Council gets jump on moratorium

Federal Way's City Council elect sent a letter yesterday to King County officials asking them to allow only single-family residential development in Federal Way for the next several months.

Council members were elected Tuesday and won't have any official power until they're

sworn in on Sept. 30. However, council members felt they had to act as soon as possible on controlling development in Federal Way.

"This is what we've been asked to do by an awful lot of people," said Councilman-elect Bob Stead, who organized yesterday's meeting.

Stead, and others, asked King

County Council legal counsel Steve Miller to draft the land-use ordinance last week.

Specifically, the ordinance asks the King County Council to allow only the construction of single-family homes within the Federal Way city limits. Apartment, commercial, and industrial projects would be prohibited.

The ordinance would apply only to new projects, not to projects that have already applied for construction permits through the King County land-use system.

The city council-elect's letter also asks the county council to enact stricter controls on grading and the clearing of land in the city limits. The county

council will discuss the request at a meeting 9:30 a.m., Monday, in Room 402 of the King County Courthouse.

THE LETTER to the council states: "We call upon you to enact interim zoning controls by enacting zoning which would restrict all zones to single-family residential during the few months until the effective

date of incorporation." Federal Way is not officially incorporated yet, and won't be until the city council passes a resolution incorporating the community. In the meantime, Federal Way is still being governed by the King County Council.

City council's winners mark election victory

While Federal Way's new city council was already making plans on election eve, it also was a night for celebrating victories and contemplating defeats.

Though vote totals were slow arriving, by the end of Tuesday night it was clear who the winners were: In Position 1, Mary Gates; Position 2, Joel Marks; Position 3, Debbie Ertel; Position 4, Jim Webster; Position 5, Jim Handmacher; Position 6, Bob Stead; and in Position 7, the closest of the races, Lynn Templeton.

With 100 percent of precinct returns and a large chunk of absentee ballots counted by Wednesday afternoon, the winners were even more clear, though it's conceivable the Position 7 race could change if there is a larger-than-anticipated return of absentee ballots.

County elections officials say they have received and counted about 800 absentee ballots. Approximately 1,000 more are outstanding, but county officials expect only 300-400 of those will be mailed in.

ABSENTEE ballots didn't have to be postmarked until midnight Tuesday. The last absentee ballots won't be counted until Monday morning, according to Bob Bruce, superintendent of elections.

As of Wednesday, Position 7 candidate Templeton had a seemingly safe lead with 3,500 votes to Watkins' 3,150.

Watkins campaigned strongly with absentee voters, sending absentee ballot applications to all Federal Way voters who have voted absentee in past elections. That strategy was very effective in the May 16 primary election.

In the primary, Watkins was second in precinct returns, but overturned Templeton's lead with absentee voters.

However, Templeton, too, campaigned strongly with absentee voters this time, making sure a campaign pamphlet was sent to every one of them.

While Watkins isn't conceding defeat yet, he admits it's a longshot that he'll win with the absentees this time around.

"I'm realistic enough to know it's a long shot," Watkins said Wednesday. "But I was certain I would end up second in the primary, too."

Templeton also wasn't claiming victory Tuesday, but was pleased with the early results. Templeton credited Watkins with "exceptionally well-organized campaign," and said if he is indeed the winner, it's because he had a more impressive record of community service.

"It's because I presented a better record of service," Templeton said. "I had a stronger vision."

THE NEXT-CLOSEST race was the Position 1 contest between



Odds and ends end up as fence

When the Federal Way News "Weird Stuff" search came to look at Tom Kohler's fence, he thought his neighbor Anne Phelps was behind it.

Kohler, 74, said Phelps has been threatening to call the News ever since he started building his unusual fence. "I told him, 'You'll have to wear your sandals and paint your toenails black when you get your picture taken,'" said Phelps. "He's been known to do that. You need someone like that in the neighborhood."

The fence in front of Kohler's log cabin near Mirror Lake, where he's lived for 10 years, is made of discarded wood and an old cedar tree. "That's the material I had," said Kohler. Gnarled branches form the pickets. He said he plans to grow perennial sweet peas on the fence.

"The round stumps were a tree that was getting too big and

Some voters left in dark over polling place

A number of Federal Way voters were surprised Tuesday when they went to their polling only to find it had been moved.

A snafu resulted in an as-yet undetermined number of voters in as many as four precincts not getting new voter registration cards telling them where their polling place had moved, said Harry Sanders of King County Records and Elections.

Elections officials fielded calls from 15-20 confused and irate voters from the Dumas and Palisades precincts Tuesday after they went to Decatur High School to vote, only to find out by a sign posted there they had been moved back to Twin Lakes Elementary. They had voted at Twin Lakes before remodeling projects forced elections officials to move the voting site to Decatur.

Sanders said Dash Point and Jessica precinct voters also

were moved to Twin Lakes from Decatur, although none had called.

The county often switches polling places because of convenience, leasing changes or school remodeling, but notifies voters through the mail of the changes, Sanders said. Elections officials learned Monday some voters had not been notified, and signs were posted at Decatur to tell voters to head back to Twin Lakes.

Some, like Twin Lakes resident and Dumas Precinct voter Leslie Largent, were surprised to find their polling place moved. She had waited until late in the day to vote, and had walked from her home to Decatur, where she had last voted. When she got there at about 7:30 p.m., she found she had to go to Twin Lakes.

"We were afraid we weren't going to get there in time," she

said.

