to new high school

A land swap with a Bellevue development firm has allowed the Federal Way School District to amass enough land to open a high school where Illahee Junior High now stands.

Although no plans for such a high school have yet been drawn up, a citizens' committee recently recommended the school district strongly consider the possibility.

The Federal Way School Board last week agreed to the deal with RNJ Homes Inc.. trading the school district's undeveloped Site 9 for a plot of land adjacent to Illahee.

The district's new 10-acre site is located east of Illahee. alongside another undeveloped plot of land owned by the district.

Together, the existing Illahee campus and both undeveloped sites add up to 40 acres, 20 of them so far unused. Forty acres is the recommended size of a standard-size high school.

A citizens' committee reported that the Federal Way School District eventually will need five full-size highschoolsin the future, when the presently booming population of elementary students grows older. Besides the three now standing, the committee reported, the school district could build a high school at Site 84, near Five Mile Lake, and could turn Illahee into

Federal Way tops county in new people, homes

Federal Way grew at more than double the rate of the rest of King County last year.

According to the county's Annual Growth Report, King County posted a population increase of 2.3 percent, to 1.446 million.

But the Federal Way Community Plan Area increased its numbers by almost 5 percent, reaching a population of 87,600. "That growth rate is expected

to continue, although not quite as fast as in recent years," said Chandler Felt with the county's Division of Planning and Community Development, which prepared the report.

Housing in the county also grew, and again Federal Way took top honors.

MORE HOMES were built in Federal Way during 1988 than in any other community planning area in unincorporated King Couty.

The majority of those Federal Way homes - as in the rest of the county - were multifamily units, built during the last two years.

During 1987 and 1988, permits were issued for 3,394 multifamily units in Federal Way. That represents a big jump from the 278 permits issued in 1986.

While developers and county officials believe the housing boom in Federal Way is nearly over, the report's authors say that south King County will continue to grow over the next three decades.

THE REPORT predicts that there will be 100,000 new jobs and 300,000 more people in south King County by the year 2020.

The Federal Way Community Planning Area, which includes small portions of Milton, Auburn, and Kent, is expected to grow by 32 percent in the next decade.

By the year 2020, 154,800 people will call the area their home. Another set of statistics, from the Puget Sound Council of Governments, has the new city of Federal Way growing at an even faster rate, reaching a population of 166,156 by the year 2020.

THE POPULATION growth in

south King County will be mat-

ched by an increase in employ-

ment, according to the report.

By the year 2020, the area is ex-

pected to provide 136,422 jobs.

Lois Schwennesen, manager of the Planning and Community Development Division, said the county's challenge now is to "link growth (in areas such as Federal Way) to quality of life.

"These are often perceived as two separate issues, but they shouldn't be. If we are going to accommodate so much growth, let's also protect open spaces,

Speed was a factor in traffic death

Skid marks and the degree of impact are leading King County accident detectives to lean toward excessive speed as a contributing factor in a July 12 fatal traffic accident.

Hersal Ray, 82, of Everett, was killed instantly when the car he was driving was hit broadside by an ambulance as he entered SW 320th Street from Seventh Avenue Southwest. A passenger, O'Dene Reis, 66, of Federal Way, was

treated at Harborview Medical Center for a broken leg.

Although a spokesman for Shepard Ambulance at first denied the ambulance was responding to an earlier accident on the same street, the company later said its driver was headed to the carmotorcycle accident just six blocks away at 13th Avenue Southwest.

The Shepard Ambulance had not been dispatched by the company to the accident, said Brant Butte, but was in the area and its driver, Michael Bales, decided to respond anyway.King County Ambulance, another private ambulance company, had been dispatched, said Det. Steve Brown.

WITNESSES SAID the Shepard ambulance had its emergency lights on at the time of the accident, which is illegal, if not on an officially dispatched emergency call, Brown said.

Police can tell by the filaments in the emergency


lights if they were on, and they plan to tear the ambulance's lights apart to have a look. Brown said.

The ambulance was traveling westbound in the second lane of the five-lane road before Ray pulled into the intersection. The ambulance swerved into the center turn-lane after the brakes were applied, and that's where the two vehicles collided, Brown said. Detectives measured 98

Entrepreneurs deliver in style

How does a good idea start? For Dan Hart and Jeff Yost, life-long Federal Way residents, it started with lunch.

