## 'Weird Stuff'

### Dutch treat delights owner

The Federal Way News "Weird Stuff" search found a windmill worth tilting at on Fred Leenstra's farm on Military Road near the Pierce County line.

But prospective Don Quixotes better bring a boat instead of a horse. The windmill is on an island in the middle of a pond. There's a horse named Bo who grazes on the surrounding acreage, but he doesn't cotton to windmill-tilters.

Leenstra's parents came from windmill country. They were from the Frisian Islands in the Netherlands. An authentic pair of old wooden shoes sits on the windmill catwalk, testifying to Leenstra's heritage.

"I'm a Dutchman," he said. "I guess I needed a windmill."

It's about 20 feet high, not counting the blades. And it works. Leenstra said the generator inside could charge a small battery.

He's a contractor. He builds playfields and parks. His company, Golf Landscaping, built the Seattle Seahawks practice field in Kirkland, so digging the pond that surrounds the windmill wasn't too intimidating. He dug another pond on his land that has wild Canadian geese swimming in it as well as trout he planted himself.

He first saw the windmill at Clover Park Vocational Technical Institute six years ago. He suspects it was a carpentry project for the students. When he asked if it was for sale, he was told it already had been sold.

Two years later, the windmill was still there. Leenstra got the name and phone number of the buyer, and struck a deal, paying about \$3,000. He hauled it

## Private talk Candidates listen to contracting expert

Thirteen of the 14 Federal Way City Council candidates attended a meeting Tuesday evening on contract services from which the press and public were excluded.

The meeting, and another held Wednesday, were organized to inform candidates and other community leaders about contracting for services.

Howard Chambers, Lakewood, Calif. city manager, and Sam Olivito, executive director of the California Association of Contract Cities, met with the candidates for two hours on Tuesday. They later met with the Federal Way First! Transition Team steering committee and the chamber of commerce board on Wednesday.

By all accounts, candidates established no preliminary policies on contracting for services and nothing controversial was discussed at the closed-door meetings.

Chambers said he wanted only candidates and those who supported contract services at the meeting to avoid controversy and to avoid taking up meeting time defending contract services.

"I'm not a salesman," Chambers said later in a private interview. "I don't want to be the one who says, 'You've got to do this.'"

"I honestly believe that contracting is a cost-effective way of providing municipal services."

## Land swap may lead to new high school

A land swap with a Bellevue development firm has allowed the Federal Way School District to amass enough land to open a high school where Illahee Junior High now stands.

Although no plans for such a high school have yet been drawn up, a citizens' committee recently recommended the school district strongly consider the possibility.

The Federal Way School Board last week agreed to the deal with RNJ Homes Inc., trading the school district's undeveloped Site 9 for a plot of land adjacent to Illahee.

The district's new 10-acre site is located east of Illahee, alongside another undeveloped

plot of land owned by the district.

Together, the existing Illahee campus and both undeveloped sites add up to 40 acres, 20 of them so far unused. Forty acres is the recommended size of a standard-size high school.

A citizens' committee reported that the Federal Way School District eventually will need five full-size high schools in the future, when the presently booming population of elementary students grows older. Besides the three now standing, the committee reported, the school district could build a high school at Site 84, near Five Mile Lake, and could turn Illahee into

# Federal Way tops county in new people, homes

Federal Way grew at more than double the rate of the rest of King County last year.

According to the county's Annual Growth Report, King County posted a population increase of 2.3 percent, to 1.446 million.

But the Federal Way Community Plan Area increased its numbers by almost 5 percent, reaching a population of 87,600.

"That growth rate is expected to continue, although not quite as fast as in recent years," said Chandler Felt with the county's Division of Planning and Com-

munity Development, which prepared the report.

Housing in the county also grew, and again Federal Way took top honors.

MORE HOMES were built in Federal Way during 1988 than in any other community planning area in unincorporated King County.

The majority of those Federal Way homes — as in the rest of the county — were multifamily units, built during the last two years.

During 1987 and 1988, permits were issued for 3,394 multifami-

ly units in Federal Way. That represents a big jump from the 278 permits issued in 1986.

While developers and county officials believe the housing boom in Federal Way is nearly over, the report's authors say that south King County will continue to grow over the next three decades.

THE REPORT predicts that there will be 100,000 new jobs and 300,000 more people in south King County by the year 2020.

The Federal Way Community Planning Area, which includes small portions of Milton,

Auburn, and Kent, is expected to grow by 32 percent in the next decade.

By the year 2020, 154,800 people will call the area their home.

Another set of statistics, from the Puget Sound Council of Governments, has the new city of Federal Way growing at an even faster rate, reaching a population of 166,156 by the year 2020.

THE POPULATION growth in south King County will be matched by an increase in employment, according to the report. By the year 2020, the area is ex-

pected to provide 136,422 jobs.

Lois Schwennesen, manager of the Planning and Community Development Division, said the county's challenge now is to "link growth (in areas such as Federal Way) to quality of life.

"These are often perceived as two separate issues, but they shouldn't be. If we are going to accommodate so much growth, let's also protect open spaces.

## Speed was a factor in traffic death

Skid marks and the degree of impact are leading King County accident detectives to lean toward excessive speed as a contributing factor in a July 12 fatal traffic accident.

Hersal Ray, 82, of Everett, was killed instantly when the car he was driving was hit broadside by an ambulance as he entered SW 320th Street from Seventh Avenue Southwest. A passenger, O'Dene Reis, 66, of Federal Way, was

treated at Harborview Medical Center for a broken leg.

