Schools declare bus barn surplus

Land up for sale or trade

The way is being cleared for the sale or trade of the Federal Way School District's bus barn and maintenance site, located in the heart of Federal Way's commercial district.

The Federal Way School Board agreed Monday that the

10-acre site should be surplused in coming weeks. Surplusing essentially informs the state and potential buyers the property soon will be available.

The site hardly needs that kind of publicity, however. The so-called MOT site (maintenance/operations/transportation) sits about six blocks west of Federal Way's busiest intersection, Pacific Highway South and South 320th Street, and faces a K-Mart discount store and Price Choppers

grocery. Just blocks away are the Century Square and SeaTac Mall shopping centers.

Such a location makes the site a juicy buy, particularly since it is zoned for commercial use.

It does have its drawbacks. A ring road now three-quarters complete around Federal Way's business district would split the land in half, if completed. And the north end of the property butts against an aging housing development, whose owners may fight commercial develop-

ment there.

But Richard Harris, superintendent of the Federal Way School District, said some offers already have been made on the site. The land's value has not yet been appraised, he said, although King County lists its assessed valuation at \$3.4 million. The appraised value likely will be higher.

ANY SALE or trade in the near future would be welcome by the district — the school district needs a larger site for its

growing transportation and maintenance departments, as well as the purchasing and security office housed on the same piece of property, Harris said.

But the district will be a choosy suitor, he added. Any sale must supply enough money to purchase more property, about 20 acres, upon which to relocate services. The district also would require some leeway

Moratorium to be lifted by March 1, city council says

Federal Way's interim zoning controls, which prohibit most development, will be lifted by March 1.

That's the word from the Federal Way City Council, which had asked the King County Council to impose the development moratorium on Sept. 25, mainly to stop apartment construction while giving the city time to write its own land-use policies.

The subsequently adopted interim zoning controls prohibit all new development except for single-family homes. Local business leaders said they didn't expect the moratorium to include commercial development and asked the city council to lift the controls immediately.

The city council isn't going to do that. Instead, it hired planning consultant Wilsey and Ham Pacific, of Bellevue, to help the council draft new land-use ordinances and policies.

On Tuesday, the consultant said it expects to complete those ordinances and policies by March 1.

The council may even decide what those policies will be before then and the controls could be lifted in February, said Councilman Jim Handmacher, chair of the council's Land-Use and Transportation Committee, at a council working session Tuesday.

MOST OF THE consultant's work will be on drafting a comprehensive land-use plan that includes policies governing what type of mitigation the city will require from developers. Mitigation is likely to include increased setbacks and landscaping from developers beyond what King County currently re-

quires. Other policies could include requiring larger contributions for roads.

Although business leaders would rather have the zoning controls lifted now, Federal Way Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Bob Green said the council is moving in the right direction by setting a date for lifting the controls.

"We would rather not have seen (the interim zoning controls) happen at all," Green said. "But we're pleased they addressed the timeline."

Now chamber officials will be able to tell potential commercial developers when projects may begin. That should help Federal Way retain potential business projects, Green said.

THE COUNCIL had intended to pay up to \$40,000 to Wilsey and Ham for its consulting work. However, representatives of the firm told the council Monday that it will cost \$75,000 for them to complete the work the council has asked for.

Handmacher said the consultant's scope of work is already "bare bones" and it would be unwise to reduce the issues the council would like to see worked on.

The council tentatively concurred with paying Wilsey and Ham the full \$75,000.

"We were probably unrealistic...in thinking it would cost \$40,000," said Mayor Debbie Ertel. "If it gets us what we need it may be money well-spent."

A public hearing on a draft of the comprehensive plan is tentatively scheduled for Dec. 19. The council's land-use committee will discuss land-use plans at weekly meetings, 7 p.m., Mondays, at city hall.

City council candidates' fundraising disclosed

Final campaign disclosure information shows that unsuccessful candidate Phil Watkins spent the most money in the Federal Way City Council elections.

Watkins spent \$15,880 and raised \$16,073. His opponent, Lynn Templeton, raised \$7,655 and spent \$6,746.

Most of Watkins' contributors donated relatively small amounts to his campaign. Most of his cash contributions were less than \$200, but he did receive \$500 from state Sen. Stan Johnson, of Tacoma, and several \$300 contributions from

people living outside Federal Way.

Templeton had the largest single cash contribution in any of the seven city council races. Marine Hills resident Ron Sandwith donated \$2,600 to Templeton. Dynasties Restaurant owner Warren Chinn donated \$1,000 to Templeton.

Position 2 winner Joel Marks raised the second-most amount of money with a total of \$9,125. He spent \$7,613. Most of his money came from \$100 contributions, however, he received \$704 from Stepan and Associates, a local engineering firm. He also received \$250 from Richard

Butko, listed as a Federal Way resident in campaign records, and \$200 from DBM Contractors, listed as a Federal Way construction firm.

Marks' opponent, Mark Freitas, who lost the Sept. 19 election, raised and spent \$6,849. Freitas' largest contributor was the Seattle-King County Association of Realtors, which donated \$1,000. Freitas also received \$250 from American Concrete and \$250 from H.B. Corliss.

NEXT IN LINE is Position 1 winner Mary Gates who raised \$8,478 and spent \$7,977. Gates' largest contributor was the

Seattle-King County Association of Realtors, which donated \$1,000 to her campaign. She received several \$300 contributions, including those from the Evergreen Industrial Park (Evergreen Truck Stop) and \$300 from local developer Andrew Cratsenberg.

Gates' opponent, Bill Shortt, raised \$5,961 and spent \$4,865. Shortt received a total of \$1,000 from Stepan and Associates and its owner Kent Stepan. He received \$750 from his son, Bruce Shortt, and \$500 from Tacoma resident Mike Vaughn.

