Chain gain

Bus lots will be fenced in

Metro is going to try and fence crime out of three park-and-ride lots in South King County with an eight-foot, chain-link fence.

But one Burien merchant complains erecting the fences will be tantamount to creating a "Berlin Wall."

Metro is planning to install the chain link fences at the Burien, Star Lake and Federal Way (near Sea-Tac Mall) park-and-rides.

The fences won't have locked gates, said Andrea Tull, capital projects manager for Metro. But hopefully they will make potential thieves think twice, and make those coming in and out of the park-and-ride more visible, she said.

Star Lake is the first park-and-ride slated for fencing. The project is expected to begin in October and be completed by November. Plans for fencing the Burien and Federal Way park-and-rides are still tentative, Tull said.

The cost of the materials and installation for the Star Lake fence is estimated at \$26,000, said Linda Czeisler, project administrator for Metro.

Providing security guards for the lot would cost between \$10,500 and \$56,000 per lot per year, depending on how many hours the lot was patrolled, and whether Metro hired a private firm or used off duty police officers, Czeisler said.

THE THREE sites were chosen as a pilot program for King County because Metro gets the highest number of its complaints about vandalism and thefts from South End park-and-rides, Tull added.

Forty percent of all park and ride users park in the 11 lots in South King County. Yet 71 percent of complaints about crime come from South End customers, according to a 1989

Goodwill: Games tickets go on sale in fall

Unless you buy a special membership to the Goodwill Games, you'll have to wait until at least September to buy tickets for any of the 21 scheduled sports competitions next summer.

The Seattle Organizing Committee (SOC) of the Goodwill Games announced ticket prices Monday and it looks as though Cheney Stadium will host the international sporting festival's best bargain. Baseball prices start at \$3 and top out at \$25, whereas the diving events here in Federal Way will cost \$10 to \$25 per session.

Public sale of tickets will be through Ticketmaster, but not until Sept. 11, said Bill Sears, director of media relations for the SOC.

Those who can afford the \$275 price tag to join the Ambassador's Club, or the \$125

to be a Friend of the Goodwill Games, will get first crack at tickets through an advance order form that comes with membership. Those memberships are being sold now, Sears said.

Membership in the Ambassador's Club includes two tickets to the opening ceremony and passes to the Treasures of Moscow exhibit, as well as priority and advance ticket sales. Friends of the Goodwill Games also get advance ticket sale forms and discounts on Games merchandise and a free newsletter, Sears said.

TICKETS to events at the aquatic center being built in West Campus are expected to go fast, Sears said. Although the building holds 2,500 people, media and Games officials will fill about 500 of those seats for each event, leaving only 2,000 seats available to the public.

Tickets for swimming events range

from \$10 to \$40 with event-long passes at \$50 to \$200. Swimming events are scheduled for July 20 to 24.

Diving season tickets are \$60 to \$240, and competition is slated for July 31 to Aug. 5.

Water polo competition is July 25 to 29, and single event tickets are \$5 to \$25. Season tickets are \$50 to \$170.

Synchronized swimming will be July 30 only, with one evening session. Tickets are \$10 to \$40.

Games events will be staged in Seattle, Federal Way, Tacoma, Enumclaw, Redmond, the Tri-Cities and Spokane. The Games begin July 20 and last through Aug. 5 next year. Tickets to the opening ceremony at Husky Stadium, featuring the Moscow Circus, cost \$35 to \$100.

Cities may get state money

Just about everyone agrees that the state of Washington should give some money to the new cities of Sea-Tac and Federal Way.

But nobody's figured out where to get it.

The state Department of Community Development is looking at a proposal from the Association of Washington Cities to provide the two new cities with some money that could be used until the cities are able to raise some of their own.

"We recognize the state has an interest in helping the cities with an orderly transition process," said Ken Back, a community program developer for the department. "If there is something the state can do, we're going to try to do it."

Back said the money must come from current programs, because it will be needed before the state Legislature comes back into session where it could vote on some money.

He said there were a couple of funds within the department that were being looked at. Another possibility is Governor Booth Gardner's emergency fund, he said.

THE REQUEST came from AWC executive director Kent Swisher, who said the cities will need some cash to get through the first few weeks.

"It becomes so clear to everyone that a little money would help these cities a lot, to hire interim staff and get going," Swisher said.

"Everybody agrees it's a good idea, but nobody knows how to accomplish it," he continued.

The cities won't be able to come up with any money of their own right at first. The two new city councils, which will be elected Sept. 19, must vote to issue tax warrants or borrow against future tax revenues. Either way, it will take at least a little bit of time.

In the meantime come expenses for staff, telephones, space, advertising and a number of other bills.

County concerned about loss, but will help city

Some Federal Way residents couldn't resist taking some parting shots Thursday at the county government they've loved to hate for so long.

The targets of the well-mannered slings and arrows were King County Executive Tim Hill and his cabinet. Hill spoke at a Federal Way Community Council-sponsored gathering Thursday evening.

But while some comments came from residents who criticized King County for past transgressions, such as poor management of growth and road planning, many other questions

concentrated on what the county's relationship will be with the new city of Federal Way.

Specifically, Hill assured residents the county would not gouge the new cities with policies now under consideration by the county council to increase charges for some contract services.

"We pledge to be reasonable people and work out the transition," Hill said.

THE COUNTY council is considering recovering "full cost" for the services it may contract for with new cities such as police service, road maintenance and others.

The council will consider those policies at an all-day retreat, 9 a.m., Tuesday, at Robinswood House, 2432 S.E. 148th St., Bellevue.

There is some dispute about what full cost means. Some community leaders say full cost should not include overhead costs. Also, other cities already contract with the county under existing, less-expensive contracts.

"We do not believe the new cities should have contracts that are different from contracts being offered to other jurisdictions," said Pat Steel, the county's chief financial officer.

