, in time for the 1990-91 school year. The school is expected to hold 600 students who live in surrounding neighborhoods.

The 1988 bond issue that will pay for the new school also includes enough funds for a second school, to be built in Federal Way at an as-yet undetermined site.

## Council bills fight drugs, prostitution

King County Councilman Greg Nickels took a ride with county police officers last December.

They drove through some of the roughest parts of south King County — areas where drug dealing and prostitution are rampant 24 hours a day.

"I saw people congregating in areas to deal drugs, prostitutes soliciting. It became clear to me that the police needed more tools to reduce a very serious problem," he said.

Tomorrow Nickels will introduce two ordinances that he says will give police those additional tools. The measures would make it illegal to "remain in a place" known for drug or prostitution activity.

KNOWN AS anti-loitering measures, the two bills spell out specific circumstances under which police could arrest a person believed to be buying or selling drugs, or a person believed to be soliciting for prostitution.

Both specify additional circumstances police must use to determine whether the suspect is loitering in the area for illegal

purposes, or is simply in the wrong place at the wrong time.

The anti-drug loitering ordinance is modeled after a similar law in Tacoma, which is currently being challenged in the courts.

But Deputy King County Prosecutor John Cobb, who helped write both bills, said he is confident that Nickels' anti-drug bill will stand up to court challenges.

"We've made the language as clear as possible to meet any court requirements. The problem comes when language is vague, and that's not the case here," he said.

COBB EXPLAINED that police would have to consider several "circumstances" when deciding whether to make an arrest under the ordinance. These include whether the suspect is a convicted drug dealer or known member of a gang that deals drugs, whether he or she has been evicted from a rental unit for dealing drugs, or if the suspect is "behaving in a man-

## Eastiders to form community council

Some eastside residents, concerned that the Federal Way Community Council isn't looking out for their interests, are forming their own community council.

Federal Way council member Donna Grossruck announced at the council's Thursday meeting she is organizing a new Eastside Community Council.

The move seemed to be precipitated by some members' dissatisfaction with the absence of any properties east of Interstate 5 — outside of the city boundaries — in a proposed \$116 million open space bond.

A heated argument broke out when eastside resident Bill Seifert accused the Federal Way Community Council (FWCC) of not looking out for eastside residents because no eastside properties were included in Federal Way's \$5.3 million share of the space bond.

"There are 28,000 of us (on the eastside) that are going to pay our taxes for the parcels you recommended," Seifert said. "I don't think it's fair for the FWCC to ignore us. This community council does not represent all of the people in this area."

## Federal Way grows bonsai garden

The largest public collection of bonsai trees on the West Coast will open in Federal Way this October.

The collection is being established by the Weyerhaeuser Co. and will include more than 50 of the miniature trees and other plants. Some of the bonsai (pronounced bone-sie) are more than 400 years old.

Weyerhaeuser is building a meeting room, greenhouse,

office and gift shop as part of the bonsai collection. Most of the dwarfed potted trees will be displayed outdoors, but some tropical varieties will be displayed in the greenhouse.

The new complex and the collection of trees are costing Weyerhaeuser more than \$1 million, according to Stephanie Rowland, Weyerhaeuser spokeswoman.

The Pacific Rim Bonsai Collection is being done as a Washington Centennial pro-

ject by the company, Rowland said. It is also a recognition of Weyerhaeuser's international trade connections.

"It's a tribute to the trading relationships we've established with other countries," Rowland said.

MANY OF the trees were acquired from China and Japan, where bonsai is considered an art form. Bonsai, or "penjing" in Chinese, literally means "potted plant."

In Asia, it is considered to represent nature itself. The ancient plants are painstakingly trimmed, repotted, watered and pruned.

Many trees still go through the change of seasons, including sprouting buds in the spring and leaves in summer, and even turn color in the fall.

Editor: Well, I did it again! I made it home from the grocery store without being involved in a traffic accident.