Although a spokesman for Shepard Ambulance at first denied the ambulance was responding to an earlier accident on the same street, the company later said its driver was headed to the car-motorcycle accident just six blocks away at 13th Avenue Southwest.

The Shepard Ambulance had not been dispatched by the company to the accident, said Brant

Butte, but was in the area and its driver, Michael Bales, decided to respond anyway. King County Ambulance, another private ambulance company, had been dispatched, said Det. Steve Brown.

WITNESSES SAID the Shepard ambulance had its emergency lights on at the time of the accident, which is illegal, if not on an officially dispatched emergency call, Brown said.

Police can tell by the filaments in the emergency

lights if they were on, and they plan to tear the ambulance's lights apart to have a look, Brown said.

The ambulance was traveling westbound in the second lane of the five-lane road before Ray pulled into the intersection. The ambulance swerved into the center turn-lane after the brakes were applied, and that's where the two vehicles collided, Brown said. Detectives measured 98

## Entrepreneurs deliver in style

How does a good idea start?  
For Dan Hart and Jeff Yost, life-long Federal Way residents, it started with lunch.

Yost, a 22-year-old Decatur High School graduate, was visiting his brother in Florida last winter when he got hungry. His brother showed him an assortment of menus sitting by the phone.

The menu didn't come from the usual array of pizza joints. They were from classy restaurants — Italian, Chinese, French and the like. For a small fee, Yost could get the food delivered to his door by a tuxedo-clad driver, and dine in style.

Yost liked the idea so much, he thought it would go over in his home town. "(There was) nothing like this in Federal Way," he said. "I thought, 'Why not give it a try?'"

So he called up his friend Dan Hart, 20, met Yost when the two attended classes together at Green River Community College. "We sat there and didn't pay attention," said Hart. "We were just trying to figure out how to get rich."

Yost told Hart about the service in Florida, and suggested they try it here. Hart agreed. They each sunk \$3,000 into the venture, buying equipment to carry food, two-way radios, a business license and of course, tuxedos.

The first restaurant they approached was Verrazano's Italian American Restaurant in Federal Way. "We're right in the door and said 'We've got a new concept for you,'" said Hart. The manager was leery, but eventually agreed to a three-month contract with the duo. Later, they added Burger Express to their list, signing a similar contract.

## Tuxedo-clad lads will bring pasta primavera to your party

THEY CALL their service Class Express, and they operate it out of their apartment near Group Health. Their boundaries coincide roughly with those of Federal Way, but on a slow day, they'll go farther. They hope to expand the service to other restaurants in the area, one for each style of food.

Hart said most restaurants can handle more business, even when they're full and have a line going around the block. "We're basically offering the restaurants 'ghost tables,'" he said.

Kathy Fischer, who works at Verrazano's, said the contract with Class Express "works out fine, it's great. We do get a lot of orders out of it, and they're very professional."

Hart said the appearance of the tuxedo makes a difference. "The people we've brought (food) to, they're just thrilled. In Federal Way, the typical (delivery) guy comes to the door in a baseball cap and a T-shirt."

"You don't even want to let him in the house," added Yost. "If we get out there and make a good impression and do it right, there's no reason we can't succeed."

Though they've only been in business for a week and a half, Class Express averages 10-12 orders a day. "It's hard for me to believe how fast it's taken off," Yost said.

"It's already paying for rent," said Hart. "People are really happy with it. (They) can't believe it's in Federal Way."

Hart said the service caters to older people who don't like to go out, or two-income families.

## At the Movies

**"BATMAN"**  
Devotees of the Dark Knight will have minor quibbles with Tim Burton's vision of the Caped Crusader, but not many. Though he's too gadget-oriented and not much of an athlete, this Batman is the grim creature of the night envisioned by his creator, Bob Kane. The effects are tremendous, and rescue a mediocre plot, highlighted by a forced and unnecessary love story. Michael Keaton brings an interesting quirkiness to Batman's character. There may be too much of Jack Nicholson's Joker, but so what? He's brilliant. Rated PG-13. Playing at SeaTac North and South.

**"DEAD POET'S SOCIETY"**  
Imagine, if you can, Robin Williams underplaying a role and you have a thoughtful, poignant portrayal in a thoughtful, poignant film. Williams takes a back seat to his students as a free-thinking nonconformist literature teacher at a stuffy, staid conformist New England prep school. The film is bright, uplifting and tragic as it extols the virtues and dangers of the motto, carpe diem, or seize the day. Rated PG. It is playing at Gateway Center.

**"FIELD OF DREAMS"**  
A baseball fairy tale in the general mold of "The Natural," but more contemporary and less about baseball than about one man's struggle to come to terms with bitter memories of his father. Based on the novel "Shoeless Joe," the movie is faithful to the book in spirit if not every detail. Warm, witty, with bursts of visual splendor, such as the eerie initial appearance of the "ghost" of Shoeless Joe Jackson in a baseball diamond carved from a corn field by the film's engaging star, Kevin Costner. It's a movie with a message: Follow your dream and you might get a second chance. Tender hearts should bring Kleenex. Rated PG. Playing at Gateway Center.

**"GHOSTBUSTERS II"**  
Sequels are tricky things. It's possible to make good ones, but "Ghostbusters II" is just a dismal rehash about the team of ghost exterminators fighting evil. The original film was funny because it was fresh, irreverent and posed no real life-threatening danger. When you take that fun away and try to be really scary, a Ghostbusters II does, the comedy dies. What's astonishing is that talented, funny people like Dan Aykroyd, Harold Ramis, Bill Murray and director Ivan Reitman managed to make a movie without a single new idea. It's a stinky mess of old

jokes and an indigestible touchy-feely ending. Ptooey. "Ghostbusters II" is rated PG and is playing at Gateway Center and Lewis and Clark.