Sanders said elections officials don't know how many of the 1,665 registered voters in those four precincts did not receive their new registration cards. To cover their bases, they will reissue cards to all of those voters.

In the meantime, elections staff members have been trying

to find out what went wrong. The cards may have been lost in the mail or at elections, Sanders said.

"Our records show the cards were generated. We're at a loss to figure out what happened to them."

The new cards will be reissued today, Sanders said.

Lise Wood, wife of council candidate, dies

Lise Blyt Wood, a long-time Federal Way resident, real estate agent and wife of city council candidate Bob Wood, died Wednesday afternoon.

Wood, 49, died at home. The funeral home handling arrangements said she died suddenly, but friends said she had recently been ill.

She was instrumental in opening the Federal Way Windermere Real Estate office in 1983 and sold residential real estate there. Wood had been in real estate for the past 13 years.

A native of Copenhagen, Denmark, she was the 10th of 12 children born to Hans and Helga Blyt. She came to the United

States at age 18 and moved to the South King County area from Chicago in 1968.

A celebration of Wood's life has been set for 11:00 a.m. Monday at Wayside United Church of Christ/Congregational. Arrangements are being made by Yahn and Son Funeral Home of Auburn.

Besides her husband, Wood is survived by a son from a previous marriage, John Phillip Loomos, Federal Way; stepsons Robert and James Wood, Seattle; stepdaughter Patricia Scherman, Auburn; her mother, two sisters and two brothers in Denmark; a brother in France, and three grandchildren.

ween Mary Gates and Bill Shortt.

Gates, too, was guarded Tuesday evening about claiming victory, but said if she's declared the winner it's because, "I'm a mainstream candidate. (Shortt) is more extreme."

If she would have lost it would have been because she "overestimated the voters," she said.

Shortt said he lost because Gates "is better known and more popular in social circles."

Also, the small voter turnout generally favored candidates who were endorsed by local newspapers, he said. Gates was endorsed by the Federal Way News and the Morning News Tribune.

Position 2 Councilman-elect Joel Marks is the only candidate not endorsed by the newspapers who won. Marks said he won because of his strong campaigning. He doorbelled frequently and said his name was well known because of past city council campaigns in 1981 and 1985, when incorporation wasn't approved so no council was formed.

His opponent, Freitas, said he lost because of being relatively unknown, compared to Marks. However, he said he was proud of the number of votes he did get.

"I was a relative nobody," he said. Freitas said he will remain active in community issues and hopes to serve on volunteer city commissions.

Position 4 loser Elaine Cook said she doesn't plan on being involved in any city issues and hopes to travel instead. Cook said she didn't win because of the amount of campaign funds raised by her opponent, Jim Webster. Webster raised about \$7,500 to Cook's \$3,012.

Position 4 winner Webster was out of town on business and couldn't be reached for comment.

Position 3 winner Debbie Ertel had the largest lead by far of any of the races over her opponent Georgene "Jo" Asbury. Ertel said her victory was due to her long list of community achievements.

"I hope that it's a result of all the things I've been involved in," Ertel said. "I've acted like

a city council person for years without the authority."

Position 5 winner Jim Handmacher also had a commanding lead over his opponent, Bob Wood. His victory was also because of his record of service, Handmacher said.

"I would like to think it's because people compared our records and felt I had more to offer," he said. "I don't think it's a knock on Bob Wood. I don't think we got into the knocks like some of the other races."

POSITION 6 winner Bob Stead outdistanced John Ridley by a sizable margin, also. Stead credited his victory with being better known in the community.

"I think people respected what I've done and it showed at the polls," he said. Stead also discussed his position on handgun control, which became an issue after being asked about guns at a city council debate earlier this month. Stead favors restrictions on handguns while Ridley opposes them.

"I think I probably picked up as many votes as I lost on han-

dguns...maybe more," Stead said.

Several losing candidates cited a low voter turnout as one of the reasons for their defeat. Indeed, the turnout was disappointing for candidates and elections officials.

The elections' division superintendent Bob Bruce anticipated a 35-percent turnout countywide. Final precinct returns here tallied only a 25-percent return and even with absentee ballots, the total is only expected to be about 28 percent.

That's only about 3 percent higher than the city council primary election. Usually general elections have an 8-10 percent higher turnout, Bruce said.

That's still above the countywide turnout of about 23 percent. In most parts of the unincorporated county, the average was only 12-18 percent, but the overall county average was buoyed by a higher turnout in Seattle because of the mayoral race.

THE LOW TURNOUT can be credited in part because Tue-

nesday's election was a primary election for most of the rest of the county and there were few races of any regional significance besides the county executive election.

City council watchers were left hoping that residents become more active once the council begins doing business. That will officially happen after the council is sworn in at 6 p.m., Sept. 30, at Decatur High School.

The council is expected to set the date of its first official meeting at an informational session that will be held 5:30 p.m., Sept. 27, at the Federal Way School District headquarters.

For most residents who have been active behind the scenes in the Federal Way First! Transition Team and other community groups, the council's future appears bright, but tough.

"I'm delighted we have such a strong slate," said Maryann Mitchell, transition team president. "But they've got a long way to go politically."

"It can't get any worse than what we've gone through here for the last 50 years."

Citizens recruited to control speeders

King County officials are looking for a few public spirited citizens who want to help control speeding drivers in their neighborhood.

Mark Madden, traffic operations engineer with the county Department of Public Works, said the county is offering citizens a chance to help operate the Neighborhood Traffic Safety Program's electronic readerboard.

