## City-grant proposal described

King County Councilman Paul Barden is sending all Federal Way and Sea-Tac city council candidates a letter outlining his proposal for county-funded grants to the new cities during their start-up periods.

Barden introduced the proposal at a June 25 county council retreat on new city policies. It offers the new cities as much as \$500,000 to defray costs of setting

up municipal governments. Barden said the letter should clear up any misunderstandings about his proposal. He maintained that "inaccurate media reports" have distorted the candidates' perceptions of the plan.

"THIS TRANSITION is just too important — for all the peo-ple who live in those new cities - for things to be undermined because of misinformation," he

Barden declined to give this newspaper a copy of the letter, which was scheduled to be mailed to candidates on Friday.

He added that the letter should help turn around what he sees as a growing confrontational atmosphere between the new cities and the county.

In addition, Barden is introducing a measure in the King County Council tomorrow that

## School bosses retreat for look at year ahead

About 70 Federal Way School District administrators, principals, assistant principals and board members will descend on the tiny town of Union, Wash., this week.

It won't be a rumble. It will be the annual districtwide retreat, held each year before the start

School board members will

stay at the Alderbrook Inn at Union on Monday and early Tuesday. School district administrators will arrive at the same hotel Tuesday morning and stay through Wednesday.

Each year, the retreats offer a chance to hone in on the year ahead and study issues that might not get the time and attention they deserve when school is in session, said Judy Wall, com-

the 1990 Goodwill Games.

munications director for the district.

"It also gives new (employees) an opportunity to work with us and stay with us, because they become part of the administration this way," she said. "Normally, it takes a long time to get into the (school) system."

This year's administrative retreat will cost the school district \$60 per administrator, or \$4,200 total for the two-day stay. About \$3,500 of that will pay for guest speakers at the retreat. Wall said.

That bill is about 1 percent of the school district's budget for staff development, Wall added. The remainder is spent on classes and workshops for teachers and district

The school board retreat will cost \$514 for meals, snacks and lodging.

RETREATS were once held at Highline Community College in Midway, Wall said, but it was far too easy to get back to work from there.

"It was so close, secretaries were calling up with messages, and people were running back to take care of business."

The Alderbrook Inn on Hood Canal is far enough away to prevent that. And now, daily business phone calls are prohibited. Spouses of school administrators and board members are likewise kept

## Police needed time to make drug bust

Police did not believe lives were in danger Wednesday when they chose not to evacuate a local motel for several hours after learning of an illegal drug lab in one of its rooms.

King County Drug Enforcement detectives also feared that a mass evacuation of the Super 8 Motel would alert those running the methamphetamine (speed) lab and spoil any chance of making an arrest, said Det. Mark

Orendorff. Prior knowledge of the man "cooking" the drugs helped police make their decision, Orendorff said. The man in question, a 31-year-old Federal Way resident, is well-known to narcotics officers, and has been arrested several times for manufacturing drugs.

Police are familiar with the way the man makes methamphetamine, and were certain he uses a less dangerous chemical, red phosphorous, instead of the more volatile ether, Orendorff said. They also believe the man

is an experienced "cooker," and knows what he is doing, he add-

POLICE WERE called around 2 p.m. after the motel manager smelled a strange odor coming from a ground-floor room and investigated, Orendorff said. She entered the empty room after knocking, and saw signs of a drug lab.

Patrol officers who responded to her 9-1-1 call also smelled an unusual odor, and the drug unit was called.

The delay between when police were called and when the motel was evacuated at 6:30 p.m. was caused by a combination of police decisions and the lengthy search-warrant procedure, Orendorff said. Also, he added, no one was in the room until after 3 p.m.

Police were anxious to wait and arrest the man and his accomplices and make a case that will hold up in court. Because the man has been arrested

## Quick fixes won't solve problems

Recently, candidates for Federal Way City Council have taken stands regarding a moratorium for multifamily

Interestingly, Bill Shortt in Position 1 made a 180-degree switch from his antimoratorium position in the pro-moratorium primary to a position now. He justified the switch on the basis of listening to the people out there in doorbell-

Mary Gates has since 1984 spoken out against too much multifamily housing without the requirement of having services like roads, schools and parks in place to make the impact of multifamily upon the community less painful. She knew during the primary that the issue of concern is managing all development and has taken that position both then and now.