Yost, a 22-year-old Decatur High School graduate, was visiting his brother in Florida last winter when he got hungry. His brother showed him an assortment of menus sitting by the phone.

The menus didn't come from the usual array of pizza joints. They were from classy restaurants — Italian, Chinese, French and the like. For a small fee, Yost could get the food delivered to his door by a tuxedo-clad driver, and dine in style.

Yost liked the idea so much, he thought it would go over in his home town. "(There was) nothing like this in Federal Way," he said. "I thought, 'Why not give it a try?"

So he called up his friend Dan Hart. Hart, 20, met Yost when the two attended classes together at Green River Community College. "We sat there and didn't pay attention," said Hart. "We were just trying to figure out how to get rich." Yost told Hart about the service in Florida, and suggested they try it here. Hart agreed. They each sunk \$3,000 into the venture, buying equipment to carry food, two-way radios, a business license and of course, tuxedos. The first restaurant they approached was Verrazano's Italian American Restaurant in Federal Way. "We walked right in the door and said 'We've got a new concept for you,' " said Hart. The manager was leery, but eventually agreed to a threemonth contract with the duo. Later, they added Burger Express to their list, signing a similar contract.

Tuxedo-clad lads will bring pasta primavera to your party THEY CALL their service Class Express, and they operate it out of their and they operate

it out of their apartment near Group Health. Their boundaries coincide roughly with those of Federal Way, but on a slow day, they'll go farther. They hope to expand the service to other restaurants in the area, one for each style of food.

Hart said most restaurants can handle more business, even when they're full and have a line going around the block. "We're basically offering the restaurants 'ghost tables,' " he said.

Kathy Fischer, who works at Verrazano's, said the contract with Class Express "works out fine, it's great. We do get a lot of orders out of it, and they're very professional."

Hart said the appearance of

"People by nature want to relax and enjoy quality time with each other," said Yost. "If they want to come home from work and sit on the couch, I'll bring them a meal."

CLASS EXPRESS already has a few interesting anecdotes. Yost said one woman called them up and wanted nothing more than a hot dog. He tried to discourage her. It was going to cost \$8. "She wanted it, anyway," he said.


Any new business will have glitches as it starts out, and Class Express is no exception. Wednesday, Yost took an order for Teriyaki chicken from Burger Express. He sent Hart out to deliver it. It was a preorder. The customer requested that her meal arrive by eight o'clock, when company the way. "I can't believe that happened," said Yost.

"My car just went 'woosh,' " said Hart. "I got on the radio. 'Hey Jeff! Back-up!' "

Yost sent out another driver to pick up Hart, and they arrived at Chris Skilton's house in Northeast Tacoma at 8 :20. Skilton didn't mind. As it turned out, the company was about to arrive, and the food was still hot.

Skilton likes the service. "It works out good for me. When you're pregnant and it's hot, it's easy. I would recommend it, especially to people who only have 30 minutes for lunch."

Class Express guarantees delivery within 30 to 40 minutes of your order. They will deliver to office lunches and parties as well as to individuals. Preorders for a specific time are also available. Currently, their patrons are Verrazano's and Burger Express, but more selections are expected. Prices reflect the restaurants' menus, with an added \$3.50 delivery fee. For more information, call 874-9199.



the tuxedo makes a difference. "The people we've brought (food) to, they're just thrilled. In Federal Way, the typical (delivery) guy comes to the door in a baseball cap and a T-shirt."

"You don't even want to let him in the house," added Yost. "If we get out there and make a good impression and do it right, there's no reason we can't succeed."

Though they've only been in business for a week and a half, Class Express averages 10-12 orders a day. "It's hard for me to believe how fast it's taken off," Yost said.

"It's already paying for rent," said Hart. "People are really happy with it. (They) can't believe it's in Federal Way."

Hart said the service caters to older people who don't like to go out, or two-income families.







"BATMAN'

Devotees of the Dark Knight will have minor quibbles with Tim Burton's vision of the Caped Crusader, but not many. Though he's too gadget oriented and not much of an athlete, this Batman is the grim creature of the night envisioned by his creator, Bob Kane. The effects are tremendous, and rescue a mediocre plot, highlighted by a forced and unnecessary love story. Michael Keaton brings an in-



teresting quirkiness to Batman's character. There may be too much of Jack Nicholson's Joker, but so what? He's brilliant. Rated PG-13. Playing at SeaTac North and South

"DEAD POET'S SOCIETY"

Imagine, if you can, Robin Williams underplaying a role and you have a thoughtful poignant portrayal in a thoughtful, poignant film. Ten to Guatemala Group takes a vacation with purpose

The closest Virginia Aller has ever gotton to the Mayan ruins in Guatemala is in an airplane flying overhead.