**"INDIANA JONES AND THE LAST CRUSADE"**  
"Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade" won't disappoint devotees of the George Lucas/Steven Spielberg hero. The inimitable Indy (Harrison Ford) gets tangled up with Nazis, religious fanatics, and his own father (Sean Connery) while searching for the legendary Holy Grail. The plot is thin, the action predictable and the

suspense non-existent, but the stunts are routinely breath-taking, and Connery adds some spice to the formula mix. Rated PG-13. "Indiana Jones" is playing at SeaTac North and at Southcenter.

**"STAR TREK V: THE FINAL FRONTIER"**  
"Star Trek" may be one of the best sequels out this year. Better than "Rocky" or "Friday the 13th," the fifth "Star Trek" sequel is as comfortable as an old pair of sneakers. In this latest installment, the Enterprise is commandeered by a renegade Vulcan named Sybok

(Laurence Luckinbill), who does things we don't associate with Mr. Spock's race, like smiling. The plot begins on an epic scale, but peters out. But fans of Captain Kirk (William Shatner) and Mr. Spock (Leonard Nimoy) and the rest of the Enterprise crew won't be disappointed. Who cares about an untidy plot when there are Klingons to fight? "Star Trek" is rated PG and is playing at SeaTac South.

**"DO THE RIGHT THING"**  
Film-goers who think of Spike Lee as an independent primitive filmmaker will be surprised by the depth and skill he displays in "Do The Right Thing." Lee uses classical techniques such as irony, satire, debate and careful plotting to make a film about racism in a Brooklyn neighborhood. The ensemble cast, headed by Ruby Dee and Ossie Davis, does an admirable job, and Lee is no slouch as the main character. Combining visual storytelling with an intelligent script that offers no easy solutions to the problems of racism makes "Do The Right Thing" the best movie of the summer, far surpassing the empty-headed excesses of better-known blockbusters and sequels.

## Ten to Guatemala Group takes a vacation with purpose

The closest Virginia Aller has ever gotten to the Mayan ruins in Guatemala is in an airplane flying overhead.

Though the ruins are only 55 miles from Barillas, a village where she and her husband, Dr. Leon Aller, help to run a small hospital, the road there takes about 12 hours to travel. So whenever visitors set out on the voyage, Mrs. Aller stays behind.

"I'm always on KP duty," she complained with a laugh Monday night. The occasion was a reunion of Marine View Presbyterian Church members who recently visited the Allers in Barillas.

Ten Marine View members took the "vacation with a purpose" the latter half of June, inspired after hearing Dr. Aller speak at the church about his medical mission last fall. Aller, a retired physician, and his wife, a retired teacher, travel to Barillas four times a year for up to two months a visit.

The Marine View group spent a week with the Allers, working in the hospital and learning about the local culture. They spent another week visiting the Guatemalan Evangelical Mission for street kids in the village of Parrmou.

**DESPITE THE** Christian overtones of the voyage, the purpose of the visit was educational, not evangelical, said Bonnie Barthel.

The group left for Guatemala June 17, after months of planning and a series of Spanish lessons, taught by Cecelia Humphres, a Marine View member from Ecuador. Humphres served as translator for the nine other travelers.

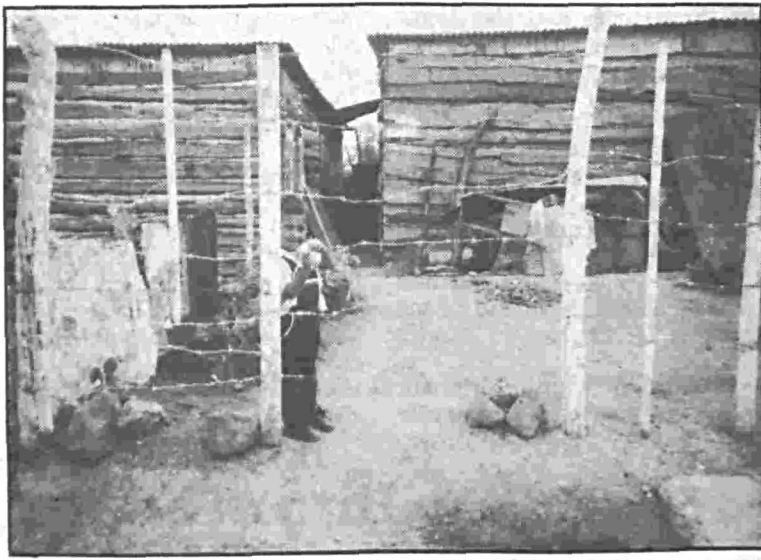

They departed with bags full of tools and heads filled with visions of helping the less fortunate.

They returned July 3 with snapshots of village life, Mayan ruins, and memories of being taught how to help out by the Guatemalans themselves.

In one instance, Barthel recalled, the group helped to erect a pumphouse with cinder blocks. In their cache of tools was a saw, which they put to use cutting the blocks down to size. Until, that is, they noticed some Guatemalans chipping away with their ever-present machetes.

Sure enough, the machete-hacked cinder blocks broke exactly right.

"We each learned from one another," Barthel said.

**THE IDEA** to travel to Guatemala originated when Leon Aller visited Marine View last fall, seeking support for his mission.

His medical practice in Barillas intrigued the membership enough that when the Mission Commission proposed the church send a group there, 10 people liked the idea.