I have four observations: 1) Will Bill Shortt flipflop again? If elected could you really trust what positions he has?

2) Do you wonder about his motives for making the switch? Aren't we all fed up with development occurring here without the services such as transportation, landscape buffering, attention to impact on the schools, etc.? Is he playing on that disgust for development by offering you a quick fix with lots of voter appeal - in other words, has he pondered, "What do I need to say to get elected?"

3) Moratoriums do not deal with the problem, they postpone the problem. In anticipation of the moratorium talk, many complexes have been built these past two years to "beat the moratorium." Moratoriums are a taking of private property. If they are permanent, the new city would have to pay the owner compensation for the limitations placed on what could be built on that property - the classic downzone is costly for any duration. If the moratorium is not long, the problem of multifamily remains.

4) Mary Gates supports an amended zoning document with particular concentration on mitigation measures which means that developers pay for the impact of their developments providing roads, schools, parks. She has long been an advocate of promitigation which is consistent with much of the work being done by

Advantages of mitigation:

1) The King County Comprehensive Plan states on page

127, "King County government has the responsibility and the authority to assure that adequate facilities and services are available or can be made available to support planned growth. F-106 Individual developments should provide all on-site improvements needed to meet adopted service standards for roads, sewage disposal, water supply, surface water management, fire flow, public transit, neighborhood parks, and open space." This and other areas of the document confirm that it is legal and expected to have development pay for development. As a city, we can also assure enforcement of that requirement that development pay its fair share.

2) The city can move to enforce the requirements on the books and add additional ones via amendment which can be done in a more timely fashion than writing a whole new plan a timely and important job that should be done but without a

time crunch. 3) Mitigation costs you less. Moratoriums on multifamily will result in higher rents, lawsuits and legal council result from questionable land use practices like this and cost plen-

4) Mitigation doesn't dump multifamily into unincorporated areas surrounding the city. This is bound to occur as a knee-jerk reaction to multifamily moratorium. The traffic coming from those developments will still impact the streets, parks, schools. If we annex those areas in the future, we get all that multifamily too.

Who takes the more experience-oriented, thoughtful, less quick fix, less narrow in scope, more realistic position? Mary Gates does as she advocates making growth pay for growth to secure a quality com-

This has been her position during the 21/2 years she spent on the Federal Way Community Plan Update Advisory Committee 1984-86, it was her position in the primary, and it is her position

I know where she stands, I appreciate the complexity of this issue and am not swayed by quick fix electioneering, and I will vote for her in Position 1 on

## Retreat provides steady study time

the Washington State School Directors' Association, said that organization strongly recommends school boards go on retreat at least once a year.

"'It's an excellent idea. Sometimes we need to take ourselves out of the day-to-day, nitty-gritty operations of the school district, where we can't go back to our desks or answer the phone. Then we can do some bigger planning," said Lundsgaard, a former Federal Way board member. "It helps to think more creatively, too, when you're not distracted by the ever-ringing phone." The school board takes a varying number of retreats per year. The last was in spring, when the group studied goals and reviewed the performance of Superintendent Richard Harris.

THIS YEAR, the school board has about two dozen items on its agenda, including levy planning, budget work and close-up looks at magnet schools, enrollment and growth, technology in education and the expansion of school science programs.

The board also will stay long enough to work with assistant superintendents this year, said board member Gail Pierson.

"It's important not only that we know the administrators, but that they know us and they know a little bit of from whence decisions come and what's behind them," Pierson said.

Guest speakers at the administrators' retreat this week include Judith Billings, Superintendent of Public Instruction, and Drs. Allen Cohn and Wil Roy, both researchers of student success and learning. Cohn will speak about reaching all students and Roy will address the use of humor in instruction and leadership.