Also, county police officials pledged to be reasonable in their negotiations with the new cities for police service.

"We're not going to walk away from these cities or cram anything down their throats," said Sheriff James Montgomery.

However, county officials admitted deep concerns about the loss of property- and sales-tax revenue from the soon-to-be cities of Federal Way and Sea-Tac.

In response to those projected losses, the county is reducing its overhead costs and is planning

to lay off an unspecified number of employees, said Steel.

But like the new cities, the county, too, is in limbo about

finances and budget.

"We don't really know what will be our range of services," Hill said.

Regency Woods project approved

A King County hearing examiner has denied an appeal of the 491-unit Regency Woods apartment complex, giving the go-ahead to the project.

Hearing examiner Robert Titus denied an appeal from DIRE (Development Impact Resistance Exercise), a local land-use watchdog group that

had requested an environmental impact statement be prepared.

Titus stated in his decision that the project is not expected to adversely affect traffic and no environmental impact statement (EIS) is required.

The county already approved an adjacent Regency Woods single-family development of about 450 homes in 1986.

Another hearing examiner is requiring the developers of an adjacent 9-acre shopping center to complete an EIS before approval is given to the center.

DIRE appealed the shopping center also. DIRE's president, Debra Ertel, said she was frustrated and disappointed with Titus' decision allowing the apartment project to go ahead

without an EIS.

DIRE had appealed the apartments on the grounds that developers hadn't addressed traffic concerns and wouldn't be able to mitigate impacts on Federal Way's already overcrowded schools.

Titus rejected those

Confessions of a group of snoops

We confess. We're nosy. We don't like it when school board members meet behind closed doors in executive session, even though that is their right under certain circumstances.

We don't like it when authorities keep us so far away from an accident scene we can't tell what's going on, even though it might be for our own good as well as the safety of others.

Last week we didn't like it when we were barred from a session on contract services to which Federal Way City Council candidates were invited.

A private citizen picked up most of the tab and we were excluded at the request of one of the guest speakers, not the candidates, many of whom were surprised we were banned.

Although by all accounts the education-oriented session lacked the stuff of sensational headlines, we believe secrecy of any kind, however well-intentioned, breeds suspicion.

We believe city-related issues must be discussed openly if Federal Way citizens are to be supportive of their fledgling government.

Besides, we're nosy. You wouldn't want us any other way.

Team is compiling candidate calendar

The Federal Way First! Transition Team met Tuesday evening and two issues occupied most of the meeting. The first was compilation of a calendar of appearances and meetings for the candidates. We are having some difficulty planning meetings to discuss issues with the candidates when they have so many other activities scheduled.

We began to list events and they included the following activities: The workshops by the Association of Washington Cities are given every other Wednesday and will cover the city manager selection process, legal issues including city council responsibilities, and land use and community development. The series has covered municipal finance and contracting for services.

The Federal Way Chamber of Commerce sponsors debates between opposing candidates in a series presented every Thursday morning at 7:30 at the Educational Services Center.

The Federal Way Community Council has scheduled evening debates on Sept. 7 and Sept. 11.

The list is growing, and active campaigning has hardly started for most candidates.

Carolyn Hayek presented an impressive written report on projected court caseload, and reliance on district court versus establishment of a municipal court.

The other issue that we spent a lot of time discussing is how to provide the services of an interim city manager. The city council will be elected on Sept. 19, the election will be certified the end of the month, and the city council will want to get

started immediately to form the new city. They will have no office, no meetings scheduled, no agendas, no budget, they will be in a mess.

They will be looking for a city manager to hire at the time they most need one. If an experienced city manager could be available at least part time to handle the routine matters and offer advice on procedures and regulations, it would save a lot of "reinventing the wheel." The personnel committee has found that perhaps we can borrow a city manager from a neighboring city, and will lay the groundwork for this loan if the council decides to go this route.

We discussed again the need to legally incorporate as soon as possible for many reasons, some being the county inaction on road improvements, the explosive growth in Federal Way with lax county controls, and the need to have a government to act for the city since the county is considering cutting some services as early as the first of next 1990 budget. We discussed the transition team role in gathering information to aid the city council in drafting these budgets.

Watch this space to find out when we will meet next, and what we are doing.

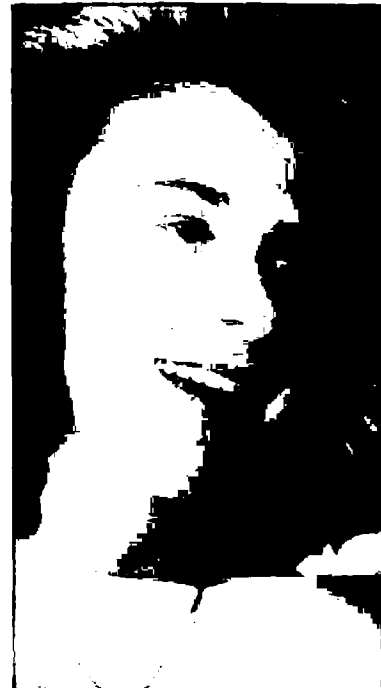

Metro hopes to fence crime out of park-and-ride lots

Metro survey.
Ironically, police in Burien say that crime is on the decrease in the Burien Park-and-Ride, and Federal Way police say that crimes in Federal Way park-and-rides isn't any more significant than in the other large parking lots.

Katie Horgan, crime analysis officer at the Burien precinct, said a program instituted in January makes it easier for police to give warnings and ar-

rest people loitering in areas around the park-and-ride.

Since then, police have given 25 warnings and arrested 10 to 12 repeat offenders, she said. Police have also increased the number of plainclothes patrol officers in that area, Horgan said.

"The kids know that at any given time there can be 10 to 12 people patrolling the area," she added.