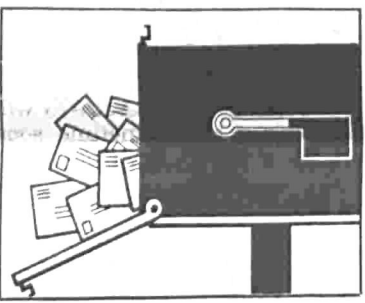

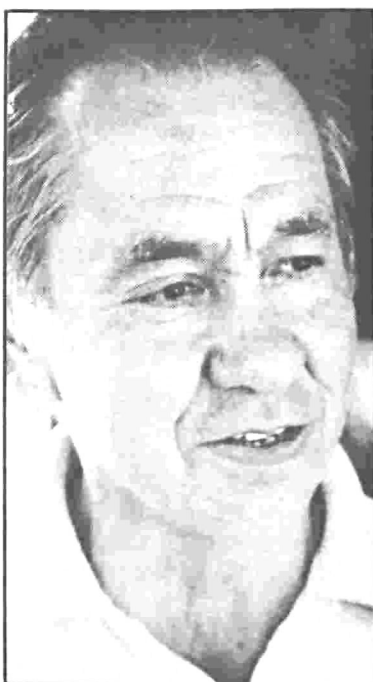

## Road projects grinding to a halt

As this series of reports on the work of the Federal Way First! Transition Team continues, I would like to tell you about the Transportation Committee. I am the chairman. Our main objective is to be informed about King County road work in this area and future county plans, and I would like to submit this report. There is no work being done by the county in Federal Way this year, and little encouraging news about future projects.

Although county officials have assured us that road construction money in the 1989 county budget (including funds for the widening of Southwest 312th and South and Southwest 356th), will be spent here, that has not yet been cast in concrete.

King County has a minor role in the work being done by the state at Dash Point Road south of 312th Street. They will relocate the entrance to Lakota Park. Some other projects we were expecting to see done this year are: the coordination of the lights on 320th from the freeway to 11th Avenue South, the widening to four lanes of First Avenue South, from 312th to 320th Street, and addition of left turn lights at 336th Street and 21st Avenue Southwest.

The signal coordination on 320th has been bogged down in a legal hassle over who would be liable in case of lawsuit, the state or the county. It was originally schedul-

ed for late 1988 and now will probably be started by the state early in 1990. Last Monday I spoke with a county road engineer and he told me that the First Avenue South project is on hold since we will be an incorporated city soon. The county has been collecting money from developers for the improvement at 336th and 21st Avenue Southwest for some time, but is waiting for the large site on the southeast corner (behind the shopping center) to be developed before they add the left turn lights.

Some projects farther down the line are the widening of 312th Street from First Avenue South, west to Dash Point Road, widening of 312th Street from 99 east to 26th Avenue South, widening of 356th Street west of 99 to 21st Avenue Southwest, relocation and widening of 356th east of 99 to 16th Avenue South, and widening of 16th Avenue South between 348th Street and 99. The

west 312th Street work is in the right-of-way appraisal stage and progressing slowly. It is not a hot project with the county so quite likely will be affected by incorporation. The badly needed east 312th Street work was not scheduled for several years so will have to be done by the new city. The west 356th Street project is also on hold because of the incorporation and the east 356th Street project only has a completed preliminary route study so will be the new city's problem also.

The projects that are receiving some design attention from the county are improvement mentioned above and an extension of South 344th to the east from 21st Avenue Southwest to join Campus Way. This was recommended for cancellation last year by the Federal Way Community Council, but the county is convinced it is important. In my opinion, if the county would improve

356th Street as planned and upgrade the signal at 21st Avenue Southwest and 336th, the new road probably would not be needed for several years if at all. That is my opinion. If you live in that area I would like to hear your ideas. Also, if you live in that area please drive carefully. The article in the June 30 Federal Way News described the dangers of 21st Avenue Southwest quite accurately.

That is about the extent of the transportation scene in Federal Way as I know it. Please help me keep up to date on these projects if you have more current information. Remember the Federal Way First! Transition Team meeting at the old fire station on the east end of 312th Street Monday July 10 at 7:30 pm.

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# Remedies sought for risky road

The public was outnumbered by county and school district officials at a road safety meeting held Wednesday at Mirror Lake Elementary School.

Nevertheless, officials agreed that Eighth Avenue South should be improved for the safety of Mirror Lake students who cross that road to get to school.

Present were King County Councilman Paul Barden, who called for the meeting, Rep. Jean Marie Brough (R-30th), Mark Madden of the county traffic and planning department, Assistant Superintendent Rich Hamlin and Transportation Director Rod Leland of the Federal Way School District, and three King County police officers.

The public was represented by Mirror Lake neighbors Becky Watling and Connie Britt, and Elaine Cook, candidate for the Federal Way City Council.

Watling and Britt told the officials that Eighth Avenue South offers a straight link bet-

between South 320th and South 312th streets, and so plays host to speeding drivers hoping to avoid traffic lights on Pacific Highway South.

Barden and Madden agreed that a pedestrian pathway alongside the road, more warning signs, brightly colored traffic cones and additional crossing guards might draw drivers' attention to children and crosswalks.