All 10 remained interested through the months it took to arrange the trip. Funds were raised (\$300) to purchase tools, which would later be left behind. Each of the 10 people paid about \$1,000, a bargain if you consider a working trip a vacation, pointed out Dick Shenk, a Mission Commission member who went with his wife, Elinor.

In addition to building the pumphouse, the group kept busy painting things blue, said Bobbie Wright, who still has paint in her hair to prove it.

Appropriately enough, the first visitors in a post-partum room they painted were a woman and her newborn son. There probably aren't many more photographs of Guatemalan infants around.

**PRINTS AND** slides were out in force Monday night at the group's reunion in the basement of Marine View Church on Dash Point.

One shot just about everyone made a point to take was of a mountain looming over a

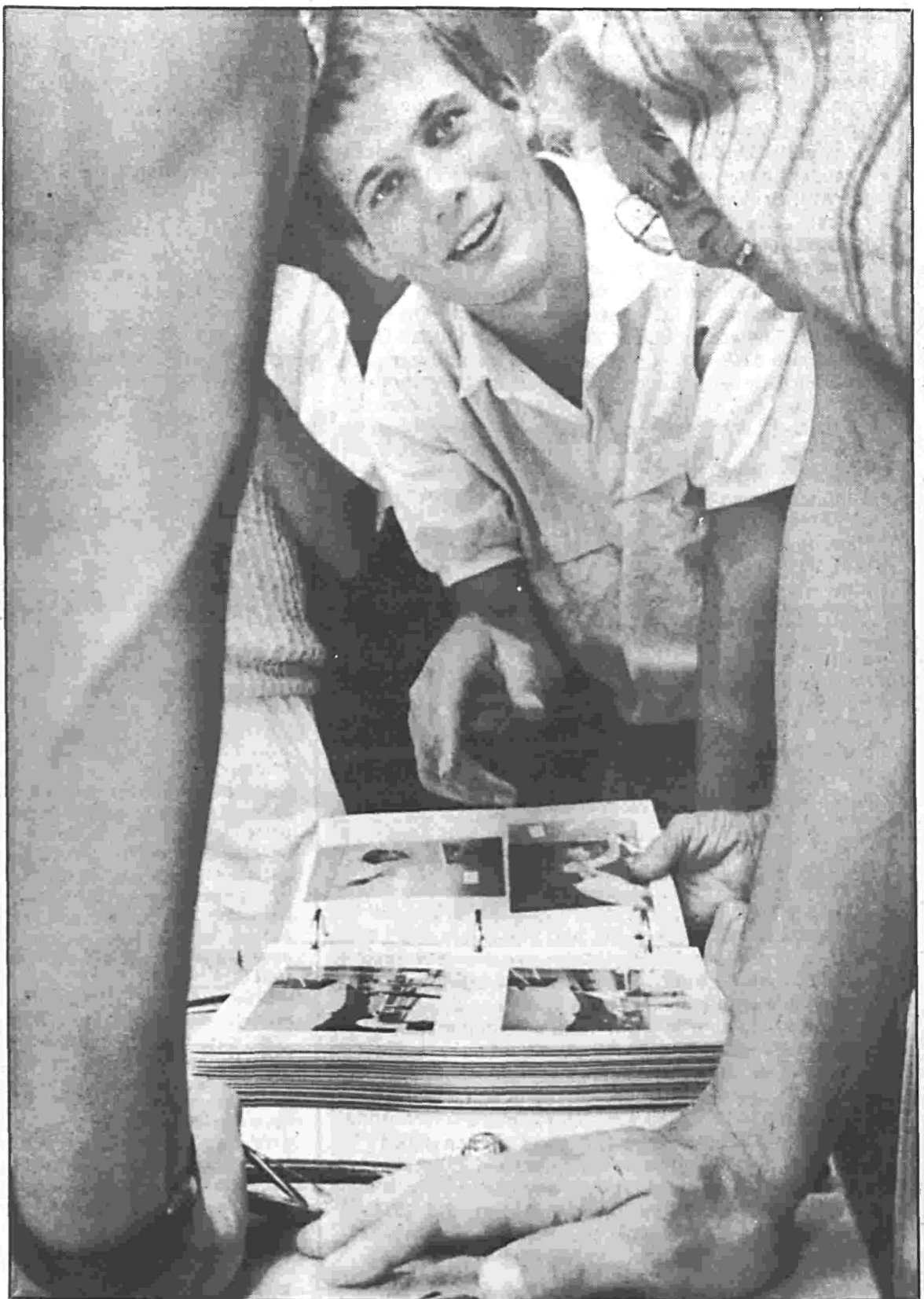

village, testimony to the damage wreaked by machete-wielding Guatemalans. Trees have vanished from the base of the mountain halfway up to its summit.

If the logging continues, the Marine View group learned, the village soon will be without its water supply. One of the group's tasks was to plant seedlings on

the mountainside. Overall, Shenk said, he was pleased with how well the trip went — including the absence of illness among the travelers.

"It was really very successful," he said. Rounding out the group were: Kiki Barthel, Wesley Wingard, Don Deighton, Pat Long, and Kathy McAdams.

Leon Aller is president of an organization called Hands for Peacemaking and is always on the lookout for support for his hospital. He can be reached in Snohomish at 568-7880.