"I think Metro is grasping at straws," said Dan Olson, who

had likened fencing the Burien Park-and-Ride to putting up the Berlin Wall. "I think they're trying to find an easy answer to appease customers."

OLSON, VICE president of Seafirst Bank and a former chamber of commerce president, said he's worried about the image a huge fenced area would give the Burien core. He also questions how effective a fence would be.

"Metro's going to have to do a

real sales job to convince me it's going to do any good," he adds.

Sally Mantz, manager of SeaTac Mall, which is across the street from the park 'n ride on South 320th Street, said she didn't think a fenced lot would affect the image of the mall.

"If it's going to protect the cars and the riders — by all means, I think it's a smart move for Metro," Mantz said.

Tull said she's sensitive to the concerns raised by Olson, and

plans to talk to members of the Southwest King County Chamber of Commerce about alternatives. It's possible Metro could fence three sides of the Burien lot, leaving the area facing Fourth Avenue SW open.

"We want to be good neighbors. We also want to reduce crime," she said.

The intensity of the business community's concerns will determine how Metro responds, said Federal Way resident Lon-

nie McLean, chairman of a security task force that recommended the fencing.

It's difficult to monitor a parking lot when kids can duck between cars and slip out of the lot at any point, he said.

"My idea is that if society goes the way it does — the problem will probably get worse," McLean said. "If it gets any worse — it will affect their business too," he said, referring to Burien merchants.

Vandals shooting at vehicles, homes

King County police are seeking help from anyone who may have witnessed one of several recent shooting incidents in which homes and cars have had windows shot out.

Precinct 5 (Federal Way) police have received 10 complaints of such vandalism since July 11, including a man who was hit by a BB pellet while driving his car.

None of the victims have seen the culprit or culprits who have been shooting at houses and cars. In some instances the weapons used have been larger-caliber guns, and in others, pellets or BBs. One home-owner found a marble beneath a broken front window.

So far, no one has been hit or injured, said Lt. Max Osburn, but that could change. Most of the incidents have occurred at night. Vandals have hit all over Federal Way, but the Marine Hills area has been hit harder than most. Half of the incidents reported were in or near Marine Hills.

In some of the shootings, it appeared the shots were fired from the road, possibly from a passing car. But in a July 11 shooting, a resident believes whoever shot a gun into his home might have done so from a barked area beneath a window. He found signs someone had been moving around in that area, reports said.

"We'd like to catch whoever's doing this, and we could use some help," Osburn said.

Anyone who has any information regarding the vandalism is asked to call Precinct 5 detectives at 296-2726.

Teen-ager reports sex attack by pal

A 14-year-old Federal Way boy told police he was sexually assaulted by a friend while staying overnight at his house.

King County police report the boy was staying overnight with a 15-year-old friend Tuesday, and that they had been drinking. When they went to bed, he told police, his friend initiated sexual contact and tried to force him into having sex. The younger boy struggled and resisted the other boy and broke free.

The boy then called home and his father retrieved him. The younger boy was taken to St. Francis Community Hospital for an exam, and the other boy was taken to the county youth detention center and booked for investigation of rape.

Car lot cars lose tires and stereos

Someone broke into a local car lot and stole the tires off two cars and the stereos out of several others.

King County police report someone entered the lot at Jet Chevrolet after closing Wednesday and disabled seven cars while stealing tires and electronic equipment. The two cars that lost their tires were left propped up on milk crates the thieves must have brought along, police said.

Several cars had windows broken and damage totaled more than \$5,000.

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Ertel debates, but Asbury is absent

Thursday's weekly Federal Way City Council candidate's debate was more of a speech than a debate.

Position 3 candidate Georgene "Jo" Asbury was absent, citing a "family emergency."

However, Position 3 candidate Debra Ertel responded to questions from a chamber of commerce panel. The chamber is sponsoring the debates.

Ertel, 41, is a 14-year resident of Federal Way and has been active in community issues for about 12 years. She is a founder of DIRE (Development Impact Resistance Exercise), a group

set up to monitor land-use issues.

Ertel said people regard her as a community expert and she has several ideas to control growth and related concerns such as traffic and Federal Way's need for parks.

One plan would be to require developers to contribute to a park fund as a mitigating measure for construction projects, she said.

"I'd like to see Federal Way require a contribution made to acquire parks," Ertel said. Another option would be to have developers acquire vacant lots adjacent to their projects that

could be turned into "pocket parks."

Federal Way needs to create its own development mitigation policy, she said, so that developers know what they're going to have to pay up front and so the city makes sure parks, roads and other facilities are in place.

Roads and transportation are one of the new city's most important priorities, she said.

"Transportation is critical," Ertel told the group of 30 chamber members and residents. "It's not going to cost much. It's mostly going to be coordination."

Ertel is active in a number of community groups and said she would have to give up some of her memberships to concentrate on the city council.

Ertel stomped the opposition in the May 16 primary election with 3,499 votes compared to Asbury's 759 votes.

Ertel works as a production analyst for Robinson Publishing. She is a single mother with a 14-year-old daughter.

Asbury, 54, is a secretary at Puget Power. She is married with two children. She has lived in Federal Way for 22 years.

PROGRESS on the pool, which will host the aquatics events here, is moving along swimmingly, organizers say. Joseph Borden, director of planning and construction for the SOC, said the roof of the pool building is nearly finished and the pouring of the swimming and diving pools is almost com-

plete. He said the building's exterior will be finished within the next few weeks.

Progress also is being made in acquiring the estimated \$32 million needed for security during the Games. Athletes from more than 50 nations have been invited, and money to protect them has been coming — slowly — from state and federal

sources, Sears said.

The SOC has secured \$5 million in federal funding and \$3.5 million from the state Legislature. The U.S. House and Senate Armed Services subcommittees have approved the appropriation of another \$14.6 million. The SOC will seek the remaining \$9 million from the Legislature next session, Sears

said.

come up with \$25,000 or \$50,000 per city to help them with initial expenses.