Though the ruins are only 55 miles from Barillas, a village where she and her husband, Dr. Leeon Aller, help to run a small hospital, the road there takes about 12 hours to travel. So whenever visitors set out on the voyage, Mrs. Aller stays behind.

"I'm always on KP duty," she complained with a laugh Monday night. The occasion was a reunion of Marine View Presbyterian Church members who recently visited the Allers in Barillas.

Ten Marine View members took the "vacation with a purpose" the latter half of June, inspired after hearing Dr. Aller speak at the church about his medical mission last fall. Aller, a retired physician, and his wife, a retired teacher, travel to Barillas four times a year for up to two months a visit.

The Marine View group spent a week with the Allers, working in the hospital and learning about the local culture. They spent another week visiting the Guatemalan Evangelical Mission for street kids in the village of Parrmous.

DESPITE THE Christian overtones of the voyage, the purpose of the visit was educational, not evangelical, said Bonnie Barthel.

The group left for Guatemala June 17, after months of planning and a series of Spanish lessons, taught by Cecelia Humphres, a Marine View member from Equador. Humphres served as translator for the nine other travelers.

Feds bomb Kent Security

One step closer to playoffs

The Federal Way Omni American Legion baseball team took one giant leap toward clinching a post-season berth Tuesday, blowing away District 11-leading Kent Security, 9-4.

The win put the Feds (11-4 in league play) in a position where they would have to lose two of their last three games and Kirkland (8-6) or Burien (7-6) would have to win all of theirs to even create a tie for the final berth.

It also allowed Omni to gain on Security (10-2) and stick with second-place Kent Post 15 (11-3), as well as stay ahead of fourth-place Bellevue Honda (7-4).

Next week's Division II tournament will include host Kent Post 15 and the top three other finishers.

Federal Way hosted Post 15 Wednesday (after press time) and visited Bothell last night, with the only league action left being the as-yet unscheduled completion of a game with Bellevue Honda suspended with the score tied, 4-4, after nine innings of play.

The Feds will play their own alumni at 4 p.m. Monday at Cheney Stadium as part of Federal Way Community Night for the Tacoma Tigers, with the Division II tournament running July 28-30 at Kent Memorial Park.

"We're playing about as well right now as could be expected of us," said Federal Way head coach Tom Wagner, whose team was coming off a secondplace finish at the 12-team Vern Bean Classic in Bellevue before Tuesday's game. "The defense is a lot better as well as our hitting."

Tuesday's win gave Omni a 22-10-1 record overall, and victories in five of its last six outings. FEDERAL WAY outhit

Vacationers enjoy nature's beauty at Domke Lake

One of the least advertised vacation spots in North Central Washington is a small clearwater lake nestled in the Cascades not far from the better-known Stehekin resort area.

Domke Lake is a sparkling reminder of what it's like to live far away from civilization - so far that there are only two ways to get there: by air or by boat and then hike.

For years, we have been attracted to the lake for its beauty and isolation, not to mention the generally excellent fishing. In recent years, we've visited Domke for three- and four-day stays, holing up in one of only two cabins on the entire lake.

The cabins were once owned and operated by Gordon Stuart, a former trapper and woodsman who came to Domke in 1924 and lived out a Harry Truman-like solitary existence until his death four years ago. Gordon willed the property to Sidney Burns, who has continued to shun publicity and promotion much the same as Stuart did. Consequently, few people know about Domke and its special charms.

If you visit Domke, you begin to understand why a man could forsake civilization for a seemingly idyllic life at the edge of these calm, fresh waters.



Exploring the Northwest by Cary Ordway

Our most recent visit was by seaplane, operated by Chelan Airways, Chelan. Our pilot, Ernie Gibson, has himself created a legend with decades of experience flying up and down Lake Chelan. By his own estimation, Gibson has flown at least 25,000 trips along this 55-milelong lake.