The group hopes to hold another meeting in late July or early August to ask more neighbors' opinions and report on any progress.

# Maleng praises drug fight

King County Prosecutor Norm Maleng says a nightmare he had three years ago is coming true.

The nightmare was about some King County neighborhoods ruled by crack (rock cocaine) dealers.

"Now horrible terms have entered our vocabularies," Maleng told the Federal Way Community Council Thursday. "Now we talk about rockhouses, crack babies, Crips and Bloods."

"In 1989, we will file more drug felony charges than the total number of criminal cases filed 10 years ago."

However, the county is making progress, Maleng said.

The county has more than tripled the number of deputy prosecutors assigned to drug felony cases in the last three years and a new Omnibus Drug Act passed by the state Legislature last session "makes sure drug dealers are hammered," Maleng said.

Maleng called Federal Way residents "crimefighters" and said there has been a revolution in community involvement in fighting drugs.

Citizens must have a change in attitude and should realize, "The most important thing you can do in the war on drugs is education," he said.

Maleng has been King County Prosecutor for 10 years.

ner that raises a reasonable suspicion" of drug activity.

In addition, other sections of the bill permit an arrest of a person "acting as a lookout for those engaged in drug activity," and those who "take flight in response to, contact from a police officer."

**COUNCILMAN Paul Barden** plans to introduce a similar anti-drug loitering bill on Monday, but his measure has not been reviewed by the prosecutor's office.

Barden's bill more closely resembles the Tacoma law, which is being challenged by the American Civil Liberties Union, in Pierce County Superior Court.

Jerry Sheehan, spokesman for the ACLU, said the challenge of the Tacoma ordinance is based on its "unconstitutionality due to vague and overbroad language."

Sheehan had no comment on Nickels' or Barden's bills.

Barden was not available for comment on his measure.

**NICKELS SAID** his anti-drug bill could solve a serious problem, one that often prevents police from making drug arrests.

According to police, drug dealers and buyers often conduct their business near garbage dumpsters. When they spot police officers, they simply dump the drugs and run.

Under Nickels' ordinance, police could make an arrest even if the suspect was not in possession of the drugs.

"This bill is not a cure-all for the drug problem," said Nickels. "I know it is only a band-aid, but the problem is severe enough that we need to do something now."

**NICKELS' OTHER** bill, the anti-prostitution loitering ordinance, is modeled after a similar city of Seattle law, which Deputy Prosecutor Cobb said has stood up to court challenges.

Like the anti-drug bill, this measure would make it illegal to "remain in (an area) with the intent of committing, inducing, enticing, soliciting, or procuring

another to commit, an act of prostitution."

It spells out circumstances that would allow an arrest, including "circling an area in a motor vehicle and repeatedly beckoning to, or attempting to stop pedestrians."

Cobb said that "cruisers" who are looking for prostitutes, or the prostitutes themselves who "cruise with their pimps" are a major problem in areas such as Pacific Highway South, near the Sea-Tac Airport.

Cobb said both ordinances are based on requests from King County police.

Nickels does not expect the council to approve the proposals until the end of the summer.

# Eastiders left out of parks bond

Seifert later walked out of the meeting.

**NEWLY** elected council president Ron Belknap responded that the council had been floundering the last several months because of a lack of leadership, but now the council will get back on track and make sure residents on both sides of the freeway are represented.

"Maybe it hasn't (represented everyone)," Belknap said. "But it will."

Belknap also lives on the eastside.

Belknap pointed out that the Federal Way representatives on a countywide citizens advisory committee on open space that decided which parcels should be in the bond were not representing the FWCC.

Those representatives, Dick Burris and Dave Kaplan, submitted the list of parcels to the open space committee after a public forum on open space in Federal Way on June 1. The list of parcels was prioritized by about 30 residents and council members who attended the forum.

Two eastside parcels, 37 acres on North Lake and 50 acres called Lutherland near Lake

Killarney, were included on a list of 10 possible parcels but were ranked fifth and eighth.

Most of the parcels chosen by the countywide advisory committee closely mirrored the prioritized list, but one parcel that was chosen was ranked lower than the eastside North Lake property.

That happened because the countywide advisory committee considered parcels in the unincorporated county separately from the parcels within various suburban cities, said Kaplan.

**THE PARCELS** on the eastside were beaten out by 38 parcels in the unincorporated county that were chosen. Another 10 parcels countywide also were left out, Kaplan said.

"I tried to get more," Kaplan said.