The device, which is visible to drivers, is attached to a radar unit that measures the speed of oncoming cars. Officials call the mechanism a "graphic reminder to motorists to slow down."

Madden said there are several areas where speeding is a problem in south King County, including 8th Avenue South, between South 312th and

South 320th streets: 6th Avenue Southwest, between Southwest 330th and Southwest 320th streets; and Southwest 330th Street, from 6th Avenue Southwest to 1st Avenue South.

Two pool events sold out

If you haven't ordered your tickets for the swimming and diving events at next summer's Goodwill Games, you're too late.

Tickets for water polo still are available, and synchronized swimming is not sold out, "though it's getting there fast," said Bill Sears, SOC spokesman.

The swimming, diving, water polo and synchronized swimming events will be in the new aquatic center under construction in West Campus.

Sears said other events are close to selling out. They include hockey, gymnastics, figure skating and men's basketball. He suggests those still planning to order tickets be sure to list alternate selections in case their first choice is sold out.

Leak closes I-5 station

A Federal Way truck weigh station was closed and hazardous materials teams were called out Tuesday when a cleaning compound was found leaking in the back of a truck.

The driver of the truck found the leaking chemical when he made a stop at a truck weigh station on northbound Interstate 5, near the Wild Waves amusement park.

Hazardous materials teams from Fire District 39 (Federal Way) and the Port of Seattle were called to investigate. The weigh station and a nearby rest area were closed from 11 a.m. to about 4 p.m. while specially-suited investigators examined the truck and took samples of

the material.

The chemical was identified as Oakite Deoxidizer, a highly reactive compound that includes ferric sulfate, nitric acid and hydrochloric acid. The chemical is most often used to clean boilers, said Penny Hulse, public information officer for the fire department.

The truck driver was hauling 55-gallon barrels of the cleanser from Tacoma to Seattle, said Hulse. Only one barrel leaked, she added.

The barrel eventually was disposed of and the truck decontaminated under the direction of the state Department of Ecology, Hulse said.

Satellite dishes don't require EIS

on the issue of an apartment moratorium, but others said a moratorium wouldn't be useful. However, all seven members-elect supported the proposed interim-control ordinance.

"In order to have the time to conduct the study which we believe was mandated by our city electorate, we must have the opportunity to conduct the review without the pressure of a rush of new high-impact construction which might defeat...the execution of land-use alternatives," the letter states.

SEVERAL COUNCIL members-elect were concerned that the ordinance might limit

King County Library System plans to build two new libraries in Federal Way. According to Councilwoman-elect Mary Gates, the county is close to purchasing land for one of those libraries.

However, libraries are allowed to be built on single-family zoned land, said Councilwoman-elect Debbie Ertel, who has been active in land-use issues as president of DIRE (Development Impact Resistance Exercise), a local land-use watchdog group.

Ertel recently resigned as DIRE president to avoid a conflict of interest.

The city council-elect will

meet at 7:30 this morning to review the proposed interim ordinance. It will also meet at 7 a.m., Tuesday, for breakfast at the Federal Way Executive to get to know each other better.

Council members at yesterday's meeting were in high spirits, teasing each other and cracking jokes in-between discussion of the proposed ordinance. Councilman-elect Jim Webster was the only one of the seven members absent because he was out of town on business.

too close," said Kohler. "The posts were under a neighbor's old deck. She got rid of her junk, I got my fence."

He built it to discourage drivers from parking in his yard. The front edge of the lawn used to be tall grass. But neighbors pressed Kohler to trim it. "Too many people were saying, 'Why don't you cut your grass?'" he said.

SO HE cut it. The next day, there were tire tracks on the lawn. "I was thinking of putting broken glass out there," he said.

Instead, he opted for the unconventional fence. "It's just something different to keep people from driving up into the yard," he said.

"I haven't had anybody tell me they don't like the fence," said Kohler.

Anne Phelps agreed. "Most of (the neighbors) I think get a kick out of it."

The fence isn't Kohler's only project. The retired electrician has a collection of curios made from cast-off materials in his backyard. "You gotta do something when you're retired, you know," he said.

An authentic Chinese tea house made of cedar branches with a thatched swamp grass roof stands in one corner of the yard. Kohler used his knowledge of Chinese characters to make a

plaque for the entry that says, "Welcome to China."

He built a rose trellis out of scrap wood and corrugated plastic in the model of a Japanese pagoda. Nearby is a full-size barbecue made of old bricks.

Then there's the chain-saw carvings. A dragon's head guards the entrance to Kohler's cellar, and a carved raven hangs from the roof of his boathouse. Kohler named him Edgar Allen Crow.

"I use Michelangelo's method," he said. "You think of what you're going to do, and you cut away everything that doesn't look like it."

KOHLER said he prefers to use scrap material for his creations, because, "It's more of a challenge. Anybody can go to the store and buy stuff."

His wife Bernadette thinks her husband's creations are anything but ordinary.

"Tom does everything weird," she said. "Yeah, everything turns out kind of weird, but he enjoys it."

Eastiders planning apartment battle

About 70 Federal Way eastside residents gathered Monday to plan their fight against a 526-unit apartment complex at Peasley Canyon Road and Military Road South.

Some of those residents later attended a Federal Way Water and Sewer District meeting Tuesday to protest district plans to extend the necessary sewer service to the apartments.