While two of us took that enjoyable 45-minute plane ride, four friends chose the other mode of transportation to Domke - a two-and-a-half hour boat trip on the "Lady of the Lake II," followed by another 90 minutes of hiking a reasonably steep trail from Lucerne to Domke. They boarded the boat at Field's Point Landing to save time; the trip from Chelan takes nearly four hours.

Naturally, we arrived ahead of the hikers and had time to load our provisions into one of two aluminum fishing boats we had rented with our cabin. The only way to get to our cabin was to cross the lake by boat thankfully a three horsepower motor-driven boat.

Our cabin, the larger of the two, was big enough for eight people and came outfitted with cooking utensils, pots, pans, silverware and even sheets on the beds. But the cabin is quite rustic - some would say primitive - so vacationers are advised not to expect too many amenities.

That was fine with us. Our purpose for visiting Domke was to get away from the work-a-day world, and a primitive cabin in the woods sometimes offers a nice alternative to the most pampered resort stay.

Our hiker friends arrived in a couple of hours, mildy tired from their uphill climb. The two couples had brought in heavy packs laden with food and other supplies, but none of the four reported any serious problem with the hike. And all had enjoyed the excursion on the

"Lady of the Lake II."

Settling into our cabin for a three-day weekend, we used our time to read, hike, cook (on an ancient wood stove), eat and, most of all, to fish. Both trolling and still fishing proved suc-cessful in yielding feisty 14- to 15-inch rainbow trout. This is the best kind of fishing, in my estimation, for even if you're not successful, this beautiful treelined lake is just the right place for drifting with your thoughts.

In summer, the lake warms to a temperature just right for swimming. There are numerous little beaches and coves to visit in your boat. And, best of all, you have this lake generally to yourselves, the only intrusion being a few backpackers that sometimes camp in one of the lakes small camping grounds.

In all, Domke is an ideal getaway in spring, summer or fall - the hottest season being the best because the cabins are not well insulated. But there are a few points Domke visitors should be aware before they go.

First, the accommodations are rustic and not pretentious. The smaller cabin rents for \$30 each night for two. The larger cabin rents for \$60 per night for 4 with each additional person costing \$5. Bedding, towels, and cooking utensils are provided.

Second, the boats and motors are relatively expensive - \$10 per day for a rowboat and \$25 per day for a motorboat. We arrived about Friday noon, departed Sunday noon and paid more than \$100 just for two boats.

And, it's important to note that this is a self-service resort. Guests are asked to clean the cabins thoroughly, cut and stack wood to replace what they have used and carry out their trash. In the old days, Gordon would make note in his reservation book to remind him whether you left things in good order; if you didn't, Gordon didn't really want you to come back.

Last - but not least for people who don't like rodents - there were mice in our cabin. When the lights go out, the little creatures foray into the kitchen and other locales in search of food, and they don't dine very quietly.

Of course that also gave us

Babysitting ad leads to scary calls

Two Federal Way teen-agers and their mother have learned a scary lesson about what kind of information they give to strangers.

What began as an advertisement for babysitting services has turned into a nightmare for the family. The mother, who wished not to be identified by name, placed an ad in the Federal Way News for her 13year-old daughter, who was looking for babysitting jobs.

What she got was obscene and frightening threats made by a male caller to her 17-year-old daughter, who answered the man's calls and gave him information that could prove dangerous in the future, the woman said.

At 9:30 a.m. July 14, the 17year-old answered the man's first call. He asked at that time

about the younger daughter's availablility to babysit and was told to call back because she wasn't home.

HE CALLED back at 1 p.m. and again talked to the older daughter. This time he said he worked for a real estate agency and was understaffed for the summer and looking for parttime help in the office, the girls' mother said. Her daughter expressed interest because the job would have paid \$6 an hour, she said.

The man asked for a home address to send material about the job. He also asked about her appearance and clothing, which the girl answered, because she assumed the questions were related to how she would appear on the job.

On July 17 the man called a third time and again spoke to the older daughter. He said he still

The man told the girl that he knew when her mother would be gone the next day and said, 'You're going to let me in, right?" her mother related. He then threatened to tie her up, tape her mouth, disrobe her and take pictures of her and her sister as well, police reports said.

THE GIRL said she asked the man if he also intended to rape her and he answered that he might, the report said.

The girls' mother said they have received no more calls, but that hasn't stopped her from worrying. Both girls are staying with relatives in another town for a while, and when they come home they won't be spending any time alone, she said.

They also will be receiving a

lecture on what not to say to strangers on the telephone, she added.