Position 6 winner Bob Stead raised \$8,243 and spent \$6,166.

Among his largest contributors were the Seattle-King County Association of Realtors with a donation of \$750, Merle McClatchie with \$500, and Stead's law

Gray-haired bandit likes certain stores

One doesn't see many gray-haired armed robbers. By that time in life, most are either in jail, dead or retired.

That's why police say a gray-haired robber who hit two Federal Way stores in the past two weeks is a possible suspect in five other armed robberies in South King County and in Bellevue.

The gray-haired robber first hit in Federal Way Nov. 7 when he held up a clerk at Thriftway.

A gray-haired robber also held up the Woodmont Pay'N Save Nov. 11. In both instances a gun was used and the robber ordered the clerk to walk toward the back of the store as he made his escape through the front door.

Thriftway and Pay'N Save stores in White Center and Seattle also were robbed by a gray-haired bandit, and Fisher Drugs and Lakehills Drug Store in Bellevue were similarly vic-

timized, said Detective Robert Clark of the King County police robbery unit.

"It's possible these are the same guy. Some things in witness descriptions are different, but others are the same," Clark said.

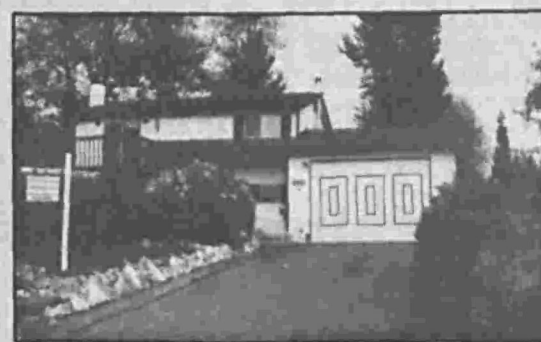
"Besides, you don't see too many armed robbers this guy's age. You don't get many over about 35," he added.

In each of the seven cases, the

robber picked a female clerk to hold up, making off with money from one cash register.

The robber who hit the Federal Way stores is 47 to 60, 5 feet 10 inches to 6 feet tall and 160 to 175 pounds. He has been described as having a beard that ranges from a few days' growth to a rough beard, Clark said. One witness said his hair was blond and turning gray and that he had a raspy voice.

between the sale of its land and the purchase of a new site, since MOT operations cannot be stopped while a new site is being developed.

Or the school district could go for a land swap, which would allow a nearly immediate move to a new site.

"We're open to whatever's out there, but (any agreement) has to provide us with a place to move to," Harris said.

The district also hopes to find a deal that will somehow include

the price of constructing new transportation, maintenance, security and purchasing buildings at the new site.

Harris said the district has not yet assessed the cost of building a new MOT site.

HARRIS can tick off several qualities a new MOT site must have. It must be on a fairly well-developed road. It must be easily accessible to all areas of the school district. It should have more than one road leading into it.

It shouldn't be on a road as busy as South 320th Street,

which has presented several driving hazards for bus drivers heading out of the present site. But then, it shouldn't be a residential site either.

A school district committee once thought it had found the perfect place, a district-owned piece of land under the Bonnevill Power Administration lines near West Campus. But public outcry quashed the idea then, and the property has since been traded for a school site near Illahee Junior High.

"It seemed a logical location for its size, but the more we look-

ed at it, the more we realized it was in a residential area. And there was no access — we would have had to build a road to the site what would have dumped out on First Avenue. And First Avenue is starting to look more and more like 320th," Harris said.

Many Federal Way roads are starting to look like busy South 320th Street. And homes and apartments are popping up, thick as flies.

"The right place is becoming tougher to find all the time," Harris said.

Flights fight for space in airport

Planners from the Federal Aviation Administration are examining ways to squeeze more planes into Sea-Tac Airport.

The net result may be that Bellevue and Mercer Island residents will hear more jet noise while noise levels in Southwest King County remain unchanged.

The FAA is trying to boost the number of planes that can land from the north, said Bill Butler, head of the task force recommending changes.

In prime weather conditions, 56 planes per hour can land from the south. However, only 42 planes an hour can land from the north, Butler said.

That's because planes coming from places such as New York and Minneapolis cut north of Seattle over Bothell before they turn south, instead of taking a direct route over Lake Washington, Butler said.

PLANES FROM airports such as Denver and Atlanta also cut north of Seattle instead of coming from the east for a direct landing.

In contrast, planes landing from the southwest and northwest fly in over Elliott Bay, a more direct shot to the airport.

The circuitous routes for planes coming from the east are the result of informal agreements made to certain communities over the years,

Butler said.

"The cumulative weight of these is killing us," he added, noting that Sea-Tac had the fifth highest number of delays of any major U.S. airport in August.

Butler and his task force have identified 13 different route changes to speed up landings for planes coming from the east.

The most efficient flight path for planes coming from the northeast would be to cut across Lake Washington, and for planes from the southeast to fly parallel to Interstate 405, cutting west north of Boeing Field, Butler said.

"I don't need to tell you this isn't real popular in Bellevue," he added.

HOWEVER, NOISE was a consideration when the new routes were drawn up, Butler said. Planners worked with the stipulation that areas not now affected by jet noise would not get planes flying overhead at levels lower than 3,000 feet.

A slightly modified plan would route only commuter flights and quieter (Stage III) aircraft over Lake Washington. Other jets would continue to fly north to Bothell before turning south.

The proposals were presented to Fred Issac, regional administrator of the FAA and Temple Johnson, air traffic division manager.

They will make the final decision. The earliest that a new flight path could be adopted would be Jan. 11. If a new flight route is not adopted by then, the FAA would have to wait another 56 days to change it, Butler said.