However, another group of eastside property owners told the district board of commissioners they also favor sewer service so they can develop their property.

The group of smaller property owners can't afford to extend the service on their own because the extension is expected to cost millions of dollars, but they could afford to hook up to the sewer lines if the apartment developer pays for most of the project.

The developer of the apartment complex is Trammel Crow

Realty, a Bellevue firm. The company is proposing a rezoning for 15.5 acres on the southeast corner of Peasley Canyon Road and Military Road South from single-family to multi-family.

THE FIRM HOPES to build 276 apartment units on the southeast corner and another 250 units on the northwest corner, which already is zoned multi-family.

But it means sewer service extended to both sites before they can be developed, according to King County land-use regulations.

Also, other smaller property owners cannot develop their land without sewers either.

"A lot of people are in favor of these sewers," eastside property owner Daryl Harding told the district board. "Most people have their life savings in that property."

Harding is a former eastside resident who would like to develop eastside land.

However, the 70 residents at

the recently formed East Side Residents' Association meeting on Monday were strongly against the rezoning and the apartment complex, saying the project would damage the environment and would overcrowd roads.

One eastside resident advised other eastsiders to organize to fight the project.

"We must somehow become united from north to south," said Ray Schow. "Just because our ox is gored, you still have to look out for your neighbors down the road."

THE ASSOCIATION plans to organize a petition drive and to attend a hearing on the appeal of a county decision not to require preparation of an environmental impact statement (EIS).

The hearing will be held 9:30 a.m., Nov. 9, in Hearing Room 2 of King County Building and Land Development Division (BALD) headquarters in Bellevue.

The water and sewer district

board made no decision Tuesday on proceeding with the sewer extension. The district already has issued a certificate of sewer availability to Trammel Crow and sewer extension plans are included in the district's comprehensive plan, a document that lays out future district extensions.

It's unclear if the developers could force the district to allow the sewer extension, according to district officials.

Developers would not return phone calls asking about the project.

Christian staff works within mental health unit

If a person is a bad driver and has an accident, doctors may be able to heal his body. But unless someone teaches him how to drive, he'll just have another accident.

That's the analogy Dr. Greg Konzelman uses to describe "spiritual crashing," which he considers to be the most common cause of major mental illness.

You can treat some mental illnesses with drugs, he explained, but unless you get at the underlying cause, the illness will just return.

Konzelman is the head of a new program at Tacoma's Puget Sound Hospital that examines its patients' Christian beliefs in order to "get at" the reason they are sick and to equip them with the tools they need to recover and stay recovered.

The Pacific Crest Christian

Therapy program opened for business earlier this month in

the hospital's mental health unit and makes use of the unit's housing facilities and staff, but is otherwise independent of it. Patients in the Pacific Crest program spend their non-sleeping time exclusively with members of the Christian staff — Konzelman and his counselors.

The basic program includes time with him, with counselors, studying the Bible and learning social interaction skills. Participation in the program is voluntary.

IT IS the third such Pacific Crest program in existence and the first Christian-based inpatient program in the state, Konzelman said. The closest Pacific Crest program is at a Portland hospital owned by the company that also owns Puget Sound Hospital.

The Pacific Crest starts each individual treatment program from a non-denominational

point of view, incorporating the patient's own beliefs into it as they progress.

Konzelman believes patients benefit from having an all-Christian staff by being more comfortable around them.

"People with a Christian background are more comfortable talking to other Christians," he explained. "They open up faster."

He also believes that exploring those beliefs can provide a clue to the cause of the illness. In some cases, he said, the patient may have a distorted interpretation of the Bible. When life doesn't go as expected, they become unjustifiably angry with God.

Konzelman doesn't pretend to be an expert Bible scholar, but he said, a person's beliefs can be so off base you don't need a theology degree to recognize it. "I'm so awful God couldn't possibly love me," is one exam-

ple he said he's heard. "But we're all fallible. We need God to help us get through life," he said.

DAILY Bible study is one other aspect of treatment and provides patients with tools they need to overcome their present problems and to deal with future ones.

For example, he said, forgiveness is a basic tenet of Christianity. He cited cases of abuse, where the anger of the victims towards their abusers clouds their ability to recover from the experiences.

"You ask for the Lord's help," he explained. "There's tremendous healing power in that."

The 10 Commandments provide another crutch on the road to recovery, he said. "There are some things God says we have to do," he said. "We are accountable for what we do."

KONZELMAN spends his mornings working with patients at Western State Hospital. He is charged with the care of more than 40 patients on one of the wards, which has afforded him the chance to see how the institutional therapy offered by Western compares to the Pacific Crest program.

"There's no real time or resources for one-to-one therapy at Western," he said. "This program's greatest strength is intensive individual therapy with a licensed, Christian psychologist."

In addition to Konzelman, the Pacific Crest team includes two Christian counselors — one holds a master's in counseling and the other holds a master's in divinity. The staff will expand as the program grows, he predicted. The nurses who care for the Pacific Crest patients work for the hospital, so their job qualifications don't have to include being Christian.

Konzelman earned his doctorate in psychology at the University of North Dakota. The son of a Lutheran minister, he had his wife, a Catholic, now attend a Presbyterian church. "God goes to lots of churches."

New minister takes reins at Servants

The Rev. Warren C. Thompson, a native of Southern California, has taken the reins of Servants of Christ Reformed Church in Federal Way.