Nonetheless, the Federal Way area came out well in the bond, he said. Despite the appearance that the new community council is being formed because of the open-space disagreement, Grossruck said she's been organizing the new council for weeks.

Grossruck, who owns a real estate business with her husband, said there are 17 potential members of the eastside council. The group hasn't met yet, but will soon.

Grossruck informed King County Councilman Paul Barden of her plans for the new council late last month. Barden is in support of the new council, according to a Barden aide. Councilmember Greg Nickels, who represents most of the eastside, also will support the council, according to an aide.

It's anticipated that residents living south of South 272nd Street and north of the Pierce County Line, and east of I-5 and west of Auburn, will be invited to attend, Grossruck said.

Grossruck said she has no hard feelings towards the council.

"My purpose is not to do anything against the FWCC," she said. "It's not a breakaway or a splinter group, it's just another voice."

Grossruck knows of no other members on the Federal Way council who will join the eastside group.

Community councils have no decision-making authority. However, they typically advise the King County Council on many community issues and sometimes influence county council decisions.

Even though Federal Way will become a city sometime soon

after the new city council is elected in the Sept. 19 election, the FWCC will continue to exist.

Currently, FWCC members are elected and appointed. Grossruck said she doesn't anticipate eastside council members will be elected. The new council would be an open forum for anyone to participate in.

Federal Way's approaching incorporation has created a variety of community activist groups. The Federal Way First! Transition Team is currently studying cityhood issues and working with city council candidates. The FWCC plans to sponsor at least two city council candidate forums.

Another group was recently formed to study the annexation of the eastside into Federal Way. That group is REACT (Residents East of I-5 Annexation Consideration Team), and is led by Bill Seifert. If the new Eastside Community Council gets off the ground, many Federal Way residents may be reaching for a scorecard to keep the players straight.

# State slaps on new garbage tax

A new 1 percent tax on all residential and commercial garbage collection and handling charges will be imposed July 1 to finance statewide recycling and solid waste management programs.

The tax was authorized by the Solid Waste Reform Act passed by the Legislature during the 1989 session. It will be added to the existing 3.6 percent solid waste collection tax.

The 1 percent tax is projected to generate \$15 million over a five-year period. The money will be used to pay for programs that promote recycling and ensure

that solid waste is disposed of safely.

Like the present tax, the new levy will apply to all residential and commercial garbage collection by public utilities and private companies, landfill disposal charges and solid-waste hauling fees.

The tax will be levied on the first \$8 of a monthly charge for residential pick-up service of less than two cans and the first \$12-a-month charge for two or more cans.

For landfill disposal fees and hauling charges, the tax will be

levied on the full amount of charges.

The tax will not be levied on any basic garbage utility charges for residents who do not use home collection services on a regular basis. Also not subject to the tax will be specific recycling charges imposed by some refuse collectors.

Not all of those at Pattison's are skating. A number of rink patrons, mostly junior high and high school students, are content to sit out the evening on the sidelines in snack bar booths. They shout to be heard above the top-40 music, watch other skaters and flirt outrageously.

Young, 16, and his girlfriend, Caffaro, 14, sit on the sidewalk in front of the rink, arms around each other. They're waiting for a ride home after a skating session and the night has begun to turn chill for the two, whose shorts and sweaters had been ample protection for the indoor rink and earlier sunshine.

Young recently moved to Federal Way and attended Seattle's Chief Sealth High. Caffaro, who also lives here, attends Christian Faith School in Des Moines.

They skate about twice a month when they aren't going to school dances or movies. Sometimes they just stay home with friends and rent movies to watch on the VCR.

"WE LIKE to go to movies, but for two people, once you buy popcorn and pop, it can cost \$20. It costs only \$3.50 to go skating," Caffaro said.

Back up the highway at Sportsworld, Tyee High School students Wernex, 16, Davis, 17, and Ellis, 17, are bowling and keeping an eye on other bowlers. The crowd here is a representative mix of young and old. But it's the younger bowlers, as well as strikes and spares, that interest these three.

They usually socialize in groups or with girlfriends, but on this night it's girls only. The bowling alley is a good place to spot friends and check out the guys, Davis said.

It's also a place their parents feel safe sending them — sort of.

"Our parents like this because we're in one place and they know where we are. But Trish's mom told her before we left, 'Take you health card.' Nobody trusts Kim's driving," Wernex said.

said.

Back at Burger King, Rutledge, 16, a Federal Way High student, is leaning against a garbage can outside, her fingers laced through those of her boyfriend, Chris Macoy, 17, of Puyallup High. They are the center of a circle of regulars who sport the latest in bike shorts, surfing wear and Nordstrom's preppy best.