"We cannot continue to do nothing," Butler said. Airport flight paths have not changed since 1974, but the number of flights in and out of the airport have grown exponentially during that time, he said. "Delays are an abstract concept. But what it really means is late dinners, missed meetings and higher ticket prices," he said.

Irene Jones, a Sea-Tac resident who is working with the airport's Noise Mediation group, said she hopes the new routes are adopted soon, so that their impact can fully be discussed in mediation meetings before they end in April.

"The people in my community will say, Ha. Ha. Proves them (Eastsiders) right. They've never known noise before," Jones said. "It's awfully hard not to have that attitude when you've been impacted as much as we have."

But since it seems inevitable that the FAA will make changes, it would be helpful to have the new areas affected by noise join in noise mediation, she said.

Sutherland hired as Sea-Tac's manager

Tacoma Mayor Doug Sutherland was hired as the city of SeaTac's first permanent manager Tuesday night.

Sutherland will step down as Tacoma's mayor in January after serving the maximum two terms as mayor. He will finish his current term while serving as SeaTac's manager.

Sutherland, 52, has served as a volunteer moderator for pre-city council election forums for both SeaTac and Federal Way and was well-known and liked in both cities. He was recently honored for his work in Federal Way by a city council proclamation.

But while Sutherland seems well-liked, one SeaTac City Council member was upset at his lack of professional city managing experience. Councilwoman Jeanne Masters was the lone council member voting against Sutherland's appointment.

Sutherland replaces interim City Manager David Gago who resigned at Tuesday's SeaTac City Council meeting. Gago cited the long commute from



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Tacoma as a reason for leaving.

Sutherland, who also lives in Tacoma, will be paid \$5,500 a month.

In Federal Way, the city council hired interim City Manager Al Locke last month to work until a permanent manager is hired. That's expected to take about six months.

The city council has hired Waldron and Co., an executive search firm, to find manager candidates. The city is paying the firm \$20,000 plus up to \$8,000 in expenses.

Kent annexation meeting

The city of Kent is hosting a meeting Monday to discuss the merits of annexing a part of unincorporated King County in the West Hill area.

The boundaries of the proposed annexation are South 253rd Street to the North, Pacific Highway South to the west, Military Road South to the east and Star Lake to the south.

The purpose of the meeting at the Star Lake Improvement Club, is to determine support for the annexation, which could include all, or just a portion of

the area.

A small island of unincorporated land just south and west of Kent-Des Moines Road also is a possible annexation site.

City staff will attend the meeting to discuss the annexation and answer questions.

The meeting starts at 7 p.m. The clubhouse is at the corner of Military Road South and South 272nd Street.

His opponent, John Ridley, raised \$8,106 and spent \$7,904. Almost all of that was Ridley's own money. Ridley did receive an \$806 contribution of in-kind expenditures from ANP Publishing and \$250 from Jewelry Palace, a Federal Way retail store.

FOLLOWING STEAD in campaign fund-raising is Position 4 winner Jim Webster, who raised \$7,212 and spent \$6,742. Webster received \$500 from Federal Way residents Tom and Jan Crews, \$300 from Cratsenberg and \$200 from Federal Way resident Gerald Greenfield.

Webster's opponent, Elaine Cook, raised and spent \$3,220, most of it her own money. She received several smaller contributions including \$50 from local residents Francis and Ilene Marckx.

Position 5 unsuccessful candidate Bob Wood raised \$5,138 and spent \$5,155, most of that his own money. Wood received \$750

from the Realtor's association and \$100 from Federal Way resident P.W. Eicholz.

Position 5 winner Jim Handmacher raised \$4,613 and spent \$4,497. Handmacher received \$1,000 from Tacoma resident Gilbert Johnston, \$200 from Federal Way resident Rob Rueber and \$200 from Puyallup construction firm Schuur Brothers Construction.

Finally, Position 3 winner Debbie Ertel raised \$2,250 and spent \$2,093. Ertel received several \$100 contributions from Federal Way residents and \$100 from the Seattle Women's Political Caucus.

Ertel's opponent, Georgene "Jo" Asbury, raised and spent \$893, almost all of it her own money. Asbury received \$100 from Federal Way Water and Sewer District attorney John Bocek and \$150 from Seattle resident Ekhard Komen.

Any money left over from campaigns may be donated to other political campaigns or may be kept by candidates if it was earlier identified in campaign records as their personal funds.

Want to be instantly surrounded by a crowd of vocal cabbies at Sea-Tac Airport? Just mention STITA.

STITA — the new Seattle-Tacoma International Taxicab Association — is receiving plenty of comments these days.

By mid-December, all cab drivers who have not paid the \$40 dues, painted their cabs white and donned the official STITA uniform will find their access to airport limited by the Port of Seattle. Under a contract signed by STITA and the Port Commission, only STITA members will have full access to the airport.

"A lot of people snivel about it," said E. Ross Lunbeck, STITA president. But it's a necessity, he added.

Unless independent Sea-Tac cab operators band together and improve their service, the port could boot them out of the airport in favor of a company such as Farwest Taxi or Yellow Cab, Lunbeck said.

The new association will also give Sea-Tac cab drivers unity and a new image that will help them compete against Shuttle Express, Lunbeck said.

Under an agreement drawn up between the port and STITA, STITA members may operate at the airport for two years. After that, the agreement may be renewed on a yearly basis by the Port Commission.

"We have a two-year opportunity to live up to the terms of this contract," Lunbeck said. "It's better for the cab drivers to set their own mouse trap than to nitpick on the heels of the competitors."

OF 168 CAB drivers at Sea-Tac, 157 have joined STITA, according to Ike Jouhal, vice president of the organization.

However, 16 cab owners and drivers have hired an attorney to seek an injunction to halt enforcement of the contract.

Laird Knopp, a cab owner who opposes STITA, said it will take the independence out of being an independent operator.