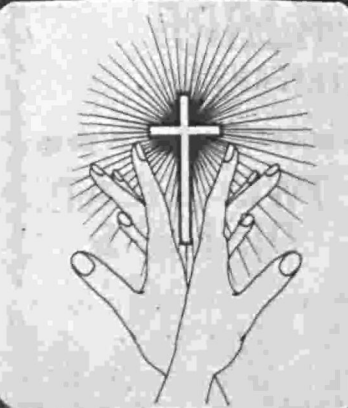

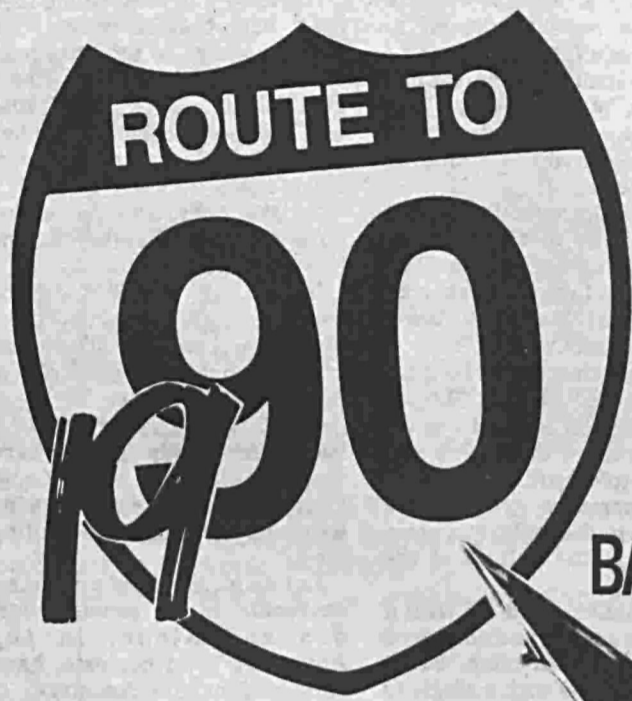

The Federal Way Omni American Legion baseball team took one giant leap toward clinching a post-season berth Tuesday, blowing away District 11-leading Kent Security, 9-4.

The win put the Feds (11-4 in league play) in a position where they would have to lose two of their last three games and Kirkland (8-6) or Burien (7-6) would have to win all of theirs to even create a tie for the final berth.

It also allowed Omni to gain on Security (10-2) and stick with second-place Kent Post 15 (11-3), as well as stay ahead of fourth-place Bellevue Honda (7-4).

Next week's Division II tournament will include host Kent Post 15 and the top three other finishers.

Federal Way hosted Post 15 Wednesday (after press time) and visited Bothell last night, with the only league action left being the as-yet unscheduled completion of a game with Bellevue Honda suspended with the score tied, 4-4, after nine innings of play.

The Feds will play their own alumni at 4 p.m. Monday at Cheney Stadium as part of Federal Way Community Night for the Tacoma Tigers, with the Division II tournament running July 28-30 at Kent Memorial Park.

"We're playing about as well right now as could be expected of us," said Federal Way head coach Tom Wagner, whose team was coming off a second-place finish at the 12-team Vern Bean Classic in Bellevue before Tuesday's game. "The defense is a lot better as well as our hitting."

Tuesday's win gave Omni a 22-10-1 record overall, and victories in five of its last six outings.

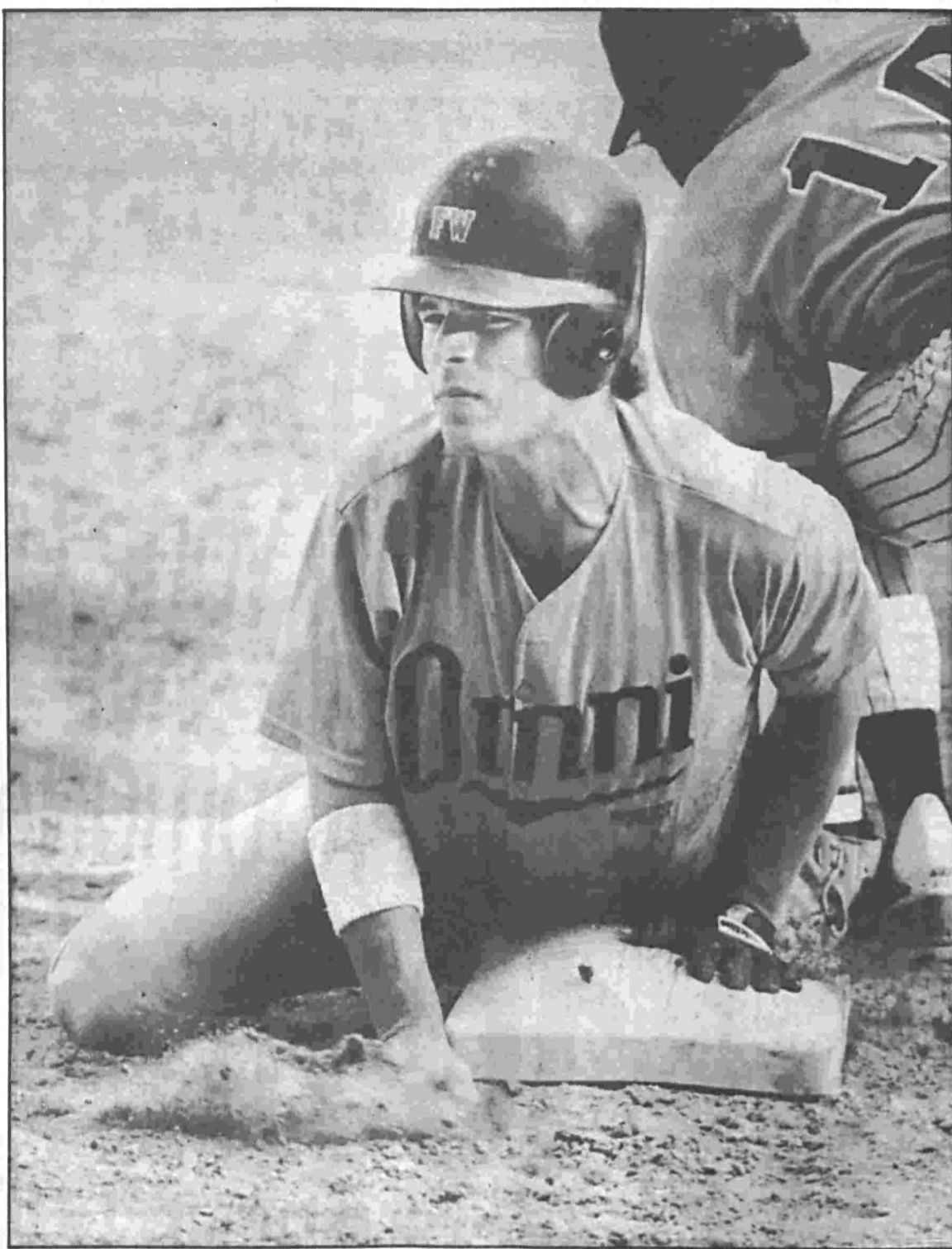
**FEDERAL WAY** outthit Kent, 8-4, in dealing the Security squad only its second league loss.