BEYOND THAT, Swisher would like to see the Legislature make provisions to help other new cities that come along.

He suggested legislation that

would give new cities a certain amount of money per capita.

State Rep. Lorraine Hine (D-33rd) said she thinks the concept is a good idea.

"We're partners with the local governments," she said. "We are in the business of serving the same constituents."

She said there's money coming from the state that the cities would get anyway, including liquor taxes and liquor store revenue, along with other state shared money.

An advance on those funds would probably be appropriate, she said.

Dick Milne, Gardner's press

aide, said it's too soon to tell if the governor's emergency fund would be the right place to get the money.

"We're certainly not discouraging their request," he said. "If it's in the form of a loan, we would have no problem with that."

arguments, stating traffic concerns had been addressed and there are no provisions in state law requiring developers to address school impacts.

Ertel said she understood Titus' decision is based in law,

but said it's frustrating that the county continues to refuse to address major issues, such as school overcrowding.

"Our problem has been with the system, not necessarily with the developer," Ertel said. "King County never gets around

to adopting the laws they need to mitigate development."

Regency Woods is a mammoth, 228-acre development owned by several different groups of investors. The property is east of Interstate 5 and is bordered by Enchanted Parkway and the town of Milton.

The apartment project is being developed by Intermark Design Group of San Francisco. Construction on the project is expected to begin in early 1990.

Ertel said DIRE will meet with a lawyer next week to decide if it will appeal Titus' decision to King County Superior Court.

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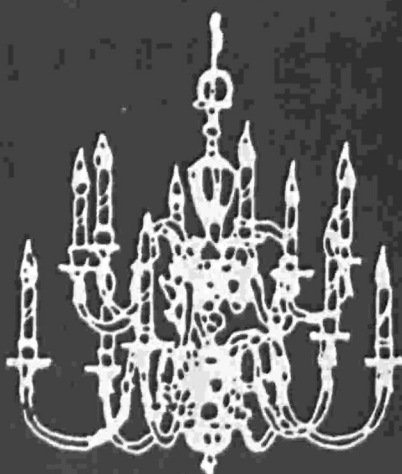
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Salute to vets opens Waterland

"For those who fought for freedom, freedom has a flavor that the protected will never know."

A popular saying among veterans.

Not a day goes by that Ben Giddings doesn't remember his comrades from the Korean War. As members of the 23rd Infantry Division, Giddings says they accounted for 25 percent of all casualties on each side of the war.

"We were in the thick of it all the time. It's important that their death wasn't in vain," he says.

In the official opening of the 30th annual Waterland Festival, the city of Des Moines and King County will rededicate the flag triangle on Des Moines Memorial Drive to veterans like Giddings.

The dedication will take place Wednesday, July 26 at 10:20 a.m. at the triangle, located just north of the Des Moines city limits.

"THERE SHOULD be things like that so people can keep a constant reminder of the sacrifices that veterans made to their freedom," Giddings says.

Giddings, past commander of a center for veterans in Federal Way, and the late Jim Kennelly came up with the idea to put the triangle there in the first place. That was three years ago.

It was originally dedicated as part of Burien's Honor America Celebration.

The city and county decided to hold a special ceremony to rededicate the triangle to veterans because Des Moines will assume maintenance of the site from the county.

Plans call for a plaque to be erected and for flowers and small shrubs to be planted.

"We're doing it to honor veterans and beautify the entrance to our downtown," says Bob Olander, Des Moines' assistant city manager.

The city originally planned to rededicate the triangle last month, on Flag Day. It was first dedicated on June 14, 1986.

TIME CONSTRAINTS forced the city to bump the date to July.

"We decided we'd do it at the next major event, and that was Waterland," Olander says.

Sherm Bailey, an aide to King County Councilman Paul Barden, said Des Moines officials asked the county if the city could assume maintenance of the site.

"There was a little problem with landscaping there and water," he says. "Des Moines wanted to take over the site, even though it's in King County, because they wanted to beautify it."

To Dick Whipple, who served in the Tonkin Gulf in Vietnam,

the triangle should mean as much to non-veterans as those who served in overseas wars.

"I fly the flag every day at my house," he says. "I fought for the people in the United States to be able to worship the flag. Every individual who served overseas fought like hell to de-

fend that flag."

King County Councilman Paul Barden and Mayor Pat DeBlasio will give speeches. Ruby Lea DeBlasio will emcee the event.

Trumpeter Philip Minami will provide music. Les Chopard, a member of the pastoral staff at Des Moines Gospel Chapel, will

close the ceremony with a call for God's blessing.

"Something like this keeps the public aware that war is not the way to go," says Larry Watson, co-director of the festival and a World War II vet. "We want to make sure a world war doesn't happen again."

Bunco pair takes woman for \$2,500 in switch scam

A retired Federal Way woman fell for a scam police call the Jamaican Switch Thursday and lost \$2,500.

The woman told King County police she was leaving a store at SeaTac mall when she stopped to help a woman who said she had found \$40,000, and showed her a parcel that looked as if it contained a large amount of cash.

The scam usually involves two bunco artists, one pretending to find the money, the other pretending to be another innocent bystander who happens upon the scene.

In this instance, the major player told the victim and her accomplice that she would share her find with them if they would help her. She said she needed \$2,500 from each to show good

faith. In return, she promised each \$13,000.

The scammers then went with the victim to one bank, where the second player pretended to go inside and make a withdrawal. She returned with an envelope that appeared to contain cash, and gave it to the woman who claimed to have found the \$40,000.

They then accompanied the victim to her bank, where she actually did withdraw \$2,500 and handed it over to the woman.

The major player then said she wanted to take her to the store where she works and ask her boss if he thought it was good money and not counterfeit. They drove to an undisclosed store in Federal Way and the woman disappeared inside for a moment.