Thompson, 51, earned a bachelor's degree from El Camino College in Torrance, Calif. in 1964 and worked in sales for several California companies before beginning his theological studies at Bethany College in Minneapolis in 1975. He graduated from that school with a degree in theology and mission.

He served at churches in New York and California before receiving the call to Servants of Christ.

Thompson, a U.S. Army veteran, is currently finishing his master's degree and will pursue a doctorate through Fuller Seminary.





A kinder, gentler viking

Norse nuts navigate past 'Erik's' little flaws

"Erik the Viking" is a "sort-of" movie.

It's sort of a swashbuckler. It's sort of a farce. It's sort of a grand quest. It's sort of a lot of things, and not quite anything.

Monty Python alumnus Terry Jones, who directed and wrote the screenplay, is at his best in the farcical moments. But when he ventures into more meaningful territory, he suffers from inconsistency. Some things work, and some things don't. His big message turns out to be shallow.

However, shallow is better than obscure, and Jones has an all-star cast to carry him through the questionable moments. There are some excellent bits in "Erik the Viking."


Tim Robbins (the confused pitcher from "Bull Durham") plays Erik, a young viking who has no taste for looting, fighting, raping or pillaging. Faced with a prospective victim (Samantha Bond), he can't bring himself to "do his duty."

Unfortunately, a few of Erik's comrades have no such scruples, and while trying to protect the girl from other assailants, Erik accidentally kills her.

That prompts him to begin his quest. Tired of fighting, he and a band of vikings travel to the Edge of the World to wake the gods, ending a centuries-long winter.

Along the way, they run into the Dragon of the North Sea, a huge, spongy creature with a truly inflamed sinus condition. Of course, Erik falls in love with a princess (Imogen Stubbs), and runs afoul of a villain, Halfdan the Black (John Cleese).

EVENTUALLY, they reach the land of Asgaard, where they

get some surprises. The gods are not what they expect, and they have no solution to the problems of earthly fighting and killing. Man will have to take care of it on his own.

That's the message, and for the most part, Jones enjoys a degree of success. But there is a carelessness about the writing, a kind of genre-mixing which requires a delicate touch that Jones seems to lack.

For instance, characters die here and there, and the deaths aren't handled in a funny way. It seems like a deliberate attempt to stir our emotions, rather than an oversight.

Yet farcical moments inevitably follow the deaths. It's hard to shift emotional gears that quickly. It can be done, but it requires nearly flawless writing. "Monty Python and the Holy Grail" is a good example of properly-handled humorous death. In that film, dire situations are given such a ridiculous

Hatcher promises culinary class at new Cafe Pacific

By SEAN ROBINSON

If all goes well, John Hatcher's Cafe Pacific will open next month in the Federal Way Shopping Center.

"We're looking at an Oct. 1 opening right now, and that's not firm," said Hatcher, 28. The Federal Way News reported in August that Cafe Pacific would open Sept. 1, but Hatcher has been slowed by red tape. He's finding that the process of gathering the necessary permits from King County and jumping through administrative hoops is a bit distasteful.

"It's a long process," Hatcher said ruefully. "There's a lot of hurdles that you have to go through. There's not anything strange about it. But it's unfortunate that delays have to happen."

BUT GET him to talk about his restaurant, and he brightens

up. Hatcher is a chef, with 13 years' experience in the industry. For the last six years, he's been a chef at several restaurants in the Seattle area.

He and his wife Amy are co-owners of Cafe Pacific. Amy handles the business side, while he covers the cuisine. "She has the administrative skills, I have the chef's degree," said Hatcher.

He has big plans. Cafe Pacific will be a sautee house, with food that is, "not thick and heavy. A

lot of variety," he said.

He calls the food he'll be serving fresh Northwest cuisine. The menu includes seafood, salads, pasta dishes, sandwiches, and beef and poultry. When he says fresh, he means it. "I definitely deal with seasonal availability," said Hatcher. "You would have a different selection every day of the year."

Lunch entrees run from \$3.50 to \$7.25, and dinners from \$7.95 to \$13.75. It's possible to get half portions on virtually every item,

and even combine half portions in a classy create-your-own mix. "I'm flexible for what people want," said Hatcher.

He doesn't want Cafe Pacific to be viewed as an "occasion" restaurant, suitable only for black ties and evening gowns. "I'd like people to find out that they can stop in more often," said Hatcher. "You won't feel like you're underdressed. Dining doesn't have to be so regimented."

HE HOPES to be involved in

catering as well as in-house dining, and he offers food to go. He's going to send menus to local merchants and businesses. "They can come to the door, pay for it, and go back to work," said Hatcher. "I think there's a better selection than the fast food chains."

Hatcher has applied for a liquor license. He'll serve beer and wine if it's approved. Cafe Pacific will be open 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. Sunday through Thursday, and 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. Friday

and Saturday. "That is seating time," said Hatcher. That means a customer coming in at five minutes to 10 in the evening won't be pushed out the door. The customer can enjoy a leisurely dinner just as if it were 8 p.m., he said.

The roadblocks are a little intimidating, but he remains optimistic. "I know I'm a little young to be doing this, I won't kid you there," said Hatcher. "I've just got to believe this was meant to be."