He also opposes a STITA regulation that will require cabs to be no more than seven years old by June 1990, and no more than five years old by June 1992.

Current King County regulations say cabs cannot be more than six years old or have more than 100,000 miles to be relicensed. However, cabbies can get

Old pump pours out pastoral memories

In the quiet suburbs near Steel Lake, Ray Allen's old-fashioned pump seems out of place.

The handle and shaft mechanism that used to draw South Dakota water from the ground serves as a yard light now. Chrome-plated fixtures and stainless steel sinks have replaced the pump's simple faucet and bucket.

Allen, 56, told the Federal Way News "Weird Stuff" search the pump, sans light, was at his house before he was. He moved here in 1975. He grew up in Iowa.

That's why the old pump had a special meaning for him. It belonged to the original owner, who built the house in 1959. The pump came from South Dakota.

"It was from his grandfather's homestead or something," said Allen. "He really didn't want to leave it when he sold the house, but I

talked him into it."

He talked the owner into it because the pump brought back some childhood memories. "I was born on a farm in Iowa, and we had a pump just like that one before electricity days," he said.

The pump doesn't work anymore. The inner workings have rusted, and no well springs from the ground beneath it. Covered in white paint, it makes an odd lamp-post.

Allen put the lamp on it. "Oh, I just needed a light out here really," he said. "And rather than buying a yard light, I thought, 'That's as good a place as any to put a light.'"

around that if their vehicle passes a certified mechanic's inspection, said Tod Anderson, a King County licensing inspector assigned to taxicabs.

KNOPP CLAIMS the rule will impose a hardship to many at Sea-Tac.

"Most of those guys out here can't buy an '85 or '86 cab to run for a few years," he said.

Knopp just bought his cab this year. But John Faga's cab is a 1980 van. Even though the van is nine years old it has been maintained and runs like new, Faga said.

"Tell those port people we have enough regulations on our belly, we can barely swim," Faga said. "It's enough we have

to work 18 hours a day to support ourselves."

Working as a cabbie at Sea-Tac often means waiting hours for fares, and Knopp charges that STITA is an attempt to reduce the number of cab owners at the airport.

"STITA is not trying to push anyone out," Jouhal said. "I think when we improve our image, we will get more fares. We would like to be a classic airport in the United States."

But Lunbeck added, "We're going to reach a point here in two to four weeks if you don't have a uniform on, you're not going to be able to pick up on the lower drive."

Bicycle maps available soon

The King County Bicycle Guidemap, a product of a joint effort by King County, Cascade Bicycle Club and Recreational Equipment Incorporated (REI), will be in stores by next month.

The map is one of the most detailed collections of bicycle routes in the country. It documents thousands of miles of county, state and municipal roads and trails and also summarizes grades, conditions and road characteristics.

The map is the result of one year of research by the county and was partially supported by a \$5,000 grant from the Cascade Bicycle Club. REI will produce and distribute the map, which should be available in REI and bicycle stores around the county. The map costs \$5.

Bandit robs bank during lunch hour

A scruffy-looking man gave a bank clerk a stick-up note Wednesday and made off with an undetermined amount of cash.

The clerk at Puget Sound National Bank in the 1700 block of South 320th Street told police the man came into the bank at 12:08 p.m., loitered at the check-writing island for a moment, then approached her window.

She said he tossed a note at her that implied he had a gun and demanded money. She complied, and the man fled the bank running north toward Ernst.

The robber is described as white, 25-30, 5 feet 8 inches and 165 pounds. He has sandy blond hair, a scraggly beard and wore dark sunglasses, blue jeans, a jean jacket and boots.

Shoplifter fires at store employees

A fleeing shoplifter turned on grocery store employees who gave chase and fired a gun at them.

Employees at the Safeway store at South 288th Street and Military Road South said the man entered the store at about 2:50 a.m. Tuesday, grabbed a half-case of beer and walked out the front door without paying.

One employee alerted the others, and three gave chase as the man fled north toward South 288th Street. When he reached the street, the shoplifter turned on the store employees, displayed a small handgun, and fired one shot. No one was hit.

After dropping the beer, the man continued running east on South 288th without any further pursuit from the store employees. Four police dogs responded and tracked the man to South 284th and 38th Avenue South where they lost the scent.

The shoplifter is described as white, 25-28, 6 feet tall with a husky build. He has reddish-blond hair and wore light-colored blue jeans and a black leather jacket.

Boy turns in mom for using drugs

An 11-year-old boy turned his mother and her boyfriend in to police Monday for alleged drug activity.

The boy told police he was concerned about his mother's "spacey" behavior of late, and her live-in boyfriend's increased agitation with him. He said he suspected drug use from school lessons in the DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) program.

When his 37-year-old mother and her 34-year-old boyfriend left for work Monday, the boy searched their bedroom and found a box containing drug paraphernalia with trace residue of suspected cocaine and marijuana. He then called police, who took the box and its contents for lab analysis.

Child Protective Services was contacted, and the boy was sent to his father's home in Redmond, where two of the boy's brothers live.

Driver passes out in running pickup

A police officer responding to a report of a suspicious person discovered the driver of a pickup truck passed out, with his motor running and the truck sitting in the middle of a street.

The driver made it as far as the middle of 16th Avenue South at South 304th Street before he passed out at about 12:15 a.m. Sunday. The officer said the inside of the truck smelled strongly of alcohol, and the driver, a 30-year-old Federal Way man, had apparently just been sick.

A check showed the driver had an outstanding arrest warrant for driving on a suspended license. The officer roused the man to arrest him and search the car. That search turned up a small quantity of suspected cocaine.

The man was booked into the King County Jail.