## Vacationers enjoy nature's beauty at Domke Lake

One of the least advertised vacation spots in North Central Washington is a small clear-water lake nestled in the Cascades not far from the better-known Stehekin resort area.

Domke Lake is a sparkling reminder of what it's like to live far away from civilization — so far that there are only two ways to get there: by air or by boat and then hike.

For years, we have been attracted to the lake for its beauty and isolation, not to mention the generally excellent fishing. In recent years, we've visited Domke for three- and four-day stays, holing up in one of only two cabins on the entire lake.

The cabins were once owned and operated by Gordon Stuart, a former trapper and woodsman who came to Domke in 1924 and lived out a Harry Truman-like solitary existence until his death four years ago. Gordon willed the property to Sidney Burns, who has continued to shun publicity and promotion much the same as Stuart did. Consequently, few people know about Domke and its special charms.

If you visit Domke, you begin to understand why a man could forsake civilization for a seemingly idyllic life at the edge of these calm, fresh waters.



### Exploring the Northwest

Our most recent visit was by seaplane, operated by Chelan Airways, Chelan. Our pilot, Ernie Gibson, has himself created a legend with decades of experience flying up and down Lake Chelan. By his own estimation, Gibson has flown at least 25,000 trips along this 55-mile-long lake.

While two of us took that enjoyable 45-minute plane ride, four friends chose the other mode of transportation to Domke — a two-and-a-half hour boat trip on the "Lady of the Lake II," followed by another 90 minutes of hiking a reasonably

steep trail from Lucerne to Domke. They boarded the boat at Field's Point Landing to save time; the trip from Chelan takes nearly four hours.

Naturally, we arrived ahead of the hikers and had time to load our provisions into one of two aluminum fishing boats we had rented with our cabin. The only way to get to our cabin was to cross the lake by boat — thankfully a three-horsepower motor-driven boat.

Our cabin, the larger of the two, was big enough for eight people and came outfitted with cooking utensils, pots, pans, silverware and even sheets on the beds. But the cabin is quite rustic — some would say primitive — so vacationers are advised not to expect too many amenities.

That was fine with us. Our purpose for visiting Domke was to get away from the work-a-day world, and a primitive cabin in the woods sometimes offers a nice alternative to the most pampered resort stay.

Our hiker friends arrived in a couple of hours, mildly tired from their uphill climb. The two couples had brought in heavy packs laden with food and other supplies, but none of the four reported any serious problem with the hike. And all had enjoyed the excursion on the

"Lady of the Lake II."

Settling into our cabin for a three-day weekend, we used our time to read, hike, cook (on an ancient wood stove), eat and, most of all, to fish. Both trolling and still fishing proved successful in yielding feisty 14- to 15-inch rainbow trout. This is the best kind of fishing, in my estimation, for even if you're not successful, this beautiful tree-lined lake is just the right place for drifting with your thoughts.

In summer, the lake warms to a temperature just right for swimming. There are numerous little beaches and coves to visit in your boat. And, best of all, you have this lake generally to yourselves, the only intrusion being a few backpackers that sometimes camp in one of the lakes small camping grounds.

In all, Domke is an ideal getaway in spring, summer or fall — the hottest season being the best because the cabins are not well insulated. But there are a few points Domke visitors should be aware before they go.

First, the accommodations are rustic and not pretentious. The smaller cabin rents for \$30 each night for two. The larger cabin rents for \$60 per night for 4 with each additional person costing \$5. Bedding, towels, and cooking utensils are provided.

Second, the boats and motors are relatively expensive — \$10 per day for a rowboat and \$25 per day for a motorboat. We arrived about Friday noon, departed Sunday noon and paid more than \$100 just for two boats.

And, it's important to note that this is a self-service resort. Guests are asked to clean the cabins thoroughly, cut and stack wood to replace what they have used and carry out their trash. In the old days, Gordon would make note in his reservation book to remind him whether you left things in good order; if you didn't, Gordon didn't really want you to come back.

Last — but not least for people who don't like rodents — there were mice in our cabin. When the lights go out, the little creatures foray into the kitchen and other locales in search of food, and they don't dine very quietly.

Of course that also gave us

some entertainment. One of the true joys of Domke is the satisfaction of knowing you rigged a home-made mouse trap — and that it worked.

All reservations must be made in writing to: Emerald Camp, Lucerne, Chelan, WA 98816. It is open usually through hunting season but the best advice is to write and check with the owners.