At the Movies

"THE ABYSS"

James Cameron, director of "The Terminator" and "Aliens," has come up with the rarest of combinations: A special-effects movie with a plot. "DEAD POET'S SOCIETY"

Imagine, if you can, Robin Williams underplaying a role and you have a thoughtful, poignant portrayal in a thoughtful, poignant film. Williams takes a back seat to his students as a free-thinking nonconformist literature teacher at a stuffy, staid conformist New England prep school. The film is bright, uplifting and tragic as it extols the virtues and dangers of the motto, *carpe diem*, or seize the day. Rated PG. It is playing at Gateway Center.

"FIELD OF DREAMS"

A baseball fairy tale in the general

mold of "The Natural," but more contemporary and less about baseball than about one man's struggle to come to terms with bittersweet memories of his father. Based on the novel, "Shoeless Joe," the movie is faithful to the book in spirit if not every detail. Warm, witty, with bursts of visual splendor, such as the eerie initial appearance of the "ghost" of Shoeless Joe Jackson in a baseball diamond carved from a corn field by the film's engaging star, Kevin Costner. It's a movie with a message: Follow your dream and you might get a second chance. Tender hearts should bring Kleenex. Rated PG, it's playing at SeaTac South.

"INDIANA JONES AND THE LAST CRUSADE"

"Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade" won't disappoint devotees of the George Lucas/Steven Spielberg hero. The inimitable Indy (Harrison Ford) gets tangled up with Nazis, religious fanatics, and his own father (Sean Connery) while

searching for the legendary Holy Grail. The plot is thin, the action predictable and the suspense non-existent, but the stunts are routinely breath-taking, and Connery adds some spice to... the formula mix. Rated PG-13, "Indiana Jones" is playing at SeaTac North.

"MILLENNIUM"

"Millennium" has great potential as a trashy late-night TV movie. The plot is silly, the acting is mediocre, and the effects are reminiscent of "Battistar Galactica." But it's still fun, despite a time-travel premise that forces the viewer to watch some of the bad scenes twice. Cheryl Ladd, Kris Kristofferson and Daniel J. Travanti perform with all the panache of unflavored yogurt. Rated PG-13, for language and adult situations. It's playing at SeaTac South.

"THE PACKAGE"

"The Package" is a fairly typical political suspense thriller, distinguished by the presence of veteran actors Gene Hackman, Tommie Lee Jones and John Heard. It may have been done before, but it's still entertaining, and the two hours fly by, leaving you with a paranoid feeling. Rated R for language and violence. Playing at Gateway Center.

"PARENTHOOD"

It isn't easy to make movies about family life without descending into the syrup-laden well of sentimentality. "Parenthood" manages to avoid all the clichés that generate labels like "the feelgood movie of the summer." It features an excellent ensemble cast, nifty plot twists, crisp direction of a good screenplay by Ron Howard, and the best performance of Steve Martin's career. It's also very funny. Decatur downs TJ to stay in first place



Glory days of hillclimbing revived

In the beginning, there was The Hill.

Nearly 500 feet of dirt and rocks pitched at angles as sharp as 70 degrees, rising like a giant ski slope from the base of Jolly Rogers race track toward Military Road.

Riders challenged it regularly

in the 1950s and '60s. They came from North Seattle, West Seattle, Federal Way, even Oregon and Idaho to try to ride their motorcycles to the top.

Jolly Rogers hillclimbs used to be quite a spectacle. In the time since charter members of the Jolly Rogers Motorcycle

Club carved it out of bushes and Woody Combs perched in a tree halfway up with a hand-held stopwatch for the first hillclimb, The Hill gained a reputation far and wide.

It hosted a climb a week in the 1950s. Hundreds of spectators would flock to Jolly Rogers,

open a picnic lunch or a can of beer, and kick back to ooh and ah as riders strained for the top. Programs featured biographies of top climbers and advertisements from businesses in White Center through Des Moines.

Hillclimbs: Promoter rekindling history

ON MAY 17, 1964, Jolly Rogers staged the ultimate event: a national hillclimb. More than 4,000 fans packed the track's 10 acres to watch the action.

"The state patrol wouldn't let anyone else in," recalls Lila Bulen, former public relations director for the Jolly Rogers Motorcycle Club.

Now, there is still The Hill. But today it sits neglected and ignored by most who drive by Jolly Rogers, which is just across the SeaTac city boundary at South 216th Street and 41st Avenue South in Kent.

If Ted Ridge has his way, it won't be ignored much longer.

Starting Sunday, Sept. 24, Ridge will try to recapture the magic of the '50s by staging a hillclimb, '80s style.

Ridge is former president of Seattle Motorcycle Club, the primary tenant at Jolly Rogers, and head man of Clicker Promotions, which will host the climb.

ALTHOUGH it has continued to have motocross races, Jolly Rogers hillclimbs declined rapidly in the 1970s. Until Ridge held one last summer, there hadn't been a climb at the track for 14 years.

"Nobody knows the place exists. That's the problem. People live three miles away and don't even know it's there," Ridge says.

Jolly Rogers is hard to find. Following South 216th east from Military Road, no signs mark its entrance. One must turn right on 41st South — a gravel road — and drive through woods past rows of houses to reach the race track

entrance, marked by a chain-link fence and gate.

Ridge found the track as a youngster growing up in the Angle Lake area. He raced a couple of times at Jolly, then quit riding for a few years through high school and college.

About six years ago, he missed riding and bought a trail bike. He saw a flyer for a race at Jolly Rogers and went to check it out.

"WITHIN A year and a half, I was president of Seattle Motorcycle Club. I got heavily involved," Ridge says.

His involvement with motocross races led to the hillclimb promotion, which he now pursues with passion.