Upon her return to the car the woman told the victim she should go inside and upstairs to the office to talk to the male store manager. The victim said she went inside, but found no male store manager. When she went back outside, the other two women were gone, along with her \$2,500.

The ruse is an old and fairly common one, said Steve Davis, King County Fraud Unit sergeant.

"The main motivator here is greed," he said. "The thing to keep in mind is, if somebody approaches you with an idea that sounds too good to be true, it probably is. And ask yourself, why would somebody involve me?"

Davis said con artists who practice this scam usually prey on the elderly. If an honest person found a sum of money that large, they most likely would turn it in. If no one claimed it, the finder would be eligible to keep it, anyway, he said.

The suspects are described as black, one in her late 20s, 5 feet 4 inches tall with a slender build. She has short hair and wore large earrings. Her accomplice, the woman who pretended to be a bystander, is 35-37, 5 feet 3 inches tall and weighing 150 pounds. She wore dark glasses. Both women were well-dressed.

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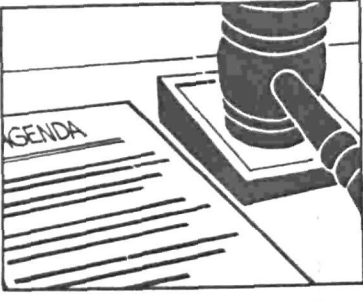

Teacher talks include stipends

Stipends for school coaches and music teachers are now being discussed in negotiations between the Federal Way School District and the local teachers' union.

The stipends and a district-wide salary schedule are the only two items to be covered in this year's talks, said Bill Hansen, president of the Federal Way Education Association.

Negotiators will use the results of a committee study of district stipends to decide next year's pay for coaches and music teachers, Hansen said. The salary schedule will be somewhat revamped, too, with pay plans adjusted to fit a district model.

Hansen said he foresees little

problem with completing talks before school starts in early September.

Teachers are now working on the second year of a three-year contract. Class size can be negotiated next year, and the entire contract is open for negotiation the year after that.

Patrol fizzled fireworks

Officials of Fire District 39 (Federal Way) claim a fireworks emphasis patrol, combined with overcast skies, resulted in the quietest Fourth of July here in years.

The fire department received only 16 fireworks-related calls after fireworks went on sale in the community. Loss attributed to fireworks so far is \$570.

That's quieter than the past two years, which in turn were quieter than most years before. Thirty-six alarms were raised in 1988 for a \$1,740 total loss, and 27 alarms were raised in 1987 for a \$123,485 loss.

Firefighters this year studied fireworks-related incidents of the past, plotting their size and location, and patrolled those areas where problems were most numerous. Fire officials report that about 220 people were warned about fireworks safety on those patrols.

The holiday report also notes that Jumping Jacks, which are legal fireworks, were responsible for nine of the 16 calls this year, and that \$150 of the \$570 damages were caused by a flaming firework flying into an automobile where other fireworks were stored.

Carpenters OK contract

Although King County carpenters rejected a recent contract proposed by Associated General Contractors, about 60 percent of the state's carpenters gave it the nod in a recent labor vote.

The contract approval ended a week-long strike that resulted in pickets at six Federal Way schools now under construction.

The carpenters approved a

three-year contract, with pay and benefit increase of \$2.51 an hour for the duration of the contract. The carpenters were asking for \$3.45 for those three years.

School district officials say the strike should have little effect on modernization at most schools, although it slowed work at Lake Grove and Twin Lakes elementary schools, and Thomas Jefferson High School.

Friends rejoice at pilot's survival

Instead, he ended up in a hospital after guiding his crippled DC-10 to a landing in a cornfield next to the airport in Sioux City, Iowa.

Haynes, a Bow Lake resident, is credited with helping save the lives of 174 people who survived the crash of United Airlines DC-10.

Another 119 are either dead or unaccounted for after the Wednesday crash.

Haynes, a 33-year veteran pilot at United, brought the plane nearly 70 miles to Sioux Gateway Airport after losing all hydraulic control systems.

He could only turn the plane to the right after the tail cone tore loose and plummeted into a cornfield.

WELTE SAID Haynes was suffering mostly from bruises. Reports have said he suffered lacerations behind his ears and to his foot and face.

"As far as his other injuries, we're just watching and monitoring him," Welte said.

Haynes, a long-time Bow Lake resident, is the state umpire consultant for Little League.

He's been active with Highline East Little League for years, said Barbara Hacker, publicity coordinator for District 7 Little League.

News of the crash spread quickly Wednesday at the District All-Star tournament. Bill Miyao, one of Haynes' close friends, said his wife came to the field with the news.

Miyao said at first the news was that the plane had crashed

in a ball of fire. The word came later that Haynes survived with minimal injuries.

MIYAO SAID Haynes had talked before about the possibility of a plane crash.

"It's one of those typical things," Miyao said. "You don't think it can happen to someone you know."

"When it does, it's still hits you as a shock, because you don't think it could happen," he said.

Miyao said Haynes was involved in Little League "for the kids."