She warns others who might advertise services not to include a name that could indicate sex. That and a young age signal vulnerability to those who prey on others, she said.

SUCH ADS are a risk, but a few, obvious rules can help avoid trouble, said Lt. Max Osburn of King County's Precinct 5 (Federal Way).

"Obviously, you have to be careful about the kind of information you give out over the phone. Never give your address," Osburn said.

He also recommends that any meeting set up between a potential employer and someone advertising for work should not be attended alone.

Another Federal Way woman recently avoided what could have been a tragedy when she responded to an unusual call for a job interview. An unauthorized employee of a discount store asked her to come by at closing for an interview, but the woman, suspicious, brought her boyfriend along. Daunted by the boyfriend's presense, the phony interviewer nervously cancelled the appointment.

"People are going to have to (take out ads), but it's a risk you take. You just have to be cautious," Osburn said.

Site 9 was recently assessed at about \$200,000. The property next to Illahee was assessed at \$180,000, so the school district will receive \$20,000 to make the



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

LAKEWOOD IS a city of 77,000 people that operates almost exclusively by contracting with county agencies and private providers for municipal services, such as road maintenance. It was one of the first cities in the nation to do that and is often used as a model by other cities wishing to contract.

Chambers said he receives at least one inquiry a week from other cities and speaks as often as once a month to groups around the country.

Most of Chambers' and Olivito's expenses were paid for by Al Brandt, a Federal Way resident who is active in local Republican politics and is Position 2 candidate Joel Mark's campaign manager. Brandt is retired but formerly worked in personnel management for

out to his pasture, dug the pond, made the island in the middle, and set it up.

Position 1 candidate Mary Gates was the only candidate who did not attend Tuesday's meeting. Gates could not be reached for comment.

By all accounts, no potential Federal Way city policy on contracting for services ranging from road maintenance to police service was discussed by any candidates. Chambers made a two-hour presentation on Lakewood's contract services, which included a slide show and question-and-answer period.

"After having sat through the meeting you would have been bored," said Cook.

Spoiled meat may close food stores

Grocery stores in King County could have their meat departments shut down for up to three days, if the county Board of Health approves rule changes suggested at Wednesday's board meeting.

The board directed the Department of Public Health to draw up new rules allowing inspectors to suspend meat department licenses at stores that repeatedly sell spoiled meat.

The health department is also looking at bringing three retired meat inspectors back on the payroll to beef up inspections of meat departments at stores hit by the 10-week-old grocery workers strike.

HEALTH BOARD members say that consumer complaints of spoiled meat and meat being sold beyond its pull date have increased dramatically since the strike began.

Health department inspectors also say they are finding spoiled meat in 11 percent of the stores, a number that Dr. Ted Baker, chief of the meat inspection program, called "extraordinary."

"We are dealing with a severe situation that needs rapid attention," said King County Councilwoman Cynthia Sullivan, who chairs the Health Board.

SPOKESMEN FOR King County grocery stores, however, insisted that replacement workers are maintaining food safety.

The New Siens

Signo Uddenberg, whose company manages the Sea-Tac Village Thriftway store, told the Health Board that, "mistakes are made by everybody, but our stores make every effort to offer fresh and wholesome products."

Jed Pritchett, vice president of labor relations for Albertson's Food Centers, blamed the United Food and Commercial Workers Union, which represents the striking grocery workers, for the increase in complaints.

"We are disappointed that the union is using meat safety to create a media sensation ... to further its bargaining position," he said.

Sullivan and board member Ron Sims said they were convinced that the complaints were not generated by the union.

"The complaints have gone up astronomically," said Sullivan. "This is not a media event. It is a situation that warrants response."

SIMS, WHO is also a member of the King County Council, said

he personally visisted three stores the day before the Wednesday meeting and was "startled" to find spoiled meat at all three.

At one store, Sims said he even found flies in the frozen meat section, that apparently had "flown in, cooled off, and died."

King County Executive Tim Hill, the third member of the Health Board, sounded a more cautious note, telling other board members not to "exaggerate a problem that doesn't exist."

Hill was silent when the vote was taken on the proposed rule change, although he did not register a "no" vote.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT officials say it could take as long as 30 days to promulgate the new rules, due to public notice requirements.

By then, said one official, the strike may be settled and the rules may not be needed.

In the meantime, inspectors have authority to levy fines