Ridge wants to restore hillclimbs to their former prominence. He has a plan for three climbs next year, perhaps as part of a five-state series.

To lure entrants, he has posted a \$3,000 purse for Sunday's event. Last summer, with a smaller purse, he attracted riders from Oregon, Idaho and California, as well as top locals.

Ridge knows his task will be difficult. "It will take time to build up, get the word out," he says.

But word of Sunday's race has already spread as far as Utah. Eleven riders from the Beehive state, including No. 1 national rider Travis Whitlock, have committed to the Jolly Rogers' hillclimb.

The top 10 riders in the country will be there, Ridge says.

"It's building. If all goes well this year, next year should be really good," he claims. "I'm glad I started it."

Hillclimbing tests riders' courage

Standing at the bottom looking up, the hill appears steeper than from any other angle.

Hiking it is taxing even for young persons in great shape. Driving or riding a bicycle up it is out of the question.

So what makes grown men charge straight up it on 700-pound motorcycles with virtually no protection?

"They're a bunch of crazy fools," says Ted Ridge, who is promoting Sunday's hillclimb at Jolly Rogers race track.

Hillclimbing is not a sport for weak of heart. As bikes fly toward the top of the 500-foot hill, which features inclines as steep as 70-degrees, riders strain to keep the machines from flipping over. They spray a roostertail of dirt and rocks as high as 200 feet in the air.

"It's hard to describe some of these guys. A lot of them wear the least protective gear of all motor sport riders," Ridge says.

HILLCLIMBS feature motorcycles of all classes, from 80cc engines to 700cc engines and greater. Each rider gets two solo attempts to reach the top.

Their success is measured by distance climbed unless they reach the top. Then they are judged by time.

Modified and exhibition bikes stand the best chance of reaching the top of the hill.

Modified bikes may be altered to extend their frames six inches over a regular, or "stock," bike. Exhibition-bike frames may be extended by a foot to a foot-and-a-half, and also feature paddlewheel-like devices in the rear to dig into the dirt and provide traction.

"These are drag bikes designed to go straight up a hill," Ridge says.

But some of Sunday's best entertainment might come from the smaller classes, such

as bikes with 80cc or 125cc engines.

"Those are pretty wild. They're the ones that flip," notes Ridge.

Smaller bikes will run first in Sunday's climb, beginning about 10 a.m. The exhibition

and modified classes will begin about 1 p.m.

Jolly Rogers will also feature a vintage exhibition for bikes 1972 and older.

Gates open Sunday at 7 a.m. at Jolly Rogers, located at South 216th Street and 41st Avenue South in Kent. Day-of-

race entry fee for modified and exhibition-class bikes is \$65. Entry fee for sportsman classes is \$15.

Spectator admission is \$5, with children under 12 free. For more information, call Ted Ridge at 246-8484.



Members' passion keeps climb alive

In its heyday, the Jolly Rogers Motorcycle Club had 40 members.

It entered a float each year in the Seafair Parade, helped fight leukemia, and built the only motocross track in the south end: Jolly Rogers race track.

The floats are gone, and so is the club's non-profit status. Eight members remain.

They have scattered since Jolly Rogers' incorporation in 1946, and they no longer attend a majority of events at the track. But they are responsible for keeping motocross and hillclimbing alive.

Jolly Rogers Motorcycle Club still meets the first Saturday of each month. Club members pay the property taxes on the track's 10 acres, then lease it for races and climbs.

Last year, the facility was used about nine times.

It might seem futile to some to keep paying for a place with

such little return, but Lila Bulen won't hear such talk.

Lila and her husband Kenneth, a charter member, have been with the Jolly Rogers club from the beginning. The longtime Riverton Heights residents tirelessly promoted the track and its events in the 1950s and '60s.

They now live in Seattle but have retained their interest in Jolly Rogers.

"My husband and I were very concerned that this property would get lost somewhere," Lila says. "It's very expensive."

The club has turned down several offers for the land, most from real estate developers.

Obtaining the property, a former goat farm, was such a stroke of foresight, "It would be a shame to let it get away because someone was too stupid to pay the property taxes," Lila says.

Lancers silence skeptics

Offense helps Kennedy mow down Hazen, 48-0.

would expect to win 48-0 over a ranked team. I thought we would win, but not like this," said a pleased Kennedy coach Tom Merrill. "Our offensive line did a super job and our defense was really doing a job. Sam Severo and Chad Fisher were both outstanding."

Not so outstanding was the Lancers' kickoff coverage.

Due to prolific offensive output, Kennedy's special teams found themselves in an un-

wanted spotlight as Hazen repeatedly brought the ball back into good field position on kickoff returns.

"If Puget Sound wasn't there, they'd probably still be running. Maybe we should have done an onside kick every time," Merrill quipped.

Much to their consternation, the Highlanders' kickoff successes were met with sound defensive defeats. Kennedy halted Hazen's first drive at the

1-yard line, forcing a fumble and preserving the shutout.

Meanwhile, Smith, Shaw and running back Tony Klettheimer provided most of the scoring output as Kennedy carved through Hazen for 500 total offensive yards.

Smith hit eight of 12 passes for 144 yards and rushed for 124 more. Shaw added 70 yards on seven carries, Klettheimer 74 on 10 and two touchdowns.

Jarrett Johnson, Mike Savage and Doug Strauss added insurance touchdowns for the Lancers.