"BASICALLY, it's just a meeting place. We hang out here for a while, then go other places. We try to find parties, but if we can't, we come back here to find out where they are," Rutledge said.

Jason Glen, Rich Warden and Mike Miles are here, too. All are 18 and recent Federal Way High grads. They don't like to waste their gas cruising the mall, so they hang out at Burger King and wait to hear what's happening. They'd like to go to a dance club, but Seattle and even the Omni in Kent are too far away. They like to stick closer to home.

Another meeting spot is Denny's. Some go there when they tire of Burger King, or BK, as it's known to regulars. Some drift over after Burger King closes, or after the parties, for coffee or an early breakfast.

Aaron Brooks, 17, attended Federal Way High. He and several buddies, proclaiming loyalties to their favorite heavy metal groups on their T-shirts, have been sitting on the ground outside of Denny's. They had been inside, but were asked to leave after an hour — house rules.

On this night, there is no place else to go.

But they are entertained for a while by the music pulsating from a nearby Mazda RX-7, its hatchback open to allow the group to hear better.

FRANKLIN WILSON is there to listen to the music and talk to friends because it's convenient. He and his buddies spend their free time hanging out because they aren't mobile and there's no place they can cheaply spend an entire evening.

It's barely into Saturday morning and the crowds have begun to thin. Some teens have headed home or to a party they heard about earlier.

Behind Burger King a chopped VW Bug stops in the middle of the road. It's platinum blonde driver lurches her car ahead inches at a time, trying to attract the attention of the driver of the car behind her.

It works, and he follows her out of the parking lot.

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# Cruising ban would shrink options

A proposed countywide ban on cruising could have a significant impact on the social life of many a Federal Way youngster.

The ordinance, proposed by King County Executive Tim Hill at the behest of local law enforcement, will be reviewed tomorrow by the King County Council Public Safety and Legal Services Committee.

The King County Sheriff's Department asked the executive for the ban after spending months of weekends on special emphasis patrols at SeaTac Mall and SeaTac Village near Burger King to break up the cruising pattern. Some Friday nights as many as 250-plus cars traversed 20th Avenue South between Burger King and the mall and drove around inside the mall parking lot.

Merchants said mall patrons complained about the noise and drinking, and merchants complained about the congestion, and vandalism.

THE PATROLS abated the problem somewhat, but Maj. Ollie Moore, Precinct 5 commander, said an ordinance banning cruising would be the most

effective tool to keep the problem from resurfacing.

But most cruisers don't see their pastime as a problem. They say there is little else to do in Federal Way.

Moore has suggested that Metro open up a park-and-ride lot for cruising, but Metro officials say they have yet to be officially approached on the idea.

An alternative does not appear imminent, but at least teenagers' laments of nothing to do aren't falling on deaf ears.

When Gloria Sehlin was a high school senior at Federal Way High in 1969, it was the only high school in town, Auburn High was the big rival and there were dances nearly every Friday and Saturday night, either in Federal Way or Auburn.

If the local roller rink (at Santafair) wasn't hosting such acts as the Wailers and Merrilee and the Turnaboks, the jukeboxes at nearby lakeside resorts were getting a workout.

"AND IT WAS cheap. I can't remember exactly what it cost then, but if it was more than two bucks I'd be surprised," Sehlin said.

She's a mother of four now,

ages 7 to 19, and sympathizes with Federal Way youth who say they find little to do in the way of entertainment locally.

Aside from dancing, Sehlin and her friends cruised. The Grotto, where Shogun and Jack-in-the-Box now sit, was a popular spot, as was the A & W, where Rax now does business.

"We'd drive back and forth between the two places, seeing whose cars we recognized," she remembered. "You could chew away three or four hours hopping from car-to-car."

Sehlin's children are active in sports. If they weren't, she said she worries that they might not spend their time as wisely as they do.

She knows they go to parties, just like she did when she was a teen, but she trusts them to make wise decisions, just like she did.

THE TEENS who hang out at Burger King looking for parties most frequently end up at private homes, but any port in a storm of boredom usually will do, said Precinct 5 patrol Sgt. Gene Kahn.

His officers have broken up teen drinking parties in homes,

public parks and even cul de sacs in unfinished housing developments. Maintenance roads underneath the Bonneville power lines in West Campus used to be popular, but rapid development there has diminished the party spots, Kahn said.