Administrators also will look at student equity as well as various department goals.

And Wall said they will study under sunny skies, at no extra

sets up a timeline for negotiating the grants, as well as the interlocal agreements that will keep county services flowing during the transition period.

UNDER THAT MEASURE, the county would give the new cities \$100,000 each to pay for incorporation start-up costs. The money would be offered after the new city councils are elected on Sept. 19, 1989.

The county also would make

available another \$500,000 during 1990, money the cities could use to defray the costs of

operating a new government.
In addition, the measure sets up a process for negotiating contracts between the cities and the county to provide county ser-

The proposal assumes that the county will contine delivering basic services to the new cities, and will continue collecting taxes that otherwise would transfer to the new cities following the incorporation.

TURNER HAS clipped logos into four heads of hair so far, all young men from Pierce County. And she has even more customers waiting to pay \$25 for the haircut-and-dye treatment

The stylist said young customers started requesting the cut a few weeks ago, in the wake of record crowds lining up for "Batman," the movie.

Based on their descriptions of the eccentric style, she shopped for Batman paraphernalia, picked up some stencil material and last weekend created an outline for the Batman

Her first bat-do was done Monday on a Sumner boy. Turner says the logo has improved as she has worked on the heads of Donovan Sommer, 16, of Edgewood, Brad Walp, 15, also of Edgewood, and Gorton of Graham.

AS MUCH AS SHE admires her own handiwork, however, Turner is philisophical about the whimsical trim.

"I figure, to each their own. I'd kill the kid if he was mine, but they love the results," she said with a laugh.

The boys sporting the bat-dos admit their own parents are less than enthused.

"My stepmom said I owe her one, 'cause dad's not exactly happy," said Sommers.

THE BIRTH OF A bat-do takes about two hours, starting with a buzz-cut (usually on the back of the head) and continuing with the bleaching of a circular background (the yellow part of the official logo).

The unbleached bat design inside is then tinted black. The result is a somewhat fuzzy bat, stretched to about 5 inches across the back of the head. Turner figures that with some trimming and touch-up, she can keep the same bat going for two or three months.

'It'll just get a little furry," she said. Which could change the classic D.A. into a (ahem) B.A. By the way, what does one wear with a bat-do? "A cape and tights?" Gorton speculated.

## Trio of escapees back behind bars

A King County Jail escapee who eluded King County police in Federal Way last week was captured Monday in northeast Seattle.

James A. Justice, 25, was the last of three July 22 jail escapees to be returned to jail. Timothy McHugh, 23, was arrested Sunday in Tukwila and Ramon Martinez Rodriguez, 37, was arrested just hours after

Justice was arrested by Seattle police after officers received a tip about his whereabouts, said Don Church, public information officer. An officer spotted a truck matching a description given police in the 6500 block of 28th Avenue Northeast, and stopped the vehicle. Justice was a passenger in the truck and presented a fake identification, but a photo montage proved to arresting officers who he was, Church said.

On July 26, Justice had led King County police on a short chase through Camelot Square Mobile Home Park. Two of his companions, who were not escapees, were apprehended, but Justice escaped.

All three escapees were returned to the King County Jail and charged in King County Superior Court with escape.

## Citizens monitor speeders

King County police will begin recruiting citizens in the next few months to operate a traffic speed control measure approved by the King County Council on

Under the new system, the citizen volunteers will be issued radar equipment to monitor the speed of motorists as they travel through selected areas of the county. The speeds will then be flashed on readerboards that are visible to the traffic.

The volunteers could not issue citations to those exceeding the speed limit, but they could give out warnings.

The measure also asks the King County Sheriff to report to the council by Feb., 1990, on the effectiveness of the program, and to give the council his recommendations on whether it should continue.

## Cruisers beware

Officials at King County's Precinct 5 plan to ask the King County Council to declare the SeaTac Mall and possibly two other shopping centers nocruising areas.