At 2-0, Kennedy sits in a tip atop the Seamount League standings with Renton and Highline. After a big win over a highly ranked team, will there be any letdown at 1-1 Lindbergh next week?

"No, because our seniors won't allow that," Merrill replies.

Raider gridders taking on an old rival tonight

A share of first place in the South Puget Sound League's Puget Division standings is at stake tonight when Jefferson and Auburn meet at Federal Way Memorial Field at 7:30.

The Raiders are coming off a 17-0 victory at Bethel last Friday, while Auburn thumped Sumner, 41-19. Auburn and Jefferson share the Puget Division lead with Kentwood and Rogers.

Jefferson opened its season with a 28-20 victory over crosstown rival Decatur, while Auburn beat Kentridge, 14-7.

Tonight's game will mark the first time the two schools have met since 1972 when Auburn was a member of the old South Puget Sound League. The Trojans rejoined the SPSL this year along with Kentwood, Kentridge and Kent-Meridian after the North Puget Sound League disbanded.

Trojan running backs Bobby Skoor and Keith Howard had impressive outings against Sumner last week. Howard rushed for 132 yards on 13 carries and scored on touchdown runs of 21 and 77 yards. He also caught a 32-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Dennis Harvey, who threw for 195 yards.

Skoor caught touchdown passes of 72 and 53 yards from Harvey and also rushed for a three-yard TD. Skoor also had a 78-yard touchdown run nullified by a penalty.

While Auburn's offense is explosive, the Trojans did allow 232 yards on the ground by Sumner, which could be in Jefferson's favor.

The Raiders' Dan Meade gained 151 yards on 37 carries and scored two touchdowns in TJ's season opener against Decatur, and then came back to rush for 139 yards on 25 carries and score on runs of 67 and 10 yards against Bethel.

Jefferson's defense only allowed 24 yards total offense by Bethel in the second half last week, and the week before the Raiders did not allow Decatur to run a play the entire fourth quarter.

For the game, Jefferson's wishbone offense churned out 250 yards rushing against Bethel.

Rogers last week, 14-13. Federal Way has had a strong aerial attack both weeks, while the Eagles' ground game also sparked against Spanaway Lake before being shut off by Kentwood.

Scott Dixon rushed for an impressive 207 yards and two touchdowns the first week of the season, but managed only 20 yards on eight carries against the Conquerors.

Receiver Lake Dawson has racked up six touchdowns so far this season for the Eagles, including one on an end-around play.

Dawson snagged two seven-yard TD's against Kentwood and six passes for 64 yards, plus a two-point conversion pass.

Dawson caught four passes for 56 yards and three touchdowns against Spanaway Lake, and added the rushing touchdown and a

catch for a two-point conversion. Quarterbacking for the Eagles is senior Jeff Wagner, who is also having a good season.

Wagner completed 18 of 31 passes for 192 yards and two touchdowns last week, after completing eight of 14 for 112 yards against Spanaway Lake.

Another favorite target for Wagner has been Monte Macon, who had an apparent touchdown called back by a penalty against

the Conquerors. Clover Park has gone to the air for all three of its touchdowns so far this season, with senior Jim Pak performing the quarterback duties.

Park found Eric Carmichael in the end zone for the lone Warrior score against Puyallup, then fired the ball to Alan Allen for touchdowns of 53 and 46 yards last week.

Hill, Hilyer begin executive battle

Controlling growth promises to be a major issue in the King County Executive race.

With the field narrowed down to Democrat Bruce Hilyer and Republican Tim Hill, both candidates are offering what they call responsible plans to manage growth.

Hilyer, who was back campaigning full-time Wednesday after defeating Marvin Durning in the Tuesday primary, continued his attacks on Hill. Hilyer blamed the county executive for a recent county council decision to permit a major development in the Snoqualmie Valley, calling that action a sample of Hill's lack of leadership in controlling growth.

BUT THE Democrat also said that he will be offering "positive solutions to the problem of uncontrolled growth."

"I will plan with suburban cities to find a way to pay for growth, including developer fees to pay for roads, schools, parks, fire and other public services," said Hilyer.

Hill, who acknowledged that county residents are "concerned about growth and how growth is managed," said he has a record of managing growth, and cited transportation management as an example.

Hill said he plans to "reactivate efforts to document transportation needs, find out what it will cost and what are the funding options."

He said he intends to ask the state legislature and the governor for taxing authority, in-

cluding an increase in the gas tax, tied to specific transportation projects, such as the 1st Avenue South bridge.

Hill could not put a dollar amount on the tax increase he would be asking for.

THE INCUMBENT county executive said that concern over growth also was reflected in the race for County Council District 7, where Democratic challenger David Miller, a relative unknown, posted a good showing against Republican Paul Barden.

With only a few absentee ballots to be counted, the returns give Barden 62 percent of the vote, to Miller's 38 percent.

IN HIS OWN race, Hill accused Hilyer of campaigning with "simplistic solutions" to problems of growth and crime, and touted his own "experience and ability to get the job done."

Hilyer, meanwhile, was strategizing with his primary opponent, Marvin Durning, who promised to help the Democrat defeat Hill.

Durning, who blamed his loss on Tuesday on his late entry into the race, said he called Hilyer early Wednesday to offer help in the campaign.

One of the major issues of the Democratic primary, Hilyer's admission that he used marijuana during his college days, was downplayed by the Democratic victor.

"That is an issue of the past," he said. "People are not concerned about what happened in the 1960's. They are concerned about what's happening today."