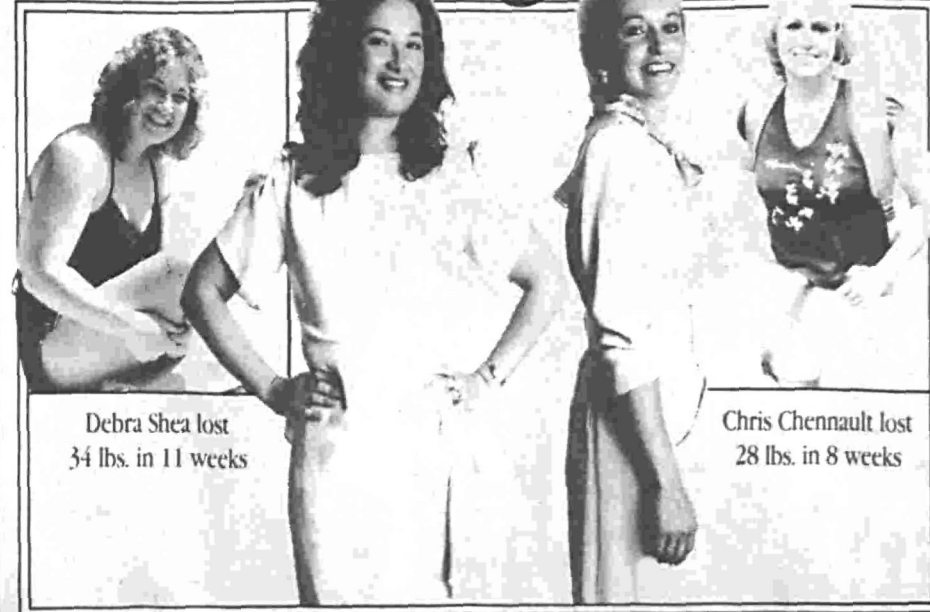
Lee Pietron, another Little League umpire, said he's watched TV coverage of the crash "10-15 times."

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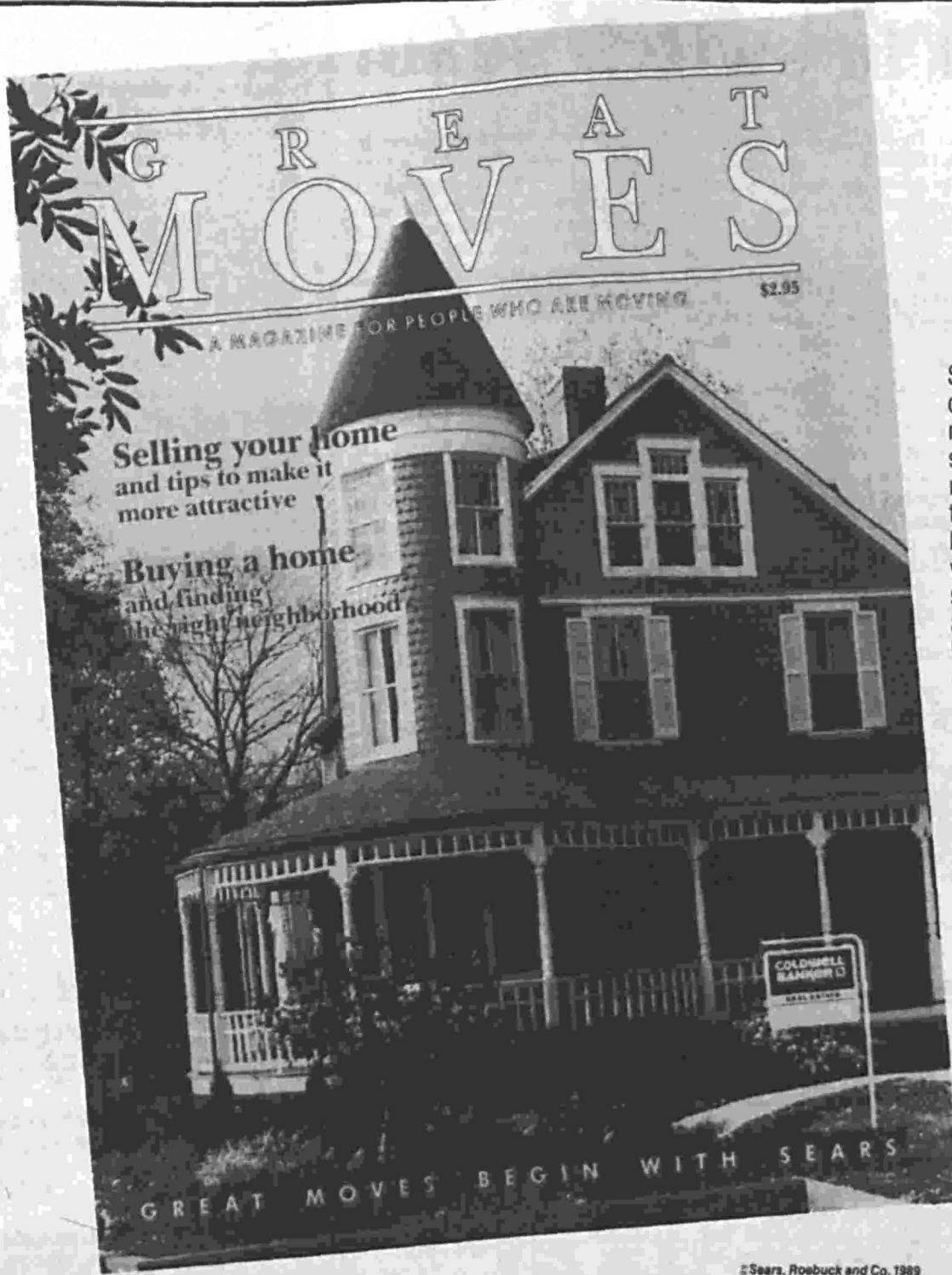