The council recently gave police that power by passing a no-cruising ordinance for unincorporated King County. Police must designate a no-cruising area, and the council must approve it, before the ordinance can be enforced.

Lt. Max Osburn, Precinct 5, said the exact perimeters of the no-cruising area have not been determined, but cruisers can expect to be banned from the mall. He said he also will

recommend SeaTac Village and Gateway Center be included in the no-cruising area.

Any proposition to be placed before the council is a couple of months down the road, Osburn added, because police want to consult with local businesses and residents before making a final determination.

The ordinance was spurred by weekend evening cruising at the mall and nearby Burger King by upwards of 250 cars at a time. Merchants complained of vandalism, noise, traffic congestion and lost business because of the popular past-

Salnikov toured the pool with SOC and chamber officials and gave a brief, softspoken speech above the construction clamor at the pool.

Salnikov, 29, will be at the Games in a coaching capacity, having retired after a long and record-filled career as a swimmer. He was unbeaten in 1,500meter freestyle competition from 1977 to 1986, and in 1986 took five gold medals at the Goodwill Games. He also has two Olympic gold medals and has held numerous world records, including the current record in the 1,500 meters.

He was in town with his wife, Marina, to act as Grand Marshall for the Seafair Torchlight Parade Friday and to promote the Goodwill Games. He headed to Lake Washington after his tour of the pool to see the hydroplanes.

Before he left, one of approximately 20 chamber and SOC officials asked if there are any other "Salnikovs" to be on the watch for in competitive swim-

"Yes," Salnikov replied. "His name is Vladimir Salnikov and he is 15 months."

The SOC told the community council the Games are ahead of projections in the number of people applying to be volunteers for the Games.

But the SOC still is looking for volunteers and is open to projects that will increase goodwill between participating countries and the U.S., and especially between the U.S. and the Soviet Union. Although other countries, (an estimated 54) are expected to participate, the Games were designed to build goodwill between the two superpowers, SOC officials explained.

The SOC is looking for

Washington residents willing to house athletes' families and artists who will come to the U.S. as part of an attached cultural exhibit. The athletes themselves will be housed in University of Washington dormitories for the July 20 to Aug. 5 event.

"What denomination are you?" he demanded as a newspaper photographer entered the room.

Catholic, he was told.

"I hate Catholics!" Troxel retorted, apparently unaware that he was resting in a Catholic hospital. Oblivious to the laughter, he launched into a story about his first motherin-law's habit of attending

Mass every morning and from there, into a story about the Mississippi River town where he grew up - three-quarters Catholic, he remembered.

Troxel has been married twice - widowed after 44 years of marriage to his first wife and now married for 35 years to Sadie, 83. His occupations, he said, have included being a cobbler in Florida, a horseradish farmer and a doctor's assistant. His favorite career, he said, was "anything I could make a living at."

Is caring for such an elderly couple difficult for the Dixons? No, not really, said Carl Dixon, who retired eight years ago. He said he enjoys Troxel's stories, and, when he gets up at 6 a.m., he can usually find his 100-year-old friend in the yard visiting with the family's pet

## Church high school gets 4- year reprieve

Officials of a Woodmont area church have won a partial victory in their appeal of a King County decision that would have let the church operate its high school for only another two

Instead, the Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, at 2021 S. 260th St., will be allowed to operate the high school until June 30, 1993.

Church officials told a county hearing examiner the extension will give them time to find another site to build a high school. The church has been operating a school with 200 elementary, junior high and high school students.

The church currently has a variance from the county to conduct junior high and high school classes. County zoning regulations state that junior high

schools must be operated on sites of at least 10 acres and high schools on sites of at least 15

The church school site is only 2.73 acres.

MANY NEIGHBORS to the school oppose a permanent variance for the high school, citing increased traffic from high school students.

One couple who lives near the school called the zoning examiner's decision a mixed bless-Neighbor Jimmy Anderson

said he's glad the high school will have to go elsewhere after 1993, but most neighbors feel, "We've been had," he said.

"That school has every intention of making it a permanent facility," Anderson said.