When she was younger, a rural area near what is now Enchanted Parks was popular for parties, Sehlin said. At the Goose Farm teens would play music, dance, play piggy-back jousting games, and, in some instances, drink. Interests and entertainments haven't changed much, Sehlin said, but the opportunities have.

"There is nothing else to do, and the same people are going to get tired of hosting 25-30 kids every weekend," she said.

And as long as kids, and even some parents, continue to host illegal parties, the police will be bound to continue to break them up and confiscate their beer, Kahn said.

"Sometimes we intercept fliers advertising a party in someone's home when mamma and daddy are away. We'll take it to the house and show it to them and say, 'Have you seen this?' That usually nips it in the bud."

# Summer heat hard on elderly

Extremely hot weather can be life threatening to older people, particularly those with health conditions such as hypertension, diabetes and heart disease.

Heat stroke, heat exhaustion and heat cramps are the three major types of heat-related illnesses.

Heat stroke is the most dangerous. With heat stroke, the victim's sweat glands fail to function. This results in an excessively high body temperature or hypothermia.

Heat exhaustion is the most common form of heat-related illness. Some of the symptoms include rapid pulse, profuse perspiration, thirst, clammy or sweaty skin, dizziness and nausea.

Heat cramps, although the least serious of the heat-related illnesses, may lead to more critical problems if not treated. Symptoms include sweaty skin, weakness and nausea, occasional tingling in the arms or legs, or muscle cramps usually beginning in the abdomen and legs.

The American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) emphasizes prevention as the key to reducing the heavy toll on lives that another serious heat wave could bring.

Acclimate your body to the

heat by gradually increasing your exposure. Limit physical activity during the hottest part of the day. If you must go outside, stay in the shade, wear a wide-brimmed hat or use an umbrella. Wear lightweight, light colored, loose-fitting clothing.

Park your car in the shade, and before entering the car roll down the windows and open the doors to allow the heat to escape.

Drink plenty of liquids whether you feel thirsty or not. Avoid alcoholic beverages, coffee, tea and other drinks that contain caffeine.

Keep rooms cool during hot spells by setting air conditioners

to between 78 and 80 degrees and drawing curtains over sunny windows. For people without air conditioning, place room-size electric fans in front of windows to pull hot air outside.

Older people who are unable to correct overheated living conditions are advised by the AARP to go to air-conditioned senior centers, libraries, movie theaters or shopping malls during the hottest part of the day.

Assistance is also available through the Area Agency on Aging, local American Red Cross chapters, community offices of social services and local public health offices.

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# Carpenters return Schools suffer little in strike, so far

Good weather and lucky timing may mean the Federal Way School District's summer construction projects will continue with nary a hitch, despite a week-long strike by union carpenters.

Although carpenters struck six school construction sites and picketed at a few of them, Jeff Greene, owner's representative for school modernization projects, said little effect should be seen in the projects' schedules.

When the strike occurred, carpenters' duties were either nearly done or not yet begun on modernization construction at Nautilus, Twin Lakes, Lake Grove and Brigadoon elementary schools and Federal Way High School. Heavy carpentry at Thomas Jefferson High School was stopped for one day, said Greene, and construction at Sacajawea was not affected at all.

Carpenters went back to work Friday morning when they and Associated General Contractors, which represents most of the region's general contractors, produced a tentative contract. Carpenters will vote on the three-year contract next week, and votes will be tallied Saturday.

Carpenters were asking for \$3.45 an hour more in wages and benefits for those three years. The tentative contract allows \$2.51 more in wages and benefits.

Carpenters will be on the job at least until the proposed contract is accepted or rejected. The school district is in a wait-and-see position, said Greene, but the outlook for getting students back in school on time is brighter.

"I guess we timed it right, especially since that hot weather (in spring) meant we could put roofs on some schools before this even started," he added.

The strike had potentially the most effect on Thomas Jefferson High School, now in the midst of heavy construction.

The single day of carpentry lost to the strike may be made up through the summer.

Work at Nautilus is nearly done, so the delay had little effect there, Greene said. Some carpentry work is behind schedule at Lake Grove, one of the district's smaller projects. Twin Lakes' paint job is lagging because painters there honored

picket signs last week, but Greene said work at that school was already ahead of schedule.

Work at Federal Way High School and Brigadoon is newly underway and does not yet need much carpentry, Greene said. Sacajawea's general contractor was not associated with the Associated General Contractors, and so was not struck.