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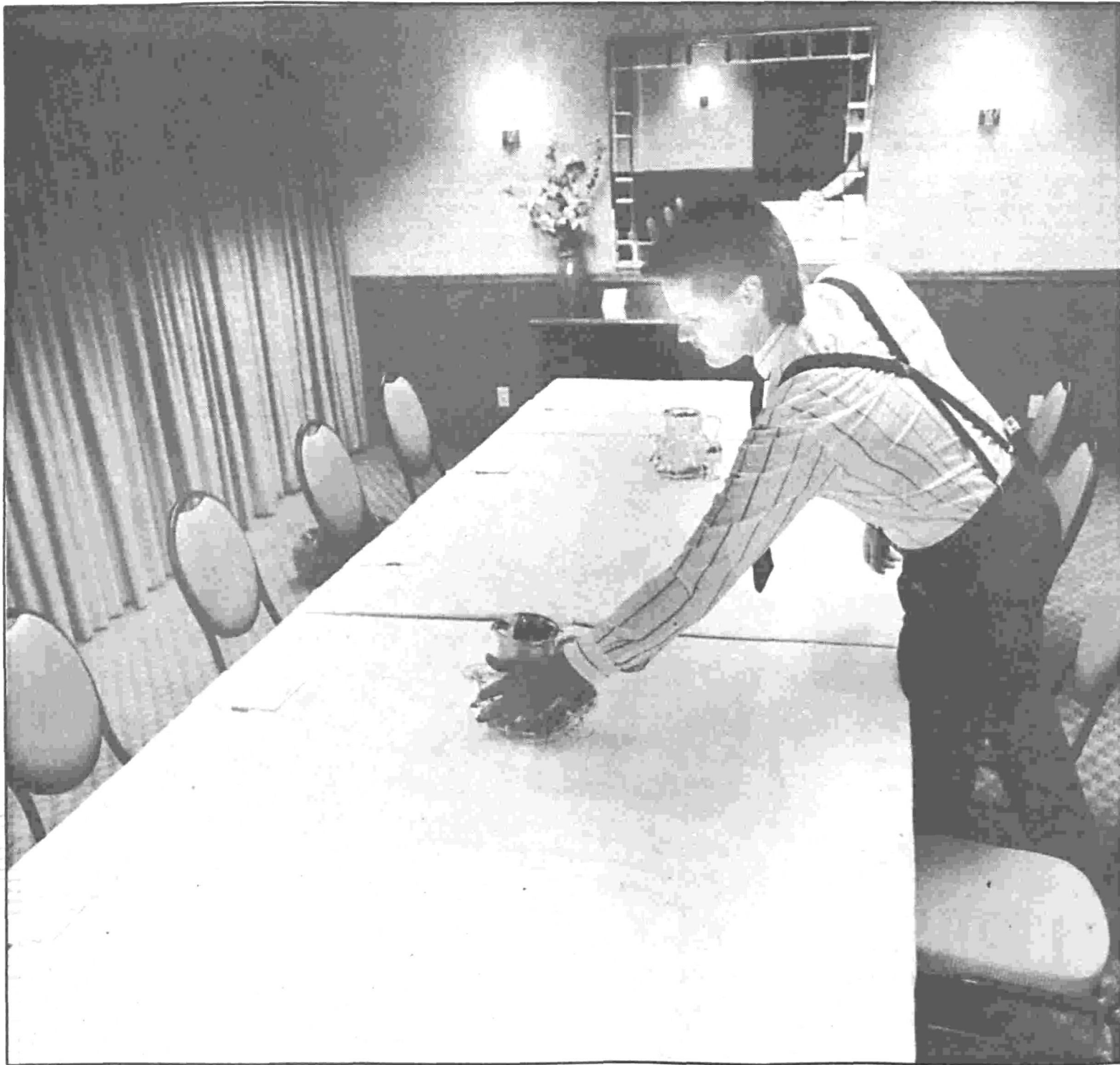

Speech students take state honors

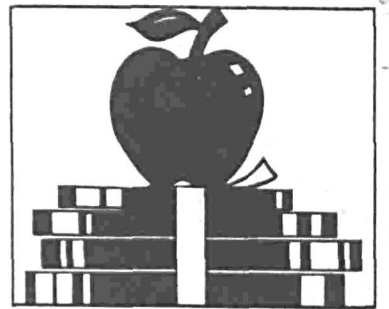
Four Federal Way High School students recently participated in national speech competition, and two of those four earned national standings at that contest.

Meetings make big business

From huge to humble, Sea-Tac establishments are hanging out their shingles.

Their commodity is something almost anyone with extra space can sell — meeting space.

"Even with all the hotels, there's a real shortage for meeting space, especially for something moderately priced," says Roy Moore, who recently opened the Sea-Tac Airport Conference Center.

The conference center is housed in the 53-year-old red brick Angle Lake Elementary School building.

True, it doesn't have a cocktail lounge, says Moore, who is leasing the building from the Highline School District.

But it does have nine rooms that are ideal for classroom-style seminars, he says. The real selling point of the center is its proximity to Sea-Tac Airport, Moore adds.

So far, he's rented the space — which costs about \$3 per person per meeting — to computer classes and real estate schools. A recent marketing survey of 1,000 organizations resulted in requests for more information from 700 of them, Moore says.

OTHERS ARE getting into the act, too. According to a recent survey done by the Southwest King County Chamber of Commerce, the Sea-Tac and Tukwila areas have meeting space available for more than 26,000 people.

When Susan Seachris and Patricia Gardner converted an apartment building in Tukwila into Towne & Country Suites, they turned the manager's unit into 1,000-square feet of meeting rooms.

The partners were thinking of ways to market the hotel to corporate travelers, rather than a create a revenue maker.

"I see it more as an amenity than a money-making entity," explains Gardner.

But to the big hotels in the area, meeting rooms are what bring in the income when tourist traffic is slow.

"It's our bread and butter," Jim Myers, director of marketing at the Red Lion, says of conventions and seminars.

The Red Lion can accommodate groups of up to 1,000 comfortably. Renting space there can range from \$150 to \$3,000, depending on the number of people, the day of the week and whether food and beverages are ordered, Myers says.

Convention-goers account for 45 percent of the guest room business at the 850-room hotel, Myers says.

ROUGHLY A QUARTER of a million convention delegates pass through the Sea-Tac Red Lion's doors every year. It's a growing business, too, he adds.

"The Northwest is becoming a first choice destination for national associations and regional as well as national corporations," Myers says.