Roundtrip airfare via Chelan Airways is \$80 per adult. If you'd like to take the 2-1/2 mile hike from Lucerne on Lake Chelan — and believe me, it's a lot easier coming down than going up — a one way fare is \$40. For more information, phone Chelan Airways, (509) 682-5555.

If you plan on taking the "Lady of the Lake II," the roundtrip fare to Lucerne is \$16, half-price for children ages 6 to 11. Children under 6 are free. For more information, phone (509) 682-4584.

# Babysitting ad leads to scary calls

Two Federal Way teen-agers and their mother have learned a scary lesson about what kind of information they give to strangers.

What began as an advertisement for babysitting services has turned into a nightmare for the family. The mother, who wished not to be identified by name, placed an ad in the Federal Way News for her 13-year-old daughter, who was looking for babysitting jobs.

What she got was obscene and frightening threats made by a male caller to her 17-year-old daughter, who answered the man's calls and gave him information that could prove dangerous in the future, the woman said.

At 9:30 a.m. July 14, the 17-year-old answered the man's first call. He asked at that time

about the younger daughter's availability to babysit and was told to call back because she wasn't home.

HE CALLED back at 1 p.m. and again talked to the older daughter. This time he said he worked for a real estate agency and was understaffed for the summer and looking for part-time help in the office, the girls' mother said. Her daughter expressed interest because the job would have paid \$6 an hour, she said.

The man asked for a home address to send material about the job. He also asked about her appearance and clothing, which the girl answered, because she assumed the questions were related to how she would appear on the job.

On July 17 the man called a third time and again spoke to the older daughter. He said he still

was looking for a receptionist, and asked more questions about her appearance. This time he also asked about her work shift at a local restaurant and her mother's work place and office hours.

The interview lasted about 20 minutes, police reports say, then turned frightening when the caller asked the girl if she was familiar with the word "rape."

After that, the man's tone and speech changed, going from professional and articulate, to high-pitched, excited and nervous, with heaving breathing, the girl said.

The man told the girl that he knew when her mother would be gone the next day and said, "You're going to let me in, right?" her mother related. He then threatened to tie her up, tape her mouth, disrobe her and take pictures of her and her sister as well, police reports said.

THE GIRL said she asked the man if he also intended to rape her and he answered that he might, the report said.

The girls' mother said they have received no more calls, but that hasn't stopped her from worrying. Both girls are staying with relatives in another town for a while, and when they come home they won't be spending any time alone, she said.

They also will be receiving a

lecture on what not to say to strangers on the telephone, she added.

She warns others who might advertise services not to include a name that could indicate sex. That and a young age signal vulnerability to those who prey on others, she said.

SUCH ADS are a risk, but a few, obvious rules can help avoid trouble, said Lt. Max Osburn of King County's Precinct 5 (Federal Way).

"Obviously, you have to be careful about the kind of information you give out over the phone. Never give your address," Osburn said.

He also recommends that any meeting set up between a potential employer and someone advertising for work should not be attended alone.

Another Federal Way woman recently avoided what could have been a tragedy when she responded to an unusual call for a job interview. An unauthorized employee of a discount store asked her to come by at closing for an interview, but the woman, suspicious, brought her boyfriend along. Daunted by the boyfriend's presence, the phony interviewer nervously cancelled the appointment.

"People are going to have to (take out ads), but it's a risk you take. You just have to be cautious," Osburn said.

feet of ambulance skid marks prior to the point of impact. The Ray car was knocked 160 feet down the road, and the ambulance went another 44 feet before stopping.

A vehicle moving at the posted 40 mph speed limit would have traveled only another 10 feet after hitting the Ray car, Brown said. Those numbers make it highly unlikely the ambulance was traveling the speed limit, but detectives won't know just how fast it was going until its tachograph box, which records speed and other driving factors, is analyzed, he added.

INFORMATION in the box, which is not unlike the "black boxes" on airliners, will be read and interpreted by a firm in Virginia. The boxes can be programmed to track speed, distances traveled, stops made and use of emergency lights.

No charges will be filed or citations issued until all of the information is collected and reviewed.

a high school.

The same committee also decided that the school district eventually must build more new junior high schools. It would need eight or nine, or three or four more than its present five, if Federal Way's housing boom continues as it has.

Illahee temporarily doubled as a high school and junior high until Decatur High School was built in 1975.

Site 9, which the district traded away, is a 10-acre parcel of land located at Century-Palms. The site was sold to the district for \$57,518 in 1970 by the Weyerhaeuser Co. RNJ Homes plans to build single-family homes at the site.

Site 9 was recently assessed at about \$200,000. The property next to Illahee was assessed at \$180,000, so the school district will receive \$20,000 to make the

swap even, said Superintendent Richard Harris.

Harris added that the swap makes the creation of a high school at Illahee possible, but other possibilities are in the offing.

"We haven't said it will be a high school. It's a potential high school, certainly, but that decision is not made yet. This trade has just given us flexibility," he said.

# Candidates say public should be included in meetings

LAKWOOD IS a city of 77,000 people that operates almost exclusively by contracting with county agencies and private providers for municipal services, such as road maintenance. It was one of the first cities in the nation to do that and is often used as a model by other cities wishing to contract.

Chambers said he receives at least one inquiry a week from other cities and speaks as often as once a month to groups around the country.

Most of Chambers' and Olivito's expenses were paid for by Al Brandt, a Federal Way resident who is active in local Republican politics and is Position 2 candidate Joel Mark's campaign manager. Brandt is retired but formerly worked in personnel management for

General Electric and Boeing. The cost of those expenses were private, Brandt said. He said he was concerned about the high cost of government generally, and hoped the new city would choose to contract for vital services, rather than create its own inefficient bureaucracy.