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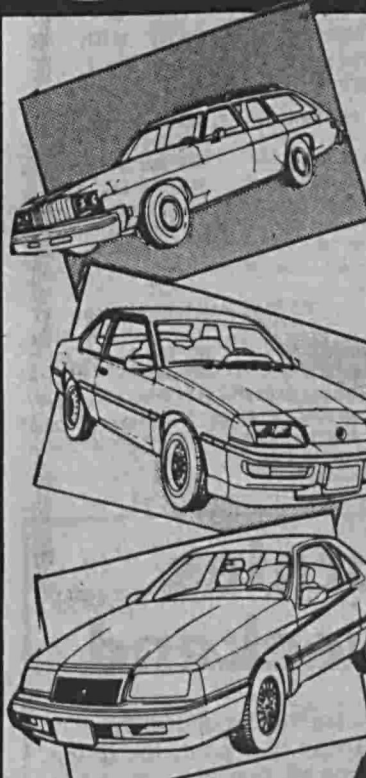
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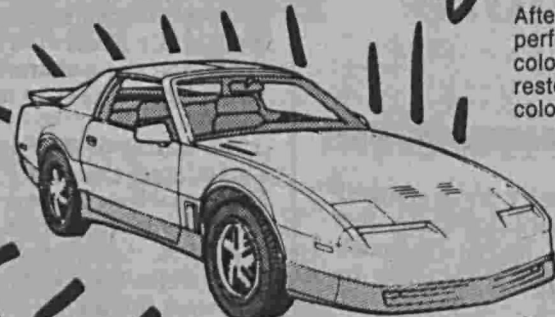