John Beltz, director of sales at the Sea-Tac Marriott, echoes Myers' remarks.

The Marriott has 16,000-square feet of meeting room space, including three ballrooms. Its meeting rooms are booked about 50 percent of the time, Beltz says.

Having the airport so close by is a wonderful asset, because corporate travelers want to fly in, go to their meeting and fly out, he says.

From February through mid-May, the hotel gets a lot of business from corporate travelers and association conventions, Beltz says. During the summer months, the corporate bookings drop off. Social events, such as wedding receptions and high school and military reunions, fill up the rooms, Beltz says.

Rod Healea, director of catering at the Doubletree Inn and Suites, says he notices an increase of corporate meetings again in the fall. December is a busy time due to company Christmas parties. January

through March is a busy time again because many companies are doing annual forecasts and writing budgets, Healea says.

Besides the hotels, the airport also has meeting space available.

"IT'S SURPRISING how many people fly into the city, do business and go home because they don't want to pay for a hotel room," says Rosie Courtney, a community relations officer for the Port of Seattle.

Port customers doing international trading can use a meeting room in the World Trade Center in the airport's main terminal.

Host International also rents out two conference rooms and an auditorium for the port.

The rooms are used mostly by

government agencies and lawyers flying into town to get a deposition, says Judy Matthews, catering coordinator for Host.

"But we're trying to get more private business people," she adds. "A lot of people just don't know we have the space."

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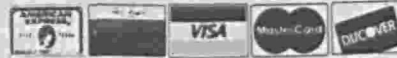

Young ump's are big hit behind the plate

It is not unusual to see umpires stick together like brothers. It is unusual to see brothers stick together as umpires.

That has been the case for Donnie and Blake Roberts for much of this season, as the two Federal Way brothers in blue often have found themselves making calls on the same Little League diamond.

The 19- and 15-year-old siblings have been working the District 10 Little League All-Star tournament in White Center this past week after completing a busy regular season that found them rotating around to such Little League charters as Foster, Soundview and Federal Way American.

Auburn League president Dan Irwin calls them "two of the best young umpires around."

District 10 softball umpire consultant John Livie, who has been filling in as baseball consultant at the District 10 tournament, said that Donnie and Blake "are the only brother team that I know of" and Livie has been working with District 10 for some 10 years.

In addition to umping today's District 10 Little League championship game at White Center, Donnie also has been selected for the state crew that will umpire the state Little League tournament in Kennewick on Aug. 1 and the Senior Little League state tournament in Vancouver, Wa., which begins tomorrow.

"I'm one of the youngest, if not the youngest, to be going to state" as an umpire, said Donnie, a 1988 graduate of Thomas Jefferson.

BUT BEING THE youngest can have its drawbacks, said Donnie, explaining there have been times when he found himself just a few years older than the players themselves.

Each league sets its own age requirements for umpires. Donnie and Blake were both 13 when they started with Steel Lake.

"Sometimes that's a hindrance," said Donnie of being the youngest umpire on the field. "You get older guys coaching who won't try to argue or question as much as on a younger person."

Donnie isn't one to let the older coaches in-

fluence his calls, though.

"I will not take crap from coaches," he said.

"That's literally what it is."

Because of his occasional quick thumb, Donnie has earned a few nicknames, such as the "Ax-man" for kicking coaches out of games.

"I think coaches think they can argue with younger kids and get their way more than they can with older guys," Donnie said.

IN TUESDAY'S District 7 game at Highline East, Donnie found himself trying to stay in the game mentally as it went on for 2½ hours before the final out.

As the high-scoring, drawn-out game wore on, Donnie said he found himself thinking, "When's it going to get over? You try to think of stuff to do just to keep your head in the game."

Some games go fast and some go slow.

"You take the good with the bad and the bad

with the good and it will balance out in the long run," he said.

Blake, on the other hand, found himself in the thick of the action at third base, making a series of close calls.

His number one concern at the time: "Please don't have a coach on my tail."

"Blake's done well," said Livie. "He's a young umpire, but he's always asking questions and he's always willing to learn. That's the best you can hope for."

Inevitably, people disagree with some calls. Blake cited a recent Kent Parks Department game, where a parent told him and his partner "that was the lousiest umpired game I've ever seen."

When that happens, Blake said, he tries to ignore them.

"If you know you've done your job, their opi-

nions are just opinions" said Blake, who will be a sophomore at Jefferson in the fall.

Spectators are not the only people to sometimes question a call. Donnie and Blake's mother, Elaine, has helped her sons develop their game during discussions on the way home from games.

"We have our own little critique session in the car," said Elaine, who is the safety director for District 10.

UMPIRES MUST try to remain calm at all times and always show composure.

"The toughest part is to keep your head in the game," said Donnie. "If you lose your head, you don't want it showing on the field. You always want to look your best out there. You don't want to look like you're not concentrating."

"We have a lot of communication. On different situations we have to rotate. We do a lot of communication back and forth. That gives you something to do."

The umpires must work as a unit when they're on the field.

"Whenever we go out there, we have to be a team," said Blake. "If one person does not think in a team way, the whole team will fail."

Little League ump's don't get paid, but at least one of the Roberts brothers hopes all the hard work will pay off later. Donnie, who will have worked some 85 to 90 games by the end of the season, is planning to attend Joe Brinkman's umpire camp in Florida in the winter. He would like to be a professional umpire one day.

BLAKE, WHO will have umpired between 75 and 80 games at the end of the season, hasn't decided whether he wants to pursue calling balls and strikes beyond the Little League level.

But both are enjoying District 10 Little League tournament action at White Center. They get great pleasure out of seeing the excitement among the players.

"Once they see those lights turn on, it's like Yankee Stadium, the 1978 World Series," said Donnie. "You can just see the adrenalin flowing out there."