Several of the candidates said the meeting was useful in helping them learn about contract services, but they wouldn't have attended if they had known the press and public would be excluded.

One candidate, who also contributed to paying for Chamber's expenses, said he understood why Chambers wanted the press excluded, but wouldn't have attended if he had known about the exclusion.

"This is a departure from the status quo and Chambers didn't want to create a problem," said Position 7 candidate Phil Watkins.

"I'm not comfortable with that," said Position 5 candidate Jim Handmacher. "I thought it was silly for the press to be ex-

cluded. It makes people suspicious the decisions are being made behind closed doors. Even though we can't make decisions yet.

CANDIDATES have no legal decision-making power until they are elected to office after the Sept. 19 final election.

Consequently, it is perfectly legal for the candidates, and any other non-governmental agency or private citizen, to hold any meeting and exclude anyone they wish.

However, an already wary electorate is likely to be unsettled by any meetings their potential city leaders attend from which the press and public are excluded, said Position 4 candidate Elaine Cook.

"We certainly don't need to start out with problems," Cook said. "Enough of those are going to come along anyway. I feel the public should be a part of the process."

Position 1 candidate Mary Gates was the only candidate who did not attend Tuesday's

meeting. Gates could not be reached for comment.

By all accounts, no potential Federal Way city policy on contracting for services ranging from road maintenance to police service was discussed by any candidates. Chambers made a two-hour presentation on Lakewood's contract services, which included a slide show and question-and-answer period.

"After having sat through the meeting you would have been bored," said Cook.

# Siphoner picks on the wrong victim

A gas thief picked the wrong truck to siphon Tuesday, and not only failed to get his own car started, but lost his car to police, who impounded the abandoned vehicle.

One resident of a Twin Lakes area neighborhood told police his garden hose was shortened by about 3 feet and the gas line on his motorcycle cut, apparently by someone trying to steal gas. When he failed at the house, the gas-thief moved on to a neighboring home, and siphoned about 2 gallons of fuel from a diesel-powered truck. Diesel fuel will not run a gas-powered engine.

When the neighbors left their homes shortly before 6 a.m. that morning, they found a suspicious car parked on the block, and a young man lying down inside. Lying outside the car was its gas cap, an empty gas can smelling of diesel fuel and the garden hose used to siphon it.

The neighbors alerted police, but the young man was gone by the time they arrived. The police settled for his car instead, and it was impounded.

The gas-thief is described as a white male, 16-20 years old, standing 5 feet 6 inches tall with a small build. He has brown hair and wore black spandex knee-length shorts and a sweater jacket. The Chevy Impala he abandoned is registered to a Tacoma resident.

An intruder in a Camelot area house didn't take anything Tuesday night, but made himself at home.

A resident of the home told King County police that sometime between 1- and 8:30

a.m. someone came through a locked window as she slept, had a drink and a cigarette, then left through the front door.

Police lifted fingerprints from a doorknob and the glass the intruder used.

# Spoiled meat may close food stores

Grocery stores in King County could have their meat departments shut down for up to three days, if the county Board of Health approves rule changes suggested at Wednesday's board meeting.

The board directed the Department of Public Health to draw up new rules allowing inspectors to suspend meat department licenses at stores that repeatedly sell spoiled meat.

The health department is also looking at bringing three retired meat inspectors back on the payroll to beef up inspections of meat departments at stores hit by the 10-week-old grocery workers strike.

HEALTH BOARD members say that consumer complaints of spoiled meat and meat being sold beyond its pull date have increased dramatically since the strike began.

Health department inspectors also say they are finding spoiled meat in 11 percent of the stores, a number that Dr. Ted Baker, chief of the meat inspection program, called "extraordinary."

"We are dealing with a severe situation that needs rapid attention," said King County Councilwoman Cynthia Sullivan, who chairs the Health Board.

SPOKESMEN FOR King County grocery stores, however, insisted that replacement workers are maintaining food safety.

Signo Uddenberg, whose company manages the Sea-Tac Village Thriftway store, told the Health Board that, "mistakes are made by everybody, but our stores make every effort to offer fresh and wholesome products."

Jed Pritchett, vice president of labor relations for Albertson's Food Centers, blamed the United Food and Commercial Workers Union, which represents the striking grocery workers, for the increase in complaints.

"We are disappointed that the union is using meat safety to create a media sensation...to further its bargaining position," he said.

Sullivan and board member Ron Sims said they were convinced that the complaints were not generated by the union.

"The complaints have gone up astronomically," said Sullivan. "This is not a media event. It is a situation that warrants response."

SIMS, WHO is also a member of the King County Council, said

he personally visited three stores the day before the Wednesday meeting and was "startled" to find spoiled meat at all three.

At one store, Sims said he even found flies in the frozen meat section, that apparently had "flown in, cooled off, and died."

King County Executive Tim Hill, the third member of the Health Board, sounded a more cautious note, telling other board members not to "exaggerate a problem that doesn't exist."

Hill was silent when the vote was taken on the proposed rule change, although he did not register a "no" vote.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT officials say it could take as long as 30 days to promulgate the new rules, due to public notice requirements.

By then, said one official, the strike may be settled and the rules may not be needed.

In the meantime, inspectors have authority to levy fines

against stores where spoiled meat is found. They also can begin carrying out another directive from the board, requiring the department to notify the media when a grocery store's meat department is closed down. The notices would be similar to those currently given when restaurants are closed for health reasons.