Tacoma voters prefer fluoride by wide margin

Fluoride will stay in Tacoma's drinking water, but opponents who forced the issue on the Nov. 7 ballot said they will never give up trying to ban fluoride forever.

Tacoma voters approved fluoridating their drinking water in September 1988. However, anti-fluoride residents, calling themselves Citizens for Freedom of Choice, organized a petition drive to repeal fluoridation.

On Nov. 7, voters resoundingly voted to keep fluoride in their water by a margin of 58 percent to 42 percent. Election officials say 19,213 voted to keep fluoride, while 13,089 voted to repeal fluoridation. Those totals are the precinct results and absentee ballots available as of Nov. 7. More absentee ballots are left to be counted, but election officials say the results won't change.

Opponents say the proposal to repeal failed because of confusing ballot wording. Voters were

asked to vote "yes" if they wanted to repeal fluoride and "no" if they wanted to keep it.

"I think it was grossly unfair," said Wini Silko, a petition-drive leader. "Of course everybody who loses is going to say that."

Silko said many voters called Citizens for Freedom of Choice to say they mistakenly voted to keep fluoride. Also, other callers said they didn't know what the word "repeal" meant, she said.

Now the group plans to fight

fluoride on a national level by revealing what they believe is damning information about fluoride currently held by the federal government.

"This will be exposed as the biggest crime of the century," Silko said. "It's like a pressure cooker. It's going to explode."

Tacoma began adding fluoride to drinking water on July 24. According to the established medical community, fluoride is the most efficient, cost-effective

way of preventing dental decay.

Opponents blame fluoride for a litany of health problems.

Fluoridation affects about 2,000 residents of southwest Federal Way who get their water directly from Tacoma. Fluoridation will also affect the rest of Federal Way when Tacoma's Green River Pipeline 5 begins operating sometime in 1993. Federal Way will take water from the pipeline, which will be fluoridated at its Green River source.

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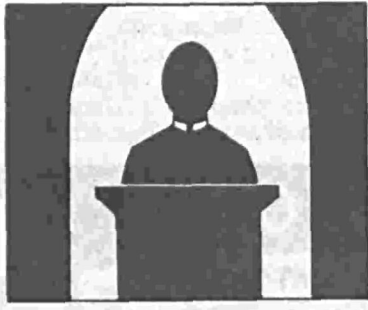

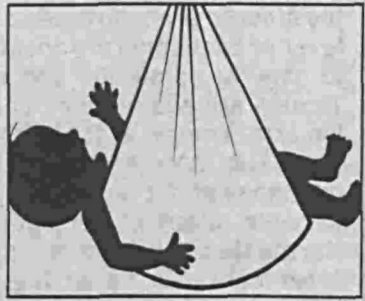

Pagliacci pitches its pizza

Authentic crust hits the bricks

Pizza doesn't always have to have tomato sauce, says Dorene McTigue, owner of the new Pizzeria Pagliacci in SeaTac Mall.

"There's certain things that just don't go right with tomato sauce," she said. "Truly, there's very little tomato sauce on pizza in Italy."

So Pagliacci's, a pizzeria in the East Coast tradition, has items on the pizza menu that use an olive oil and garlic sauce. Those gourmet pizzas feature esoteric toppings, like goat cheese and sun-dried tomatoes. "We felt it was time," said McTigue, 45. "Everybody wanted to move away from just pepperoni."

But pepperoni, tomato sauce and all the other familiar toppings still are on the menu of the new restaurant. And whatever pizza you order, it comes on an authentic Neopolitan crust, hand-tossed in the Old World style, and cooked in a brick oven.

"One of my passions and interests is Italian food," said McTigue. "My family is of Italian heritage, and I've spent time in Italy."

Her first pizzeria opened in Seattle's University district 10 years ago.

McTIGUE SAID the recipes are home-cooked. "Most of them are based on family recipes," she said.

Yes, there's pasta on the menu, too. Torte spaghetti and lasagna are made fresh each day. Brad Homan, manager of the SeaTac branch, said the lasagna is the most popular non-pizza item.

Several different salads are available, including specials ranging daily in price from \$2.50 to \$2.95.

A SLICE of pizza can cost \$1.25 to \$2.00, depending on your choice.

After the crust gets a thorough tossing, it's dressed and put directly into the brick oven, which Homan calls an advantage.

"It definitely adds a quality to the pizza that you don't get from a conveyor belt pizza," he said. "Our pizzas cook from the bottom up."

Heather Steven, lead cook at the pizzeria, handles the tossing. It took her four weeks to learn the technique of flicking the flexible dough into the air. It looks easy, but busy days can be tough. "After you work for five hours, your arms get tired," she said.

Full pizzas come in two sizes, 13 and 17 inches. The Original, which McTigue is proud of, has mozzarella, tomato sauce, oregano and spices. "Only a pizza with a very good crust can dare feature the Original pizza," proclaims the menu. The Original is \$6.90 for the 13-inch, and \$9.20 for the 17-inch.

For \$9.50 or \$11.95, you can get pepperoni, but you can add Italian sausage, mushrooms,

black olives, bell peppers and onions, and create the Brooklyn Bridge, which goes for \$12.50 or \$15.95. The gourmet pizzas with the olive oil and garlic sauce run around \$14.50 and \$16.50.

PIZZA CENTIOLI, named for McTigue's maiden name, is Pagliacci's exclusive creation. "It's kind of something that I created. It's taken off a classical idea," she said. "Some people call it Italian nachos." Pizza Centioli is an extra thin crust with olive oil, garlic, chili peppers, parsley, fontina cheese and mozzarella. It comes only in a medium size, and costs \$8.

One of the reasons McTigue opened a pizzeria in Federal Way was the demand from the community.