Anderson's wife, Gladys,

"I think it's kind of a dirty deal," she said.

School officials could not be reached for comment on the examiner's decision. However, Hearing Examiner James O'Connor said the four-year grace period does give church officials enough time to lobby the King County Council for modification in the zoning code to allow smaller sites for high

In the meantime, the total enrollment of the school cannot exceed 140 students. There can be no more than 60 junior high and high school students and 80 elementary school students.

As part of the existing variance, the junior high, along with the elementary school, will be allowed to continue operating

SCHOOL OFFICIALS have

also asked for a building permit to construct an 11,760-squarefoot gym/classroom building on the property. It is unknown if plans for the building will proceed without a permanent variance to operate the high

The Andersons say they, and others, feel as if they're under siege. A Bellevue developer has plans for a 232-unit apartment complex called Springwood Manor about two blocks from the school.

Also, neighbors will be outside the Federal Way city limits when the community officially. incorporates sometime next year. Consequently, land-use will still be controlled by King County.

"It's getting pretty bad," said Gladys Anderson. "We're in noman's land."

several times and still conunues, they believe, to make drugs, police wanted to be sure to follow each step by the book and make a flawless arrest, Orendorff said.

Police could not actually determine a drug lab was inside until they entered the room, and they could not do that without a search warrant or the belief that others were in imminent danger. "It was a decision call," he said.

ALTHOUGH nine people went to the hospital for treatment of nausea and other side effects caused by the smell of the cooking drugs, Orendorff said he believed no one was in serious danger from the lab.

'We had to weigh the public safety against us getting a guy like (the drug manufacturer) off the street. This guy finally had to be taken care of," Orendorff

Police did clear the rooms on either side of the room with the suspected drug lab from the start. Two of the three occupants of the drug-cooking room were arrested one at a time as they left the room. The

third person, a woman, was taken from the room by officers when the smell of the cooking drugs grew so strong third-floor guests began to complain and police began to worry about

After removing the last person from the room, police called Fire District 39 (Federal Way) to evacuate the building and assist. But Washington State Patrol narcotics agents, in special suits, did not dismantle the \$40,000 setup until after 7 p.m., when the warrant arrived and safety precautions allowed officers into the room, Orendorff

About 70 guests were evacuated and not allowed back into the motel until the next day. An assistant manager for the motel said an Environmental Protection Agency representative tested each of the building's rooms and gave Super 8 permission to reopen for business at 4 p.m. Thursday. The room that housed the drug lab will not be used until it is

completely redone, she added.
CHEMICALS USED to make methamphetamine are highly toxic and dangerous if they come in contact with the skin or are inhaled. They also are volatile and can explode if cooking conditions are not perfect, Orendorff said. Aside from the man who was

cooking the drugs, police ar-rested the 25-year-old woman who rented the room, although she was not there when the other arrests were made. A 22-yearold woman was arrested in the room, and a 16-year-old girl was arrested as she left the room. The man also was arrested as he left the motel room.

## Build strong bridges, women politicians urge

It's a minor legend among local women politicians now, the story about the time Barbara Shinpoch, former mayor of Renton, spoke to a grade-school class.

A boy in that class raised his hand, eager to ask a question of the longtime mayor.

"And the question was, 'Can a man be mayor, too?' "chuckled Doris Cooper, now in her third term as mayor of Kirkland.

It was more than just a droll episode to Cooper and three other women who fielded questions at Monday's meeting of the Federal Way Women's Network. All four women are longtime politicians, and all four believe women have made their mark on local government.

But, they added, attitudes toward women in government are not changing as quickly as they'd like.

"As a woman, you find the public has different expectations. You can't be average; you've got to be the best. You always have to be on the right side of the decision, and everybody has a different idea of the 'right side,' " Cooper

"There should be more of us, not only on (local) councils, but in higher elected offices," said Judy Wood, a councilmember from Kent. "That will come, but some of us are getting tired of waiting."