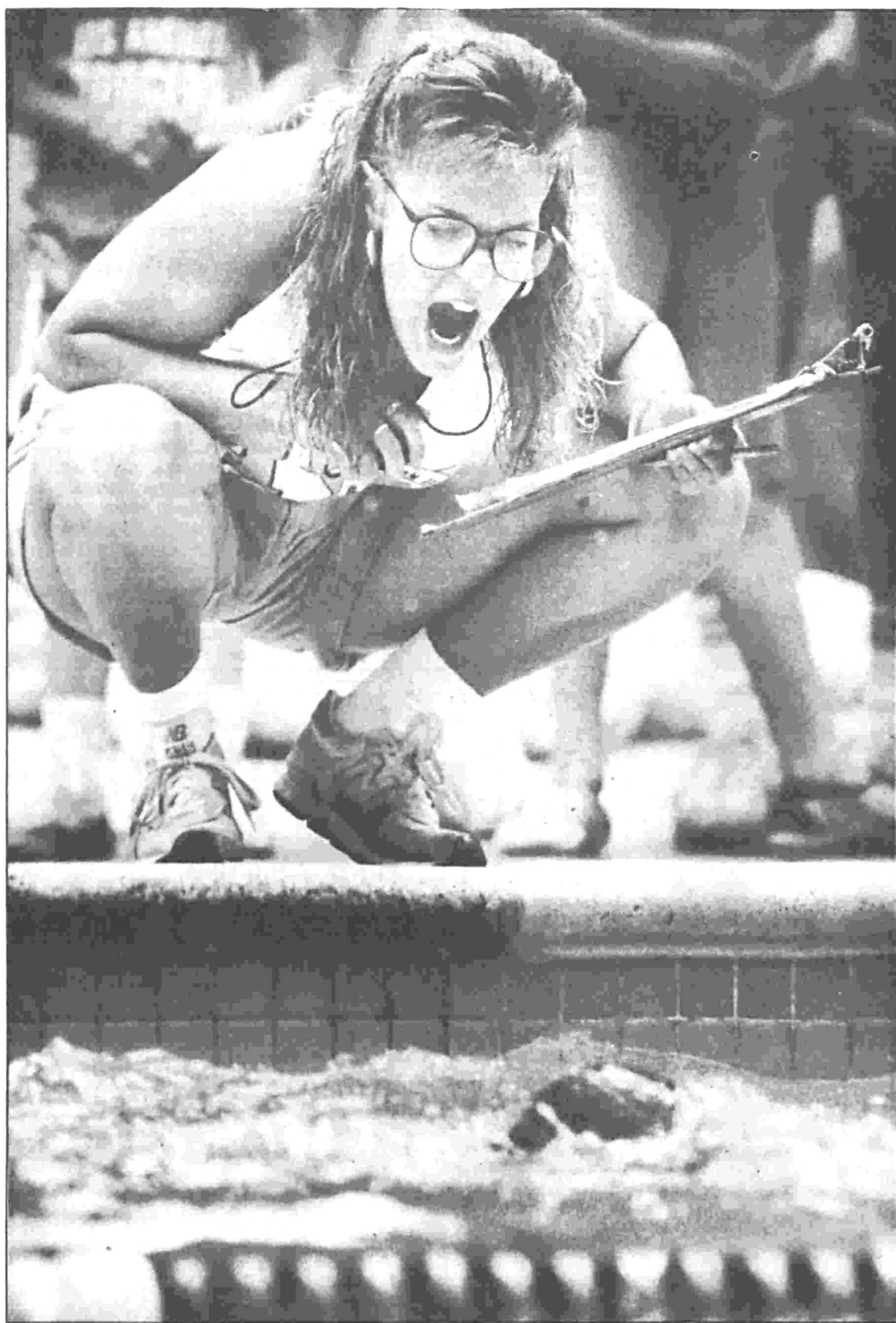

"VALLIANT dropped three seconds in the backstroke against Marine Hills," says coach Dick Bacon.

Eleven-year-old Carl Maloney grabbed three firsts for Twin Lakes in the boys' 12-and-under competition. His wins came in the 12-and-under 200 medley relay with John McDougall, Todd Thurnall and Greg Spear (2:29.21), the 100 individual medley (1:22.44) and the 50-yard butterfly (33.24).

Sixteen-year-old Vince Riggio was amazingly strong for the Twin Lakes seniors with two firsts in a tough age group of 18-and-unders. Riggio powered for a first in the 18-and-under 100 freestyle (54.88) and the 50-yard backstroke (29.94).

The Marine Hills wagon wasn't empty, either. They loaded up with senior girls to win all

the 17-and-under events.

Dana Butts took three firsts in a strong Marine Hills effort. Butts won the 50-yard freestyle (26.16), the 100-yard individual medley (1:05.63) and the 50-yard backstroke (32.96).

# Some candidate finance records incomplete

Position 7 candidate Phil Watkins continues to lead in the amount of money raised in Federal Way City Council campaigns.

According to the latest monthly reports, filed with the state's Public Disclosure Commission (PDC), Watkins raised \$7,461 in cash and in-kind contributions, such as yard signs, through June 10.

He spent \$7,331, according to the reports, which are required of all candidates by the PDC.

Watkins' competitor in the Position 7 race, Lynn Templeton, had raised \$1,565 through May 1. However, the PDC has no record of Templeton's most recent required filing.

The commission also has no record of the most recent required filings by Position 2 candidate Joel Marks and Position 5 candidates Jim Handmacher and Bob Wood.

Marks could not be reached for comment, but Templeton

and Handmacher said the forms were sent to the PDC and it may be a clerical error by the PDC. Wood said he wasn't sure what happened to the forms, but would check into whether his campaign manager sent them.

The 14 candidates who survived the May 16 final election are required to file financial disclosure forms with the PDC monthly through the Sept. 19 final election. Seven candidates will be elected to be city council members in the final election.

**IN THE OTHER** races, Position 1 candidate Mary Gates raised \$3,855 and spent \$2,782. Bill Shortt raised \$2,081 and spent \$1,665.

In Position 2, Mark Freitas raised \$2,767 and spent \$2,755.

In Position 3, Debra Ertel raised \$1,405 and spent \$1,037. Georgene Asbury raised \$670 and spent \$661.

In Position 4, Jim Webster raised \$3,667 and spent \$3,015. Elaine Cook raised \$1,471 and spent \$1,304.

In Position 6, Bob Stead raised \$5,309 and spent \$3,850. John Ridley raised \$4,176 and spent \$3,456.

The other 23 candidates who were defeated in the primary are required to file final disclosure reports by June 6.

According to the PDC, Rick Allen raised \$3,318 and spent \$3,108. Homer Anders didn't file. Merva Cheha didn't file. Lew Drohman didn't file. Richard Feutz raised \$1,333 and spent \$1,341. Al Frank didn't file. Dave

Froyalde raised \$1,386 and spent \$1,779, which he will cover with a personal loan. Charles "Ben" Gittings didn't raise any funds but spent \$144 of his own money.

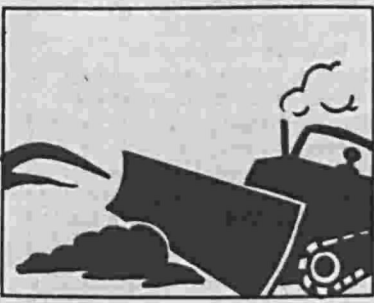

If required disclosure forms are not filed, candidates are notified in writing that the forms must be filed. If the forms still are not filed, the PDC is empowered by state law to fine candidates up to \$1,000 for their first violation and \$2,500 for multiple violations.