But Federal Way is decidedly different from the heavy

sidewalk traffic and packed-in buildings of urban Seattle. "It's a new experience for us, being in a mall. We feel pretty good," she said. "I really love the community. It's a happening little community. We're not cookie-cutter, either. We try to reflect the neighborhood that we're in, and give the community something they don't have. In

Federal Way, we see a real need for the pasta."

Pizzeria Pagliacci, in the food court at SeaTac Mall, is open from 11 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. Monday through Saturday, and 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday. Take-out orders as well as special orders not on the menu are available. Call 839-8595 for more information.

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A show on the Road

Bodett talks of follies and foibles, and no, it was not a Motel 6 ad

It's somewhat lonely, being an avid fan of Tom Bodett.

"Bodett?" friends ask. "That guy who offers to leave the light on for you at Motel 6?"

Yes, but he does 6 radio ads. Bodett also stars in an hour-long weekly radio show based in Homer, Alaska. He talks about scruffy, scrappy characters from his own imagination who populate The End of the Road, the last place you get to in Alaska before having to turn around. And 175 radio stations all over the U.S. have picked up on it.

"Oh," friends say. "Like Garrison Keillor."

Yeah, something like that. So it was a relief to know that Tom Bodett, that guy who rambles through the Motel 6 commercials and does what Garrison Keillor used to do, filled every seat last weekend in Kane Hall at the University of Washington, where he taped a show that will be aired in a few weeks.

At least 600 other Pacific Northwest residents have taken to Bodett, and so took time out for his Seattle show. And nearly all those 600 fans looked like me — fairly young, somewhat eccentric but too polite for punk. These were the people who would chuck it all and head to Alaska, given half a chance and

a good parka.

BUT BODETT does not exactly invite his listeners to the 49th state. Well, he does, but he doesn't mean it. You'd just jam the roads with your Winnebagos, and then he'd have to talk about you in his weekly Winnebago Report, which recounts the supposed foibles of Alaska tourists.

No, he's probably rather have you sit back Sunday nights, tune into KEZZ FM and listen to him and his piano-playing partner, Johnny B.

Bodett's tales honor average people — the town junkyard owner, the happily married couple, the left-wing activist and the cafe owner/city councilwoman all star in his weekly vignettes. They fight, complain, worry, laugh and wonder, so much like real people that one would be disappointed not to find them living somewhere in Alaska.

Bodett seldom elicits belly laughs. He opts for the comfortable chuckle ("Camping together is the emotional dipstick of a relationship...").

Unlike Keillor, his wisdom is tucked into the story, not displayed like a diamond. And poignancy is not hard to come by. The Alaskan oil spill hit the End of the Road hard, with its imaginary characters banging away at both sides of the issue. But it was the usually holier-than-thou minister who summed

things up for everyone:

"Oh God," he said. "We are so sorry."

TOM BODETT in person is something of a surprise. Despite his voice like an aged oak, he's only 34, and he looks like his audience, with suspenders and loafers and longish brown hair.

He performed here on a stage "decorated" with old tires, street cones and junk. Johnny B. played boogie woogie piano from across the stage and punctuated Bodett's tales with ditties. A stage manager counted down, pointed to the players, pointed to the audience, and generally kept everything moving along.

Bodett geared up with an old story first, of four friends on an outing that gets worse and worse until they wind up skiing naked through Alaskan wilderness by moonlight. The "real" show, taped for airing on Jan. 6, included a story about a young boy's first reaction to his first girlfriend's first babysitting job. "Now, children were somewhere between gerbils and spare car parts on his order of living things..." Bodett said, gliding into the heart of this tale. And somehow you knew that boy's outlook would change, even for a few moments, before the story ended.

It is strange to be told when to applaud wildly. The stage manager wagged his fingers at us, and we reacted on cue.

All 600 of us did one thing on our own, though, and you won't hear it on the Jan. 7 broadcast. We gave Bodett and his pianoman a standing ovation.

Tom Bodett's radio show, "The End of the Road," is aired Sunday nights at 8 p.m. on KEZZ, 98.9 FM.

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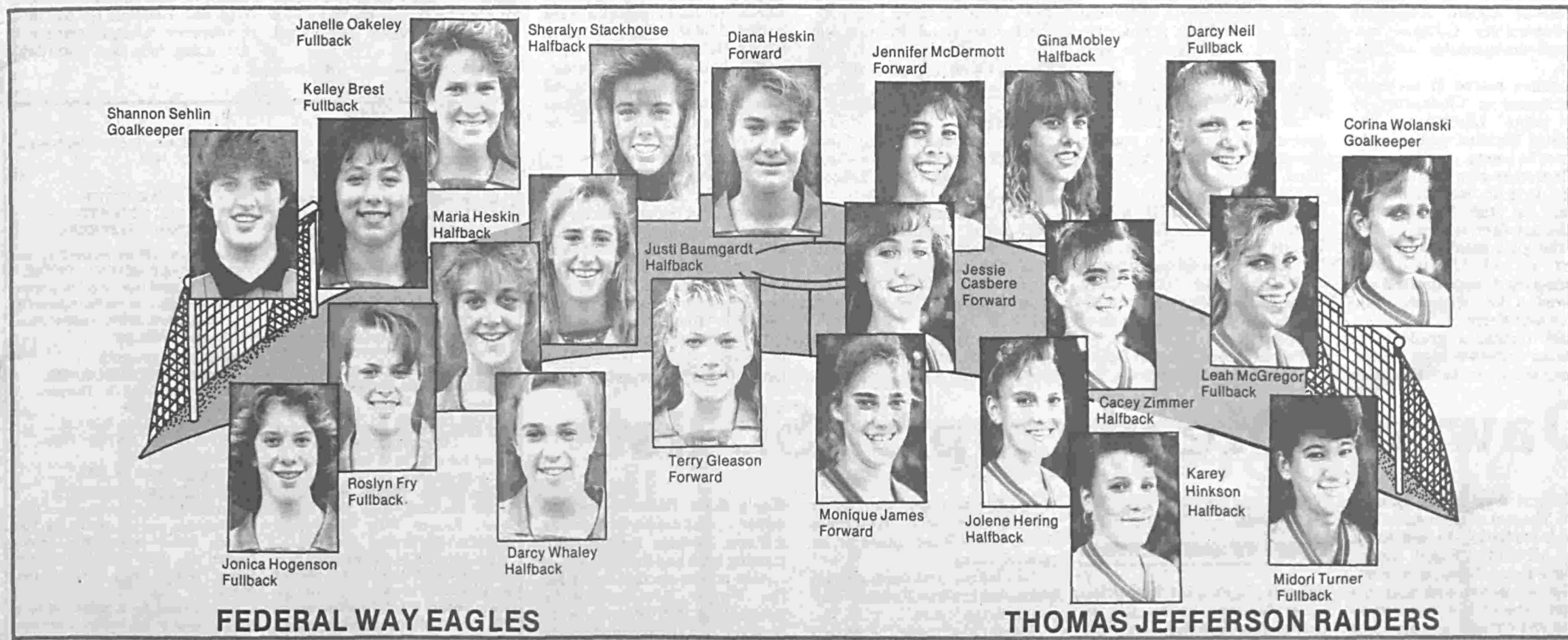