COOPER, WOOD, Redmond Mayor Doreen Marchione and state Rep. Karen Fraser (D-22nd) didn't stop at their cited topic, "Building Tomorrow "Today: Women in Goverment." They also had plenty of advice for the new city of Federal Way, which they offered to the audience of about 80, including several Federal Way City Council candidates.

Choose aides and committee members carefully, Fraser cautioned, and make sure they don't overstay their welcome.

But Marchione cautioned that getting women involved and elected is not the sole issue at hand. With more women entering the political arena, she said, some female politicos will have

tough choices to make. Marchione recalled once running against another woman can-


"I had to wonder, when you think a woman's not doing a good job, do you go in and knock her off?" she said. "I really expected some backlash from other women on that one."





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
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## Local runners blister track at nationals



## Taylor plunges into swim relay

Nothing seems to get Tom Taylor off to a better start each day than a morning dip.

The 58-year-old Twin Lakes resident swims 2 miles daily in the Federal Way pool along with members of the Federal Way masters swim club.


Taylor has been involved in masters swimming since its inception in the Pacific Northwest. Last April marked his 15th season.

But Taylor took a dive into a different body of water last Saturday when he participated in the second annual Swim Lake Washington relay.

Taylor, who also is scheduled to compete in the U.S. National Long Course Championships in Grand Forks, N.D., Aug. 17-20, joined 10 other masters swimmers with the Pacific Northwest Association (PNA) last Saturday in the official Seafair event. Swimmers took pledges from friends and acquaintances and then joined relay teams to swim the length of Lake Washington.

Taylor was sponsored by Ozzie Jindra of the Twin Lakes

The annual swim benefits the

Advocates Resources and Counseling (ARC) of King County, which assists people with developmental disabilities, and the Washington State Special Olympics.

A total of 95 swimmers entered the event, which ran from 5 a.m. to 5 p.m., raising about \$18,000.

Swim relay teams ranged from as few as six swimmers to as many as 11. One swimmer, 31-year-old Joel Edwards of Bellevue, swam 19.5 miles (or the length from Kenmore to Renton) on his own and raised more than \$1,600 himself.

THE TEAM captain of Taylor's relay team, Terri Highland, became the first woman to ever swim the length of Lake Washington last year. She raised about \$15,000 to benefit Northwest Harvest.

Every swim team was furnished with a large support boat. The name of Taylor's team support boat, a fishing vessel, was "The Ray."

Also in the water alongside the swimmers were canoeists to help keep swimmers headed in the right direction. As Taylor noted, it is impossible for a swimmer to swim a straight line in a lake.

Altogether, about 150 people were involved in the Swim Lake Washington Seafair event. "It was a real commitment,

people really knocked themselves out for this," said Chris Drapkin, ARC swim coor-

dinator. "There was a lot of support to do this. The swimmers were fantastic."

In addition to the support boats and canoeists, who also saw to it that other recreational boaters steered clear of the swimmers, four interceptor boats remained nearby and would charge out in all directions to keep the coast clear. Taylor explained.

Seattle police boats and the Lake Washington Marine Patrol were part of the flotilla as well, Taylor added.

TAYLOR SWAM for about a half hour in the morning and then swam again for the same amount of time in the afternoon. He covered a little more than a mile each time.

Team members ranged in age from the high 20s to the mid-60s, both male and female.

"The water was cold, but not as cold as I expected it to be." said Taylor. "Most of the water was rough, we swam against the wind the whole day, so all the wave movement was against your swimming."

runoff carries pollutants into local streams.

To understand Joe's motivation, you need to know his background. As a resident of California, he saw ditches that once were rivers but now act only as conduits for water. His time in Colwhat happens when you sell your water rights.

He appreciates what we have in this state. "Where else can you go in the U.S.A and catch a steelhead before work," he says.

Joe has a point, and we ought to be real happy he's working to improve our fishing resource. He got involved because the legislative process governs all user groups. A computer specialist, he knows something about logical thinking.

There are plenty of problems with the Green and my notes from our conversation details them in great length. But I'd rather let you know the good news and the good work that Joe and the con-