Eagles, Raiders braced for battle

Winner plays for state soccer title

Grab your thermoses, blankets and warm clothes, soccer fans. It's time for another epic battle between the Thomas Jefferson and Federal Way girls' soccer teams.

The Raiders and Eagles will meet for the second time this year at 7:45 tonight in Renton Stadium in the Class AAA state semifinals. The winner will play either Newport or Sammamish at 7 p.m. tomorrow for the state title. The losers will play in the consolation match at 3 p.m.

Tonight's showdown presents an opportunity for Federal Way (18-1-0) to avenge its only loss of the season, a 1-0 defeat to Thomas Jefferson (17-3-0) on Sept. 28 during the South Puget Sound League season.

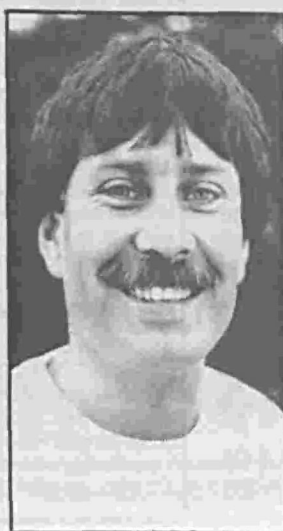

Garcia said Tuesday that "things could change very rapidly," however, due to a rash of injuries. "It's a decision of whether Jessie is back and probably Monique will be out," he said. "We're going to be shifting some people around."

Karalee Anderson also could be inserted into the Raider starting lineup as a halfback, Garcia said, while Lisa Brauner could start at fullback.

Federal Way's starting lineup is set. It consists of forwards Terry Gleason and Diana Heskin, halfbacks Darcy Whaley, Maria Heskin, Justi Baumgardt and Sheralyn Stackhouse, defenders Jonica Hogenson, Roslyn Fry, Kelley Brest and Janelle Oakeley and goalkeeper Shannon Sehl.

Federal Way and Thomas Jefferson have never met before in the state playoffs, and the Eagles have not beaten the Raiders since 1984, the first year of SPSL girls' soccer.

The Eagles would love to end the drought against the Raiders and earn a shot at their second state title (they won it in 1986), but Jefferson is intent on keeping the string intact.

Casbere said the Raiders feel as though they have away the league title after beating the Eagles during the regular season.

"We don't want to give it to them again," she said. "We want to take something."

The Eagles are just as fired up.

"We're not looking at Federal Way as some cross-town rival or anything. We're looking at Federal Way as another team, a very tough team that we have to beat."

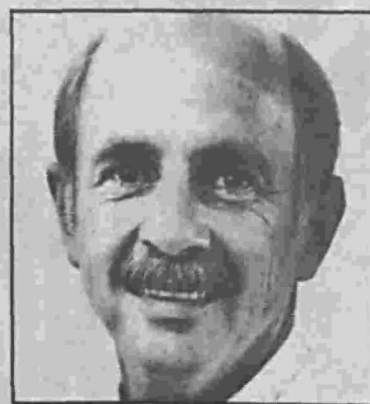
Parents play key role in supporting youth soccer

If it wasn't for mom and dad, there wouldn't be a soccer organization for the kids to play in. It's mom and dad that get the kids to practice, and to the games on time. Many times they have to drive across the state to a game.

A typical week for Rogers and Emily would go like this: Monday, pick up Maria and Diana from high school practice, go home and get ready for dinner and get Liana and Christina to soccer practice at 5 p.m. Liana practices at

Christina has had away games in Spokane and Bellingham and has a game in Vancouver coming up. On Sunday, Maria and Diana play their U-19 Spirit game. And that brings us back to Monday again.

As you can see, Roger and Emily play an important part in the soccer lives of

HCC harriers claim fourth consecutive crown

Call them the comeback kids. The Highline Community College men's cross country team overcame adversity to win the Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges conference championship last Saturday.

Highline scored 37 points to clip runner-up Clackamas by one point. Clackamas had defeated Highline earlier in the year by 50 points.

Clackamas also had taken an early lead in last Saturday's race, but the Thunderbirds rallied to pull off the win.

"The guys didn't panic, they just carefully worked themselves through the field and showed a lot of poise," said coach Ben Welch.

Carl Buena, a graduate of Thomas Jefferson High School, placed second in the 8,000-meter

(5 miles) race with a time of 26 minutes, 11 seconds, finishing behind Clackamas' Tim Bear-dall by only one second.

"He ran a very smart, tactical race," said Welch of Buena. "He ran tough. He's come a long way."

Buena was an alternate in this race a year ago, said Welch.

"He just made large improvements to come up and get second and almost win the thing," his coach said.

FINISHING THIRD in the team scoring was Lane Community College of Oregon with 79 points, followed by Spokane (105), Bellevue (132), Clark Community College from Vancouver (148) and Linn-Benton of Oregon (186).

The meet took place at Lower Woodland Park in Seattle.

Taking third individually was Lane's George Ulrich with a time of 26:39. He was followed by Highline freshman Bill Goodwin of Shorecrest (26:42), Clackamas' Gene Branberhorst (26:44), Clackamas' Nick Barger (26:51), Thomas Jefferson graduate Robbie Truva from Highline (26:58), Clackamas' Dusty Moore (27:00), Spokane's Gregg Cummins (27:01) and Lane Community College's Ted Leblow (27:04).

Other Highline placers were Chris Helm (Lindbergh) in 11th, 27:08; Terry Cushman (Kent-Meridian) in 13th, 27:23; Tim Vandervlugt in 14th, 27:29; and Spike English (Kent-Meridian) in 29th, 28:24.

"It was kind of an exciting way to wrap up an up and down season," said Welch, noting the

obstacles the T-Birds had to overcome.

For one, Buena suffered an injury to his foot during the season. Goodwin missed a week and a half of the season due to an illness, Helm also missed a week and a half with strep throat, Cushman had foot problems and English had kidney stones removed not too long before the conference race.

What was even more impressive for Highline was that Cushman got tripped during the race and managed to get up and still competed well. He had been accidentally knocked down by his own teammate, Truva, who also got up to run exceptionally well, said Welch.

Truva was another T-Bird who improved "just a tremendous amount" during the season, said

Welch, while Goodwin also showed great improvement. The best Goodwin had run during the season was fifth on HCC's team. At the conference meet, he ran second on the team and placed fourth overall.

Highline has now won four

conference championships in a row and seven altogether. That gives HCC the conference championship lead. Highline had been tied with Bellevue for the most conference championships with six going into last Saturday's race.

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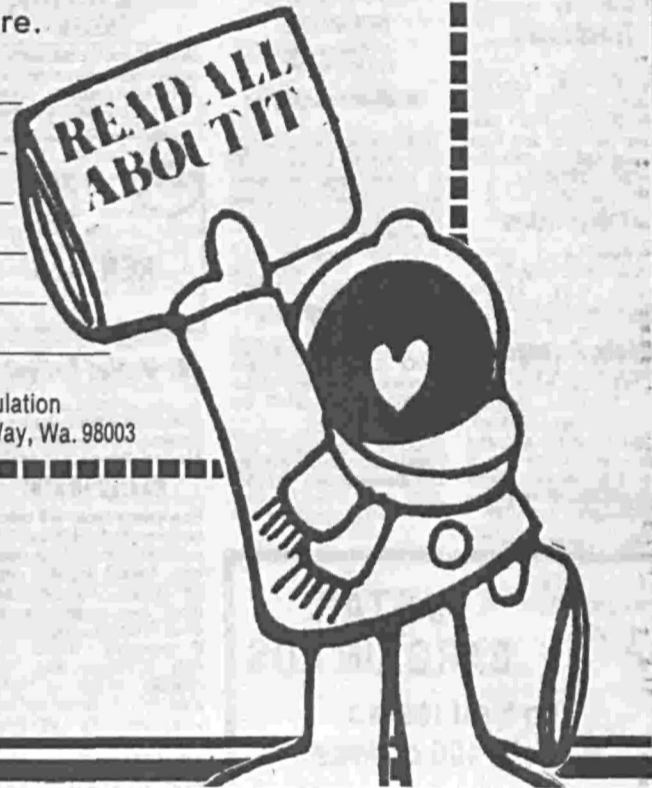

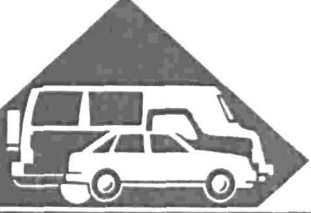

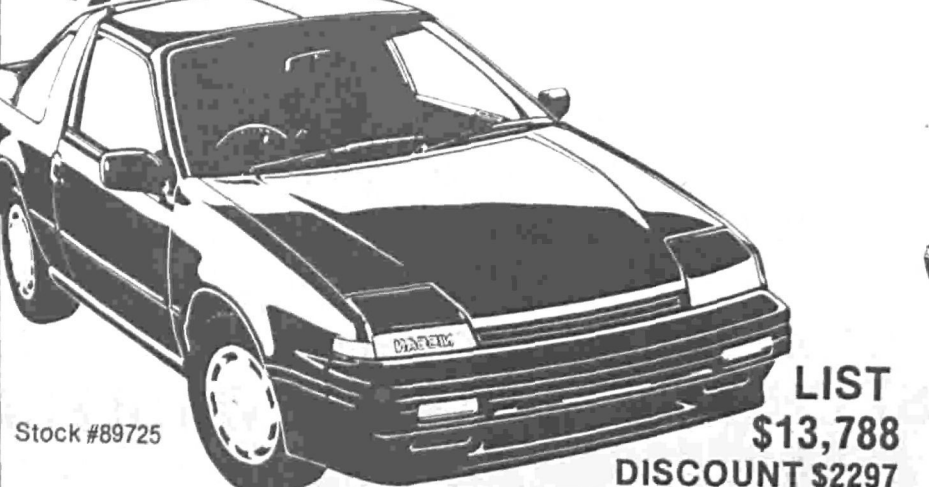
